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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

There are no restrictions on the republication of official documents appearing in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted

proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Proposed Amendment of Rule 1305—Governing Compulsory Arbitration; Recommendation No. 134

The Civil Procedural Rules Committee proposes to amend Rule of Civil Procedure 1305 governing compulsory arbitration. The recommendation is being submitted to the bench and bar for comments and suggestions prior to its submission to the Supreme Court.

The Explanatory Comment which appears in connection with the proposed recommendation has been inserted by the Committee for the convenience of the bench and bar. It will not constitute part of the rules nor will it be officially adopted or promulgated by the Court.

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1300. COMPULSORY ARBITRATION

Subchapter A. RULES

Rule 1305. Conduct of Hearing. Evidence.

(a) Except as prescribed by this rule, the rules of evidence shall be followed in all hearings before arbitrators. Rulings on objections to evidence or on other issues which arise during the hearing shall be made by a majority of the board.

(b)(1) **[If at least twenty days' written notice of the intention to offer the following documents in evidence was given to every other party accompanied by a copy of the document, a party may offer in evidence, without further proof,]** The following documents shall be admitted into evidence if at least twenty days' notice of the intention to offer them was given to every other party accompanied by a copy of each document to be offered:

[(1) (i) bills [, records and reports of hospitals, doctors, dentists, registered nurses, licensed practical nurses and physical therapists, or other licensed health care providers,] or other documents evidencing charges incurred;

Official Note: The board of arbitrators may find a bill authentic, necessary and reasonable without extrinsic evidence but is not required to do so.

[(2) (ii) [bills for drugs, medical appliances and prostheses,] records of businesses, government departments, agencies or offices, subject to statutory restrictions, provided that these are records which would otherwise be admissible if authenticated by a custodian of records;

Official Note: The restrictions on the admissibility of evidence under this subparagraph are unique to the records specified and are not found elsewhere in subdivision (b).

(iii) records and reports of hospitals and licensed health care providers;

(iv) expert reports and descriptions of expert qualifications;

[(3)] (v) [bills for or] written estimates of value, damage to, cost of repair of or loss of property; and

[(4)] (vi) [a report] reports of rate of earnings and time lost from work or lost compensation prepared by an employer.

(2) If twenty days' advance notice of intention to offer documents in evidence was not given but copies of the documents were provided to the other parties at least twenty days in advance of the hearing or during discovery, the admissibility of the documents without authentication shall be in the discretion of the arbitrators upon a finding of the absence of prejudice.

(3) A document which is received into evidence under subparagraphs (1) or (2) may be used for only those purposes which would be permissible if the person whose testimony is waived by this rule were present and testifying at the hearing. The arbitrators shall disregard any portion of a document so received that would be inadmissible if the person whose testimony is waived by this rule were testifying in person.

(4) Any other party may subpoena the person whose testimony is waived by this rule to appear at or serve upon a party a notice to attend the hearing and any adverse party may cross-examine [him] the person as to the document as if [he] the person were a witness for the party offering the document. The party issuing the subpoena shall pay the reasonable fees and costs of the person subpoenaed to testify, including a reasonable expert witness fee if applicable.

(c) A written estimate of value, damage to, cost of repair of or loss of property shall be accompanied by a statement of the party offering it whether the property was repaired and, if it was, whether the repairs were made in full or in part and by whom, together with the bill therefor.

(d) A party may offer in evidence, without the certification required by Sections 5328 and 6103 of the Judicial Code, an official weather or traffic signal report or a standard United States Government life expectancy table. A party may also offer any other official record kept within the Commonwealth without such certification if the provisions of subdivision (b) are followed.

Explanatory Note

The 1981 Explanatory Note to Rule 1305 will be deleted.

Explanatory Comment

Recommendation No. 134 proposes the amendment of Rule 1305(b) which relaxes the rules of evidence as to the introduction of certain types of written evidence at a hearing before a board of arbitrators in compulsory arbitration. First, the proposed amendment clarifies the

rule by providing that, if twenty days' notice of the intention to offer certain types of documents into evidence is given to every other party and if the notice is accompanied by copies of the documents, the documents "shall be admitted into evidence." Second, the recommendation broadens the categories of such evidence to include business and governmental records (subdivision (b)(1)(ii)) and expert reports and qualifications (subdivision (b)(1)(iv)). Third, new subdivision (b)(2) provides for the instance in which the required notice was not given but the other parties had received copies of the documents at least twenty days prior to the hearing or during discovery. Finally, new subdivision (b)(3) directs the board of arbitrators in its consideration and use of the documents admitted into evidence.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

LUZERNE COUNTY

Order Designating the Pre-Trial Service Program, as the County Bail Agency; No. 793 of 1996

Order

And Now this 7th day of March, 1996, the following Rule is adopted and shall become effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*:

Luz. Cr. 4010 Bail Agency:

In accordance with and pursuant to the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure, the Luzerne County Court designates the Luzerne County Pre-Trial Service Program as the County Bail Agency with all the duties and powers now or hereafter provided for by said Rules including the following:

- a. To interview every person detained in lieu of or in default of bail as soon as possible after the commitment to determine whether such person qualifies for release on some supervised or unsupervised form of bail.
- b. To secure such information as may be necessary and relevant to any bail decisions.
- c. To make recommendations as to the bail risks of any defendant as well as concerning the types of release and the conditions of release on bail for individual defendants.
- d. To investigate and evaluate the reliability and solvency of any surety and report the same to the Court and/or issuing authority.
- e. Supervising defendants when so designated by the bail authority.
- f. To be surety on any bail permitted by law.
- g. Administering percentage cash bail when authorized by a bail authority pursuant to the Rules of Criminal Procedure.
- h. To keep account of the whereabouts of defendants released on bail for whom it is surety or defendants who are released under their supervisory powers and author-

ity or any bail authorized by the agency and to inform the Court or issuing authority of any violation by such defendant of terms or conditions of their release.

i. To make reasonable rules and regulations necessary to implement the Bail Agency's functions and to make the same known to each person placed under the supervision of the Agency.

j. With the approval of the Court to set, collect and retain as a fee an amount reasonably related to the cost of administering the particular bail program.

k. Nothing in this rule shall prohibit the designation of other private surety in appropriate bail cases without the designation of the County Bail Agency of supervisory surety.

l. Nothing in this rule shall prohibit the posting of any appropriate type of bail allowed under the Rules of Criminal Procedure by other private or licensed sureties.

m. Any representative of the Bail Agency who seeks and obtains information from a defendant shall both orally and in writing advise a defendant that anything said to a Bail Agency representative may be used against said defendant.

n. Information obtained from or concerning any defendant shall be disclosed only to persons authorized by law to receive such information and use of the same shall be as now or hereafter restricted or limited by the Rules of Criminal Procedure.

Integrated Resource Planning for Natural Gas Utilities

On January 11, 1996, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) adopted an Order on Reconsideration for the final rulemaking to state specifically that jurisdictional gas utilities with less than 8 billion cubic feet (8 Bcf) of annual sales are exempt from reporting requirements. Integrated Resource Planning (IRP) provides for a more comprehensive decisionmaking process which facilitates optimization of the resource mix to meet future customer demand in least-cost fashion. Through the rulemaking, we have updated existing forms, consolidated reporting requirements, and eliminated obsolete forms. The regulations are applicable to gas utilities with sales in excess of 8 Bcf annually. The contact person is Thomas Heck, (717) 783-1985.

Executive Summary

On January 11, 1996, the Commission adopted an Order on Reconsideration for the final rulemaking regarding IRP specifically stating that jurisdictional gas utilities with less than 8 Bcf of annual sales are exempt from reporting requirements. This order fulfills the statutory procedure of section 7(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.7(c)) which requires an agency to submit a report to the Legislative Standing Committees, the Governor's Office and Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) within 40 days of receipt of IRRC's disapproval order.

On September 27, 1995, the Commission adopted a final rulemaking implementing annual IRP for eligible gas utilities which was disapproved by IRRC. On December 14, 1995, the Commission received written notice of this disapproval and responded by letter dated December 18, 1994, notifying IRRC of its intent to proceed to implement final-form regulations with further revisions or modifications under the procedures designed in section 7(c) of the Regulatory Review Act.

IRP provides for a more comprehensive decisionmaking process which facilitates optimization of the resource mix to meet future customer demand in least-cost fashion. Through the rulemaking, we have updated existing forms, consolidated reporting requirements and eliminated obsolete forms. The regulations are applicable to gas utilities with sales in excess of 8 Bcf annually.

Regulatory Review

Under section 7(a) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Commission submitted a copy of the final rulemaking, which was published as proposed at 23 Pa.B. 4095, and served on August 13, 1993, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of House Committee on Consumer Affairs and the Senate Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure for review and comment. In compliance with section 5(b.1) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Commission also provided IRRC and the Committees with copies of the comments received, as well as other documentation.

In preparing these final-form regulations, the Commission has considered the comments received from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

These final-form regulations were deemed approved by the House Committee, were approved by the Senate Committee on January 30, 1996, and were approved by IRRC on February 7, 1996, in accordance with section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(c)).

Order on Reconsideration

By the Commission:

The Commission's final-form regulations pertaining to IRP for gas utilities were adopted on September 27, 1995, and submitted for review to the Governor's Budget Office, the Attorney General, the House and Senate designated standing committees and IRRC pursuant to the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. §§ 745.1—745.15).

The final-form regulations were deemed approved by the House Consumer Affairs Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. However, on December 14, 1995, IRRC officially disapproved the final-form regulations. The IRRC disapproval is based on IRRC's opinion that clarification is necessary to specify the identity of those major jurisdictional gas utilities subject to the filing requirements.

Pursuant to section 7(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Commission may submit revised final-form regulations within 40 days of the IRRC disapproval. Because the Commission believes that integrated resource planning is beneficial for gas utilities and ratepayers, we shall proceed expeditiously to consider the issue raised in the IRRC disapproval order and to resubmit the final-form regulations. The primary benefit of the IRP is that it requires an annual resource planning report (ARPR) and provides for a more comprehensive decisionmaking process by natural gas utilities. This rulemaking also consolidates reporting of natural gas utilities.

The issue raised by IRRC concerns the necessity to specify the threshold level of sales of those major jurisdictional gas utilities subject to the filing requirements. Upon consideration of the IRRC disapproval order adopted December 6, 1995, we shall amend our regulations to specifically provide that jurisdictional gas utilities with annual sales of eight Bcf per year or more shall be required to submit annual IRP reports.

We believe that this modification to our regulations will address the concern raised by IRRC as to which jurisdictional gas utilities are obligated to file these IRP reports. Accordingly, under 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 308(c), 501, 504, 523, 1319 and 1501, and the Commonwealth Documents Law (45 P. S. § 1201 et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder at 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1—7.4, we hereby delete regulations at §§ 59.61 and 59.67 and add regulations at §§ 59.81—59.84; and amend regulations at §§ 59.62, 60.8 and 69.181, with ellipses referring to the existing text of

the regulations, in the manner set forth in Annex A; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered that

1. The Commission's final-form regulations adopted September 27, 1995, at this docket are hereby modified consistent with Annex A and the discussion herein. We hereby order that §§ 59.61 and 59.67 are deleted; §§ 59.81—59.84 are added; and 59.62, 60.8 and 69.181 are amended, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

2. The Secretary shall submit this order and Annex A to the House and Senate designated standing committees, and IRRC for their review, and a copy to the Governor's Office via General Counsel.

3. The Secretary shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for review as to form and legality and to the Governor's Budget Office for fiscal review.

4. The Secretary shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau.

5. This order is submitted under the requirements of section 7(c) of the Regulatory Review Act pertaining to procedures for subsequent review.

Subpart C. FIXED SERVICE UTILITIES

CHAPTER 59. GAS SERVICE

REPORTING AND CURTAILMENT OF SERVICE

§ 59.61 (Reserved).

§ 59.62. Gas sales ban.

* * * * *

(e) Each jurisdictional utility having suspended new sales under subsection (a) shall petition the Commission for express approval prior to commencement of sales to new gas customers—to include the expansion of service or new service to an existing customer. New or expanded sales shall be permitted to all customer classes as defined in § 69.21 (relating to priority of service); except that for Priorities 5 and 6 customers, equivalent alternate fuel capacity installed within 1 year of commencement of service is to be required by the utility as a precondition to new or expanded service. A petition to resume new sales shall be in full compliance with this section and shall contain supporting data that includes an updated integrated resource planning report as required at § 59.81(a) (relating to periodic reporting requirements for major gas utilities).

(1) A detailed statement of energy efficiency standards which the utility proposes to require, if any, for entitlement to new or expanded service, to be included in the rules and regulations of its tariff.

(2) Projections for the current year and 3 forward years, by priority classification under § 69.21 of the

number of new customers and associated consumption in each priority class to be served.

(3) A brief economic impact statement discussing the effects of new or expanded sales, including any effect on unemployment, the demand for alternate fuels and local economic conditions, the estimated cost of future gas supply, and the effects of increased gas prices on various classes of customers and industries within the utility's service area.

(4) Other information as the Commission may, by this title or by special order, require.

(f) When a major jurisdictional gas distribution utility subject to the sales-ban provisions of this section determines in the ordinary course of its business that a customer has connected a gas appliance in violation of this section, the utility shall promptly notify the customer and the Commission, in writing, of a violation. If the customer does not remove the unauthorized gas equipment within 30 days after a notice is served on the customer, the utility shall disconnect gas service until the equipment is removed; however, in the case of residential customers, termination after expiration of the 30-day period shall be under Chapter 56, Subchapter E (relating to termination of service), and no disconnections may be required or permitted during the winter heating season, November 1 through March 31. New customers shall be notified in writing of the restrictions against and implications of unauthorized attachments at the time of application for service and shall be informed of the fact that written application to the utility is required any time the addition of new or larger-capacity gas burning equipment is contemplated.

§ 59.67. (Reserved).

ANNUAL RESOURCE PLANNING REPORT

§ 59.81. Periodic reporting requirements for major gas utilities.

(a) For the purposes of this subchapter, each jurisdictional public utility with sales of 8 billion cubic feet per year or more including transportation volume shall submit to the Commission an annual integrated resource planning report. Except for Form 1A/2A, whose filing date is March 1, copies of the report shall be submitted on or before June 1, 1996, and June 1 of successive years. An original and five copies of the report shall be submitted. This report shall include a plan that includes the past year's historical data, program changes, and the next 3-year forecast. One copy of the report shall also be submitted to the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate and the Office of Trial Staff. The information contained within the report shall conform to the following requirements:

(1) The name and telephone number of persons having knowledge of the matters, and to whom inquiries should be addressed.

(2) A forecast of annual, winter season and peak day energy demand requirements in million cubic feet displayed by component parts, as indicated in Form 1A, Form 1B and Form 1C, respectively. The load growth projections shall reflect the effects of price elasticity, market-induced conservation, building and appliance efficiency standards and the effects of the utility's existing and planned conservation and load management activities.

(3) A forecast of annual, winter season and peak day energy resources in million cubic feet indicating sources of presently available and new supplies which the utility

estimates will become available displayed by component parts, as indicated in Form-IRP-Gas-2A, Form-IRP-Gas-2B and Form-IRP-Gas-2C, respectively.

(4) A forecast of the number of customers (year end) displayed by component parts, as indicated in Form-IRP-Gas-3.

(5) A summary forecast of annual, winter season and peak day energy resources and demand requirements in million cubic feet, as indicated in Form-IRP-Gas-4A, Form-IRP-Gas-4B and Form-IRP-Gas-4C.

(6) The data required under paragraphs (1)—(5) shall consist of the past 5 years actual historical data, the current year (both actual and projected) and a 3-year forecast. For the purpose of this section, the term “current year” refers to the year in which the filing is being made.

(7) A detailed discussion of the methodologies, data sources and assumptions used in preparing the information required by this section shall be included.

(b) The reporting formats referred to in this section are contained in § 59.84 (relating to formats). Annual data shall be submitted on a calendar year basis, January 1 through December 31. If the utility purchases gas on a contract basis other than a calendar year, the contract time interval shall be identified. Winter season data shall be submitted for the period November 1 through March 31, unless compelling reasons require the use of a different interval, in which case, the interval utilized shall be indicated.

(c) Annual integrated resource planning reports submitted under subsection (a) shall be accompanied by a summary suitable for public distribution. The summary shall include an implementation plan specifying activities scheduled for the acquisition and development of the resources delineated in the report, which are to take place during the planning period. Utilities shall maintain copies of the summary open for public inspection during normal business hours.

(d) Informal sessions may be scheduled for reviewing integrated resource plans and providing an opportunity for interested parties to participate in the review process.

§ 59.82. Annual Conservation Report.

(a) For purposes of this subchapter, each jurisdictional gas utility with sales of 8 billion cubic feet per year or more including transportation volume, shall submit its Annual Conservation Activities Report and incorporate it with the reporting requirements found at § 59.81(a) (relating to periodic reporting requirements for major gas utilities) on or before June 1 of each year except for Form 1 which is due March 1. The report shall contain a description of conservation and load management programs implemented or operational during the past calendar year and programs which are proposed to be implemented within 1 year following the filing of the report.

(1) A conservation program shall include a method designed to produce a reduction in total annual energy use, regardless of its effect on peak demand.

(2) A load management program shall include a method to reduce the peak or maximum load or demand, with little or no change in total annual energy use.

(b) The description shall conform to the Form-IRP-Gas-5 and shall contain:

- (1) A descriptive title of the program.

- (2) The purpose or objective.

- (3) The details of program activity and implementation schedule.

- (4) An accounting of the monetary and personnel resources actually or proposed to be expended or devoted to the program.

- (5) The actual or anticipated results of the program in terms of energy savings, reduction of utility on peak demand or other appropriate measure of the program's objective.

(c) The report shall also contain, for each class or type of energy user the number of customers in each class as of the end of the previous year, the total energy consumed by each class and the individual target consumption reductions for each class, as indicated on Form-IRP-Gas-6.

(d) The report shall include a summary of programs, as indicated on Form-IRP-Gas-7.

(e) For each program with an annual utility expenditure of more than \$100,000 or more than 0.1% of total annual revenue, whichever is less, excepting informational, educational or research and development programs, the utility shall submit a cost-benefit analysis using the common evaluation methodology in § 59.83 (relating to evaluation methodology), as indicated on Forms-IRP-Gas-8 and IRP-Gas-9.

(f) The Commission, through its Bureau of Conservation, Economics and Energy Planning, may issue a list of specific conservation and load management programs which shall be considered for implementation by each designated utility. The utility shall provide information documenting the consideration of these and other conservation and load management options and supporting the utility's decision of whether or not to implement the options.

(g) Utilities shall maintain copies of the annual conservation reports open to public inspection during normal business hours. Customers shall be notified, in writing, of the availability of the reports for public inspection. Notification may be included with customers' monthly bills.

(h) The following forms have been provided for under this chapter as a format to be used in preparing the annual conservation report:

- (1) Form-IRP-Gas-5—Program Description.
- (2) Form-IRP-Gas-6—Energy Users.
- (3) Form-IRP-Gas-7—Program Summary.
- (4) Form-IRP-Gas-8—Cost-Benefit Analysis Inputs.
- (5) Form-IRP-Gas-9—Cost-Benefit Analysis Results.

§ 59.83. Evaluation methodology

For purposes of this subchapter, each jurisdictional utility with sales of 8 billion cubic feet per year or more including transportation volume, shall utilize benefit-cost methodologies as prescribed by the Bureau of Conservation, Economics and Energy Planning to evaluate the costs and benefits of conservation and load management programs, and demand-side management programs. The cost-benefit methodologies shall be utilized by the utility during the next program year after they are prescribed.

§ 59.84. Formats.

In preparing the annual integrated resource planning reports required by § 59.81(a) (relating to periodic report

ing requirements for major gas utilities), each jurisdictional utility shall use the forms and schedules specified by the Bureau of Conservation, Economics and Energy Planning, which shall include the following:

- (1) Form-IRP-Gas-1A—Annual Energy Demand Requirements; Form-IRP-Gas-1B—Winter Season Energy Demand Requirements; Form-IRP-Gas-1C—Peak Day Energy Demand Requirements.
- (2) Form-IRP-Gas-2A—Annual Energy Resources; Form-IRP-Gas-2B—Winter Season Energy Resources; Form-IRP-Gas-2C—Peak Day Energy Resource.
- (3) Form-IRP-Gas-3—Number of Customers (Year End).
- (4) Form-IRP-Gas-4A—Annual Supply/Demand Summary; Form-IRP-Gas-4B—Winter Season Supply/Demand; Form-IRP-Gas-4C—Peak Day Supply/Demand Summary.
- (5) Form-IRP-Gas-5—Program Description.
- (6) Form-IRP-Gas-6—Energy Users.
- (7) Form-IRP-Gas-7—Program Summary.
- (8) Form-IRP-Gas-8—Cost-Benefit Analysis Inputs.
- (9) Form-IRP-Gas-9—Cost-Benefit Analysis Results.

CHAPTER 60. NATURAL GAS TRANSPORTATION SERVICE

§ 60.8. Reporting requirements.

A natural gas utility shall submit to the Commission an annual report on or before June 1 regarding transportation service that includes the following information:

- (1) The volumes transported for each customer.
- (2) The rate charged each customer for transportation service.
- (3) A description of the rate and service, approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, under which the gas is carried to the facilities of the natural gas utility.

CHAPTER 69. GENERAL ORDERS, POLICY STATEMENTS AND GUIDELINES ON FIXED UTILITIES

RECOVERY OF TAKE-OR-PAY EXPENSES

§ 69.181. Recovery of take-or-pay expenses—statement of policy.

* * * * *

(p) A utility which is permitted to recover take-or-pay costs, regardless of the forum for recovery, is required to file with the Commission an annual report due at the same time as Form 1 as specified by § 59.81(a)(1) (relating to periodic reporting requirements for major gas utilities) regarding take-or-pay recovery that includes the following information:

Title 61—REVENUE

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

[61 PA. CODE CH. 817]

Wild Card Lotto

The Department of Revenue (Department), adopts amendments to Chapter 817 (relating to additional plans, games and drawings after September 1981).

In response to interest among lottery players, the Department is amending the Wild Card Lotto game regulations to allow a player to select a cash option at the time a Wild Card Lotto ticket is purchased. The cash option is a method of payment wherein the player elects to receive a parimutuel share of the prize money allocated to the first prize category as a lump sum cash payment in the event that that player subsequently becomes the holder of a winning ticket for that category. If a player does not select the cash option at the time of purchase, and the player subsequently becomes the holder of a winning ticket for the first prize category, the holder will receive a parimutuel share of the prize money allocated to the first prize category in accordance with the existing annuity provisions for that category. When the cash option is selected, the wording "cash payment" will appear on the ticket. This regulatory change may produce an undetermined increase in sales. The cash option has been implemented in other states with positive results.

Interested persons may comment on any lottery game by contacting the person specified in this preamble. Because of the time constraints associated with the establishment, operation and administration of lottery games, the Department finds that notice of proposed rulemaking is impracticable. More specifically, the efficient operation of the Lottery requires that the Lottery be up-to-date with the latest innovations and trends in the lottery industry. The inability to adapt quickly to ever-changing marketing strategies can have a drastic effect upon Lottery revenues. The need for the Lottery to react quickly to market forces has been recognized in the past as a valid reason for promulgating lottery regulations under the proposed rulemaking omitted process. Therefore, under section 204 of the act of July 31, 1968 (CDL) (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1204) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4, proposed rulemaking has been omitted.

Fiscal Impact

The Department has determined that the amendments will have no significant adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth; to the contrary, the amendments may produce an undetermined net revenue.

Paperwork

The amendments will not generate substantial paperwork for the public or the Commonwealth.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

The amendments will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. No sunset date has been assigned.

Contact Person

The contact person for an explanation of the amendments is Anita M. Doucette, Office of Chief Counsel, Department of Revenue, Dept. 281061, Harrisburg, PA 17128-1061.

Authority

The amendments are promulgated under section 6 of the State Lottery Law (act) (72 P. S. § 3761-6). Section 6(a) of the act specifically provides the Secretary of Revenue with the power and duty to promulgate rules and regulations governing the establishment and operation of the lottery.

Regulatory Review

The amendments are not required to be submitted to the Department of Aging for comment under section 2203-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 581-3 (27)). However, under section 2203-A the Department has submitted the amendments to the Department of Aging for comment as a courtesy.

Under section 5(f) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(f)), the Department submitted a copy of these amendments with proposed rulemaking omitted on February 12, 1996, to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees on Finance. On the same date, the amendments were submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. §§ 732-101—732-506). In accordance with section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, these amendments were deemed approved by the Committees on March 3, 1996, and were approved by IRRC on March 6, 1996.

Findings

The Department finds that the regulations are necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute. Under section 204 of the CDL, the Department also finds that the proposed rulemaking procedures in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) are impracticable because of the time constraints associated with the establishment, operation and administration of lottery games.

Order

The Department, acting under its authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 61 Pa. Code Chapter 817, are amended by amending §§ 817.113, 817.116, 817.118 and 817.120 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

(b) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Secretary of the Department shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

CHAPTER 817. ADDITIONAL PLANS, GAMES AND DRAWINGS AFTER SEPTEMBER 1981

WILD CARD LOTTO

§ 817.113. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Apparent winning ticket—A standard game ticket bearing winning numbers which has not been validated by the Lottery.

Cash option—A method of payment which the player selects at the time of purchase of a Wild Card Lotto ticket in order to receive payment of a parimutuel share of the prize money allocated to the first prize category as a lump sum cash payment in the event that the player subsequently becomes a holder of a winning ticket for that category.

Game panel, panel or game grid—The area of the bet slip which contains 48 squares numbered 1 through 48. A game panel is lettered and, when used to purchase a ticket, corresponds to the numbers selected and printed on the ticket.

On-line retailer or retailer—A person licensed to sell Lottery tickets who has been approved by and contracted with the Lottery to sell Wild Card Lotto tickets.

Standard game ticket or ticket—A Wild Card Lotto ticket, produced by an on-line retailer in an authorized manner, containing two separate plays, each containing a letter prefix followed by six selected numbers from 1 through 48, a drawing date, the amount bet, cash option selection, if applicable, and validation number data.

Wild Card Lotto bet slip—A card used in marking a player's bet having ten game panels, each containing 48 squares numbered 1 through 48. A game panel is identified by one of the following letters, A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I or J.

Wild card number—A seventh number selected at random at a Wild Card Lotto drawing, which shall be utilized to determine winners who have three, four or five winning numbers in addition to this number.

Winning numbers—Six numbers, from 1 through 48, randomly selected at a valid Wild Card Lotto drawing which shall be used to determine the winning plays contained on standard game tickets.

Winnings pool—The amount allocated from Wild Card Lotto gross sales for a particular Wild Card Lotto game drawing for the purpose of paying parimutuel prizes in a particular Wild Card Lotto game drawing but excluding money brought forward from a previous Wild Card Lotto game drawing.

§ 817.116. Wild Card Lotto bet slip and ticket characteristics and restrictions.

(a) The player shall select, or request selection by computer, six numbered squares in each of two game grids on a bet slip. In addition, the player may select the cash option method of payment of the first prize category. The cash option shall be selected at the time of purchase. Bet slips shall be available at no cost to the purchaser. The minimum entry is \$1. For \$1, play games A and B; for \$2, play games A, B, C and D; for \$3, play games A, B,

C, D, E and F; for \$4, play games A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H; for \$5, play games A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and J. Game panels shall be selected in alphabetical order in accordance with the instructions printed on the bet slip. A bet slip has no pecuniary or prize value and does not constitute evidence of purchase or numbers selected.

(b) To purchase a Wild Card Lotto ticket, players shall pay the purchase price to an authorized retailer, submit the completed bet slip, or request number selection by computer selection, and select the cash option, if applicable. The authorized retailer shall issue a standard game ticket, which shall contain the six number selections played in each game grid—identified by a letter as described in subsection (a)—the drawing date, amount bet, cash option selection, if applicable, and validation number date. This standard game ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed, and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize. The standard game ticket shall contain two separate plays prefixed by a letter corresponding to the bet slip. The standard game ticket shall only be valid for the drawing date printed on the ticket.

(c) If bet slips are unavailable, plays may also be given to an authorized retailer in groups of six number selections for each of two game grids for each \$1 wagered. In addition, the cash option, if selected, shall be given by the player at that time. The selections shall be manually entered into the computer terminal by the retailer.

(d) A standard game ticket may only be cancelled by a player if he produces the ticket, returns the ticket to the selling agent and cancels the ticket within the time limits established by the Lottery prior to the drawing and if no drawing applicable to the ticket has previously been held.

(e) It is the sole responsibility of the ticket purchaser or holder to verify the accuracy and condition of data printed on the standard game ticket. The sole remedy of the purchaser or holder is cancellation as described in subsection (d).

§ 817.118. Determination of prizewinners.

* * * * *

(i) Winning Wild Card Lotto prizes will be paid as follows:

(1) Prizes payable to the first prize category winners will be paid either by an initial cash payment plus equal annual payments over a specified term of 20 years or by a

one time cash payment if the player selected the cash option at the time of purchase.

(2) Individual ticket prize payments for the second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth prize categories will be paid entirely in cash.

(3) If more than one winning play is determined, each, upon meeting the requirements of §§ 817.120 and 817.121 (relating to ticket validation requirements; and procedures for claiming and payment of prizes), is entitled to a prorated payment share of the total first prize category.

(4) For first prize category payments, the total of initial cash payments and annual payments over the term for the first prize category may not be less than \$1 million, or, if the cash option is selected at the time of purchase, a single cash payment in an amount equal to the funds necessary, as determined by the Lottery, to purchase an annuity of not less than \$1 million. If more than one winning play is determined, each is entitled to a prorated payment share of the total first prize category as provided in paragraph (3).

* * * * *

§ 817.120. Ticket validation requirements.

(a) *Valid tickets.* To be a valid Wild Card Lotto ticket, the following conditions shall be met:

* * * * *

(8) The player selected or computer selected numbers on the ticket shall be in individual groups of six numbers each associated with a single letter, A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I or J and the six numbers and the associated letter shall constitute a single lettered game grid play. The cash option, if selected, shall be present on the ticket.

* * * * *

(10) The player selected or computer selected numbers, the cash option, if selected, the validation number data and the drawing date of an apparent winning ticket shall appear on the official file of winning tickets; and a ticket with that exact date may not have been previously paid.

STATEMENTS OF POLICY

Title 7—AGRICULTURE

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

[7 PA. CODE CH. 17a]

Guidelines for Approval of Optional Training Programs for Humane Society Police Officers

The Department of Agriculture (Department), Bureau of Animal Industry, hereby adopts Chapter 17a (relating to interim guidelines for approval of optional training programs for humane society police officers).

The Humane Society Police Officer Enforcement Act (act) (3 P. S. §§ 456.1—456.7), became effective on February 10, 1995. In summary, the act defines "humane society police officers," sets forth minimum training requirements and requires that humane society police officers seek and obtain appointment by a court of common pleas, under 22 Pa.C.S. § 501 (relating to appointment by nonprofit corporations), to act as police officers.

The act distinguishes between the initial and the continuous training of humane society police officers. Under section 4(b) and (c) of the act (3 P. S. § 456.4(b) and (c)), an initial training program shall include a total of at least 56 hours of instruction in various prescribed areas of study, while a continuous training program must include at least 6 hours of instruction every 2 years from the completion of initial training.

The act describes two acceptable sources for the required training: the first source is a training program established by a land grant institution. This training program is currently being developed jointly by the Pennsylvania State University and the University of Missouri—both of which are land grant institutions. These institutions have prepared the basic course curriculum and have consulted with various agricultural and humane organizations regarding appropriate course content. This training program is expected to be available in early 1996.

The second source for the training required under the act is an optional training program developed and administered by an accredited college, accredited university, accredited community college or another public or private entity with respect to which the Department has granted its approval.

The Department is authorized under the act to consider whether optional training programs for which approval is required and sought meet the applicable training requirements in section 4(a)—(c) of the act. Although section 4(g) of the act requires that the Department ultimately adopt formal regulations establishing standards and procedures for approving optional training programs, it allows the Department to implement interim guidelines until it adopts these formal regulations.

This statement of policy imposes the same content requirements upon an optional training program as are set forth in section 4(c) of the act. An applicant for Departmental approval of an optional training program must submit a detailed syllabus of the program and document, to the Department's satisfaction, that the training program meets or exceeds the requirements of the act.

It is foreseeable that the regulations which the Department ultimately promulgates with respect to the act will

set forth optional training program course requirements in greater detail than does this statement of policy. The act requires instruction in certain areas with respect to which the Department needs to acquire additional experience or expertise. These areas include enforcement of cruelty to animals laws, Pennsylvania rules of criminal law and criminal procedure, and others.

This statement of policy prescribes a step-by-step process by which public or private entities can apply for and obtain the Department's approval of optional training programs for humane society police officers.

Sections 17a.5 and 17a.6 (relating to contents of a complete application; and syllabus) provide applicants with a clear statement of the information required of them.

Sections 17a.8 and 17a.11 (relating to incomplete application; and disapproval) allow the Department to assist the applicant in obtaining necessary documentation and in developing a program that meets the requirements of the act.

Section 17a.15 (relating to monitoring by the Department) allows the Department to attend and monitor the presentation of an approved optional training program, and thereby gain experience which should prove useful in the development of the regulations which are ultimately required under the act.

In summary, this statement of policy serves several important purposes for the Department and for entities affected by the act:

(1) First, it brings the Department into compliance with section 4(g) of the act.

(2) Second, it provides colleges, universities, community colleges and other public or private entities with a mechanism by which to seek and obtain Departmental approval of an optional training program, as these entities are required to do under section 4(g) of the act.

(3) Third, the Department's written approval of a particular optional training program should assist an individual who completes the program and applies to an appropriate court to be appointed a humane society police officer under 22 Pa.C.S. § 501 to demonstrate that the training program met the minimum requirements of the act.

(4) Fourth, it provides the Department with an experiential basis with respect to topics with which it is not currently familiar, and with which it should become familiar prior to promulgating regulations.

Through the administration of this statement of policy, the Department will acquire additional experience in the required areas of instruction for humane society police officer training programs. The Department will allow persons seeking Departmental approval of optional training programs to be as innovative as possible within the confines of the act. The Department can then review and compare approved optional training programs; and the regulations which the Department ultimately adopts will reflect the Department's experience in administering this statement of policy.

In addition, the Department can consider incorporating or adopting the best features of the forthcoming Pennsylvania State University/University of Missouri training program into the regulations which it ultimately adopts.

This statement of policy does not constitute a rule or regulation, does not have the force and effect of law and is not intended to circumscribe any administrative discretion afforded the Department under the act with respect to the approval of optional training programs.

Fiscal Impact

Commonwealth

The statement of policy does not impose costs and has no fiscal impact upon the Commonwealth.

Political Subdivisions

The statement of policy does not impose costs and has no fiscal impact on political subdivisions.

Private Sector

This statement of policy does not impose costs and has no fiscal impact on the private sector.

General Public

The statement of policy does not impose costs and has no fiscal impact on the general public.

§ 17a.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Act—The Humane Society Police Officer Enforcement Act (3 P. S. §§ 456.1—456.7).

Agricultural animal—A bovine animal, equine animal, sheep, goat, pig, poultry, bird, fowl, wild or semiwild animal or fish or other aquatic animal which is being raised, kept, transported or utilized for the purpose of or under agricultural production.

Agricultural production—The production and preparation for market of agricultural animals and their products and of agricultural, agronomic, horticultural, silvicultural and aquacultural crops and commodities.

Approved optional training program—An optional training program that meets the relevant requirements of section 4(a)—(c) of the act (3 P. S. § 456.4(a)—(c)) and has been approved by the Department under authority of section 4(g) of the act.

Cruelty to animals laws—The provisions of 18 Pa.C.S. § 5511 (relating to cruelty to animals).

Department—The Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth.

Humane society police officer—A person appointed under 22 Pa.C.S. § 501 (relating to appointment by non-profit corporations) to act as a police officer for a society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals. The term includes a person who is an agent of a society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals as "agent" is used in 18 Pa.C.S. § 5511.

Land grant institution—Educational institutions located within or outside the geographic boundaries of this Commonwealth which have received a grant of public land made by the Congress of the United States for the support of education under the Morrill Act (7 U.S.C.A. §§ 301—308).

Optional training program—A course of instruction for the initial or continuous training of humane society police officers that is developed and administered by an accredited college, an accredited university, an accredited community college or any other public or private entity, and that satisfies the training requirements of section 4(a)—(c) of the act.

Optional training program for the continuous training of humane society police officers—An optional training program that meets the requirements of section 4(c)(5) of the act.

Optional training program for the initial training of humane society police officers—An optional training program that meets the requirements of section 4(c)(1)—(4) of the act.

Person—A corporation, partnership, association, government entity (other than the Commonwealth), estate, trust, foundation, natural person, society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals, college, university or community college.

Society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals—A nonprofit society or association incorporated under 15 Pa.C.S. Chapter 53, Subchapter A (relating to general provisions) for the purpose of the prevention of cruelty to animals.

§ 17a.2. Objectives.

This chapter sets forth interim guidelines establishing standards and procedures for approving those optional training programs that require the Department's approval under section 4(g) of the act (3 P. S. § 456.4(g)). The act requires optional training programs to address a wide

variety of subjects—including several subjects with respect to which the Department has no experiential basis. Although it is the objective of this chapter to establish a procedure by which optional training programs can be approved, this procedure is also intended to provide the Department with the experience necessary to develop more detailed regulations on the subject at some later date. The Department intends these interim guidelines to be flexible—requiring only that an optional training program meet the specific training requirements in section 4(a)—(c) of the act.

§ 17a.3. Approval of optional training programs required.

A person seeking to offer an optional training program that has been developed and would be administered by an accredited college, accredited university, accredited community college or another public or private entity shall apply for and obtain the approval of the Department prior to administering the optional training program. A training program that has been developed by a land grant institution does not require the approval of the Department.

§ 17a.4. Obtaining an application.

A person may obtain an application for approval of an optional training program from the following address, upon request: Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Industry, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17110-9408.

§ 17a.5. Contents of a complete application.

A complete application for approval of an optional training program shall contain the following:

- (1) The complete name, address and telephone number of the applicant.
- (2) A statement of whether the applicant seeks approval of an optional training program for the “initial” training, the “continuous” training, or both the “initial” and “continuous” training of humane society police officers.
- (3) The name of the person who is expected to be an instructor at the optional training program, together with a statement of the relevant qualifications, education and experience of that person and a statement of the general subject matter upon which that person would instruct.
- (4) A complete and detailed syllabus of the optional training program, as described in § 17a.6 (relating to syllabus).
- (5) A copy of any book, handout or other printed material that would be distributed to persons taking the optional training program or that the persons would be expected to purchase for use at the optional training program.
- (6) A copy of the final examination required under section 4(c)(4) of the act (3 P. S. § 456.4(c)(4)), unless the program is for the continuous training of humane society police officers.
- (7) Other relevant documentation which the Department may request.

§ 17a.6. Syllabus.

(a) *General requirements.* A syllabus for an optional training program shall set forth in detail the material to be taught, the qualifications of the authors and a list of resources, and shall specifically set forth the minimum amount of time which shall be devoted to each subject of instruction.

(b) *Optional training program for the initial training of humane society police officers.* A syllabus for an optional training program for the initial training of humane society police officers shall demonstrate that the program meets or exceeds the requirements of section 4(c)(1)—(3) of the act (3 P. S. § 456.4(c)(1)—(3)). Specifically, these requirements are that the program:

- (1) Include a minimum of 56 hours of instruction.
- (2) Include at least 32 hours of instruction in the following areas:
 - (i) Cruelty to animals laws.
 - (ii) Care and treatment of animals.
 - (iii) Pennsylvania rules of criminal law and criminal procedure.
- (3) Include at least 24 hours of instruction in the following areas:
 - (i) Animal husbandry practices constituting normal agricultural operation.
 - (ii) Practices accepted in agricultural industry in the raising, keeping and production of agricultural animals.
 - (iii) Characteristics of agricultural animals likely evidencing care that is violative of the cruelty to animals laws.
 - (iv) Proper care and handling of agricultural animals enforcement of the cruelty to animals laws.

(c) *Optional training program for the continuous training of humane society police officers.* A syllabus for an optional training program for the continuous training of humane society police officers shall demonstrate that the program meets or exceeds the requirements of section 4(c)(5) of the act. Specifically, these requirements are that the program:

- (1) Offer at least 6 hours of additional instruction within each 2-year period, at least 2 hours of which shall be in the areas of instruction set forth at section 4(c)(3) of the act and summarized at subsection (b)(3).
- (2) Attempt to provide instruction that differs from instruction previously provided to program participants in their initial or continuous training.

§ 17a.7. Submitting the application.

An application for approval of an optional training program shall be submitted to the Department by mail or delivery to the address in § 17a.4 (relating to obtaining an application).

§ 17a.8. Incomplete application.

Within 20 days of receiving an application for approval of an optional training program, the Department will mail the applicant written notice of defects or omissions that cause the application to be incomplete.

§ 17a.9. Time requirement for review of a complete application.

Within 30 days of receiving a complete application for approval of an optional training program, the Department will review the application and mail the applicant written approval or disapproval of the application.

§ 17a.10. Criteria for approval.

The Department will review a complete application for approval of an optional training program to determine whether the program satisfies the training requirements of section 4(a)—(c) of the act (3 P. S. § 456.4(a)—(c)). The

Department will approve an optional training program if it meets or exceeds these requirements.

§ 17a.11. Disapproval.

The Department's disapproval of an optional training program will set forth the reasons for disapproval and, if practicable, prescribe the changes, actions or documentation necessary for the optional training program to obtain the Department's approval.

§ 17a.12. Term of approval.

(a) *Initial training.* The Department's approval of an optional training program for the initial training of humane society police officers will be valid for no more than 5 years from the date of issuance.

(b) *Continuous training.* The Department's approval of an optional training program for the continuous training of humane society police officers will be valid for no more than 2 years from the date of issuance.

(c) *Reapproval.* A person may apply for reapproval of an optional training program in accordance with the application procedures in this chapter.

§ 17a.13. Withdrawal of approval.

(a) *General authority.* The Department may withdraw its approval of an optional training program if one or more of the following occur:

(1) The optional training program fails to meet the minimum time, subject matter and other applicable requirements imposed by the act.

(2) A material misrepresentation was made on the application for approval of the optional training program.

(3) A material change is made in the optional training program without the approval of the Department.

(b) *Procedure.* The Department may withdraw its approval of an optional training program by providing written notice of this action to the address contained on the original application for approval.

§ 17a.14. Revisions to a previously-approved optional training program.

(a) *Approval required.* A person seeking to revise an approved optional training program shall apply for and obtain the approval of the Department prior to implementing the revisions.

(b) *Abbreviated application.* The application for approval of revisions shall be made on the application form described in §§ 17a.4 and 17a.5 (relating to obtaining an application; and contents of a complete application), but need only address the proposed revisions to the previously-approved optional training program.

(c) *Approval of revisions.* The Department's approval of revisions to a previously-approved optional training program will restart the applicable 2-year or 5-year term of approval described in § 17a.12 (relating to term of approval).

§ 17a.15. Monitoring by the Department.

A person conducting an approved optional training program shall allow at least one employe of the Department to attend and monitor the optional training program, and shall otherwise cooperate with the Department in its effort to establish and refine standards for optional training programs.

Commission Meeting and Public Hearing

The Delaware River Basin Commission will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, March 26, 1996. The hearing will be part of the Commission's regular business meeting which is open to the public and scheduled to begin at 10:30 a.m. in the Goddard Conference Room of the Commission's offices at 25 State Police Drive, West Trenton, New Jersey.

The subjects of the hearing will be as follows:

Applications for Approval of the Following Projects Under Article 10.3, Article 11 and/or Section 3.8 of the Compact:

1. *Hanover Foods Corporation D-85-70 Renewal.* An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 75 million gallons (mg)/30 days of water to the applicant's food processing facility from well nos. 3, 4, 5 and 6. Commission approval on November 26, 1985 was limited to 10 years. The applicant requests that the total withdrawal from all wells remain limited to 75 mg/30 days. The project is located near the Town of Clayton, Kent County, DE.

2. *Town of Frederica D-89-CP Renewal.* An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 3.9 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from well nos. 3 and 4. Commission approval on January 12, 1990 was limited to 5 years. The applicant requests that the total withdrawal from all wells remain limited to 3.9 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Town of Frederica, Kent County, DE.

3. *Honey Brook Borough Authority D-91-99 CP.* An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 4.32 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from new well no. 8, and to retain the existing withdrawal limit from all wells of 12 mg/30 days. The project is located in Honey Brook Township, Chester County, PA.

4. *Heidelberg Heights Sewage Company D-94-9.* A project to upgrade and expand the applicant's existing 35,000 gallons per day (gpd) sewage treatment facility by providing a new advanced secondary biological treatment system capable of providing 60,000 gpd of treatment. The project is located just south of Heidelberg Heights Road in Heidelberg Township, Lehigh County, PA. Treated effluent will continue to discharge to an unnamed tributary of Mill Creek, which is a tributary of Jordan Creek.

5. *Lansford-Coaldale Joint Water Authority D-95-13 CP.* An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply water to the applicant's distribution system from existing well nos. 1 and 2; from new well nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, A, B, C, D and F; and to limit the withdrawal from all wells to 33 mg/30 days. The project is located in Nesquehoning Borough, Carbon County, PA.

6. *Borough of Berlin D-95-24 CP.* An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 40 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from new well nos. 12 and 14, and to limit the withdrawal from all wells to 92.3 mg/30 days. The project is located in Berlin Borough and Berlin Township, Camden County, NJ.

7. *B & B Poultry Company D-95-33.* An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to continue to supply water to the applicant's poultry processing facility from new well no. 7 and existing well nos. 4, 5 and 6, and to increase the existing withdrawal limit from all wells of 9.3 mg/30 days to 14.19 mg/30 days. The project is located in Pittsgrove Township, Salem County, NJ.

8. *City of Vineland D-95-47 CP.* An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 5.6 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from new well no. 14, and to increase the existing withdrawal limit of 400 mg/30 days from all wells to 494.5 mg/30 days. The project is located in the City of Vineland, Cumberland County, NJ.

9. *Texaco Refining & Marketing, Inc. D-96-2.* A project to construct a groundwater remediation treatment plant with the capacity to treat up to 47,520 gpd of groundwater recovered from two extraction well nos. RW-1 and MW-5. The applicant will provide an air stripper for removal of Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs), a particle filter to remove suspended solids, and a liquid phase granular-activated carbon filtration system for final polishing prior to discharge to the Westfall Town shopping center storm drainage system which outfalls to the Delaware River in the Special Protection Waters designated as Significant Resource Waters. The remediation system will serve only the applicant's former Texaco Service Station site (now a Mobil gas station) at Route 209/6 and Kokolias Lane in Westfall Township, approximately 1 mile downstream of Matamoras Borough, Pike County, PA.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Referendum on Continuation of the Pennsylvania Potato Research Program

I. The Pennsylvania Potato Research Program (Program) was initially established in 1976 under the provisions of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act of 1968 (act) (3 P. S. §§ 1001—1012). The Program has been continued by referendums conducted in 1981, 1986 and 1991. The act and the Program require that the Secretary of Agriculture call a referendum of affected producers every 5 years to determine whether or not a majority of those voting still desire the Program.

II. *Referendum Period:* The referendum period shall be April 15, 1996, until 4 p.m. on April 30, 1996. Completed ballots shall be mailed or hand-delivered to the Office of

the Secretary of Agriculture, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408. Hand-delivered ballots must be received by 4 p.m. on April 30, 1996. Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked no later than April 30, 1996, and received no later than May 3, 1996.

III. *Notice of Referendum:* This referendum order and an official ballot shall be mailed no later than April 12, 1996, to all affected producers whose names appear on the list of Pennsylvania potato producers maintained in the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture. Additional copies of the same materials shall be made available at the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture. For purposes of determining eligibility to vote, the record date, as required by regulation, shall be the effective date of this referendum order.

IV. *Eligible Voters:* The rules governing the eligibility of a producer for voting are as follows: All growers who planted 5 or more acres of potatoes in the 1995 calendar year are entitled to vote.

V. *Counting of Ballots:* The ballots will be canvassed and counted by a Teller Committee appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. The counting of the ballots will

begin at 10 a.m., Monday, May 6, 1996, in the State Agriculture Building, Harrisburg, PA. The Secretary will announce the results of the referendum within 30 days following the completion of the referendum period. The results will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and disseminated to the news media.

VI. *Reporting Irregularities:* Any irregularities or disputes concerning the referendum procedures must be reported in written form to the Secretary of Agriculture not later than 7 calendar days from the end of the referendum period.

VII. *Publication:* This referendum order shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and the *Patriot-News*.

VIII. *Effective Date:* The foregoing order shall be effective from and after March 16, 1996.

The following parties have applied for an NPDES permit to discharge controlled wastewaters into the surface waters of this Commonwealth. These proposed determinations are tentative.

Persons wishing to comment on the proposed permit are invited to submit a statement to the Field Office indicated as the office responsible, within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within this 30-day period will be considered in the formulation of the final determinations regarding this application. Responses should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Field Office of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based. A public hearing may be held if the Field Office considers the public response significant.

Section 702 of The Bituminous Coal Mine Act (52 P. S. §§ 701—702) provides a mechanism for operators to obtain variances from specific requirements of the Act to

accommodate the adoption of new machinery, equipment, tools, supplies, methods or processes.

Section 242(c) of The Bituminous Coal Mine Act requires that where belt conveyors are installed, main stoppings and regulators shall be so arranged as to reduce the quantity of air traveling in the belt conveyor entry to a minimum for effective ventilation and to provide an intake air split as an escapeway from the face area to the main air current.

Summary of the Request: Valley Coal Company is proposing to incorporate a rail system for transporting personnel and supplies to the working sections of the 6-West Mains. The rail system entry would be established in an entry adjacent to the belt entry. Both entries would maintain common intake air, isolated from the primary intake and return entries.

Under section 1113 of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. § 6020.1113), notice is hereby provided that the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has entered into a Consent Order and Agreement with Lena Kimmel concerning the Filmore Site.

The Filmore Site encompasses approximately 20 acres at the south end of Filmore Avenue in Millcreek Township. In the past, wastes containing hazardous substances were disposed throughout the Filmore Site. The Department has determined that response actions are necessary to protect the public health and welfare and the environment at the Filmore Site.

Lena Kimmel currently owns two parcels within the Filmore Site that cover approximately 0.17 acre. The Department has incurred and will incur response costs

because of the hazardous substances that have contaminated these parcels. However, based upon information obtained by the Department, and based upon information certified to by Ms. Kimmel, the Department has determined that Ms. Kimmel did not cause or contribute to the contamination of these parcels or the rest of the Filmore Site. Accordingly, the Department has agreed to settle any claims that it may have against Ms. Kimmel for \$3,475 and her consent to access so that the Department, and its designated agents, may conduct response actions at the parcels owned by Ms. Kimmel.

The specifics of the Department's settlement with Ms. Kimmel are set forth in the Consent Order and Agreement. The Department will receive and consider comments relating to the Consent Order and Agreement for 60 days from the date of this Public Notice. The Department may withdraw its consent to the settlement with Ms. Kimmel if the comments concerning the Consent Order and Agreement disclose facts or considerations which indicate that the settlement is inappropriate, inadequate or not in the public interest. The Department's settlement with Ms. Kimmel shall become final upon the filing of the Department's response to any significant comments that it receives during the 60-day public comment period.

Notice of Settlements Under the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act

Industrial Solvents and Chemical Company Site
Newberry Township, York County

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1305), has entered into eight proposed consent decrees regarding the Department's costs incurred for response activities at the Industrial Solvents and Chemical Company (ISCC) site. The proposed consent decrees have been entered into with Biddle Sawyer Corporation (Biddle), Quebecor Printing Memphis Inc. (Quebecor), Verla International, Ltd. (Verla), Dynamics Corporation of America (Dynamics), Specialty Screw Machine Products, Inc. (Specialty), American Inks and Coatings Corporation (American), Stambaugh's Air Service, Inc. (Stambaugh's), and various departments and agencies of the United States (United States), all defendants in *Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection v. Reeves Hoffman Div./Dynamics Corp. of America, et al.*, 1:CV-95-0499 (M.D. Pa.) and were lodged with the Court during the 60-day comment period required by section 1113 of HSCA, (35 P. S. § 6020.1113).

The ISCC site is a 9-acre parcel of land in Newberry Township, York County, adjacent to Interstate 83. The surrounding area is primarily rural, although residential, commercial, and industrial developments are located within a close vicinity of the site. A number of private residential wells have been contaminated by hazardous substances migrating from the ISCC site.

ISCC was involved in the reprocessing of used solvents. Because of violations of hazardous waste requirements, the Department on July 6, 1989, terminated ISCC's authority to operate a hazardous waste treatment and storage facility. The site was abandoned in 1990 when ISCC declared bankruptcy. A total of 996 potentially responsible parties for the hazardous substances located at the ISCC site were identified by the Department.

Because of the threat to human health and the environment posed by the ISCC site, the site was placed on the Pennsylvania Priority List for Remedial Response on October 26, 1991. The Department and a group of approximately 136 cooperating potentially responsible parties have conducted a number of interim actions at the site to address the release or threat of release of hazardous substances. To date, the Department has incurred costs of approximately \$2.7 million to implement and/or oversee these interim actions. A final remedial action for the groundwater and soil at the ISCC site will be selected by the Department and implemented in the future.

The proposed consent decree with Biddle was lodged with the Federal District Court for the Middle District of Pennsylvania on February 22, 1996. Under the terms of this consent decree, Biddle will pay the Department a total of \$288,116 over a 3-year period to reimburse the Department for its past costs at the ISCC site. The proposed consent with Quebecor was lodged with the Court on March 5, 1996. Under the terms of this consent decree, Quebecor will pay the Department \$133,121 to reimburse the Department for its past costs at the ISCC site.

The proposed consent decree with Dynamics was lodged with the Court on March 8, 1996. The proposed consent decrees with Verla, Specialty, American, and Stambaugh's were lodged with the Court on March 12, 1996. Under the terms of these consent decrees, Verla will pay \$87,565, Dynamics will pay \$359,033 over 2 years, Specialty will pay \$135,401, American will pay \$93,670 over 5 years, and Stambaugh's will pay \$40,859 to reimburse the Department for its past costs at the ISCC site.

The proposed consent decree with the United States was lodged with the Court on March 12, 1996. Under the terms of this proposed consent decree, the United States will pay \$500,000 to the Department to resolve its liability for the Department's past and future costs at the ISCC site, as well as for natural resource damages.

The Department will respond to any significant written comments and request that the Court take appropriate action regarding the proposed consent decrees. Notice of Prompt Interim Response Under the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) under the authority of the Hazardous Sites

Cleanup Act (HSCA), act of October 18, 1988, initiated a prompt interim response (response) at the Windship Road Drum Site (Site). The site is located along a private roadway off of Windship Road near Route 307, in Covington Township, Lackawanna County.

On February 26, 1995, Department personnel inspected the site subsequent to a citizens report that several drums of unknown material were discovered as a result of some excavation activities performed during the cleanout of a drainage culvert. During the inspection, six drums, exposed or partially exposed, were noted. A subsequent investigation by the Department, using metal detection instrumentation, indicated the probable presence of additional buried drums. The site is located directly adjacent to a commercial property as well as several residences. A small stream runs along the eastern edge of the site into a wetland approximately 200 feet south of the site.

After determining that the Site constituted a substantial threat to public health and safety and the environment, the Department initiated a response at the site on February 28, 1996. The prompt action interim response chosen by the Department consisted of excavation of drums, re-packaging, chemical analysis, temporary storage and final disposal at an approved facility. A total of 56 drums, as well as 1 small container, were discovered during the response. The Department also considered taking no action at the site. However, due to the imminent threat to human health and safety and the environment, this option was rejected by the Department.

The administrative record contains information which was used as the basis for the decision to conduct the response at the site. The administrative record will be available for public inspection from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, at the Department's Northeast Regional Office located at 2 Public Square, Wilkes-Barre, PA 18711.

Written comments concerning the response or information in the administrative record will be accepted in person, if delivered, or by mail, if postmarked, on or before June 21, 1996 to the attention of Joseph Iannuzzo, Project Officer—Hazardous Sites Cleanup Program, at the Northeast Regional Office address.

Additionally, the public will have an opportunity to present oral comments at a public hearing. The public hearing has been scheduled for May 16, 1996, at 7 p.m. at the Covington Township Municipal Building. Persons wishing to present oral comments must register on or before May 9, 1996 by calling Joseph Iannuzzo at (717) 826-2589. If no person registers to present oral comments by May 9, 1996, the hearing will not be held. Finding

Bedford County

Under the provisions of section 2002(b) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 512(b)), the Secretary of Transportation makes the following finding:

The Department of Transportation plans to replace Bedford County Bridge No. 32, with a new two-lane, steel through-girder structure at essentially the same location. The project includes minor improvements to the horizontal and vertical alignments and the acquisition of a minor amount of right-of-way (0.098 acre) from adjacent properties.

The proposed project involves the demolition of the existing Bedford County Bridge No. 32 which has been determined to be eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, and is also considered to be a contributing element to the Hyndman Historic District, which also is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. The effects of this project on the existing Bedford County Bridge No. 32 and on the Hyndman Historic District will be mitigated by the following measures to minimize harm to these historic resources:

1. The existing Bedford County Bridge No. 32 has been recorded according to specific criteria established for this project by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission (PHMC). This recordation has been completed and was formally accepted by the PHMC on June 12, 1995.
2. During dismantling of Bedford County Bridge No. 32, the PHMC will have the opportunity to select structural members, or parts thereof, for the Commission's own use.
3. A permanent plaque will be erected in the vicinity of the new bridge, and will contain a historical narrative of Bedford County Bridge No. 32. The narrative will be approved by the PHMC, prior to the plaque's fabrication.
4. The final design plans for the replacement bridge will be coordinated with and approved by the PHMC.

The environmental, economic, social and other effects of the proposed project have been considered as enumerated in section 2002, subsection 18(b) of The Administrative Code of 1929, and it is concluded that there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the project as designed, and that all reasonable steps have been taken to minimize harm to the project area's historic resources.

No adverse environmental effects are likely to result from the construction of this bridge project.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEARING BOARD

Chesterfield Development Corporation v. DEP; EHB Doc. No. 96-002-MR

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and Chesterfield Development Corporation (Chesterfield) have agreed to a settlement of the appeal at the above-referenced docket. On December 6, 1996, the Department sent a letter to Chesterfield in response to correspondence from Chesterfield requesting that the Department modify a prohibition on connections to the Westtown Sewer Company plant (Plant) in Westtown Township, Chester County. Chesterfield sought the modification in order to allow the connection of homes in the Green Lane Village Development (Green Lane) to the Plant. The Department's December 6, 1995 letter informed Chesterfield that the Department had no basis to consider lifting the prohibition. Chesterfield filed an appeal to the Environmental Hearing Board seeking review of the December 6, 1995 letter.

The parties have agreed to a settlement of the appeal, the major provisions of which include:

(1) The Department has agreed to modify the prohibition on new connections to the Plant to allow the connection of 44 units in Green Lane, and to review requests to authorize the connection of additional units in Green Lane as improvements are made at the Plant.

(2) Chesterfield has agreed to assume responsibility for payment for the current pump and haul operation at Green Lane and will pay all costs incurred by the Department for operation of the pump and haul, as well as all outstanding unpaid bills for the pump and haul.

(3) Chesterfield has agreed to the dismissal of the appeal at this docket.

Liquor Control Board—Size Limitations on Containers of Wine; Doc. No. 54-49

Order

On November 14, 1995, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Liquor Control Board (LCB). This rulemaking would amend 40 Pa. Code Chapter 11 under the authority found in section 207(1) of the Pennsylvania Liquor Code (Code) (47 P.S. § 2-207(i)). The proposed regulation was published in the November 25, 1995 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on February 9, 1996.

These rulemaking amendments to three sections of the LCB's regulation will increase the maximum size limitation on wine containers sold in the Commonwealth from 4 liters to 5 liters. This increase to the size limit also applies to sales by winery licensees and limited winery licensees in the Commonwealth. The LCB's regulation will continue to provide that the container size restrictions do not apply to wines sold by Pennsylvania wineries for delivery outside this Commonwealth. A "[L]imited [W]inery" is defined by the Code (at Section 1-102) as a winery which has a maximum annual output of 200,000 gallons.

This market-driven change will allow the sale in Pennsylvania of the so-called "bag in the box" wine (box wine), which the LCB says is popular in neighboring states. The

LCB states that this rulemaking change is based on projections by the A. C. Neilson Company (A. C. Neilson) and the National Alcohol Beverage Control Association, Inc., which project that one in five glasses of wine consumed in 1996 will be from a 5 liter box. According to the LCB, A. C. Neilson also reports that 5 liter box wine represented a 61.9% share of the growth of the table wine industry in 1993; it increased an additional 3.1% (to 64%) in 1994; and it made up 48% of the growth of the table wine market for the January—August time period in 1995.

These proposed amendments will have some beneficial impacts and no adverse impact. Consumers and retail liquor licensees will benefit by having an additional choice of purchasing wines in 5 liter containers. Limited wineries will have the option of manufacturing wine in 5 liter containers for sale in the Commonwealth. The proposed slight increase in wine container size would also apply to sacramental wine available to ordained priests, rabbis and other clergymen.

In our Comments, we suggested that the LCB consider increasing the maximum container size limitation to slightly more than 6, rather than 5, liters. Doing so would authorize the sale in Pennsylvania of slightly larger-sized champagne and wine bottles. In addition, we suggested that the LCB also consider allowing other wine type (that is, fermented alcohol content) products, such as hard cider, be made available to Pennsylvania consumers.

The LCB did not choose to incorporate our suggestions into the final-form regulation. It acknowledged that while both suggestions have some consumer appeal, neither was of a significant enough level to warrant being added to this final-form rulemaking. The LCB also pointed out that because Pennsylvania is a "control" state, the LCB shoulders a greater responsibility than our neighboring private enterprise states. The LCB has the dual responsibility of providing quality service and products to our consumers and licensees while not encouraging increased consumption of alcoholic beverages.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. These minor regulatory amendments proposed by the LCB will allow the sale of box wine in Pennsylvania, which has been established to be popular with consumers.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 54-49 from the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board, as submitted to the Commission on February 9, 1996, is approved; and
2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.

Department of Revenue—Wild Card Lotto; Doc. No. 15-375

Order

On February 12, 1996, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this regulation from the Department of Revenue (Revenue). This rulemaking will amend 61 Pa. Code §§ 817.113, 817.116, 817.118 and 817.120. The authority for this regulation is section 6 of the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. § 3761-6).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was omitted for this regulation. It will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

These amendments to the "Wild Card Lotto" rules will give ticket holders the option of receiving a lump sum award for a ticket that wins the first prize. Currently, the first prize award is a 20-year annuity.

In order to receive the lump sum payment, a player must select this option when he or she buys a "Wild Card Lotto" ticket. When this option is selected, the words "cash payment" will appear on the ticket. First prize for this lottery game is 60% of the parimutuel prize pool. The minimum amount awarded for first prize is \$1 million. If the first prize is the minimum, the lump-sum cash payment will equal the funds necessary, as determined by the Pennsylvania State Lottery, to purchase an annuity of not less than \$1 million. Forty-nine percent of Wild Card Lotto gross sales is reserved for the total parimutuel prize pool and allocated to the payment of prizes. Revenue asserts that this regulation will have no significant adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. Revenue contends this proposal is in response to demands from lottery players. In addition, similar lump sum payment programs have generated additional lottery ticket sales and revenues in other states.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 15-375 from the Department of Revenue, as submitted to the Commission on February 12, 1996, is approved; and
2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.
