Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of April 2000

The Department of Banking (Department) under the authority contained in section 301 of the Act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), hereby determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of April 2000, is 9%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on an individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in Pennsylvania. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 6.52 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 9.02 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 9%.

Kreider Farms has submitted an application for an individual NPDES permit for an existing concentrated animal feeding operation (CAFO) known as the Kreider Dairy Farm, located on Indian Village Road in Penn Township, **Lancaster County**. The CAFO is situated near an unnamed tributary to Chickies Creek, which is classified as a Warm Water Fishery. The CAFO is designed to maintain 6,242 animal equivalent units (AEUs) consisting of 1,615 milk cows, 250 dry cows, 1,275 replacement heifers and 900,000 layers.

No new facilities are proposed as part of this application. Manure generated at the CAFO is collected and pumped to a separator room where solids are separated from liquid manure. Solid manure is composted on the farm and either sold or spread on neighboring farms. Liquid manure is managed through a three-stage storage system consisting of one reinforced concrete storage tank (900,000 gallons) and two earthen impoundments with a combined capacity of approximately 9.5 million gallons. There will be no release or discharge to waters of the Commonwealth under normal operating conditions. Normal operating conditions are defined as conditions below a 25-year, 24-hour storm event.

The Department has conducted administrative and technical reviews of the application. Based on the preliminary review and application of lawful standards and regulations including the Final CAFO Strategy, the Department has made a tentative determination to issue an individual NPDES permit (Document #3620-PM-WQ00514) for the operation subject to the terms and conditions and monitoring and reporting requirements specified in the draft permit.

The permit application and proposed draft permit are on file at the Southcentral Regional Office of the Department. Persons may make an appointment to review the files by calling Mary DiSanto, File Review Coordinator, at (717) 705-4732.

Preamble 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302-304 and 305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(l)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified as proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

reinforced concrete culvert substructure in and along Crow Creek (WWF) (a.k.a. Abrams Run) beneath the proposed Ramp L at Station 557+00. The culvert is located approximately 95 feet upstream from the existing I-76 bridge over Crow Creek (Valley Forge, PA Quadrangle N: 14.50 inches; W: 2.2 inches). Work also includes the temporary impact to Crow Creek and adjacent wetlands for temporary access.

- 3. To construct and maintain a nonjurisdictional dam across an unnamed tributary to Crow Creek (WWF) to facilitate a stormwater management basin. This site is located north of I-76, left of station 17+75 to station 19+50. (Valley Forge, PA Quadrangle N: 14.25 inches; W: 0.7 inches).
- **E23-241.** Encroachment. **Riverfront Inc.**, P. O. Box 547, Drexel Hill, PA 19026. To reissue Permit No. E23-241 for the following activities associated with the construction of the Riverfront Marina Project (Bridgeport, NJ-PA Quadrangle N: 19.9 inches; W: 6.7 inches) in Tinicum Township, **Delaware County**.
- 1. To construct two fixed timber mooring piers in a "U" shaped configuration to create 54 boat slips into the Delaware River (WWF, MF). The base of the pier will consist of a 12 foot by 120 foot pier which forms the base of the "U", two 6 foot by 160 foot piers will extend from the ends to the base pier and span the intertidal mud flat, a 5 foot by 240 foot mooring pier will be constructed at the terminus of each extension pier extending beyond the low water line, seven 4 foot by 40 foot and eight 4 foot by 30 foot finger piers will be arranged perpendicular to each mooring pier. Also, to repair and maintain an existing 12 foot by 40 foot long timber walkway to access the "U" shaped pier from uplands, and to modify and maintain an existing 15 foot by 25 foot roofed pier adjacent to the walkway as a concession stand.

To impact 0.51 acre of wetlands adjacent to a tributary to the Schuylkill River (WWF) at a point upstream of Route 82 at the Pioneer Crossing Landfill for the purpose of creating a borrow area (Birdsboro, PA Quadrangle N: 4.2 inches; W: 8.5 inches) in Exeter Township, **Berks County**. The permittee agrees to provide 0.84 acre of replacement wetlands.

E29-079. Encroachment. **Donald Clevenger**, HCR 75 Box 5, McConnellsburg, PA 17233. To construct and maintain rock riprap protection at the right bank of Big Cove Creek located upstream of the driveway culvert and at the left and right banks downstream of same and to remove some of the unpermitted fill along the floodway of Cove Creek to minimize back water effects (McConnellsburg, PA Quadrangle N: 12.0 inches; W: 17.0 inches) in Todd Township, **Fulton County**.

E03-378. Encroachment. Independence Pipeline Company, 500 Renaissance Center, Detroit, MI 48243-1902. To construct and maintain a 36-inch-diameter highpressure natural gas pipeline through two watercourses across Armstrong County. This installation will require temporary equipment crossings to be installed across each watercourse. The objective of this project is to supply natural gas to the eastern United States. This application is being reviewed concurrently with similar encroachment applications for Lawrence (E37-127), Butler (E10-300), Clarion (E16-109), Jefferson (E33-195), Forest (E27-059), Elk (E24-208), McKean (E42-263), Cameron (E12-118), Potter (E53-337) and Clinton (E18-288) Counties as a single and complete project. The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters Armstrong County at the Armstrong-Butler County line in Perry Township, Armstrong County (Parker, PA Quadrangle N: 02.15 inches; W: 09.00 inches) and progresses eastward for 4.26 miles to the Armstrong-Clarion County line at the edge of the Allegheny River in Perry Township, Armstrong County (Rimersburg, PA Quadrangle N: 06.20 inches; W: 16.80 inches). This pipeline traverses Perry Township in Armstrong County.

Watersheds encountered east to west include Pine Run (WWF), Cove Run (WWF) and the Allegheny River (WWF).

Both watercourses will be crossed by the wet open cut method. A total of 100 lineal feet of watercourse will be temporarily impacted. There are no wetlands that will be impacted by this project in Armstrong County. Approximately 2.1 miles (50%) of the alignment in Armstrong County follows established right-of-ways.

E10-300. Encroachment. Independence Pipeline Company, 500 Renaissance Center, Detroit, MI 48243-1902. To construct and maintain a 36-inch-diameter highpressure natural gas pipeline through 58 watercourses and 48 wetlands across **Butler County**. This installation will require temporary equipment crossings to be installed across each watercourse and wetland. The objective of this project is to supply natural gas to the eastern United States. This application is being reviewed concurrently with similar encroachment applications for Lawrence (E37-127), Armstrong (E03-378), Clarion (E16-109), Jefferson (E33-195), Forest (E27-059), Elk (E24-208), McKean (E42-263), Cameron (E12-118), Potter (E53-337) and Clinton (E18-288) Counties as a single and complete project. The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters Butler County at the Butler-Lawrence County line in Muddy Creek Township, Butler County (Portersville, PA Quadrangle N: 05.20 inches; W: 04.95 inches) and progresses eastward for 29.32 miles to the Butler-Armstrong County line in Fairview Township, Butler County (Parker, PA Quadrangle N: 02.20

inches; W: 09.00 inches). This pipeline traverses Muddy Creek, Franklin, Clay, Concord and Fairview Townships in Butler County.

Watersheds encountered east to west include Camp Run (WWF), Little Yellow Creek (CWF), Yellow Creek (CWF), Crab Run (CWF), Big Run (HW-CWF), Shannon Run (HQ-CWF), Swamp Run (HQ-CWF), Muddy Creek (HQ-CWF), Stony Run (WWF), Pine Run (WWF), Connoquenessing Creek (HQ-CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), Bear Creek (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), South Branch Bear Creek (WWF).

Watercourse crossing methods consist of 35 wet open cuts and 23 flume pipes. A total of 2,900 lineal feet of watercourse will be temporarily impacted. Of the 48 wetland impacts, four are to exceptional value wetlands. Each wetland crossing will be by the wet open cut method resulting in a total temporary impact of 11.54 acres. Of the 48 wetland impacts, one is a 2,000 foot long exceptional value wetland impact and two are 1,000 foot long impacts to nonexceptional value wetlands. Approximately 17.5 miles (59.7%) of the alignment in Butler County follows established right-of-ways.

This project crosses Moraine State Park resulting in the minor expansion of an existing right-of-way. Projected impacted areas within Moraine State Park include the Frank Preston Conservation Area. Within Moraine State Park, a total of 14 watercourses and 19 wetlands are to be impacted. Of the 19 wetland impacts within the park, four are to exceptional value wetlands within the Swamp Run area. The cumulative exceptional value wetland impact is 3,000 feet lineal feet. These wetlands are classified exceptional value because they are known habitat of the Pennsylvania Threatened Cistothorus platensis (Sedge Wren) and the Pennsylvania Endangered Rallus elegans (King Rail).

E16-109. Encroachment. Independence Pipeline Company, 500 Renaissance Center, Detroit, MI 48243-1902. To construct and maintain a 36-inch-diameter highpressure natural gas pipeline through 52 watercourses and 25 wetlands across Clarion County. This installation will require temporary equipment crossings to be installed across each watercourse and wetland. The objective of this project is to supply natural gas to the eastern United States. This application is being reviewed concurrently with similar encroachment applications for Lawrence (E37-127), Butler (E10-300), Armstrong (E03-378), Jefferson (E33-195), Forest (E27-059), Elk (E24-208), McKean (E42-263), Cameron (E12-118), Potter (E53-337) and Clinton (E18-288) Counties as a single and complete project. The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylva-nia boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters Clarion County at the Clarion-Armstrong County line in Toby Township, Clarion County (Rimersburg, PA Quadrangle N: 06.20 inches; W: 16.80 inches), crossing the Allegheny River and progressing eastward for 18.74 miles. The project then turns northeast near the village of Truittsburg in Redbank Township and continues for 11.05 miles to the Clarion-Jefferson County line in Clarion Township, Clarion County (Corsica, PA Quadrangle N: 02.20 inches; W: 09.00 inches).

This pipeline traverses Toby, Porter, Redbank, Limestone and Clarion Townships in Clarion County.

A compressor station is expected to occupy approximately 20 acres near Independence mile marker 286 in Porter Township. The station will not impact any watercourse, floodway, water bodies or wetlands.

Watersheds encountered east to west include Allegheny River (WWF), Black Fox Run (WWF), Catfish Run (WWF), Cherry Run (CWF), Wildcat Run (CWF), East Fork Wildcat Run (CWF), Fiddlers Run (CWF), West Fork Leatherwood Creek (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), Leatherwood Creek (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), Jack Run (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), Leisure Run (CWF), Town Run (CWF), Poe Run (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), Piney Creek (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), Little Piney Creek (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery), Little Mill Creek (CWF, Trout Stocked Fishery).

Watercourse crossing methods consist of a directional drilling under the Allegheny River, 46 wet open cuts and five flume pipes. A total of 2,600 lineal feet of watercourse will be temporarily impacted. All 25 nonexceptional value wetland crossings will be wet open cut method resulting in a total wetland temporary impact of 2.05 acres. Of the 25 wetland impacts, three of the crossings are over 100 feet long.

The Allegheny River is a Pennsylvania Nominated Priority 1-A Scenic River and habitat of two Federally Listed Mussel Species, Clubshell (Pleurobema clava) and Northern Riffleshell (Epioblasm torulosa rangiana).

Approximately 14.2 miles (47.5%) of the construction alignment in Clarion County follows established right-of-ways.

Prior to construction of the 36-inch pipeline, Independence will remove or abandon-in-place an existing 12-inch-diameter National Fuel Gas Supply Corporation gas pipeline identified as "K-Line" along the construction right-of-way in Clarion County. "K-Line" work will take place from Independence milepost 296.8 to 303.1 along existing, maintained right-of-ways through Limestone Township and Clarion Township.

Initially, all "K-Line" watercourse and wetland crossings will be abandoned-in-place but temporary stream and wetland crossings will be constructed and remain in place for up to 60 days until installation of the new 36-inch-pipeline. At the time of installation, all "K-Line" watercourse crossings under 10 feet in width and all wetland crossings will be removed and the new 36-inch pipeline will then be immediately installed into the same trench. All "K-Line" watercourse crossings 10 feet or greater in width will remain in place. All abandoned-in-place crossings not in direct alignment with the new 36-inch pipeline will remain abandoned-in-place.

"K-Line" work will impact 14 watercourses and seven nonexceptional value wetlands within three watersheds. The watersheds traversed include Piney Creek (CWF, TSF), Little Piney Creek (CWF, TSF), and Little Mill Creek (CWF, TSF). Of the 11 "K-Line" watercourse crossing removals, eight will be by wet open cut method and three by flume pipe method. A total of three "K-Line" watercourse crossings will remain abandoned-in-place. All seven nonexceptional value wetland "K-Line" crossings will be removed by the wet open cut method. This "K-Line" project will not involve the Allegheny River.

E24-208. Encroachment. **Independence Pipeline Company**, 500 Renaissance Center, Detroit, MI 48243-1902. To construct and maintain a 36-inch-diameter highpressure natural gas pipeline through 68 watercourses and 63 wetlands across **Elk County**. This installation will require temporary equipment crossings to be in-

stalled across each watercourse and wetland. The objective of this project is to supply natural gas to the eastern United States. This application is being reviewed concurrently with similar encroachment applications for Lawrence (E37-127), Butler (E10-300), Armstrong (E03-378), Clarion (E16-109), Forest (E27-059), Jefferson (E33-195), McKean (E42-263), Cameron (E12-118), Potter (E53-337) and Clinton (E18-288) Counties as a single and complete project. The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters Elk County at the Elk-Jefferson County line at the Clarion River in Millstone Township, Elk County (Sigel, PA Quadrangle N: 18.85 inches; W: 10.10 inches), and progresses northeastward for 8.2 miles to the Elk-Forest County line in Millstone Township, Elk County (Hallton, PA Quadrangle N: 13.25 inches; W: 13.95 inches).

The project passes through a portion of Forest County and reenters Elk County at the Elk-Forest County line in Highland Township (Hallton, PA Quadrangle N: 15.65 inches; W: 11.55 inches) and continues northeastward for 21.37 miles to the Elk-McKean County line in Jones Township, McKean County (Mt. Jewett, PA Quadrangle N: 00.40 inch; W: 03.30 inches).

The project passes through a portion of McKean County and reenters Elk County at the Elk-McKean County line in Jones Township, Elk County (Haxel Hurst, PA Quadrangle N: 00.75 inch; W: 05.70 inches) and continues eastward for 3.21 miles to the Elk-McKean County line in Jones Township, Elk County (Wildwood Fire Tower, PA Quadrangle N: 21.80 inches; W: 14.85 inches) and exits Elk County for the final time.

This pipeline traverses Millstone, Highland and Jones Townships in Elk County.

Watersheds encountered east to west include Millstone Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF), Gregg Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), Sugarcamp Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), Wyncoop Run (HQ-CWF), Jakes Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), Steck Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), McClelland Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), Pigeon Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), Red Lick Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Twin Lick Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Threemile Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery, Wild Trout Fishery), Maple Run (HQ, TSF, WTF), Pigeon Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), East Branch Spring Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Ellithorpe Run (HQ, CWF, Wild Trout Fishery), Cherry Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Big Mill Creek) HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Wolf Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Wolf Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Nearing Run (CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Rocky Run (CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), East Branch Clarion River (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Luke Run (HQ-CWF, Wild Trout Fishery), Wellendorf Branch (HQ-CWF, Wild Trout Fishery), Wellendorf Branch (HQ-CWF, Wild Trout Fishery), Wellendorf Branch (HQ-CWF, Wild Trout Fishery).

Watercourse crossing methods consist of 53 wet open cuts and 15 flume pipes. The West Branch Clarion River crossing is proposed as a 50-foot wet open cut method. The East Branch Clarion River is proposed as a 35-foot wet open cut method. A total of 3,500 lineal feet of watercourse in Elk County will be temporarily impacted.

Of the 63 wetland crossings, 34 are considered exceptional value wetlands. Two exceptional value wetland

crossings are 700 feet long each. The longest nonexceptional wetland crossing is 1,800 feet long. All wetland crossings will be by wet open cut method resulting in a total temporary impact of 16.08 acres of exceptional value and nonexceptional wetland.

Approximately 25.4 miles (77.2%) of the alignment in Elk County follows established right-of-ways. A majority of this project traverses the Allegheny National Forest. The Allegheny National Forest is identified as high or moderate quality Myotis sodalis (Indiana Bat) summer habitat. This project will create a new right-of-way across a portion of Elk State Forest.

Prior to construction of the 36-inch pipeline, Independence will abandon-in-place or remove various National Fuel Gas Supply Corporation gas pipelines along the construction right-of-way in Elk County. This process will occur in two sections from Independence milepost 316.2 to 324.5 through Forest County and starting again in Elk County at Independence milepost 325.8 to 336.1, along existing, maintained right-of-ways through Millstone Township and Highland Township.

Initially, all watercourse and wetland pipeline crossings will be abandoned in-place but temporary stream and wetland crossings will be constructed and remain in place for up to 60 days until installation of the new 36-inch pipeline. All abandoned-in-place watercourse and wetland crossings not in direct alignment with the new 36-inch pipeline will remain abandoned-in-place and not be removed. At the time of installation, all watercourse crossings under 10 feet in width and all wetland crossings in direct alignment of the new 36-inch pipeline will be removed and the new 36-inch pipeline will be immediately installed into this same trench. All abandoned-in-place watercourse crossings 10 feet or greater in width will remain in place.

The first section, from Independence milepost 316.2 to 318.5, will be associated with the existing National Fuel Gas Supply Corporation "C-Line" and "K-197 Line", each are 12-inches in diameter. The watersheds traversed include Millstone Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF) and Gregg Run (HQ-CWF, TSF). A total of three watercourses will be impacted. A total of two watercourse pipeline crossings will be removed (one by wet open cut method and one by flume pipe method) and four watercourse pipeline crossings will remain abandoned-in-place. A total of two nonexceptional wetlands will be impacted. A total of two wetland crossings will be removed by wet open cut method and two will remain abandoned-in-place.

The second section starts at Independence milepost 318.5 to the Elk-Forest County Line Independence milepost 324.5, continues through Forest County, then continues in Elk County at Independence milepost 325.8 to Independence milepost 336.1. This section is associated with the removal or abandonment-in-place of existing National Fuel Gas Supply Corporation 22-inch diameter "K-197 Line" and 12-inch diameter "C-Line".

The watersheds traversed include Sugarcamp Run (HQCWF, TSF), Wyncoop Run (HQ-CWF), Jakes Run (HQCWF, TSF), Steck Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), McClelland Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), Pigeon Run (HQ-CWF, TSF), Red Lick Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Twin Lick Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Threemile Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Maple Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Pigeon Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), East Branch Spring Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery) and Ellithorpe Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery).

A total of 37 watercourses will be impacted. A total of 28 watercourse pipeline crossings will be removed, 24 by wet open cut method and four by flume pipe method. A total of 35 of the watercourse pipeline crossings will remain abandoned-in-place. A total of 37 wetlands will be impacted with 10 of these wetlands being exceptional value. A total of 35 wetland pipeline crossings will be removed by wet open cut method, with eight of these wet open cut method removals being in exceptional value wetlands. The longest exceptional value wetland impact is 260 feet long. The longest nonexceptional wetland impact is 1,800 feet long. A total of 24 wetland pipeline crossings will remain abandoned-in-place with 10 of these being in exceptional value wetlands.

E25-606. Encroachment. **Presque Isle Condominium Association**, 558 West 6th Street, Erie, PA 16507. To construct and maintain an 80-foot-long, 9-foot-diameter corrugated metal pipe culvert and associated fill in a tributary to Presque Isle Bay, Lake Erie (Scott Run) for the stabilization of the ravine slope at the existing Presque Isle Condominiums approximately 1,800 feet north of West 6th Street east of Peninsula Drive (Swanville, PA Quadrangle N: 20.0 inches; W: 3.75 inches) in Millcreek Township, **Erie County**.

E27-059. Encroachment. Independence Pipeline Company, 500 Renaissance Center, Detroit, MI 48243-1902. To construct and maintain a 36-inch-diameter highpressure natural gas pipeline through 4 watercourses and four wetlands across **Forest County**. This installation will require temporary equipment crossings to be installed across each watercourse and wetland. The objective of this project is to supply natural gas to the eastern United States. This application is being reviewed concurrently with similar encroachment applications for Lawrence (E37-127), Butler (E10-300), Armstrong (E03-378), Clarion (E16-109), Elk (E24-208), Jefferson (E33-195), McKean (E42-263), Cameron (E12-118), Potter (E53-337) and Clinton (E18-288) Counties as a single and complete project. The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters Forest County at the Forest-Elk County line in Jenks Township, Forest County (Hallton, PA Quadrangle N: 13.25 inches; W: 13.95 inches) and progresses northeastward for 1.3 miles to the Forest-Elk County line in Jenks Township and exits Forest County.

Watersheds encountered east to west include Spring Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF) and Hill Run (HQ-CWF, TSF). Watercourse crossings consist of four wet open cut methods. A total of 200 lineal feet of watercourse in Forest County will be temporarily impacted through road and pipeline construction.

Of the four nonexceptional value wetland crossings, the longest wetland crossing is 250 feet long. All wetland crossings will be by wet open cut method and associated temporary road construction, resulting in a total temporary impact of 0.56 acre.

A majority of this project traverses the Allegheny National Forest. The Allegheny National Forest is identified as high or moderate quality Myotis sodalis (Indiana Bat) summer habitat. Approximately 1.3 miles (100%) of the alignment in Forest County follows established right-of-ways.

Prior to construction of the 36-inch pipeline, Independence will abandon-in-place or remove two National Fuel

Gas Supply Corporation gas pipelines (12-inch-diameter "C-Line" and 22-inch-diameter "K-197 Line") along the construction right-of-way in Forest County. This process will occur from Independence milepost 324.5 to 325.8 through Jenks Township.

Initially, all watercourse and wetland pipeline crossings will be abandoned-in-place but temporary stream and wetland crossings will be constructed and remain in place for up to 60 days until installation of the new 36-inch pipeline. All abandoned-in-place watercourse and wetland crossings not in direct alignment with the new 36-inch pipeline will remain abandoned-in-place and not be removed. At the time of installation, all watercourse crossings under 10 feet in width and all wetland crossings in direct alignment of the new 36-inch pipeline will be removed and the new 36-inch pipeline will then be immediately installed into this same trench. All abandoned-in-place watercourse crossings 10 feet or greater in width will remain in place.

The watersheds traversed include Spring Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF), and Hill Run (HQ-CWF, TSF). A total of four watercourses will be impacted. A total of three watercourse pipeline crossings will be removed by the wet open cut method. A total of five watercourse pipeline crossings will remain abandoned-in-place. A total of four nonexceptional value wetlands will be impacted. A total of four wetland pipeline crossings will be removed by the wet open cut method. The longest wetland wet open cut method removal is 260 feet long. A total of four wetland pipeline crossings will remain abandoned-in-place.

E33-195. Encroachment. Independence Pipeline Company, 500 Renaissance Center, Detroit, MI 48243-1902. To construct and maintain a 36-inch-diameter highpressure natural gas pipeline through 37 watercourses and six wetlands across Jefferson County. This installation will require temporary equipment crossings to be installed across each watercourse and wetland. The objective of this project is to supply natural gas to the eastern United States. This application is being reviewed concurrently with similar encroachment applications for Lawrence (E37-127), Butler (E10-300), Armstrong (E03-378), Clarion (E16-109), Forest (E27-059), Elk (E24-208), McKean (E42-263), Cameron (E12-118), Potter (E53-337) and Clinton (E18-288) Counties as a single and complete project. The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters Jefferson County at the Jefferson-Clarion County line in Union Township, Jefferson County (Corsica, PA Quadrangle N: 02.20 inches; W: 09.00 inches), and progresses north-eastward for 13.2 miles across the Clarion River to the Jefferson-Elk County line in Heath Township, Jefferson County (Sigel, PA Quadrangle N: 18.85 inches; W: 10.10 inches). This pipeline traverses Union, Eldred, Barnett and Heath Townships in Jefferson County.

Watersheds encountered east to west include Little Mill Creek (CWF-TSF), Mill Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Seaton Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Black Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Cathers Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Truby Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Clear Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Clarion River (CWF).

Watercourse crossings methods consist of 29 wet open cuts, seven flume pipes and one boring. The Clarion River crossing is proposed as a 277-foot-long wet open cut method. The Clear Creek crossing is proposed as a conventional boring under the bed of the watercourse. A total of 2,000 lineal feet of watercourse in Jefferson County will be temporarily impacted. Of the six wetland crossings, three are exceptional value wetland crossings with one of these exceptional value wetland crossings being 200 feet long. All wetland crossings will be by wet open cut method resulting in a total temporary impact of 0.8 acre.

The Clarion River is Federally Eligible Wild and Scenic River and a Pennsylvania Nominated Priority 1-A Scenic River. Additionally, this project traverses Clear Creek State Park.

Approximately 12.9 miles (100%) of the construction alignment in Jefferson County follows established right-of-ways.

Prior to construction of the 36-inch pipeline, Independence will abandon-in-place or remove various 12-inch-diameter National Fuel Supply Corporation gas pipelines along the construction right-of-way in Jefferson County. This process will occur in two sections from Independence milepost 303.1 to 316.2, along existing, maintained right-of-ways through Union Township, Eldred Township, Barnett Township and Heath Township.

Initially, all watercourse and wetland pipeline crossings will be abandoned-in-place but temporary stream and wetland crossings will be constructed and remain in place for up to 60 days until installation of the new 36-inch pipeline. All abandoned-in-place watercourse and wetland crossings not in direct alignment with the new 36-inch pipeline will remain abandoned-in-place and not be removed. At the time of installation, all watercourse crossings under 10 feet in width and all wetland crossings in direct alignment of the new 36-inch pipeline will be removed and the new 36-inch pipeline will then be immediately installed into this same trench. All abandoned-in-place watercourse crossings 10 feet or greater in width will remain in place.

The first section, from Independence milepost 303.1 to 310.1, will be associated with the existing 12-inch National Fuel Gas Supply Corporation "K-Line". The watersheds traversed include Little Mill Creek (CWF, TSF), Mill Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF) and Seaton Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF). A total of 19 watercourses will be impacted. A total of nine watercourse pipeline crossings will be removed by the flume pipe method. A total of eight "K-Line" watercourse crossings will remain abandoned-inplace. One nonexceptional wetland will be impacted by the "K-Line" removal in this section. This wetland crossing will be removed by the wet open cut method.

The second section, from Independence milepost 310.1 to 316.2, will be associated with the existing National Fuel Gas Supply Corporation "C-Line" and "K-197 Line", each are 12 inches in diameter. The watersheds traversed include Black Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF), Cathers Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF), Truby Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF), Clear Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF), and Clarion River (CWF). A total of 18 watercourses will be impacted. A total of seven watercourse pipeline crossings will be removed by wet open cut method and two will be by the flume pipe method. The remaining 27 crossings will remain abandoned-in-place. This abandonment-in-place includes the two Clarion River pipeline crossings and the two Clear Creek pipeline crossings. A total of five

wetlands will be impacted, three of these being exceptional value wetlands. A total of five wetland pipeline crossings will be removed by the wet open cut method, three of these through exceptional value wetlands. A total of five wetland pipeline crossings will remain abandoned-in-place, three of these through exceptional value. The first section, from Independence milepost 303.1 to 310.1, will be associated with the existing 12-inch National Fuel Gas Supply Corporation "K-Line". The watersheds traversed include Little Mill Creek (CWF, TSF), Mill Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF) and Seaton Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, WTF).

A total of 19 watercourses will be impacted. A total of nine watercourse pipeline crossings will be removed by the wet open cut method and two will remain wetlands.

E37-127. Encroachment. Independence Pipeline Company, 500 Renaissance Center, Detroit, MI 48243-1902. To construct and maintain a 36-inch-diameter highpressure natural gas pipeline through 34 watercourses and 41 wetlands across Lawrence County. This installation will require temporary equipment crossings to be installed across each watercourse and wetland. The objective of this project is to supply natural gas to the eastern United States. This application is being reviewed concurrently with similar encroachment applications for Butler (E10-300), Armstrong (E03-378), Clarion (E16-109), Jefferson (E33-195), Forest (E27-059), Elk (E24-208), McKean (E42-263), Cameron (E12-118), Potter (E53-337) and Clinton (E18-288) Counties as a single and complete project. The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters Lawrence County at the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County (New Middletown, OH-PA Quadrangle N: 01.70 inches; W: 02.65 inches) and progresses eastward 20.69 miles to the Lawrence-Butler County line in Perry Township, Lawrence County (Portersville, PA Quadrangle N: 05.20 inches; W: 04.95 inches). This pipeline traverses Little Beaver, Big Beaver, Wayne and Perry Townships in Lawrence County.

Watersheds encountered east to west include North Fork Little Beaver Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF), Honey Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF), Beaverdam Run (HQ-CWF), Eckles Run (WWF), Beaver River (WWF), Snake Run (WWF), Unnamed Tributary Beaver River, locally known as Vinegar Valley Run (WWF), Duck Run (WWF), Squaw Run (WWF), Slippery Rock Creek (CWF, TSF) and Camp Run (WWF).

Watercourse crossing methods consist of 31 wet open cuts including the Beaver River a 100-foot-long wet open cut, two flume pipes and one directional drill under the bed of Slippery Rock Creek. A total of 1,700 lineal feet of watercourse will be temporarily impacted. Of the 41 wetlands impacted, two are exceptional value wetlands. All wetland crossings will be by wet open cut method, a total temporary wetland impact of 6.4 acres. Of the 41 wetland crossing impacts, one is 900 feet long and 12 are over 100 feet long. Additionally, this project will cross the southern portion of McConnell's Mill State Park-Slippery Rock Gorge, a designated National Natural Landmark. This park crossing will call for the minor expansion of an existing established right-of-way. Resources impacted within the park include Slippery Rock Creek and two

exceptional value wetlands. Approximately 4.2 miles (20.3%) of the alignment in Lawrence County follows established right-of-ways.

The Pennsylvania portion of the project from the State of Ohio and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania boundary in Little Beaver Township, Lawrence County to Leidy Township, Clinton County spans 178.4 miles. The entire pipeline from Defiance, Ohio to Leidy, Clinton County, PA spans 397.4 miles.

The project enters McKean County at the McKean-Elk County line in Sergeant Township, McKean County (Mt. Jewett, PA Quadrangle N: 00.40 inch, W: 03.30 inches) and progresses eastward for 5.79 miles to the McKean-Elk County line in Sergeant Township, Elk County (Hazel Hurst, PA Quadrangle N: 00.75 inches; W: 05.70 inches). The pipeline passes through a portion of Elk County and re-enters McKean County at the McKean-Elk County line in Sergeant Township, Elk County (Wildwood Fire Tower, PA Quadrangle N: 21.80 inches; W: 14.85 inches) at the East Branch Clarion River and proceeds eastward for 3.98 miles to McKean-Cameron County line in Norwich Township (Wildwood Fire Tower, PA Quadrangle N: 21.25 inches; W: 05.10 inches) and exits McKean County for the final time.

This pipeline traverses Sergeant and Norwich Townships in McKean County.

Watersheds encountered east to west include Rocky Run (CWF, Wild Trout Fishery), Sevenmile Run (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Fivemile Run (HQ-CWF, Wild Trout Fishery), East Branch Clarion River (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), North Fork Straight Creek (HQ-CWF, Wild Trout Fishery), South Fork West Branch Potato Creek (HQ-CWF, TSF, Wild Trout Fishery), Elk Fork Sinnemahoning Creek (EV-CWF, Wild Trout Fishery).

Watercourse crossing methods consist of 13 wet open cuts, three flume pipes and one dam and pump crossing. A total of 850 lineal feet of watercourse in Elk County will be temporarily impacted.

Of the 20 wetland crossings, all the wetlands considered exceptional value. The longest exceptional value wetland crossing is 600 feet long. All wetland crossings will be by wet open cut method resulting in a total temporary impact of 3.35 acres. Approximately 1.7 miles (18.1%) of the alignment in McKean County follows established right-of-ways.

This project will create a new right-of-way across Elk State Park and Elk State Forest. The Elk State Forest is identified as potentially high or moderate quality Myotis sodalis (Indiana Bat) summer habitat.

A final report provides a description of the site investigation to characterize the nature and extent of contaminants in environmental media, the basis for selecting the environmental media of concern, documentation supporting the selection of residential or nonresidential exposure factors, a description of the remediation performed, and summaries of sampling methodology and analytical results which demonstrate that the remediation has attained the cleanup standard selected. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Homeownership Choice Demonstration Program; Request for Proposals

The Housing Finance Agency (Agency) announces a request for proposals (RFP) to provide funds for the development of single family homes, for purchase, in urban communities.

Background

After several decades of booming suburban development, there has been a recent increase in the amount of interest surrounding land-use decisions and growth. A number of constituencies have espoused the position that "suburban sprawl," if unaddressed, could have negative environmental, economic and societal consequences. These groups argue that unless alternatives are identified, unchecked growth could cost the Commonwealth millions in public infrastructure dollars; continue to concentrate poor and minority families in urban areas with limited access to jobs or schools that provide quality education; and continue to weaken the sense of community across this Commonwealth.

In July of 1997, Governor Tom Ridge responded to increasing concern about current municipal land-use patterns with the establishment of the 21st Century Environmental Commission (Commission). The Commission's mandate was to develop and help implement environmental strategies designed to provide a better environment for future generations without inhibiting their ability to prosper. Further, the Commission was charged with helping government to assert its role as an efficient capable steward of the environment, establish policies and practices that effectively support the goals of environmental quality, personal and community well-being, and economic prosperity.

The Commission issued a final report in September 1998 which detailed a number of key strategies sustaining this Commonwealth as a desirable place to live, work and raise a family. One of these recommendations was the revitalization of this Commonwealth's older urban communities to combat suburban and exurban sprawl. The report strongly states that to counteract suburban sprawl, urban places must be economically and environmentally healthy and desirable places to live.

An important component of Agency's mission is to make this Commonwealth a better place to live while fostering community and economic development. To achieve this mission, the Agency recognizes that affordable homeownership is a vehicle for both increasing a geographic area's economic diversity and marketability. The presence of long-term investors (that is, homebuyers) builds optimism and hope in a community and signals that urban neighborhoods hold promise for becoming healthier, more attractive places in which to raise families, shop and work.

The challenge is to craft strategies that encourage older urban communities to become competitive with suburban and rural areas. While increasing urban homeownership opportunities is a step in the right direction, significant hurdles remain before urban neighborhoods become attractive alternatives for homebuyers. The field of community development, including comprehensive community revitalization initiatives, offers an opportunity to strengthen and complement urban homeownership ef-

forts. An urban homeownership choice demonstration program would be consistent with and complement the Ridge administration's effort to reconfigure the dynamics of economic growth through the Keystone Opportunity Enterprise Zones.

The Homeownership Choice Demonstration Program (HCDP)

For urban areas to become more attractive, it is clear that a significant undertaking is required. This effort should seek to both attract additional homeowners to urban areas, while simultaneously addressing structural obstacles that make the urban development marketplace less than attractive. To this end the Agency's Board has set aside \$5 million to sponsor a demonstration program that will encourage market-sensitive and innovative land use planning concepts in urban areas, as well as work in concert with community revitalization efforts. The focus of the program is the development of new homeownership opportunities and the transformation of distressed urban neighborhoods into attractive places to live.

The Guiding Principles for the HCDP include the following:

Link to comprehensive approaches. homeownership is an important part of any neighborhood revitalization agenda, it is not sufficient by itself to transform distressed urban areas. To achieve measurable impact, projects need to be conceived within the context of overall strategic plans, designed to produce significant scale. Recognizing that the resources that could reasonably be brought to bear through this demonstration would be insufficient to transform entire neighborhoods, the Agency intends to maximize potential impact by coordinating the demonstration with efforts that seek to address some other factors that contribute to negative urban environments (that is, unemployment, crime, lack of green or open space, and the like). The HCDP provides an opportunity for the Agency to work collaboratively, comprehensively and efficiently with public and private sector partners undertaking comprehensive neighborhood revitalization projects.

Transfer cost-effective homebuilding skills to urban areas. For-profit homebuilders operate primarily in the suburbs. However, the skills and knowledge that these homebuilders often possess are much needed in urban areas. The HCDP seeks to make urban homebuilding sufficiently attractive to transfer to urban areas the efficiencies and techniques which enable builders to produce low-cost, high-quality suburban homes. To ensure the transfer of skills beyond the program, for-profit developers should work in partnership with local nonprofit developers or Community Development Corporations (CDCs). These nonprofits should already be engaged in the types of comprehensive revitalization activities that are needed to complement a homeownership initiative. To encourage partnership and learning at the municipal level, applications for funding through the program should be a joint effort between a for-profit builder, a nonprofit and the local government. To ensure that local resources are better focused on the demonstration program in that area, municipalities are limited to one application.

Increase homeownership opportunities and choices in urban areas. Currently, there exists a homeownership gap that divides the suburbs from the cities. Approximately 73.7% of suburban families own their homes, compared with just 50.5% of families in central cities. A central focus of the program is the development of homeowner-

ship opportunities in urban areas. Further, these opportunities must be structured so as to be viewed as attractive choices and potential alternatives to homeownership opportunities in the suburbs. To increase the overall number of homeowners, use of program funding is to be directed to producing homes and homeownership opportunities

Encourage diversity of homeownership. An important element of strengthening urban neighborhoods is reducing economic and social isolation. While 73.5% of white families in America are homeowners, only 45.5% of Latino families and 47% of African American families own their homes. Applications must include an Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan.

Build mixed-income communities. While the program will pursue the development of affordable housing opportunities for first time home buyers, these projects should be largely indistinguishable from neighboring market-rate properties. In this manner, the properties should attract home buyers with a wide range of incomes. In the event that local matching support has certain restrictions on its use, the HCDP funds may be designated to target low, moderate- and middle-income families.

Develop at scale. To have an impact on an urban area's economic and social viability, it will be necessary to produce a demonstrable critical mass of revitalization within small, select neighborhoods. By "critical mass" is meant the achievement of a scale of development sufficient to generate spontaneous reinvestment in a community. Therefore, the HCDP will consider efforts that would achieve the development of no less than 50 homeownership units in municipalities with a population of 50,000 or more and no less than 25 homeownership units in those municipalities with a population of 50,000 or less.

Focus on new construction. New homes transform neighborhoods by attracting the residents, businesses and jobs that urban areas need to reverse decades of decline. An emphasis is placed on the construction of new homes.

Focus on strategic locations. The HCDP proposals should target those areas within municipalities of a sizable population which have experienced significant depopulation while their surrounding suburban communities have experienced significant growth.

Leverage Agency funds. To extend the impact of the Agency's funding, support through the program must be matched on a 1:1 basis by local applicants. Of this amount, a minimum of 50% of the funding should be contributed by local government. The Agency intends to provide its funding as a loan, with flexible repayment and deferred interest provisions. Applicants are encouraged to devise innovative methods to secure and repay agency funds.

Insure long term affordability. The energy efficiency of the housing developed is an important factor in maintaining affordable operating costs. Applicants must include a description of the energy efficiency standards and specifications which they will meet. Applicants are encouraged to be innovative in the use of renewable energy technologies, or such other energy efficiencies as will facilitate long term affordability.

Increase net investment. This demonstration is intended to in a small, yet ambitious, manner counteract some market inefficiencies and is not intended to address the viability of public housing and HUD's efforts to shift the costs for the operation of such public housing units. Thus projects which are a part of, or result from, public housing restructuring or mixed finance applications will

not be considered for participation in this demonstration. An outcome of the program should be a net increase in local affordable housing investment.

Requirements

The HCDP Development

The design of the proposed housing development must address the *Guiding Principles* of the HCDP.

- 1. The HCDP proposal must detail plans for the development of no less than 50 homeownership units in municipalities with a population of 50,000 or more and no less than 25 homeownership units in those municipalities with a population of 50,000 or less.
- 2. Developments need to be conceived within the context of comprehensive municipal strategic plan, designed to produce significant scale.
- 3. The comprehensive municipal strategic plan should specify plans for economic development and include other physical or public safety improvements proposed or in place, such as sidewalks, street lights and the proximity to or availability of other community services and amenities such as transportation, schools, shopping areas and parks, and the like.
- 4. The HCDP development homeownership opportunities must be structured so as to be viewed as attractive choices and potential alternatives to homeownership opportunities in the suburbs.
- 5. An emphasis is to be placed on the construction of new single family homes, including development of duplex and townhouse as well as detached units. The product mix is to be based upon the overall needs of the community.
- 6. The HCDP development must show coordination with efforts that seek to address some other factors that contribute to negative urban environments (that is, unemployment, crime, lack of green or open space, and the like).
- 7. The use of HCDP funds is intended to target low-, moderate- and middle-income families. However, only those purchasers with incomes at or below 115% of area median income are eligible for the Agency's single family mortgage loan programs.

Note: In striving to build mixed income communities, the Agency may consider the entire area and not simply the new HCDP development in its evaluation.

- 8. The proposal must show a time-line for the proposed development, including, but not limited to, budgets, access to matching or leveraging funds, site control, construction schedule and overall time to completion and occupancy.
- 9. The outcome of the HCDP development should be a net increase in local affordable housing investment.
- 10. Proposals which are a part of, or result from, public housing restructuring or mixed finance applications will not be considered for participation in this demonstration.

The Proposal

- 1. Proposals for funding through the program should be a joint effort between a for-profit builder, a nonprofit and the local government. Proposals coming from first class cities must be generated through and submitted by the municipal government.
- 2. For-profit homebuilders/developers should work in partnership with local nonprofit developers or CDCs.

- 3. The HCDP proposals should target those areas within municipalities of a sizable population which have experienced significant depopulation while their surrounding suburban communities have experienced significant growth.
- 4. Applicants are limited to one proposal per municipality.
- 5. The Agency's funding must be matched on a 1 : 1 basis by local applicants.
- 6. A minimum of 50% of the match funding should be contributed by local government.

Examples of sources for local government matching funds may include, but are not limited to, funds made available through, CDBG, HOME and the Department of Community and Economic Development's Community of Opportunities Program.

- 7. Applicants should address all the key features of the proposed development and include specific outcomes to be achieved, including how the HCDP funds will make urban homeownership more attractive and affordable.
- 8. It is preferable that HCDP homeownership opportunities, especially those specifically intended for first time home buyers, be offered in conjunction with the creation of a viable homeownership association, possibly through a partnership with a community based nonprofit organization.

A proposal must include:

1. The amount of HCDP funds requested and proposed use of funds.

Note: HCDP funds may be used for housing development and housing related expenditures only, for example: land acquisition, infrastructure, mortgage write-downs for qualifying buyers (those at or below 115% of area median income) to ensure affordability.

- 2. An outline indicating how the HCDP funds will be secured and how repayment will be achieved over the life of the Program.
- 3. A description of the proposed HCDP development, its scope, marketing plan and a comprehensive description of the need for and the expected effect of the HCDP development and funding.
- 4. Detailed plans and drawings of the neighborhood and proposed site, including any proposed municipal improvements not part of the HCDP proposal.
- 5. A definitive market study showing the HCDP development as complementing or part of a comprehensive municipal plan that would include other physical improvements either existing or proposed for the neighborhood.
- 6. A narrative on the effect of the proposed HCDP development on the current residents and any relocation of residents that may be necessary with plans to do so.
 - 7. An Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan.
- 8. A description of the energy efficiency standards and specifications which the proposed HCDP development will meet.
- 9. A detailed plan to leverage resources for the project, a list of the sources of matching and/or leveraging funds and a time-line for fund availability.
- 10. A detailed breakdown of percentage of funding support and degree of municipal participation.

11. A description of all other efforts that will be offered or undertaken by the appropriate governmental entities in support of the applicant and the proposed HCDP development, including evidence of appropriate zoning.

- 12. A list of community linkages and partnerships in support of the HCDP development.
- 13. A list of contacts for each of the partners in the HCDP proposed development, for example, municipality, developer, contractor, CDC, nonprofit, and the like, to include: name, full address, telephone number, fax number and E-mail address.
- 14. A brief description of any previous experiences in the community, with the developer, the nonprofits and the CDC, and the like.
- The Agency encourages applicants to provide additional information, ideas and proposed linkages beyond what is required.
- Applicants are also encouraged to provide statistical analyses and data to support the concept.

The Process

The process is designed to include 2 phases. The first is the application phase. Proposals must be received by the Agency no later than 5 p.m. on Friday, June 30, 2000.

The second is the evaluation phase. The Agency will evaluate all proposals and inform applicants of a decision by Thursday, August 31, 2000.

The Agency monitoring and municipal reporting requirements will be based upon the use of HCDP funds.

Although the Agency will have mortgage funding available for those purchasers who qualify for the Agency's single family loan programs, mortgage funding through the Agency is not a requirement.

Note: One qualifying factor is that the purchaser be a first time home buyer, unless the municipality is in a designated target county—then the purchaser need not be a first time home buyer to qualify for the Agency funding.

Decision factors

Funding decisions will be based upon the *Guiding Principles* enumerated in the program description and the criteria set forth in the *Development* and *Proposal Requirement* sections of this RFP.

Although all criteria must be addressed and all will be evaluated, priority will be given to those proposals demonstrating a high degree of municipal participation, support and leveraging of funds. Proposals that demonstrate a substantial positive overall effect on the neighborhood/community, build upon the existing network of community organizations, programs and services, build mixed-income communities and/or are evaluated to be a vital part of a comprehensive economic development plan will also be considered more favorably.

Another significant factor is site control. Those projects exhibiting the greatest degree of site control, all else being equal, will be viewed as being most ready to proceed and therefore receive favorable consideration in the competitive evaluation.

Additionally, consideration will be given to the experience and previous success of the partners' prior developments. The Agency recognizes that in some areas of the Commonwealth, due to the lack of experienced nonprofits, home builders may have to partner with less experienced nonprofit partners.

Proposal/application material will become the property of the Agency. The Agency reserves the right to amend or modify this demonstration program at any time and may determine to discontinue this program at any time. Costs associated with this proposal/application will be the responsibility of the applicant.

State Real Estate Commission Regulation No. 16A-568

Agency

April 6, 2000

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Section 5.1(h) and (i) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) list the criteria IRRC must use to determine if the regulation is in the public interest. The State Real Estate Commission (Commission) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final regulation. If the final regulation is not delivered by March 6, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 35.201. Definitions—Consistency with the statute.

This section proposes to amend an existing definition and add ten new definitions of terms, which are also defined in The Real Estate Licensing Act (act) (63 P. S. § 455.201). Only the definition of "consumer" is identical to the definition in the act; the remainder are not.

We object to the definitions in the regulation which differ from the definitions in the act. The Commission should reference the statutory definitions in section 455.201 of the act. If the Commission does not reference the statutory definitions of these terms in the final regulation, it should justify the changes to the following definitions.

Agency relationship

This definition refers to a "broker of record or licensees employed by a broker of record." The act refers to the "broker or licensees in the employ of the broker." The term in the proposed regulation also refers to a "consumer who becomes a principal." The act refers to a "consumer of real estate services."

Buyer agent

This definition refers to a "licensee who enters into an agency relationship with a buyer/tenant." The act refers to a "consumer buyer of real estate" instead of a "buyer/tenant."

Designated agent

This term refers to one or more licensees designated by the "broker of record," while the act refers to an "employing broker." The term in the proposed regulation also refers to licensees "employed by the broker of record," while the act refers to licensees "within the broker's employ."

Dual agent

This term is defined as "a licensee who acts as an agent for the buyer/tenant and seller/landlord in the same transaction." The act defines the term as "a licensee who acts as an agent for the buyer and seller, or lessee and landlord, in the same transaction."

Listing broker

This term is defined as "a broker of record who has entered into a written agreement with a seller/landlord to market property as a seller's agent, dual agent or transaction licensee." The act defines the term as "a broker engaged as a seller's agent, dual agent or transaction licensee to market the property of a seller/landlord for sale or lease pursuant to a written agreement with the seller/landlord."

Principal

This term is defined as "a consumer who has entered into an agency relationship with a broker of record or another licensee employed by the broker of record." The act defines the term as "a consumer of real estate services who has entered into an agency relationship with a broker."

Salesperson

Subsection (vii) states that a salesperson may "assist a broker in managing [or appraising] property." The existing definition is being amended by the deletion of the phrase "or appraising." However, the remainder of subparagraph (vii) is inconsistent with the definition of "salesperson" as defined in the act, because the definition does not include the phrase "managing of property."

Seller's agent

This term is defined as "a licensee who enters into an agency relationship with a seller/landlord." The act defines the term "seller agent" as "any licensee who has entered into an agency relationship with a seller of real estate."

Subagent

This term is defined as "a licensee, not in the employ of the listing broker, who acts or cooperates with the listing broker in selling property as a seller's/landlord's agent." The act defines the term as "a broker, not in the employ of the listing broker, who is engaged to act for, or cooperate with, the listing broker in selling property as an agent of the seller. A subagent is deemed to have an agency relationship with the seller."

Transaction licensee

The term is defined as "a licensee who, without entering into an agency relationship with the consumer, provides communications or document preparation services or performs other acts listed in the definition of 'broker' or 'salesperson'." The act defines the term as "a licensed broker or salesperson who provides communication or document preparation services or performs acts described under the definition of "broker" or "salesperson" for which a license is required, without being an agent or advocate of the consumer."

2. Section 35.281. Putting contracts, commitments and agreements in writing—Clarity.

Subsection (a) Valuable Consideration

This subsection states, "and a principal or consumer who is required to pay a fee, commission or other valuable consideration..." What qualifies as "valuable consideration," other than monetary consideration? For clarity, the Commission should define the term "valuable consideration," or list examples in subsection (a).

Subsection (b)(1) Open Listing

This subsection contains the term "open listing." For clarity, the Commission should consider defining the term in either this section or § 35.201 (relating to definitions).

Subsection (b)(3) Disclosure Statement

Subsection (b)(3) applies to licensees who provide services to the buyer/tenant, but are paid by the seller/landlord. These licensees are required to provide, and have signed, "a written disclosure statement describing the nature of the services and the fees to be paid." Section 35.331 (relating to written agreements generally) contains much more detailed language. These additions provide a more accurate description of the required materials. For greater clarity, the Commission should add a cross-reference to § 35.331 of the proposed regulation in subsection (b)(3).

3. Section 35.283. Conflict of interest—Consistency with the statute; Clarity.

Subsection (f) Conflict of Interest

Subsection (f) requires a licensee to disclose to a principal any conflict of interest in a "reasonably practicable period of time." Although the act (63 P. S. § 455.608.1(7)) requires a licensee to "timely disclose" any conflicts of interest to a consumer, the Commission should clarify what it considers timely disclosure. It is in the consumer's best interest to be notified immediately of any conflict of interest. Therefore, we recommend that the Commission provide a definitive standard in the final regulation for what would be considered timely.

4. Section 35.284. Preagreement disclosures to consumers—Clarity.

Subsection (a) Licensee Duties

This subsection requires licensees to provide a disclosure summary to "all consumers." Subsection (b) requires a licensee to provide the entire disclosure to "the consumer." Does disclosure need to go to all consumers, or just those interested in conducting business with the licensee? For clarity, the Commission should use either "all consumers" or "the consumer" consistently in this section.

Additionally, there appears to be a typographical error in subsection (a)(4). The cross reference to "§ 33.336 (relating to disclosure summary)" is incorrect. The section in the proposed regulation that relates to disclosure summary is § 35.336. This should be corrected in the final regulation.

5. Section 35.311. Generally—Consistency with the statute; Clarity.

Subsection (d) Confidential Information

This subsection provides that "a licensee in an agency relationship may not knowingly, during or following, reveal or use confidential information..." For improved clarity and consistency with section 606.1(g) of the act (63 P. S. § 455.606a(g)), the Commission should add the phrase "the termination of an agency relationship" after "during or following."

6. Section 35.314. Dual agency—Consistency with the statute; Clarity.

Subsection (b)(2) Licensee Duties

This subsection requires the licensee to make a good faith effort to find a buyer for the property and a property for the buyer, "unless otherwise agreed." (Emphasis added.) However, the language in section 606.4(b)(2) of the act $(63\ P.\ S.\ \S\ 455.606d(b)(2))$ is more specific. The act requires the agreement to be in writing. Additionally, the act states, "... except that a dual agent is not obligated to seek additional offers to purchase the property while it is subject to an existing contract for sale." For improved clarity and consistency with the act, the Commission should add the language contained in section 606.4(b)(2) of the act.

7. Section 35.315. Designated agency—Consistency with the statute; Statutory authority.

Subsection (b) Designation

This subsection states, "Designation should take place at the time that the parties enter into a written agreement." (Emphasis added.) Subsections (b)(1) and (2) list circumstances where it is permissible to designate an agent after the initial designation or after the written agreement is signed.

"Should" is nonregulatory language which implies that a provision is optional. Optional provisions should be placed in policy statements or guidance documents. Regulations contain mandates which have the full force and effect of law. The Commission should replace "should" with "shall," or delete this provision.

Additionally, a commentator and the House Professional Licensure Committee expressed concerns that this subsection could be interpreted as a general consent to a designated agency relationship. For clarity, the Commission should specify that the consumer must consent to the designation of an agent as well as the specific agent designated.

Subsection (b)(2) Renunciation of Prior Agency Relationship

This subsection requires the principal to renounce any previous agency relationship with other licensees employed by the broker of record "to the exclusion of other designated agents." The meaning of this phrase is unclear. We request that the Commission explain the intent of this phrase.

Subsection (d) Agency Relationships

This subsection states, "The licensees employed by the broker of record who are not designated may not have an agency relationship with either party in the transaction." This provision appears to be inconsistent with section 606 of the act (63 P.S. § 455.606). The act provides that licensees employed by a broker have the same relationship to the consumer as the broker, except when the broker is a dual agent and designates a licensee to act exclusively on behalf of one party. We request that the Commission explain how subsection (d) is consistent with the act.

Subsection (e) Company Policy on Designation

This subsection refers to designated agents of the "consumer." Since a consumer who enters into an agency relationship is a "principal," should the term "consumer" be replaced with "principal?"

In addition, the Commission should clarify the meaning of "affiliated licensees" in this subsection.

8. Section 35.331. Written agreements generally—Consistency with the statute; Clarity.

Subsection (a) Written Agreements

This subsection states that a written agreement "... may contain the following information printed conspicuously." (Emphasis added.) "May" is nonregulatory language that implies that a provision is optional. Further, the use of the word "may" appears to be inconsistent with section 608.1 of the act (63 P. S. § 455.608a), which uses the word "shall." Therefore, the Commission should replace "may" with "shall" in subsection (a).

Subsection (a)(6) Description

This subsection requires the written agreement to provide "a description of the licensee's conflicts of interest and a method whereby the licensee will disclose future conflicts." This requirement is not clear. What is intended when the Commission requires a licensee to describe "a method whereby the licensee will disclose future conflicts"? Section 608.1(7) of the act (63 P. S. § 455.608a(7)) requires a licensee to include a statement which notifies consumers of the "licensee's continuing duty to timely disclose any conflicts of interest." The Commission should revise this subsection so that it is consistent with the act.

9. Section 35.332. Exclusive listing agreements—Clarity.

The Preamble states that subsection (d) is being deleted. However, the regulation does not show this deletion. The Commission should reconcile this inconsistency in the final regulation.

10. Section 35.333. Agreements of sale—Clarity.

Subsection (a) Conspicuously

Subsection (a) requires each agreement of sale to contain "conspicuously..." a specific statement. The use of the term "conspicuously" is vague. If the Commission intends by the use of the term "conspicuously" that the statement should appear in bold, large type and on the

front page of each agreement of sale then the Commission should specifically describe its requirement in the final regulation.

Subsection (a) Agreement of Terms

Subsection (a) refers to "an agreement of sale, other than for a cemetery lot, mausoleum or cremation space or opening..." However, subsection (d) refers to "an agreement of sale for a cemetery lot or plot or a mausoleum space or opening." Does the Commission intend subsections (a) and (d) to apply to the same subjects? If so, the Commission should revise both subsections to ensure that the language is consistent in the final regulation.

11. Section 35.337. Comparative market analysis—Reasonableness.

Subsection (b) exempts a licensee who is also licensed as an appraiser under the Real Estate Appraisers Certification Act (63 P. S. §§ 457.1—457.19) from placing a disclosure on the comparative market analysis. The intent of the disclosure is to alert a consumer that a comparative market analysis is not an appraisal. Regardless of who prepares a comparative market analysis, a consumer should be informed that the analysis is not the same as an appraisal. Consequently, the disclosure requirement should apply to all market analyses and subsection (b) should be deleted.

12. Miscellaneous Clarity Issues.

Section 25.283. Conflict of interest

There appears to be a typographical error in subsection (d). The last word in this subsection, "service," should be "services."

Section 35.313. Buyer's agency

The title of this section is inconsistent with the format used in § 35.312, and in the act. For consistency the title should be changed to "Buyer's agent."

Section 35.314. Dual agency

The title of this section should be changed to "Dual agent."

Subsection (b)(2) contains a typographical error. The first word should be changed from "Maing" to "Making."

Section 35.315. Designated agency

The title of this section should be changed to "Designated agent."

Subsections (f)(1), (f)(2), (f)(4) and (f)(5) are numbered incorrectly. These subsections should be renumbered (f)(1), (f)(2), (f)(3) and (f)(4).

Section 35.331. Written agreements generally

Subsections (a)(5), (a)(6), (a)(7) and (a)(8) are numbered incorrectly. They should be renumbered subsections (a)(4), (a)(5), (a)(6) and (a)(7) respectively.

Subsection (b) incorrectly refers to subsection (b) instead of subsection (a). This should be corrected in the final regulation.

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which has not been met. The Depart-

ment of Agriculture (Department) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by March 6, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

Section 138h.5. Eligibility criteria—Fiscal Impact; Reasonableness; Need

We question why the Department is deleting the criterion in existing subsection (b)(2) which requires evaluation of the "availability of funding for a project from a source other than the Commonwealth."

If alternate funding is or becomes available to an applicant, continuing the subsection (b)(2) requirement would give the Department the flexibility of commensurately reducing the amount of funding to the applicant under the Agricultural Land Conservation Assistance Grant Program (Program). That, in turn, would make more funds available for other Program projects.

Three other proposed rulemakings implementing Farm Safety and Occupational Health programs (Regulations #2-119, #2-122 and #2-123) contain requirements that other sources of funding be evaluated. The Department should likewise continue this requirement in this regulation, or justify its deletion.
