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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva-nia Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

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Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.


Whereas, the needs of our children and families are increasingly complex, and the network of services available to them are managed by a myriad of agencies, often with differing goals and objectives; and

Whereas, streamlining programs and processes, encouraging closer coordination among government agencies, and establishing clearer goals would allow more comprehensive solutions to the problems confronting children and families and allow both public and private agencies to better address the needs of our children and families; and

Whereas, the problems and issues that confront Pennsylvania's children will best be addressed by strong families and strong communities; and

Whereas, it is imperative that all parts of the Commonwealth continually seek new, innovative, and creative ways to manage scarce resources in order to strengthen families and improve the lives of the children of this Commonwealth.

Now, Therefore, I, Edward G. Rendell, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority invested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby establish the Governor's Cabinet on Children and Families (hereinafter referred to as the "Cabinet") and do order and direct as follows:

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6.111. Purpose.

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§ 6.111. Purpose.

The purpose of the Governor's Cabinet on Children and Families is to make recommendations to the Governor on ways to improve the delivery of services to children and families by making the services more responsive, efficient and effective.

§ 6.112. Powers and duties.

The Governor's Cabinet on Children and Families (Cabinet) will have the power to:

- (1) Review and evaluate State government programs that provide services for children and families.
- (2) Review and evaluate the policies of State government agencies that affect the health and well-being of children and families and make recommendations to the Governor regarding the policies.
- (3) Maximize the coordination of programs that affect children and families between and among State government agencies.
- (4) Recommend the creation of new programs to serve the unmet needs of children and families.
- (5) Identify program measures to evaluate the efficacy of State government programs affecting children and families, to redirect, revamp, consolidate or eliminate the programs.
- (6) Work with charitable foundations, local government agencies, child advocacy groups, community and religious leaders, academia, policy and research organizations and other entities as may be appropriate to carry out the purpose of the Cabinet.

§ 6.113. Composition.

- (a) The Governor's Cabinet on Children and Families (Cabinet) will consist of the Secretary of Public Welfare who will serve as Chairperson. The Chairperson will designate an individual to serve as Executive Director. Members include the following:
 - (1) The Secretary of Education.
 - (2) The Secretary of Health.
 - (3) The Secretary of Labor and Industry.
 - (4) The Insurance Commissioner.
 - (5) The Director of the Governor's Office of Health Care Reform.
- (6) The Director of the Governor's Office of Policy or the Director's designee.
 - (7) The Chairperson of the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission.
- (8) The Chairperson of the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency.
 - (9) The Governor's Chief of Staff or a designee.
 - (10) The Secretary of the Budget or a designee.
- (b) Each agency represented on the Cabinet shall designate an individual to serve as a key staff contact. Agencies may assign staff, as necessary, to complete the work of the Cabinet.

§ 6.114. Responsibilities of Commonwealth agencies.

Commonwealth agencies under the direction of the Governor shall cooperate with the Governor's Cabinet on Children and Families (Cabinet). At a minimum, Commonwealth agencies will:

- (1) Provide staff resources, information, records and materials, as necessary, for the Cabinet to carry out its responsibilities.
- (2) Implement program improvements identified and adopted by the Cabinet.
- (3) Evaluate the efficiency and effectiveness of management and productivity improvements.
- (4) Recommend to the Cabinet areas of investigation that might result in improvements to Commonwealth government operations or removal of barriers that adversely affect the delivery of services to children and families.

§ 6.115. Commission on Children and Families.

- (a) The Governor will appoint a Commission on Children and Families (Commission) to assist and advise the Governor's Cabinet on Children and Families to:
- (1) Identify policy, program and systemic barriers that prevent State and local governments from effectively and efficiently serving the needs of children and families.
 - (2) Formulate remedies and solutions to identified problems.
- (b) The Commission will consist of members appointed by the Governor, in numbers the Governor deems appropriate. The Governor will designate one Commission member to serve as chairperson.

§ 6.116. Compensation.

Members of the Commission on Children and Families will receive no compensation for their services, except that the members may be reimbursed for actual travel and related expenses in accordance with Commonwealth policy. See Chapter 40 (relating to travel and subsistence).

Amendments to Business of the Superior Court and the Superior Court Internal Operating Procedures

Rules of Appellate Procedure, Business of the Superior Court

The Superior Court of Pennsylvania has amended procedures by which requests that a decision of the Court be published are made. This policy is reflected in the Pennsylvania Rules of Appellate Procedure—Business of the Superior Court, with the amendment to Rule 3519, appearing in 210 Pa. Code Chapter 35.

Superior Court Internal Operating Procedures

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1910. ACTIONS FOR SUPPORT Rule 1910.16-5. Support Guidelines. Deviation.

(c) In determining the duration of an award for spousal support or alimony pendente lite, the trier of fact shall consider the period of time during which the parties lived together from the date of marriage to the date of final separation.

Rule 1910.16-6. Support Guidelines. Adjustments to the Basic Support Obligation.

(c) Unreimbursed Medical Expenses. Unreimbursed medical expenses of the obligee or the children shall be allocated between the parties in proportion to their respective net incomes [and]. The court may direct that obligor's share be added to his or her basic support obligation, or paid directly to the obligee or to the health care provider.

(1) For purposes of this subdivision, medical expenses are annual unreimbursed medical expenses in excess of \$250 per person [which are recurring and can be reasonably predicted by the court at the time of establishment or modification of the support or-

der]. Medical expenses include insurance co-payments and deductibles and all expenses incurred for reasonably necessary medical services and supplies, including but not limited to surgical, dental and optical services, and orthodontia. Medical expenses do not include cosmetic, chiropractic, psychiatric or psychological services unless specifically directed in the order of court.

* * * * *

[(2) If there are annual medical expenses in excess of \$250 per person which are unpredictable or non-recurring, the court may order that such expenses, if incurred, be allocated in proportion to the parties' net incomes. The court may direct obligor to pay his or her share either to the obligee or directly to the health care provider.

Title 246—MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES

PART I. GENERAL [246 PA. CODE CH. 400]

Clarification Regarding Distribution of Proceeds of Sale

The Minor Court Rules Committee is planning to recommend that the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania amend Rule 416 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards and Civil Procedure for District Justices to clarify that an executing officer shall distribute the proceeds of a sale directly to the party or parties entitled to receive the proceeds. The Committee has not submitted this proposal for review by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

The following explanatory Report highlights the Committee's considerations in formulating this proposal. The Committee's Report should not be confused with the Committee's Official Notes to the rules. The Supreme Court does not adopt the Committee's Official Notes or the contents of the explanatory reports.

The text of the proposed changes precedes the Report. Additions are shown in bold; deletions are in bold and brackets.

TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 400. EXECUTION OF JUDGMENTS FOR THE PAYMENT OF MONEY

Rule 416. Distribution of Proceeds. Priorities.

- A. Not later than five **[(5)]** days after the sale of personal property the officer executing the order shall prepare a **proposed** schedule of **[proposed]** distribution of the proceeds of sale which shall be kept on file in the office of the district justice from which the order issued and shall be available for inspection. No schedule of distribution need be filed when the property is sold to the plaintiff for costs only.
- B. When a receipt of the plaintiff has been accepted on account of the purchase price, the schedule shall set forth [his] the plaintiff's name and address, the amount of [his] the judgment and the amount of credit claimed or allowed upon the purchase price.
- C. [The officer executing the order shall distribute the proceeds of the sale in accordance with the proposed schedule of distribution unless written exceptions are filed in the office of the district justice from which the order issued not later than ten (10) days after the filing of the proposed schedule.] Unless written exceptions are filed in the office of the district justice from which the order issued not later than ten days after the filing of the proposed schedule of distribution, the officer executing the order shall distribute the proceeds of the sale directly to the party or parties entitled to receive the proceeds in accordance with the proposed schedule.

Proposed Amendment to Rule 416 of the Rules of Conduct, Office Standards and Civil Procedure for District Justices

CLARIFICATION REGARDING DISTRIBUTION OF PROCEEDS OF SALE

The Minor Court Rules Committee (hereinafter the Committee) undertook a review of Pa. R.C.P.D.J. No. 416 (Distribution of Proceeds. Priorities.) in response to an inquiry about who is to distribute the proceeds of a sale of personal property held in accordance with an order of execution. The Committee learned that some executing officers (sheriffs and constables) are forwarding the proceeds of the sale to the district justice court for distribution. The Committee believes that the appropriate procedure, and the intent of Rule 416C, is for the executing officer to distribute the proceeds of the sale directly to the party or parties entitled to receive the proceeds. The Committee noted that the district justice has very limited direct involvement in the execution process beyond the issuance of the order of execution and the determination of property claims and disputes, if any. Importantly, the Committee believes that there is no specific accounting mechanism in the district justice courts to receive, account for, and distribute the proceeds of a sale.

Accordingly, the Committee proposes that Rule 416C be amended to further clarify that "the officer executing the

order shall distribute the proceeds of the sale directly to the party or parties entitled to receive the proceeds." In addition, the Committee proposes minor technical or "housekeeping" amendments to the Rule to address gender neutrality and to conform to modern drafting style.

ACTIONS FOR CUSTODY, PARTIAL CUSTODY AND VISITATION OF MINOR CHILDREN

Rule L1915.3. Commencement of Action. Complaint. Order for Conciliation Conference. Conciliation Conference.

(a) Upon commencement of an action for custody, partial custody or visitation of minor children, or the filing of a petition seeking modification or contempt of an existing order or seeking relocation, the plaintiff/petitioner shall attach an order to the original complaint or petition, directing the defendant/respondent to attend a conciliation conference. The court will schedule the conciliation conference at a court facility and the Prothonotary will provide a copy of a scheduling order to the plaintiff/petitioner for service on the defendant/respondent.

(b) The parties and their attorneys shall attend the conciliation conference.

- (c) At the conference, the parties and their attorneys shall meet and discuss the issues and use their best efforts to reach a settlement based on the best interests and welfare of the child/children.
- (d) Upon reaching a settlement, the attorneys and parties shall immediately dictate a consent order. The court will make a member of its staff available to prepare the order. The parties shall sign the order and present it to the court staff before leaving the court facility.
- (e) If the parties are unable to reach a settlement of the issues, they shall notify the court before leaving the court facility.
- (f) In the event Pa.R.C.P. 1940.3(b) or another rule or law prevents the court from ordering a mediation orientation session, the parties and their attorneys shall so notify the court at the conclusion of the conciliation conference and the court will proceed to schedule a pre-hearing conference. Otherwise, the court will order a mediation orientation session and mediation pursuant to Rule L1940.3.

In those cases which proceed to a pre-hearing conference, a pre-hearing statement shall be filed with the court by each party at least seven (7) days before the pre-hearing conference. If no agreement is reached at the pre-hearing conference the court will schedule a hearing.

MEDIATION IN CUSTODY ACTIONS

Rule L1940.3. Order for Orientation Session and Mediation. Selection of Mediator

- (a) In those cases where the parties have participated in a conciliation conference pursuant to Rule L1915.3 and have been unable to reach a settlement, except when mediation is prohibited by Pa.R.C.P. 1940.3(b) or another rule or law, the court will order an orientation session and a mediation conference ("the mediation") and the parties and their counsel shall attend and participate as ordered.
- (b) The court shall set a date and time for the mediation as soon as practical after the pleading asserting the child custody issue is brought to the attention of the court.
- (c) The cost of the mediation shall be paid equally by the parties and each party shall deposit his/her share with the court administrator not later than seven (7) days prior to date of the mediation.
- (d) All applications for continuance shall be made in writing to the court and shall follow Clarion County Rule L216. No requests for continuance shall be made less than seven (7) days prior to the scheduled mediation.

Rule L1940.5. Duties of Mediator

- (a) The child custody mediator shall ascertain the issues in the action through discussion with the attorneys and/or the parties. He/she shall not take testimony and the mediation shall not be of record. Rather, the mediator shall attempt to determine the relevant facts through discussion and shall suggest or recommend a proposed settlement.
- (b) The mediation procedure shall at all times be in the sole discretion of the child custody mediator, in accordance with applicable rules of court.
- (c) When the child custody mediator determines that the parties have reached full agreement concerning the matter, he/she shall immediately have the parties and

their attorneys report to the court administrator. The court administrator shall make a member of the court staff available to prepare a consent order, which shall be dictated either by the attorneys or by the mediator. Upon preparation and execution thereof the same shall be submitted to the court for approval and signature.

- (d) If the parties can reach only partial agreement concerning the action, the child custody mediator in his/her discretion may dictate a consent order covering the partial agreement and refer the disputed areas to the court for decision, or may refer the entire action to the court for decision. The child custody mediator may further, in his/her discretion, dictate a consent order based upon the submission of a written stipulation executed by the attorneys and/or the parties.
- (e) If, when the mediation is called, one party does not appear either personally or by counsel, the mediator shall ascertain whether service and notice of the mediation have been made upon the non-appearing party. If service and notice have been made, the mediator may, in his/her discretion, dictate an order granting the relief requested by the appearing party. If no party appears either personally or through an attorney, the mediator shall submit a report to the court, together with a proposed order to dismiss the action, in which event costs shall be assessed and collected.
- (f) If it appears to the mediator that psychological evaluations and/or home studies are needed for ultimate resolution of the matter, he/she shall report that decision to the court. The court will then decide whether to issue an order of court directing such psychological evaluations and/or home studies. The costs of such evaluations and/or home studies shall be paid equally by the parties unless for cause shown the court directs otherwise.
- (g) In those actions where the parties cannot reach agreement, the mediator shall prepare and file a report pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 1940.6.
- (h) With the consent of the parties, the mediator shall state in the report a concise summary of the mediation, including the background of the action, the allegations of the parties concerning the areas of dispute, and the recommendations, if any, of the mediator concerning disposition. The mediator shall attach any evaluation reports and home studies to such report. The report shall also include pre-trial information, which the attorneys shall be prepared to provide to the child custody mediator, such as lists of witnesses, exhibits, and stipulations, and an estimate of trial time.
- (i) A proposed order setting the matter for a prehearing conference before the court and requiring the filing of pre-hearing statements at least seven (7) days before the pre-hearing conference shall be attached to any report submitted by the mediator.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 51, 63 AND 93] General Provisions; Fishing; Boating

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapters 51, 63 and 93 (relating to administrative provisions; general fishing regulations; and boat registration and numbering). The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed rulemaking relates to permits for fish collecting activities, fishing and registration and titling.

A. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form, will go into effect upon publication of an order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Contact Person

For further information on the proposed rulemaking, contact Laurie E. Shepler, Assistant Counsel, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000, (717) 705-7815. This proposed rulemaking is available electronically through the Commission's website (http://www.fish.state.pa.us).

C. Statutory Authority

The proposed additions of §§ 51.72 and 51.73 (relating to permits for commercial pest control agents; and general permits for fish collecting activities) are published under the statutory authority of section 2905 of the code (relating to permits for scientific and educational fish collecting activities). The proposed amendments to §§ 63.6 and 63.8 (relating to authorized devices for game fish, baitfish and fishbait; and long bows, spears and gigs) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102(b) of the code (relating to rules and regulations). The proposed amendments to § 93.9 (relating to surrender of certificate of registration) are published under the statutory authority of section 5122 of the code (relating to registrations, licenses, permits, plates and statistics). The proposed amendments to \S 93.102 (relating to application procedure and contents of applications for certificates of title) are published under the statutory authority of section 5325 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to permits for fish collecting activities, fishing and registration and titling.

E. Summary of Proposed Rulemaking

(1) Sections 51.72 and 51.73. From time to time, the Commission's regional law enforcement offices receive calls from individuals seeking assistance in removing snakes or other unwanted "visitors" from their residences. Generally, the response is to refer the individuals to a commercial pest control business. Unlike the Game Commission, the Commission does not have regulations governing commercial pest control agents. Commercial entities that wish to engage in this business as it pertains to fish have been advised by Commission staff in the past to obtain a scientific collectors' permit under § 51.71 (relat-

ing to scientific collectors' permits). The Commission believes that there are issues associated with commercial pest control agents that require regulations that are tailored to this business. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to add § 51.72 to read as set forth in Annex A. The Commission also proposes to add § 51.73 to read as set forth in Annex A to cover fish collecting activities other than for scientific or educational research purposes or pest control.

- (2) Section 63.6. A recent review of the Commission's regulations has revealed the need to clarify that nets may not be used to catch or take game fish. This issue has arisen with regard to the Lake Erie tributaries and the illegal netting of steelhead. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (3) Section 63.8. In recent years, crossbows have become more popular and the Game Commission has relaxed restrictions for their use during the regular firearms season for deer and during the elk and bear seasons. Allowing their use in fishing would have no or little impact and would eliminate the need for a permit for their use for persons with disabilities. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (4) Section 93.9. This section sets forth the conditions under which an individual is required to surrender a certificate of registration. The condition in this section dealing with documented vessels is not valid. Documented vessels are exempt from the requirement to display the registration number but are required to be registered, in part, to serve as proof of payment of sales tax. Because documented vessels are required to be registered, their owners must possess a certificate of registration and display a validation decal. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (5) Section 93.102. A question has arisen regarding whether it is appropriate for the Commission to issue a certificate of title for a boat that is currently registered in another state. For example, a North Carolina resident recently sought to obtain a Pennsylvania title for a boat that is currently registered in North Carolina. Although North Carolina does not have a mandatory titling program, it does allow individuals to voluntarily title their boats. The individual did not want to title the boat in North Carolina, but wished to keep the boat registered there.

The Commission has determined that as a matter of policy it should not issue certificates of title for boats that are currently registered in other states. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

The proposed additions of §§ 51.72 and 51.73 will create new paperwork requirements in that individuals who wish to apply for permits for commercial pest control agents and general permits for fish collecting activities will have to complete an application on the form prescribed by the Commission. However, the Commission currently is issuing permits covering these activities under its already existing scientific collectors' permit program. Thus, the increase in paperwork will be modest.

The remainder of the proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed additions of §§ 51.72 and 51.73 will impose new costs on the private sector and the general public in that individuals applying for permits for commercial pest control agents and general permits for fish collecting activities will have to pay a fee. The remainder of the proposed rulemaking will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Comments

Annex A

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION Subpart A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

CHAPTER 51. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS Subchapter H. PERMITS FOR FISH COLLECTING ACTIVITIES

- § 51.72. Permits for commercial pest control agents.
- (a) General. An annual commercial pest control permit is required to take, catch, possess, transport, release or dispatch fish, reptiles and amphibians, for another person for a fee or other consideration, that are creating a nuisance or are a risk to human health or safety. This permit authorizes the agent to control designated fish, reptiles and amphibians for another at any time of the year.
- (b) Application. In addition to the requirements of § 51.42 (relating to applications), an application for an annual commercial pest control permit shall be accompanied by a nonrefundable fee of \$50.
 - (c) Operation.
- (1) An agent shall have the approval of the property owner or lessee and confine all activities to that property.
- (2) An agent shall carry the permit and a valid Pennsylvania fishing license at all times and present it upon the request of any officer authorized to enforce the code.

- (3) An agent shall comply with the terms and conditions of the permit.
- (d) Records and reports. An agent shall keep a record of all activities conducted under the authority of the permit on the form prescribed by the Commission.
- (1) The agent shall keep the records for 3 years following the expiration of the permit, and the records shall be the basis of any reports required by the Commission. Records shall be available for inspection during normal business hours at the request of any officer authorized to enforce the code.
- (2) An agent shall submit an annual report of activities to the Commission on the form prescribed by the Commission. The agent shall submit the report by January 31 of the year following the year for which the permit was issued. The report shall list the number of each species taken and their disposition.
 - (e) Unlawful acts. It is unlawful:
- (1) To catch, take, kill, possess, export or import any threatened or endangered species without the proper permits and approval of the Commission.
- (2) Except with the prior written permission of the Commission, to sell, trade, barter or transfer to another person any live or dead fish, reptile or amphibian, including parts, taken under the authority of a permit.
- (3) To release nonnative species of fish, reptiles or amphibians into the waters or other areas of this Commonwealth.
- § 51.73. General permits for fish collecting activi-
- (a) A valid and current general permit for fishing collecting activities for purposes other than those described in §§ 51.71 and 51.72 (relating to scientific collectors' permits; and permits for commercial pest control agents) is required to collect, take or maintain any species of Pennsylvania fishes, amphibians, reptiles or aquatic organisms, during seasons not permitted by regulations governing holders of a valid Pennsylvania license, individual rattlesnake hunter permit, organized amphibian and reptile hunt permit or other license or permit.
- (b) Holders of general permits and their assistants shall comply with terms and conditions of the permit, including the requirement for a report of collecting activities.

Subpart B. FISHING

CHAPTER 63. GENERAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 63.6. Authorized devices for game fish, baitfish and fishbait.

* * * * *

- (e) It is unlawful to use any type of net or seine to catch or take game fish. A landing net may be used to land game fish legally caught by hook and line.
- § 63.8. Long bows, crossbows, spears and gigs.
- (a) General. Except as otherwise provided in this part, carp, gar, suckers and eels may be taken with [a long bow, including compound, and arrow; a spear; or

- gig] long bows and arrow, including compound bows, crossbows, spears or gigs any hour of the day or night aided by a light at night if so desired, in Commonwealth waters and waters bounding and adjacent thereto[; except that there may be no spearing in the tributaries of Lake Erie from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. daily].
- (b) *Delaware River*. The following provisions apply to use of long bows **and arrow**, including compound **bows**, **crossbows**, spears and gigs on the Delaware River:

* * * * *

- (2) It is unlawful to use long bows and arrow, including compound, **crossbows**, spears or gigs to take fish within 275 yards of an eel weir.
- (3) Except as provided in paragraph (1), it is unlawful to take any fish on the Delaware River by means of long bows and arrow, **including compound bows, cross-bows,** spears or gigs.

* * * * *

- (d) Restrictions. Spears or gigs may not be mechanically propelled, may not have more than five barbed points, and may not be used in approved trout waters. [Except as provided in subsection (e), the use of crossbows is prohibited.
- (e) Persons with disabilities. The Executive Director, or a designee, may issue permits to persons exempt from the fishing license requirement under section 2709(b) of the code (relating to exemptions from license requirements)—except a person who is blind—and a person who is permanently deprived of the use of a leg or an arm or both arms allowing them to use crossbows or mechanically propelled spears and gigs subject to limitations and conditions as set forth in the permit. Persons who wish to apply for a permit under this section may apply on forms provided by: Director, Bureau of Law Enforcement, Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, Post Office Box 67000, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17106-7000.

Subpart C. BOATING CHAPTER 93. BOAT REGISTRATION AND NUMBERING

Subchapter A. REGISTRATION OF BOATS § 93.9. Surrender of certificate of registration.

- (a) The person whose name appears on the certificate of registration as owner of a boat shall surrender the certificate and the validation decals to the Commission, within 15 days after it becomes invalid, for one or more of the following reasons:
 - (1) [The boat becomes documented.
 - **(2)** The owner transfers ownership of the boat.
 - [(3)](2) * * *
 - [(4)](3) * * *
 - [(5)](4) * * *
 - [(6)](5) * * *
 - [(7)](6) * * *
- (b) If the certificate of registration becomes invalid for the reasons in subsection [(a)(1), (4) or (6)] (a)(3) or (5), the person whose name appears on the certificate as the owner shall remove the number and validation decal from the boat. If the registration becomes invalid for the reasons in subsection (a)[(7)](6), the owner shall remove the validation decal but shall leave the registration number fixed to the boat.

Subchapter B. TITLING OF BOATS

§ 93.102. Application procedure and contents of applications for certificates of title.

* * * * *

(e) The Commission will not issue a certificate of title for a boat that is registered or titled, or both, in another state or that is documented by the United States Coast Guard unless the application for title is accompanied by the current certificates of registration or title, or both, for the boat or evidence that the marine document for the boat is no longer in effect.

Title 4—ADMINISTRATION

Reorganization of the Department of General Services


The Executive Board approved a reorganization of the Department of General Services effective September 24, 2003

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION

Meeting and Public Hearing

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold an informal conference followed by a public hearing on Wednesday, October 15, 2003. The hearing will be part of the Commission's regular business meeting. Both the conference session and business meeting are open to the public and will be held at the Commission's offices at 25 State Police Drive, West Trenton, NJ.

The conference among the commissioners and staff will begin at 9:30 a.m. Topics of discussion will include: an update on development of the Water Resources Plan for the Delaware River Basin, including a proposed resolution authorizing the executive director to solicit public comment on the draft plan; an update on establishment of the TMDLs for PCBs in the Delaware Estuary; an update on activities concerning the TMDL Implementation Advisory Committee (IAC), including a summary of a meeting among the regulatory agency participants, IAC membership status, fundraising and plans for an initial 2-day meeting on October 21 and 22, 2003; a discussion on the status of the Lake Wallenpaupack drought operating plan approved by Resolution No. 2002-33 on November 25, 2002, including a proposal to extend beyond December 3, 2003, the credit granted PPL to satisfy its consumptive use compensation requirement; and a presentation by a representative from PSEG updating their Estuary Enhancement Program.

The subjects of the public hearing to be held during the 1:30 p.m. business meeting include the following dockets:

- 1. Borough of Jim Thorpe D-81-71 CP Renewal 3. An application for the renewal of a ground water withdrawal project to continue withdrawal of 14.1 million gallons per 30 days (mg/30 days) to supply the applicant's public distribution system from existing Wells Nos. 1 and 4 in the Maunch Chunk Formation in the Silkmill Run Watershed. The project is located in Jim Thorpe Borough, Carbon County.
- 2. Borough of Alpha D-87-62 CP Renewal 2. An application to renew a ground water withdrawal of 13.0 mg/30 days to supply the applicant's public distribution system from existing Wells Nos. 1—3 in the Lopatcong Creek and Pohatcong Creek watersheds. The project is located in Alpha Borough, Warren County, NJ.
- 3. City of Bridgeton D-98-50 CP. An application to replace Wells Nos. 3 and 6—9 in the applicant's public water distribution system, which have become unreliable, with replacement Wells Nos. 18—21 and to add new Wells Nos. 22—24. The applicant requests that the combined allocation for the new wells be limited to 60 mg/30 days of water and that the total withdrawal from all wells be limited to 170 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Cohansey River Watershed in the City of Bridgeton, Cumberland County, NJ.
- 4. Saville Rustin Water Company D-2003-19 CP. An application for approval of a ground water withdrawal project to supply up to 1.296 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's public water distribution system from new Well No. 6 and to retain the existing withdrawal from all wells of 7.5 mg/30 days. The project well is located in the

Little Bushkill Watershed in Lehman Township, Pike County.

- 5. East Penn Manufacturing D-2003-23. An application for approval of a ground water withdrawal project to supply up to 15 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's industrial facility from new Wells Nos. 2 and 4—9 in the Leithsville and Hardyston Formations and to establish the withdrawal from all wells at 15 mg/30 days. The project wells are located in the Moselem Creek Watershed in Richmond Township, Berks County.
- 6. Great Lakes Companies, Inc. D-2003-25. An application to construct a 0.09 mgd STP to provide tertiary treatment of wastewater from the proposed Great Wolf Lodge, a 400-unit hotel with an indoor water park. The project is located on the northwest corner of the intersection of State Route 611 and Interstate 80 in Pocono Township, Monroe County. Following tertiary treatment, a portion of the effluent will be spray applied to onsite areas. The remaining effluent will be discharged to Scot Run, a tributary of Pocono Creek in the Brodhead Creek Watershed, approximately 18 river miles upstream from DRBC Special Protection Waters.

In addition to the public hearing items, the Commission will address the following at its 1:30 p.m. business meeting: minutes of the September 3, 2003, business meeting; announcements; a report on Basin hydrologic conditions; a report by the executive director; a report by the Commission's general counsel; a resolution suspending the authority of the applicant to proceed with its project in Docket D-98-11 CP (the Cornog Quarry Project), at the applicant's request, pending a further decision of the Commission; a resolution authorizing the executive director to solicit public comment on the draft Water Resources Plan for the Delaware River Basin; a resolution authorizing the executive director to enter into a contract for the development of public outreach materials for the Basin Plan; and a resolution for the minutes amending the Administrative Manual: By-Laws, Management and Personnel by increasing the limit on employee contributions to Unreimbursed Medical Spending Accounts, in accordance with section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code (26 U.S.C.A. § 125).

Order of Quarantine; Plum Pox Virus

Whereas, the Plant Pest Act (3 P. S. §§ 258.1—258.27) empowers the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) to take various measures to detect, contain and eradicate plant pests in this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, the powers granted PDA under the Plant Pest Act include (at 3 P. S. § 258.21) the power to establish quarantines to prevent the dissemination of plant pests within this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, Plum Pox Virus—a plant pest indigenous to Europe—is a serious plant pest that injures and damages stone fruits such as peaches, nectarines, plums, and apricots by drastically reducing the fruit yields from these stone fruit trees and by disfiguring the fruit to the point it is unmarketable; and

Whereas, as a result of the presence of Plum Pox Virus in several townships and boroughs, PDA has issued a series of quarantine orders establishing and adjusting a quarantine area; and

Whereas, to date these quarantine orders have established a quarantine area covering the following:

- 1. Adams County: Latimore Township and Huntington Township (29 Pa.B. 5735—November 6, 1999)
- 2. Cumberland County: South Middleton Township (30 Pa.B. 3269—July 1, 2000)
- 3. Adams and Cumberland Counties: Dickinson Township (Cumberland County) and portions of Menallen Township and Tyrone Township (Adams County) (30 Pa.B. 4357—August 19, 2000)
- 4. Adams and Cumberland Counties: the Borough of York Springs (Adams County) and the Borough of Mount Holly Springs (Cumberland County) (30 Pa.B. 5852—November 11, 2000)
- 5. York County: Washington Township and Franklin Township (31 Pa.B. 3560—July 7, 2001)
- 6. Cumberland County: Southampton Township (31 Pa.B. 3559—July 7, 2001)
- 7. Franklin County: Quincy Township and the Borough of Mont Alto (31 Pa.B. 5117—September 8, 2001)
- 8. York County: Conewago Township and Monaghan Township (32 Pa.B. 4045—August 17, 2002)

Whereas, Plum Pox Virus has since been detected on stone fruit trees located in Butler Township and in portions of north-central Menallen Township, Adams County—areas adjoining or near the current quarantine area; and

Whereas, Plum Pox Virus has the potential to cause serious damage to the stone fruit production industry within this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, Plum Pox Virus is transmitted from infected trees by aphids and by budding or grafting, and can be spread into new areas by movement of infected nursery stock; and

Whereas, the movement of Plum Pox Virus-infected fruit trees poses a danger to stone fruit trees in non-infected areas; and

Whereas, there is no known control for Plum Pox Virus other than destruction of infected trees.

Now, therefore, under authority of Section 21 of the Plant Pest Act (act of December 16, 1992, P. L. 1228, No. 162) (3 P. S. § 258.21), the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture hereby establishes a quarantine effective in the following areas:

- A. That portion of southwestern Butler Township, Adams County, having a roughly-rectangular shape and being bounded as follows:
- 1. On the East, by Pennsylvania State Highway Route 34 (Biglerville Road);
 - 2. On the South, by the Cumberland Township Line;
- 3. On the West, by the Franklin Township Line, continuing Northwest to Blue Ribbon Road, east along Blue Ribbon Road to Beecherstown Road, along Beecherstown Road to Rose Lane, along Rose Lane to Ziegler Mill Road, and east along Ziegler Mill Road to the intersection of State Highway Route 34.
- B. That portion of Menallen Township, Adams County, having a roughly-triangular shape and being bounded as follows:
- 1. On the North, by the Adams/Cumberland County Line;
 - 2. On the East, by Pine Grove Furnace Road;
- 3. On the Southwest, by a line extending from the intersection of Pine Grove Furnace Road (SR 4007) and Bendersville-Wenksville Road (SR 4008), along Bendersville-Wenksville Road to West Point Road, along West Point Road to Back Road (T386), along Back Road to Coon Road (SR 4012), along Coon Road to the Michaux State Forest, and along the boundary of the Michaux State Forest to the Adams/Cumberland County Line.

This quarantine prohibits the movement of stone fruit trees and stone fruit budwood within the quarantined area, and prohibits the movement of stone fruit trees and stone fruit budwood out of the quarantined area.

This quarantine order also prohibits the planting of stone fruit trees (apricot, nectarine, peach and plum) in the quarantined area. This prohibition applies to both fruit-bearing and ornamental varieties of stone fruit trees. Examples of common varieties of ornamental stone fruit trees include purpleleaf plum, flowering almond, flowering peach, purpleleaf sandcherry, flowering cherry, and weeping cherry.

PDA will consult with the United States Department of Agriculture, European experts and scientific authorities with respect to the most efficacious measures by which to contain and eliminate this serious plant pest. PDA will issue further restrictions under authority of this Quarantine Order, as is required under the Plant Pest Act (at 3 P. S. § 258.21(a)). These restrictions may address aphid control, elimination or reduction of aphid habitat, destruction of Plum Pox Virus-infected stone fruit trees and budwood, destruction of endangered or exposed stone fruit trees or budwood and any other measures necessary to the containment and elimination of the Plum Pox Virus in this Commonwealth.

This Order applies to commercial orchards, commercial nurseries, homeowners and all persons within the quarantine areas described above.

This quarantine is effective as of September 26, 2003.

This notice provides information about persons who have applied for a new, amended or renewed NPDES or WQM permit, a permit waiver for certain stormwater discharges or submitted a Notice of Intent (NOI) for coverage under a General Permit. The applications concern, but are not limited to, discharges related to industrial, animal or sewage waste, discharges to groundwater, discharges associated with municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4), stormwater associated with construction activities or concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs). This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92 and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act.

For NPDES renewal applications in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements.

For applications for new NPDES permits and renewal applications with major changes in Section II, as well as applications for MS4 individual permits and individual stormwater construction permits in Sections IV and VI, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, has made a tentative determination of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the EPA Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the contact office noted before the application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after any public hearings are held.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995 PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101-6026.908).

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

For further information concerning the content of a Notice of Intent to Remediate, contact the environmental cleanup program manager in the Department regional office after which the notice appears. If information concerning this acknowledgment is required in an alternative form, contact the community relations coordinator at the appropriate regional office. If the Department schedules a hearing, a notice will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at least 30 days prior the date of the hearing.

(711 East College Avenue, Bellefonte, PA 16823) for construction of a recycled asphalt pavement (RAP) screen and five associated conveyors and four associated feeders, construction of 2,000-gallon fuel oil storage tank and a 25,000-gallon fuel oil storage tank, construction of an oil preheater and modification of a drum mix asphalt concrete plant by using no. 5 and no. 6 fuel oil and reprocessed/recycled oil as fuel in addition to the natural gas and no. 2 fuel oil which the plant is currently allowed to use at their Montoursville Asphalt Facility (Plant No. 15) in Loyalsock Township, Lycoming County.

Fugitive particulate matter emissions from the plant's RAP crushing system are projected by the applicant to be no greater than 7.74 tons in any 12 consecutive month period following the construction of the proposed screen and associated conveyors and feeders but are actually expected by the Department to be much less than this. The NOx, CO, SOx, VOCs and PM emissions from the proposed oil preheater will be no greater than .816, .685, .005, .045 and .062 ton, respectively, in any 12 consecutive month period. The VOC emissions from the two proposed fuel oil storage tanks are expected to be negligible. The asphalt concrete plant will emit no more than 38.51 pounds of NOx, 91 pounds of CO, 102.2 pounds of SOx and 22.4 pounds of VOCs when firing no. 5 fuel oil, no. 6 fuel oil or reprocessed/recycled oil nor will its fabric collector emit more than .02 grain of particulate matter per dry standard cubic foot of collector exhaust. The total combined HAP emissions from the asphalt plant are not expected to exceed 6.79 tons in any 12 consecutive month period and the formaldehyde and toluene emissions are not expected to exceed 2.1 and 1.9 tons, respectively, in the same period.

Following the completion of the proposed construction and modification, the entire facility will not emit more than 38.17 tons of NOx, 88.96 tons of CO, 99.14 tons of SOx, 21.78 tons of VOCs, 44.38 tons of PM and 22.19 tons of PM10, respectively, in any 12 consecutive month period.

The Department has determined that the proposed construction and modification will comply with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants including the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. The Department consequently intends to issue plan approval.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department plans to place in the plan approval to be issued to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

- 1. The asphalt plant shall only be fired on gas (natural or LP), virgin no. 2 fuel oil, virgin no. 5 fuel oil, virgin no. 6 fuel oil or reprocessed/recycled oil.
- 2. The sulfur content of the virgin no. 5 fuel oil, virgin no. 6 fuel oil and reprocessed/recycled oil shall not exceed .5% (by weight).
- 3. The reprocessed/recycled oil used as fuel in the asphalt plant shall not contain contaminants equal to or in excess of the following limitation:

Contaminant Limitation Arsenic 5 parts per million Cadmium 2 parts per million Chromium 10 parts per million Lead 100 parts per million Total halides 1,000 parts per million Polychlorinated biphenyls None detected (detection limit no higher than 2 parts (PCB) per million)

Additionally, the flashpoint of the reprocessed/recycled oil shall not be less than 140°F.

4. The permittee shall not accept for use in the asphalt plant any shipment of reprocessed/recycled oil for which the arsenic, cadmium, chromium, lead, total halides and PCB content and/or flashpoint are unknown, or which fails to meet any established limitation for any of these,

nor shall the permittee accept for use any shipment of any oil to be used as fuel for which the sulfur content is unknown, or which fails to meet the limitation established herein for sulfur content.

- 5. A sample of each load of reprocessed/recycled oil delivered to the asphalt plant shall be taken at the time of delivery to the plant using a sampling technique capable of achieving a representative composite sample of the entire load and shall be retained onsite for at least 2 years for random selection and analysis by the Department. The samples are to be sealed and identified as to the date of delivery, delivery invoice number, and the like.
- 6. A sample of each shipment of reprocessed/recycled oil delivered to the asphalt plant shall be taken at the time of delivery to the plant using a sampling technique capable of achieving a representative composite sample of the entire load and analyzed for total halide concentration using EPA Method 9077. The result of these analyses will not, however, be accepted by the Department as a demonstration of compliance with the limitation established herein for total halides should they differ from the results of analyses performed using EPA Method 9076. The permittee shall also perform a complete analysis for all contaminants and parameters for which limitations have been established herein using reference methods specified by the Department on at least 1 out of every 15 shipments of reprocessed/recycled oil received.
- 7. The following analytical methods are to be employed to determine compliance with the contaminant limitations and flashpoint limitation specified herein unless the Department specifies an alternate method:

- 8. The permittee shall submit an annual report to the Department listing the delivery date, quantity delivered, origin and delivery invoice number of each shipment of reprocessed/recycled oil delivered to the asphalt plant during the previous calendar year as well as identifying the arsenic, cadmium, chromium, lead, total halide, PCB and sulfur content and the flashpoint of each shipment. This report shall further identify the specific source of all analytical data provided and describe why this analytical data accurately represents the contaminant concentrations and flashpoint of the reprocessed/recycled oil delivered to the plant. This report shall be submitted by March 15 of each year.
- 9. The emission of particulate matter from the exhaust of the fabric collector controlling the emissions from the asphalt plant shall not exceed .02 grain per dry standard cubic foot of exhaust.
- 10. The NOx emissions from the asphalt plant shall not exceed .055 pound per ton of asphalt concrete produced when firing no. 5 fuel oil, no. 6 fuel oil or reprocessed/recycled oil.

- 11. The CO emissions from the asphalt plant shall not exceed .13 pound per ton of asphalt concrete produced when firing no. 5 fuel oil, no. 6 fuel oil or reprocessed/recycled oil.
- 12. The SOx emissions from the asphalt plant shall not exceed .141 pound per ton of asphalt concrete produced when firing no. 5 fuel oil, .139 pound per ton of asphalt concrete produced when firing no. 6 fuel oil or .146 pound per ton of asphalt concrete produced when firing reprocessed/recycled oil.
- 13. The VOC emissions (expressed as methane) from the asphalt plant shall not exceed .032 pound per ton of asphalt concrete produced when firing no. 5 fuel oil, no. 6 fuel oil or reprocessed/recycled oil.
- 14. The total combined HAP emissions from the asphalt plant shall not exceed 6.79 tons in any 12 consecutive month period, the formaldehyde emissions shall not exceed 2.1 tons in any 12 consecutive month period, the toluene emissions shall not exceed 1.9 tons in any 12 consecutive month period and the emission of any other individual HAP shall not exceed 1 ton in any 12 consecutive month period.
- 15. The quantity of asphalt concrete produced in the asphalt plant shall not exceed 1.358 million tons in any 12 consecutive month period.
- 16. The asphalt plant shall be stacked tested to determine the NOx, CO and VOC emission rates when firing no. 5 fuel oil and processing virgin material, when firing no. 5 fuel oil and processing a combination of virgin material and recycled asphalt pavement, when firing no. 6 fuel oil and processing virgin material, when firing no. 6 fuel oil and processing a combination of virgin material and recycled asphalt pavement, when firing reprocessed/ recycled oil and processing virgin material and when firing reprocessed/recycled oil and processing a combination of virgin material and recycled asphalt pavement. The plant shall additionally be stacked tested to determine its particulate matter emission rate while operating in any one of these six operating scenarios. Should the required NOx, CO and VOC stack testing not be performed for any of the six operating scenarios identified herein, the asphalt plant will not be authorized to operate using that operating scenario.
 - 17. The oil preheater shall be fired on natural gas only.
- 18. The operation of the recycled asphalt pavement screen and associated conveyors and feeders shall not result in the emission of any visible fugitive air contaminants (other than steam or water vapor).
- 19. No material other then virgin no. 2, no. 5 or no. 6 fuel oil and reprocessed/recycled oil shall be stored in the oil storage tanks. Additionally, no material having a vapor pressure equal to or greater than 10.5 kilopascals (1.5 psia) shall be stored in the tanks.
- 20. Following the completion of the construction and modification approved herein, the NOx, CO, SOx, VOCs, PM and PM 10 emissions from the entire facility shall not exceed 38.17, 88.96, 99.14, 21.78, 44.38 and 22.19 tons, respectively, in any 12 consecutive month period.
- 21. Comprehensive accurate records shall be maintained of the quantity of asphalt concrete produced each month as well as the amount of each type of fuel burned each month. All records shall be retained for at least 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

Public Notice of Proposed Consent Order and Agreement

Wilmington Securities, Inc., Mays/Hickman Road Site, Robinson Township, Allegheny County

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P.S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1305), has entered into a Consent Order and Agreement (CO&A) with Wilmington Securities, Inc. The site is in Robinson Township, Allegheny County.

Beginning in the 1950s and continuing sometime into the 1960s, Jake Phillips, Sr. (Phillips) hauled to the site carbon sweepings and industrial waste. Phillips' hauling to the site resulted in a pile of approximately 1,200 tons of carbon sweepings and industrial waste, including eight leaking 55-gallon drums. A part of the carbon sweepings and industrial waste Phillips hauled to the site was generated by Pittsburgh Coke & Chemical Company (PC&C). Wilmington Securities, Inc. (Wilmington) is a successor in interest to PC&C.

In 2001, the Department conducted an investigative interim response at the site under the authority of the HSCA. The Department's soil and waste samples showed that the site contained areas contaminated with organic compounds, arsenic and mercury resulting from Phillips' disposal activities. The Department's investigation found that there existed at the site a direct contact threat to individuals and wildlife that might come into contact with the waste on the site. Additionally, the Department found that runoff from the site discharged directly into Montour Run and the adjacent wetland area.

In 2003, the Department conducted an interim response under the authority of the HSCA to clean up the waste Phillips disposed of at the site and to clean up soil contamination related to the waste. The Department entered into negotiation with Wilmington over reimbursement of costs the Department expended during its response actions at the site. As a result of those negotiations, the Department executed a proposed CO&A with Wilmington on September 19, 2003.

Under section 1113 of the HSCA (35 P. S. § 6020.1113), the Department is publishing notice of this CO&A and will provide a 60-day period for public comment on the CO&A beginning with the date of this publication. Copies of the CO&A can be obtained by contacting Terry Goodwald, (412) 442-4000. The proposed CO&A will be open for public comment from October 11, 2003, through December 11, 2003. Persons may submit comment into the record, during this time only, by sending them to Terry Goodwald, Department of Environmental Protection, 400 Waterfront Drive, Pittsburgh, PA 15222 or by delivering them in person to this office.

The Department has reserved the right to withdraw its consent to the CO&A if comments submitted during the public comment period disclose facts or considerations which indicate, in the Department's discretion, that the CO&A is inappropriate or not in the public interest.

Notice of Prompt Interim Response Oreville Quarry Site in Longswamp Township, Berks County

The Department, under the authority of the HSCA, is initiating a prompt interim response at the Oreville Quarry Site (site) in Longswamp Township, Berks County.

Groundwater serving residential wells is contaminated with tetrachloroethylene, also referred to as perchloroethylene or PCE. The site is the suspected source of this contamination. The total area encompassed by the site is approximately 72 acres. This includes the quarry and the extent of groundwater contamination based on residential well sampling. The quarry consists of a large northern portion and a lesser southern portion. Residences lie to the south of the quarry, a go-kart track lies to the west and agricultural fields lie to the east. Portions of Old Topton Road, Kurt Drive and grassy field areas are also part of the 72-acre site.

The quarry was formerly mined for iron ore to an average depth of 30 feet from the original ground surface. The abandoned quarry contains waste from local dumping and wastes from the Caloric Corporation (Caloric). The Caloric facility is in nearby Topton Borough. Caloric terminated operations at the Topton facility in the mid-1990s. During its operation, local residents observed trucks from Caloric dumping waste material and chemicals into the quarry.

The sampling of residential wells surrounding the quarry showed eight residences with PCE contamination at or above the groundwater Statewide Health Standard of 5 parts per billion. The Department conducted a prompt interim response at this site to provide individual water treatment units to the eight impacted residences. This action was taken to protect public health and safety or the environment. This determination is based on the continued release of VOCs to the groundwater and the actual human exposure to hazardous substances via ingestion, inhalation and dermal contact.

Hanson Aggregates, PMA, Inc., Glacial Sand and Gravel Company, Tri-State River Products v. Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of Environmental Protection and Clean Water Action and Clean Water Action v. Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of Environmental Protection and Glacial Sand and Gravel, Pioneer Mid-Atlantic, Inc. and Tri-State River Products, Inc.; EHB Doc. No. 2001-138-R (Consolidated with 2001-139-R, 2001-140-R, 2001-157-R, 2001-158-R and 2001-159-R)

Appellants Hanson Aggregates, PMA, Inc. (Hanson), Glacial Sand and Gravel Company (Glacial), Tri-State River Products, Inc. (Tri-State) (Permittees) and Clean Water Action (CWA) challenged permits issued by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) in the previously captioned consolidated appeal. The permits authorize dredging activities in the Allegheny River and Ohio River.

The parties have agreed to a settlement of the previously captioned consolidated appeals, which is memorialized in a Consent Order and Agreement, the major provisions of which include:

- a. The Permittees shall provide \$22,000 as funding to conduct a study to evaluate the effectiveness of the current Department and U. S. Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) approved Mussel Survey Protocol.
- b. The Department shall revise the current Protocol by requiring increased diving times in Pools 5—9 in the Allegheny River for the remaining terms of the existing dredging permits.
- c. The Department shall make its malacologist available to provide to CWA, the Permittees and other qualified participants, including the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, information regarding upcoming malacology conferences and other scientific symposia.
- d. The Permittees shall refrain from dredging in Pools 6 and 9 of the Allegheny River until at least December 31, 2005, but may request the Department to reconsider authorization to dredge in Pool 9 later in 2004, if the ACOE issues a Federal permit authorizing dredging in Pool 9.
- e. The Department agrees to defer implementation of additional restrictions on dredging that affect State threatened or endangered species until the expiration of the term of the current permits.
- f. The Permittees shall maintain as an isolation distance between dredging and any public water supply well a radius of 1,000 feet, unless a Permittee demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Department that a lesser distance will maintain a travel time of 90 days or greater.
- g. The Department reserves the right to establish a setback laterally or upstream of any industrial or commercial surface water supply intake, or of any other private or public ground or surface water supply, if necessary, to protect the supply from adverse water quality impacts.
- h. When the updated National Environmental Policy Act documentation relative to commercial sand and gravel dredging on the Allegheny and Ohio Rivers is finalized, the Department may reopen and/or modify the current permits.
- i. The Department shall require the commercial dredging companies to submit a plan to mitigate the environ-

mental impacts of dredging in accordance with the requirements of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 105 in all new permit applications.

- j. The Permittees shall conduct a study of the potential for the suspension and transport of certain organic and inorganic sediments in the Ohio and Allegheny Rivers.

Proposed Revision to the State Implementation Plan for Ozone for the Reading Area (Berks County); Public Hearing

Ground-level ozone concentrations above the Federal health-based standard are a serious human health threat and can also cause damage to crops, forests and wildlife. The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is seeking public comment on a State Implementation Plan (SIP) revision for the Reading ozone maintenance area (Berks County).

On May 7, 1997, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved the Commonwealth's One-Hour Ozone Redesignation Request and Maintenance Plan for the Reading Area (plan). The plan included a demonstration that through 2007, air quality would continue to meet National health-based standards and that emissions would be no greater than those in 1992. On January 29, 2002, the EPA revised the methodology by which highway emissions are to be calculated. The Department is proposing to amend its maintenance plan to update the highway emissions inventory with this methodology. Once approved by the EPA, the SIP revision will establish new 2004 and 2007 motor vehicle emissions budgets for the purposes of transportation conformity.

S. § 532).

Equipment approved under this notice may be used by law enforcement officials to obtain test results which will be admissible in evidence in any summary or criminal proceeding in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3731 (relating to driving under the influence of alcohol or controlled substance), any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5502 (relating to operating watercraft under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), any other violation of the Fish and Boat Code arising out of the same action, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 (relating to hunting or furtaking prohibited while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or any other violation of the Game and Wildlife Code arising out of the same action. Law enforcement agencies should determine that an approved training program in the use of the equipment is available in accordance with the previously referenced statutes before purchasing any of the devices contained on this list.

The approval of equipment by the Department is based on the evaluation of the equipment by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) of the United States Department of Transportation. Equipment which met the Federal requirements was published at 67 FR 62091 (October 3, 2002) as a Conforming Products List. Instruments marked with an asterisk (*) meet the Model Specifications detailed at 49 FR 48854 (December 14, 1984) (that is, instruments tested at breath alcohol concentrations of 0.000, 0.050, 0.101 and 0.151 gram of alcohol per 210 liters of air). Instruments not marked with an asterisk meet the Model Specifications detailed at 58 FR 48705 (September 17, 1993) and were tested at breath alcohol concentrations of 0.000, 0.020, 0.040, 0.080 and 0.160 gram of alcohol per 210 liters of air. Instruments whose precision and accuracy have been evaluated in the latter concentration range (that is, devices not marked with an asterisk) should be used when reliable results are required at blood concentrations below 0.050%.

NHTSA also evaluates equipment to determine if it must be operated at fixed locations (that is, nonmobile equipment) or can be transported to nonfixed operational sites in the field (mobile equipment). Equipment on the list is approved for both mobile or nonmobile operation, or both unless otherwise specified as indicated on the list.

INDEPENDENT REGULATORY REVIEW COMMISSION

Actions Taken by the Commission

The Independent Regulatory Review Commission met publicly at 10:30 a.m., Thursday, September 25, 2003, and announced the following:

Regulation Approved

State Board of Veterinary Medicine #16A-5712: Professional Conduct; Prescription Drugs (amends 49 Pa. Code § 31.21)

State Board of Veterinary Medicine—Professional Conduct; Prescription Drugs; Regulation No. 16A-5712

On June 10, 2002, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the State Board of Veterinary Medicine (Board). This rulemaking amends 49 Pa. Code § 31.21. The proposed regulation was published in the June 22, 2002 Pennsylvania Bulletin with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on June 17, 2003. At its July 24, 2003, public meeting, the Commission voted to disapprove the final-form regulation. On September 5, 2003, the Board submitted its report containing the revised final-form regulation to the Commission.

The final-form regulation establishes requirements and standards for prescribing and dispensing both prescription and nonprescription drugs. In acting on our disapproval order, dated July 24, 2003, the Board deleted a provision that required veterinarians to provide written prescriptions upon request except when a veterinarian has a good faith belief that the prescription may be misused

The revised regulation contains beneficial provisions relating to drugs and dispensing including requirements for child-resistant packaging, detailed labeling, adequate directions for use and precautions concerning expiration dates. Even though we support these provisions in the

regulation and believe they are in the public interest, we are disappointed by the deletion of the written prescription provision that was in both the proposed rulemaking and the original final-form version of this regulation.

When the Commission voted to disapprove this regulation on July 24, 2003, we noted one issue. In explaining this concern, our order stated:

One issue, which we raised in our comments, remains a concern. Our comments suggested that the final-form regulation require veterinarians to inform clients that they have the option of receiving a written prescription that can be filled elsewhere. The Board did not include such a requirement in the final-form regulation.

We believe that notification to the consumer of the opportunity to request a written prescription is in the public interest and will not impose an unreasonable burden upon veterinarians (71 P. S. §§ 745.5b(b)(1)(i) and (ii), and (b)(3)).

In its report, the Board misrepresents the Commission's position on this regulation. It asserts that the Commission concluded it was unreasonable to require a veterinarian to give a written prescription at the client's request "if the Board did not also require the veterinarian to notify clients that the clients could obtain a written prescription." This is an erroneous interpretation of our order.

Nothing in our comments or order on this regulation supports this interpretation of the Commission's position. At the public meeting on July 24, 2003, Commissioners expressed support for the entire regulation including the written prescription option. However, the order, as previously stated, affirmed that notification to clients of this option is also in the public interest. The vote to disapprove provided an opportunity for the Board to improve the regulation by adding a public notice provision. A provision such as this would expand the economic benefits of the written prescription option by insuring greater public awareness of the option. In this light, it would be cost effective, reasonable and in the public interest. The vote on July 24, 2003, was not a rejection of any part of the regulation.

We must assert that we are very displeased with the deletion of the written prescription provision. As previously stated, we were looking for further improvement of this provision, not its deletion. Even though we are dismayed by this action, the Board did state in its report that it will review the written prescription provision and public notice issue. Furthermore, the Board counsel advised the Commission that the written prescription provision will be the subject of a rulemaking in the very near future and that the public notice issue will also be considered at that time. We note that the American Veterinary Medical Association and consumer organizations, such as *Consumer Reports* magazine, have studied the written prescription issue. The Board should take advantage of this research. We urge the Board to expedite its review and to publish a proposed rulemaking addressing the written prescription and public notice issues at the earliest possible opportunity.

Finally, the Commission believes that the General Assembly should review these issues under section 5.2(b)(4) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. \S 745.5b(b)(4)).

Having considered all the criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

By the Commission:

On January 17, 2003, Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff filed a Formal Complaint against Easton Telecom Services, Inc. (Respondent), an IXC reseller certificated at A-310483. In the Complaint, Prosecutory Staff alleged that Commission staff had notified Respondent by both first class and certified mail, return receipt requested, that Respondent had failed to file its 2001 Annual Report. The Complaint requested that the Commission issue an order canceling the Respondent's certificate for failure to file its 2001 Annual Report in violation of 66 Pa.C.S. § 504.

Service of the Complaint was perfected on January 27, 2003, and Respondent filed its 2001 Annual Report on March 11, 2003, but without the \$250 late filing fee penalty specified in the Complaint.

The history of this service provider is as follows. In 2001, Easton filed for Chapter 11 Bankruptcy in the Southern District of New York. By order entered November 15, 2001, the Bankruptcy Court granted Respondent, who was the Debtor in the bankruptcy action, the relief of selling its assets and customer base to Weston. Under the Bankruptcy Court order, that sale and transfer took place on November 16, 2001.

On January 14, 2002, Respondent and Weston Telecommunications, LLC (Weston) filed a joint Application to Transfer and Abandon Telecommunication Services at docket no. A-310483F2000. The parties attached a copy of the Bankruptcy Court's November 15, 2001, order and

included the applicable \$350 application fee. By letter dated April 18, 2002, Respondent again notified the Commission of the Bankruptcy Court's order as well as the fact that it had no customers and was no longer operating as an IXC reseller in this Commonwealth. In that letter, Respondent also requested that its certificate be cancelled.

Based upon the foregoing, and upon our determination that Respondent does not have any outstanding assessments or fines, it is appropriate to cancel the certificate of public convenience of Easton Telecom Services, Inc. By this order, we also close the abandonment and transfer application docket at A-310483F2000; Therefore,

The allegations in Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff's complaint are deemed admitted and the complaint is hereby sustained; however, due to our disposition of Easton Telecom Services, Inc.'s certificate of public convenience under Ordering Paragraph No. 2, we will waive the \$250 late filing penalty.

Order

By the Commission:

In this order, the Commission revisits the issue of the implementation of area code relief in southeastern Pennsylvania. The most recent numbering data concerning the 215 and 267 Numbering Plan Areas (NPAs) demonstrates that both of these NPAs have experienced an unprecedented and efficient use of numbering resources due to the implementation of various number conservations measure. As a result, there are adequate numbering resources available for telecommunications carriers in these NPAs. Accordingly, the Commission orders the rescission of the implementation schedule for the 445 NPA in southeastern Pennsylvania.

I. Background

1. Introduction of 267 NPA

When the supply of numbering resources within an NPA or area code is estimated to exhaust, some form of area code relief must be implemented so that customers in that area can continue to obtain the services they desire from the carrier of their choice. It is the duty of the North American Numbering Plan Administrator (NANPA) to monitor the viability of area codes so as to determine when all of the numbers available in the area code are nearing exhaust.2

On May 24, 1996, the NANPA made a filing with the Commission in which the NANPA indicated that the supply of NXX codes, or telephone numbers, in the 215

NA, or area code; refers to the linst three ughts or a ten-ught telephone number in the form of NPA-NXX-XXXX.

The Industry Numbering Committee (INC) Guidelines provide that when an area code is nearing exhaust, the NANPA, in the appropriate circumstances, must act as the NPA Relief Planner and discuss relief alternatives so as to address the numbering exhaust. See NPA Code Relief Planning and Notification Guidelines at §§ 4.0—4.9 (August 2002).

area code was nearing total exhaustion.3 In that filing, the NANPA also informed the Commission that the telecommunications industry had reached consensus to implement an all services distributed overlay as the relief plan. The new NPA was to overlay and share the same geographic boundaries of the 215 NPA. Thus, by an Order entered May 21, 1998,⁴ the Commission directed that the 215 NPA in southeastern Pennsylvania receive an overlay to address the prevailing NXX code shortage problem. The NANPA assigned the 267 NPA to overlay the 215

In June 1999, the 267 overlay NPA was activated and placed into service with a projected life of 4 1/2 years as forecasted by the NANPA. Based upon the initial demand for NXX codes from the 267 NPA by telecommunications service providers in southeastern Pennsylvania, the NANPA recalculated the estimated service life of the 267 NPA and estimated that the 267 NPA would exhaust its supply of NXX codes during the first quarter of 2003. Shortly thereafter, on October 4, 1999, the NANPA, in accordance with its directive to initiate NPA relief planning in areas in sufficient time (30 months) to prevent the exhaust of numbering resources, notified the Commission and the telecommunications industry that it was necessary to begin planning relief alternatives for the 267 NPA.

2. Introduction of the 445 NPA over the 215 and 267

On December 2, 1999, the NANPA convened a meeting with the telecommunications industry to discuss relief alternatives for addressing the numbering exhaust in the 267 NPA. The NANPA indicated that 364 NXX codes had been assigned from the 267 NPA since its June 1999 activation date. The industry reached consensus to recommend to the Commission an all services distributed overlay as its preferred alternative for area code relief in the 267 NPA.7 This overlay would cover the same geographic boundaries of the existing 215 and 267 NPAs (215/267 NPAs).

In January 2000, the NANPA, on behalf of the industry, filed with the Commission the industry's relief recommendation. The filing informed the Commission that the industry would begin implementation of the overlay NPA on or about April 3, 2000.8 The NANPA assigned the 445 NPA as the overlay NPA for the 215/267 NPAs.

3. Modification of the implementation schedule for the 445 NPA

On May 18, 2000, the Pennsylvania telecommunications industry finalized the implementation schedule for the

445 NPA.¹⁰ The implementation schedule, inter alia, established May 1, 2001, as the activation date for the 445 NPA. However, in response to the industry's recommended implementation schedule for the 445 NPA, the Commission reviewed the 2001 number utilization data for both the 215 and 267 area codes and the amount of NXX codes available for assignment within those existing area codes. As a result, by an Order entered March 12 2001, at P-00961071F0002, the Commission concluded that the previously referenced implementation schedule approved by the telecommunications industry for the new 445 NPA was inappropriate and modified the implementation schedule for the 445 NPA overlay.

In its March 12, 2001, Order, the Commission determined that the 445 NPA should not be activated on May 1, 2001, but rather, established an implementation schedule that was based on the number of NXX codes remaining in the 215/267 NPAs. Accordingly, the Commission concluded that the new 445 overlay NPA should not be activated until 3 months prior to NXX code exhaust in the existing 215/267 NPAs. 11 Additionally, the Commission directed the NANPA to provide monthly updates on the projected exhaust dates for the existing 215/267 NPAs. 12 In particular, the NANPA was to inform the Commission when the supply of NXX codes in the 215/267 NPAs was to exhaust in 10 months. 13

4. Release of the 2003 Numbering Resource Utilization Forecast (NRUF) Data

In its effort to ensure that new area codes are not introduced prematurely, the Commission has continued to monitor vigorously the numbering data that is compiled by the NANPA. In June 2003, the NANPA released the 2003 NPA NRUF exhaust projections for all area codes. The NRUF data indicated that the NPAs in this Commonwealth, including the 215/267 NPAs, experienced an unprecedented, efficient use of numbering resources due to the implementation of thousands-block (1K) number pooling¹⁴ and other number conservation measures such as NXX code reclamation.¹⁵ Accordingly, the NANPA revised the projected exhaust date for the 215/267 NPAs. In particular, the exhaust date for the 215/267 NPAs was changed from the first quarter of 2005 to the fourth quarter of 2008, or nearly 5 years from now.

Discussion

It is beyond dispute that the most recent numbering data concerning the 215/267 NPAs clearly demonstrates that the 445 overlay NPA is no longer necessary. According to information on the NANPA's website, 16 as of September 4, 2003, there were approximately 15 full NXX codes still available for assignment in the 215 NPA and 252 full NXX codes still available for assignment in the 267 NPA. However, the 215/267 NPAs have been utilizing 1K number polling since August 2002, and thus, all telecommunications carriers providing service in the 215/ 267 NPAs, including wireless carriers, can only receive a block of 1,000 telephone numbers from the Pooling Administrator. Therefore, since all telecommunications carriers providing service in the 215/267 NPAs receive only a block of 1,000 telephone numbers instead of a full 10,000

may resolve matters involving the introduction of new area codes within their states, which includes establishing the necessary dates for the implementation of relief plans. However, the Commission chose not to open a docket on the industry's consensus

block of telephone numbers, these 267 (15 + 252) full NXX codes will last longer. 17 Moreover, in addition to the full NXX codes available for assignment in the 215/267 NPAs, there are approximately 1,900 individual 1K blocks of telephone numbers still available for assignment in the 215/267 NPAs according to the Pooling Administrator's data. Clearly, there are adequate numbering resources available the telecommunications carriers providing service in the 215/267 NPAs.

Additionally, the Commission began implementation of its reclamation authority in August 2000^{18} and has already reclaimed some $37\ NXX$ codes within the 215/267NPAs. The Commission believes that additional NXX codes from these NPAs will be subject to reclamation, adding further to the number of NXX codes available for assignment.

More importantly, the NRUF data shows that the utilization rate¹⁹ for the total NXX codes assigned in the 215 NPA is 57% and that the utilization rate for the total NXX codes assigned in the 267 NPA is only 16%. This means that the telecommunications carriers still have the ability to assign many more numbers from their current inventories alone to meet customer demand.

The current numbering data clearly demonstrates that the number conservation measures implemented within the 215/267 NPAs have resulted in the availability of adequate numbering resources for telecommunications carriers providing service in the 215/267 NPAs. Consequently, the 215/267 NPAs will not be nearing exhaustion of their numbering resources in the near future. This fact is evident by the recent change in the projected exhaust date of the 215/267 NPAs from the first quarter of 2005 to the fourth quarter of 2008, which is a significant revision.

The new projected exhaust date for the 215/267 NPAs removes the urgency to implement the 445 NPA. We note that the proliferation of new area codes before they are necessary is detrimental to both consumers and the telecommunications industry. Accordingly, since the numbering data does not justify the retention of the 445 NPA for area code relief in the 215/267 NPAs, we will direct the NANPA to reclaim the 445 NPA and return it to the pool of available area codes within the North American Numbering Plan (NANP).²⁰ However, we recognize that the telecommunications industry completed their network preparation for the implementation of the 445 NPA by February 2001. Therefore, to prevent the telecommunications industry from having to perform the monumental task of undoing their prior implementation work, we shall direct the NANPA to hold the 445 NPA in "reserved" status.²¹

Conclusion

The policy of the Commission is to ensure that numbering resources are made available on an equitable, efficient and timely basis in this Commonwealth while ensuring that the impact of proliferating new area codes on consumers is minimized to the extent possible. The recent numbering data from the NANPA clearly demonstrates

the 445 NPA for reassignment to the 215/267 NPAs, but only if circumstances warrant

that the implementation of number conservations measures such as mandatory 1,000 block pooling and NXX code reclamation have contributed to the efficient use of numbering resources in the 215/267 NPAs. As a result, telecommunications carriers will have adequate numbering resources available to them and, thus, the implementation and activation of the 445 NPA is no longer necessary and should be rescinded. Furthermore, we believe that the action of directing the NANPA to reclaim the 445 NPA will prolong the life of the NANP. Lastly, we believe that rescinding the 445 NPA will not deter telecommunications carriers from providing services to their customers or compromise the ability of timely area code relief to be implemented in the 215 and 267 NPAs in the future if circumstances warrant; Therefore,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. The consensus relief plan of the 445 NPA overlaying the 215/267 NPAs in southeastern Pennsylvania and the previously adopted implementation schedule for the 445 overlay NPA is rescinded.
- 2. The NANPA shall reclaim the 445 NPA and return it to the pool of available area codes within the North American Numbering Plan and place it in "reserved" status.
- 3. All jurisdictional telecommunications carriers providing service in southeastern Pennsylvania are directed to inform their customers, by means of a bill insert, that the 445 NPA will not be introduced, but that ten-digit dialing will continue in the 215/267 NPAs.
 - 4. A copy of this order shall be sent to the NANPA.
- 5. A copy of this order shall also be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and posted on the Commission's website at http://puc.paonline.com/.

Statement of Commissioner Kim Pizzingrilli

Recission of the Relief Plan for the 215/267 NPAs

Public Meeting September 18, 2003 SEP-2003-LAW-0114* Docket No. P-00961071F0002

In this order, the Commission revisits the issue of the implementation of area code relief in southeastern Pennsylvania. The most recent numbering data concerning the 215 and 267 Numbering Plan Areas (NPAs) demonstrates that both of these NPAs have experienced unprecedented and efficient use of numbering resources due to conservation measures and NXX code reclamation. Based on the success of these measures, the North American Numbering Plan Administrator has revised the projected exhaust date for the 215/267 NPAs to the fourth quarter of 2008, nearly five years from now. Accordingly, retention of the proposed 445 NPA for area code relief in the 215/267 NPÅs is no longer justified.

I wish to commend the telecommunications industry for their cooperation and efficient utilization of NXX codes. This action today, and the fact that no new area codes have been opened in Pennsylvania since 1999, has given us proof positive that our conservation and reclamation efforts are working for the benefit of Pennsylvania.






