DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Pennsylvania Pre-K Counts Program; Eligibility, Application Process and Funding Level

The act of July 20, 2007 (P.L. 278, No. 45) amending the Public School Code of 1949 to add the Pennsylvania Pre-K Counts Program, requires the Department of Education (Department) to publish both on its Internet web site and in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* the process through which eligible providers may apply for grant funds, the criteria used to select approved providers for grant funds and the per-student funding levels of approved providers, by county.

Application Process

The Department developed an application form, available on the Department's web site in its eGrants section of the web site. Interested eligible applicants were invited to attend any of seven bidders' conferences and nine teleconferences to receive informational and technical assistance on the program, its requirements, the application process and program implementation expectations.

To accomplish the goal of targeting PA Pre-K Counts funds to areas with the highest number or percentage of at-risk young children, the Office of Child Development and Early Learning used its Program Reach and County Risk Assessment data for Fiscal Year 2005-2006 to determine the approximate amount of the total appropriation for 2007-2008 that should be dispersed to each county. This Risk and Reach data compiled information on the number of children served and funding levels for early childhood programs supported by State and Federal investments and an analysis of educational and family risk factors for each county. This Risk and Reach data is available on the Department's web site at www.pde.state.pa.us/early_childhood/lib/early_childhood/ProgramReachCountyRiskAssessment_6.07_final.pdf.

Eligible PA Pre-K Counts providers were invited to submit a competitive proposal application that demonstrated the degree to which they proposed to increase high quality services to children age-eligible for the program, their capacity to target services to children most in need, their plans to work in partnership with other providers in the community, their capacity to undertake cooperative and collaborative planning with other agencies and programs serving young children, the degree to which they planned to incorporate the elements of high quality programming and the degree to which their budgets reflected a sound framework for program success. The previously listed factors served as the criteria for selecting approved providers. In addition, the Department gave priority in grant funding to approved providers serving the highest number of highest percentage of at-risk eligible students and attempted to ensure geographic dispersal of the available funds.

Grants were awarded on a per-child basis. A program offering a 2 1/2 instructional day for 180 days could provide justification for Pre-K Counts funding for up to \$3,950 and a program providing 5 instructional hours for 180 days could go to \$7,900. In this year, the participating providers were able to justify these amounts per child.

THE CLEAN STREAMS LAW AND THE FEDERAL CLEAN WATER ACT APPLICATIONS FOR NATIONAL POLLUTION DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (NPDES) PERMITS AND WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT (WQM) PERMITS

This notice provides information about persons who have applied for a new, amended or renewed NPDES or WQM permit, a permit waiver for certain stormwater discharges or submitted a Notice of Intent (NOI) for coverage under a general permit. The applications concern, but are not limited to, discharges related to industrial, animal or sewage waste, discharges to groundwater, discharges associated with municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4), stormwater associated with construction activities or concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs). This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92 and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act.

For NPDES renewal applications in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements.

For applications for new NPDES permits and renewal applications with major changes in Section II, as well as applications for MS4 individual permits and individual stormwater construction permits in Sections IV and VI, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, has made a tentative determination of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the EPA Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before an application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Envi- ronmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environ-
 mental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the
 Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to
 publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment
 noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An
 acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to

 of further liability for the remediation of the site for any
 contamination identified in reports submitted to and
 approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person
 shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution
 actions brought by responsible persons not participating
 in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act,
 there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period
 for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific
 Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as
 a special industrial area. This period begins when a
 summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is pub-

lished in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

2. Under 40 CFR Part 60 Section 60.672, the PM emissions from the exhaust of Control Device ID C102 associated with Source ID P101 shall not exceed 0.05 grams per dry standard cubic meter. Additionally, the exhaust shall not exhibit greater than 7% opacity at any time.

3. Under the permittee requesting this elective restriction, the PM emissions in the exhaust of Control Device ID C102 associated with Source ID P101 shall not exceed

4. The average production rate plus 10% of the average production rate during the stack test will become the legal production limit of the plant.

5. (a) The permittee shall perform a US EPA Reference Method 22-like observation daily of both stacks (S104A and S104B) leading from the South EAF Baghouse (C104) while the EAF is in operation, during each day the source is operated. The absence of any visible emissions will indicate proper operation of the control device. If visible emissions are detected at any time, US EPA Reference Method 9-like procedure shall be performed within 24 hours.

(b) If any visible emissions occur during stack testing or during normal operations, the Department reserves the right to require a continuous monitoring system for the measurement of opacity of emissions discharged into the atmosphere from both stacks (S104A and S104B) leading from the South EAF Baghouse (C104).

a. Grinding Area Fabric Filter: Filterable PM and PM10 testing shall be by EPA Method 5, 5B, 201 or 201A. Testing shall be conducted within 180 days of commencement of operation and once during the term of the operating permit thereafter.

b. Natural Gas-Fired Boilers: NOx and CO testing shall be conducted by either EPA method stack testing or by using portable analyzers within 180 days of commencement of operation and once during the term of the operating permit thereafter.

c. Stack testing shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139 and the Department's Source Testing Manual.

d. The Owner/Operator shall submit three copies of a pretest protocol to the Department for review at least 60 days prior to the performance of any stack test. All proposed stack test methods shall be identified in the pretest protocol and approved by the Department prior to testing.

e. The Owner/Operator shall notify the Regional Air Quality Manager at least 15 days prior to any stack test so that an observer may be present at the time of the test.

f. All relevant operating parameters shall be recorded at appropriate intervals throughout the duration of stack test. Operating data recorded shall be sufficient to establish that the units and the air cleaning devices are operating at maximum routine operating conditions. A discussion of the recorded operating parameters and values shall be included in the test report.

g. The Owner/Operator shall submit three copies of the stack test report to the Department within 60 days of the completion of testing.

15. The Owner/Operator shall perform a daily inspection for the presence of visible stack emissions, fugitive emissions and malodorous emissions from the emission sources covered by this plan approval. Records of the inspections shall be maintained in a log and include any corrective actions taken. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12b)

16. All Fabric Filters shall be equipped with gauges to monitor pressure drop across the baghouse. Pressure drop readings shall be kept using either electronic recording devices or recorded manually on a daily basis while the control device is operating. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12(b))

17. The Owner/Operator shall maintain each fabric filter and scrubber by the manufacturer's recommendation. The maintenance schedule for each unit and records of all maintenance activities performed on each unit shall be maintained in a log. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12(b))

18. At a minimum, the Owner/Operator shall maintain records of the following: (25 Pa. Code § 127.12(b))

a. Monthly VIM Furnace steel production rates.

b. Monthly VAR Furnaces steel production rates.

c. Daily and monthly operating hours for the Grinding Area.

d. Daily and monthly operating hours for the Welding Station.

e. Daily and monthly operating hours for the Crucible Cleaning Station.

f. Daily visible stack emission, fugitive emission and malodorous emission inspection for the sources covered by this plan approval.

g. The maintenance schedule for, and records of, all maintenance activities performed on each fabric filter and scrubber.

19. The Owner/Operator shall submit an annual facility-wide emissions report (AIMS Report) to the Department by March 1 of each year for the previous calendar year. (25 Pa. Code § 135.3)

20. All logs and required records shall be maintained on site for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12b)

21. This Plan Approval authorizes the temporary operation of the sources covered by this Plan Approval provided the following conditions are met. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12b)

(a) The Owner/Operator shall submit written Notice of the Completion of Construction and the Operator's intent to commence operation at least 5 days prior to the completion of construction. The Notice shall state the date when construction will be completed and the date when the Operator expects to commence operation.

(b) Operation of the sources covered by this Plan Approval is authorized only to facilitate the start-up and shakedown of sources and air cleaning devices, to permit operations pending the issuance of an Operating Permit, or to permit the evaluation of the source for compliance with all applicable regulations and requirements.

(c) Upon receipt of the written Notice of the Completion of Construction from the Owner/Operator the Department shall authorize a 180-day Period of Temporary Operation of the sources from the date of commencement of operation. The Notice submitted by the Owner/Operator, prior to the expiration of this Plan Approval, shall modify the Plan Approval expiration date. The new Plan Approval expiration date shall be 180 days from the date of commencement of operation.

(d) Upon determination by the Owner/Operator that the sources covered by this Plan Approval are in compliance with all conditions of the Plan Approval the Owner/Operator shall contact the Department's reviewing engineer and schedule the Initial Operating Permit Inspection.

(e) Upon completion of Initial Operating Permit Inspection and determination by the Department that the sources covered by this Plan Approval are in compliance with all conditions of the Plan Approval the Owner/Operator shall submit an application for revision to Title V Operating Permit to the Department at least 60 days prior to the expiration date of the Plan Approval.

(f) The Owner/Operator may request an extension of the 180-day Period of Temporary Operation if compliance with all applicable regulations and Plan Approval requirements has not been established. The extension request shall be submitted in writing at least 15 days prior to the end of the Period of Temporary Operation and shall provide a description of the compliance status of the source. The extension request shall include a detailed schedule for establishing compliance and the reasons compliance has not been established. This Period of Temporary Operation may be extended for additional limited periods, each not to exceed 120-days, by submitting an extension request as described previously.

(g) If, at any time, the Department has cause to believe that air contaminant emissions from the sources listed in this plan approval may be in excess of the limitations specified in, or established under this plan approval or

the permittee's operating permit, the permittee may be required to conduct test methods and procedures deemed necessary by the Department to determine the actual emissions rate. The testing shall be conducted in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139, where applicable, and in accordance with any restrictions or limitations established by the Department at such time as it notifies the company that testing is required.

General Conditions

1. Words and terms that are not otherwise defined in this plan approval shall have the meanings set forth in section 3 of the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P. S. § 4003) and 25 Pa. Code § 121.1. (25 Pa. Code § 121.1)

2. The issuance of this plan approval does not prevent the future adoption by the Department of any rules, regulations or standards, or the issuance of orders necessary to comply with the requirements of the Federal Clean Air Act (CAA) or the Air Pollution Control Act, or to achieve or maintain ambient air quality standards. The issuance of this plan approval shall not be construed to limit the Department's enforcement authority. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12b (a) (b))

3. This plan approval authorizes temporary operation of the sources covered by this plan approval provided the following conditions are met.

(a) When construction, installation, modification or reactivation is being conducted, the permittee should provide written notice to the Department of the completion of the activity approved by this plan approval and the permittee's intent to commence operation at least 5 working days prior to the completion of said activity. The notice shall state when the activity will be completed and when the permittee expects to commence operation. When the activity involves multiple sources on different time schedules, notice is required for the commencement of operation of each source.

(b) Under 25 Pa. Code § 127.12b(d), temporary operation of the sources is authorized to facilitate the shutdown of sources and air cleaning devices, to permit operations pending the issuance of a permit under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter F (relating to operating permits) or Subchapter G (relating to Title V operating permits) or to permit the evaluation of the air contaminant aspects of the source.

(c) This plan approval authorizes a temporary operation period not to exceed 180 days from the date of commencement of operation, provided the Department receives notice from the permittee under paragraph (a), previously.

(d) The permittee may request an extension of the 180-day shakedown period if further evaluation of the air contamination aspects of the sources is necessary. The request for an extension should be submitted, in writing, to the Department at least 15 days prior to the end of the initial 180-day shakedown period and shall provide a description of the compliance status of the source, a detailed schedule for establishing compliance, and the reasons compliance has not been established. This temporary operation period will be valid for a limited time and may be extended for additional limited periods, each not to exceed 120 days. If, at any time, the Department has cause to believe that air contaminant emissions from the sources listed in this plan approval may be in excess of the limitations specified in, or established under this plan approval or the permittee's operating permit, the permittee may be required to conduct test methods and procedures deemed necessary by the Department to determine

the actual emissions rate. The testing shall be conducted in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139, where applicable, and in accordance with any restrictions or limitations established by the Department at the time as it notifies the company that testing is required. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12b)

4. The permittee shall maintain and operate the sources and associated air cleaning devices in accordance with good engineering practice as described in the plan approval application submitted to the Department. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12(a)(10))

5. (a) The records, reports or information obtained by the Department or referred to at public hearings shall be available to the public, except as provided in paragraph (b) of this condition.

(b) Upon cause shown by the permittee that the records, reports or information or a particular portion thereof, but not emission data, to which the Department has access under the act, if made public, would divulge production or sales figures or methods, processes or production unique to that person or would otherwise tend to affect adversely the competitive position of that person by revealing trade secrets, including intellectual property rights, the Department will consider the record, report or information, or particular portion thereof confidential in the administration of the act. The Department will implement this section consistent with sections 112(d) and 114(c) of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 7412(d) and 7414(c)). Nothing in this section prevents disclosure of the report, record or information to Federal, State or local representatives as necessary for purposes of administration of Federal, State or local air pollution control laws, or when relevant in a proceeding under the act. (25 Pa. Code §§ 127.12(c) and (d) and 35 P. S. § 4013.2)

6. (a) This plan approval will be valid for a limited time, as specified by the expiration date contained on page 1 of this plan approval. Except as provided in §§ 127.11a and 127.215 (relating to reactivation of sources; and reactivation), at the end of the time, if the construction, modification, reactivation or installation has not been completed, a new plan approval application or an extension of the previous approval will be required.

(b) If construction has commenced, but cannot be completed before the expiration of this plan approval, an extension of the plan approval must be obtained to continue construction. To allow adequate time for departmental action, a request for the extension should be postmarked at least 30 days prior to the expiration date. The Department will not issue an extension after the plan approval expires. The request for an extension should include the following:

- (i) A justification for the extension,
- (ii) A schedule for the completion of the construction.

If construction has not commenced before the expiration of this plan approval, then a new plan approval application must be submitted and approval obtained before construction can commence.

(c) If the construction, modification or installation is not commenced within 18-months of the issuance of this plan approval or if there is more than an 18-month lapse in construction, modification or installation, a new plan approval application that meets the requirements of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter B (related to plan approval requirements), Subchapter D (related to prevention of significant deterioration of air quality) and

Subchapter E (related to new source review) shall be submitted. (25 Pa. Code § 127.13)

7. (a) This plan approval may not be transferred from one person to another except when a change of ownership is demonstrated to the satisfaction of the Department and the Department approves the transfer of the plan approval in writing.

(b) Section 127.12a (relating to compliance review) applies to a request for transfer of a plan approval. A compliance review form shall accompany the request.

(c) This plan approval is valid only for the specific source and the specific location of the source as described in the application. (25 Pa. Code § 127.32)

8. (a) Under 35 P. S. § 4008, no person shall hinder, obstruct, prevent or interfere with the Department or its personnel in the performance of any duty authorized under the Air Pollution Control Act.

(b) The permittee shall also allow the Department to have access at reasonable times to said sources and associated air cleaning devices with such measuring and recording equipment, including equipment recording visual observations, as the Department deems necessary and proper for performing its duties and for the effective enforcement of the Air Pollution Control Act and regulations adopted under the act.

(c) Nothing in this plan approval condition shall limit the ability of the EPA to inspect or enter the premises of the permittee in accordance with section 114 or other applicable provisions of the CAA. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12(4) and 35 P. S. § 4008 and § 114 of the CAA)

9. This plan approval may be terminated, modified, suspended or revoked and reissued if one or more of the following applies:

(a) The permittee constructs or operates the source subject to the plan approval in violation of the act, the CAA, the regulations promulgated under the act or the CAA, a plan approval or permit or in a manner that causes air pollution.

(b) The permittee fails to properly or adequately maintain or repair an air pollution control device or equipment attached to or otherwise made a part of the source.

(c) The permittee fails to submit a report required by this plan approval.

(d) The EPA determines that this plan approval is not in compliance with the CAA or the regulations thereunder. (25 Pa. Code 127.13a)

10. (a) The permittee, or any other person, may not circumvent the new source review requirements of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter E by causing or allowing a pattern of ownership or development, including the phasing, staging, delaying or engaging in incremental construction, over a geographic area of a facility which, except for the pattern of ownership or development, would otherwise require a permit or submission of a plan approval application.

(b) No person may permit the use of a device, stack height which exceeds good engineering practice stack height, dispersion technique or other technique which, without resulting in reduction of the total amount of air contaminants emitted, conceals or dilutes an emission of air contaminants which would otherwise be in violation of this plan approval, the Air Pollution Control Act or the regulations promulgated thereunder, except that with

prior approval of the Department, the device or technique may be used for control of malodors. (25 Pa. Code §§ 121.9 and 127.216)

11. Reports, test data, monitoring data, notifications shall be submitted to the:

Regional Air Program Manager
Department of Environmental Protection
(At the address given on the plan approval transmittal letter or otherwise notified) (25 Pa. Code § 127.12c)

12. (a) If required by section 112(r) of the CAA, the permittee shall develop and implement an accidental release program consistent with requirements of the CAA, 40 CFR Part 68 (relating to chemical accident prevention provisions) and the Federal Chemical Safety Information, Site Security and Fuels Regulatory Relief Act (P. L. 106-40).

(b) The permittee shall prepare and implement a Risk Management Plan (RMP) which meets the requirements of section 112(r) of the CAA, 40 CFR Part 68 and the Federal Chemical Safety Information, Site Security and Fuels Regulatory Relief Act when a regulated substance listed in 40 CFR § 68.130 is present in a process in more than the listed threshold quantity at the facility. The permittee shall submit the RMP to the EPA according to the following schedule and requirements:

(1) The permittee shall submit the first RMP to a central point specified by the EPA no later than the latest of the following:

(i) Three years after the date on which a regulated substance is first listed under § 68.130; or,

(ii) The date on which a regulated substance is first present above a threshold quantity in a process.

(2) The permittee shall submit any additional relevant information requested by the Department or the EPA concerning the RMP and shall make subsequent submissions of RMPs in accordance with 40 CFR § 68.190.

(3) The permittee shall certify that the RMP is accurate and complete in accordance with the requirements of 40 CFR Part 68, including a checklist addressing the required elements of a complete RMP.

(c) As used in this plan approval condition, the term "process" shall be as defined in 40 CFR § 68.3. The term "process" means any activity involving a regulated substance including any use, storage, manufacturing, handling or onsite movement of the substances or any combination of these activities. For purposes of this definition, any group of vessels that are interconnected or separate vessels that are located such that a regulated substance could be involved in a potential release, shall be considered a single process. (25 Pa. Code § 127.12(9) and 40 CFR Part 68)

Any person wishing to provide the Department with additional information that they believe should be considered prior to the issuance of the Plan Approval may submit the information to the Department at the address shown. A 30-day comment period, from the date of this publication, will exist for the submission of comments. Each written comment must contain the following:

- Name, address and telephone number of the person submitting the comments.
- Identification of the proposed Plan Approval (specify the Plan Approval number).

Southeast Region: Air Quality Program, 2 East Main Street, Norristown, PA 19428, Janine Tulloch-Reid, Facilities Permitting Chief, (484) 250-5920.

23-00072: Action Supply Co., Inc. (1401 Calcon Hook Road, Sharon Hill, PA 19079) for a renewal of a State-only, Natural Minor Operating Permit to operate three ready-mix concrete plants and a recycling plant with two crushers and a screener in Darby Township, **Delaware County**. The facility is a minor source of PM emissions. Monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements have been added to the permit to address applicable limitations.

09-00112: Superior Woodcraft, Inc. (160 North Hamilton Road, Doylestown, PA 18901) is a non Title V, Synthetic Minor facility which manufactures high quality wood cabinets in Doylestown Borough, **Bucks County**. 36-03142: Haines & Kibblehouse, Inc. (P. O. Box 196 Skippack, PA 19474) for operation of their Silver Hill Quarry Crushing Plant in Brecknock Township, **Lancaster County**. This is a renewal of the State-only operating permit issued in 2003.

The facility's main sources include four No. 2 fired combustion units, seven spray booths and various woodworking operations. The facility has the potential to emit PM/PM10, NOx, CO, SOx, VOCs and HAPs below the major emission thresholds. The proposed operating permit contains all applicable regulatory requirements including monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting conditions.

41-00060: Frito Lay, Inc. (220 North Reach Road, Williamsport, PA 17701) for their Frito Lay—Williamsport plant in the City of Williamsport, **Lycoming County**. The facility's main sources include 18 natural gas fired combustion units, ten propane fired combustion units, one natural gas and propane fired combustion unit, four snack food fryers, three ovens, two extruders, corn kettles, one corn clipper cleaner, two cold cleaning degreaser, one natural gas fired emergency generator and two corn meal storage silos. The facility has the potential to emit SOx, NOx, CO, PM/PM10, VOCs and HAPs below the major emission thresholds. The proposed operating permit contains all applicable regulatory requirements including monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting conditions.

41-00042: Eastern Wood Products (P. O. Box 1056, Williamsport, PA 17703) for their plant in Old Lycoming Township, **Lycoming County**. The facility's main sources

include one wood-fired boiler, one natural gas-fired boiler, woodworking operations, two storage tanks and eight dry wood kilns. The facility has the potential to emit SO_x, NO_x, CO, PM/PM₁₀, VOCs and HAPs below the major emission thresholds. The proposed operating permit contains all applicable regulatory requirements including monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting conditions.

49-00029: Clarks Feed Mill, Inc. (Route 61 North, P. O. Box W, Shamokin, PA 17872) for their animal feed mill in Shamokin Township, **Northumberland County**. The facility's main sources include one natural gas/No. 2 fuel oil fired boiler, one Forsberg cleaner, two hammermills, two pellet machines and truck and railcar receiving stations. The facility has the potential to emit SO_x, NO_x, CO, PM/PM₁₀, VOCs and HAPs below the major emission thresholds. The proposed operating permit contains all applicable requirements including Federal and State regulations. In addition, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting conditions regarding compliance with all applicable requirements are included.

59-00006: Dominion Transmission, Inc. (445 West Main Street, Clarksburg, WV 26301) for the renewal of State-only Operating Permit 59-00006 for operation of a natural gas compressor station (Boom Compressor Station) in Lawrence Township, **Tioga County**.

The facility incorporates a 3,200 horsepower natural gas-fired reciprocating internal combustion compressor engine, a 2,000 horsepower natural gas-fired reciprocating internal combustion compressor engine, a 110 horsepower natural gas-fired reciprocating internal combustion dehydration engine, an emergency generator set incorporating a 400 horsepower natural gas-fired reciprocating internal combustion engine, five small natural gas fired heaters (.25, .05, .10, 1.5 and 5.613 mmBtu/hr heat input) and a solvent parts washer.

The facility has the potential to emit up to 98.58 tons of CO, 47.60 tons of NO_x, 18.96 tons of VOCs, 4.75 tons of VHAPs, .60 ton of PM/PM₁₀ and .01 ton of SO_x per year.

The facility is not a major (Title V) facility for any air contaminant.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) proposes to renew State-only Operating Permit 59-00006. The Department intends to incorporate into this renewal all conditions currently contained in State-only Operating Permit 59-00006 with these exceptions, additions and changes:

1. Conditions requiring a monthly inspection of the facility for the presence of visible air containment emissions, visible fugitive air contaminant emissions and malodorous air contaminant emissions, and the maintenance of records of these inspections, have been removed from the permit as the sources existing at the facility are not the type which would readily generate these types of air contaminant emissions.

2. Conditions requiring the maintenance, and periodic reporting, of records of the "supporting calculations . . . used to verify compliance" with various air contaminant emission limitations have, in the case of short-term emission limitations, been removed from the permit, as compliance with the limitations cannot be demonstrated with "calculations," or, in the case of long-term emission limitations, have been changed to require the maintenance, and periodic reporting, of the amount of the respective air contaminants emitted each month.

3. A condition requiring malfunctions to be reported to the Department has been revised to exclude the reporting

of malfunctions which do not result in, or potentially result in, air contaminant emissions in excess of an applicable air contaminant emission limitation and/or do not result in, or potentially result in, noncompliance with any operating permit condition.

4. A .05 mmBtu/hr natural gas-fired space heater has been moved from Section G of the permit (Miscellaneous) to Section D and made part of Source 032 and a .10 mmBtu/hr natural gas-fired heater, which had previously been overlooked at the facility, has also been made part of Source 032.

5. Conditions requiring records to be maintained of the number of hours several small heaters (Sources 032 and 033) are operated each month have been removed from the permit as the permit contains no restrictions on the number of hours the respective sources may be operated.

6. A condition has been added to the permit requiring the performance of NO_x, CO and VOC stack testing on the facility's 3,200 horsepower engine between July 1, 2011, and June 30, 2012.

7. As required by § 1189.91(d), the Department followed the formula set forth in the Commonwealth's approved State Plan to determine that the BAF for FY 2007-2008 for county nursing facilities is 1.03. The Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services approved State Plan amendment 07-008 on September 5, 2007.

The BAF for rate setting year 2007-2008 shall limit the estimated aggregate increase in the Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities over the 3 year period commencing July 1, 2005, and ending June 30, 2008, from the Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities in rate year 2004-2005 to 10.12%. The formula for this BAF as it applies to county nursing facilities is $BAF = 1.00 + 0.03$.

Purpose of Notice

The purpose of this notice is to announce the Department of Public Welfare's (Department) final annual case-mix per diem payment rates for State Fiscal Year (FY) 2007-2008 for nonpublic nursing facilities that participate in the Medical Assistance (MA) Program.

As required by the case-mix payment methodology set forth in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187, Subchapter G (relating to rate setting), the Department annually sets a new MA per diem rate for each nonpublic nursing facility. Each facility's annual per diem rate is comprised of four components: resident care; other resident related; administrative; and capital.

Section 1187.96 (relating to price- and rate-setting computations) states that the sum of the rate components will be multiplied by a budget adjustment factor (BAF). The BAF is based on the funding that is appropriated for nursing facility services in the General Appropriations Act and "will be determined in accordance with a formula specified in the Commonwealth's approved State Plan." 55 Pa. Code § 1187.96(e)(2)(iv).

The Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved State Plan Amendment (SPA) 07-007 on September 5, 2007. The SPA states that the BAF for rate-setting year 2007-2008 shall limit the estimated aggregate increase in the Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities over the 3 year period commencing July 1, 2005, and ending June 30, 2008, from the Statewide day-weighted average payment rate for MA nursing facility services for county and nonpublic nursing facilities in rate year 2004-2005 to 10.12%. The formula for this BAF as it applies to nonpublic nursing facilities is as follows: (the nonpublic nursing facilities' share of total appropriated funds plus the estimated annual patient pay amount) divided by the estimated acuity adjusted annual payments of \$3,147,260,444 which equals .93194.

The final FY 2007-2008 annual per diem rates are available on the Office of Medical Assistance Programs' (OMAP) website at www.dpw.state.pa.us/PartnersProviders/MedicalAssistance/DoingBusiness/LTCCCaseMixInfo/. To establish the database for the calculation of peer group medians and prices, the Department used each facility's three most recent audited cost reports that were issued by the Department on or before March 31, 2007, and indexed the costs for each report forward to the common date of December 31, 2007, using the CMS Nursing Home Without Capital Market Basket Index.

The following is a listing, by group, of the number of facilities with a particular year-end, and the inflation factor used to roll the costs of each facility forward to the common date of December 31, 2007.

* As a result of using the three most recent audited cost reports, the "Number of Facilities" column reflects a number in excess of actual enrolled nursing facilities.

After the database was inflated using the inflation values, the Department grouped the facilities in the correct geographic and bed size groupings. In accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.94 (relating to peer grouping for price setting), to establish peer groups, the Department used the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) group classification published in the Federal Office of Management and Budget Bulletin No. 99-04 (relating to revised statistical definitions of Metropolitan Areas and guidance on uses of Metropolitan Area definitions) to classify each nursing facility into one of three MSA groups or one non-MSA group. The Department then used the bed complement of the nursing facility on the final day of the reporting period of the most recent audited MA-11 used in the Nursing Information System database to classify nursing facilities into one of three bed complement groups. These groups are 3—119 beds, 120—269 and 270 and over. Peer groups 7 and 10 have been collapsed in accordance with § 1187.94(1)(iv). Peer group 13 is designated for special rehabilitation facilities only and peer group 14 is designated for hospital-based nursing facilities only, regardless of geographic location or bed-size.

After the database was established and the peer groups determined, the Department then calculated the medians and prices for each peer group. To calculate the resident care cost medians, the Department divided the audited allowable resident care costs for each cost report by the total facility case-mix index from the available February 1 picture date closest to the midpoint of the cost report period to obtain case-mix neutral total resident care cost for the cost report year. The Department then divided the case-mix neutral total resident care cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the case-

mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility to obtain the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem of each nursing facility. The Department arrayed the average case-mix neutral resident care cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined a median for each peer group.

To calculate the other resident care cost medians, the Department first divided the audited allowable other resident care costs for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days for the cost report year to obtain the other resident related cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the other resident related cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average other resident related cost per diem of each nursing facility. The Department arrayed the average other resident related cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups and determined a median for each peer group.

To calculate the administrative cost medians, the Department adjusted, as appropriate, the total audited actual resident days for each cost report to a minimum 90% occupancy in accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1187.23 (relating to nursing facility incentives and adjustments). The Department then divided the audited allowable administrative cost for each cost report by the total audited actual resident days, adjusted to 90% occupancy, if applicable, to obtain the administrative cost per diem for the cost report year. The Department calculated the 3-year arithmetic mean of the administrative cost for each nursing facility to obtain the average administrative cost per diem of each nursing facility. The Department arrayed the average administrative cost per diem for each nursing facility within the respective peer groups to determine a median for each peer group.

After the medians were determined for each peer group, the Department set prices using the medians. To set peer group prices, the Department multiplied the resident care cost median of each peer group by 1.17 to obtain the resident care cost peer group price; multiplied the other resident related cost median of each peer group by 1.12 to obtain the other resident related peer group price; and, multiplied the administrative cost median of each peer group by 1.04 to obtain the administrative cost peer group price.

The peer groups, peer group medians and peer group prices of general and county nursing facilities, hospital-based and special rehabilitation nursing facilities for Year 13 are listed in Annex A.

A Medical Assistance nursing facility provider may file an administrative appeal if the provider believes that the Department made any errors, or the provider otherwise disagrees with the Year 13 peer group prices that the Department established for its peer group. A provider's appeal must be sent in writing to the Department's Bureau of Hearings and Appeals, P. O. Box 2675, Harrisburg, PA 17105, and received by the Bureau of Hearings and Appeals within 30 days of the date of this notice. If a provider chooses to appeal, the provider will be afforded the opportunity for a de novo hearing before the Bureau of Hearings and Appeals. The peer group prices applied in setting the provider's rates may be changed as a result of the final adjudication of the provider's peer group price appeal. Providers should refer to 67 Pa.C.S. Chapter 11 (relating to medical assistance hearings and appeals), and to the Department's regulations at 55 Pa. Code Chapter 41 (relating to medical assistance provider appeal procedures), for more detail regarding their appeal rights and the requirements related to their written appeals.

Fiscal Impact

The fiscal impact associated with this change is estimated to be \$11.612 million (\$5.277 million in State funds) for FY 2007-2008

Lake Erie Commercial Fishing—2008

The Executive Director of the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission), acting under the authority of 58 Pa. Code § 69.31(b) (relating to seasons), has determined that the 2008 total allowable commercial catch for walleye from the Commonwealth waters of Lake Erie is 4,000 pounds. The commercial fishing season for walleye on Lake Erie is January 1 to midnight March 15 and 12:01 a.m. the first Saturday in May to December 31. This season shall end when the Executive Director determines that 4,000 pounds of walleye probably have been taken by commercial fishing interests fishing in the Commonwealth waters of Lake Erie.
