

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified previously for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes* provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the *Laws of Pennsylvania* are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services (Department) shall distribute advance sheets of the *Laws of Pennsylvania* to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$25.

THE COURTS

Title 210—APPELLATE PROCEDURE

PART I. RULES OF APPELLATE PROCEDURE [210 PA. CODE CH. 3]

Proposed Amendments to Rules 311, 313 and 342

The Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee proposes to amend Pennsylvania Rules of Appellate Procedure 311 and 342. The amendments are being submitted to the bench and bar for comments and suggestions prior to their submission to the Supreme Court. The proposed amendments are necessary to assure orderly administration of estates, trusts and guardianships.

The proposed Recommendation is endorsed by the Orphans' Court Procedural Rules Committee and was drafted by a joint subcommittee of the Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee and Orphans' Court Procedural Rules Committee. Its primary purpose is to provide for immediate appeal of Orphans' Court orders, many of which were appealable prior to the 1992 amendment to Pa.R.A.P. 341 defining a final order as any order that disposes of all claims and all parties. Amendments to Rule 342 in 2000 and 2005 required the trial judge to determine that the order was final before the aggrieved party could take an immediate appeal. The Committee believes this Recommendation is necessary because this requirement has proven to be unworkable.

The proposed amendment to Rule 342 provides additional categories of orders that would be immediately appealable and deletes the requirement of a determination of finality by the Orphans' Court judge. For instance, an order interpreting a will or trust will now be immediately appealable as of right. See proposed amended Note to Pa.R.A.P. 342. See Pa.R.A.P. 342(a)(3). Orders confirming an account or determining an interest in real or personal property, previously appealable only upon a determination of finality, will be immediately appealable as of right without the requirement of determination of finality. Pa.R.A.P. 342(a)(1), (a)(5). Orders determining the validity of a will or trust, currently appealable as interlocutory orders as of right pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 311(a)(8), shall be appealable as of right under the amendment to Rule 342. See Pa.R.A.P. 342(a)(2). Orders determining the status of a fiduciary, sometimes allowed to be appealed as collateral orders under Pa.R.A.P. 313, shall be appealable as of right under Pa.R.A.P. 342(a)(4).

Rule 342(a)(6) recognizes that other orders in Orphans' Court proceedings may be immediately appealable under the other rules of Chapter 3. For example, certain orders may be appealable as of right under Pa.R.A.P. 311(a)(4) (injunctions), under Pa.R.A.P. 313 (collateral orders) or under Pa.R.A.P. 341(b) (final orders) or they may be appealable by permission under Pa.R.A.P. 312 and 1311. None of the amendments proposed in this Recommendation would eliminate the right of an aggrieved party in an Orphans' Court proceeding to file an appeal pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 311, 312 and 1311, 313 or 341, assuming the order meets the requirements of any of those rules.

As proposed in the Recommendation, failure to appeal an order that is immediately appealable under paragraphs (a)(1)—(5) of Rule 342 shall constitute a waiver of all objections to such order and may not be raised in any subsequent appeal. See Pa.R.A.P. 342(c). The consequences of failing to appeal an Orphans' Court order which falls within paragraph (a)(6) will depend on whether such order is immediately appealable under Rules 311, 313, or 341.

CHAPTER 3. ORDERS FROM WHICH APPEALS
MAY BE TAKEN

INTERLOCUTORY APPEALS

Rule 311. Interlocutory Appeals as of Right.

(a) General rule. An appeal may be taken as of right and without reference to Pa.R.A.P. 341(c) from:

(8) [Estate and trust matters. An order determining the validity of a will or trust.

(9)] *Other cases.* An order which is made appealable by statute or general rule.

Official Note: Authority—This rule implements 42 Pa.C.S. § 5105(c) (interlocutory appeals), which provides:

Subdivision (h) (Further proceedings in lower court)—See note to Rule 1701(a) (effect of appeal generally).

Explanatory Comment—2010

Following a 2005 amendment to Rule 311, orders determining the validity of a will or trust were formerly appealable as of right under subdivision (a)(8). Pursuant to 2010 amendments to Rule 342 (Appealable Orphans' Court Orders), such orders are now immediately appealable under subdivision (a)(2) of Rule 342.

Rule 313. Collateral Orders.

Official Note: Rule 313 is a [codification] codification of existing case law with respect to collateral

*

orders. See Pubar v. Greco, 483 Pa. 68, 73, 394 A.2d 542, 545 (1978) (quoting Cohen v. Beneficial Industrial Corp., 337 U.S. 541 (1949)). Examples of collateral orders include an order denying a pre-trial motion to dismiss based on double jeopardy, Commonwealth v. Brady, 510 Pa. 363, 508 A.2d 286, 289—91 (1986) (allowing an immediate appeal from denial of double jeopardy claim under collateral order doctrine where trial court makes a finding that motion is not frivolous); an order denying a petition to permit the payment of death taxes, *Hankin v*. Hankin, 338 Pa. Super. 442, 487 A.2d 1363 (1985); and an order denying a petition for removal of an executor, Re: Estate of Georgianna, 312 Pa. Super. 339, 458 A.2d 989 (1983), aff'd, 504 Pa. 510, 475 A.2d 744. Thorough discussions of the collateral order doctrine as it has been applied by Pennsylvania appellate courts are found in the following sources: Darlington, McKeon, Schuckers and Brown, 1 Pennsylvania Appellate, Practice Second Edition, §§ 313:1-313:201 (1994) and Byer, Appealable orders under the Pennsylvania Rules of Appellate Procedures in Practice and Procedures in Pennsylvania Appellate Courts (PBI No. 1994-869); Pines, Pennsylvania Appellate Practice: Procedural Requirements and the Vagaries of Jurisdiction, 91 Dick. L. Rev. 55, 107—115 (1986).

If an order falls under Rule 313, an immediate appeal may be taken as of right simply by filing a notice of appeal. The procedures set forth in Rules 341(c) and 1311 do not apply under Rule 313.

Explanatory Comment—2010

Following the 2010 amendments to Rule 342 (Appealable Orphans' Court Orders) an order denying a petition for removal of a fiduciary, previously appealable as a collateral order, is now expressly appealable under subdivision (a)(4) of Rule 342.

FINAL ORDERS

Rule 342. [Orphans' Court Orders Appealable. Orders Determining Realty, Personalty and Status of Individuals or Entities. Orders Making Distribution Appealable Orphans' Court Orders.

[An order of the Orphans' Court Division making a distribution, or determining an interest in realty or personalty or the status of individuals or entities, shall be immediately appealable:

- (1) upon a determination of finality by the Orphans' Court Division, or
- (2) as otherwise provided by Chapter 3 of these rules.

Official Note: This rule was amended in 2001 to allow appeals from orders determining an interest in realty, personalty or status of individuals or entities, upon certification of the Orphans' Court judge. Prior to the 2001 amendment, this rule only permitted appeals from an order of distribution not final under Rule 341(b). The amendment to the rule was not intended to preclude immediate appeals in Orphans' Court matters as heretofore permitted under Rule 311 (Interlocutory Appeals as of Right) and Rule 313 (Collateral Orders).

However, Rule 342 may have been ambiguous in that regard because in *Estate of Sorber*, 2002 Pa. Super. 226, 803 A.2d 767 (2002), a panel of the Superior Court interpreted the 2001 amendment of Rule 342 to preclude immediate appeals from collateral orders unless determined to be final by the

Orphans' Court judge. The holding in *Estate of Sorber*, to wit, that Rule 342 precludes collateral order appeals under Rule 313, is now superseded by the 2005 amendment to Rule 342.

The 2005 amendment provides that Rule 342 is not the exclusive means for appealing orders: (a) determining an interest in realty or personalty or the status of individuals or entities, or (b) making a distribution. An aggrieved party may appeal such orders under any other Rule in Chapter 3 of the Rules of Appellate Procedure to the extent that the order meets the requirements for appealability under any such rule.]

- (a) General rule. An appeal may be taken as of right from the following orders of the Orphans' Court Division:
 - (1) An order confirming an account;
- (2) An order determining the validity of a will or trust;
- (3) An order interpreting a will, trust, or other document that forms the basis of a claim against an estate or trust;
- (4) An order determining the status of fiduciaries, beneficiaries or creditors in an estate, trust, or guardianship;
- (5) An order determining an interest in real or personal property; or
- (6) As otherwise provided by Chapter 3 of these rules.
 - (b) Definitions. As used in this rule,
- (1) "estate" includes decedent's, minor's and incapacitated person's estates, and the estate of a principal under Chapters 33, 35, 51, 55 and 56 of Title 20 ("the PEF Code");
- (2) "trust" includes inter vivos and testamentary trusts, and the "custodial property" under Chapters 53 and 77 of the PEF Code; and
- (3) "guardianship" includes guardians of the person for both minors and incapacitated persons under Chapters 51 and 55 of the PEF Code.
- (c) Waiver of objections. Failure to appeal an order that is immediately appealable under paragraphs (a)(1)—(5) of this rule shall constitute a waiver of all objections to such order and may not be raised in any subsequent appeal.
- (d) Nonprofit corporations. This rule shall not apply to orders involving nonprofit corporations within the jurisdiction of the Orphans' Court pursuant 20 Pa.C.S. § 711(21) and Pa.R.J.A. No. 2156(1).

Official Note: In 1992, the Supreme Court amended Rule 341 to make clear that, as a general rule, a final order is an order that ends a case as to all claims and all parties. As a result, many Orphans' Court orders that may have been considered constructive final orders prior to 1992 became unappealable interlocutory orders. While some Orphans' Court orders were construed by case law to be appealable as collateral orders, see Estate of Petro, 694 A.2d 627 (Pa. Super. 1997), the collateral order doctrine was neither consistently applied nor was it applicable to other Orphans' Court orders that our appellate courts had previously deemed to

be final under the "final aspect" doctrine. See, e.g. Estate of Habazin, 679 A.2d 1293 (Pa. Super. 1996).

In response, the Supreme Court adopted Rule 342 that initially permitted appeals from Orphans' Court orders concerning distribution even if the order was not considered final under Rule 341(b). In 2001, Rule 342 was amended to allow appeals from orders determining an interest in realty, personalty or the status of individuals or entities, in addition to orders of distribution, if the Orphans' Court judge made a determination that the particular order should be treated as final. In 2005, the Supreme Court amended Rule 342 again, adding subdivision (2) to clarify that Rule 342 was not the exclusive method of appealing Orphans' Court orders.

Also, in 2005, the Supreme Court amended Rule 311 to provide for an interlocutory appeal as of right from an order determining the validity of a will or trust. See former Rule 311(a)(8). Such an order needed to be immediately appealable and given finality so that the orderly administration of the estate or trust could appropriately proceed.

Since that time, it has become apparent that other adversarial disputes arise during the administration of an estate, trust and guardianship, and that orders adjudicating these disputes also must be resolved with finality so that the ordinary and routine administration of the estate, trust or guardianship can continue. Experience has proven that the determination of finality procedure in subdivision (1) of Rule 342 is not workable and has been applied inconsistently around the Commonwealth.

Experience has also proven that it is difficult to analogize civil litigation to estate, trust and guardianship administration because the civil proceeding defines the scope of the dispute, but the administration of a trust or estate does not define the scope of Orphans' Court litigation. Administration of a trust or an estate continues over a period of time, and litigation in Orphans' Court occurring at some point during the administration needs to be determined with finality so that the estate or trust administration can continue properly and orderly. Thus, the traditional notions of finality that are applicable in the context of ongoing civil adversary proceedings do not correspond to litigation in Orphans' Court.

Therefore, in order to facilitate orderly administration of estates, trusts and guardianships, the 2010 amendments list certain orders that will be immediately appealable without any requirement that the Orphans' Court make a determination of finality.

Subdivisions (a)(1)—(5) list orders unique to Orphans' Court practice that closely resemble final orders ending a case or controversy as to all outstanding claims and parties. Subdivision (a)(1) provides that the adjudication of any account, even an interim or partial account, is appealable. Previously, only the adjudication of the final account would have been appealable as a final order under Rule 341. This limitation has proven unworkable for estate administration taking years and trusts established for generations during which interim and partial accounts may be adjudicated and confirmed. Orders under new subdivision (a)(2)(orders

determining validity of will or trust) were appealable following the 2005 Amendment to Rule 311 as interlocutory appeals as of right. See old Rule 311(a)(8). Subdivision (a)(3) is a new provision that allows an immediate appeal from an order interpreting a will, trust, or other relevant document that forms the basis of a claim asserted against an estate or trust. Such orders can include, among other things, an order determining that a particular individual is or is not a beneficiary under the will or trust, to what degree a particular standard gives the beneficiary rights to principal or income, to what degree the remainder interests in a trust are vested, and determining if an underlying agreement executed by the decedent during life creates rights against the estate. Subdivision (a)(4) is a restatement of prior Rule 342 intended to clarify, among other things, that the removal or refusal to remove a fiduciary is an appealable order, a determination of the status and claim of a creditor is an appealable order, and that such orders include orders pertaining to estates, trusts and guardianships. Subdivision (a)(5) retains the same language from prior Rule 342. Orders falling with subdivisions (a)(1)—(5) no longer require the lower court to make a determination of finality.

In keeping with the 2005 amendment that added subdivision (2) to prior Rule 342, subdivision (a)(6) provides that there may be other orders that are appealable under the other rules in Chapter 3 of the Rules of Appellate Procedure. Examples would include injunctions appealable under Rule 311(a)(4), Interlocutory Orders Appealable by Permission under Rule 312 and 1311, Collateral Orders appealable under 313, and an order approving a final accounting which is a true final order under Rule 341(b). Whether or not such orders require certification or a further determination of finality by the trial court depends on the applicable rule in Chapter 3. Compare Rules 311(a)(4), 313 and 341(c) with Rules 312 and 1311.

Failure to appeal an order that is immediately appealable under subdivisions (a)(1)—(5) of this rule shall constitute a waiver of all objections to such order and may not be raised in any subsequent appeal. See 342(c). The consequences of failure to appeal an Orphans' Court order under (a)(6) will depend on whether such orders fall within Rules 311, 312, 1311 or 341.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 58—RECREATION

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CHS. 61 AND 65] Fishing

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapters 61 and 65 (relating to seasons, sizes and creel limits; and special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will go into effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The amendment to § 61.1 (relating to Commonwealth inland waters) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102(b) of the code (relating to rules and regulations). The amendment to § 65.24 (relating to miscellaneous special regulations) is published under the statutory authority of section 2307(a) of the code (relating to waters limited to specific purposes).

D. Purpose and Background

The final-form rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the final-form rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

E. Summary of Changes

(1) Amendment to § 61.1. The Commission recently adopted an amendment to § 61.2 (relating to Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary) that reduced the creel limit for American shad on the West Branch and the entire Delaware River mainstem from the confluence of the East and West Branches downstream to the Commodore Barry Bridge from six to three. This change went into effect on January 9, 2010.

Upon further review of its regulations, however, the Commission determined that an amendment to § 61.1 was also needed. This section provides for a daily limit for American shad of six on all inland waters that are not covered by other sections within Chapter 61. Section 61.2, which is applicable only to those Delaware River tributaries from the mouths of the tributaries upstream to the limit of the tidal influence, does not cover large tributaries upriver of the tidal influence, such as the Lackawaxen River in Pike County. It is likely that a limited number of shad enter the larger tributaries upriver of the tidal influence. Currently, the limit for American shad on those Delaware River tributaries is six under § 61.1. Therefore, the Commission amended this section to reduce the creel limit to three as set forth in proposed rulemaking.

(2) Amendment to § 65.24. On October 26, 2009, the act of August 27, 2009 (P. L. 377, No. 40) (Act 40) went into effect. Act 40 amended section 2907.2 of the code

(relating to Lake Erie fishing permits) to provide that a Lake Erie permit is required to fish in Lake Erie, Presque Isle Bay and their tributaries, including waters that flow into those tributaries, instead of "the Pennsylvania waters of Lake Erie, Presque Isle Bay and their tributaries" only. This amendment requires anglers to procure a Lake Erie fishing permit to fish in Conneaut Creek, Turkey Creek and their tributaries when previously one was not required because although these streams begin in this Commonwealth, they enter Lake Erie in Ohio. Although a Lake Erie permit will be required to fish these streams, Act 40 also provides that proceeds derived from their sale may now be used to fund projects on those waters.

Section 65.24 currently provide that a Lake Erie permit is not required on Conneaut Creek, Turkey Creek and their tributaries. To be consistent with Act 40, this section is amended to remove that language.

In addition, the Commission currently applies the seasons, sizes and creels limits applicable to Lake Erie and its tributaries under § 69.12 (relating to seasons, sizes and creel limits-Lake Erie and Lake Erie tributaries) to the portion of Conneaut Creek that flows through Erie County. However, the Commission applies the seasons, sizes and creel limits applicable to Commonwealth inland waters under § 61.1 to the portion of Conneaut Creek and its tributaries that flow through Crawford County except with regard to salmon and steelhead that are addressed in § 65.24. To be consistent with Act 40, § 65.24 is amended to remove the existing language. With this change, the Commission will apply the Lake Erie seasons, sizes and creel limits to the entire length of Conneaut Creek and its tributaries. The Commission is actively developing a viable steelhead fishery in Conneaut Creek by annually stocking smolts. Accordingly, the Commission amended § 65.24 to read as set forth in proposed rulemaking published at 40 Pa.B. 427 (January 16, 2010).

F. Paperwork

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The final-form rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The final-form rulemaking will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Comments

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 40 Pa.B. 427. During the public comment period, the Commission received one public comment supporting the proposal to amend § 61.1. The Commission did not receive public comments concerning the proposal to amend § 65.24. Copies of the public comment was provided to the Commissioners.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided and public comments received were considered.

(3) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 61 and 65, are amended by amending §§ 61.1 and 65.24 to read as set forth at 40 Pa.B. 427.
- (b) The Executive Director shall submit this order and 40 Pa.B. 427 to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality and form as required by law.
- (c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and 40 Pa.B. 427 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect on immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION [58 Pa. Code Ch. 75] Fishing

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapter 75 (relating to endangered species). The Commission is publishing this final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). The final-form rulemaking adds the Northern Redbelly Dace, Northern Cricket Frog and Blue-spotted Salamander to the list of endangered species. The final-form rulemaking also removes the Silver Chub from the list of endangered species, the Mooneye, Goldeye and Skipjack Herring from the list of threatened species and the Brook Silverside from the list of candidate species.

A. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will go into effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The amendments to §§ 75.1 and 75.2 (relating to endangered species; and threatened species) are published under the statutory authority of section 2305 of the code (relating to threatened and endangered species). The amendment to § 75.3 (relating to candidate species) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102 (relating to rules and regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

The final-form rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations regard-

ing endangered, threatened and candidate species. The specific purpose of the final-form rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

E. Summary of Changes

Additions to the Endangered Species List

(1) Northern Redbelly Dace (*Phoxinus eos*). The Northern Redbelly Dace is a small cyprinid. Characterized as a colorful minnow, this dace has a dark olive or brown back with spots, and two dark, broad bands on the side. The space between the two bands is cream, reddish or dark. The stomach is cream-colored except in breeding males where the stomach is yellow-orange to red. It occurs in ponds and slow and swampy sections of streams. In this Commonwealth, it appears to be strictly confined to springs, wetlands and sections of waterways impounded by beavers (Doug Fischer, personal observation).

Its National distribution includes the Atlantic, Great Lakes, Hudson Bay, upper Mississippi, Missouri, and Peace-Mackenzie River drainages, from Nova Scotia west to Northwest Territories and British Columbia, south to northern Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Colorado (Page and Burr, 1991). In this Commonwealth, it currently inhabits the Allegheny River drainage in Erie and Warren Counties (unpublished data). It also occurs adjacent to northwest Pennsylvania in the Brokenstraw Creek and Conewango Creek drainages in New York (Smith, 1985). This species is listed as endangered in Massachusetts.

Only one historic occurrence record, Susquehanna County, exists in this Commonwealth (Cope, 1862). More recently, five occurrences were documented in 2008: two in the French Creek drainage in Erie and Warren Counties; and three in the Brokenstraw Creek drainage in Warren County. Apparently three of these occupied waterways have not been previously surveyed and surveys on the remaining two did not include the occupied sections or habitat suitable for Northern Redbelly Dace (Raney, 1938; Stauffer, 1987; E. Cooper field notes; Commission unpublished data). The total known lineal occupancy appears to be no more than 10 kilometers.

The Fishes Technical Committee of the Pennsylvania Biological Survey (PABS) reviewed the Heritage rank of the Northern Redbelly Dace and recommended it be changed from Extirpated (SX) to "critically imperiled" (S1) "because of extreme rarity or because of some factor(s) making it especially vulnerable to extirpation" from this Commonwealth. Typically five or fewer occurrences or very few remaining individuals or acres occur in this Commonwealth. The PABS committee recommended endangered status based on the previously referenced data and apparent rarity of the species in this Commonwealth.

The Northern Redbelly Dace was described by Cope (1862) from specimens collected in Meshoppen Creek, Susquehanna County. Specimens have not been reported from this Commonwealth since that time and this taxon was considered extirpated (Cooper, 1983). This species was evaluated through the Commission's fish species documentation and objective listing criteria and met Criteria B.3 (Distribution & Trends) that the extent of occupancy in the stream/river is less than 10 miles. Recently discovered populations of this species in northeastern Erie and northwestern Warren Counties justify a change in status from extirpated to endangered. Therefore, the Commission added the Northern Redbelly Dace to the list of endangered species.

(2) Northern Cricket Frog (Acris crepitans). The Northern Cricket Frog is the smallest frog species in this

Commonwealth, averaging around 23mm. This small tree frog is variable in coloration and markings. The dorsal body color can be golden brown, tan, gray or olive and can vary among individuals depending on ground temperature. Most often middorsal stripes are present and vary in color from brown to lime green. The most characteristic marking of the Northern Cricket Frog is the V-shaped or dark triangle spot located between the eyes and the well defined longitudinal stripe along the rear surface of the dark dorsal thigh.

Breeding habitats are typically described as permanent bodies of water such as slow-moving streams, ponds, lakes, marshes, bogs and swamps, but breeding sites can also be semipermanent ponds and seasonal forest pools. Often, breeding microhabitats within these larger systems are open-canopied, usually contain emergent vegetation and contain areas of flat, sparsely vegetated patches along the margins of open water (Bayne, 2004; Gibbs, et al., 2007; White and White, 2002). Upland habitats surrounding breeding habitats are varied but include floodplain forest, small scrub-shrub islands in impoundments, mature deciduous forest with rocky substrates, mature deciduous forest with sandy substrates and old fields.

The Northern Cricket Frog is known from southeastern New York, south along the Atlantic Coastal states and west along the Gulf Coast from northwestern Florida to eastern Texas. Southern populations range as far north as Tennessee and Missouri. Isolated populations occur on the coastal plain of South Carolina. It is listed as an endangered species in New York and as a species of concern in Ohio.

The Northern Cricket Frog was historically distributed throughout the southeastern and southcentral portions of this Commonwealth with several apparently disjunct populations found in northeastern and southwestern Pennsylvania. Counties in this Commonwealth of historical occurrence included Allegheny, Berks, Bucks, Carbon, Chester, Cumberland, Dauphin, Delaware, Franklin, Lebanon, Montgomery, Philadelphia and York. Nearly half of all records were collected from within or near the coastal plain in southern Bucks, Delaware, Montgomery and Philadelphia Counties. All records considered historical were initially documented before 1983.

The Northern Cricket Frog is apparently extirpated from approximately 92% of historically (initially discovered pre-1983: 34 of 37 locations) documented collection sites. Two of the three historical sites considered extant are included as a "best case scenario" since investigations or surveys have not been conducted for the species at these locations. The species may very well have disappeared from these locations as well. A total of six recent new sites have been initially documented since 1983. Of these sites, 50% (three of six) are considered extirpated, and an additional 33% (two of six) are located in a heavily disturbed industrial/urbanized landscape making future viability uncertain (these sites are considered extant in this analysis). Presently, of the 43 total sites that have been adequately documented as valid collection locations in this Commonwealth, only 14% (6 of 43) are considered extant. Suitable habitats in the vicinity of all but two of the historical collection locations (single sites in Chester and Franklin Counties have not been investigated since their initial discovery, but are considered extant in this analysis as a best case scenario) have been investigated in the last 15 years, thus documenting a significant (86%) population reduction for this species in this Commonwealth in the last 20 years (Listing Criterion A.1: Range

Reduction of > 80% in the last 20 years). The Area of Occupancy for *A. crepitans* in this Commonwealth is under 4 square miles (Listing Criterion B.2) and severely fragmented (Listing Criterion B.2.a). Additionally, declines are projected in the area of occupancy, area/extent/ and or quality of habitat, number of locations or subpopulations and number of mature individuals (Listing Criterion B.2.b).

The Amphibian and Reptile Technical Committee of PABS reviewed the Heritage rank of the Northern Cricket frog and recommended it be changed to "critically imperiled" (S1), critically imperiled in this Commonwealth "because of extreme rarity or because of some factor(s) making it especially vulnerable to extirpation" from this Commonwealth. As the species meets Listing Criteria A.1 and B.2, the Committee recommended the status of the Northern Cricket Frog (Acris crepitans) be elevated to endangered in this Commonwealth. Therefore, given the apparent rarity and threats to the Statewide population, and multiple listing criteria met, the Commission added the Northern Cricket Frog to the list of endangered species.

(3) Blue-spotted Salamander (Ambystoma laterale). The Blue-spotted Salamander is member of the Ambystomatidae (mole salamander) family. They are characterized as a small to medium sized salamander with a pattern of bright blue spots scattered over a grayish-black or black body. They live mostly a terrestrial, fossorial/subterranean existence. Blue-spotted Salamanders require both breeding (aquatic) and nonbreeding (upland) habitats. Breeding habitat in this Commonwealth consists of hardwood swamps, open marshes, oxbow ponds, ditches and seasonal forest pools, often within or near floodplains of large streams and rivers. Nonbreeding habitat can be characterized as deciduous and mixed forests surrounding breeding habitats.

Blue-spotted Salamanders occur in southeastern Quebec to Lake Winnipeg, south through the Great Lakes region and New England to northern Indiana and northern New Jersey. Hybrid A. laterale populations (in association with A. jeffersonianum, A. texanum and A. tigrinum) occur throughout the range of this species. The Blue-spotted Salamander is listed as endangered in Ohio and New Jersey and as a species of concern in New York.

The Blue-spotted Salamander complex (including associated hybrids) is a peripheral species to this Commonwealth with all known populations being found in northern tier counties bordering the New Jersey and New York: the Delaware River drainage (Northampton County) and the Allegheny River drainage (McKean County and Warren County).

The Blue-spotted Salamander was not discovered in this Commonwealth until April 2000. The Blue-spotted Salamander probably did not recently colonize this Commonwealth; rather, this species likely escaped detection due to locations being situated in fairly rural areas and general similarity in appearance to the Jefferson Salamander. This species was not detected during the 7-year long Pennsylvania Herpetological Atlas project.

The Blue-spotted Salamander was first discovered in this Commonwealth in McKean County (Allegheny River drainage) during the spring of 2000 as part of a distribution-wide survey for the Jefferson Salamander (Ambystoma jeffersonianum) and Blue-spotted Salamander complex (Bogart and Klemens, 2008; Ruhe, unpublished). Two additional populations were subsequently found in Northampton (Delaware River drainage) and

Warren (Allegheny River drainage) Counties (Bogart and Klemens, 2008; Ruhe, unpublished). The Northampton County population was discovered in October 2003 and the Warren County population in October 2008 (Ruhe, unpublished).

The known extent of occurrence for the Blue-spotted Salamander in this Commonwealth encompasses an area of under 3 square miles, qualifying the species for listing as endangered under listing criteria B.1. (Extent of Occurrence < 40 mi²). As the Blue-spotted Salamander meets the listing criteria B.1, the Amphibian and Reptile Technical Committee of PABS recommends that the Blue-spotted Salamander be listed as an endangered species. Therefore, based upon the limited range of the species within the Commonwealth, the small number of known sites and threats to these sites, the Commission added the Blue-spotted Salamander to the list of endangered species.

Removals from the Endangered, Threatened and Candidate Species Lists

(1) Silver Chub (*Macrhybopsis storeriana*). The Silver Chub is a small, slender, silvery minnow with large eyes, small mouth and small, posterior maxillary barbel. It inhabits large rivers and lakes, where it prefers clean sand and gravel substrates. The Silver Chub's Nationwide distribution includes the Lake Erie drainage in Ontario, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan; Mississippi River basin from Pennsylvania and West Virginia to the Midwest, and south to Gulf Coast drainages from Alabama to Louisiana. In this Commonwealth, they occur in Lake Erie and in the Allegheny, Monongahela and Ohio River drainages (Argent and Carline, 2005).

The Silver Chub was probably common in the large rivers in this Commonwealth's portion of the Ohio River drainage prior to European settlement (Trautman, 1981). It was abundant in the Monongahela in the late 1800s (Evermann and Bollman, 1886). It was apparently extirpated during the early 1900s, when conditions in these rivers were degraded (Ortmann, 1909). The Ohio River Sanitation Commission collected one specimen in 1957 and eight in 1959 from the lower Allegheny River. Cooper (1983) collected a single specimen from Lake Erie near the mouth of Walnut Creek in 1971.

The Silver Chub is rarely taken in Lake Erie and was considered extirpated in the Ohio River drainage by Gilbert (1985). It was collected in 1986 in the Ohio River and has subsequently been documented in the Monongahela and lower Allegheny as well (unpublished data—California University of Pennsylvania (CU of PA), ORSANCO, Pennsylvania State University (PSU) and the Commission). It has been collected more often since the early 1990s, with collections ranging from 1 to 24 specimens (unpublished data—CU of PA, ORSANCO, PSU and the Commission). Multiple size classes including juveniles have been collected recently in the Ohio River (T. Stecko, PSU, personal communication, unpublished data, 2009).

The Fishes Technical Committee of PABS reviewed the Heritage rank of the Silver Chub and recommended that it be changed from "critically imperiled" (S1) to "vulnerable-apparently secure" (S3S4) status, "uncommon but not rare, and usually widespread" in this Commonwealth. The PABS committee additionally recommended "delisting" status based on the previously referenced data and apparent commonality of the species in this Commonwealth. The PABS definition of "delisted species" is "species which were once listed but now cited for delisting."

The Silver Chub was listed as endangered based on a limited number of collections and apparent low numbers. Field surveys conducted throughout the historic Pennsylvania range since 1990 have documented an expansion in range and population size compared to pre-1990 information. These species were considered extirpated during the first half of the 20th century; however, recent electrofishing and benthic trawl surveys have documented a more or less continuous distribution throughout the Ohio River and lower reaches of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers. Based on recent records, it appears that this species is now fairly widespread in the lock and dam section of the "Three Rivers" (Crisswell and Stauffer, 2005).

This species was evaluated through the Commission's fish species documentation and objective listing/delisting criteria. The Silver Chub now occupy much of their former range and their population is increasing. Therefore, it no longer meets endangered species listing criteria. It also does not meet the threatened species listing criteria. Enough information is available to make the determination that this species is secure in this Commonwealth at present and to justify removal from the list of endangered fishes. Therefore, the Commission removed the Silver Chub from the list of endangered species.

(2) Mooneye (*Hiodon tergisus*). The Mooneye is a medium-sized, deep-bodied pelagic fish that inhabits large rivers and reservoirs. The Mooneye is known from the St. Lawrence—Great Lakes drainage (except Lake Superior), Mississippi River and Hudson Bay basins from Quebec to Alberta and south to the Gulf; Gulf Slope drainages from Alabama to Louisiana. In this Commonwealth, it occurs in the Monongahela and Ohio Rivers, the lock and dam section of the Allegheny River and formerly occurred in Lake Erie (Fowler, 1940; Cooper, 1983).

Lessueur's original 1818 description of this species, based in part on specimens collected in Pittsburgh, is apparently the only historic record from the Ohio River drainage in this Commonwealth (Cooper, 1985). In Lake Erie, it was collected in 1920 near Erie (UMMZ 55667). The Mooneye was common in Ohio waters before 1900, but has decreased greatly since and is rarely taken in Lake Erie (Trautman, 1981). It was probably fairly common in this Commonwealth before 1900 as well but was apparently extirpated during the early 1900s when conditions in these rivers were degraded. Its recent recolonization is undoubtedly a result of improved water quality.

The Mooneye was collected in 1987 in the Allegheny River and since has been collected as far upriver as River Mile 60 and has subsequently been documented in the Monongahela and lower Ohio Rivers as well (unpublished data—CU of PA, ORSANCO, PSU and the Commission). It has been collected more often since the early 1990s with collections ranging from 1 to 22 specimens (unpublished data—CU of PA, ORSANCO, PSU and the Commission).

The Fishes Technical Committee of PABS reviewed the Heritage rank of the Mooneye and recommended that it be changed from "imperiled-vulnerable" (S2S3) to "apparently secure" (S4) status, "uncommon but not rare, and usually widespread" in this Commonwealth with "usually more than 100 occurrences." The PABS committee additionally recommended "delisting" status based on the previously referenced data and apparent commonality of the species in this Commonwealth.

The Mooneye was listed as threatened in this Commonwealth based on a limited number of collections and apparent low numbers. Field surveys conducted throughout the historic Pennsylvania range since 1990 have documented a significant expansion in range and population size compared to pre-1990 information. The Mooneye was considered extirpated from this Commonwealth, with no collections reported between 1920 and 1987 (Cooper, 1985; unpublished data); however, recent electrofishing and gillnet surveys have documented a more or less continuous distribution throughout the Ohio River and lower reaches of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers. This species was evaluated through the Commission's fish species documentation and objective listing/delisting criteria. The Mooneye no longer meets listing the threatened species listing criteria as the distribution and population of the Mooneye is increasing.

Enough information is available to make the determination that it is secure in this Commonwealth at present and to justify removal from the list of threatened fishes. Therefore, the Commission removed the Mooneye from the list of threatened species.

(3) Goldeye (*Hiodon alosoides*). Similar in shape and form to the Mooneye, the Goldeye inhabits large turbid rivers and the silty shallows of large lakes. It is known from tributaries to James Bay in Quebec and Ontario; Arctic, Missouri, Mississippi and Ohio River drainages from Northwest Territories to Pennsylvania and south to Louisiana. In this Commonwealth, the Goldeye was known from the Ohio River Basin.

The historic distribution of Goldeye within this Commonwealth is difficult to determine. Fowler (1911 and 1919) reported collections from the Beaver River (one specimen) and the Youghiogheny River (two specimens) made by Edward D. Cope, presumably in the 1860s or 1870s. Trautman (1981) reported that in Ohio it was far more numerous in the Ohio River below Portsmouth than in the industrially polluted upper Ohio River near the Pennsylvania state line and remained fairly common there from 1955 to 1980. However, recent records do not exist.

The Fishes Technical Committee of PABS reviewed the Heritage rank of the Mooneye and recommended it be changed to "extirpated" (SX) status, "believed to be extirpated from the 'state'" (State Rank Definitions, 1996). The PABS committee recommended "delisting" status based on the previously referenced data and lack of contemporary collections of the species in this Commonwealth.

The Goldeye was listed as threatened based on a limited number of collections and apparent low numbers. Field surveys conducted throughout the Ohio River basin during the last 110 years have not yielded a known collection of Goldeye supported by a preserved voucher specimen. These surveys include increasingly intensive efforts using multiple methodologies implemented by multiple scientific entities. At this time, enough information is available to make the determination that the Goldeye is presumed extirpated from this Commonwealth and to justify its removal from the list of threatened fishes. Therefore, the Commission removed the Goldeye from the list of threatened species.

(4) Skipjack Herring (Alosa chrysochloris). The Skipjack Herring is a streamlined, laterally compressed herring with a large mouth and protruding lower jaw. It inhabits open waters of medium to large rivers and reservoirs. The Skipjack Herring is known from the Hudson Bay drainage and Mississippi River basin from Minnesota south to the Gulf of Mexico, and from Pennsyl-

vania to South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas Gulf Slope drainages from Florida to Texas. In this Commonwealth, it is known from the Ohio, Monongahela and Allegheny River basins.

Early accounts indicated that the Skipjack Herring was evidently uncommon in the Commonwealth. Rafinesque (1820) stated that it seldom went as far upriver as Pittsburgh. Trautman (1981) reported that rivermen occasionally took individuals between Marietta, Ohio and the Pennsylvania state line. Fowler (1919) reported an occurrence from the Conemaugh River, Indiana County, that he thought was likely a Skipjack Herring. However, Fowler (1940) also reported this species from Blair County, a questionable record at best. Cooper (1985) considered it extirpated and thought it possible that the species never had been collected from this Commonwealth. It was occasionally collected in this Commonwealth's portion of the Ohio River during the mid-1980s and has continued to increase in numbers, and recent records show the Skipjack Herring is well distributed and taken regularly in the Ohio and Monongahela Rivers (Criswell and Stauffer, 2005; unpublished data—CU of PA ORSANCO, PSU and the Commission).

The Fishes Technical Committee of PABS reviewed the Heritage rank of the Skipjack Herring and recommended it be changed to "apparently secure" (S4) status, "uncommon but not rare, and usually widespread" in this Commonwealth with "usually more than 100 occurrences." The PABS committee additionally recommended "delisting" status based on the previously referenced data and apparent commonality of the species in this Commonwealth.

The Skipjack Herring was listed as threatened based on a limited number of collections and apparent low numbers. Field surveys conducted throughout the historic Pennsylvania range since the 1990s have documented an expansion in range and population size compared to pre-1990 information. The Skipjack Herring was considered extirpated until the mid-1980s; however, recent electrofishing and gillnet surveys have documented a more or less continuous distribution throughout the Ohio River and lower reaches of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers. This species was evaluated through the Commission's fish species documentation and objective listing/delisting criteria. The Skipjack Herring now occupy their former range (widespread in the Ohio and Monongahela and increasing in the Allegheny) and the population is increasing in this Commonwealth. They no longer meet the threatened species listing criteria.

Enough information is available to make the determination that it is secure in this Commonwealth at present and to justify removal from the list of threatened fishes. Therefore, the Commission removed the Skipjack Herring from the list of threatened species.

(5) Brook Silverside (*Labidesthes sicculus*). The Brook Silverside is a slender, elongate fish with a nearly straight dorsal profile anteriorly, including a flattened head. It inhabits lakes and sluggish sections of large streams and rivers, where it occurs primarily in schools near the surface in open water, often over substrates of silt, sand or mud. The Brook Silverside is known from the St. Lawrence—Great Lakes drainage (except Lake Superior) and Mississippi River basin from southern Quebec to eastern Minnesota and south to Louisiana; Atlantic and Gulf drainages from South Carolina to Texas. It has been introduced elsewhere. In this Commonwealth, it is known from the Ohio River and Lake Erie drainages in western part of this Commonwealth (Cooper, 1983).

Little historical information on abundance is available for this Commonwealth. Trautman (1981) reported that in Ohio the Brook Silverside was abundant and distributed throughout this Commonwealth prior to 1900 but was severely reduced and many populations were extirpated. He identified the chief factor causing this decline as increased turbidity levels. Since this species is generally detected during surveys targeting other fishes, comprehensive data on distribution and abundance is lacking. It probably declined significantly in our western rivers, as did many other fishes, and is now rebounding there.

In the last 25 years, collection records indicate that the Brook Silverside is found to be locally common in larger water bodies. It is collected regularly in the Allegheny, Monongahela and Ohio Rivers, French Creek and tributaries, Shenango River and its tributaries and major impoundments, and Lake Erie (CU of PA, ORSANCO, PSU and the Commission).

The Fishes Technical Committee of PABS reviewed the Heritage rank of the Brook Silverside and recommended it be changed to "apparently secure" (S4) status, "uncommon but not rare, and usually widespread" in this Commonwealth with "usually more than 100 occurrences." The PABS committee additionally recommended "delisting" status based on the previously referenced data and apparent commonality of the species in this Commonwealth.

The Brook Silverside was listed as a candidate species based on a limited number of collections and apparent low numbers. Recent field surveys conducted throughout the historic Pennsylvania range have documented a significant expansion in range and population size compared to pre-1990 information. This species was evaluated through the Commission's fish species documentation and objective listing/delisting criteria. The Brook Silverside population and distribution is increasing in this Commonwealth and they no longer meet the candidate species listing criteria. Enough information is available to determine that it is secure in this Commonwealth at present and to justify Brook Silverside's removal from the list of candidate fishes. Therefore, the Commission removed the Brook Silverside from the list of candidate species.

The Commission amends §§ 75.1, 75.2 and 75.3 to read as set forth in the proposed rulemaking published at 40 Pa.B. 429 (January 16, 2010).

F. Paperwork

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The final-form rulemaking will not have direct adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The final-form rulemaking will not impose new direct costs on the private sector or the general public. The direct regulatory significance of designating a species as endangered or threatened is limited to prohibiting persons from taking, catching, killing or possessing these mussels in this Commonwealth. Because none of the species that are proposed for listing have commercial or recreational significance because of their rarity, there are no direct fiscal impacts from providing these protections.

With respect to listings previously proposed by the Commission, the private sector and regulated community have asserted that the designation of certain species as endangered or threatened may have indirect fiscal impacts on them and the Commonwealth because of impacts on permitting decisions by the Department of Environmental Protection and other agencies. If an endangered species is found in an area slated for development, applicants for permits may be required to conduct additional studies or adjust the project to avoid adverse impacts on these species and their habitat. These are fiscal impacts resulting from regulatory and statutory authorities other than those under the aegis of the Commission.

H. Public Comments

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 40 Pa.B. 429. During the formal comment period, the Commission received 67 public comments supporting the listings and one public comment advocating that the listings of the Northern Redbelly Dace and the Bluespotted Salamander be deferred to allow for additional studies of both species to be undertaken and to explain the basis of the listing for the Blue-spotted Salamander to the public. The Commission received one public comment supporting the listings after the formal comment period. During the formal comment period, the Commission received one public comment supporting the delistings. Copies of the public comments were provided to the Commissioners.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided and the public comments received were considered.
- (3) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 75, are amended by amending §§ 75.1, 75.2 and 75.3 to read as set forth at 40 Pa.B. 429.
- (b) The Executive Director shall submit this order and 40 Pa.B. 429 to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality and form as required by law.
- (c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and 40 Pa.B. 429 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect on immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Default Service Regulations

An error occurred in the proposed rulemaking which appeared at 40 Pa.B. 2267, 2276 (May 1, 2010). A proposal to amend § 54.188(f) (relating to Commission review of default service programs and rates) was inadvertently omitted. The correct version of the proposed amendment to § 54.188(f) is as follows, with the ellipses referring to the proposal published at 40 Pa.B. 2267:

§ 54.188. Commission review of default service programs and rates.

* * * * *

(f) A DSP shall submit tariff supplements on a quarterly or more frequent basis, consistent with § 54.187(h) and (i) (pertaining to default service rate design and recovery of reasonable costs), to revise default service rates to ensure the recovery of costs reasonably incurred in acquiring electricity [at prevailing market prices]. The DSP shall provide written notice to the named parties identified in § 54.185(b) of the proposed rates at the time of the tariff filings. The tariff supplements shall be posted to the DSP's public internet domain at the time they are filed with the Commission. A customer or the parties identified in § 54.185(b) may file exceptions to the default service tariffs within 20 days of the date the tariffs are filed with the Commission. The exceptions shall be limited to whether the DSP has properly implemented the procurement plan approved by the Commission and accurately calculated the rates. The DSP shall post the revised PTC for each customer class within 1 business day of its effective date to its public internet domain to enable customers to make an informed decision about electric generation supply options.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 61]

Fishing; Seasons, Sizes and Creel Limits

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 61 (relating to seasons, sizes and creel limits). The Commission is publishing this proposed rule-making under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect on January 1, 2011.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments to §§ 61.1—61.3 (relating to Commonwealth inland waters; Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary; and Pymatuning Reservoir) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purposes of the proposed amendments are described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. Summary of Proposal

Because mussels, sometimes referred to as clams in slang, have declined greatly in their populations and their ranges both Nationally and within this Commonwealth, the conservation of mussels faces many challenges. Nearly 82% (54 species) of this Commonwealth's native mussels are considered endangered, extirpated or of special concern (PABS 2008). Nationally, mussels are declining; 70% of the 297 native species have an endangered, threatened, special concern or extinct status (Williams and Neves, 1995).

Under section §§ 61.1(d) and 61.2(d), harvest of up to 50 fish bait is permitted per day without seasons or size limits. Inland seasons, sizes and creel limits for fish bait apply to the Susquehanna and Lehigh Rivers under §§ 61.7 and 61.8 (relating to Susquehanna River and tributaries; and Lehigh River, Schuylkill River and tributaries). Under § 61.3(c), there are not season, size or creel restrictions on fish bait. Section 102 of the code (relating to definitions) defines "fish bait" as "[u]nless otherwise provided by commission regulation, crayfish or crabs, mussels, clams and the nymphs, larvae and pupae of all insects spending any part of their life cycle in the water."

Harvest of endangered and threatened mussels is prohibited under §§ 75.1 and 75.2 (relating to endangered species; and threatened species). Since mussels as a group are severely threatened, additional reduction of mussel populations by harvest as fish bait should be prohibited. Specifically, with the existing laws, the Commission is concerned that:

- (1) Rare species will be harvested because they are difficult to identify correctly. Unless mussels are prohibited from bait use, anglers or other collectors could inadvertently collect rare or protected species. Additionally, enforcement of laws prohibiting harvest of protected species will not be effective if the Commission's waterways conservation officers are not well trained in the identification of mussels.
- (2) Commercial pressure for mussel harvest for the pearl industry could decimate populations. Mussel shells are collected and pieces of nacre are used to seed pearl-producing oysters. At this time, a commercial harvester can legally take large quantities of mussels, remov-

ing many thousands of pounds of mussels a year. With a legal limit of 50 mussels per day and no season, 10 commercial collectors could legally take 500 mussels per day (182,500 mussels per year) as fishbait under existing Commission regulations. Commercial mussel poachers have been convicted for illegal harvest in West Virginia, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and in the southeastern United States. By prohibiting a legal possession limit of mussels as fishbait, the Commonwealth can better protect its mussel resource.

(3) The transportation of aquatic invasive mussels could result in the introduction to additional waterways. Discharged zebra mussel and quagga mussels used for bait present significant risk for invasive mussel infestation. Although it is unlawful to possess the exotic zebra mussel and the closely related quagga mussel, they may be inadvertently transported to otherwise uninfested waters as fishbait.

The Pennsylvania Biological Survey's Bivalve Subcommittee and the Mollusk Committee have requested that the current mussel harvest with a Pennsylvania fishing license be disallowed. Other states, such as West Virginia, Ohio, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Indiana and Illinois, have laws making mussel harvest illegal.

For these reasons, the Commission proposes to prohibit the harvest of live mussels by amending §§ 61.1—61.3 to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed rulemaking will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public, except to the degree there is commercial harvest of mussels in the Commonwealth.

H. Public Comments







DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION

Meeting and Public Hearing

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold an informal conference followed by a public hearing on Wednesday, July 14, 2010. The hearing will be part of the Commission's regular business meeting. Both the conference session and business meeting are open to the public and will be held at the West Trenton Volunteer Fire Company, located at 40 West Upper Ferry Road, West Trenton, NJ.

The conference among the commissioners and staff will begin at 10:30 a.m. and will consist of a presentation on the pass-by flow study being conducted by the Susquehanna River Basin Commission in partnership with The Nature Conservancy and a presentation by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service on the Delaware River Dwarf Wedgemussel Habitat Study.

The subjects of the public hearing to be held during the 1:30 p.m. business meeting include the dockets listed follows:

- 1. City of Burlington, D-1973-046 CP-2. An application for a surface water withdrawal (SWWD) project to reduce the total system allocation from 120 million gallons per month (mgm) to 80 mgm from existing Intakes Nos. 2 and 3. The project is located in the Delaware River Watershed in the City of Burlington, Burlington County, NJ.
- 2. Town of Bethe—Kauneonga Lake, D-1974-196 CP-2. An application for the approval of an existing 0.6 million gallons per day (mgd) discharge from the Kauneonga Lake WWTP. The Kauneonga Lake WWTP discharges to the Delaware River at River Mile 261.10—16.21—5.43 (Delaware River—Mongaup River—White Lake Brook) and is located in the Town of Bethel, Sullivan County, NY. The project is located within the drainage area of the section of the Delaware River known as the Upper Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters.
- 3. Pottstown Borough Authority, D-1989-055 CP-2. An application for the renewal of an existing 12.85 mgd discharge from Outfall No. 001. Additionally, the applicant has requested a Total Dissolved Solids (TDS) Determination, which is required for any discharge of more than 1,000 mg/l (the basin-wide monthly average effluent limit). The monthly average and daily maximum TDS effluent limit concentrations requested are 2,235 mg/l and 3,000 mg/l, respectively. The project will continue to discharge to the Schuylkill River at River Mile 92.47—51.3 (Delaware River—Schuylkill River) in the Borough of Pottstown, Montgomery County, PA.
- 4. Honey Brook Borough Authority, D-1991-099 CP-2. An application for renewal of an existing groundwater withdrawal project to continue to supply up to 12 mgm of water to the applicant's public water supply system from existing Wells Nos. 5—8. The project wells are completed in Precambrian-gneiss. The project is located in the West

Branch Brandywine Creek Watershed in Honeybrook Township, Chester County, PA.

- 5. Hamburg Municipal Authority, D-1992-073 CP-3. An application for approval of the Hamburg Municipal Authority WWTP. The project WWTP was approved by the Commission Docket No. D-1992-73 CP-2 on March 1, 2006; however, the docket expired on September 30, 2009. The project WWTP will continue to discharge 1.5 mgd of treated sewage effluent to the Schuylkill River. The facility is located in the Borough of Hamburg, Berks County, PA.
- 6. Hatfield Quality Meats, LLC, D-1999-072-2. An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal to supply up to 20.57 mgm of water to the docket holder's meat processing system from Wells Nos. H-1, H-3, H-4, H-8, H-10, and H-12. No increase in the current allocation is proposed. The six project wells are constructed in the Brunswick Formation. The project is located in the Upper Reach Skippack Creek Watershed in Hatfield Township, Montgomery County, PA and is located in the Southeastern Pennsylvania Ground Water Protected Area.
- 7. Borough of Dublin, D-2000-011 CP-2. An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal to continue the withdrawal of up to 7.13 mgm to supply the docket holder's public water supply from existing Wells Nos. 1—3 and 5 in the Lockatong Formation and Brunswick Group. The project is located in the East Branch Perkiomen—Morris Run and Tohickon Deep Run watersheds in the Borough of Dublin, Bucks County, PA, within the Southeastern Pennsylvania Ground Water Protected Area.
- 8. United Mobile Homes, D-2005-003-2. An application for approval to continue discharging 79,500 gallons per day (gpd) of treated effluent from the Kinnebrook WWTP. The WWTP is located at River Mile 261.1—16.0—3.62—1.17 (Delaware River—Mongaup River—Kinne Brook—Unnamed Tributary). The facility discharges to an unnamed tributary of Kinne Brook, and is located in the drainage area of the section of the nontidal Delaware River known as the Upper Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters. The project is located in the Town of Thompson, Sullivan County, NY.
- 9. Camp Ramah in the Poconos, D-2005-030-2. An application for approval of the Camp Ramah in the Poconos WWTP. The project WWTP was approved by the Commission Docket No. D-2005-030-001 on March 1, 2006; however, the docket expired on April 30, 2007. The project WWTP will continue to discharge 30,000 gpd of treated sewage effluent to an unnamed tributary of the Equinunk Creek, which is a tributary of the Delaware River. The facility is located in Buckingham Township, Wayne County, PA, and is located within the drainage area of the section of the nontidal Delaware River known as the Upper Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters.
- 10. Lehigh County Authority, D-2010-001 CP-1. An application for approval of the existing 0.06 mgd Wynnewood Terrace WWTP. The Wynnewood Terrace WWTP discharges to the Lehigh River at River Mile 183.66—28.14 (Delaware River—Lehigh River) and is located in North Whitehall Township, Lehigh County, PA within the drainage area of the section of the nontidal Delaware

River known as the Lower Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters.

- 11. Lynn Township Sewer Authority, D-1977-041 CP-2. An application for approval of an expansion of the existing Lynn Township Sewer Authority WWTP. The 0.08 mgd WWTP will be expanded to treat an average annual daily flow rate of 0.16 mgd. The WWTP will continue to discharge to Ontelaunee Creek, which is a tributary of the Schuylkill River. The facility is located in Lynn Township, Lehigh County, PA.
- 12. Upper Gwynedd Township, D-1991-088 CP-5. An application for approval of the modification of the Upper Gwynedd Township Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP). The docket holder proposes to replace the current disinfection system (chlorine contact tanks) with an ultraviolet light (UV) disinfection system. The WWTP will continue to treat an average annual flow of 5.7 mgd and discharge treated sewage effluent to the Wissahickon Creek, a tributary of the Schuylkill River. The facility is located in Upper Gwynedd Township, Montgomery County, PA.
- 13. Borough of Bally, D-1994-044 CP-2. An application for approval to increase the discharge from the Bally WWTP from 0.2 mgd to 0.5 mgd. Docket No. D-1994-044 CP-1 approved the construction of a 0.5 mgd WWTP but limited the discharge to 0.2 mgd. In 1996—the Borough of Bally Municipal Authority obtained PADEP approval to discharge at the WWTP design flow of 0.5 mgd. The Borough now seeks the Commission's approval for the larger discharge. In addition, the Borough of Bally has requested that the Commission issue a Transfer of Ownership to record that the Borough and not the Municipal Authority (which no longer exists) currently owns the facility. The Bally WWTP will continue to discharge to the West Branch of the Perkiomen Creek at River Mile 92.47—32.08—18.65—5.20—3.55 (Delaware River— Schuylkill River-Perkiomen Creek-Green Lane Reservoir-West Branch Perkiomen Creek) and is located in Washington Township, Berks County, PA.
- 14. Lyons Borough Municipal Authority, D-1994-080 CP-2. An application for approval to expand and upgrade the Lyons Borough Municipal Authority WWTP from 0.2 mgd to 0.3 mgd. Modifications will include phosphorous removal by chemical precipitation, effluent filtering, and replacement of the existing gas chlorination system with UV disinfection. The increase in annual average flow is proposed to treat additional industrial process water from East Penn Manufacturing Company, an existing industrial wastewater discharger to the WWTP. The WWTP will continue to discharge to Saucony Creek, a tributary of Maiden Creek, which is a tributary of the Schuylkill River. The project is located in the Borough of Lyons, Berks County, PA.
- 15. Plumstead Township, D-1997-033 CP-3. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal to supply up to 4.1 mgm of water to the docket holder's public water supply system from new Well No. 6 and to retain the existing withdrawal limit for all wells of 15.82 mgm. The project wells are located in the Brunswick Group, Lockatong Formation and Stockton Formation in Plumstead Township, Bucks County, PA. The project wells are in the following subbasins of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Ground Water Protected Area: Tohickon-Geddes-Cabin Runs, Pine Run, and North Branch Neshaminy Creek.

16. Superior Water Company, D-2001-015 CP-2. An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal, consolidation of one docket and two GWPA permits, and to increase the withdrawal from all wells from 23.4 million gallons per 30 days (mg/30 days) to 36.82 mgm of water to the docket holder's distribution system. The increased allocation is requested in order to meet projected increases in service area demand. The ten project wells are constructed in the Brunswick, Lockatong and Leithsville Formations. The project is located in the Zacharias Creek, Scioto Creek and Minister Creek watersheds in Upper Frederick, Douglass, New Hanover, and Worcester Townships in Montgomery County, PA within the Southeastern Pennsylvania Ground Water Protected Area.

- 17. Tidewater Utilities, Inc.—Camden District, D-2004-024 CP-3. An application for modification of an existing groundwater withdrawal project to include new Wells Nos. 222367 and 178898 completed in the Cheswold and Frederica aquifers, respectively. No increase is proposed in the previous allocation of 88.977 mg/30 days. The wells were installed to meet projected increases in service area demand. The project is located in the Saint Jones River Watershed in Dover West Township, Kent County, DE.
- 18. Borough of Freeland Municipal Authority, D-1965-052 CP-3. An application for approval of an expansion of the existing borough of Freeland Municipal Authority Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) from 0.75 mgd to 1.2 mgd and to replace the existing trickling filter treatment system with a conventional activated sludge treatment process. The WWTP will continue to discharge to Pond Creek, a tributary of Sandy Run, which is a tributary of the Lehigh River. The project WWTP is located within the drainage area of the section of the nontidal Delaware River known as the Lower Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters. The facility is located in Foster Township, Luzerne County, PA.
- 19. East Vincent Municipal Authority, D-2005-007 CP-1. An application to rerate a 48,800 gpd sewage treatment plant (STP) to process a maximum monthly flow of 52,900 gpd, while continuing to provide tertiary treatment. The project will continue to serve flows from the built-out residential development known as Bartons Meadows in East Vincent Township, Chester County, PA. The additional 4,000 gpd is needed to handle wet weather related flows due to inflow and infiltration. Following ultraviolet light disinfection, STP effluent will continue to be discharged to subsurface seepage beds in the drainage area of French Creek, which is designated as a Scenic River in the Commission Comprehensive Plan. The project is located in the Schuylkill River Watershed within the Southeastern Pennsylvania Ground Water Protected Area, off Sheeder Road just north of its intersection with Pughtown Road.
- 20. Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division, Ship Systems Engineering Station D-2009-003-1. An application for approval of a surface water withdrawal of 1,100.24 mg/30 days from an existing surface water intake. The existing Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division, Ship Systems Engineering Station currently withdraws surface water from the Philadelphia U.S. Naval Shipyard Reserve Basin located on the Schuylkill River immediately upstream of the confluence

of the Schuylkill River with the Delaware River. The surface water withdrawal is used for noncontact cooling water. The facility is located in the City of Philadelphia, Philadelphia County, PA.

- 21. Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division, Ship Systems Engineering Station, D-2009-004-1. An application for approval of a noncontact cooling water (NCCW) discharge from two existing (2) outfalls owned and operated by Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division, Ship Systems Engineering Station (NSWCCD-SSES): 1) Outfall 001 is located on the Navy Reserve Basin, and the application includes increasing the discharge of NCCW from 24.0 mgd to 36.0 mgd; and 2) Outfall 005 is located on the Delaware River in Water Quality Zone 4 and will continue to discharge up to 0.60 mgd. The Navy Reserve Basin is located on the Schuylkill River immediately upstream of its confluence with the Delaware River. The facility is located in the Schuylkill River Watershed in the City of Philadelphia, Philadelphia County, PA.
- 22. Deb-El Food Products, D-2009-036-1. An application for approval to construct a 0.05 mgd industrial waste treatment plant (IWTP) that will discharge to the Neversink River at River Mile 253.64—28.7 (Delaware River—Neversink River) in the drainage area of the section of the non-tidal Delaware River known as the Middle Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters. The IWTP is located in the Town of Thompson, Sullivan County, NY.
- 23. ArcelorMittal Plate, LLC—Conshohocken, D-2009-039-1. An application for approval of a groundwater and surface water withdrawal project to supply up to 13.4 mgm of groundwater and 46.5 mgm of surface water to the applicant's industrial process from the existing Q&T Well and existing surface water intake. Surface water will be withdrawn from the Schuylkill River in the Schuylkill-Crow Creek Watershed. The well is located in the Elbrook Formation in the Schuylkill-Crow Creek Watershed in Plymouth Township, Montgomery County, PA in the Southeastern Pennsylvania Ground Water Protected Area.
- 24. Wallenpaupack Area School District, D-2009-027 CP. An application for approval of the existing Newfoundland Elementary School WWTP. The WWTP will continue to discharge an average annual flow of 0.01 mgd of treated sewage effluent to Wallenpaupack Creek, a tributary of the Lackawaxen River. The facility is located in Dreher Township, Wayne County, PA, within the drainage area of the section of the nontidal Delaware River known as the Upper Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters.
- 25. Green Top Management, LLC, D-2010-002 CP-1. An application for approval of an expansion of the Green Top Mobile Home Park WWTP from 12,000 gpd to 18,000 gpd. The expansion includes the addition of a sequencing batch reactor unit. The WWTP will continue to discharge to an unnamed tributary of the Tohickon Creek, which is located upstream of Lake Nockamixon. The project is located within the drainage area of the section of the nontidal Delaware River known as the Lower Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters. The facility is located in West Rockhill Township, Bucks County, PA.
- 26. NIS Hollow Estates, LLC, D-2010-003 CP-1. An application for approval of the existing NIS Hollow Estates, LLC WWTP. The WWTP will continue to discharge 18,000 gpd of treated sewage effluent to an

unnamed tributary of the Lehigh River. The facility is located in East Penn Township, Carbon County, PA, within the drainage area of the section of the nontidal Delaware River known as the Lower Delaware, which is classified as Special Protection Waters.

In addition to the standard business meeting items, including adoption of the Minutes of the Commission's May 5, 2010, business meeting; announcements of upcoming meetings and events; a report on hydrologic conditions; and reports by the Executive Director and the Commission's General Counsel; the business meeting will include public hearings and consideration by the Commission of resolutions: (a) approving the Commission's Fiscal Year 2010-2015 Water Resources Program; (b) authorizing the Executive Director to require effluent nutrient monitoring by point source dischargers in Zones 2 through 6 of the Delaware Estuary; and (c) authorizing the Executive Director to enter into a contract for laboratory analysis of soil and water samples in connection with the control of polychlorinated biphenyls in the Delaware Estuary. The section of the meeting consisting of the General Counsel's report will include consideration by the Commission of two requests for hearing filed with the Commission in May 2010—one by Damascus Citizens for Sustainability concerning the applicability of the Commission's section 3.8 project review procedure to certain exploratory natural gas well projects sponsored by Newfield-Appalachia PA, LLC; and the other, jointly by the Delaware Riverkeeper Network and Nockamixon Township concerning the applicability of the Section 3.8 review procedure to the Cabot No. 2 natural gas well project sponsored by Arbor Operating, LLC in Nockamixon Township. The Commissioners also will consider draft water withdrawal Docket No. D-2009-013-1 for the Stone Energy Corporation, on which a hearing was conducted on February 24, 2010, and for which the written comment period opened on February 8, 2010, and closed on April 12, 2010. No additional testimony on the latter project will be accepted. An opportunity for public dialogue will be provided at the end of the meeting.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before an application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release

of a regulated substance at a site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. When a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) number is listed, the mining activity permit application was accompanied by an application for an individual NPDES permit. The Department has made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the mining activity permit, but the issuance of the NPDES permit is contingent upon the approval of the associated mining activity permit.

The Department further agrees that Conestoga may develop the waste disposal area for cell 26 to the limits of the cell boundary for this cell as shown in drawing BFI-345E046RI, Sheet 16 of 26 dated July 17, 2002, in the application for the Expansion Permit if Conestoga can establish that the Permeability Design, after implementation, hits a target prelining enhanced flow rate at an agreed upon discharge point, as established with 12 months of verified, consecutive weekly monitoring at the discharge point.

Approved Prearrest and Evidential Breath Testing Devices

The Department of Health (Department) has statutory authority to approve both prearrest and evidential breath testing devices for use by law enforcement officials to determine the alcohol content of blood by analysis of a person's breath. This notice contains the combined lists of prearrest breath testing devices and evidential breath testing devices.

The Department approves prearrest breath testing devices as required by 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.101—5.104 (relat-

ing to equipment to determine blood alcohol content under the Vehicle Code and the Fish and Boat Code). Authority to promulgate these regulations is contained in the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(k) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(k) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance), the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502(j) (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol) and section 2102(g) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 532(g)).

Prearrest breath testing devices approved under this authority may be used by police officers, waterways patrolmen and officers enforcing the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code in conducting preliminary determinations of the alcohol content of blood of persons suspected of driving, boating, hunting or furtaking, while under the influence of alcohol. Officers and patrolmen use these devices to assist them in determining whether or not a person should be placed under arrest for violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), for violation of 30 Pa.C.S. § 5502 (relating to operating watercraft under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), for violation of 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 (relating to hunting or furtaking prohibited while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), or for any other criminal offense under the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code, or the Game and Wildlife Code, which involves operating a vehicle or boat, hunting or furtaking while under the influence of alcohol.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) of the United States Department of Transportation published model specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids at 59 FR 39382 (August 2, 1994). These specifications established performance criteria and methods for testing alcohol screening devices using either breath or bodily fluids, such as saliva to measure blood alcohol content. NHTSA established these specifications to support state laws and the Federal Department of Transportation's workplace alcohol testing program. The Department has elected to use the NHTSA criteria for approving devices for the prearrest testing of a person's breath to determine the alcohol content of the person's blood.

NHTSA published a conforming products list of alcohol screening devices at 72 FR 4559 (January 31, 2007). The breath testing devices included in this Federal approval list have been incorporated into the list in this notice. Since this notice lists only those devices which test breath, items on the NHTSA list that test saliva or other bodily fluids are not included in this notice.

Additionally, there are a number of breath testing devices on this list of approved equipment that may be used as both prearrest and evidential testing devices. Any device on this list that was evaluated using the 1993 Model Specifications for Evidential Breath Testers (58 FR 48705) also fully meets the requirements of the Model Specifications for prearrest screening devices. Both procedures evaluate the performance of instruments at the 0.020% alcohol level.

The Department approves evidential breath testing devices under the authority of 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(1), 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(1), and 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502(c).

Evidential breath testing devices approved under this notice may be used by law enforcement officials to obtain

test results which will be admissible in evidence in any summary or criminal proceeding in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802, or any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action; or 30 Pa.C.S. § 5502, or any other violation of the Fish and Boat Code arising out of the same action; or 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501, or any other violation of the Game and Wildlife Code arising out of the same action. Law enforcement agencies should determine that an approved training program in the use of the equipment is available in accordance with the previously referenced statutes before purchasing any of the devices contained on this list.

The approval of evidential equipment listed in this notice is based on the evaluation of the equipment by NHTSA. Equipment which met the Federal requirements was published at 75 FR 11624 (March 1, 2010) as a Conforming Products List. The list contained in this notice is based on NHTSA's Conforming Products Lists.

Instruments marked with an asterisk (*) meet the Model Specifications detailed in 49 FR 48854 (December 14, 1984) (that is, instruments tested at breath alcohol concentrations of 0.000, 0.050, 0.101 and 0.151 grams of alcohol per 210 liters of air). Instruments not marked with an asterisk meet the Model Specifications detailed in 58 FR 48705 (September 17, 1993), and were tested at breath alcohol concentrations of 0.000, 0.020, 0.040, 0.080 and 0.160 grams of alcohol per 210 liters of air. The amended specifications that were published on September 17, 1993, added a test for the presence of acetone and other low molecular weight alcohols including methyl and isopropyl. Instruments whose precision and accuracy have been evaluated in the latter concentration range (that is, devices not marked with an asterisk) should be used when reliable results are required at blood alcohol concentrations below 0.050%.

NHTSA also evaluates equipment to determine if it must be operated at fixed locations (that is, nonmobile equipment) or can be transported to nonfixed operational sites in the field (mobile equipment). Most equipment on the list is approved for mobile and nonmobile operation. The listing at the end of this notice specifies nonmobile equipment only.

The instruments not marked with an asterisk meet the specifications for use as prearrest or evidentiary breath testing devices. The instruments marked with an asterisk may be used as evidentiary devices for law enforcement purposes that are concerned with blood alcohol concentrations at or above 0.050%. These instruments may also be used as prearrest breath testing devices if they are approved for mobile operations. However, these instruments may not be used for making arrests under the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code or the Game and Wildlife Code where blood alcohol concentrations below 0.050% must be determined. Nonmobile devices can only be used as evidentiary testing instruments since they are not portable. Before purchasing breath testing devices, law enforcement officials should consult with the manufacturer of the equipment they intend to purchase to verify that the devices can be used for their intended purposes.

Law enforcement agencies that plan to utilize a device which does not appear on the following list should contact the manufacturer of the equipment to verify that it has been evaluated by NHTSA and found to meet NHTSA's performance requirements. If a device is approved by NHTSA after the date of this publication, the manufacturer of the device will need to forward documentation of NHTSA acceptability to Dr. M. Jeffery Shoemaker at the

address given; so that the Department has information sufficient to enable it to include the device in the next revision of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Some of the devices included in this notice are listed under the name of more than one manufacturer. This is due to the fact that the name of the manufacturer has changed or the right to produce a device has been transferred to a different company. In such instances, the device is listed under the name of every company that was ever associated with the device to allow law enforcement agencies to continue using devices bearing the name of a previous manufacturer.

To facilitate accessibility to information concerning breath alcohol testing devices which are approved for law enforcement purposes in the Commonwealth, the Department will publish revisions of this list of equipment semiannually as notices in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. This practice was implemented in 2009 and will proceed even if an updated conforming products list has not appeared in the *Federal Register* since the Department's last annual publication of approved breath testing devices.

Laboratories Approved to Determine Analyses of Blood and/or Serum for Controlled Substances under the Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code, and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151-2165) and/or the Federal Clinical Laboratories Improvement Act of 1967 (42 U.S.C.A. § 263a) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood and/or serum for the determination of controlled substances. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances or their biotransformation products in blood and/or serum.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening and/or confirmatory analyses on blood and/or serum. Laboratories approved to perform screening analyses are designated on the approval list by an "S" followed by the letters "B" for blood and/or "Se" for serum. Laboratories approved to screen both blood and serum would therefore have "SBSe" listed after their laboratory name. Laboratories approved to offer confirmatory analyses are designated on the approval list by a "C" followed by the letters "B" for blood and/or "Se" for serum. Laboratories approved to perform confirmatory analyses on both serum and blood would therefore have "CBSe" listed after their laboratory name.

Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic blood and/or serum analysis services from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for medicolegal purposes. They should also determine that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing analyses for forensic purposes. Persons seeking the analyses are responsible for specifying the extent to which the presence of a controlled substance is to be verified. That specification should be predicated upon the purpose for which the analysis is being sought.

The Vehicle Code contains a provision in 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) that permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence at legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide these services. This section states that the test results may be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of section 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed by the state in which

the facility is located and licensed under the Federal Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (Pub. L. No. 100-578, 102 Stat. 2903). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code in 30 Pa.C.S. $\S~5125(c)(3)(ii)$.

The name or location of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name or location of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

Laboratories Approved to Determine Blood Alcohol Content under the Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code, and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.50 and 5.103 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services; and blood tests for blood alcohol content) to perform alcohol analyses of blood and/or serum and plasma. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories.

Since procedures for determining the alcohol content of serum and plasma are identical and results obtained from serum or plasma derived from a blood sample are the same, laboratories that demonstrate reliability in the determination of alcohol in serum are approved to analyze both serum and plasma for alcohol content. These laboratories are also approved and designated under the provisions of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 (relating to hunting or furtaking prohibited while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) as qualified to perform the types of specialized services which will reflect the presence of

alcohol in blood and/or serum and plasma. Laboratories located outside this Commonwealth may not provide blood and/or serum and plasma alcohol testing services in this Commonwealth unless they are licensed by the Department and approved for that purpose.

Persons seeking forensic blood and/or serum and plasma analysis services from the following designated laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for forensic purposes, and that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing determinations for this purpose. The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semi-annually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The name or location of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name or location of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The Department's blood alcohol and serum/plasma alcohol proficiency testing programs are approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services in accordance with the requirements contained in the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 U.S.C. § 263a), and implementing regulations 42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937, which are administered by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Participation in these programs may therefore be used to demonstrate acceptable performance for approval purposes under both Federal and Commonwealth statutes.

L. No. 100-578, 102 Stat. 2903). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code in 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

Laboratories Approved to Determine Urine Controlled Substance Content under the Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code, and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of urine for the determination of controlled substances or their biotransformation prod-

This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances or their biotransformation products in urine.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening and/or confirmatory urine drug analyses. Laboratories approved to perform screening tests only are designated on the approval list by an "S" after the laboratory's name. Laboratories approved to perform confirmatory testing only are designated by a "C" following the laboratory's name. Those approved to perform both screening and confirmatory analyses are designated by the letters "SC." Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic urine drug analysis services from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose. They should also determine that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing analyses for that purpose. Persons seeking the analyses are responsible for specifying the extent to which the presence of a controlled substance is to be verified. That specification should be predicated upon the purpose for which the analysis is being sought. The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The Commonwealth's Vehicle Code contains a provision in 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) that permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence at legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide these services. This section states that the test results may be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of section 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or any other violation of that title arising out of the same action if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed by the state in which the facility is located and licensed under the Federal Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (Pub. L. No. 100-5768, 102 Stat. 2903). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code in 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

The name or location of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name or location of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

Laboratories Approved to Perform Blood Lead and/or Erythrocyte Protoporphyrin Determinations under the Clinical Laboratory Act

The following laboratories are licensed in accordance with the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P. S. §§ 2151—2165), and are currently approved under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood for lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin content. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic evaluations conducted by the Bureau of Laboratories of the Department of Health (Department).

Lead poisoning is a reportable noncommunicable disease. Approved laboratories which offer blood lead testing services are required to inform the Department of actual or possible incidents of this condition in accordance with 28 Pa. Code § 27.34 (relating to reporting cases of lead poisoning). These regulations specify the following requirements for reporting by clinical laboratories:

- (1) A clinical laboratory shall report all blood lead test results on both venous and capillary specimens for persons under 16 years of age to the Department's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program, Division of Maternal and Child Health, Bureau of Family Health.
- (2) A clinical laboratory shall report an elevated blood lead level in a person 16 years of age or older to the Department's Division of Environmental Health Epidemiology, Bureau of Epidemiology or to other locations as designated by the Department. An elevated blood lead level is defined by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH). As of January 26, 2002, NIOSH defines an elevated blood lead level as a venous blood lead level of 25 micrograms per deciliter (µg/dL) or higher. The Department will publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* any NIOSH update of the definition within 30 days of NIOSH's notification to the Department.
- (3) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests of 100 or more specimens per month shall submit results electronically in a format specified by the Department.
- (4) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests of less than 100 blood lead specimens per month shall submit results either electronically or by hard copy in the format specified by the Department.
- (5) A laboratory which performs blood lead tests on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be licensed as a clinical laboratory and shall be specifically approved by the Department to conduct those tests.
- (6) Blood lead analyses requested for occupational health purposes on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be performed only by laboratories which are licensed and approved as specified in paragraph (5), and which are also approved by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration of the United States Department of Labor under 29 CFR 1910.1025(j)(2)(iii) (relating to lead).
- (7) A clinical laboratory shall complete a blood lead test within 5 work days of the receipt of the blood specimen and shall submit the case report to the Department by the close of business of the next work day after the day on which the test was performed. The clinical laboratory shall submit a report of lead poisoning using either the hardcopy form or electronic transmission format specified by the Department.
- (8) When a clinical laboratory receives a blood specimen without all of the information required for reporting purposes, the clinical laboratory shall test the specimen and shall submit the incomplete report to the Department

Erythrocyte protoporphyrin determinations may be performed as an adjunct determination to substantiate blood lead levels of 25 micrograms per deciliter or higher. Since erythrocyte protoporphyrin concentrations may not increase as a result of low-level exposures to lead, direct blood lead analysis is the only reliable method for identifying individuals with blood lead concentrations below 25 micrograms per deciliter.

Persons seeking blood lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin analyses should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose for which the analyses are sought. Laboratories offering blood lead analysis only are designated with the letter "L" following the name of the laboratory. Those offering erythrocyte protoporphyrin analysis only are designated with the letter "P." Laboratories offering both services are designated with the letters "LP."

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The name or location of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name or location of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The Department's blood lead proficiency testing program is approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in accordance with the requirements contained in the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937) which are administered by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Participation in these programs may therefore be used to demonstrate acceptable performance for approval purposes under both Federal and Commonwealth statutes.

Designated Exceptional Durable Medical Equipment

Purpose of Notice

In accordance with the Department of Public Welfare's (Department) currently approved State Plan the Department is required to publish an annual list of exceptional durable medical equipment (DME) by notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in July of each year. Interested persons may petition the Department to consider additions to the exceptional DME list by submitting a written request to the Department. Requests received on or before December 31 will be considered in developing the list for the following July.

During calendar year 2009, the Department received no written requests to add or remove items of DME from the list of exceptional DME. Therefore, this notice makes no changes in either the acquisition cost or the list of qualifying DME.

"Exceptional DME" is defined as DME that has an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more and is either Specially Adapted DME or other DME that is designated as Exceptional DME by the Department annually by notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

"Specially Adapted DME" is DME that is uniquely constructed or substantially adapted or modified in accordance with the written orders of a physician for the particular use of one resident, making its contemporaneous use by another resident unsuitable.

The list of Exceptional DME that has been designated by the Department is as follows:

- (1) Air fluidized beds. The pressure relief provided by this therapy uses a high rate of airflow to fluidize fine particulate material (for example, beads or sand) to produce a support medium that has characteristics similar to liquid. May have a Gortex cover.
- (2) Powered air flotation bed (low air loss therapy). A semi-electric or total electric bed with a fully integrated powered pressure-reducing mattress which is characterized by all of the following:
- (a) An air pump or blower with a series of interconnected woven fabric air pillows which provides sequential inflation and deflation of the air cells or a low interface pressure throughout the mattress allowing some air to escape through the support surface to the resident. May have a Gortex cover;
- (b) Inflated cell height of the air cells through which air is being circulated is 5 inches or greater;
- (c) Height of the air chambers, proximity of the air chambers to one another, frequency of air cycling (for alternating pressure mattresses), and air pressure provide adequate patient lift, reducing pressure and prevent bottoming out;
 - (d) A surface designed to reduce friction and shear;
 - (e) May be placed directly on a hospital bed frame; and
- (f) Automatically readjusts inflation pressures with change in position of bed (for example, head elevation, and the like).

(3) Augmentative communication devices. Used by residents who are unable to use natural oral speech as a primary means of communication. The specific device requested must be appropriate for use by the resident and the resident must demonstrate the abilities or potential abilities to use the device selected. Portable devices need to supplement, aid or serve as an alternative to natural speech for residents with severe expressive communication disorders. Nonportable devices may be covered only if required for visual enhancement or physical access needs that cannot be accommodated by a portable device.

- (4) Ventilators (and related supplies).
- (a) Used by residents 21 years of age and older who require full ventilator support for a minimum of 8 hours per day to sustain life.
- (b) Used by residents 20 years of age and younger who require ventilator support to sustain life (no minimum time requirement).

Effective Date

This notice is effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Method of Filing Annual Notice for the Tax Year Beginning on or After January 1, 2010

Under the provisions of section 10 of the Fiscal Code (72 P. ENVIRONMENTAL HEARING BOARD

Cumberland Coal Resources, LP v. DEP; Doc. No. 2009-103-L

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and Cumberland Coal Resources, LP (Cumberland) have agreed to a settlement of the previous matter.

The parties have agreed to a settlement, the major provisions of which provide for a revision to Coal Mining Activity Permit (CMAP) 30831303 and associated National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit (NPDES Permit) PA 0013511. As set forth in the settlement, Cumberland has agreed not to appeal from the final issuance of the Amended CMAP.

Cumberland operates the Cumberland Mine located in Whiteley Township, Greene County. On June 30, 2009, the Department issued a CMAP to Cumberland authorizing the company to discharge storm water adjacent to a new bleeder shaft by means of Outfall 032 into an unnamed tributary of Turkey Hollow Run.

The original CMAP and NPDES Permit included limitations for certain parameters that are associated with the mining of coal. Upon review of the permit, during the pendency of the appeal, the Department realized that the discharge from the site is associated with stormwater runoff from first a construction site and, now, a vegetated area surrounding a bleeder shaft. The company has represented that the stormwater will not come into contact with coal before discharge. To verify this representation but to recognize the nature of the discharge, the Department has modified the effluent limitations from numerical limitations to a monitor and report requirement.

This regulation establishes procedures, requirements and standards for effluent limits for wastewater discharges of high total dissolved solids (TDS). Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act—Guidance for Compliance Filings; Notice No. 2010-07

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act was enacted by the United States Congress and signed into law by the President on March 23, 2010, and the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act was enacted by the United States Congress and signed into law by the President on March 30, 2010 (hereinafter collectively referred to as the PPACA). The PPACA sets forth immediate market reform requirements (for plan years beginning on or after September 23, 2010) for health insurance product forms for individual, small group, and large

group health benefit plans that provide "major medical" coverage, which is comprehensive health coverage, including PPO and HMO coverage.

The Insurance Department (Department) provides the following guidance to insurance entities seeking to demonstrate compliance with the PPACA relative to policies offered, issued or renewed in this Commonwealth. This guidance is limited to policy forms for which an insurance entity (insurer) is not seeking to make any changes other than as necessary to make the policy form comply with the PPACA.

If an insurer is ordinarily required by the Accident and Health Filing Reform Act (act) (40 P. S. §§ 3801—3815) to file one or more policy forms with the Department for prior approval, and the insurer is not seeking to make any changes other than as necessary to make those policy forms comply with the PPACA, the Commonwealth will accept as evidence of satisfying the PPACA immediate market reform requirements a "Certification" executed by an authorized representative of the insurer substantially identical to the "Certification" form as follows as Attachment A. Attachment A is also available on the Department's web site at www.insurance.pa.gov. File a "Certification" upon completion of all necessary modifications to the applicable policy forms.

Copies of the policy forms themselves are not required to be filed.

To accommodate the immediate nature of the PPACA's market reform requirements, the policy form filings for which the "Certification" is submitted will be exempt from the prior approval filing requirements of the act. Upon submission of a "Certification" as previously set forth, the

policy forms will be presumed to comply with the immediate PPACA market reform requirements and may be used. Submit the "Certification" on or before September 10, 2010.

Subsequent policy form filings, or policy form filings containing changes beyond those required by the immediate PPACA provisions, must comply with the filing requirements of the act.

The Commonwealth does not require that the NAIC PPACA Uniform Compliance Summary form be filed for any policy form. However, insofar as it may provide guidance to the industry for purposes of assuring compliance with the PPACA, the form may be accessed on the System for Electronic Rate and Form Filing (SERFF) or on the Department's web site at www.insurance.pa.gov.

Finally, although the forms subject to this notice will not be reviewed and approved by the Department, those forms (and all forms used in this Commonwealth) remain subject to, and must comply in all respects with, the Commonwealth's insurance laws and regulations, and the Department retains its ability to take enforcement actions and seek any available remedy for noncompliant forms. An insurer will be responsible for assuring that all of its insureds are provided the full benefits provided by the PPACA.

Extension of the Fuel Cost Recovery Surcharge; R-2009-2108518, S.P. 28209

Order

By the Commission:

The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) by its Fuel Cost Recovery Surcharge Order at Special Permission Number 28209, ratified June 1, 2006, authorized call or demand, paratransit, and airport transfer carriers under the jurisdiction of this Commission to adjust rates and fares to offset significant increases in the cost of fuel. The fuel surcharge became effective on July 1, 2006, and was extended on June 24, 2008 and June 18, 2009. It is currently scheduled to terminate on June 30, 2010.

In a letter received May 28, 2010, the Pennsylvania Taxicab and Paratransit Association, on behalf of its members, have requested that this Commission extend the fuel cost recovery surcharge for a period of one year. The Association cites the concern of additional expenses to the industry as the reason for this request.

Initially, all call or demand, paratransit, and airport transfer carriers were authorized to collect the surcharge found on the Fuel Surcharge page of the Commission's website. The average price of fuel was posted on the third Friday of each month, with the effective date of the surcharge being the first day of the subsequent month. The Commission determined the average cost of unleaded regular gasoline based upon gasoline prices in the index of the Energy Information Administration of the U.S. Department of Energy. The amount of the fuel surcharge was determined by locating the average price of gasoline on a chart, also displayed on that page, and selecting the corresponding fuel surcharge in the column for the respective type of transportation.

Determination of the amounts to be charged was based on the cost of gasoline per trip. The constants used for calculations were those based upon statistics from the Taxicab, Limousine and Paratransit Association: The average trip length of 6.8 miles for call or demand carriers and 13.61 miles for paratransit and airport transfer carriers; the average miles per gallon per vehicle of 15.04 for call or demand carriers and 13.01 for paratransit and airport transfer carriers; and \$1.35 per gallon of unleaded regular gasoline (the average cost in 2002 according to Energy Information Administration of the Department of Energy). The cost per trip was calculated by multiplying the price of gasoline by the ratio of miles per trip to miles per gallon. The cost per trip at \$1.35 per gallon would serve as the base line. The results are tabulated in the chart below.

The Commission's intention was to create flexibility for both the carriers and the Commission. By establishing gasoline prices which would "trigger" a change in the surcharge, it would no longer be necessary to monitor the surcharge at different intervals. This flexibility would also aid in eliminating the need for emergency petitions, as was the case following Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

In the process of considering this request, the Commission has analyzed current information available from the Energy Information Administration of the U.S. Department of Energy, the American Automobile Association, and OPIS Energy Group. Data from these groups indicate that the retail price of gasoline will continue to increase throughout the summer months and even beyond, due to increased demand and the uncertainty of supply.

Many refineries have failed to return from unplanned outages and maintenance. Should more unplanned outages occur, there will be a significant impact on the future path of prices. Several analysts expect to see refinery maintenance remain relatively high even into June. High import volumes also play a part in keeping supplies adequate. Additionally, there remain many trouble spots across the globe that could affect the crude oil supply, prices, and gasoline prices (that is, Venezuela, Nigeria, Iran, and the like). Projections such as this indicate that the cost of gasoline will remain a problem for the transportation industry.

Based on our review, it appears that an extension of the Fuel Cost Recovery is an appropriate way to address the high costs and instability of gasoline prices at the present time. However, the industry should not continue to rely on this measure as a means of relief. Members of the industry will have the responsibility of taking appropriate measures.

After due consideration, we have determined that fuel costs are not likely to decrease. Based upon the evidence available, we are of the opinion that the passenger motor carrier industry continues to have a need for the Fuel Cost Recovery Surcharge to permit the recovery of fuel expenditures; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. The Fuel Cost Recovery Surcharge established at Special Permission No. 28209 be and is hereby extended until June 30, 2011, unless changed, cancelled, or extended by the Commission.
- 2. On the third Friday of every month, the Commission shall post on its web site at www.puc.state.pa.us/transport/motor/fuel_surcharge.aspx the average cost of unleaded regular gasoline upon which the surcharge will be determined.

3. Call or demand, paratransit, and airport transfer carriers rendering transportation service under the jurisdiction of the PA Public Utility Commission shall notify the public by placing a notice in all vehicles, which shall read: "The PA Public Utility Commission has authorized a fuel surcharge under Special Permission No. 28209. The surcharge has been extended and shall terminate on June 30, 2011. The current surcharge is (insert current charge here) per trip for each paying passenger."

- 4. The Fuel Cost Recovery Surcharge established at Special Permission No. 28209 be continued until midnight, June 30, 2011, at which time it will expire.
- 5. The Secretary of this Commission shall duly certify this order and deposit same with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
