

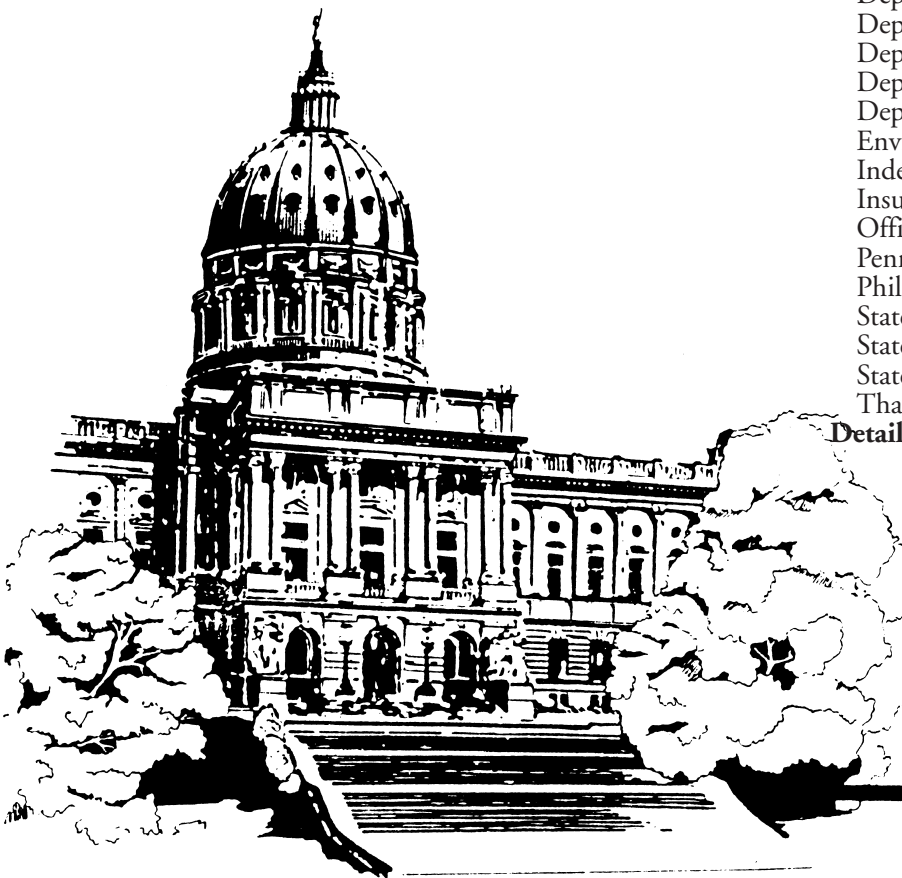

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised. A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified above for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the *Laws of Pennsylvania* are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the *Laws of Pennsylvania* to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$25.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

ADAMS COUNTY

Amendment of Rules of Criminal Procedure 105.2; Administrative Order No. 3 of 2016; 16-AO-3

Order of Court

And Now, this 17th day of February, 2016, the Court hereby Orders that Rule 105.2 of the Adams County Rules of Criminal Procedure shall be amended as follows:

Rule 105.2. Appeals.

A. [Appeals from District Justice decisions shall be listed for hearing by the Clerk for a Criminal Business Court Day at least twenty-one (21) days later than the time of filing of the docket transcript.] With the exception of appeals involving minor defendants, appeals from Magisterial District Judge decisions shall be listed for hearing by the Clerk of Courts on the first available Criminal Business Court Day at least twenty-eight (28) days later than the time of the filing of the appeal.

B. [Appeals from summary convictions by persons under the age of eighteen (18) years shall be treated the same as appeals by adults, except that either the Commonwealth or the appellant may request that the case be transferred to Juvenile Court. The Court may, either upon such request or sua sponte, order that the case be transferred and thereafter be treated as a juvenile proceeding and appellant subject to all provisions of the Juvenile Act, 42 Pa.C.S.A. § 6301 et. seq.] Appeals from summary convictions involving defendants under the age of eighteen (18) years shall be listed for hearing by the Clerk of Courts on the first Juvenile Court (DPS) Day of each month which is at least twenty-eight (28) days later than the time of the filing of the appeal. Immediately upon the filing of the appeal, the Clerk shall provide notice of the appeal and the date upon which it has been scheduled to the Department of Probation Services and the District Attorney's Office. Notice shall be provided to the defendant pursuant to local practice.

This rule amendment shall become effective after all the provisions of the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure are met, to include the following:

a. A certified copy of this order shall be submitted to the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee for review in accordance with Pa.R.Crim.P. No. 105(D);

b. Upon receipt of a statement from the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee that the local rule is not inconsistent with any general rule of the Supreme Court, two (2) certified copies of this Order together with a computer diskette that complies with the requirement of 1 Pa. Code § 13.11(b), or other compliant format, containing the test of the local rule(s) adopted hereby shall be distributed to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*;

c. One (1) certified copy of this Order shall be forwarded to the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania

Courts for distribution in accordance with the provisions of Pa.R.Crim.P. No. 105(F)(1);

d. A copy of the local rule shall be published on the Unified Judicial System's website.

e. This Order shall be filed in the Office of the Prothonotary of Adams County and a copy thereof shall be filed with the Adams County Clerk of Courts and the Adams County Law Library for inspection and copying;

f. The effective date of the local rule shall be 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Ordered and Decreed that, effective April 1, 2016, the Carbon County Court of Common Pleas *Amends* Carbon County Rules of Civil Procedure CARB.R.C.P. 1028(c) governing Preliminary Objections, Carbon County Rule of Civil Procedure CARB.R.C.P. 1034(a) governing a Motion for Judgment on the Pleadings, and Carbon County Rule of Civil Procedure CARB.R.C.P. 1035.2(a) governing a Motion for Summary Judgment.

The Carbon County District Court Administrator is *Ordered and Directed* to

1. File one (1) certified copy of this Administrative Order with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

2. File two (2) certified copies and one (1) computer diskette with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Rule 1028(c). Preliminary Objections.

1 A proposed order shall be attached to all preliminary objections.

2 The moving party shall simultaneously file a brief in support of the preliminary objections. See CARB.R.C.P. 210 for form, content of brief, service and filing requirements.

3 The adverse party shall file an answer when endorsed with a Notice to Plead.

4 If an amended pleading is not filed within twenty (20) days of service of the preliminary objections, the matter shall be decided on briefs unless the assigned Judge requests that argument be scheduled. If a party desires argument, a Praeceptum for Argument shall accompany the motion or be filed by the respondent within twenty (20) days of service of the preliminary objections. A respondent briefing schedule will be issued by the Court contemporaneous with the scheduling of argument, if so ordered by the Judge. If the matter is to be decided on briefs, a respondent briefing schedule will be issued.

5 If the Preliminary Objections raise issues of fact not of record, evidence by way of depositions or otherwise shall be filed of record to enable the objections to be properly decided.

Rule 1034(a). Motion for Judgment on the Pleadings.

1 A party moving for judgment on the pleadings shall simultaneously file with the motion a proposed order and supporting brief. If a brief is not filed with the motion, the motion shall be deemed withdrawn, without prejudice, upon motion of the opposing party. A certificate of service in conformance with Pa.R.C.P. 208.2(a)(5) shall be attached to the motion. Pa.R.C.P. 440 governs service. Service shall be required on the District Court Administrator. For form of briefs, see CARB.R.C.P. 210.

2 A response shall be filed within twenty (20) days after service of the motion.

3 If a party desires argument, a Praeceptum for Argument shall accompany the motion or response. However, the Court may dispose of any motion without oral argument.

4 A respondent briefing schedule will be issued by the Court contemporaneous with the scheduling of any argument ordered by the Judge. If the matter is to be decided on briefs, a respondent briefing schedule will be issued.

5 A party who fails to respond to the motion may be deemed to have no opposition to its grant.

6 A party who fails to file a brief shall not be permitted to argue.

Rule 1035.2(a). Motion for Summary Judgment.

1 A party moving for summary judgment shall simultaneously file with the motion a proposed order and supporting brief. If a brief is not filed with the motion, the motion shall be deemed withdrawn, without prejudice, upon motion of the opposing party. A certificate of service in conformance with Pa.R.C.P. 208.2(a)(5) shall be attached to the motion. Pa.R.C.P. 440 governs service. Service shall be required on the District Court Administrator. For form of briefs, see CARB.R.C.P. 210.

2 Any party opposing the motion shall file a response within thirty (30) days of service of the motion, together with a certificate of service evidencing service in accordance with number one above. Service shall be required on the District Court Administrator. A party who fails to

respond to the motion shall be deemed to be unopposed to the granting of the motion without contest.

3 Upon service of the motion and response on the District Court Administrator, the matter shall be decided on briefs unless the assigned Judge orders that argument be scheduled. If a party desires argument, a Praeceptum for Argument shall accompany the motion or response. However, the Court may dispose of any motion without oral argument.

4 A respondent briefing schedule will be issued by the Court contemporaneous with the scheduling of any argument ordered by the Judge or requested by the filing of the Praeceptum for Argument. If the matter is to be decided on briefs, a respondent briefing schedule will be issued.

5 A party who fails to file a brief shall not be permitted to argue.

And Now, this 24th day of February, 2016, pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 117, it is hereby

Ordered and Decreed, that effective April 1, 2016, the Carbon County Court of Common Pleas *Revises* Local Rule of Criminal Procedure CARB.R.Crim.P. 117 governing coverage for issuing warrants, conducting preliminary arraignments and summary trials and setting and accepting bail.

The Carbon County District Court Administrator is *Ordered and Directed* to do the following:

1. File one (1) certified copy of this Administrative Order with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

2. File two (2) certified copies, one (1) computer diskette and a copy of the written notification received from the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

3. Publish a copy of this Administrative Order on the Unified Judicial System's website at <http://ujportal.pacourts.us/localrules/ruleselection.aspx>.

4. Forward one (1) copy for publication in the *Carbon County Law Journal*.

5. Forward one (1) copy to the Carbon County Law Library.

6. Keep continuously available for public inspection copies of the Order in the Clerk of Courts' Office.

Rule 117. Coverage: Issuing Warrants; Preliminary Arraignments and Summary Trials; and Setting and Accepting Bail.

1. Each Magisterial District Court Office shall be open for regular business on Mondays through Fridays, excluding holidays, from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., prevailing time, which times may be modified with the approval of the President Judge to meet the needs of the public and the Court.

2. A Magisterial District Judge shall be available on-call at all times of all days without unreasonable delay to provide continuous coverage for the issuance of search warrants and arrest warrants, for the setting and acceptance of bail, and for the issuance of emergency orders under the Protection From Abuse Act, the Act of March 21, 2014, P. L. 365, No. 25 relating to the Protection of Victims of Sexual Violence or Intimidation, and the Older Adult Protective Services Act. This rule shall be satisfied by number 3 and 4 below.

3. The President Judge shall establish the schedule of assignment of Magisterial District Judges to on-call duty for availability on a rotating basis pursuant to a semi-annual/annual schedule prepared by the District Court Administrator. When a Magisterial District Judge who has jurisdiction over a particular matter is unavailable during regular business hours, authority to act is transferred to other Magisterial District Judges in the 56th Judicial District pursuant to the aforesaid assignment to on-call duty stated above.

4. Magisterial District Judges during regular business hours, an on-call Magisterial District Judge while on-call, the Clerk of Courts during business hours and the Warden, or in his absence, the Deputy Warden or Sergeant in charge of the Carbon County Correctional Facility, shall be authorized to accept bail in accordance with the provisions, and subject to the limitations of the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure.

5. A Magisterial District Judge assigned to on-call duty shall be available for preliminary arraignments in accordance with the following schedule:

A. For arrests occurring after the close of regular business hours but before 8:00 P.M., and for arrests occurring on weekends or holidays between 8:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M., the Magisterial District Judge shall respond to the call and conduct a preliminary arraignment utilizing the on-screen video arraignment connection between the police station and the Magisterial District Court prior to detention at the Carbon County Correctional Facility. Scheduling of the arraignment shall be initiated by the arresting officer contacting the Comm. Center by telephone and requesting an arraignment. Arraignments shall be scheduled whenever:

1. The defendant is arrested pursuant to a warrant, and

2. In those circumstances where an arrest has been made without a warrant and for which the defendant is to be afforded a preliminary arraignment without unnecessary delay, (See Pa.R.Crim.P. 519), after the completion of the criminal complaint.

B. For arrests occurring after 8:00 P.M. but before 8:00 A.M. on weekends or holidays, and before 8:00 A.M. on weekdays, preliminary arraignments shall be scheduled as follows:

1. For arrests pursuant to a warrant and those arrests requiring preliminary arraignment pursuant to Pennsylvania Rule of Criminal Procedure 519, the arresting agency, including the state police, municipal police or sheriff, is authorized to detain the prisoner at the Carbon County Correctional Facility until 8:00 A.M. the following morning. For Defendants so detained, the on-call Magisterial District Judge shall appear in person or by advanced communication technology at the Carbon County Correctional Facility at 8:00 A.M. to preside at the Preliminary Arraignment. The on-call Magisterial District Judge shall contact the Carbon County Correctional Facility no later than 7:30 A.M. to determine whether any Defendants are so detained.

2. Prior to detaining a prisoner at the Carbon County Correctional Facility under this Rule, the arresting agency shall contact the facility to ascertain that adequate detention facilities are available for temporary detention in accordance with this Rule. If no detention facilities are available at the facility, the arresting agency shall notify the on-call Magisterial District Judge through the Communication Center of that fact and a preliminary arraignment shall be required prior to detention or commitment to Prison.

3. The arresting agency detaining the Defendant shall provide the Magisterial District Judge with copies of the Criminal Complaint, of the Affidavit of Probable Cause in support thereof, and a copy of the Bail Information Sheet for Overnight Arraignments regarding the defendant's criminal record and flight risk, and the officer's bail recommendation, by depositing the same at the Carbon County Correctional Facility and faxing copies to the Magisterial District Court Office. The arresting agency shall be responsible to deliver or mail within twenty-four (24) hours all original documents to the Magisterial District Court office who issued the warrant or within whose jurisdiction the offense occurred.

4. The arresting officer(s) need not appear at the Preliminary Arraignment provided the documents identified in paragraph (B)(3) are provided. In the alternative, the arresting officer may appear at the Preliminary Arraignment in lieu of prior submission of these documents; however, no person shall be detained under this rule without the completion and submission of a completed criminal Complaint and Affidavit of Probable Cause. A copy shall be delivered to the Carbon County Correctional Facility and a copy faxed to the Magisterial District Court office for the Judge's use.

5. The provisions of this Rule allowing for temporary detention of prisoners shall not apply to the performance of any other duties of the on-duty Magisterial District Judge during the hours of 8:00 P.M. to 8:00 A.M.

6. The Carbon County Correctional Facility shall identify a detention area for prisoners so detained in accordance with the Standard Operating Procedures of the Carbon County Correctional Facility for temporary detention of individuals at the Prison.

7. The Carbon County Correctional Facility is directed to make available to the on-duty Magisterial District Judge appropriate space or advanced communication technology availability between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 9:00 A.M. to perform the Preliminary Arraignment at the Prison.

8. Upon completion of the Preliminary Arraignment, the detention authorized by this Rule shall terminate and the person detained shall be processed in accordance with the Orders of the Magisterial District Judge at the Preliminary Arraignment or, if no Preliminary Arraignment has been done, the person shall be released from detention and the arresting agency shall arrange for the Preliminary Arraignment of the person otherwise in accordance with the Rules of Criminal Procedure.

9. If the Preliminary Arraignment is conducted by advanced communication technology, upon completion of the Preliminary Arraignment, copies of all commitment orders, bail orders, etc. shall be faxed from the Magisterial District Judge to the Carbon County Correctional Facility and the originals mailed to the Carbon County Correctional Facility on the next regular business day. If the Preliminary Arraignment is conducted at the Correctional Facility, original documents shall be provided to the Carbon County Correctional Facility at the time of the Preliminary Arraignment.

C. Nothing in this Rule shall alter the requirements of Carbon County Local Criminal Rules of Procedure 202 regarding approval of search warrant application by attorney for the Commonwealth and Rule 507 regarding approval of police complaints and arrest warrant affidavits by the Attorney for the Commonwealth.

Administrative Order Establishing Uniform Costs for Specialized Urinalysis Testing and Confirmation by the Adult Probation/Parole Office; No. AD 4-2016

Order

And Now, this 9th day of December, 2015, the following Administrative Order establishing uniform costs in criminal cases for certain services rendered by the Adult Probation/Parole Office of Lehigh County is promulgated and is effective for all such services rendered in any criminal case thirty (30) days or more after publication of this Order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Seven (7) certified copies shall be filed with the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts; that two (2) certified copies shall be filed with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*; that one (1) certified copy shall be filed with the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee; and that one (1) copy shall be filed with the Clerk of Judicial Records of the Court of Common Pleas of Lehigh County.

Urinalysis Testing

Every person placed on Probation, Parole, Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition, Probation Without Verdict, or Intermediate Punishment, shall pay, in addition to the costs of prosecution, fines and restitution, and other costs, a fee not to exceed \$50.00 for each urine sample collected by the Lehigh County Adult Probation Department and sent for testing at Redwood Toxicology Laboratory.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE [49 PA. CODE CH. 25] Genetic Counselors

The State Board of Osteopathic Medicine (Board) amends §§ 25.215 and 25.231 (relating to definitions; and schedule of fees) and adds Subchapter O (relating to genetic counselors) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Background and Purpose

The act of December 22, 2011 (P. L. 581, No. 126) (Act 126) amended the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act (act) (63 P. S. §§ 271.1—271.18) to require the Board to issue licenses and regulate genetic counselors. This final-form rulemaking effectuates Act 126.

Statutory Authority

The final-form rulemaking is authorized under section 10.3 of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c), which authorizes the Board to license genetic counselors, to issue temporary permits to graduates of genetic counseling education programs and to regulate the practice of genetic counseling and discipline licensees. Section 16 of the act (63 P. S. § 271.16) authorizes the Board to adopt and revise regulations as are reasonably necessary to carry out the purposes of the act. In addition, section 3 of Act 126 directs the Board to promulgate regulations to license genetic counselors.

Summary of Comments and Responses to Proposed Rulemaking

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 7549 (December 28, 2013) with a 30-day public comment. The Board did not receive comments from the regulated community or the public. Neither the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) nor the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensing Committee (SCP/PLC) provided comments to the Board. On February 26, 2014, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) submitted comments to the Board.

Regarding the fees in § 25.231, IRRC noted that Act 126 provided for a \$125 biennial renewal fee “[u]ntil such time as the board adopts a fee by regulation. . . .” IRRC requested that the Board “provide a full review of the Board’s costs for biennial renewal of genetic counselor license, including the ‘Fee-Related Activities and Costs,’ in support of the amount of the fee in the final regulation.”

The licensing boards and commissions within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) set two types of fees: fees for services performed for individual applicants/licensees; and biennial renewal fees. The fees for services performed for individual applicants are based on the cost to the Board to provide the services to the individuals. Accordingly, the fee report forms for fees for services performed include: a section on fee-

related activities and costs, wherein BPOA’s revenue office performs an analysis to determine what types of employees are tasked with processing the individual applications; how much time these employees, on average, may be expected to take to perform their part of the processing; the cost of the salary and benefits of these employees; and an amount for administrative overhead related to the total time spent processing an individual application. Thus, the fees for services performed recoup from the individual applicant the average cost of processing an applicant’s application.

The second type of fee charged by the Board is the biennial renewal fee. The biennial renewal fee is not based on the cost to the Board to provide services to any particular applicant or licensee; accordingly, the fee-related activities include all of the investigative, prosecutorial, adjudicative, regulatory and administrative activities of the Board. Under section 13.1 of the act (63 P. S. § 271.13a), the Board sets the biennial renewal fee for licensees so that the total revenue and expenses over a 2-year period will be adequate to meet the enforcement efforts required under the act. In determining the biennial renewal fee for each of the licensee types licensed by the Board, the Board anticipates the amount of resources likely to be consumed in providing the investigative, prosecutorial, adjudicative, regulatory and administrative functions related to the licensee class, and, to a lesser extent, considers the average annual salary of the licensee type and seeks to impose a proportional burden across licensee types.

At the time of enactment of Act 126, the Department of State estimated an annual cost associated with this new class of licensee of approximately \$6,000 based on an estimated 100 genetic counselors. However, the Board has revisited the appropriate biennial renewal fee to be applied to genetic counselors based on new estimates of the number of genetic counselors practicing in this Commonwealth. Based on records of the American Board of Genetic Counseling (ABGC), there are currently 177 certified genetic counselors in this Commonwealth. The Board estimates there may be five individuals certified by the American Board of Medical Genetics (ABMG) that practice as genetic counselors who may also apply for licensure. The Board cannot estimate whether there are uncertified genetic counselors who will seek licensure. Therefore, for purposes of determining the appropriate fee, the Board estimates approximately 180 genetic counselors will seek licensure and on that basis has determined that a \$75 biennial renewal fee is more appropriate.

IRRC noted that the Board failed to provide a subsection in § 25.904 (relating to application for genetic counselor license by noncertified persons) requiring professional liability insurance. The Board corrected this error by adding subsection (b)(5). IRRC also suggested that because the act uses the phrase “noncertified persons,” the Board should use the same term. The Board has made that correction.

IRRC noted that § 25.905 (relating to application for temporary provisional genetic counselor license) provides that an applicant for a temporary provisional genetic counselor license shall demonstrate that the applicant has been granted active candidate status establishing eligibility to sit for the next available certification examination offered by the ABGC. IRRC suggested that, to be

consistent with section 10.3(g)(1) of the act, the Board should also include the certification examination offered by the ABMG. The Board intentionally did not include the ABMG because the ABMG has not offered an examination for approximately 25 years. Thus, no individual would have active candidate status to sit for the ABMG examination. In contrast, the Board included ABMG as a certification that would establish eligibility for licensure under § 21.903 (relating to application for genetic counselor license) because applicants for the genetic counselor license may have passed the ABMG examination at a time when the ABMG offered an examination.

IRRC suggested that the Board reference the application fee in its regulations as the fee is required to be paid by an applicant for a temporary genetic counselor license. The Board has made this correction.

IRRC further recommended the Board make additions to § 25.905 to explain what actions could be taken by an individual who formerly held a provisional license but who either failed to take the ABGC examination by the close of the second examination period or who failed to pass the ABGC examination within two examination cycles after receiving the temporary provisional license. IRRC asked if the individual would be permanently barred from applying for a license. The Board added a sentence to subsection (e) to notify the public that an individual whose temporary provisional genetic counselor license has expired under either subsection (d) or (e) may apply for a genetic counselor license when the individual meets the qualifications of § 25.903, including passing the examination.

IRRC suggested that the use of the title “graduate genetic counselor” which the holder of a temporary provisional genetic counselor license is authorized to use might confuse the public because a “graduate” college degree is understood to represent education beyond a bachelor’s degree. Applicants for a temporary provisional genetic counselor license or a genetic counselor license shall have completed a master’s degree or higher. The Board does not believe the title will be confusing because stakeholders informed the Board during the proposed rulemaking process that the title was commonly used for individuals who completed their degrees, but had not yet taken the National certification examination. In addition, the Board notes that placing “graduate” before the professional title is done by other professions to signify that an individual has completed his education program but is not yet a fully licensed professional. By way of example, “graduate nurse” is used to designate a nurse who has completed his nursing education but who has not yet passed the nurse licensure examination. Nevertheless, the Board is sensitive to IRRC’s concern regarding potential public confusion. Accordingly, to alleviate concerns that the public will be confused by the title, the Board revised the final-form rulemaking to aid clarity. First, the Board added a definition for “graduate genetic counselor” in § 25.902 (relating to definitions). In addition, the Board added to § 25.905(g) a requirement that a graduate genetic counselor inform clients that the graduate genetic counselor holds a temporary provisional license and practices under supervision. Finally, the Board added paragraph (10) to the list of conduct which would constitute unprofessional conduct in § 25.908(b) (relating to disciplinary action for applicants and genetic counselors) for failing to inform a client that a graduate genetic counselor holds a temporary provisional license and practices under supervision. The Board believes these additions will create a clearer

distinction between these two titles and will serve to eliminate confusion caused by the use of the title “graduate genetic counselor.”

IRRC questioned whether the cross-reference in § 25.906(b)(6) (relating to biennial renewal of genetic counselor license) to the requirement for professional liability insurance should be to the regulatory section rather than the statutory section. The Board changed the cross-reference.

IRRC commented on § 25.908, noting that subsections (b) and (c) list what is considered unprofessional or immoral conduct, but that subsection (a) does not directly state that a licensee may be disciplined for violations of subsection (b) or (c). IRRC recommended addressing this issue by adding language to subsection (a). Subsection (a) provides notice that a licensed genetic counselor, graduate genetic counselor or applicant for any license is subject to refusal of license or disciplinary action under section 15 of the act (63 P. S. § 271.15). Section 15 of the act relates to reasons for refusal, revocation, suspension or other corrective actions against licensees or applicants. Section 15(a)(6) of the act authorizes the Board to refuse a license to an applicant or discipline a licensee for violating a regulation promulgated by the Board. Section 15(a)(8) of the act authorizes the Board to refuse a license to an applicant or discipline a licensee for being guilty of immoral or unprofessional conduct. The Board amended the section to add a cross-reference to section 15(a)(6) and (8) of the act to address concerns about the clarity of the section.

IRRC noted that the proposed rulemaking did not directly reference the reporting required by a current licensee or applicant of violations in another jurisdiction, and asked how the Board would know if a licensee was disciplined for violations in another jurisdiction. In response, the Board notes that § 25.906(b)(2) and (3) requires genetic counselors to disclose on their biennial renewal application any license to practice as a genetic counselor in another state, territory, possession or country, and to disclose disciplinary action pending before or taken by the appropriate health care licensing authority in any other jurisdiction since the most recent application for biennial renewal. Therefore, the Board will learn of disciplinary actions taken by other jurisdictions when the genetic counselor applies for biennial renewal.

Regarding § 25.909 (relating to continuing education for genetic counselors), IRRC suggested that the Board repeat the statutory exemption from continuing education for courses in office management or practice building. The Board added this language to § 25.909(a)(1). IRRC also questioned whether it was sufficient to allow genetic counselors to earn credit for activities approved by the ABGC or the National Society of Genetic Counselors (NSGC). According to the stakeholders with whom the Board met in developing the proposed rulemaking, virtually all continuing education in the field is approved by either the ABGC or the NSGC. The Board believes allowing licensees to obtain continuing education credit for licensure renewal through courses approved by these organizations benefits both the licensee and the public, and ensures adequate availability of continuing education programs. Approval by these organizations benefits practitioners by creating a Nationally-accepted pool of continuing education courses that are recognized by employers, certifying bodies and all of the states in which these professionals are licensed. Requiring continuing education that is widely-accepted benefits licensees by ensuring license and employment portability. In addition, recogniz-

ing continuing education approved by these organizations protects the public because the organizations consistently approve only good quality continuing education programs.

Description of Amendments to the Final-form Rulemaking

The Board corrected the title “genetic counselor” throughout the final-form rulemaking. The Board also added a definition of the title “graduate genetic counselor” to § 25.902. The Board amended §§ 25.231 and 25.904 to be consistent with the act. The Board amended § 25.904 by adding a cross-reference to the professional liability insurance requirement in § 25.910 (relating to professional liability insurance coverage for genetic counselors).

The Board amended § 25.905(b)(2) to cross-reference the fees in § 25.231, rather than the statutory provision. The Board amended § 25.905(e) to clarify how an individual whose temporary provisional genetic counselor license has expired can do to ultimately become licensed as a genetic counselor. The Board added subsection (g) to impose a duty on a graduate genetic counselor to inform clients that the graduate genetic counselor holds a temporary provisional license and practices under supervision.

The Board amended § 25.906(b)(4) to correct the term “disposition in lieu of trial” which appeared in the proposed rulemaking as “disposition instead of trial.” “Disposition in lieu of trial” is a term of art in the field of criminal law and relates to a specific type of disposition of a criminal proceeding. The Board also amended § 25.906(b)(6) to cross-reference the professional liability insurance requirements in § 25.910, rather than the statutory provision.

The Board amended § 25.908(b) to add a cross-reference to section 15(6) and (8) of the act to aid clarity in interpreting the terms unprofessional and immoral conduct. The Board added § 25.908(b)(10) to provide that it is unprofessional conduct for a graduate genetic counselor to fail to inform a client that the graduate genetic counselor holds a temporary provisional license and practices under supervision.

The Board amended § 25.909 to incorporate the statutory prohibition against courses in office management or practice building as suggested by IRRC and to clarify that genetic counselors are not required to complete continuing education during the biennium in which first licensed if licensure occurred within 3 years of completion of the degree to be consistent with the regulations of the State Board of Medicine for the licensure of genetic counselors promulgated at 44 Pa.B. 6923 (November 1, 2014).

Finally, the Board amended § 25.910 to clarify that acceptable professional liability insurance coverage may include a policy personally purchased by the genetic counselor or professional liability insurance coverage provided by the genetic counselor’s employer.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The statutory requirements that genetic counselors obtain and renew licenses to practice genetic counseling, obtain and maintain professional liability insurance, and complete at least 30 hours of continuing education biennially will have a fiscal impact and impose paperwork requirements on the regulated community. Most genetic counselors are employed in a health care facility, college or university and the employer may pay the licensure fees and costs associated with professional liability insurance and continuing education.

The new requirements will also have a fiscal impact and will impose additional paperwork requirements on the Commonwealth, specifically the Board, which is charged with administering the act. However, the costs to the Board will be recouped through application fees and biennial renewal fees.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, a sunset date has not been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on December 12, 2013, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 43 Pa.B. 7549, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the HPLC and the SCP/PLC for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board shall submit to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC copies of comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Board has considered all comments from IRRC.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on January 20, 2016, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on January 21, 2016, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The Board finds that:

(1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered.

(3) The amendments to the final-form rulemaking do not enlarge the purpose of the proposed rulemaking published at 43 Pa.B. 7549.

(4) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing acts identified in this preamble.

Order

The Board orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 25, are amended by amending §§ 25.215 and 25.231 and adding §§ 25.901—25.910 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Board shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and to the Office of Attorney General as required by law.

(c) The Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Subchapter D. MINIMUM STANDARDS OF PRACTICE

§ 25.215. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Board-regulated practitioner—An osteopathic physician, perfusionist, physician assistant, genetic counselor, respiratory therapist, licensed athletic trainer, acupuncturist or an applicant for a license or certificate issued by the Board.

Immediate family member—A parent or guardian, child, sibling, spouse or other family member, whether related by blood or marriage, with whom a patient resides.

Sexual behavior—Any sexual conduct which is nondiagnostic and nontherapeutic; it may be verbal or physical and may include expressions of thoughts and feelings or gestures that are sexual in nature or that reasonably may be construed by a patient as sexual in nature.

Sexual exploitation—Any sexual behavior that uses trust, knowledge, emotions or influence derived from the professional relationship.

§ 25.901. Purpose.

This subchapter implements section 10.3 of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c), regarding genetic counselors.

§ 25.902. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

ABGC—The American Board of Genetic Counseling or an equivalent successor.

ABMG—The American Board of Medical Genetics or an equivalent successor.

Active candidate status—The designation awarded to an individual who has received approval from the ABGC or the ABMG to sit for his respective certification examination.

Genetic counseling—The provision of services to individuals, couples, families and organizations by one or more appropriately trained individuals to address the physical and psychological issues associated with the

occurrence or risk of occurrence of a genetic disorder, birth defect, or genetically influenced condition or disease in an individual or a family.

Genetic counselor—An individual who is licensed to practice genetic counseling by the Board or the State Board of Medicine.

Graduate genetic counselor—An individual who has been issued a temporary provisional genetic counselor license by the Board under § 25.905 (relating to application for temporary provisional genetic counselor license) to practice under the supervision of a physician or a genetic counselor.

Hour of continuing education—At least 50 minutes of instruction, including relevant question and answer sessions, in an approved course of continuing education or an equivalent time that an online or correspondence course would be presented live.

NSGC—The National Society of Genetic Counselors or an equivalent successor.

§ 25.903. Application for genetic counselor license.

(a) An applicant for a license to practice as a genetic counselor shall submit, on forms made available by the Board, a completed application for a license to practice as a genetic counselor, including the necessary supporting documents, and pay the application fee in § 25.231 (relating to schedule of fees).

(b) The Board may issue a license to practice as a genetic counselor to an applicant who demonstrates that the applicant:

(1) Is at least 21 years of age and of good moral character, as required under section 10.3(e)(1) and (2) of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c(e)(1) and (2)).

(2) Has received a master's degree or doctoral degree in human genetics or genetic counseling from an ABGC-accredited or ABMG-accredited educational program or has met the requirements for certification by the ABGC or the ABMG. Proof of the degree, if applicable, shall be sent directly from the applicant's education program and include an official transcript.

(3) Has passed the examination for certification as a genetic counselor by the ABGC or the ABMG or has passed the examination for certification as a Ph.D. medical geneticist by the ABMG. Proof that the applicant has passed the examination shall be sent directly from the ABGC or the ABMG and may include proof of current certification.

(4) Has obtained professional liability insurance, or is exempt from the requirement to obtain professional liability insurance, as set forth in § 25.910 (relating to professional liability insurance coverage for genetic counselors).

(c) The Board may deny an application for licensure as a genetic counselor upon the grounds for disciplinary action in § 25.908 (relating to disciplinary action for applicants and genetic counselors).

§ 25.904. Application for genetic counselor license by noncertified persons.

(a) An applicant for a license to practice as a genetic counselor who has never passed the ABGC or ABMG certification examination shall submit, on forms made available by the Board, a completed application for a license to practice as a genetic counselor, including the necessary supporting documents, and pay the application fee in § 25.231 (relating to schedule of fees).

(b) The Board may issue a license to practice as a genetic counselor to a noncertified applicant who:

(1) Submits an application to the Board, along with any required supporting documentation, by February 20, 2015.

(2) Demonstrates that the applicant is at least 21 years of age and of good moral character as required under section 10.3(e)(1) and (2) of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c(e)(1) and (2)).

(3) Demonstrates that the applicant has received a master's degree or higher in genetics or a related field of study and has worked as a genetic counselor for a minimum of 3 continuous years preceding December 22, 2011, or has received a bachelor's degree in genetics or a related field of study and has been employed as a genetic counselor for at least 10 continuous years prior to December 22, 2011.

(i) Proof of the degree shall be sent directly from the applicant's educational program and include an official transcript.

(ii) Related fields of study must include core courses in genetics.

(iii) Proof of employment as a genetic counselor may include Federal income tax forms or notarized letters from the applicant's employer.

(4) Submits at least three letters of recommendation, including one from a genetic counselor certified by the ABGC or the ABMG and one from either a clinical geneticist or medical geneticist certified by the ABMG. A person who submits a letter of recommendation shall have worked with the applicant in an employment setting sometime during the previous 10 continuous years and be able to attest to the applicant's competency in providing genetic counseling services.

(5) Demonstrates that the applicant has obtained professional liability insurance, or is exempt from the requirement to obtain professional liability insurance, as set forth in § 25.910 (relating to professional liability insurance coverage for genetic counselors).

§ 25.905. Application for temporary provisional genetic counselor license.

(a) An applicant for a temporary provisional genetic counselor license shall submit, on forms made available by the Board, a completed application, including the necessary supporting documents, and pay the fee in § 25.231 (relating to schedule of fees) for an application for a temporary provisional genetic counselor license.

(b) The Board may grant a temporary provisional genetic counselor license, which authorizes the license holder to practice only under the supervision of a genetic counselor or physician licensed under the act or under the Medical Practice Act of 1985 (63 P. S. §§ 422.1—422.51a), to an applicant who:

(1) Demonstrates that the applicant has been granted active candidate status establishing eligibility to sit for the next available certification examination offered by the ABGC.

(2) Demonstrates that the applicant is at least 21 years old, of good moral character and has completed an application form provided by the Board, and paid the appropriate fee in § 25.231.

(3) Otherwise complies with this subchapter.

(c) The Board may deny an application for a temporary provisional genetic counselor license upon the grounds in § 25.908 (relating to disciplinary action for applicants and genetic counselors).

(d) A temporary provisional genetic counselor license will expire upon the close of the second examination period for which the holder is eligible to test following issuance of the temporary provisional license and may not be renewed.

(e) A temporary provisional genetic counselor license will expire upon notice to the Board that the holder has not passed the certification examination within two examination cycles after receiving the temporary provisional license. The holder of a temporary provisional genetic counselor license who fails to pass the examination within two examination cycles shall immediately cease practicing and return the license to the Board. An individual whose temporary provisional genetic counselor license has expired under subsection (d) or this subsection may apply for a genetic counselor license when the individual can demonstrate the qualifications in § 25.903 (relating to application for genetic counselor license).

(f) The holder of a temporary provisional genetic counselor license may not use the title "genetic counselor." The holder of a temporary provisional genetic counselor license may use the title "graduate genetic counselor" but may not use an abbreviation of the title.

(g) A graduate genetic counselor shall inform clients that the graduate genetic counselor holds a temporary provisional license and practices under supervision.

§ 25.906. Biennial renewal of genetic counselor license.

(a) The license of a genetic counselor will expire biennially on October 31 of each even-numbered year in accordance with § 25.271 (relating to requirements for renewal). A genetic counselor may not practice after October 31 of an even-numbered year unless the genetic counselor has completed the biennial renewal process and the Board has issued a renewed license.

(b) As a condition of biennial renewal, a genetic counselor shall:

(1) Submit a completed application, including payment of the biennial renewal fee in § 25.231 (relating to schedule of fees).

(2) Disclose on the application any license to practice as a genetic counselor in another state, territory, possession or country.

(3) Disclose on the application disciplinary action pending before or taken by the appropriate health care licensing authority in any other jurisdiction since the most recent application for biennial renewal, whether or not licensed to practice in that other jurisdiction.

(4) Disclose on the application pending criminal charges and any finding or verdict of guilt, admission of guilt, plea of nolo contendere, probation without verdict, disposition in lieu of trial or accelerated rehabilitative disposition in any criminal matter since the most recent application for biennial renewal.

(5) Verify on the application that the genetic counselor has complied with the continuing education requirements mandated by section 10.3(j) of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c(j)) during the biennial period immediately pre-

ceding the period for which renewal is sought in accordance with § 25.909 (relating to continuing education for genetic counselors).

(6) Verify on the application that, if practicing as a genetic counselor in this Commonwealth, the licensee maintains professional liability insurance coverage in accordance with § 25.910 (relating to professional liability insurance coverage for genetic counselors).

§ 25.907. Inactive status of genetic counselor license; reactivation of inactive license.

(a) A genetic counselor license will become inactive upon either of the following:

(1) The licensee requests in writing that the Board place the license on inactive status. Written confirmation of inactive status will be forwarded to the licensee.

(2) The licensee fails to renew the license by the expiration of the biennial renewal period, that is, by October 31 of each even-numbered year.

(b) A genetic counselor whose license has become inactive may not practice as a genetic counselor in this Commonwealth until the license has been reactivated.

(c) To reactivate an inactive license, the licensee shall apply on forms made available by the Board. The licensee shall:

(1) Include the documentation required under § 25.909 (relating to continuing education for genetic counselors) for the immediately preceding biennium. Unless waived by the Board under section 10.3(j)(3) of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c(j)(3)), the Board will not reactivate a license until the required continuing education for the preceding biennium has been successfully completed.

(2) Pay the current biennial renewal fee and the reactivation application fee specified in § 25.231 (relating to schedule of fees).

(3) Except as provided in subsection (e), verify that the licensee did not practice as a genetic counselor in this Commonwealth while the license was inactive.

(d) A licensee whose license has been inactive for 4 years or more shall demonstrate continued competence by showing current certification by the ABGC.

(e) A licensee who has practiced with an inactive license, and who cannot make the verification required under subsection (c)(3), shall also pay the late fees required under section 225 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Fee Act (63 P. S. § 1401-225) as more fully set forth in this subsection. Payment of a late fee does not preclude the Board from taking disciplinary action for practicing as a genetic counselor without a current active license.

(1) A licensee whose license was active at the end of the immediately preceding biennial renewal period and who practiced after the license became inactive shall pay a late fee of \$5 for each month or part of a month from the beginning of the current biennium until the date the reactivation application is filed.

(2) A licensee whose license has been inactive since before the beginning of the current biennium shall pay the biennial renewal fee for each biennial period during which the licensee practiced and shall pay a late fee of \$5 for each month or part of a month from the first date the licensee practiced as a genetic counselor in this Commonwealth after the license became inactive until the date the reactivation application is filed.

§ 25.908. Disciplinary action for applicants and genetic counselors.

(a) A genetic counselor, graduate genetic counselor or applicant for a license under this subchapter is subject to refusal of license or disciplinary action under section 15 of the act (63 P. S. § 271.15). Following a final determination subject to the right of notice, hearing and adjudication and the right of appeal therefrom in accordance with 2 Pa.C.S. §§ 501—508 and 701—704 (relating to Administrative Agency Law), the Board may refuse licensure or impose any of the corrective actions of section 15(c) of the act.

(b) A genetic counselor, graduate genetic counselor or applicant for licensure is subject to discipline under section 15(a)(6) and (8) of the act for violating this chapter and for being guilty of immoral or unprofessional conduct. Unprofessional conduct includes:

(1) Engaging in conduct prohibited under § 25.216 (relating to sexual misconduct).

(2) Performing an act in a health care profession in a fraudulent, incompetent or negligent manner.

(3) Violating a provision of the act or this chapter setting a standard of professional conduct.

(4) Engaging in health care practice beyond the licensee's authority to practice.

(5) Representing oneself to be a physician or other health care practitioner whose profession the genetic counselor is not licensed to practice.

(6) Practicing while the licensee's ability to do so is impaired by alcohol, drugs, physical disability or mental instability.

(7) Revealing personally identifiable facts obtained as the result of a practitioner-patient relationship without the prior consent of the patient, except as authorized or required by statute or regulation.

(8) Failing to provide appropriate supervision to a genetic counselor student or a graduate genetic counselor practicing under a temporary provisional license. For purposes of this paragraph, appropriate supervision of a genetic counselor student means that the student is under the overall direction of the chair or director of the educational program. For purposes of this paragraph, appropriate supervision of a graduate genetic counselor means that the graduate genetic counselor is under the overall direction of the area supervisor and the supervisor conducts periodic review of the work of the graduate genetic counselor.

(9) Practicing outside the scope of practice for a genetic counselor as set forth in section 10.3(c) of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c(c)).

(10) Failing to inform a client that the graduate genetic counselor holds a temporary provisional license and practices under supervision.

(c) Immoral conduct includes:

(1) Misrepresenting or concealing a material fact in obtaining a license issued by the Board or renewal, reactivation or reinstatement thereof.

(2) Being convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude, dishonesty or corruption in the courts of the Commonwealth, the United States, another state, the District of Columbia, a territory of the United States or another country.

(3) Committing an act involving moral turpitude, dishonesty or corruption.

§ 25.909. Continuing education for genetic counselors.

(a) *Credit hour requirements.* A genetic counselor shall satisfy the following continuing education credit hour requirements:

(1) As a condition for biennial renewal, a genetic counselor shall complete at least 30 hours of continuing education applicable to the practice of genetic counseling; credit will not be given for a course in office management or practice building. A genetic counselor is not required to complete continuing education during the biennium in which the licensee was first licensed if licensure occurred within 3 years of completion of the degree.

(2) Except when reactivating an inactive license, when the Board has granted a waiver or when ordered by the Board, continuing education credits may be used to satisfy the continuing education credit hour requirements only for the biennial period in which the credits were earned. No hour of continuing education may be used to satisfy the requirement of paragraph (1) for more than one biennium.

(3) A genetic counselor may request a waiver of the continuing education credit hour requirements because of serious illness, military service or other demonstrated hardship by submitting a request for waiver with the supporting documentation to the Board at least 90 days prior to the end of the biennial renewal period for which the waiver is sought. The Board may grant the waiver request in whole or in part and may extend the deadline by which the credit hour requirements shall be met.

(4) A genetic counselor may be subject to disciplinary sanction as provided in section 15 of the act (63 P. S. § 271.15), including the suspension or revocation of the license, imposition of a civil penalty or other corrective measure as determined by the Board, if the licensee either submits false information to the Board regarding completion of the continuing education credit hour requirements to complete biennial renewal, or fails to complete the continuing education hour requirements and practices as a genetic counselor after the end of the biennial period.

(b) *Continuing education activities.* Credit for continuing education may be earned for activities approved by the ABGC or the NSGC.

(c) *Documentation of continuing education.* Continuing education shall be documented with a certificate of attendance or completion issued by the activity provider. The certificate must include the name of the course provider, the name and date of the course, the name of the licensee, the number of credit hours based on a 50-minute hour and the category of continuing education, if applicable.

§ 25.910. Professional liability insurance coverage for genetic counselors.

(a) A genetic counselor practicing in this Commonwealth shall maintain a level of professional liability insurance coverage in the minimum amount of \$1 million per occurrence or claims made as required under section 10.3(k) of the act (63 P. S. § 271.10c(k)).

(b) Proof of professional liability insurance coverage may include:

(1) A certificate of insurance or copy of the declaration page from the insurance policy setting forth the effective date, expiration date and dollar amounts of coverage. The policy may be personally purchased liability insurance or professional liability insurance coverage provided by the genetic counselor's employer.

(2) Evidence of a plan of self-insurance approved by the Insurance Commissioner of the Commonwealth under regulations of the Insurance Department in 31 Pa. Code Chapter 243 (relating to medical malpractice and health-related self-insurance plans).

(c) A license that was issued in reliance upon a letter from the applicant's insurance carrier indicating that the

applicant will be covered against professional liability effective upon the issuance of the applicant's license as permitted under section 10.3(k)(3) of the act will become inactive as a matter of law 30 days after the date of issuance of the license if the licensee has not provided proof of professional liability insurance coverage and will remain inactive until the licensee provides proof of insurance coverage.

(d) A licensee who does not have professional liability insurance coverage as required under section 10.3(k)(1) of the act may not practice as a genetic counselor in this Commonwealth.

**UNDER ACT 2, 1995
PREAMBLE 1**

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.907)

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) (35 P. S. §§ 6026.302—6026.305) require the Department to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30 days of this public notice and contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request, and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. Additional Class of Disproportionate Share Hospital Payments

The Department of Human Services (Department) is announcing its intent to allocate funding in Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-2016 for disproportionate share hospital (DSH) payments to qualifying acute care general hospitals that serve the indigent population of cities in this Commonwealth with an average per capita income significantly below the Statewide average. These payments are intended to provide additional financial support to hospitals that serve an inordinate amount of low-income individuals and Medical Assistance (MA) beneficiaries in impoverished areas of this Commonwealth. The Department does not intend to otherwise change the qualifying criteria or payment methodology for these payments.

All payment limitations are applicable, including those limitations that the Commonwealth may not exceed its aggregate annual DSH allotment, and that no hospital may receive DSH payments in excess of its hospital-specific limit.

Fiscal Impact

Additional Disproportionate Share Hospital Payments

The Department of Human Services (Department) is announcing its intended funding allocations for several classes of disproportionate share hospital (DSH) payments made to qualifying Medical Assistance (MA) enrolled acute care general hospitals. The Department is

DSH Payments to Critical Access Hospitals and Qualifying Rural Hospitals

For FY 2015-2016, the Department intends to allocate \$6.669 million (\$3.200 million in State general funds and \$3.469 million in Federal funds) upon approval by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for DSH payments to critical access and qualifying rural hospitals.

DSH Payments to Qualifying Acute Care General Hospitals for Obstetrical and Neonatal Health Care Services

For FY 2015-2016, the Department intends to allocate \$6.252 million (\$3.000 million in State general funds and \$3.252 million in Federal funds) upon approval by CMS for DSH payments to qualifying hospitals providing obstetrical and neonatal health care services.

Trauma DSH Payments

For FY 2015-2016, the Department intends to allocate \$18.038 million (\$8.656 million in State general funds and \$9.382 million in Federal funds) upon approval by CMS for trauma DSH payments.

Fiscal Impact

The FY 2015-2016 fiscal impact, as a result of these payments, is \$30.959 million (\$14.856 million in State general funds and \$16.103 million in Federal funds) upon approval by CMS.

Request for Legal Opinion Concerning the State Treasury's Authority to Issue a Warrant for the Payment of Requisitions to Pay Expenses of State Correctional Institutions

Dear Mr. Craig:

On behalf of the State Treasury, you have requested a legal opinion, pursuant to the Commonwealth Attorneys Act, 71 P.S. § 732-204, concerning the authority of the State Treasurer to issue his warrant for the payment of requisitions submitted by the Governor's Office of Budget to pay the continuing operational expenses of the state correctional institutions that exceed the appropriation level established in the Fiscal Year 2015-16 General Appropriation Act, Act of December 29, 2015 (P. L. ____, No. 10A) ("Act 10A of 2015"). After careful review, we have concluded that the prohibition in Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution and 72 P.S. § 3422 against the Treasury paying any money in excess of that appropriated is superseded to the extent the state law is in direct conflict with the United States Constitution or federal statutes.

As a threshold matter, Section 204(a)(1) of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act provides that, "[u]pon the request of the Governor or the head of any Commonwealth Agency, the Attorney General shall furnish legal advice concerning any matter or issue arising in connection with the exercise of the official powers or the performance of the official duties of the Governor or agency." 71 P.S. § 732-204(a)(1). The Commonwealth Attorneys Act further provides that the State Treasury shall not be considered a Commonwealth Agency for purposes of Section 204(a). 71 P.S. § 732-102 (defining the State Treasury to be a Commonwealth Agency only for purposes of Section 204(b) and 204(f) and 42 Pa.C.S. § 5110). As a result, this legal opinion is not binding on the State Treasury. Furthermore, please be advised that the protection from liability afforded recipients of binding opinions from the Attorney General under Section 204(a)(1) also does not apply to the State Treasury; therefore, reliance on this opinion is at the Treasury's discretion.

Factual Background

On December 29, 2015, Governor Wolf partially approved and signed Act 10A of 2015. As it pertains to this matter, the appropriation for state correctional institutions was reduced by the Governor from \$1.89 billion to the sum of \$956 million. You have indicated that the Treasury imminently expects the Department of Corrections to exhaust all funds appropriated for the continued operations of the state correctional institutions. Despite this anticipated appropriation shortfall, you also indicated that the Treasury anticipates the receipt of requisitions from the Office of Budget to pay for continued operations of the state correctional institutions, including requisitions for salaries and benefits for employees, as well as

food service, facility maintenance, health care, mental health care, drug interdiction programs, security operations, utility service, and safety systems.

State Law

Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution provides:

No money shall be paid out of the treasury, except on appropriations made by law and on warrant issued by the proper officers; but cash refunds of taxes, licenses, fees and other charges paid or collected, but not legally due, may be paid, as provided by law, without appropriation from the fund into which they were paid on warrant of the proper officer.

Pa. Const. Art. III, § 24.

This provision establishes a constitutional requirement that the Treasury not disperse any money without an appropriation made by law and a warrant issued by the proper officer. These requirements are further supported and supplemented by Section 3422 of the Fiscal Code which provides, in relevant part, that, “[i]f the state treasurer shall pay out for any appropriation named in an appropriation bill, a greater sum than is named therein for each appropriation, . . . they shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both, for each and every offence.” 72 P. S. § 3422.

The Fiscal Code also establishes the procedures by which expenditure requisitions are submitted to the Treasury and by which the Treasury evaluates such requisitions. Of particular importance to the issue at hand, Section 1502 of the Fiscal Code provides that, “[r]equisitions shall be audited by the Treasury Department in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and if they appear to be lawful and correct, the State Treasurer shall issue his warrant for the payment thereof.” 72 P. S. § 1502.

The United States Constitution and Federal Statutes Have Supremacy Over Conflicting Provisions of State Constitutions and State Statutes.

The Supremacy Clause of the United States Constitution, U. S. Const. Art. VI, Cl. 2, makes the United States Constitution and federal laws the supreme law of the land governing anything to the contrary in state laws or state constitutions. *Testa v. Katt*, 330 U. S. 386, 67 S.Ct. 810, 91 L.Ed. 967 (1947); *Knoll v. White*, 141 Pa. Cmwlth. 188, 194, 595 A.2d 665, 668 (1991). It is a fundamental principle that state law that conflicts with federal law is without effect. *Council 13, AFSCME, AFL-CIO v. Rendell*, 604 Pa. 352, 380, 986 A.2d 63, 80 (2009). (citing *McCulloch v. Maryland*, 17 U. S. (4 Wheat) 316, 4 L.Ed. 579 (1819)). Such a conflict arises where compliance with both state and federal laws or regulations is an impossibility or where state law stands as an obstacle to the accomplishments and execution of the full purposes and objectives of Congress. *Id.* at 81 (citing *Hillsborough County, Fl. v. Automated Med. Laboratories, Inc.*, 471 U. S. 707, 105 S.Ct. 2371, 85 L.Ed.2d 714 (1985)). Accordingly, if a conflict exists between the United States Constitution or federal statutes and the Pennsylvania Constitution or Pennsylvania Laws where it is impossible to comply with both federal and state law, the United States Constitution or federal statute would supersede the conflicting provision of the Pennsylvania Constitution or state law. However, the state law is displaced only to the extent that it actually conflicts with federal law. *Dalton v. Little Rock Family Planning Services*, 516 U. S. 474, 116 S.Ct. 1063, 134 L.Ed.2d 115 (1996).

In this matter, strict adherence to Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution and 72 P. S. § 3422 would act as a complete bar to any and all payments for the Department of Corrections once it has completely exhausted all appropriated funds. However, from that moment going forward until such time as a new appropriation is made, zero payment would result in complete cessation of operation of the Department of Corrections and its state correctional institutions. Complete cessation of operation of the Department of Corrections would undoubtedly conflict with the requirements set forth by the United States Constitution. To the extent that the United States Constitution or federal statutes require action of the Department of Corrections, those provisions would supersede Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution and 72 P. S. § 3422 and would be limited to the time period in which the Department of Corrections has completely exhausted all appropriations and to the scope of the actual conflict with the federal law.

The Pennsylvania Commonwealth Court has held that budget impasses and the absence of state funding appropriations do not allow the Commonwealth to forego its obligations with regard to certain federal programs. *Knoll*, 141 Pa. Cmwlth. at 195. In *Knoll*, the Commonwealth Court found it lawful for the Treasury to continue payment for distribution of benefits to recipients of federal programs based on the supremacy of federal law over Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution. *Id.*

The Department of Corrections, likewise, has duties mandated by the United States Constitution and federal statutes that would be impossible to meet with complete cessation of operation. “When the state takes [a person] into custody and holds him there against his will, [both the United States and Pennsylvania Constitution impose] upon it a corresponding duty to assume some responsibility for his safety and general well-being.” *DeShaney v. Winnebago County Dept of Soc. Servs.*, 489 U. S. 189, 199-200, 109 S.Ct. 998, 1005, 103 L.Ed.2d 249 (1989); Pa. Const. Art. I, § 13. This affirmative duty to protect arises “from the limitation which [the state] has imposed on the [inmate’s] freedom to act on his own behalf.” *Id.* at 190.

The principle behind the Commonwealth’s obligation to provide for an inmate’s basic needs is relatively straightforward—the state “so restrains an individual’s liberty that it renders him unable to care for himself, and at the same time fails to provide for his basic human needs—e.g., food, clothing, shelter, medical care, and reasonable safety—it transgresses the substantive limits on state action set by the Eighth Amendment and the Due Process Clause.” *Id.* at 200. Specifically, the Eighth Amendment’s proscription against cruel and unusual punishment guarantees that prison officials “must provide humane conditions of confinement.” *Farmer v. Brennan*, 511 U. S. 825, 832, 114 S.Ct. 1970, 1976, 128 L.Ed.2d 811 (1994); US Const. amend. VIII. To that end, prison officials have an obligation to ensure that inmates receive basic needs including “adequate food, clothing, shelter, and medical care, and must take reasonable measures to guarantee [their] safety.” *Id.*

Courts have held that “deliberate indifference” to the basic human needs of prisoners will be considered a violation of the Eighth Amendment. See e.g. *Estelle v. Gamble*, 429 U. S. 97, 97 S.Ct. 285, 50 L.Ed.2d. 251 (1976) (holding that the deliberate indifference to serious medical needs of prisoners violates the Eighth Amendment proscription against cruel and unusual punishment.); See

also *Inmates of Allegheny Cty. Jail v. Pierce*, 612 F.2d 754, 762 (3d Cir. 1979) (finding that deliberate indifference to serious medical needs is shown when prison officials have prevented an inmate from receiving recommended treatment or when an inmate is denied access to medical personnel capable of evaluating the need for treatment.).

Additionally, the Department of Corrections has certain obligations under the First Amendment to protect expressive activities for all inmates including speech, the free exercise of religion and access to courts. See US Const. amend. I; see also *Turner v. Safley*, 482 U.S. 78, 107 S.Ct. 2254, 96 L.Ed.2d 64 (1987); *Cruz v. Beto*, 405 U.S. 319, 92 S.Ct. 1079, 31 L.Ed.2d 263 (1972).

Taken together, these myriad of duties impose inescapable requirements on the Department of Corrections to provide a minimum level of basic service and protection to inmates in its custody and control. If the Department of Corrections was forced to completely cease operation of state correctional institutions as a result of the application of Article III, Section 24 and 72 P.S. § 3422 prohibiting any payments following exhaustion of appropriated funds, it would be impossible to comply with these minimum requirements of federal law. *Council 13*, 604 Pa. at 380. Due to this conflict between the Pennsylvania Constitution and the myriad of applicable federal laws during the period once the Department of Corrections has completely exhausted its appropriations until any new appropriation is made, the applicable federal law supersedes Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution and 72 P.S. § 3422.

Treasury Has Authority to Issue a Warrant for the Payment of any Requisition that Appears to be Lawful and Correct.

Pursuant to the Pennsylvania Fiscal Code, the Treasurer shall issue a warrant for the payment of a requisition only if it “appear[s] to be lawful and correct.” 72 P.S. § 1502. The statutory standard employed by the Treasurer is not one of absolute legal certainty, but rather, if the requisition “appears” to the Treasurer, in his sole discretion, to be “lawful and correct.” The legislature’s purposeful use of the conditional term “appears” is noteworthy, as it is an acknowledgment of the large number of expenditure requisitions that are presented daily to the Treasurer often accompanied by little legal guidance and lack in absolute legal certainty. As a consequence, the Fiscal Code permits the Treasurer to exercise his independent judgment when considering the legality of an expenditure requisition. This independent judgment would certainly apply to his analysis of whether an individual requisition for payment of a Department of Correction’s operating expense would be authorized due to the supremacy of the United States Constitution or federal statute over Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution or 72 P.S. § 3422.

It will be at the discretion of the Treasury whether any individual requisition “appear[s] to be lawful and correct” based on the supremacy of the United States Constitution or federal statute superseding Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution and 72 P.S. § 3422.

Conclusion

As the Department of Corrections must continue to operate to the level required by the United States Constitution and any applicable federal statutes, the prohibition in Article III, Section 24 of the Pennsylvania Constitution or 72 P.S. § 3422 against the Treasury paying any money in excess of that appropriated is superseded to the extent the state law is in direct conflict with the United States Constitution or federal statutes.

Finally, you are advised that, in accordance with Section 204(a)(1) of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act, 71 P.S. § 732-204(a)(1), you are not required to follow the advice set forth in this Opinion and are not protected from liability for doing so in any way.

Tentative Order

By the Commission:

The Commission’s regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) state that an Electric Generation Supplier (EGS) license will not be issued or remain in force until the licensee furnishes a bond or other security approved by the Commission. In addition, 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(d) states that the maintenance of an EGS license is contingent on the licensee providing proof to the Commission that a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission has been obtained.

Each EGS must file an original bond, letter of credit, continuation certificate, amendment, or other approved financial instrument with Rosemary Chiavetta, Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, 400 North Street, Harrisburg, PA 17120 prior to the EGS’s current security expiration date. Each financial instrument must be an original document that displays a “wet” signature or digital signature, preferable in blue ink, and displays a “raised seal” or original notary stamp. The name of the principal on the original financial instrument must match exactly with the name that appears on the EGS’s license issued by the Commission.

Failure to file before the financial security’s expiration date may cause Commission staff to initiate a formal proceeding that may lead to the following: cancellation of each company’s electric supplier license, removal of each company’s information from the Commission’s website and notification to all electric distribution companies, in which each company is licensed to do business, of the cancellation of the license.

As of February 12, 2016, each EGS listed in the Supplier Table below has not provided proof to the Commission that it has a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission, to replace its expired bond as noted in the table below.

As part of its EGS license validation procedures, the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services sent a 60-day Security Renewal Notice Letter to each entity in the Supplier Table above stating that original documentation of a bond, or other approved security, must be filed within 60 days prior to each entity's security expiration date. None of the companies listed in the Supplier Table provided the required documentation.

Based on the above facts, we tentatively conclude that the EGSs listed in the Supplier Table are not in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) and (d) and therefore it is appropriate to initiate the cancellation process for each EGS license of each company listed in the Supplier Table, without the necessity of a formal complaint, as being in the public interest; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. Cancellation of the Electric Generation Supplier Licenses of each company listed in the Supplier Table is hereby tentatively approved as being in the public interest.

2. The Secretary serve a copy of this Tentative Order upon the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Bureau of Investigation & Enforcement, Department of Revenue—Bureau of Corporation Taxes, all electric distribution companies, all of the Electric Generation Suppliers in the Supplier Table and also cause a copy of this Tentative Order to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day comment period.

3. Absent the filing of adverse public comment or the filing of approved security within 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Bureau of Technical Utility Services shall prepare a Final Order for entry by the Secretary and shall advise the affected Bureaus within the Commission in writing that the Electric Generation Supplier Licenses held by each company listed in the Supplier Table, are cancelled and the cases may be closed.

4. Upon entry of the Final Order described in Ordering Paragraph No. 3 above, each company listed in the Supplier Table will be stricken from all active utility lists maintained by the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Administration, removed from the Commission's website, and notifications be sent to all electric distribution companies in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do business.

5. Upon entry of the Final Order described in Ordering Paragraph No. 3, each electric distribution company in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do

business, shall return the customers of the Electric Generation Suppliers to default service.
