

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva-nia Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

PART V. PROFESSIONAL ETHICS AND CONDUCT [204 PA. CODE CH. 83]

Proposed Amendments to the Comments to Pennsylvania Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement Relating to Annual Registration of Attorneys—Status Changes

Notice is hereby given that The Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania is planning to recommend to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania that it adopt amendments to the Pennsylvania Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement ("Pa.R.D.E.") 219(k) relating to the administrative change in status from administrative suspension to inactive status, as set forth in Annex A.

Pa.R.D.E. 219 governs the annual registration of attorneys. Pursuant to this rule, an attorney who fails to timely register, or who fails to comply with Continuing Legal Education obligations, will be transferred to administrative suspension. Our rules provide that an attorney who is on administrative suspension for three years or more must petition for reinstatement to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania in order to resume active status. Where an attorney is administratively suspended for less than three years, Pa.R.D.E. 219 permits the Attorney Registration Office to administratively change the attorney's status. These status changes are contingent upon the attorney's fulfillment of certain requirements set forth in the Rule.

Current paragraph (h) permits a clerical change in status for an attorney who has been administratively suspended for three years or less to active status as follows:

- (h) An attorney who has been administratively suspended pursuant to subdivision (f) for three years or less is not eligible to file the annual fee form electronically. The procedure for reinstatement is as follows:
- (1) The formerly admitted attorney shall submit to the Attorney Registration Office the form required by subdivision (d)(1) along with payment of:
- (i) the current annual fee;
- (ii) the annual fee that was due in the year in which the attorney was administratively suspended;
- (iii) the late payment penalties required by paragraph (3);
- (iv) any unpaid collection fee; and
- (v) a reinstatement fee of \$300.00.

Current paragraph (k) permits a clerical change in status from administrative suspension to inactive status as follows:

(k) An inactive attorney who has been administratively suspended for failure to file the annual form and pay the annual fee required by subdivision (j)(1) of this rule, may request an administrative change in status form from the Attorney Registration Office. The form must be filed by mail or delivered in person to the Attorney Registration Office and said Office

shall change the status of an attorney eligible for inactive status under this subdivision upon receipt of:

- (1) the annual form required by subdivision (d);
- (2) payment of the annual fee required by subdivision (j)(1);
- (3) payment of all collection fees and late payment penalties assessed under subdivisions (d)(2) and (f); and
- (4) payment of an administrative processing fee of \$100.00.

The requirements of paragraphs (h) and (k) are similar, except for the fee requirements. In addition to the current annual fee, late payment penalties, unpaid collection fees and a reinstatement fee, paragraph (h)(1)(ii) requires an attorney who is administratively suspended and seeks to resume active status to pay the annual fee that was due in the year in which the attorney was administratively suspended. Paragraph (k) requires an attorney to pay the annual fee, collection fees, late payment penalties and an administrative processing fee, but does not direct an administratively suspended attorney to pay the fee that was due in the year in which the attorney was administratively suspended.

The reason for requiring an attorney to pay the annual fee that was due in the year he or she was administratively suspended is to collect an unpaid fee owed to the Board. This reason should apply to both administratively suspended attorneys seeking to resume active status and administratively suspended attorneys seeking to resume inactive status. For this reason, and for administrative ease in processing status change requests in a uniform manner, the Board proposes an amendment to paragraph (k)(3) to require that an administratively suspended attorney must pay the annual fee that was due in the year that the attorney was placed on administrative suspension.

CHAPTER 83. PENNSYLVANIA RULES OF DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

Subchapter B. MISCONDUCT

Rule 219. Annual registration of attorneys.

* * * * *

(k) Administrative Change in Status From Administrative Suspension to Inactive Status: An inactive attorney who has been administratively suspended for failure to file the annual form and pay the annual fee required by subdivision (j)(1) of this rule, may request an administrative change in status form from the Attorney Registration Office. The form must be filed by mail or delivered in person to the Attorney Registration Office and said Office shall change the status of an attorney eligible for inactive status under this subdivision upon receipt of:

- (1) the annual form required by subdivision (d);
- (2) payment of the annual fee required by subdivision (j)(1);

(3) payment of the annual fee that was due in the year in which the attorney was administratively suspended;

- [(3)] (4) payment of all collection fees and late payment penalties assessed under subdivisions (d)(2) and (f);
- [(4)] (5) payment of an administrative processing fee of \$100.00.

Proposed Amendment of Pa. O.C. Rules 2.1, 4.6 and 7.1

They neither will constitute a part of the rules nor be officially adopted by the Supreme Court. Additions to the text of the proposal are bolded and underlined; deletions to the text are bolded and bracketed.

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART II. ORPHANS' COURT RULES

CHAPTER II. ACCOUNTS, OBJECTIONS AND DISTRIBUTIONS

Rule 2.1. Form of Account.

* * * * *

(b) As illustrated in the Model Accounts, Accounts shall conform to the following rules:

* * * * *

(4) Every Account shall contain:

* * * * *

(iv) signature [and verification] pages signed by all the accountants stating the Account and verified by at least one of the accountants. The verification of a personal representative's Account shall contain a statement that the Grant of Letters and the first complete advertisement thereof occurred more than four months before the filing of the Account, unless the personal representative has been directed by the court to file an Account prior to that time.

CHAPTER IV. FORMAT AND SERVICE OF LEGAL PAPER BY PARTIES AND COURT; ELECTRONIC FILING

Rule 4.6. Notice of the Date of Entry of an Adjudication or Court Order on the Docket.

- (a) The clerk shall immediately give written notice of the entry of an adjudication or court order in a particular matter to each **interested** party's counsel of record or, if unrepresented, to each **interested** party. The notice shall include a copy of the adjudication or court order.
- (b) The clerk shall note in the docket the date when notice was given to the **interested** party or to his or her counsel under subparagraph (a) of this Rule.

Note: Rule 4.6 has no counterpart in former Orphans' Court Rule, but is derived from Pa.R.C.P. No. 236.

CHAPTER VII. RULES RELATING TO PRE-HEARING AND HEARING PROCEDURE

Rule 7.1. Depositions, Discovery, Production of Documents [and], Perpetuation of Testimony, and Subpoenas to Attend and Testify.

The court, by local rule or order in a particular matter, may prescribe the practice relating to depositions, discovery, production of documents [and], perpetuation of testimony, and subpoenas to attend and testify. To the extent not provided for by local rule or an order governing a particular matter, the practice relating to depositions, discovery, production of documents [and], perpetuation of testimony, and subpoenas to attend and testify shall conform to the practice in the Trial or Civil Division of the local Court of Common Pleas.

Note: Rule 7.1 is [identical to] derived from former Rule 3.6.

PUBLICATION REPORT

Proposed Amendment of Pa. O.C. Rules 2.1, 4.6, and 7.1

The Orphans' Court Procedural Rules Committee ("Committee") is planning to propose to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania the amendment of Pa. O.C. Rules 2.1, 4.6, and 7.1. These amendments will provide minor refinements to the Orphans' Court Rules that were adopted by the Court on December 1, 2015 and took effect on September 1, 2016.

Rule 2.1 provides the requirements for the form of Accounts. Rule 2.1(b)(4)(iv) sets forth the requirements for signature and verification pages, and currently requires the "signature and verification pages signed by all the accountants stating the Account and verified by at least one of the accountants." The Committee proposes to delete "and verification" from that phrase so it is not inconsistent with the remainder of the sentence, which only requires verification "by at least one of the accountants."

With regard to Rule 4.6, the Committee received inquiries about the necessity of sending notices to beneficiaries not participating in the present proceeding or matter. The Committee deliberated about whether "party" in Rule 4.6 was sufficient in scope to include those having an interest in the subject of the proceeding. Ultimately, the Committee concluded that "person" should be modified to "interested party," as defined in Rule 1.3.

Rule 7.1 addresses discovery practices in the Orphans' Courts. The Committee discussed that the Orphans' Court Rules did not address the use of subpoenas to attend and testify. *Compare* Pa.R.C.P. No. 234.1. The Committee agreed to add subpoenas to attend and testify to the list of permitted discovery practices set forth in Rule 7.1.

The Committee invites all comments, concerns, and suggestions regarding this proposal.

Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program Board; Grant Solicitation Announcement and Application Procedures

The Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program Board (Board) annually, or more frequently as the availability of fund permits, solicits applications for grants to conduct promotion, marketing and research projects to increase the quality, profitability, production and sale of wines, enhance the wine industry and benefit wine producers of this Commonwealth.

The Board was established by the Department of Agriculture (Department) under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4501—4513 (relating to Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act) (ACMA). Its composition, funding and duties were subsequently expanded by section 488.1 of the Liquor Code (47 P.S. § 4-488.1).

The Board makes awards of grants from its own funds generated by the methods set forth in the ACMA and makes recommendations for the awarding of grants by the Liquor Control Board from funds provided through the Liquor Code (47 P.S. §§ 1-101—10-1001).

This notice establishes the procedures by which grant applications will be solicited, reviewed and grants awarded.

- 1. Grant Solicitation. The Board will be accepting grant applications for the purposes, in the form and according to the schedule set forth herein for a period of not less than 30 days beginning on the date of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Additional publication and dissemination of this notice shall be made to applicants who have previously submitted grant applications to, or received grants from, the Board, State universities and State-supported universities located in this Commonwealth, universities with colleges of agricultural science located in this Commonwealth and individuals or entities who have requested notification from the Department or the Board of grant availability.
- 2. Process Overview. The Board will employ the review process described as follows to select projects: (a) to fund by making a grant from its ACMA funds; or (b) to recommend to the Liquor Control Board for the making of a grant.
- a. In the event of an ACMA-funded grant, the terms and conditions of the grant will be governed by a grant agreement between the Board and the applicant which shall be tendered to the applicant for execution, returnable in no more than 30 days.
- b. In the event of a recommendation to the Liquor Control Board to make and fund a grant, the decision as to whether to award a grant will be made by the Liquor Control Board. If the Liquor Control Board approves the grant recommendation, the terms and conditions of the grant will be governed by a grant agreement between the Liquor Control Board and the applicant, which shall be tendered to the applicant for execution by the Board on behalf of the Liquor Control Board, returnable in no more than 30 days.
- 3. Application Deadline. Interested applicants must deliver a complete project proposal and grant application to the Board by 4 p.m. on Friday, April 20, 2018, if

hand-delivered, or sent by mail postmarked on or before the same date and received by Friday, March 30, 2018. Applications should be addressed and delivered to the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Market Development, ATTN: Agricultural Commodity Board Grant Program, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408.

- a. Applicants are expected to provide a brief presentation of their proposals to the Board at its scheduled meeting on Tuesday, May 8, 2018, beginning at 10 a.m. in Room 309, Agriculture Building, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408. In-person attendance of applicants is not required and a conference call-in number will be provided to those who wish to participate by phone. It is important that applicants prominently include their e-mail and phone contact information in their applications.
- 4. Format of the Project Proposal and Grant Application. The project proposal and grant application shall be formatted as follows:
- a. A cover page, titled Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program—Project Proposal and Grant Application, providing: the title of the proposed project; the name and address of the applicant; the name, address, telephone number and e-mail address of the applicant's principal contact person for matters relating to the application; and the total maximum grant amount sought for the proposed project or program.
- b. Section 1, titled Statement of Purpose, explaining or presenting: the purpose for which the grant funds would be utilized; details of the proposed project, including a statement of expected impact of outcomes, staffing for the project, and objectives and methodologies; and whether, how and to what anticipated extent the proposed promotion, marketing or research project increases the quality, profitability, production and sale of wines, enhances the wine industry and benefits wine producers of this Commonwealth.
- c. Section 2, titled Statement of Need, explaining the need for the grant funds sought, and identifying the presence of any additional funding partners and the extent of that funding.
- d. Section 3, titled Budget, presenting a detailed budget for the proposed project or program, including an itemized breakdown of: all personnel by name devoted to the project, their professional qualifications, the amount of time calculated by hours and the tasks to be performed by each of the named personnel; each and every item of direct expense to be incurred in the project separately set forth, including all purchases of consumable or nonconsumable goods or equipment, listing the disposition of all nonconsumable goods or equipment upon completion of the project; all travel by dates, purpose, destination, mode of transportation and rate; a full breakdown of other costs, if any, and the method used to calculate those costs. See also paragraph 10.
- e. Section 4, titled Criteria for Measuring Outcomes, identifying methods for measuring outcomes.
- f. Section 5, titled Industry Involvement, describing the extent of any support, participation and funding from this Commonwealth's wine industry, including any written confirmation of that support, participation or funding.

- 5. Scoring of Applications. The Board will evaluate each complete and timely-filed project proposal and grant application it receives, which shall include a 100-point scale assessing:
 - a. Up to 20 points for the project needs statement.
- b. Up to 20 points for the expected impact of project outcomes.
- c. Up to 20 points for the promotion, marketing or research methodology.
 - d. Up to 20 points for overall project evaluation.
- e. Up to 20 points for support and participation from industry.
- 6. Scores. Upon completion of evaluations, the Board will prepare a record identifying each complete and timely-filed project proposal and grant application received and the numerical score assigned to each. In the event of an ACMA-funded grant, the Board will award grants based upon its evaluation and scoring. In the event of one or more recommendations to the Liquor Control Board to make and fund a grant, the Board will transmit to the Liquor Control Board the project proposal and grant application, along with the score assigned to it by the Board and any other information deemed relevant by the Board or requested by the Liquor Control Board. Request will be made by the Board that the Liquor Control Board respond to all recommendations for grant approval within 30 days.
- 7. Term of Grants. Applications should be submitted for projects to begin after July 1, 2018, on a date within the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 (July 1, 2018—June 30, 2019). Anticipated completion dates will be dictated by the project scope and parameters and may exceed 12 months from commencement if the project so warrants. The Board may award, or recommend that the Liquor Control

- Board approve, grant funding for multiyear projects or extensions of an on-going project, if the Board identifies that a multiyear term or an extension advances the grant's objectives. Requests for extensions of ongoing projects shall be made, evaluated and processed in accordance with all the requirements of this notice.
- 8. *Notice of Award.* Applicants shall be notified by mail of the decision on their grant applications by the Board. Best efforts will be made to do so within 60 days of the application deadline.
- 9. Grant Agreement. With the mailed grant award notice, the Board will provide applicants with a grant agreement for execution and return within 30 days. The Board will obtain the required signature on the grant agreements, including the Liquor Control Board, if necessary, and any other required Commonwealth entities, and return a copy to the applicant. No grant agreement is effective and work should not begin until all required signatures have been applied to the grant agreement. Among the terms of the grant agreement shall be a requirement that the grant recipient provide the Board full and complete access to all records relating to the performance of the project and submit information as the Board may require.
- 10. Nonmatching Cost-Reimbursement Grant and Indirect Costs Cap. Grants made hereunder do not require the applicant secure or devote a matching sum to the project. Payment of grant funds will occur on a reimbursement basis only. No grant award will include an allowance for indirect costs, if any, in excess of 10%.

 - Part C. II. Best Management Practices (BMPs)
- A. Pollution Prevention and Exposure Minimization (standard)
 - B. Good Housekeeping (standard)
 - C. Erosion and Sedimentation Controls (standard)
 - D. Spill Prevention and Responses (standard)
- E. Sector—Specific BMPs (see PAG-03 NPDES General Permit Appendix K)
 - F. Site Specific BMPs
 - 1. Baseline BMPs
 - a. Good Housekeeping

Good housekeeping procedures are designed to maintain a clean and orderly environment. Often common sense housekeeping procedures are the most effective tool in preventing stormwater impacts. A clean and orderly work area will reduce the potential for impacts from the facility operations to stormwater.

The following is a list of ARSC practices:

- (1) All places of employment, passageways, storerooms, and service rooms are kept clean, orderly and in sanitary condition.
- (2) The site manager is responsible for proper house-keeping practices, and the site is subject to unannounced inspections from a member or ARSC management.
- (3) Means of egress are kept clear of tools, materials, and debris.
- (4) Equipment is visually checked and maintained on a daily basis.
- (5) Wherever possible, materials are stored inside to prevent exposure to weather conditions so as to avoid impacts to the extent possible.

- (6) Trash and rubbish are removed to dumpster on an as-needed basis.
- (7) Drip pans, absorbent pads, and/or other means are used under hose connections and in other situations where minor drips or spills are likely. This is done to maintain safe working conditions and to prevent the release of oil to the environment.

Incidental drips and spills of regulated substances will be cleaned up immediately using materials and supplies that are maintained on site.

b. Preventative Maintenance

The preventative maintenance program identifies areas and equipment that needs to be maintained to prevent as much as possible the possibility of stormwater impacts. Maintenance activities applicable to this facility include the following:

- (1) Routinely clean the drainage channel leading into the retention pond and other conveyances of stormwater to prevent debris and silt accumulation.
- (2) Replace or repair waste collection bins if damaged or leaking.
- (3) If indications of leaks, spills, or drips are evident anywhere in the facility, identify and correct the problem.
 - c. Visual Inspections

Routine facility inspections shall be conducted by facility personnel. If conditions are discovered which could impact stormwater quality, the Emergency Coordinator shall arrange for corrective action or designate an individual to make such arrangements. Records of corrective actions will be maintained by maintenance personnel.

d. Spill Prevention and Response

All employees should receive initial and refresher training in spill response and related environmental issues. All employees are responsible for the cleanup of any spill. Small, routine drips and spills may be cleaned by applying loose absorbent to the spill and then disposing of the absorbent properly.

If a discharge of a regulated substance occurs, the spill must be reported immediately to the Emergency Coordinator, who will implement appropriate measures to prevent adverse environmental impacts.

e. Runoff Management Practices

Runoff management practices prevent runoff from becoming impacted or treat stormwater runoff prior to off-site discharge. Runoff management practices in use at this facility include:

- (1) Grading and paving in operating areas to divert stormwater away from areas that could potentially impact stormwater and prevent mixing with runoff.
- (2) Parking areas are gravel, which allows stormwater to absorb into the ground and also minimizes erosion.

f. Employee Training

Environmental Awareness Training is provided to all ARSC employees on an annual basis. The training includes many environmental topics with focus on identification of the environmental impact that can be caused by improper management (i.e., storage, handling, and/or usage) of regulated substances. This training is intended to familiarize employees with requirements related to RCRA, DOT, SPCC, and PPC regulations.

g. Record Keeping and Reporting

Records of discharges of regulated substances, monitoring, inspection, and maintenance activities will be retained on site by the appropriate personnel. These records will be maintained for a minimum of six years. Under the individual NPDES Permit, inspections reports should be maintained on site.

h. Additional BMPs

The applicable BMPs and stormwater controls from the "Salt Institute Voluntary Salt Storage Guidelines for Distribution Stockpiles" have been incorporated into the facility's PPC Plan.

2. Stormwater Monitoring and Reporting

Stormwater monitoring and reporting will be conducted as required by Part A.I. and Part C.V. of NPDES Permit No. PA0266451.

3. Implementation

The site is expected to maintain compliance with the BMPs discussed earlier by conducting periodic inspections and implementing actions to improve BMPs and preventative maintenance practices. A summary of the schedule for BMPs, such as inspections and training, is provided in Summary of BMP Scheduled table below.

Modifications to the current BMPs will be evaluated on a quarterly basis. Based on the findings and recommendations identified from the quarterly inspections, a schedule will be developed to implement maintenance activities. BMPs and maintenance activities proposed based on quarterly inspections are anticipated to be scheduled for implementation during the next quarter, weather permitting.

4. Stormwater Management

The goal of the Stormwater Management Program is to minimize the contact between the salt and rainwater, and contain and control all water from the stockpile area with the confines of the pad.

To minimize contact with precipitation, the stockpile is covered in sections by a waterproof tarp as salt is added to the pile. The seams are watertight and resistant to high winds. The covering is properly maintained to prevent precipitation from contacting the salt.

At a minimum, the cover should be checked on a daily basis to ensure that it is in good condition, that there are no tears, that the seams are watertight, and that the pile is properly covered to prevent exposure of salt to precipitation.

The perimeter of the stockpile cover is sealed to the pad with ballast to prevent washout of salt from the toe of the stockpile. Ballast is placed high enough on the sides of the stockpile to minimize slackness in the cover as salt shifts and flows beneath the cover down to the perimeter of the stockpile. The perimeter cover ballast is maintained until the stockpile is exhausted. The perimeter of the stockpile pad is surrounded by an asphalt berm to contain the salt.

At a minimum, the perimeter of the stock pile should be checked on a daily basis to ensure the perimeter of the stockpile cover is sealed to the pad with ballast and that the perimeter is contained within the asphalt berm.

Dust emissions are curtailed at all point in the unloading system by controlling flow and drop and having the rock salt fall a minimum distance by adjusting the height of the radial stacker during unloading.

Trucks leaving the unloading area must be tarped by the drivers before departure.

5. Best Management Practices

a. Salt Handling

The facility was designed to minimize and control the generation of dust. The facility operates in a manner that is sensitive to other industrial, commercial, public, and government facilities and residential areas.

- (1) The permittee will avoid handling salt during winds.
- (2) The permittee will minimize the distance the salt must fall from stackers and front end loaders.
 - (3) Roadways will be kept clean.
- (4) Salt will be contained with the confining berms of the site.
- (5) The stockpile will be covered to prevent precipitation contact except when loading out to customers during winter storm events where salt is needed to maintain safe driving conditions.
- (6) Salt spilled by trucks, railcars or other vehicles will be cleaned up promptly.

- (7) Salt will be loaded into trucks within the pad area and loads will not exceed the legal or physical capacity of the truck.
 - (8) All trucks must be tarped before leaving the site.
- (9) Salt deliveries to the site and shipments to customers will be scheduled when an employee is scheduled to be onsite to oversee the activities.
- (10) During loadout, the permittee will remove the covering just high enough to load out the day's shipment. This will minimize the moisture absorption by the salt and provide security to the cover if the wind direction shifts toward the working face.
- (11) The working face will be maintained perpendicular to the long axis of the pile by loading alternately left/right and right/left.
- (12) The permittee will avoid creating a horseshoe shaped working face that results from removing the center of the pile and leaving extended edges or aprons.
- (13) Chunks of salt that form as the crust of the pile breaks up will be crushed and blended into the pile and not allowed to accumulate.
 - b. General Maintenance.

General maintenance is very important to the environmental health of the facility.

- (1) On site equipment, as well as trucks picking up salt loads, will be checked regularly for oil leaks. Oil spills will be cleaned up and reported to DEP per regulations.
- (2) The asphalt pad will be inspected from settlement and cracks. Repairs will be made before stockpiling more salt on the area. We will reseal the pad periodically to ensure non-degradation of the low permeability of the pad and base. Expansion joints will be resealed when necessary.
- (3) Visual inspections, at a minimum of after each storm event, will be made of the storm water holding pond and repaired promptly.
- (4) Housekeeping is very important throughout the site.

In addition to the Potential Pollution Reporting required by Part A.III.C.3. of this permit, the permittee shall immediately notify the Department whenever a salt storage stockpile cover is not properly maintained to prevent precipitation from contacting the salt and the permittee observes that stormwater runoff from the pile is causing or threatening pollution to a waterway of the Commonwealth, the permittee shall immediately notify the Department.

Oral notification to the Department is required as soon as possible, but no later than 4 hours after the permittee becomes aware of the discharge causing or threatening pollution.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act. there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

- 3. The total amount of solvent added to each batch of product produced in the SRO process shall not exceed 8,560 kgs.
- 4. Within 180 days of the commencement of operation of the SRO process, the permittee shall perform stack testing upon the vent condenser inlet and outlet while in use to determine the volatile organic compounds control efficiency of the condenser.
- 5. The pre-cooler condensers shall be equipped with instrumentation to accurately monitor and record the coolant inlet temperature on a continuous basis. The fabric collectors shall be equipped with instrumentation to accurately monitor the differential pressure across the collector on a continuous basis.
- 6. Pursuant to the Best Available Technology Requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the total emissions from the Combined Heat and Power (CHP) Unit in any 12 consecutive month period shall not exceed:
 - (a) 15.2 tons of nitrogen oxides
 - (b) 0.7 ton of carbon monoxide
 - (c) 0.3 ton of sulfur dioxide
 - (d) 1.4 ton of particulate matter, including PM_{2.5}
 - (e) 1.2 ton of volatile organic compounds

(f) 0.3 ton of total hazardous air pollutants

- 7. Pursuant to best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall not permit the emission into the outdoor atmosphere from the exhaust of the CHP unit:
 - (a) Nitrogen oxides in excess of 30 ppm 15% oxygen
 - (b) Carbon monoxide in excess of 1.35 ppm 15% oxygen
- 8. Pursuant to best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the Combined Heat and Power Unit shall only be fired on pipeline-quality natural gas.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in

On January 8, 2018, Applicant requested a State water quality certification from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP), as required by Section 401 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. § 1341), to ensure that the construction, operation and maintenance of the Project will protect water quality in Pennsylvania through compliance with State water quality standards and associated State law requirements, which are consistent with the requirements of the Clean Water Act.

This issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* includes notices for Erosion and Sediment Control Permit (ESP062518001) and Chapter 105 Joint Permit (E25-791) applications for the Project which are currently under review by the PADEP and Erie and Crawford County Conservation Districts. The tie-in location for this Project in East Fairfield Township, Crawford County will also require a General Permit 5 (GP052018601) for a pipeline crossing of a wetland and a General Permit 8 (GP082018601) for a temporary equipment crossing of a wetland which are being reviewed by the Crawford County Conservation District.

The Project, as proposed in Pennsylvania, includes the conversion of approximately 26.6 miles of existing 12-inch natural gas gathering pipeline to transmission pipeline [from N: 41.544658°; W: 80.068591° to N: 41.855941°; W: 80.187377°], the conversion of approximately 5 miles of existing 8-inch natural gas gathering pipeline to transmission pipeline [from N: 41.855941°; W: 80.187377° to N: 41.858780°; W: 80.282057°], and the construction of approximately 16.7 miles of new 12-inch transmission pipeline [from N: 41.858780°; W: 80.282057° to N: 41.928212°; W: 80.519379°] for the purpose of transporting natural gas from East Fairfield Township, Crawford County, PA to the Ohio border in Springfield Township, Erie County. The Project also includes the construction of an additional 11.8 miles of new 12-inch natural gas transmission pipeline from the PA-OH border west to North Kingsville, OH [N: 41.907349°; W: 0.689399°], but this portion of the Project will not be authorized by PADEP. Pipeline work also includes modification of two existing compressor stations, cathodic protection, and numerous temporary access roads and staging areas to support construction and facility access. Numerous stream and wetland crossings will occur along the project route as described below. The new construction portion of the pipeline route has been co-located to parallel/overlap existing utility and road ROWs for a total of 10.78 miles in PA.

The Project, as proposed, will require approximately 146 acres of earth disturbance (143 acres in Erie County; 3 acres in Crawford County), the crossing of 58 streams (including floodways of streams not crossed by the pipeline) resulting in 1,159 linear feet of temporary impact and 4,236 linear feet of permanent impacts to the following surface waters: Turkey Creek (CWF) and tributaries; Raccoon Creek (CWF) and tributaries; East Branch Conneaut Creek (CWF) and tributaries, tributaries to Crooked Creek (HQ-CWF), tributaries to Conneaut Creek (CWF), and tributaries to Temple Creek (CWF); 11.258 acres of temporary wetland impact; 10.078 acres of permanent wetland impacts. All crossings will be installed by open trench, with the exception of East Branch Conneaut Creek, which will be installed by conventional bore.

PADEP anticipates issuing a State water quality certification to Applicant for the Project that will require compliance with the following State water quality permitting programs, criteria and conditions established pursuant to State law to ensure the Project does not violate applicable State water quality standards set forth in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93:

- 1. Discharge Permit—Applicant shall obtain and comply with a PADEP National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit for the discharge of water from the hydrostatic testing of the pipeline pursuant to Pennsylvania's Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001), and all applicable implementing regulations (25 Pa. Code Chapter 92a).
- 2. Discharge Permit—Applicant shall obtain and comply with a PADEP National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits for the discharge of industrial wastewater and/or contaminated industrial stormwater from the compressor stations pursuant to Pennsylvania's Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001), and all applicable implementing regulations (25 Pa. Code Chapter 92a).
- 3. Erosion and Sediment Control Permit—Applicant shall obtain and comply with PADEP's Chapter 102 Erosion and Sediment Control Permit issued pursuant to Pennsylvania's Clean Streams Law and Storm Water Management Act (32 P.S. §§ 680.1—680.17), and all applicable implementing regulations (25 Pa. Code Chapter 102).
- 4. Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permits—Applicant shall obtain and comply with a PADEP Chapter 105 Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permits for the construction, operation and maintenance of all water obstructions and encroachments associated with the project pursuant to Pennsylvania's Clean Streams Law, Dam Safety and Encroachments Act (32 P.S. §§ 673.1—693.27), and Flood Plain Management Act (32 P.S. §§ 679.101—679.601), and all applicable implementing regulations (25 Pa. Code Chapter 105).
- 5. Air Quality Permits—Applicant shall obtain and comply with all necessary PADEP Air Quality Permits associated with the installation of compressors at the Meadville Compressor Station and the modification of the County Line Compressor Station.
- 6. Storage Tank Permit—Applicant shall obtain and comply with all necessary PADEP Storage Tank Permits associated with the installation and operation of storage tanks at the compressor stations.
- 7. Water Quality Monitoring—PADEP retains the right to specify additional studies or monitoring to ensure that the receiving water quality is not adversely impacted by any operational and construction process that may be employed by Applicant.
- 8. Operation—Applicant shall at all times properly operate and maintain all Project facilities and systems of treatment and control (and related appurtenances) which are installed to achieve compliance with the terms and conditions of this State Water Quality Certification and all required permits, authorizations and approvals. Proper operation and maintenance includes adequate laboratory controls, appropriate quality assurance procedures, and the operation of backup or auxiliary facilities or similar systems installed by Applicant.
- 9. Inspection—The Project, including all relevant records, are subject to inspection at reasonable hours and intervals by an authorized representative of PADEP to determine compliance with this State Water Quality Certification, including all required State water quality

permits and State water quality standards. A copy of this certification shall be available for inspection by the PADEP during such inspections of the Project.

- 10. Transfer of Projects—If Applicant intends to transfer any legal or equitable interest in the Project which is affected by this State Water Quality Certification, Applicant shall serve a copy of this certification upon the prospective transferee of the legal and equitable interest at least thirty (30) days prior to the contemplated transfer and shall simultaneously inform the PADEP Regional Office of such intent. Notice to PADEP shall include a transfer agreement signed by the existing and new owner containing a specific date for transfer of certification responsibility, coverage, and liability between them.
- 11. Correspondence—All correspondence with and submittals to PADEP concerning this State Water Quality Certification shall be addressed to the Department of Environmental Protection, Northwest Regional Office, Lori Boughton, 230 Chestnut Street, Meadville, PA 16335.
- 12. Reservation of Rights—PADEP may suspend or revoke this State Water Quality Certification if it determines that Applicant has not complied with the terms and conditions of this certification. PADEP may require

- additional measures to achieve compliance with applicable law, subject to Applicant's applicable procedural and substantive rights.
- 13. Other Laws—Nothing in this State Water Quality Certification shall be construed to preclude the institution of any legal action or relieve Applicant from any responsibilities, liabilities, or penalties established pursuant to any applicable Federal or State law or regulation.
- 14. Severability—The provisions of this State Water Quality Certification are severable and should any provision of this certification be declared invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of the certification shall not be affected thereby.

Prior to issuance of the final State water quality certification, PADEP will consider all relevant and timely comments, suggestions or objections submitted to PADEP within 30 days of this notice. Comments should be directed to Lori Boughton, Regional Program Manager at the previous address or through the Pennsylvania AT&T Relay Service at (800) 654-5984 (TDD). Comments must be submitted in writing and contain the name, address and telephone number of the person commenting and a concise statement of comments, objections, or suggestions on this proposal. No comments submitted by facsimile will be accepted.

Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30 days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of

practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. The appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure are also available in Braille or on audiotape from the Secretary to the Board at (717) 787-3483. This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create a right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decisional law.

For individuals who wish to challenge an action, the appeal must reach the Board within 30 days. A lawyer is not needed to file an appeal with the Board.

The PAG-11 General Permit will become effective on March 3, 2018, and will expire on March 2, 2023. All

Medical Assistance Program Fee Schedule: Addition of Procedure Code for Vaccine Administration

In accordance with 55 Pa. Code § 1150.61(a) (relating to guidelines for fee schedule changes), the Department of Human Services (Department) announces the addition of the following procedure code to the Medical Assistance (MA) Program Fee Schedule for the administration of a quadrivalent influenza virus vaccine derived from cell cultures that contains a preservative, effective for dates of service on and after March 5, 2018.

90756	Influenza virus vaccine, quadrivalent (ccIIV4), derived from cell cultures, subunit, antibiotic free, 0.5 mL dosage, for intramuscular use (Flucelvax Quadrivalent®)	\$10

Flucelvax Quadrivalent® is a suspension for injection that is now available either in a 0.5 mL, single-dose, pre-filled syringe or a 5 mL multidose vial containing ten doses. The United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) first approved use of Flucelvax Quadrivalent®, a quadrivalent influenza virus vaccine derived from cell cultures, preservative and antibiotic free, in a single-dose, pre-filled syringe, on May 23, 2016. On July 7, 2017, the FDA approved the Flucelvax Quadrivalent® containing a preservative and supplied in a 5 mL multidose vial containing ten doses. The American Medical Association released Common Procedural Terminology (CPT) code 90756 on July 1, 2017, for administration of a quadrivalent influenza virus vaccine derived from cell cultures that contains a preservative, such as Flucelvax Quadrivalent® as supplied in a 5 mL multidose vial containing ten doses. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services made CPT code 90756 available as of January 1, 2018, as part of the annual 2018 Healthcare Common Procedure Coding System update. The Department is adding CPT code 90756 to the MA Program Fee Schedule to identify when a practitioner administers preservative-containing Flucelvax Quadrivalent® from a 5 mL multidose vial containing ten doses.

The Department will issue an MA Bulletin to providers enrolled in the MA Program specifying the procedures for billing of the administration of the influenza virus vaccine.

Fiscal Impact

The Department anticipates no fiscal impact as a result of adding CPT code 90756 to the MA Fee Schedule, as there is an existing procedure code on the fee schedule that is being used for the administration of an unspecified vaccine and the addition of this procedure code will not increase utilization.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. Name: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania \$1 Break the Bank (hereinafter "\$1 Break the Bank"). The game number is PA-5027.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized Retailer or Retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar Code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, and transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.

(f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

- (g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *PRIZE*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) *Progressive Top Prize*: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.
- (k) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (l) Winning Ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (m) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area and generated via quick pick that, when matched against the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a \$1 Break the Bank ticket is \$1.
 - 4. Description of the \$1 Break the Bank lottery game:
- (a) The \$1 Break the Bank lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the Progressive Top Prize amount, all prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select his or her own play symbols. \$1 Break the Bank tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) \$1 Break the Bank is played by matching the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. If the player's ticket contains a 1 (WIN1) symbol, the player wins \$1 instantly. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Players can win the prize identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) A \$1 Break the Bank game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer by verbally requesting a \$1 Break the Bank game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a \$1 Break the Bank game ticket and select the \$1 Break the Bank option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

- 5. Pennsylvania \$1 Break the Bank ticket characteristics:
- (a) A \$1 Break the Bank ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each \$1 Break the Bank ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area and a "YOUR NUMBERS" area. The play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area are: 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), and 30 (THIRTY). The play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY) and a 1 (WIN1) symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: FREE (TICKET), $\$1^{.00}$ (ONE DOL), $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), \$100 (ONE HUN) and PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE).
- (d) Prizes: The prizes that can be won in this game are: Free \$1 Fast Play Ticket, \$1, \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$40, \$100 and the Progressive Top Prize. The Progressive Top Prize amount starts at \$2,500 and increases by 16¢ every time a \$1 Break the Bank ticket is purchased. When a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket is sold, the Progressive Top Prize resets to \$2,500.
 - (e) A player can win up to 8 times on a ticket.
- (f) Approximate Number of Tickets Available for the Game: Approximately 1,200,000 tickets will be available for sale for the \$1 Break the Bank lottery game.
- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All \$1 Break the Bank prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "Progressive Top Prize." The amount won under this subsection is the amount of the Progressive Top Prize, determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$2,500.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the

- matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40^{.00} (FORTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $\$1^{.00}$ (ONE DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols is a 1 (WIN1) symbol and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under that 1 (WIN1) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.
- (l) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "WINNING NUMBER" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one \$1 Break the Bank game ticket.

- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

- 9. Ticket Validation and Requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets: A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
 - 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) Pursuant to the preceding subsections (a), (b) and (c), the retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
 - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
 - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery,

Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

- 14. Progressive Top Prize Restrictions:
- (a) An amount of 16q from the sale of each \$1 Break the Bank ticket will be accumulated in the Progressive Top Prize pool.
- (b) Prize Amount: The amount of the Progressive Top Prize at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the Progressive Top Prize are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising the \$1 Break the Bank game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.
- (c) The Progressive Top Prize and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a Progressive Top Prize being reset without the actual sale of a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the Progressive Top Prize pool (i.e. 16α from the sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next Progressive Top Prize won.
 - 15. Governing Law:
- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play \$1 Break the Bank lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 16. Retailer Compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 17. Retailer Incentive Programs. The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play \$1 Break the Bank lottery game tickets.
- 18. Retailer Bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not

exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which he qualifies on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

- 19. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote \$1 Break the Bank or through normal communications methods.
- 20. Applicability: This notice applies only to the \$1 Break the Bank lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania \$2 Break the Bank Fast Play Game 5026

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania \$2 Break the Bank (hereinafter "\$2 Break the Bank"). The game number is PA-5026.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized Retailer or Retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar Code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, and transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.
- (f) Play: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.

- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *PRIZE*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) *Progressive Top Prize*: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.
- (k) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (l) Winning Ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (m) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area and generated via quick pick that, when matched against the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a \$2 Break the Bank ticket is \$2.
 - 4. Description of the \$2 Break the Bank lottery game:
- (a) The \$2 Break the Bank lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the Progressive Top Prize amount, all prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select his or her own play symbols. \$2 Break the Bank tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) \$2 Break the Bank is played by matching the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. If the player's ticket contains a 2 (WIN2) symbol, the player wins \$2 instantly. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Players can win the prize identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) A \$2 Break the Bank game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer by verbally requesting a \$2 Break the Bank game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a \$2 Break the Bank game ticket and select the \$2 Break the Bank option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

- 5. Pennsylvania \$2 Break the Bank ticket characteristics:
- (a) A \$2 Break the Bank ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each \$2 Break the Bank ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area and a "YOUR NUMBERS" area. The play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 36 (THYSIX), 37 (THYSVN), 38 (THYEGT), 39 (THYNIN), and 40 (FORTY). The play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 36 (THYSIX), 37 (THYSVN), 38 (THYEGT), 39 (THYNIN), 40 (FORTY) and a 2 (WIN2) symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTN), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), $\$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN) and PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500 and the Progressive Top Prize. The Progressive Top Prize amount starts at \$10,000 and increases by 18¢ every time a \$2 Break the Bank ticket is purchased. When a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket is sold, the Progressive Top Prize resets to \$10,000.
 - (e) A player can win up to 12 times on a ticket.
- (f) Approximate Number of Tickets Available for the Game: Approximately 2,400,000 tickets will be available for sale for the \$2 Break the Bank lottery game.
- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All \$2 Break the Bank prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "Progressive Top Prize." The amount won under this subsection is the amount of the Progressive Top Prize, determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$10,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the

- matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40^{.00} (FORTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (1) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$4'0 (FOR DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols is a 2 (WIN2) symbol and a prize symbol of $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under that 2 (WIN2) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.

- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets: A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

- 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

- (a) An amount of 18¢ from the sale of each \$2 Break the Bank ticket will be accumulated in the Progressive Top Prize pool.
- (b) Prize Amount: The amount of the Progressive Top Prize at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the Progressive Top Prize are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising the \$2 Break the Bank game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.
- (c) The Progressive Top Prize and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a Progressive Top Prize being reset without the actual sale of a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the Progressive Top Prize pool (i.e. 18¢ from the sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next Progressive Top Prize won.
 - 15. Governing Law:
- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play \$2 Break the Bank lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 16. Retailer Compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 17. Retailer Incentive Programs. The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play \$2 Break the Bank lottery game tickets.
- 18. Retailer Bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in

a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which he qualifies on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

- 19. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote \$2 Break the Bank or through normal communications methods.
- 20. Applicability: This notice applies only to the \$2 Break the Bank lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania \$5 Break the Bank Fast Play Game 5025

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania \$5 Break the Bank (hereinafter "\$5 Break the Bank"). The game number is PA-5025.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized Retailer or Retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar Code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing

plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, and transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.

- (f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (g) Play Area: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *PRIZE*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) *Progressive Top Prize*: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.
- (k) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (1) Winning Ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (m) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area and generated via quick pick that, when matched against the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a \$5 Break the Bank ticket is \$5.
 - 4. Description of the \$5 Break the Bank lottery game:
- (a) The \$5 Break the Bank lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the Progressive Top Prize amount, all prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select his or her own play symbols. \$5 Break the Bank tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) \$5 Break the Bank is played by matching the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. If the player's ticket contains a 5 (WIN5) symbol, the player wins \$5 instantly. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Players can win the prize identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) A \$5 Break the Bank game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer by verbally requesting a \$5 Break the Bank game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total

- purchase price of a \$5 Break the Bank game ticket and select the \$5 Break the Bank option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- 5. Pennsylvania \$5 Break the Bank ticket characteristics:
- (a) A \$5 Break the Bank ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each \$5 Break the Bank ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area and a "YOUR NUMBERS" area. The play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 36 (THYSIX), 37 (THYSVN), 38 (THYEGT), 39 (THYNIN), and 40 (FORTY). The play symbols located in the "YOUR NUM-BERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 36 (THYSIX), 37 (THYSVN), 38 (THYEGT), 39 (THYNIN), 40 (FORTY) and a 5 (WIN5) symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: \$5.00 (FIV DOL), \$10.00 (TEN DOL), \$15.00 (FIFTN), \$20.00 (TWENTY), \$40.00 (FORTY), \$50.00 (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$400 (FOR HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO), \$5,000 (FIV THO) and PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$400, \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000 and the Progressive Top Prize. The Progressive Top Prize amount starts at \$50,000 and increases by 30¢ every time a \$5 Break the Bank ticket is purchased. When a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket is sold, the Progressive Top Prize resets to \$50,000.
 - (e) A player can win up to 16 times on a ticket.
- (f) Approximate Number of Tickets Available for the Game: Approximately 4,800,000 tickets will be available for sale for the \$5 Break the Bank lottery game.
- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All \$5 Break the Bank prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "Progressive Top Prize." The amount won under this subsection is the amount of the Progressive Top Prize, determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$50,000.

- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5,000 (FIV THO) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$400 (FOR HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$400.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING

- NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40.00 (FORTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (l) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols is a 5 (WIN5) symbol and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under that 5 (WIN5) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- 7. Number and Description of Prizes and Approximate Chances of Winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes, and approximate chances of winning:

 - 9. Ticket Validation and Requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets: A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
 - 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) Pursuant to the preceding subsections (a), (b) and (c), the retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
 - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.
 - 14. Progressive Top Prize Restrictions:
- (a) An amount of 30ϕ from the sale of each \$5 Break the Bank ticket will be accumulated in the Progressive Top Prize pool.
- (b) Prize Amount: The amount of the Progressive Top Prize at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the Progressive Top Prize are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising the \$5 Break the Bank game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.
- (c) The Progressive Top Prize and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a Progressive Top Prize being reset without the actual sale of a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the Progressive Top Prize pool (i.e. 30ϕ from the sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next Progressive Top Prize won.
 - 15. Governing Law:
- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play \$5 Break the Bank lottery game.

- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 16. Retailer Compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 17. Retailer Incentive Programs. The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play \$5 Break the Bank lottery game tickets.
- 18. Retailer Bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaran-
- teed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which he qualifies on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 19. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote \$5 Break the Bank or through normal communications methods.
- 20. Applicability: This notice applies only to the \$5 Break the Bank lottery game announced in this notice.
