READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Rules, Regulations and Statements of Policy in Titles 1—107 of the Pennsylvania Code

Text proposed to be added is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Text proposed to be deleted is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Title 201—RULES OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

[201 PA. CODE CH. 40]

Proposed Amendments to the Uniform Rules Governing Court Reporting and Transcripts

The Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts is considering recommending to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania the adoption of amendments to the Uniform Rules Governing Court Reporting and Transcripts eliminating the Committee on Court Reporting and Transcripts and providing for a minimum 30-day public comment period for any proposed transcript rate increase in a judicial district.

The proposed deletion of Rule of Judicial Administration 4003 and amendment of Rule of Judicial Administration 4008 will help to streamline the process and provide more transparency when a judicial district seeks to increase its transcript rates. The deletion of Rule 4003 is proposed given the lack of activity by the Committee for the past several years. The proposed amendment to Rule of Judicial Administration 4008 will require a judicial district that seeks to increase its transcript rates to solicit feedback for at least 30 days prior to submitting its proposal to the Court Administrator for review. The Administrative Office will serve as the entity proposing any changes to the Uniform Rules Governing Court Reporting and Transcripts, as it does generally with the Rules of Judicial Administration, along with public notice and opportunity for comment.

Proposed new material is underlined and in bold-face type, and deleted material is bracketed and in bold-face type.

Annex A

TITLE 201. RULES OF JUDICIAL **ADMINISTRATION**

CHAPTER 40. UNIFORM RULES GOVERNING COURT REPORTING AND TRANSCRIPTS

Rule 4003. [Committee on Court Reporting and Transcripts Rescinded by Supreme Court Order dated

(A) The Committee on Court Reporting and Transcripts shall consist of the following members appointed by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, one of whom shall be designated as Chair and one of whom shall be designated as Vice-Chair:

- (1) One representative of the Superior Court of Pennsylvania;
- (2) One representative of the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania;
- (3) Two president judges of the courts of common pleas chosen from among the judicial districts of the Commonwealth;
- (4) Two members of the County Commissioners Association of Pennsylvania;
- (5) The district court administrator of the Philadelphia County Court of Common Pleas;
- (6) The district court administrator of the Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas;
- (7) Two district court administrators chosen from among the judicial districts of the Commonwealth other than Philadelphia and Allegheny;
- (8) Two providers of court reporting services representing the various methods currently in usage within Pennsylvania; and
 - (9) Two members of the Pennsylvania Bar.
- (B) Initial appointments shall be for one-, two- or three-year terms, and these members may serve one additional three-year term. Thereafter appointments shall be for three years and members shall serve no more than two consecutive three-year terms. A replacement appointee shall serve for the balance of the unexpired term.
- (C) The Committee shall review current rules and practices, and, upon concurrence of the Court Administrator, recommend revisions to the Uniform Rules Governing Court Reporting and Transcripts as may be necessary to effectuate the policy of these rules.
- (D) The Administrative Office shall provide staff support to the Committee.

Rule 4008. Transcript Costs Payable by a Requesting Party Other Than the Commonwealth or a Subdivision Thereof.

(F) Requests for Rate Increases

The president judge of a judicial district may request an increase in the rates prescribed in subdivision (A) or (D) by submitting a written request to the [Committee] on Court Reporting and Transcripts] Court Administrator. Prior to submission, notice of the proposed increase shall be published for public comment for at least thirty days. Any comments received must be forwarded to the Court Administrator with the **request.** The request shall only be approved where it is established that the judicial district faces an economic hardship caused by the current rates and that the requested rates are reasonable. If the Committee approves the request by majority vote, it shall be

forwarded to the Court Administrator for review.] If the Court Administrator determines that the increase is necessary, the request shall be forwarded to the Supreme Court.

And Now, this 22nd day of July, 2019, upon the recommendation of the Minor Court Rules Committee, the proposal having been published for public comment at 45 Pa.B. 1252 (March 14, 2015) and 47 Pa.B. 7305 (December 2, 2017):

It is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that Rule 402 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure Before Magisterial District Judges is amended in the following form.

This Order shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(b), and shall be effective on January 1, 2020.

Annex A

TITLE 246. MINOR COURT CIVIL RULES PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 400. ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS RENDERED BY MAGISTERIAL DISTRICT JUDGES FOR THE PAYMENT OF MONEY

- Rule 402. Request for Order of Execution. Entry of Judgment in Court of Common Pleas or Philadelphia Municipal Court.
- A.(1) Execution of a judgment for the payment of money rendered by a magisterial district judge may be ordered by a magisterial district judge in whose office the judgment was rendered or entered, provided the plaintiff files in that office
- [(1)] (a) not before the expiration of 30 days from the date the judgment is entered by the magisterial district judge, and
- [(2)] (b) within five years of that date, a request for an order of execution.
- (2) The magisterial district judge in whose office the judgment was rendered or entered shall accept all timely requests for an order of execution on that judgment, including when the location of the property to be levied upon is located outside the county of the magisterial district where the judgment was rendered or entered.
- B. The request form shall be attached to the order, return and other matters required by these rules.

C. The plaintiff may enter the judgment, for the purpose of requesting an order of execution thereon, in an office of a magisterial district judge other than that in which it was rendered only if levy is to be made outside the county in which the judgment was rendered and the office in which the judgment is entered for execution is that of [a] the magisterial district judge whose magisterial district is situated in the county in which levy is to be made.

The plaintiff may enter the judgment in such other office by filing therein a copy of the record of the proceedings containing the judgment, certified to be a true copy by the magisterial district judge in whose existing office the judgment was rendered or by any other official custodian of the record.

- D.(1) The plaintiff may enter the judgment in the court of common pleas in any county or the Philadelphia Municipal Court. When so entered, the indexing, revival and execution of the judgment shall be in accordance with procedures applicable in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court.
- (2) The judgment may be entered in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court by filing with the prothonotary or Philadelphia Municipal Court Administrator a copy of the record of the proceedings containing the judgment, certified to be a true copy by the magisterial district judge in whose office the judgment was rendered or by any other official custodian of the record.
- (3) The judgment may be entered in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court after 30 days from the date the judgment is entered by the magisterial district judge. The judgment may not be entered in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court after five years from the date the judgment is entered by the magisterial district judge.
- (4)(a) Within 14 days of entering the judgment in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court, the plaintiff shall file satisfactory proof of the entry of judgment with the magisterial district court that entered the judgment, and the magisterial district court shall vacate the judgment from its docket.
- (b) If after 14 days of entering the judgment in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court, the plaintiff fails to comply with subparagraph $\overline{4(a)}$ of this rule, the defendant may file such proof with the magisterial district court that entered the judgment, and the magisterial district court shall vacate the judgment from its docket.
- (5) Except as provided in [paragraphs] subparagraphs D(4) and D(6) of this rule, once the judgment is entered in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court all further process must come from [the court of common pleas] that court and no further process may be issued by the magisterial district judge.
- (6) The magisterial district judge shall enter satisfaction on the docket of the magisterial district court proceedings upon the filing by any party in interest of a certified copy of the docket entries of the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court showing the judgment and satisfaction have been entered in [the court of common pleas] that court.

E.(1) As used in this rule, a judgment marked "expired" is a judgment that cannot be satisfied, revived, or vacated because the five-year period designated in Rule 402 has elapsed.

(2) If the plaintiff does not request an order of execution in a magisterial district court or enter the judgment in a court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Mu**nicipal Court** within five years of the date the judgment was entered by the magisterial district judge, then the judgment shall be marked expired.

Official Note: The discretionary language used throughout paragraphs A(1), C, and D is intended to reflect the various options available to the plaintiff for executing upon a judgment rendered by a magisterial district judge.

Under [subdivision A] paragraph A(1) of this rule, the execution proceedings are commenced by requesting an "order of execution." The request may not be filed before the expiration of 30 days after the date the judgment is entered by the magisterial district judge. This will give the defendant an opportunity to obtain a supersedeas within the appeal period. The request must be filed within five years of the date the judgment is entered by the magisterial district judge. No provision has been made for revival of a judgment in magisterial district court proceedings.

Under paragraph A(2), if the plaintiff requests an order of execution in the magisterial district court where the judgment was entered and the property to be levied upon is outside the county of that magisterial district, then the magisterial district judge shall accept the request and use the available automated system to facilitate the transfer of the request to the magisterial district court in the magisterial district where the property is located. The magisterial district judge who receives a request to levy upon property located outside the county of the magisterial district shall neither reject it solely on this basis nor direct the plaintiff to file it with the other court. This requirement is consistent with Rule 403A, which provides that "[u]pon the filing of the request form, the magisterial district judge...shall issue the order of execution thereon.'

[Subdivision] Paragraph C provides for entering the judgment, for the purpose of requesting an order of execution, in an office of a magisterial district judge other than that in which the judgment was rendered when levy is to be made outside the county in which the judgment was rendered. Compare Pa.R.C.P. No. 3002.

As to **[subdivision] paragraph** D, see Section 1516 of the Judicial Code, 42 Pa.C.S. § 1516. The [30 day] **30-day** limitation in the rule appears to be required by this Section. Certification by the magisterial district judge should not be done before the expiration of 30 days after the date of entry of the judgment. The only method available to renew a judgment would be to record the judgment in the [Prothonotary's] prothonotary's or Philadelphia Municipal Court Administrator's office prior to the expiration of the five-year period and then follow the applicable Rules of Civil Procedure for the revival of judgments. See Pa.R.C.P. No. 3025 et seq.; see also Phila. M.C.R. Civ.P. No. 126c. Also, [subdivision] paragraph D makes clear that when the judgment is entered in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court, all further process

shall come from [the court of common pleas] that court and that no further process shall be issued by the magisterial district judge except that the magisterial district judge shall enter on the magisterial district court docket vacating of the judgment due to its entry at the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal **Court**, or proof of satisfaction of a judgment that had been entered in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court and subsequently satisfied in that court. This exception is necessary so that procedures exist for entering satisfaction of all judgments with the magisterial district court, regardless of whether the judgment has been certified to and satisfied in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court. A plaintiff filing a judgment in the court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court is required to file satisfactory proof of the entry of judgment with the magisterial district court that entered the judgment, and the magisterial district court will then vacate its judgment. This step ensures that only the enforceable common pleas or Philadelphia Municipal Court judgment will be reportable as an outstanding liability of the defendant.

[Subdivision] Paragraph E provides that a judgment shall be marked expired if the plaintiff does not request an order of execution in a magisterial district court or enter the judgment in a court of common pleas or the Philadelphia Municipal Court within five years of the date the judgment was entered by the magisterial district judge. Limiting the time period for entry of the judgment to five years will give a plaintiff sufficient time to act without indefinitely penalizing a defendant.

Recommendation 3-2018, Minor Court Rules Committee

Amendment of Pa.R.C.P.M.D.J. No. 402 **Entry of Judgment**

I. Introduction

The Minor Court Rules Committee ("Committee") recommended amendments to Rule 402 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure before Magisterial District Judges ("Rules"). Rule 402 addresses entry of judgment with a court for the purpose of seeking execution. The amendments will (1) clarify the procedure for a request for an order of execution that will take place outside the magisterial district court where the judgment was rendered, and (2) add the Philadelphia Municipal Court as an additional court where a magisterial district court judgment may be entered for the purpose of seeking an order of execution.

II. Background and Discussion

Request for an Order of Execution

The Committee received inquiries in recent years regarding a magisterial district judge's authority to reject a request for an order of execution that will occur outside the county where the judgment was rendered (i.e., an out-of-district execution²), and, instead, require that the plaintiff go directly to a magisterial district court in the other county to pursue execution. The Committee believed

¹ The Committee's Final Report should not be confused with the Official Notes to the Rules. Also, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania does not adopt the Committee's Official Notes or the contents of the explanatory Final Reports.
² A plaintiff may seek an out-of-district execution because the defendant owns tangible, non-perishable, personal property that can be levied upon outside the district where the action took place. The Magisterial District Judge System ("MDJS") has automated procedures in place to accommodate out-of-district executions.

that this scenario was not consistent with the Rules, and found that clarification of Rule 402 would be useful for the bench and bar.

Rule 402A addresses entering the judgment for execution in the magisterial district where it was rendered and is silent on the question of where the execution will take place. Rule 402A provides:

Execution of judgment for the payment of money rendered by a magisterial district judge *may* be ordered by a magisterial district judge in whose office the judgment was rendered or entered provided the plaintiff files in that office

- (1) not before the expiration of 30 days from the date the judgment is entered by the magisterial district judge, and
- (2) within five years of that date,
- a request for an order of execution.

Pa.R.C.P.M.D.J. No. 402A (emphasis added).

In contrast, Rule 402C provides:

A plaintiff may enter the judgment, for the purpose of requesting an order of execution thereon, in an office of a magisterial district judge other than that in which it was rendered only if levy is to be made outside the county in which the judgment was rendered and the office in which the judgment is entered for execution is that of a magisterial district judge whose magisterial district is situated in the county in which levy is to be made.

Pa.R.C.P.M.D.J. No. 402C (emphasis added).

The discretionary language used in Rules 402A and C is for the sole benefit of the plaintiff to elect where to enter the judgment for execution. Moreover, the directive language of Rule 403A provides that "[u]pon the filing of the request form, the magisterial district judge shall note on the form the time and date of its filing and *shall* issue the order of execution thereon." (Emphasis added.)

The Committee recommended adding new subparagraph A(2) to Rule 402, as well as amending the Official Note to Rule 402, to clarify that the magisterial district judge in whose office the judgment was rendered or entered shall accept all timely requests for an order of execution on that judgment, even when the property to be levied upon is located outside the county of the magisterial district where the judgment was rendered or entered.

Entering Judgments in the Philadelphia Municipal Court

In addition to providing for entering judgments in magisterial district courts, Rule 402 also provides that a plaintiff may enter a judgment rendered by a magisterial district court in the court of common pleas of any county. See Rule 402D(1). When entered in the court of common pleas, the judgment is subject to the indexing, revival, and execution procedures applicable in the court of common pleas. Id. Entering a judgment in the court of common pleas, and submission of proof thereof to the magisterial district court, has the effect of vacating the underlying magisterial district court judgment, so that only one judgment remains in effect for execution purposes. See Rule 402D(4).

While reviewing Rule 302 (pertaining to venue) on a separate matter, the Committee observed that the venue rule specifically permits the transfer of cases to and from the Philadelphia Municipal Court, while the rule on entry of judgments limits transfers to a magisterial district court or a court of common pleas. The Committee agreed

that permitting entry of judgments in the Philadelphia Municipal Court would be useful to litigants, and discussed amending Rule 402 to add the Philadelphia Municipal Court as a court where a plaintiff may enter a magisterial district court judgment.

The Philadelphia Municipal Court Rules of Civil Practice permit entry of judgments from other courts: "[j]udgments of other Pennsylvania jurisdictions within the jurisdictional amount of this court may be transferred to this court by filing a certified copy of all the docket entries in the action and a certification of the amount of judgment or a certified copy of the transcript of the judgment." See Phila. M.C.R. Civ.P. No. 125a. Judgments entered in Philadelphia Municipal Court are treated in the same manner as judgments entered in the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County.

Judgment recovered in the Philadelphia Municipal Court shall be a lien upon property in the same manner and to the same extent that judgment recovered in the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County is a lien. All such judgments shall be indexed in the judgment index or indices of Philadelphia County in the same manner as judgments of the court of common pleas are indexed.

42 Pa.C.S. § 1124. With regard to judgments of magisterial district courts, 42 Pa.C.S. § 1516, referenced in the Official Note to Rule 402, provides:

[a] judgment of a magisterial district judge shall not operate as a lien on real property until a transcript of the record showing a final judgment of a magisterial district judge has been filed in the manner prescribed by general rules in the office of the clerk of the court of common pleas of the county where the property is situated, or in the office of the clerk of the branch of the court of common pleas embracing such county.

42 Pa.C.S. § 1516.

Permitting entry of judgments in the Philadelphia Municipal Court would achieve consistency between the courts, and provide litigants with an additional venue to initiate the judgment enforcement process.

III. Rule Changes

With regard to requests for out-of-district executions, the Committee recommended amending Rule 402 and the Official Note to Rule 402. New paragraph A(2) provides that the magisterial district judge in whose office the judgment was rendered or entered shall accept all timely requests for an order of execution on that judgment, even when the property to be levied upon is located outside the county of the magisterial district where the judgment was rendered or entered. The amendments to the Official Note also explain that the discretionary language used throughout Rule 402 is intended to reflect the various options available to the plaintiff for executing upon a judgment rendered by a magisterial district judge. The Committee also recommended noting the contrast with Rule 403A, which provides that "[u]pon the filing of the request form, the magisterial district judge...shall issue the order of execution thereon."

The Committee recommended adding the Philadelphia Municipal Court as a court where a magisterial district court judgment can be entered for the purpose of pursuing execution. This is reflected by adding the Philadelphia Municipal Court throughout paragraphs D and E of the rule, as well as pertinent references in the Official Note.

The Committee recommended minor stylistic changes throughout Rule 402.

Public Hearing and Business Meeting

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold a public hearing on Wednesday, August 14, 2019, at the Delaware River Basin Commission, 25 Cosey Road, West Trenton, NJ. A business meeting will be held the following month on Wednesday, September 11, 2019, at The Conference Center at Mercer, Mercer County Community College, 1200 Old Trenton Road, West Windsor, NJ. The hearing and business meeting are open to the public.

Public hearing. The public hearing on August 14, 2019, will begin at 1:30 p.m. Hearing items include draft dockets for withdrawals, discharges and other projects that could have a substantial effect on the basin's water resources, as well as a resolution authorizing the Executive Director to enter into contracts for analytical services relating to the control of toxic substances in the Delaware River and Bay.

Written comments on matters scheduled for hearing on August 14, 2019, will be accepted through 5 p.m. on August 19, 2019. Time permitting, an opportunity for open public comment will be provided upon the conclusion of Commission business at the September 11, 2019, business meeting.

The public is advised to check the Commission's web site periodically prior to the hearing date, as items scheduled for hearing may be postponed if additional time is needed to complete the Commission's review and items may be added up to 10 days prior to the hearing date. In reviewing docket descriptions, the public is also asked to be aware that the details of projects may change during the Commission's review, which is ongoing.

- 1. Bridgeport Borough, D-1970-081 CP-4. An application to renew the approval of the applicant's existing 0.9 million gallons per day (mgd) wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) and its discharge. Any deferred items will be considered for action at a public meeting of the Commission on a future date.

Program Requirements for the Very Small Meat Processor Federal Inspection Reimbursement Grant Program

The Department of Agriculture (Department) hereby provides notice of the standards and requirements for the Very Small Meat Processor Federal Inspection Reimbursement Grant Program (Program).

The Program is established under authority of the act of July 1, 2019 (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 10101—10106) (Act 36). Act 36 takes effect August 30, 2019. The Program allows the Department to award reimbursement grants for certain eligible costs incurred by a person who meets the Federal definition of a "very small meat processor."

This notice establishes the procedures by which grant applications will be solicited and reviewed, and by which grants will be awarded, drawing on \$500,000 in funding available in Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-2020.

- 1. Program Objectives. The Program's objective is to reimburse some portion of the costs associated with meeting Federal inspection and certification guidelines during the planning and start-up periods for a very small meat processor operating within this Commonwealth.
- 2. *Definitions*. The following words and phrases apply to the Program:

Department. The Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth.

Person. An individual, partnership, association, firm, corporation or any other legal entity.

Program. The Very Small Meat Processor Federal Inspection Reimbursement Grant Program.

Secretary. The Secretary of the Department.

Very small meat processor. A person subject to Federal meat inspection that meets the United States Department

- of Agriculture's definition of a "very small processor," having fewer than 10 employees or annual sales of less than \$2.5 million.
- 3. Reimbursement Grant Program. Program grants shall be reimbursement grants. The following shall apply:
- a. The amount of reimbursement is based on actual eligible costs submitted by an approved applicant for an approved project during any fiscal year in which grants are offered.
- b. Grants shall only be available for eligible costs (as described in Paragraph No. 3(d)) of obtaining a Federal certification to allow the sale of meat by a very small meat processor.
- c. Grants are limited to no more than \$50,000 per applicant.
- d. Grant reimbursement money is limited to 50% or less of the costs of an eligible project.
- e. Grant reimbursement money shall not be used to reimburse any portion of an in-kind contribution to an eligible project.
- f. Grant money may not be used to pay or reimburse wages or salaries of grant recipient staff.
- g. Grant money may not be used to reimburse any portion of the project costs which are being paid or reimbursed under another Federal or State grant program.
- h. If the Department receives eligible grant applications that collectively seek an amount exceeding the \$500,000 sum made available by the General Assembly for grants in FY 2019-2020, the Department may prorate individual grants by multiplying the grant amount sought by a fraction having the individual grant amount sought as the numerator and the total amount of grants sought as the denominator.
- i. In the event funding is exhausted or otherwise unavailable, the Department shall be under no obligation to provide Program grants.
- j. Grant money may only be awarded and distributed to the owner of the eligible very small meat processor establishment. The Department may not assign grant money to a lessee, operator or person other than the owner of the eligible very small meat processing establishment.
- 4. Applicant Eligibility. A person who is a very small meat processor or who is starting a very small meat processor business may apply to the Department for a grant under the Program.
 - 5. Application Procedure.
- a. Online Applications Only. An applicant for a grant under the Program shall be submitted through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Single Application for Assistance online application system at www.esa.dced.state.pa.us.
- b. Application Window. Applications must be submitted through the Single Application for Assistance online application system between 7 a.m. on August 15, 2019, and 11:59 p.m. on September 30, 2019. Applications received outside of that application window will not be considered or reviewed.
- c. Application Requirements. An application for a grant under the Program shall contain the following information:

- i. The applicant's name, the organization name, a business address and a telephone number.
- ii. A list of corporate officers, if the applicant is a corporation.
- iii. The applicant's eligibility, setting forth information evidencing and attesting that the applicant meets the definition of a "very small meat processor."
- iv. A plan outlining the process being undertaken to apply for and obtain Federal certification as a meat processor.
- v. The estimated eligible costs for which reimbursement is sought, not to exceed 50% of project costs.
- vi. An attestation signed by the applicant stating the applicant, verifying the accuracy of the information presented on the application, and verifying the applicant is in good standing with all Federal licensure, recordkeeping and slaughter requirements, including the Federal Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points standards.
- d. *Eligible Costs*. The following costs are eligible for reimbursement under the Program:
- i. Invoiced costs directly incurred for the initial compliance inspection.
- ii. A one-time reimbursement for the cost, not including man hours, directly incurred in producing the required Federal Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points plan. If a professional consultant is utilized to develop the Federal Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points plan, reasonable costs may be reimbursed, as determined by the Department.
- iii. Up to 50% of the actual costs of a first-time purchase of equipment necessary for compliance with the Federal Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points plan.
- 7. Disposition and Review of Grant Applications. The Department will review each application, and supporting documentation submitted therewith, for completeness and accuracy. If an application is found to be incomplete or inaccurate, the Department may request additional documentation and may discontinue further processing of the application until the requested information is received.
- 8. Notice of Disposition of Application. The Secretary will make a decision with respect to each timely, complete grant application it receives by October 15, 2019, and will provide the applicant written notice of the disposition of that application.
- 9. Agreement Required. If the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant shall execute a Grant Agreement which describes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made.
- 10. Distribution of Grant Money. As Program grants are reimbursement grants, the Department will not issue grant money until the successful applicant submits all of the following to the Department:
 - a. The date of the inspection.
- b. The name of the Federal inspector or veterinarian in charge of the inspection.
- c. A document signed by the Federal inspector or veterinarian in charge evidencing that the approved applicant's establishment passed the inspection.

d. Documentation of actual costs for which reimbursement is sought and payment of the costs.

Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. A comment submittal should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for public hearings on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.907).

Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

- 1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Perfectly Peared (hereinafter "Perfectly Peared"). The game number is PA-5064.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized Retailer or Retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar Code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, and transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.
- (f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (g) Play Area: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) *PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE*: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.
- (k) ROW: A specific, pre-defined portion of the play area, which contains two play symbols and a prize symbol in a horizontal line, that when played according to the instructions, determine whether a player wins a prize. Each "ROW" is played separately.

- (l) WINNING SYMBOLS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in any "ROW," determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (m) Winning Ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a Perfectly Peared ticket is \$1.
 - 4. Description of the Perfectly Peared lottery game:
- (a) The Perfectly Peared lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE," all prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select his or her own play symbols. Perfectly Peared tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Perfectly Peared is played by matching the play symbols in the "WINNING SYMBOLS" area to the play symbols located in each "ROW." A player matching any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" to both the symbols in the same horizontal "ROW" will win the prize shown for that "ROW." When one of the matching symbols is a "Pear" (PEAR) symbol, double the prize shown. A bet slip is not used to play this game. Each "ROW" is played separately.
- (c) Players can win the prize identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) A Perfectly Peared game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer by verbally requesting a Perfectly Peared game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Perfectly Peared game ticket and select the Perfectly Peared option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
 - 5. Perfectly Peared ticket characteristics:
- (a) A Perfectly Peared ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code. Each ticket shall consist of five "ROW" areas. Each "ROW" is played separately.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each Perfectly Peared ticket play area will contain a "WINNING SYMBOLS" area and five "ROW" areas. The play symbols located in the "WINNING SYMBOLS" area, and each of the five "ROW" areas, are: Pear (PEAR) symbol, Orange (ORANGE) symbol, Apple (APPLE) symbol, Bananas (BANANAS) symbol, Strawberry (STRAWBERRY) symbol, Grapes (GRAPES) symbol, Watermelon (WATERMELON) symbol, Blueberry (BLUEBERRY) symbol, Kiwi (KIWI) symbol, Starfruit (STARFRUIT) symbol, Cantaloupe (CANTALOUPE) symbol, Plum (PLUM) symbol, Coconut (COCONUT) symbol and a Pineapple (PINEAPPLE) symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions located in the play area are: FREE (TICKET), $\$1^{.00}$

(ONE DOL), $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), \$100 (ONE HUN) and PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE).

- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: Free \$1 Ticket, \$1, \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$40, \$100 and the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." The "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" amount starts at \$2,000 and increases by \$0.20 every time a Perfectly Peared ticket is purchased. When a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winning ticket is sold, the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" resets to \$2,000. A player can win up to five times on a ticket.

- (p) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols match both the play symbols in the same horizontal "ROW," and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.
- (q) Holders of tickets where any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols match both the play symbols in the same horizontal "ROW," and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the "Prize" area for that "ROW," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one Perfectly Peared game ticket.

- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
 - 9. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets: A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
 - 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
 - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
 - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" restrictions:

- (a) An amount of \$0.20 from the sale of each Perfectly Peared ticket will be accumulated in the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" pool.
- (b) Prize Amount: The amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising the Perfectly Peared game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.
- (c) The "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" being reset without the actual sale of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" pool (i.e. \$0.20 from the sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" won.

15. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Perfectly Peared lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

- 16. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 17. Retailer incentive programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Perfectly Peared lottery game tickets.
- 18. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which he qualifies on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 19. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Perfectly Peared or through normal communications methods.
- 20. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Perfectly Peared lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania The Lucky Spot Fast Play Game 5063

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania The Lucky Spot (hereinafter "The Lucky Spot"). The game number is PA-5063.

- 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized Retailer or Retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar Code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.
- (f) Play: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.
- (k) SPOT: The visual representation of a solid black spot printed beneath certain play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area. When a "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol is printed over a solid black spot and matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the player wins all 12 prizes shown on the ticket.
- (l) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (m) Winning Ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (n) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the main play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a The Lucky Spot ticket is \$5.
 - 4. Description of The Lucky Spot lottery game:
- (a) The Lucky Spot lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" amount, all prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select his or her own play symbols. The Lucky Spot tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells

terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

- (b) The Lucky Spot is played by matching the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Players can win the prize identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) A The Lucky Spot game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer by verbally requesting a The Lucky Spot game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a The Lucky Spot game ticket and select The Lucky Spot option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
 - 5. The Lucky Spot ticket characteristics:
- (a) A The Lucky Spot ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each The Lucky Spot ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area and a "YOUR NUMBERS" area. The play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" and the "YOUR NUMBERS" areas are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), and 30 (THIRT). The "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols may appear as plain play symbols or may appear on a "SPOT."
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions located in the play area are: $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$25^{.00}$ (TWY FIV), $\$30^{.00}$ (THIRTY), $\$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE).
- (d) Prizes: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$25, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000 and the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." The "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" amount starts at \$50,000 and increases by \$0.90 every time a The Lucky Spot ticket is purchased. When a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winning ticket is sold, the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" resets to \$50,000. A player can win up to 12 times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 4,200,000 tickets will be available for sale for The Lucky Spot lottery game.

- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All The Lucky Spot prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." The amount won under this paragraph is the amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE," determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$50,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (d) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in three of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in three of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in four of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (e) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in five of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in five of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (f) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in eight of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$50-00 (FIFTY) appears in four of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (i) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of 50^{00} (FIFTY) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of 15^{00} (FIFTEEN) appears in four of the "Prize"

- areas, a prize symbol of $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL) appears in four of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (j) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of \$30^{.00} (THIRTY) appears in four of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in four of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (k) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY) appears in five of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN) appears in six of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (1) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (m) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in three of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in seven of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (n) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in four of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in six of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (o) Holders of tickets where any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing on a "SPOT," and a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in six of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in five of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$15^{.00} (FIFTEEN) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of 50^{00} (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of 50.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of $30^{.00}$ (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the

matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

- (r) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$25.00 (TWY FIV) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$25.
- (s) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (t) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the "Prize" area under the match-

- ing "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (u) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (v) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

- 8. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person so named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
 - 9. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets: A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
 - 10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
 - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
 - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" restrictions:

- (a) An amount of \$0.90 from the sale of each The Lucky Spot ticket will be accumulated in the "PROGRES-SIVE TOP PRIZE" pool.
- (b) Prize Amount: The amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising The Lucky Spot game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.
- (c) The "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" being reset without the actual sale of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" pool (i.e. \$0.90 from the

sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" won.

15. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play The Lucky Spot lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
 - 16. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 17. Retailer incentive programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play The Lucky Spot lottery game tickets.
- 18. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which he qualifies on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 19. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote The Lucky Spot or through normal communications methods.
- 20. Applicability: This notice applies only to The Lucky Spot lottery game announced in this notice.

Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program; Panfish

Acting under the authority of 58 Pa. Code § 65.20 (relating to Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program), the Executive Director has designated September 2, 2019, as a Mentored Youth Fishing Day for panfish in selected Panfish Enhancement Lakes previously designated under 58 Pa. Code § 65.11 (relating to panfish enhancement). This designation under 58 Pa. Code § 65.20 will be effective upon publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

To participate, anglers 16 years of age or older (adult anglers) must possess a valid Pennsylvania fishing license and be accompanied by a youth (less than 16 years of age) who has obtained a mentored youth permit or a voluntary

youth license from the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission). Youth anglers must obtain a 2019 mentored youth permit or a voluntary youth license from the Commission and be accompanied by an adult angler with a valid Pennsylvania fishing license to participate.

There are 20 selected lakes that are currently managed under panfish enhancement special regulations, with some lakes normally having a minimum size of 7 inches for sunfish, some lakes having a minimum size of 9 inches for crappie and some lakes having a minimum size of 9 inches for yellow perch or a combination of two or three of these fish species with minimum size restrictions on these lakes. On September 2, 2019, there will be no minimum size for panfish, but the daily limits will remain in effect. Other Commonwealth inland regulations will apply. It is unlawful to fish in waters designated as part of the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program (Program) except in compliance with the requirements of 58 Pa. Code § 65.20 when participating in the Program.

On September 2, 2019, the identified waters will be open to all anglers but only Program participants (youth and their mentors) may possess panfish of less than the normal minimum size limits. > Department of Human Services Outpatient Psychiatric Services and Psychiatric Outpatient Clinics Regulation No. 14-538 (# 3176)

On July 28, 2017, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Department of Human Services (Department). This rulemaking amends 55 Pa. Code Chapters 1153 and 5200. The proposed regulation was published in the August 12, 2017 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a public comment period ending on September 11, 2017. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on June 4, 2019.

This rulemaking updates two chapters of the Department's regulations relating to outpatient psychiatric services and psychiatric outpatient clinics to increase access to tele-behavioral and mobile mental health treatment services and to implement changes in the benefit packages resulting from the implementation of the Medicaid expansion under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Department (62 P.S. §§ 201(2), 1021 and 50 P.S. §§ 4201(2), 7105 and 7112) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the May 25, 2019 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Department of Health (Department) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Section 27.32a. Reporting AIDS, HIV, CD4 T-lymphocyte counts and percentages, HIV viral load test results, including detectable and undetectable viral load results and genotype test results, and perinatal exposure of newborns to HIV.—Implementation procedures; Fiscal impact; Need; and Clarity.

Proposed amendments to this section will require the reporting of test results through the Department's electronic disease surveillance system (system). We have three concerns. First, in the Preamble and Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF), this system is referred to as "PA-NEDSS." To improve the clarity of the regulation, we suggest that "electronic disease surveillance system" be defined, and if appropriate, include a reference to "PA-NEDSS."

Second, language preceding the reference to the system states that reporters "shall" report using the system. The word "shall" imposes a duty or obligation. Based on information provided in the Preamble and RAF, it is our understanding that results can be submitted by manual data entry or by mail to the Department. If those manners of reporting are allowable, we suggest that the final regulation be amended to reflect those options.

Third, a commentator expressed concern that data submitted into the system still requires manual data entry, and the additional reporting requirements will increase the time and cost necessary to remain in compliance with the regulation. The commentator encourages the Department to develop a process in which data entry

could be automated. In addition, the commentator is concerned with the possible duplication of data being submitted by multiple reporters. In the Preamble to the final-form regulation, we ask the Department to explain how the regulated community is to use the system. We also encourage the Department to work with the regulated community to ensure they understand how the system will work and the reporting options that are available to them. Finally, we ask the Department to address the concern about duplication of data entry by multiple reporters. If this duplication is occurring, what is the need for multiple reporters? Can it be eliminated without hampering the Department's efforts to stop the spread of HIV?

Section 27.32c. Partner services relating to HIV and AIDS.—Clarity.

Proposed amendments to this section will eliminate the following language: "Counseling, testing referral and partner notification services shall be performed in accordance with the Confidentiality of HIV-Related Information Act (Act) (35 P.S. §§ 7601—7612)." In the Preamble, the Department explains that the regulations do not require a reference to the Act in order for the requirements of the Act to be followed. We agree with the Department's analysis. However, the language provides an additional level of notice to the regulated community. It also provides greater clarity to those that must comply with the regulation and the statute. For these reasons, we ask the Department to keep the language in the final-form regulation.

3. Miscellaneous clarity.

Subsection 27.4(b) includes an outdated reference to the forthcoming implementation of the system. Subsection 27.4(e) includes references to multiple methods of reporting. Subsection 27.22(d) includes a reference to "electronic mechanisms." We suggest that these subsections be amended to reflect the current terminology being proposed and also the current status of electronic reporting.

Your payment is an admission that you committed the alleged violation and an agreement to cease and desist from further violations. Upon receipt of the evidence of insurance from your insurer, and upon receipt of your payment, the Complaint proceeding shall be closed.

- D. If you file an Answer which either admits or fails to deny the allegations of the Complaint, the Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement will request the Commission to issue an Order imposing the penalty set forth in this Complaint.
- E. If you file an Answer which contests the Complaint, the matter will be assigned to an Administrative Law Judge for hearing and decision. The Judge is not bound by the penalty set forth in the Complaint and may impose additional and/or alternative penalties as appropriate.
- F. If you are a corporation, you must be represented by legal counsel. 52 Pa. Code § 1.21.

Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs v. Jacqueline N. Barnes, LPN; Case No. 16-51-11521

On January 3, 2018, Jacqueline N. Barnes, LPN, license No. PN279416, of Arnold, Westmoreland County, was indefinitely suspended, retroactive to July 12, 2017, and ordered to pay \$755 in costs of investigation, based on being unable to practice practical nursing with reasonable skill and safety to patients by reason of addiction to alcohol or addiction to hallucinogenic or narcotic drugs or other drugs which tend to impair judgement or coordination, so long as such dependence shall continue or has become mentally incompetent.
