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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Extension of Deadline for Receipt of Absentee and Mail-In Ballots in Certain Counties

June 1, 2020

Whereas, the General Primary Election is scheduled by law to occur throughout the Commonwealth on June 2, 2020;

Whereas, to date, due in large part to COVID-19, an unprecedented number of Pennsylvanians have taken advantage of absentee voting and the Commonwealth's newly implemented mail-in balloting procedure;

Whereas, civil unrest over the weekend in the counties of Allegheny, Dauphin, Delaware, Erie, Montgomery and Philadelphia led to curfews, travel restrictions, and the evacuation of election offices in at least two counties, which affected the counties' efforts and impeded many voters' attempts to return their ballots;

Whereas, these civil disturbances, curfews, and travel restrictions have been continuing and expanding in these counties, thereby impeding county election activities and opportunities for voters to submit their absentee and mail-in ballots, and are expected to continue into tonight and tomorrow;

Whereas, on Saturday, May 30, 2020, and as amended on Monday, June 1, 2020, I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, pursuant to the provisions of Section 7301(c) of the Emergency Management Services Code, (35 Pa.C.S. §§ 7101 et seq., as amended) proclaimed the existence of a disaster emergency in the counties of Allegheny, Dauphin, Delaware, Erie, Montgomery and Philadelphia due to the civil disturbance affecting these counties;

Whereas, the civil disturbances in these affected counties have created one or more barriers to voters returning their ballots, including travel and public transportation disruptions, road closures and blockages, lack of access to ballot drop boxes, alteration of mobile ballot collection schedules, evacuations of buildings, and curfews;

Whereas, Sections 1306(c), 1308(g)(1)(ii) and 1306-D(c) of the Pennsylvania Election Code (25 P.S. §§ 3146.6(c), 3146.8(g)(1)(ii) and 3150.16(c)) provide that no civilian absentee or mail-in ballot shall be counted if it is received by the county board of elections after eight o'clock P.M., prevailing time, on the day of the primary election;

Whereas, in these affected counties, it appears very likely that a large number of voters who applied for absentee or mail-in ballots by the May 26 deadline will not be able to return their ballots by the statutory deadline; and

Whereas, these recent civil disturbances make it necessary and proper to extend the statutory deadline in those affected counties for receipt of voted civilian absentee and mail-in ballots to ensure that voters in those counties are not disenfranchised through no fault of their own.

Now, Therefore, I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Emergency Management Services Code, and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby issue this Executive Order as follows:

1. Deadline for Receipt of Absentee and Mail-In Ballots. Notwithstanding the provisions of Sections 1306(c), 1308(g)(1)(ii), and 1306-D(c) of the Pennsylvania Election Code (25 P.S. §§ 3146.6(c), 3146.8(g)(1)(ii), and 3150.16(c)) or any other provision in the laws of the Commonwealth to the contrary, for the counties of Allegheny, Dauphin, Delaware, Erie, Montgom-

ery and Philadelphia, an otherwise valid civilian absentee or mail-in ballot shall be counted if it bears a postmark, cancellation mark, or other official indicia of the date of mailing ("postmark") of no later than Tuesday, June 2, 2020, and is received by postal mail in the office of the county board of elections no later than five o'clock P.M., prevailing time, on Tuesday, June 9, 2020.

Further provided, however, that no civilian absentee or mail-in ballot shall be counted if it is received by any means other than postal mail after eight o'clock P.M., prevailing time, on Tuesday, June 2, 2020.

- 2. Segregation of Ballots. Absentee and mail-in ballots that are received by a county board of elections later than eight o'clock P.M., prevailing time, on Tuesday, June 2, 2020, under the authority of Paragraph 1 of this Executive Order shall be segregated from all other absentee and mail-in ballots. The segregated ballots shall be canvassed in accordance with the Pennsylvania Election Code.
- 3. Notice. The Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall post this Executive Order in the Department of State's Bureau of Elections and Notaries, and in all other appropriate places, and shall communicate its contents to the county boards of elections, and shall take all necessary action to provide notice of this Executive Order to the general public.
- 4. Effective Date. This Executive Order shall take effect immediately and remain in effect only until 5:00 P.M., prevailing time, Thursday, July 2, 2020.

Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency

June 3, 2020

Whereas, on March 6, 2020, I declared a disaster emergency due to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic that is devastating the country, including the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and its citizens;

Whereas, my Proclamation of Disaster Emergency of March 6, 2020, will automatically expire on June 4, 2020, unless renewed by Amendment;

Whereas, as of June 3, 2020, 72,894 persons have tested positive or meet the requirements to be considered as presumed probable cases for COVID-19 in the Commonwealth in all 67 counties, and 5,667 persons are reported to have died from the virus; and

Whereas, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to be of such magnitude or severity that emergency action is necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of affected citizens in Pennsylvania.

Now Therefore, pursuant to the provisions of section 7301(c) of the Emergency Management Services Code, 35 Pa.C.S. § 7301(c), I do hereby order and direct as follows:

1. The Proclamation of Disaster Emergency of March 6, 2020, is renewed for a period of ninety days, and shall continue to apply to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

2. All directives, authorized actions and provisions of the March 6, 2020, Proclamation of Disaster Emergency shall remain in full force and effect until either rescinded by me or terminated by law.

This Proclamation Amendment shall take effect immediately.

Proclamation; Senate Bill No. 1027, Printer's No. 1729

I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, have caused this Proclamation to issue and, in compliance with the provisions of Section 15 of Article IV of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, do hereby give notice that I have filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, with my objections thereto, the following bill passed by both houses of the General Assembly at the Regular Session of 2019-2020:

Senate Bill No. 1027, Printer's No. 1729, entitled "An Act [a]mending the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L. 177, No. 175), entitled 'An act providing for and reorganizing the conduct of the executive and administrative work of the Commonwealth by the Executive Department thereof and the administrative departments, boards, commissions, and officers thereof, including the boards of trustees of State Normal Schools, or Teachers Colleges; abolishing, creating, reorganizing or authorizing the reorganization of certain administrative departments, boards, and commissions; defining the powers and duties of the Governor and other executive and administrative officers, and of the several administrative departments, boards, commissions, and officers; fixing the salaries of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and certain other executive and administrative officers; providing for the appointment of certain administrative officers, and of all deputies and other assistants and employes in certain departments, boards, and commissions; providing for judicial administration; and prescribing the manner in which the number and compensation of the deputies and all other assistants and employes of certain departments, boards and commissions shall be determined,' in organization of independent administrative boards and commissions, further providing for Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board; in organization of departmental administrative boards and commissions and of advisory boards and commissions, further providing for State Geospatial Coordinating Board; in Commonwealth agency fees, further providing for Department of Health; in powers and duties of the Department of State and its departmental administrative board, providing for report on implementation of 2020 general primary election; providing for COVID-19 emergency statutory and regulatory suspensions and waivers reporting requirements, for COVID-19 debt cost reduction review and for licensing; and, in judicial administration, further providing for surcharges and fees; and making a related repeal.'

Notice of Veto; House Concurrent Regulatory Review Resolution Number 1

May 29, 2020

To the Honorable House of Representatives and the Honorable Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article III, Section 9 of the Pennsylvania Constitution and Section 7(d) of the Regulatory Review Act, I veto and disapprove, and return

herewith, House Concurrent Regulatory Review Resolution Number 1, which disapproves the Department of Labor and Industry's Final-Form Regulation 12-106.

I am vetoing, disapproving, and returning this concurrent resolution for two reasons. First, the Concurrent Resolution is procedurally defective. In adopting the Concurrent Resolution, the General Assembly failed to comply with the Regulatory Review Act (RRA), which creates the concurrent resolution process as applied to regulations. The RRA provides:

Upon receipt of the commission's order pursuant to subsection (c.1)...one or both of the committees may, within 14 calendar days, report to the House of Representatives or Senate a concurrent resolution and notify the agency.... If either committee reports a concurrent resolution before the expiration of the 14-day period, the Senate and the House of Representatives shall each have 30 calendar days or ten legislative days, whichever is longer, from the date on which the concurrent resolution has been reported, to adopt the concurrent resolution.... If the General Assembly does not adopt the concurrent resolution... in the time prescribed in this subsection, it shall be deemed to have approved the final-form or final-omitted regulation.

71 P.S. § 745.7(d). Neither the House of Representatives nor the Senate adopted this Concurrent Resolution within 30 calendar or ten legislative days from the date that the House committee reported its Concurrent Resolution. As such, the RRA directs that the General Assembly is deemed to have approved Final-Form Regulation 12-106.

First, the House of Representatives failed to adopt the Concurrent Resolution by the statutorily prescribed deadline. The House Labor and Industry Committee reported the Concurrent Resolution on February 5, 2020. The full House of Representatives did not adopt this Concurrent Resolution until April 21, 2020, more than 30 calendar days from February 5, 2020. Furthermore, April 21, 2020, was more than ten legislative days from February 5, 2020, as the House of Representatives was in session on March 16, March 23, March 24, March 25, April 6, April 7, April 13, April 14, April 16 and April 20, 2020. The RRA required the House of Representatives to adopt the Concurrent Resolution on one of those days. Because the House of Representatives failed to adopt the Concurrent Regulation by the statutory deadline, Final-Form Regulation 12-106 was deemed approved by operation of law.

Similarly, the Senate also failed to adopt the Concurrent Resolution by the statutorily prescribed deadline. Section 7(d) of the RRA directs that the time period for action on a concurrent resolution for both the Senate and House of Representatives is to commence "from the date on which the concurrent resolution has been reported." 71 P.S. § 745.7(d). The House Labor and Industry Committee reported this Concurrent Resolution on February 5, 2020. The Senate did not adopt this Concurrent Resolution until May 27, 2020, more than 30 calendar days from February 5, 2020. Furthermore, May 27, 2020, is more than ten legislative days from February 5, 2020, as the Senate was in session on March 18, March 25, April 6, April 7, April 15, April 20, April 21, April 28, April 29, May 6, May 11, May 12, May 13, May 18 and May 26, 2020. Because the Senate also failed to adopt the Concurrent Resolution by the statutory deadline, Final-Form Regulation 12-106 was deemed approved by operation of law.

Second, I am vetoing, disapproving, and returning the Concurrent Resolution because Final-Form Regulation 12-106 is necessary to protect Pennsylvania's workers from unreasonably low wages not fairly commensurate with the value of the services rendered. Final-Form Regulation 12-106 provides a long overdue update of the definitions of executive, administrative and professional employees who are exempt from the overtime and minimum wage provisions of the Pennsylvania Minimum Wage Act of 1968 and modernizes the obsolete salary threshold for those workers. The update to the salary thresholds will protect Pennsylvania's employees from being arbitrarily designated as exempt and being required to work excessive

overtime hours without additional compensation. Ensuring that workers are fairly compensated and paid a living wage will have an overall positive economic impact for the Commonwealth. In addition, increased competitiveness of Pennsylvania's employers to attract skilled labor, positive economic impact due to increased spending by affected workers, and discretionary time returned to employees are all benefits to the Commonwealth. Now, more than ever, Pennsylvania needs the benefits that Final-Form Regulation 12-106 provides to its citizens.

For the reasons set forth above, I must veto, disapprove, and withhold my signature from House Concurrent Regulatory Review Resolution No. 1.

Notice of Veto; Senate Bill 1027; Printer's No. 1729

May 29, 2020

To the Honorable Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill 1027, Printer's Number 1729.

We are living in unprecedented times as we confront the extraordinary challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. In response to these challenges, I ordered the temporary closure of non-life sustaining businesses and issued stay-at-home orders. These were steps necessary to save lives across this Commonwealth and to flatten the curve so that our health system would not be overwhelmed by a surge of COVID-19 cases. We came together as Pennsylvanians to make these sacrifices for the common good.

Because of the success of these early mitigation efforts, we are now focused on a plan to reopen Pennsylvania while prioritizing the health and welfare of its citizens. Our reopening plan uses a combination of factors, including statistical metrics developed in collaboration with Carnegie Mellon University, to evaluate when and to what extent our communities can safely reopen while guarding against a COVID-19 resurgence. We have developed a data-driven, color-coded system that transitions counties from the most restrictive red phase to the intermediate yellow phase (limited reopening) and ultimately to the least restrictive green phase. As part of our ongoing progress towards reopening, I have announced that all of Pennsylvania's sixty-seven counties will have moved from the red to the yellow phase by June 5th with some counties transitioning to the green phase prior to that date. As the Commonwealth continues to re-open, we will continue to monitor and assess the data, county by county, to maximize our economic recovery while minimizing public health risks.

Unfortunately, certain counties have opted to go "rogue" by prematurely re-opening their economies and unilaterally moving themselves to the "next phase," driven by fear rather than by scientifically-proven metrics. I have warned that I would impose consequences for such a unilateral move,

including using the Commonwealth's licensing capabilities to enforce the non-life sustaining business shutdown order. This bill limits my ability to take that executive enforcement action. The bill prohibits a penalty from being imposed upon a licensed business for re-opening in violation of the non-life sustaining business shutdown order. Such a prohibition is a legislative infringement on executive authority and violates the separation of powers which is critical to the proper functioning of our democracy.

Now is not the time to surrender; we need to continue to be united in the fight against COVID-19.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from Senate Bill 1027, Printer's Number 1729.

YORK COUNTY

Amendment of Local Rules of Criminal Procedure; CP-67-AD-22-2020

Administrative Order Amending York County Local Rules of Criminal Procedure 571 & 600

And Now, this 2nd day of June, 2020 it is Ordered that York County Local Rules of Criminal Procedure 571 and 600 are amended as follows, effective July 20, 2020.

The District Court Administrator shall publish this order as may be required.

By the Court

York R.Crim.P. 571. Arraignment.

- (A) The court administrator shall establish periodic dates for arraignment of defendants [and shall publish the dates and times in the Court Calendar at least annually].
- (B) A defendant shall be advised orally and in writing, by court [order] notice, of the date and time for the arraignment at the defendant's preliminary hearing, or at the time the preliminary hearing is waived. [The arraignment date shall normally be set as the fifth (5th) Friday following the date that the preliminary hearing is held or waived, or the next available Friday thereafter in the event of a court holiday.]
- (C) A waiver of formal arraignment by [defendants] a defendant represented by counsel [pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 571(D)] may be made without the physical appearance of the defendant or counsel in [Court] court, provided such waiver is [received by the district attorney at least three (3)] filed with the clerk of courts by noon two business days prior to the date scheduled for arraignment.
- [(1) A waiver of formal arraignment shall be on such form as prescribed the court, and shall contain at least the information set forth in Pa.R.Crim.P 571(C).

(2) A waiver of formal arraignment is not available to a defendant not represented by counsel.

The waiver shall be on such form as prescribed by the district court administrator.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of July 2020

The Department of Banking and Securities (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P.L. 13, No. 6) (41 P.S. § 301), determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of July 2020, is 3 1/2%.

The interest rate limitations under the Commonwealth's usury statute were pre-empted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub.L. No. 96-221). Further pre-emption was instituted with the signing of Pub.L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or

exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board or the United States Treasury, or both. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 1.05 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 3.55 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 3 1/2%.

Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under Sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the NOI to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following identified site(s), proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30-days of the following specified date. During this comment period the municipality may request that the following identified person, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30-days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

Chronic Wasting Disease—Designation of Disease Management Areas and Endemic States and Canadian Provinces Order # 8

Executive Order

Whereas, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is an infectious and progressive neurological disease that is found in, and always proves fatal to, members of the family

Cervidae (deer, elk or moose, and other susceptible species, collectively called cervids); and

Whereas, There are no known treatments for CWD infection, no vaccines to protect against CWD infection, and no approved tests that can detect the presence of CWD in live cervids; and

Whereas, CWD is designated as a "dangerous transmissible disease" of animals by order of the Secretary of Agriculture under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d) (relating to dangerous transmissible diseases); and

Whereas, The Game and Wildlife Code (Code) (34 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder (58 Pa. Code §§ 131.1 et seq.) collectively provide broad authority to the PGC to regulate activities relating to the protection, preservation, and management of game and wildlife, including cervids; and

Whereas, On March 28, 2017 (effective May 16, 2017), the Commission added 58 Pa. Code § 137.35 (relating to Chronic Wasting Disease Restrictions) to give more permanent status and structure to the CWD requirements and restrictions previously established and maintained over the prior decade by and through executive orders; and

Whereas, Section 137.35(d) provides the Executive Director with the authority to designate CWD Disease Management Areas (DMAs) within this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, Section 137.35(d) also provides the Executive Director with the authority to designate CWD-endemic States or Canadian Provinces; and

Whereas, Previous executive orders concerning designation of CWD DMAs and CWD-endemic States and Canadian Provinces within this Commonwealth were issued by the Commission on June 1, 2017, July 24, 2017, October 6, 2017, February 16, 2018, May 21, 2018, October 22, 2018 and June 17, 2019; and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that further designation of CWD DMAs and CWD-endemic States and Canadian Provinces is required to implement necessary updates to the Commission's CWD program.

Now Therefore, I, BRYAN J. BURHANS, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder, do hereby order and direct the following:

1. DMAs within this Commonwealth are designated as set forth below. These DMAs are more graphically illustrated on the maps titled "DMA2," "DMA3" and "DMA4" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundaries and maps of DMA2, DMA3 and DMA4, the written descriptions shall prevail.

a. DMA1: Eliminated.

b. *DMA2*: Adams, Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Centre, Cumberland, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon, Indiana, Snyder, Somerset, Union and Westmoreland counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the Southeastern extent of the DMA at the intersection of Taneytown Road (State Highway 134) and the Maryland State Line, proceed north on Highway 134 for approximately 7.5 miles to the intersection of Steinwehr Avenue in Gettysburg. Follow right on Steinwehr Ave to Baltimore Street. Follow left on Baltimore Street through downtown Gettysburg. Proceed halfway around the traffic circle at the square onto Carlisle Street (State Highway

34). The DMA boundary follows Highway 34 north for approximately 21.2 miles to the intersection of the Baltimore Avenue (State Highway 94). Follow Highway 94 north for approximately 6.1 miles to the intersection of Interstate 81. Follow I-81 north for approximately 18.6 miles to the Susquehanna River. Follow the Susquehanna River north for approximately 48.5 miles to the State Highway 61 bridge. The DMA boundary follows Highway 61 west for approximately .4 miles to the intersection of US Highway 11 in Shamokin Dam. Follow US Highway 11 south for 3.3 miles to the intersection of US Highway 522. Follow US Highway 522 west for 10.4 miles to the intersection of Route 104. Follow route 104 north for approximately 8.9 miles to the intersection of State Highway 45. Turn left and the boundary follows State Highway 45 for approximately 34.2 miles to the intersection of State Highway 144 in Old Fort. The DMA boundary follows State Highway 144 south for approximately 3.8 miles to the intersection of US Highway 322 in Potters Mills. Proceed left on US 322 south for 11.2 miles to the intersection of State Highway 655 near Reedsville. Turn right and the boundary follows Highway 655 south for approximately 8.1 miles to the intersection of State Highway 305. The DMA boundary follows State Highway 305 west for 10.2 miles to State Highway 26, then west along State Highway 26 for 9.4 miles to intersection of State Highway 45. Follow State Highway 45 south for 11.8 miles to State Highway 350. Turn right on State Highway 350 and follow for 15.6 miles to State Route 3049. Follow State Route 3049 north for 4.3 miles then State Route 2051 (Curtain Street) for .4 miles to the intersection of State Highway 53 in Osceola Mills. Continue left on State Highway 53 for 5.1 miles to the intersection of Route 153 in Houtzdale. The DMA boundary follows Route 153 south for 5.9 miles to the intersection of Route 253 (Viola Pike) and then left on Route 253 for 8.6 miles to the intersection of State Highway 53 in Van Ormer. 

Turn left on State Route 897, proceeding 4.0 miles south to the intersection with U.S. Route 30. Turn right on U.S. Route 30, proceeding west for 0.3 miles to the intersection with State Route 41 (Newport Pike). Turn left on State Route 41, proceeding 2.8 miles south to the intersection with State Route 2027. Turn right on State Route 2003, proceeding north for 1.6 miles to U.S. Route 222 (Robert Fulton Highway). Turn left on U.S. Route 222, proceeding south for 4.5 miles to State Route 3004 (Furniss Road). Turn right on State Route 3004, proceeding 1.6 miles at which point State Route 3004 becomes State Route 10Z (Harmony Ridge Dr.). Proceed along State Route 10Z for 2.0 miles to Fishing Creek. Left following Fishing Creek approximately 0.5 miles to the Susquehanna River. Proceed northwest along the Susquehanna River shoreline for 20.0 miles to a point abeam State Route 999. Turn right on State Route 999 proceeding east for 7.0 miles to State Route 741 (Rohrerstown Road). Turn left on State Route 741, proceeding north for 3.6 miles to U.S. Route 30 (Lincoln Highway) interchange. Turn right on U.S. Route 30, proceeding east for 2.4 miles to State Route 4011 (Fruitville Pike). Turn left on State Route 4011, proceeding north for 6.7 miles to State Route 772 (Orange Street). Turn right on State Route 772, proceeding east for 3.6 miles to State Route 501. Turn left on state Route 501 in Lititz, proceeding northerly for 5 miles to the intersection with U.S. Route 322 (West 28th Division Highway). Turn left on U.S. Route 322, proceeding westerly for 1.3 miles to the Pennsylvania Turnpike (U.S. Route 76). Move right along U.S. Route 76, proceeding east for 0.7 miles to the western boundary of State Game Lands 46. Proceed north, then east for 1.2 miles along the game lands boundary to state Route 501 (Furnace Hills Pike). Turn left on state Route 501, proceeding north for 4.1 miles to the intersection with state Route 419. Turn left, proceeding west for 0.1 miles to state Route 897 (South 5th Street). Turn right on state Route 897,


proceeding northwest for 6.2 miles to the starting point at the intersection of state Route 897 and U.S. Route 422 at the place of beginning.





Environmental Quality Board Regulation # 7-552 (IRRC # 3251)

Administration of the Land Recycling Program June 1, 2020

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the February 15, 2020 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the RRA (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Environmental Quality Board (Board) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

Section 250.4. Limits related to PQLs.—Clarity and lack of ambiguity.

Under subsection (a), practical quantitation limits (PQL) are selected from PQLs or estimated quantitation limits "specified by the (United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)) in the most current version of EPA's drinking water or solid waste analytical methods." The Board states in the Preamble to the proposed regulation that the amendments "update the references and procedures for determining" PQLs. However, the current reference to a specific EPA manual is replaced with general EPA analytical methods. We ask the Board to clarify references to these methods in the final-form regulation or explain in the Preamble to the final-form regulation why it is unnecessary to do so.

2. Section 250.10. Measurement of regulated substances in media.—Clarity and lack of ambiguity.

Under subsection (d), samples of groundwater from monitored drinking water wells are required to be field acidified and unfiltered in accordance with a Department of Environmental Protection (Department) technical guidance manual or "an alternative sampling method that accurately measures regulated substances in groundwater." What alternative sampling methods are acceptable? We ask the Board to specify sampling methods in the final-form regulation or explain in the Preamble to the final-form regulation why it is unnecessary to do so.

3. Appendix A, Tables 1, 3A, 3B and 5A—Possible conflict with or duplication of statutes or existing regulations.

Polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB) (Aroclor)

PCB-1221 (Aroclor), PCB-1232 (Aroclor), PCB-1242 (Aroclor), PCB-1248 (Aroclor) and PCB-1260 (Aroclor) are

not listed in Appendix A, Table 5A. However, these five regulated substances are contained in Appendix A, Tables 1, 3A and 3B. As described in § 250.301(a) (relating to scope), Appendix A, Table 5 contains "the toxicological and physical parameters used to calculate the medium-specific concentrations (MSC) in Appendix A, Tables 1—4." Why did the Board delete these regulated substances from Appendix A, Table 5A? We ask the Board to revise the final-form regulation so that Appendix A, Tables 1, 3A and 3B do not conflict with the regulations of the Department.

4. Appendix A, Tables 2 and 4B—Fiscal impact; Reasonableness; Whether the regulation is supported by acceptable data.

Vanadium

The Cleanup Standards Scientific Advisory Board (CSSAB), established to provide technical and scientific advice and assist the Department and the Board with developing statewide health standards, does not endorse MSCs for vanadium and "recommends revision or removal of the MSCs for vanadium that are included in the proposed regulations." CSSAB states that the residential soil MSC for vanadium is "well below naturally occurring background levels" and "appears to be substantially lower than any published federal or state value." CSSAB also details limitations of the database used by the Department to determine the MSCs. Commentators also raise these issues and support CSSAB. A commentator also states that MSCs for vanadium will impact "the cost and timeliness of cleanup activities under Act 2." We ask the Board to respond to the concerns of CSSAB and commentators in the Preamble of the final-form regulation by explaining why the MSCs for vanadium are reasonable, the appropriateness of the data used to determine the MSCs and the fiscal impact to attain compliance with the MSCs for vanadium. Further, we ask the Board to consider revising the MSCs for vanadium as suggested by CSSAB.

5. Appendix A, Tables 4A and 7—Determining whether the regulation is in the public interest; Protection of the public health, safety and welfare; Whether the regulation is supported by acceptable data; Legislative intent.

Lead

Section 250.306(e) (relating to ingestion numeric values) describes the development of the residential ingestion numeric value for lead in soil using the

Integrated Exposure Uptake Biokinetic (IEUBK) model and the Adult Lead Methodology (ALM). Appendix A, Table 7 identifies the input values used in the IEUBK model for lead in children for residential exposure and the ALM for non-residential exposure. This table corresponds to the numeric values for residential and nonresidential soil MSCs for lead in Appendix A, Table 4A. Commentators have numerous concerns regarding the non-residential soil MSC for lead given the potential for significant health problems due to lead exposure, especially in children. A commentator questions why the ALM was used to calculate non-residential soil, noting that "lead in soil is blown and tracked off site onto roads, sidewalks and then into yards and homes where children play." A commentator adds that "there is no guarantee that a site will remain non-residential." Several commentators advise that the non-residential soil MSC for lead of "2,500 (parts per million (ppm)) is based on outdated guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention," specifying that the current recommendation of "5 (micrograms per deciliter ($\mu g/dL$)) is the threshold blood lead concentration for higher risk in children and fetuses, not 10 µg/dL as the proposed rule implies." Commentators urge the Board to retain the numeric value of 1,000 ppm for lead in non-residential

We have three concerns with Appendix A, Tables 4A and 7. First, why does Appendix A, Table 7 include two instances of "TBD" in the value column? Second, is the Board using acceptable data to calculate the numeric values in Appendix A, Table 4A? Third, does the potential for non-residential soil contaminated with lead to migrate to residential areas meet the standard in Section 102(6) of Act 2 (35 P.S. § 6026.102(6)) that cleanup plans shall take "into account its current and future use and the degree to which contamination can spread offsite and expose the public or the environment to risk?" We ask the Board to address in the Preamble to the final-form regulation these questions about the data used to establish the MSCs for lead. We also ask the Board to explain in the Preamble to the final-form regulation how the non-residential soil MSC for lead will adequately protect the public health, safety and welfare.

We will review the Board's responses to these questions and concerns as part of this Commission's determination of whether the regulation is in the public interest.

Telework and remote operations are strongly encouraged in counties that have been designated to move to the green phase, however, in instances where that is not feasible, insurance licensees will be permitted to conduct in-person operations, including in-person sales, with restrictions to protect licensees and their employees and consumers. Licensees are advised that in-person business should be conducted by appointment only, wherever possible, when operating in the green phase. Walk-in business is permissible to the extent that the insurance business has enacted mitigation procedures designed to protect employees and the public.

Licensees must adhere to the updated guidance, building safety and business safety orders issued by Governor Tom Wolf that details procedures businesses must follow to conduct in-person operations in counties slated to move to the green phase of reopening. The interceptor sewer will convey the existing 110,000 gallons per day of sewage flow from the pump station site directly to the WWTP.

Problem Description: Raw sewage discharge from a CSO point exists at a PS in a high-quality cold-water fishery classified watershed. Deletion of the PS will result in elimination of a CSO point as well as significant energy savings and other cost savings relating to 40,000 kilowatt hours per year of electricity consumption. These other cost savings include operation of an emergency generator and elimination of daily operation, maintenance and inspection involving labor, parts and materials. In addition, the PS structure is encroaching on an existing public right of way intended as an extension of Vine Street, affecting access to, and utilization of, adjacent private property. Demolition of the PS will also solve this long-standing problem. Implementing this project will allow all wet-weather overflows to be conveyed directly to the WWTP.

In addition, the Authority would like to install 10,150 linear feet of 10-inch diameter new water line from the Cessna service area to the Camp Sunshine area and replace the existing 500,000-gallon capacity Hoover finished water storage tank.

Problem Description: The existing water line near the Pennsylvania Turnpike Interchange intersection has been subject to numerous leaks and breaks due to its brittle condition, contributing to water loss and interruptions of water supply in the commercial area. The existing Cessna service area serves several homes and businesses and is a dead-end water line. If a line break would occur, the area would encounter a major interruption in water supply. The existing 500,000-gallon Hoover finished water storage tank has experienced significant internal deterioration and requires attention to ensure availability of sufficient water supply reserve for existing and future needs of the system.

This will eliminate the public health concern. The two existing pressurized 1,500-gallon hydro-pneumatic tanks are deteriorating and pose a safety hazard. The project will remove these tanks and replace them with a proposed 150,000-gallon ground level glass-coated bolted steel storage tank. The new tank will provide pressure and storage for the system and eliminate the safety hazard of the existing hydro-pneumatic tanks.

Problem Description: The source water consistently exceeds the iron and manganese secondary maximum

contaminant levels and the manganese health advisory limit. The existing treatment for iron and manganese is seques-tration which does not remove or reduce these concentrations. This is a public health concern.
