

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Rules, Regulations and Statements of Policy in Titles 1—107 of the Pennsylvania Code

Text proposed to be added is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Text proposed to be deleted is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the [Legislative Reference] Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

§ 1.891. Mission.

The mission of the Governor's Office of Performance Through Excellence is to empower and enable employees at every level of State government to create an excellent experience for the Commonwealth's customers and to achieve measurable results for all residents of this Commonwealth.

§ 1.892. Governor's Office of Performance Through Excellence.

The Governor's Office of Performance Through Excellence (Office) is hereby created within the Executive Offices of the Governor.

- (1) The Governor will appoint a member of his staff to serve as Director of the Office, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
 - (2) The Director of the Office shall report to the Governor.
- (3) The Governor may appoint, to serve at his pleasure, individuals as he may deem appropriate to provide advice to the Office and the Director.

§ 1.893. Powers and duties.

The Governor's Office of Performance Through Excellence shall have the power and duty to:

- (1) Develop and implement strategies for creating a Commonwealth workplace culture that fosters continuous improvement, wherein employees feel respected and empowered to innovate, solve problems and deliver greater value to customers;
- (2) Develop and implement strategies for monitoring, managing and accelerating progress toward the Commonwealth's priority goals;
- (3) Develop and implement strategies for measuring and improving the customer experience across multiple channels, such as online, phone and in-person, with the Commonwealth's services;
- (4) Develop and implement enterprise risk management strategies that assess, mitigate and capitalize upon risks to the Commonwealth's priority goals;
- (5) Consult with agencies, boards and commissions to identify opportunities to collaborate and partner with external entities to bring new ideas and best practices into State government;
- (6) Promote cross-agency coordination and collaboration aimed at solving common problems and achieving shared goals;
- (7) Build the capacity of Commonwealth agencies to implement strategies for performance management, customer experience improvement, risk management and create a workplace culture that supports continuous improvement through training, consultation and facilitation;
- (8) Provide regular reports to the Governor and the heads of Commonwealth agencies that describe the status of specific priority objectives, identify barriers to achieving the objectives and recommend specific actions for improving performance;
- (9) Publish on the Commonwealth's web site administration goals and progress;
- (10) Work collaboratively with Commonwealth agencies to identify opportunities to leverage data, integrated business process automation and evidence for improving State government performance;
- (11) Work collaboratively with Commonwealth agencies and the Office of the Budget to integrate performance data into the budget process; and
- (12) Exercise all other necessary powers to ensure successful implementation of this subchapter, as permitted by law.

§ 1.894. Cooperation by Commonwealth agencies.

Agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction shall provide assistance to and cooperate with the Governor's Office of Performance Through Excellence (Office), as requested by the Office, in pursuit of the matters which are the subject of this subchapter.

§ 1.895. Independent agencies, State-affiliated entities and State-related entities.

Independent agencies, State-affiliated entities and State-related agencies are strongly encouraged to work with the Governor's Office of Performance Through Excellence and to implement continuous process improvements as envisioned by this subchapter.

§ 1.896. General provisions.

This subchapter shall be implemented consistent with applicable law. This subchapter is not intended to, and does not create, any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the Commonwealth, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees or agents, or any other person.

§ 1.897. Effective date.

This subchapter shall take effect immediately and remain in effect unless revised or rescinded by the Governor.

§ 1.898. Rescission.

Executive Order 2015-04, published at 48 Pa.B. 1087 (February 24, 2018), is hereby rescinded.

Notice of Veto; House Bill No. 2025, Printer's No. 3907

September 24, 2020

To the Honorable House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 2025, Printer's Number 3907.

Addressing the global climate crisis is one of the most important and critical challenges we face. This legislation is extremely harmful to public health and welfare as it prevents the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (Department) from taking any measure or action to abate, control or limit carbon dioxide emissions, a greenhouse gas and major contributor to climate change impacts, without prior approval of the General Assembly. Like every state in the country, the Commonwealth has already begun to experience adverse impacts from climate change, such as higher temperatures, changes in precipitation, and frequent extreme weather events, including large storms, flooding, heat waves, heavier snowfalls, and periods of drought. Reductions in carbon dioxide emissions are even more significant now as emerging evidence links chronic exposure to air pollution with higher rates of morbidity and mortality from COVID-19.

This legislation also prohibits the Commonwealth from participating in the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), a regional initiative among Northeast and Mid-Atlantic states to reduce greenhouse gas emissions while generating economic growth, unless additional legislation is enacted. RGGI participating states have reduced power sector carbon dioxide pollution by 45 percent since 2005, while the region's per-capita gross domestic product has continued to grow. By joining RGGI, Pennsylvania has the opportunity to make real progress on limiting climate change-causing carbon pollution while generating thousands of new jobs, providing for worker training, and offering future electric bill savings.

In addition to the legislation's failure to address climate change, the immediate effect of this legislation would be to halt a rulemaking package I directed the Department to develop by executive order pursuant to the authority of the Air Pollution Control Act to abate, control, or limit carbon dioxide emissions from fossil-fuel-fired electric power generators. The Regulatory Review Act and the Air Pollution Control Act afford the opportunity for extensive public participation, including public comment and public hearings, in the rulemaking process. Members of the General Assembly also have a robust role in the rulemaking process, including through their appointments on advisory committees and the Environmental Quality Board. This legislation creates burdensome and duplicative processes that will thwart the Department's ability to take any action to regulate the greenhouse gas most responsible for climate change in the transportation, industrial, and commercial sectors, as well as the electric power sector.

The citizens of this Commonwealth cannot afford to wait any longer. Given the urgency of the climate crisis facing Pennsylvania, the Commonwealth must take concrete, economically sound, and immediate steps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Allowing this legislation to become law would effectively deny that climate change is an urgent problem that demands prudent solutions.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 2025, Printer's Number 3907.

Local Rule of Judicial Administration 6110. Scheduling of Temporary and Emergency Protection from Abuse Hearings.

(a) The Court of Common Pleas shall hear Petitions for Protection from Abuse each business day between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. by a judge or judges,

- selected by Court Administration on a weekly basis. The Court of Common Pleas is unavailable to hear Petitions for Protection from Abuse from 3:00 p.m. each business day until 8:30 a.m. the following business day.
- (b) During times when the Court of Common Pleas is unavailable, a Petition for Emergency Relief from Abuse may be presented to the designated on-call Magisterial District Judge and shall not be filed with the Prothonotary.
- (c) If the on-call Magisterial District Judge determines that emergency relief is merited following an emergency hearing, the Petition for Emergency Relief from Abuse shall be granted and an Emergency Order issued. An Emergency Order will expire at 3:00 p.m. the following business day.
- (d) If an Emergency Order is granted, the on-call Magisterial District Judge shall advise the Plaintiff that the Emergency Order will expire at 3:00 p.m. the following business day and further advise Plaintiff to file a Petition for Protection from Abuse with the Prothonotary at the Franklin or Fulton County Courthouse on the next business day pursuant to Paragraph (a) of this Rule if he or she desires continuing protection.
- (e) If an Emergency Order is granted by the on-call Magisterial District Judge, the Magisterial District Judge shall immediately certify the Emergency Order and any documentation in support thereof to the Franklin County Court of Common Pleas and forward the Emergency Order to law enforcement for service on the Defendant.
- (f) If a Magisterial District Judge determines an Emergency Order will not be granted, the Magisterial District Judge shall advise the party they may file a Petition for a Protection from Abuse Order with the Prothonotary at the Franklin or Fulton County Courthouse pursuant to Paragraph (a) of this Rule.

Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order

By the Commission:

The Public Utility Commission (Commission) adopts this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order to solicit comments regarding the replacement of the Policy Statement at 52 Pa. Code § 65.20 with a Commission regulation to implement the International Water Association (IWA)/American Water Works Association (AWWA) Water Audit Methodology (Water Audit Methodology) as a best management practice in water loss control in Pennsylvania as directed by Commission Order on November 10, 2011 at Docket No. M-2008-2062697.

In light of the current challenges facing the water industry, namely: (1) rising cost imposed by the need to rehabilitate aging infrastructure; (2) increased energy costs for pumping; (3) increased costs of chemicals and other treatment necessary to meet ever more stringent Safe Drinking Water Act requirements; and (4) the limited availability financial resources for developing newsources of supply, among others, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) seeks to implement the Water Audit Methodology which will help achieve a number of public interest benefits, including, preservation of water resources, limitation of water leakage, reduction of overall company risk, and enhanced customer service.

Background

A. The 2008 Order

On November 10, 2008, the Commission issued a Tentative Opinion and Order at Docket No. M-2008-2062697 (2008 Tentative Order) regarding a pilot program to implement the Water Audit Methodology. By way of the 2008 Tentative Order, the Commission invited all jurisdictional water utilities to voluntarily participate in a pilot program to implement the Water Audit Methodology. The 2008 Tentative Order became final on December 10, 2008 (2008 Order).

As stated in the 2008 Order, a critical aspect of efficient operations involves tracking levels of unaccounted-for

water (UFW). Maintaining low levels of UFW helps prevent waste of a precious resource, avoids lost revenue, and indicates a well-managed water utility. Both the Commission and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) monitor levels of UFW on an annual basis. In addition, as part of the Commission's rate case review process, expenses for power and chemicals may be disallowed when levels of UFW exceed 20 percent. Indeed, the Commission's current Policy Statement at Section 65.20 strongly suggests that an ongoing leak detection and repair program is an integral part of maintaining low levels of UFW.

For many years, the determination of UFW used by this Commission, jurisdictional water utilities, and throughout the country was a combination of a methodology established by William D. Hudson and a procedure set forth in the AWWA Training Manual.² Over time, however, it became apparent that differing interpretations and adjustments, along with the incorporation of different components, led to less than representative results.

As stated in the 2008 Order, an enhanced, more comprehensive method has since been developed, which gives every indication that it offers superior data and indicators for improved operational accountability. This Water Audit Methodology, not only assists utilities in identifying where the losses are occurring, but also expresses by volume how much is lost and at what cost.3 The term "unaccounted-for water" was replaced with the term "water audit" based on the concept and underlying procedure that virtually all water can be "accounted-for." The Water Audit Methodology was developed jointly by a five-country group formed by the IWA and the AWWA in 1997. In 2003, the AWWA's Water Loss Control Committee identified the Water Audit methodology as a worldwide best management practice in water loss control.⁴ In 2006, the AWWA released a Water Audit software package that is available free of charge on its website, broadening the new procedure's accessibility. A year later, the AWWA Research Foundation designated the Water Audit methodology as the current best practice.6 Today, its use continues to expand, consistent with widespread efforts to increase water supply sustainability, infrastructure remediation, and overall service reliability.

As noted in the 2008 Order, experience with the Water Audit methodology throughout the country has been growing. In Pennsylvania, the Philadelphia Water Department has been pioneering the procedure since its inception in 2000 and has achieved notable success. It is also noted that the Delaware River Basin Commission (DRBC) amended its Comprehensive Plan and Water Code in 2009 to implement an updated water audit

approach consistent with the Water Audit Methodology and has been receiving annual water audits in the IWA/AWWA format.7

B. The 2012 Order

On November 10, 2011, the Commission issued a Tentative Opinion and Order at M-2008-2062697 (2011 Tentative Order) wherein the Commission ordered all Class A water utilities (over \$1,000,000 in annual revenues) to implement the Water Audit Methodology. The Tentative Opinion and Order became final January 27, 2012 (2012 Order).8 Specifically, the Commission concluded:

Based upon this Commission's tradition of establishing groundbreaking regulatory tools, such as the DSIC or single tariff pricing, we will order the implementation of this Water Audit methodology which will help achieve a number of public interest benefits, such as increased infrastructure reliability, help preserve water resources, limit water leakage, reduce overall company risk, and enhance customer service. We believe that this practice is a better tool than the current unaccounted-for-water method and in the public interest.

See, In Re: Pilot Project to Implement The International Water Association/American Water Works Association Water Audit Methodology, Docket No. M-2008-2062697 (Order entered November $10,\ 2011$) at $11.\ To$ this end, the Commission ordered the five participating water utilities, namely, Aqua Pennsylvania, Inc., Pennsylvania-American Water Company, Superior Water Company, York Water Company and United Water Pennsylvania, Inc., to file annual Water Audit summaries with the Secretary of the Commission for the year ended December 31, 2011, no later than April 30, 2012, and on subsequent years no later than April 30.

In addition to ordering the five participating water utilities to file annual Water Audit summaries by April 30, 2012, the Commission specifically directed in the 2012

That all other Class A water utilities (over \$1,000,000 in annual revenues) commence to file the annual Water Audit summaries with the Secretary of the Commission for the year ended December 31, 2012 no later than April 30, 2013, and on subsequent years no later than April 30. These other Class A water utilities presently include Columbia Water Company, Newtown Artesian Water Company, CAN DO, Inc.-Water Division, United Water Bethel, Inc., and Audubon Water Company.

Id. at 12. Accordingly, the Water Audit Methodology was adopted by this Commission and all Class A water utilities have filed the requisite annual Water Audit summaries with the Secretary of the Commission since 2012.

The 2012 Order specifically directed the preparation of proposed regulations implementing the Water Audit Methodology. With this Order, the Commission proposes replacement of the Policy Statement at 52 Pa. Code § 65.20 with a regulation which would implement the Water Audit Methodology for all Class A water utilities (over \$1,000,000 in annual revenues).

Tentative Order were withdrawn.

Discussion

The Commission Policy Statement at Section 65.20 of its regulations states, in pertinent part:

§ 65.20. Water conservation measures—statement of policy.

In rate proceedings of water utilities, the Commission intends to examine specific factors regarding the action or failure to act to encourage cost- effective conservation by their customers. Specifically, the Commission will review utilities' efforts to meet the criteria in this section when determining just and reasonable rates and may consider those efforts in other proceedings instituted by the Commission.

See, 52 Pa. Code § 65.20. Subsection (4) of this section, which specifically addresses unaccounted-for-water, states:

Levels of unaccounted-for-water should be kept within reasonable amounts. Levels above 20% have been considered by the Commission to be excessive.

Id. The stated intent of this Policy Statement is to address water conservation measures by examining specific factors regarding the action or failure to act to encourage cost-effective conservation by water utilities and their customers.

In 2013, the Commission questioned whether it should "revise its existing regulations regarding unaccounted-forwater at 52 Pa. Code § 65.20, or, whether it is necessary for the Commission to adopt new regulations regarding the Water Audit methodology." See, Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking for Revision of the Commission's Regulations on Water Conservation Measures at 52 Pa. Code § 65.20 at Docket No. L-2012-2319361 (Order entered January 24, 2013). Five sets of Comments were filed as well as one set of Reply Comments. Based on the comments received and internal review, the Commission declined to further implement additional regulations or policy statement at that time. Staffing changes in Commission Bureaus, other issues taking priority, and the fact that utilities had already been implementing this methodology contributed to this issue remaining unchanged.

The Commission has determined that, rather than revising its existing Policy Statement at § 65.20, a new regulation addressing water conservation is necessary and this Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking reflects this change. The Commission has formally adopted the Water Audit Methodology and all Class A Water utilities have been filing the annual Water Audit summaries each year. Consistent with the proposed regulation, the DEP's regulations regarding water loss require certain reporting of system unaccounted for water loss (exceeding 20%). Establishing a water loss regulation is also consistent with the guidance set forth by the Susquehanna River Basin Commission and Delaware River Basin Commission. 10

Thus, by way of this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Order, the Commission seeks comments from interested persons regarding the replacement of its Policy Statement at § 65.20 with a Commission regulation which will enable the Commission to more comprehensively address public utility water loss in the Commonwealth. The Commission expects the comments to include proposed language for its consideration and subsequent review by the Independent Regulatory Review Commis-

sion. Additionally, the Commission invites comments from the regulated community (particularly the participants in the 2008 pilot project and the other Class A water utilities that have been filing their annual Water Audits in April of each year since 2013) and other interested parties on the experienced benefits and costs of the Water Audit Methodology. More specifically, the Commission requests specific costs and/or savings associated with implementation of the Water Audit Methodology, including legal, accounting or consulting procedures which may be required. Finally, the Commission invites comments as to whether the Water Audit Methodology should be extended to the other jurisdictional water utilities.

Accordingly, pursuant to 66 Pa.C.S. § 501, the Commission issues this Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking for comment; *Therefore*,

It is Ordered That:

- 1. The Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking is issued for comment.
- 2. The Law Bureau shall deposit this Order with the Legislative Reference Bureau to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 3. Interested parties may submit written comments, via the Commission's electronic filing system, referencing Docket No. L-2020-3021932 within 45 days of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Comments shall be filed consistent with the Commission's July 27, 2020 Secretarial Letter. Before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) for consideration and disposition is an Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (ANOPR) regarding implementation of the International Water Association (IWA)/American Water Works Association (AWWA) Water Audit Methodology (Water Audit Methodology) as a best management practice in water loss control in Pennsylvania.

The Commission seeks to implement the Water Audit Methodology to achieve many public interest benefits, including, preservation of water resources, limitation of water leakage, reduction of overall company risk, and enhanced customer service. Overall, the Commission seeks to more comprehensively address public utility water loss in the Commonwealth consistent with our regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 65.20, DEP regulations, and the guidance set forth by the Susquehanna River Basin Commission and Delaware River Basin.

I look forward to reviewing the input and comments received from all interested stakeholders, particularly regarding how the Water Audit Methodology may be improved or streamlined through this rulemaking process.





Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Annual Plan for Awarding Grants Under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act

This notice presents the Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-2021 Annual Plan (Annual Plan) of the Department of Agriculture (Department) for the administration of the grant program authorized under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act (act) (3 P.S. §§ 1501—1508.1). It prescribes how the available funds appropriated by the General Assembly shall be distributed. This Annual Plan is authorized by section 8(a) of the act (3 P.S. § 1508(a)), has been prepared with the assistance and advice of the Agricultural Fair Advisory Committee (Committee), and was approved by that Committee at its September 21, 2020, meeting.

The act authorizes the Department to make grants to organizations conducting eligible agricultural fairs, Statewide agricultural organizations which contribute to the development of agriculture and agribusiness and to eligible agricultural youth groups for support of their programs.

Funds appropriated by the General Assembly to fund the act in FY 2020-2021 shall be dispersed by the Department as follows, on a funds-available basis, in the following order of priority:

- 1. First priority shall be given to grants to finance a portion of a fair's operating costs. These costs include, but are not limited to, the cost of exhibiting agribusiness products, materials and equipment, conducting agricultural or agribusiness educational activities and demonstrations, and awarding premiums to contest and exhibit winners at the agricultural fair. For these grants, the maximum payment shall be as allowed for each Class Fair under section 5(1)(i)(A) of the act (3 P.S. § 1505(1)(i)(A)). These maximum payments range from \$2,500 to \$14,000, depending on the Class Fair involved.
- 2. Second priority shall be given to grants to finance a portion of the agricultural premiums identified in section 5(1)(i)(B) of the act. For these grants, the maximum payment shall not exceed \$15,000.
- 3. Third priority shall be given to grants to reimburse a county agricultural society, or an independent agricultural society, that conducts harness horse racing at its annual agricultural fair, other than races for colts and fillies 2 and 3 years of age, in an amount equal to that used during the annual agricultural fair as purse money for harness horse racing, track and stable maintenance, starting gate rental and the cost of harness horse racing officials during the annual fair. For these grants, the maximum amount of reimbursement shall be as allowed under section 5(1)(iii) of the act. This maximum amount is \$13,000, at least \$4,000 of which must be used to reimburse purse money.
- 4. Fourth priority shall be given to grants to reimburse a county agricultural society, or an independent agricultural society, that conducts harness horse racing for 2-year-old and 3-year-old colts and fillies at its annual agricultural fair. For these grants, the maximum amount of reimbursement shall be as allowed under section 5(1)(iv) of the act. This maximum amount is \$7,600.
- 5. Fifth priority shall be given to grants to reimburse a Statewide agricultural organization that conducts an agricultural fair and is otherwise eligible for grants under section 5(2) of the act, for up to \$2,000 of its fair's operating expenses (including premium payments) on a dollar-for-dollar basis, and for 50% of all additional premium costs that are not included in that initial dollar-for-dollar reimbursement, up to a maximum amount of \$10,000. The total maximum payment shall not exceed \$12,000.

- 6. Sixth priority shall be given to grants to countywide or Statewide 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) or combined FFA and Future Homemakers of America units of boys and girls under 21 years of age that are eligible for grants under section 5(3) of the act. Grants shall be awarded in accordance with the requirements of that provision of the act.
- a. The purpose of the act is to make funds available to encourage the further development and improvement of this Commonwealth's agricultural fairs, and to continue the contribution of agricultural fairs to agriculture and agribusiness by encouraging related careers, fostering agricultural production and agricultural product improvements, and promoting increased investments in agriculture. This Commonwealth's agricultural fairs also enrich the life of the community by showcasing agricultural and agribusiness achievements, offering recreational opportunities and promoting tourism. For these reasons, the Department encourages those agricultural youth groups that are eligible for grants under section 5(3) of the act to engage in projects and activities that are conducted at agricultural fairs or that are of direct benefit to agricultural fairs.
- b. The Department will award grants to the agricultural youth groups previously described as follows:
- i. For actual expenses incurred for activities which contribute to the advancement of agriculture or agribusiness by a 4-H Youth group, a payment which will be calculated according to the following formula, under authority of section 5(3) of the act:
- *Tier 1*: \$2,000 for total enrollment of up to 1,000 members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member.
- *Tier 2*: \$2,500 for total enrollment of 1,001 to 2,000 members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member.
- *Tier 3*: \$3,000 for total enrollment of 2,001 to 3,000 members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member.

- Tier 4: \$3,500 for total enrollment of 3,001+ members plus \$1.50 for each traditional member and \$1 for each school enrichment/special interest member, a maximum reimbursement of \$9,000.
- ii. For actual expenses incurred for activities which contribute to the advancement of agriculture or agribusiness by FFA Youth groups, a payment which will be calculated using the following formula, under authority of section 5(3) of the act:
- *Tier I*: County FFA Organizations with 100 members or less will receive base funding of \$1,000 with an additional \$4 per member.
- Ther II: County FFA Organizations with 101 to 210 members inclusive will receive a \$2,000 base funding with an additional \$2 per member.
- *Tier III*: County FFA Organizations with 211 members or more will receive funding of \$2,000 with an additional \$4 per member for every member over 210.
- 7. Any funds remaining after the previous grants have been awarded shall be utilized for capital improvement as provided in section 5(1)(ii) of the act.

Given the ongoing novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the Department advises that the amount of funding appropriated for dispersal in accordance with the act and this Annual Plan may ultimately be less than in previous years. Also, in the event subsequent COVID-19-related legislation changes available funding amounts or requires that expenditures of available funding be reprioritized, the Department will publish a revised version of this Annual Plan that is consistent with that legislation.

The Department will endeavor to disburse the previous payments at the earliest date practicable.

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96). The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Medical Assistance Quality Strategy for the Commonwealth

The Department of Human Services (Department) is making available for public review and comment the Medical Assistance (MA) and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) Managed Care Quality Strategy for the Commonwealth.

Background

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) requires states to draft and implement a written quality strategy for assessing and improving the quality of health care and services furnished by managed care organizations that have a contract with the Department (see 42 CFR 438.340 (relating to managed care State quality strategy)). As a result, the Department has developed the MA and Children's Health Insurance Managed Care Quality Strategy for the Commonwealth (Quality Strategy), which discusses the various quality improvement initiatives the Department has implemented to increase the quality of care for individuals receiving services through its managed care programs. The Quality Strategy for the Commonwealth is not intended to comprehensively describe all the activities that the Department undertakes to assure the quality of care rendered to individuals who are receiving services through managed care programs.

The Department is required by 42 CFR 438.340(c)(2) to update its managed care quality strategy as needed. The updates included in this version of the Quality Strategy reflect developments in the Community HealthChoices program, changes made to improve alignment among the various managed care programs, new value-based pur-

chasing, targets, and updated goals, objectives, and quality improvement initiatives. All Federal regulatory references have been updated to refer to the current version of the Medicaid managed care final rule.

Discussion

The Quality Strategy will be used to assure that the contractors that are implementing the Department's managed care programs are in compliance with the terms of their agreements with the Department and have committed resources to meet the following: to perform monitoring and ongoing quality improvement; to contribute to the improvement of health for the populations they serve; and to incorporate new programmatic changes to assure that the individuals they serve have timely access to high-quality care.

Across the Department, the focus is on increasing alignment among the various managed care programs, moving toward compliance with Federal law by reporting on the CMS Core Set by 2024, and improving the provision of services to Pennsylvanians who are especially vulnerable, including individuals with disabilities, individuals with serious persistent mental illness and individuals with opioid use disorder.

The Office of Medical Assistance Programs' (OMAP) key initiatives continue to be centered around value-based purchasing, and include reducing preventable hospital admissions and readmissions, improving coordination and integration between physical health and behavioral health managed care programs, and incentivizing hospitals to follow-up on opioid-related emergency department admissions. OMAP is also encouraging expanded use of community-based care management teams, as well as continued implementation of the Patient Centered Medical Home model and the development of a Perinatal Quality Collaborative.

The Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services' key quality improvement initiatives include value-based purchasing arrangements, expansion of telepsychiatry services, implementation of a Section 1115 Demonstration Waiver to provide substance use disorder treatment services, suicide prevention and tobacco cessation initiatives, and further expansion of the evidence-based programs available for Behavioral HealthChoices consumers.

The Office of Long-Term Living (OLTL) has implemented Community HealthChoices, a Statewide mandatory managed care program. Eligible individuals include: (i) adults that are eligible for MA and need long-term services and supports; and (ii) individuals who are dually eligible for MA and Medicare. As this program matures, OLTL will focus on developing value-based purchasing models for home and community-based services and will use Performance Improvement Programs to reduce potentially avoidable nursing facility admissions.

The Office of CHIP recently transitioned to become a part of OMAP. As a result of this transition, CHIP will be making changes in its policies and procedures to better align with the procedures and resources of MA, allowing individuals to easily transition between the CHIP and MA Programs.

Finally, key quality initiatives for the Adult Community Autism Program (ACAP) include increasing the number of community-based services available for individuals who receive services through ACAP, improving coordination across multiple systems that provide support for adults

with autism and improving the service delivery system to address the diversity of needs of individuals who are diagnosed with autism.
