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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in **underscored bold face**. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Reproductive Health Care

Whereas, the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has long provided a guarantee of reproductive health care rights independent of, and more expansive than, any protection provided by the United States Constitution; and


Whereas, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has provided access to reproductive health care services in the Commonwealth for almost 50 years; and

Whereas, other States have adopted, and may continue to adopt, laws that seek to impose civil or criminal liability or professional discipline on persons who seek and obtain, or on health care professionals who provide reproductive health care services in the Commonwealth that are permitted by the laws of the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, efforts already taken by bordering and other states to restrict access to reproductive health care services may lead more individuals to seek reproductive health care services from providers in the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, health care professionals lawfully providing, and persons lawfully seeking and obtaining, reproductive health care services in the Commonwealth should be protected from legal liability premised on, and professional discipline issued under, the laws of other States when those services are lawful in the Commonwealth and meet Commonwealth standards for good professional practice.

Now, Therefore, I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws do hereby order and direct the following:

§ 7.911. Definitions.

For the purposes of this subchapter, “reproductive health care services” includes all medical, surgical, counseling or referral services relating to the human reproductive system, including, but not limited to, services relating to pregnancy, contraception or the termination of a pregnancy.

§ 7.912. No assistance from Executive Agencies.

Except as required by an order of a court of competent jurisdiction, no agency, board, commission or council under the Governor’s jurisdiction (Executive Agency), and no employee, appointee, officer or other person acting on behalf of any Executive Agency, may provide any information or expend or use time, money, facilities, property, equipment, personnel or other Commonwealth resources in furtherance of any investigation or proceeding initiated in or by another state that seeks to impose civil or criminal liability or professional discipline upon a person or entity for:

(1) the provision, securing or receiving of, or any inquiry concerning, reproductive health care services that are legal in this Commonwealth; or

(2) any assistance given to any person or entity that relates to the provision, securing or receiving of, or any inquiry concerning, reproductive health care services that are legal in this Commonwealth.

This restriction shall not apply to any investigation or proceeding where the conduct that is subject to potential liability under the investigation or proceeding initiated in or by the other state would be subject to civil or criminal liability or professional discipline under the laws of the Commonwealth if committed in this Commonwealth or if action is required by Federal law. Notwithstanding the general prohibition of this section, Executive Agencies and individuals acting on their behalf may provide information or assistance in connection with such an investigation or proceeding in response to the written request of a person or entity that is the subject of such an investigation or proceeding.

§ 7.913. Protection of health care and other professionals licensed in this Commonwealth.

Executive Agencies are directed to work with the boards of professional licensure operating under their respective supervision to consider whether to implement policies that will ensure that no person shall be disqualified from licensure or subject to discipline by a Commonwealth board of professional licensure for providing or assisting in the provision of reproductive health care services or as a consequence of any judgment, discipline, or other discipline threatened or imposed under the laws of another state so long as the services as provided would have been lawful and consistent with standards for good professional practice in this Commonwealth.

§ 7.914. Communication about reproductive health care services.

Executive Agencies, consistent with applicable law, are directed to consider implementing steps that would help inform the public about reproductive health care, including:

(1) communicating directly with the public on matters pertaining to reproductive health care services;

(2) providing comprehensive information about the current cost and availability of reproductive health care in a manner that is easily accessed and understood by the public; and

(3) educating the public about the protection of health care information stored or accessed on personal devices.

§ 7.915. Unavailability of interstate extradition.

The Governor shall decline any request received from the executive authority of any other state to issue a warrant for the arrest or surrender of any person charged with a criminal violation of a law of that other state where the violation alleged involves the provision or receipt of or assistance with reproductive health care services unless the acts forming the basis of the prosecution of the crime charged would also constitute a criminal

offense under the laws of the Commonwealth. Consistent with the requirements of the United States Constitution, this limitation shall not apply in the circumstance where the person who is the subject of the request for arrest or surrender was physically present in the requesting state at the time of the commission of the alleged offense and thereafter fled from that state.

§ 7.916. Implementation.

Executive Agencies shall take all steps necessary to implement this subchapter.

§ 7.917. General.

This subchapter shall be implemented consistent with applicable law. Nothing in this subchapter shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect the authority granted by law to an Executive Agency, or the head thereof. This subchapter is not intended to, and does not create, any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the Commonwealth, its departments, agencies or entities, its officers, employees or agents, or any other person.

§ 7.918. Effective date.

This subchapter will take effect immediately and shall remain in effect unless revised or rescinded by the Governor.

Notice of Bill Enacted without Signature

July 19, 2022

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I have allowed House Bill 2644, Printer's Number 3644 to become law without my signature. While I am allowing this legislation to become enacted, I write to record my concerns with both the substance of the legislation and how it will be administered. This legislation was the product of a divided government, in which compromise between differing viewpoints is necessary.

As this bill advanced through the legislative process, my administration raised concerns about the structure of the Oil and Gas Well Plugging Grant Program established in Subchapter C of the bill. First, the bill directs that federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) funding be deposited in the Orphan Well Plugging Fund; however, IIJA funds are not dispersed to states, they are administered by the Department of Interior. Second, the legislation requires the payment of grants of either \$10,000 or \$20,000 per well based on the depth of the well, without reference to the actual cost of plugging the well. Third, the legislation eliminates the Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) authority to impose requirements on recipients of federal funding that are stricter than the requirements under State law, even if those more stringent requirements are mandatory parts of the federal program. Unfortunately, these concerns were not addressed through the legislative process, and there are concerns that significant provisions of the bill are neither applicable to the program nor capable of being implemented.

Finally, the legislature's action to withdraw the Environmental Quality Board's authority to establish bonding amounts for the conventional industry provides an appropriate occasion to revisit whether the Commonwealth is doing enough to ensure that this industry is being a good environmental steward by preventing the abandonment of wells and meeting its obligations as a prudent trustee of Pennsylvania's public natural resources for current and future generations.

Evidence on this count is discouraging. Over the past five years, DEP has identified more than 17,000 violations at conventional oil and gas wells, and DEP has issued over 3,300 Notices of Violations to the conventional industry specifically due to attempts to abandon wells since July 1, 2017. In addition, over the past five years, operators of conventional oil and gas wells have failed to report production for an average of around 36,000 conventional oil and gas wells per year.

Due to these concerns, DEP is reviewing existing processes and procedures and will be providing the following evaluations and recommendations to me by September 1st:

1) Evaluation of the conventional industry's recent record of compliance with reporting requirements and performance requirements under existing law.


2) Evaluation of using existing authority, including increased exercise of civil penalty authority and forfeiting conventional oil and gas well bonds and requiring submission of replacement bonds, as methods to deter and motivate conventional operators to address abandoned wells and violations of the applicable law.

3) Recommendations for increased scrutiny of conventional oil and gas operators' requests for regulatory inactive status approval and permit transfers, because these steps are often precursors to improper abandonment of wells.

4) Evaluation of using existing criminal provisions related to conventional oil and gas operations as a means of deterring and motivating conventional operators to address abandoned wells and violations of the applicable law.

5) Recommendations for regulatory reform to comprehensively regulate conventional drilling according to modern best practices and industry standards.

Amendments to the Superior Court Operating Procedures

TITLE 210. APPELLATE PROCEDURE

PART II. INTERNAL OPERATING PROCEDURES

CHAPTER 65. OPERATING PROCEDURES OF THE SUPERIOR COURT

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICES AND STAFF

§ 65.2. Prothonotary.

A. The Prothonotary is an officer of the Superior Court who is charged with the clerical duties and responsibilities of the business of the Court. The duties and responsibilities of the Prothonotary include but are not limited to:

1. keeping the records and seal of the Court;
2. issuing, processing, and entering judgments and orders at the direction of the Court;
3. certifying copies from the records of the Court;
4. scheduling all hearings and arguments before the Court, preparing the calendar, and coordinating judicial schedules;
5. supervising the collection of all fees collected by the Court and ensuring the proper receipt and distribution of such fees; overseeing the preparation of the Court's official record of proceedings, attesting to their accuracy, and providing for distribution;

[6. overseeing the preparation of the Court's official record of proceedings, attesting to their accuracy, and providing for distribution;]

6. [7.] promptly securing all records wherein appeals have been filed and, where provided by Rule of Appellate Procedure, dismissing an appeal for failure to comply with the Rules or Order of the Court;

7. prepare the daily judgment lists for the Reporter to post pursuant to O.P. 65.3.B; and

8. any other such duties as required by the Court.

B. Opinions filed with the Prothonotary are to be made available to the parties and the public promptly thereafter.

§ 65.3. Reporter.

A. The Reporter shall be a member of the administrative staff of the Court whose duties and responsibilities include:

1. maintaining accurate journals and recording the votes and miscellaneous correspondence on all opinions, memoranda, and petitions for reargument for each case before the Court;

2. preparing statistical reports, in cooperation with the legal systems coordinator, which shall indicate the number of decisions rendered each year by the Court;

3. compiling assignment lists and records of the case assignments of the judges;

4. maintaining a record of all panels and compiling paperbooks which shall be kept until cases have been reported to the printer;

5. preparing and preserving for a reasonable period of time correspondence to and from the Superior Court printer[.]; **and**

6. preparing a digest to inform the Court of recent Supreme Court and en banc Superior Court decisions.

B. In conjunction with the Prothonotary's responsibility pursuant to O.P. 65.2.A.7, the Reporter shall verify and post the daily judgment lists of the Court.

§ 65.7. Central Legal Staff.

Central Legal Staff is an office of the Court created for the purpose of assisting the Court in:

1. reviewing and processing motions;[,]

2. preparing memos for the Court as directed;[,]

3. screening cases;[,]

4. [certifying cases] **reviewing proposed decisions** to advise the Court of apparent conflicts **or of conflict-clearance**;[,], **preparing a newsletter to inform the Court of recent Supreme and Superior Court decisions,**] and

5. accepting such other responsibilities as may be assigned by the Court or the President Judge.

§ 65.12. Initial Review of Docketing Statements.

Central Legal Staff is responsible for the screening of docketing statements filed pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 3517. These statements are to be initially screened to determine if the appeal is jurisdictionally or procedurally defective. **Failure to file a timely docketing statement may result in dismissal of the appeal. However, [N] no appeal shall be subject to being quashed or dismissed on the basis of review of the completed docketing state-**

ment [review] alone; rather, if [a defect is apparent] **a potential defect is identified, a rule-to-show-cause order shall issue to the appellant as to why the appeal should not be quashed or dismissed [letter shall be addressed to counsel to verify same]**. Following notification to counsel, the appeal is subject to being quashed **or dismissed** by the assigned monthly motions judge.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

MIFFLIN COUNTY

Local Rule 700; CP-44-CV-2-2022

Order of Court

And now, this 20th day of July, 2022, the Court hereby adopts the following new Local Rules of Judicial Administration.

Rule 700. Sentencing Judge.

(A) Except as provided in paragraph (b), the judge who presided at the trial or who received the plea of guilty or nolo contendere shall impose sentence unless there are extraordinary circumstances which preclude the judge's presence. In such event, another judge shall be assigned to impose sentence.

(B) The supervision of a defendant serving a sentence may be transferred to a judge other than the original sentencing judge in any of the following situations:

(1) Whenever a substitution of judges shall enhance the efficient disposition of cases, and after a hearing, or when in writing, the defendant consents to supervision being transferred to another judge;

(2) The defendant is facing a new sentencing in front of a different judge on a separate case, and after a hearing or in writing, the defendant consents to supervision being transferred to the other judge; or

(3) There exist extraordinary circumstances, including death, incapacitation, or retirement, which preclude the presence of the original sentencing judge.

Comment: Local Rule 700(A) tracks Pa.R.Crim.P. 700(A). Pa.R.Crim.P. 700 also governs sentencings that result from a violation of probation or parole. See *Comm. v. McNeal*, 120 A.3d 313 (Pa. Super. 2015). Accordingly, Local Rule 700(B) flows from Pa.R.Crim.P. 700(B), which invites promulgation of local rules to expand the circumstances under which transfers from one judge to another may be made. Local Rule 700(B) reflects the recognition that transfers are appropriate under a variety of circumstances, including where, in order to consolidate a violation hearing in front of the "back judge" with the sentencing for a new case in front of a different judge.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY BOARD

[25 PA. CODE CH. 250]

Administration of the Land Recycling Program Vanadium MSC Rule

The Environmental Quality Board (Board) proposes to amend Chapter 250 (relating to administration of land recycling program). This rulemaking is proposed under § 250.11 (relating to periodic review of MSCs), which requires the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to review new scientific information related to Statewide health standard medium-specific concentrations (MSC) at least 36 months after the effective date of the most recent promulgated MSCs and to propose to the Board any changes to the MSCs as necessary. This proposed rulemaking uses contemporary scientific information to update the toxicity value for vanadium, resulting in updates to the vanadium MSCs.

This proposed rulemaking was adopted by the Board at its meeting on May 18, 2022.

A. Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

C. Statutory Authority

This proposed rulemaking is authorized under sections 104(a) and 303(a) of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act 2) (35 P.S. §§ 6026.104(a) and 6026.303(a)), which direct the Board to adopt and amend periodically by regulation Statewide health standards for regulated substances for each environmental medium, including any health-based standards adopted by the Federal government by regulation or statute, and health advisory levels, and which direct the Board to promulgate appropriate mathematically valid statistical tests to define compliance with Act 2, and other regulations as necessary to implement the provisions of Act 2; and section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 510-20), which authorizes the Board to formulate, adopt and promulgate rules and regulations that are necessary for the proper work of the Department.

D. Background and Purpose

The Commonwealth's Land Recycling Program, established by Act 2 (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101–6026.908), encourages the voluntary cleanup and reuse of contaminated commercial and industrial sites. It sets standards that are protective of human health and the environment and

which consider future use. It provides potential land developers with clear cleanup standards based on risk and provides an end to liability when that cleanup standard is achieved.

Act 2 and Chapter 250 do not create permitting or corrective action obligations; rather, they provide remediators with options to address contamination and any associated liability that arises under other statutes. To take advantage of the liability protection provided in Act 2, a person must remediate their site by selecting and attaining compliance with one or any combination of the following three environmental standards: background standard, Statewide health standard or site-specific standard. Chapter 250 contains tables of numeric values for contaminants in each environmental medium, including soil and groundwater. These numeric values are used by remediators to determine the MSCs at their sites and account for used and unused groundwater, as well as residential and nonresidential exposure factors. If the Statewide health standard is selected to attain compliance, the remediator must use the applicable MSCs to demonstrate attainment of the standard at the point of compliance.

Section 250.11 requires the Department to review new scientific information used to calculate MSCs under the Statewide health standard and propose appropriate changes at least every 36 months following the effective date of the most recently promulgated MSCs. The Board most recently promulgated MSCs that became effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking at 51 Pa.B. 7173 (November 20, 2021). Based on new scientific information, this proposed rulemaking would update the vanadium toxicity value and the resulting Statewide health standard MSCs for vanadium.

This proposed rulemaking would impact any person addressing a release of vanadium at a property, whether voluntarily or by order of the Department. This proposed rulemaking would not add or create new regulatory obligations for any particular category of person. Under section 301(a) of Act 2 (35 P.S. § 6026.301(a)), a remediator has the authority to select a remediation standard of choice. To receive cleanup liability protection, remediators must comply with all of the applicable technical and administrative requirements of the selected remediation standard in accordance with section 501(a) of Act 2 (35 P.S. § 6026.501(a)).

As noted previously, this proposed rulemaking would not singularly affect one specific industry or person. This proposed rulemaking would impact the owners and operators of properties throughout this Commonwealth where vanadium has been released. Some of these properties may be owned or operated, or both, by small businesses. Because of the application of this proposed rulemaking, it is not possible to identify specifics on the types and numbers of small businesses that could potentially be affected by vanadium contamination. In addition, Act 2 and Chapter 250 are unique from other statutes and regulations because they do not create permitting or corrective action obligations. Rather, Act 2 and Chapter 250 provide remediators with options to address contamination and any associated liability that arises under other environmental statutes. Making changes to the MSCs in the Chapter 250 Appendix A does not create liability or obligations related to vanadium. Instead, a person's liability arises under other statutes, while Act 2 and Chapter 250 provide that person the means to resolve their

liability imposed by those statutes and to address the contamination. In this way, Act 2 and Chapter 250 do not create new obligations for a particular category of person in the way a new permitting obligation or corrective action regulation would.

The current vanadium oral reference dose provided in Chapter 250's Table 5B comes from United States Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Provisional Peer-Reviewed Toxicity Value (PPRTV) database which is considered a "Tier 2 Source" in § 250.605(a) (relating to sources of toxicity information). The PPRTV value for vanadium is based on a sodium metavanadate study and has generated a residential direct contact value that is near the lower end of the naturally occurring concentration range of vanadium in soil, according to a study by the United States Geological Survey. A cleanup value this low makes it difficult for remediators to determine if vanadium soil concentrations are naturally occurring or are related to a vanadium release at their site. Use of the PPRTV value has also impeded utilization of the Department's policy, titled "Management of Fill Policy," Document No. 258-2182-773.

These proposed numeric value increases reflect updated scientific information related to the toxicity of vanadium and accurately align with the risk from exposure. The EPA has determined that there is a high level of uncertainty associated with the development of the PPRTV toxicity value, which is why it is so low. The alternative to using the PPRTV toxicity value for vanadium is to use the EPA's Integrated Risk Information System (IRIS) vanadium pentoxide value and apply a molecular weight conversion. The PPRTV value is based on a sodium metavanadate study and it can only be used as an elemental vanadium value because of the molecular weight conversion done in the study. The IRIS vanadium pentoxide value is a vanadium compound value that, by using the same molecular weight conversion, can also be used as an elemental vanadium value. The only difference is that the Department has performed the molecular weight conversion. The IRIS value is preferred over the PPRTV value because it has less uncertainty associated with it and it is a "Tier 1 Source" for toxicity values according to § 250.605(a), which means it has gone through a more rigorous peer review process. The EPA has endorsed the use of the IRIS vanadium pentoxide value in conjunction with a molecular weight conversion by using it to develop their vanadium Regional Screening Level.

The Department consulted with the Cleanup Standards Scientific Advisory Board (CSSAB) during the development of this proposed rulemaking. The CSSAB, which was established by section 105 of Act 2 (35 P.S. § 6026.105), consists of persons representing a cross-section of experience, including engineering, biology, hydrogeology, statistics, medicine, chemistry, toxicology and other related fields. The purpose of the CSSAB is to assist the Department and the Board in developing Statewide health standards, determining the appropriate statistically and scientifically valid procedures and risk factors to be used, and providing other technical advice as needed to implement Act 2. The Department presented this proposed rulemaking to the CSSAB for its review at a meeting held on October 4, 2021. The Department received a unanimous letter of support for this proposed rulemaking from the CSSAB on October 12, 2021.

E. Summary of Regulatory Requirements

Chapter 250 Appendix A, Tables 2, 4A, 4B and 5B

Proposed amendments to the "Medium-Specific Concentrations" tables include updates to the groundwater

(Table 2), soil direct contact (Table 4A) and soil-to-groundwater (Table 4B) vanadium numeric values. Proposed amendments to the Physical and Toxicological Properties for Inorganic Regulated Substances (Table 5B) table include an updated toxicity value for vanadium. Additionally, a footnote is proposed to be added to Table 5B explaining that the updated vanadium toxicity value is derived from the oral reference dose for vanadium pentoxide from the EPA's IRIS database with the application of a molecular weight conversion.

F. Benefits, Costs and Compliance

Benefits

When the General Assembly enacted Act 2, it found and declared among its policy goals in section 102 of Act 2 (35 P.S. § 6026.102) that "[p]ublic health and environmental hazards cannot be eliminated without clear, predictable environmental remediation standards and a process for developing those standards," that "[a]ny remediation standards adopted by this Commonwealth must provide for the protection of public health and the environment," and that "[c]leanup plans should be based on actual risk that contamination on the site may pose to public health and the environment, taking into account its current and future use and the degree to which contamination can spread offsite and expose the public or the environment to risk[.]"

To implement these policy goals, the General Assembly granted the Board the rulemaking authority in sections 104 and 303 to develop Statewide health standards and the methods to calculate those standards. Chapter 250 implements Act 2 consistent with the General Assembly's declaration of policy outlined in section 102 of Act 2.

The amendments to the MSCs in this proposed rulemaking would serve both the public and the regulated community because they would provide MSCs based on the most up-to-date health and scientific information for vanadium. Section 104(a) directed the Board to adopt regulations needed to implement Act 2 and granted the Board the rulemaking authority to amend those standards periodically as better science becomes available and as the need for clarification or enhancement of the program becomes apparent. Accordingly, when the Board first promulgated Chapter 250 at 27 Pa.B. 4181 (August 16, 1997), the intent of the General Assembly was for the Board to update and amend those standards as necessary.

Potential contamination of soil and groundwater from accidental spills and unlawful disposal may impact residents of this Commonwealth. Vanadium is a systemic toxicant (non-carcinogen) as defined under Act 2 and its release not only poses a threat to the environment, but also may affect public health. Research on vanadium is continuous and provides the basis for the protection of Commonwealth residents through site cleanup requirements.

The proposed update to the vanadium toxicity value would result in proposed increases to the vanadium MSC numeric values. Value increases reflect updated scientific information related to the toxicity of vanadium and recognize that the updated values accurately align with the risk from exposure. Value increases can also prevent impracticable remediation requirements for sites where existing vanadium standards for sites where existing vanadium standards are lower than naturally occurring concentrations.

The benefits of this proposed rulemaking are difficult to quantify because, unlike other statutory or permitting structures, Act 2 does not prevent contamination but instead provides remediators with a variety of options to

addresses sites with existing contamination. In that sense, this proposed rulemaking, consistent with Act 2, benefits the public because it may reduce harmful exposure and result in efficient and expedient remediation and reuse of contaminated sites.

Compliance costs

The Department believes this proposed rulemaking will result in positive economic impacts because the proposed MSCs more accurately align with exposure risk and prevent impracticable remediation requirements for a site where existing vanadium standards are lower than naturally occurring concentrations. The number of completed remediations varies each year but on average, remediators apply the Act 2 remediation standards to approximately 800 contaminated properties across this Commonwealth per year. The Department does not expect that the proposed amendments would impact the number of remediations voluntarily completed or the number that must be completed as a result of Department enforcement actions.

The proposed updates to the vanadium Statewide health standard MSCs would not affect the cleanup options available to remediators under other cleanup standards. Persons conducting remediation under Act 2 may choose from three different cleanup standards: background, Statewide health or site-specific.

Compliance assistance plan

The Land Recycling Program disseminates information related to these updates using the Department web site and e-mails to environmental consultants and stakeholders involved in the program.

Paperwork requirements

This proposed rulemaking would not result in any additional forms or reports, beyond those already required by Act 2 and Chapter 250.

G. Pollution Prevention

The Federal Pollution Prevention Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 13101–13109) established a National policy that promotes pollution prevention as the preferred means for achieving state environmental protection goals. The Department encourages pollution prevention, which is the reduction or elimination of pollution at its source, through the substitution of environmentally friendly materials, more efficient use of raw materials and the incorporation of energy efficiency strategies. Pollution prevention practices can provide greater environmental protection with greater efficiency because they can result in significant cost savings to facilities that permanently achieve or move beyond compliance.

Act 2 encourages cleanup plans with remedy goals which treat, destroy or remove regulated substances whenever technically and economically feasible. This proposed rulemaking provides the necessary Statewide health standard MSCs for remediators to remove contamination or eliminate exposure, where appropriate. In particular, this proposed rulemaking reflects the most up-to-date science, especially as it relates to the characterization and removal of contamination that exceeds Act 2 MSCs. During the remediation of a contaminated site, potential sources of pollution are often removed to attain the Act 2 standards, thus eliminating or minimizing the potential for continued migration of the sources of pollution to other areas.

H. Sunset Review

The Board is not establishing a sunset date for this proposed regulation because the requirements are needed for the Department to carry out its statutory authority.

I. Regulatory Review

Under Section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on July 12, 2022, the Department submitted a copy of these proposed amendments to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Environmental Resources and Energy Committees. In addition to submitting the proposed amendments, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed regulatory analysis form prepared by the department. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed regulations within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria that have not been met. The Act specifies detailed procedures for review of these issues by the Department, the General Assembly, and the Governor prior to final publication of the regulations.

J. Public Comments

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, suggestions, support or objections regarding this proposed rulemaking to the Board. Comments, suggestions, support or objections must be received by the Board by August 29, 2022.

The manual will be amended to reflect the latest issuances, and published annually in Title 4 of the *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.4 at the end of each fiscal year.

This amendment updates the index for all executive orders, management directives, and manuals issued, amended, and rescinded between July 1, 2021 and June 30, 2022. Changes are indicated by an asterisk (*).

- All documents preceded by the letter "M" are manuals. All documents preceded by the letter "MD" are management directives.
- Documents with a strike-through have been rescinded.
- Amendments are presented as complete documents that incorporate all changes since the last issuance.
- Revisions which generally affect older issuances are pen and ink changes or replacement pages and affect only those parts of an issuance being changed. Therefore, the issuance changed by a revision will be in more than one document because there will be original issuance and any revision.

Program Requirements for the Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program

The Department of Agriculture (Department) hereby provides notice of the standards and requirements for the Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program (Program).

The Program is established under the authority of 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 10701—10705 (relating to Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program), referred to as the Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program Act (act). The Program allows the Department to award reimbursement grants for certain eligible projects to improve urban agricultural infrastructure in an urban area, improve or

facilitate the aggregation of agricultural products in an urban area, entail the sharing of resources among urban agricultural entities or community organizations and support community development in the project area.

This notice establishes the procedures by which grant applications will be solicited, reviewed and by which grants will be awarded, drawing on funding available in Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023.

1. *Program Objective.* The Program's objective is to provide grants to reimburse some portion of the costs of implementing projects that improve agriculture infrastructure in urban areas and that focus on aggregation of agricultural products, sharing of resources and support for community development resources.

2. *Definitions.* The following words and phrases apply to the Program:

Department. The Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth.

Eligible project. A project that the Department determines does one or more of the following:

a. Improves agricultural infrastructure in an urban area.

b. Improves or facilitates the aggregation of agricultural products in an urban area.

c. Entails the sharing of resources among urban agricultural operations, agricultural producers or community organizations.

d. Supports community or economic development in the project area.

Person. An individual, partnership, association, firm, corporation, cooperatives or any other legal entity.

Program. The Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program.

Secretary. The Secretary of the Department.

Urban municipality. A municipality with a population density equal to or greater than 291 persons per square mile and a total population equal to or greater than 2,500, or a municipality in which more than 50% of the population lives in an urbanized area, as defined by the United States Census Bureau. A listing of Urban municipalities can be found on the Center for Rural Pennsylvania's list of municipalities, currently found at <https://www.rural.pa.gov/download.cfm?file=Resources/PDFs/data/List%20of%20Municipalities%20web%202022.xlsx>.

3. *Reimbursement Grant Program.* Program grants shall be reimbursement grants. The following shall apply:

a. The amount of a grant is based on actual eligible costs submitted by an approved applicant for an approved project.

b. Grant money shall not exceed 85% of the costs of an eligible project.

c. Grant money shall not be used to reimburse any portion of an in-kind contribution to an eligible project.

d. Grant money may not be used to pay or reimburse wages or salaries of grant recipient staff.

e. Grant money may not be used to reimburse any portion of the project costs which are being paid or reimbursed under another Federal or State grant program.

f. A single applicant may not be awarded more than \$100,000 in grants in any 5-year period, calculated from the date the Department awards the grant.

g. Grants will only be offered to the extent that funding is made available to the Department. In the event funding is exhausted or otherwise unavailable, the Department will be under no obligation to provide grants. Grant money may be prorated or offered as a percentage of actual costs, as determined by the Department, and set forth in an order by the Secretary, to spread available money to a larger number of eligible applicants.

4. *Eligibility.* A person may apply to the Department for a grant for an eligible project in an Urban municipality under the Program.

5. *Grant Types.* An applicant for a grant under the Program shall specify whether the applicant seeks a Microgrant or a Collaboration Grant.

a. A "Microgrant" shall be awarded for one-time project or to a single entity applicant. The maximum amount of a Microgrant shall be the lesser of \$2,500 or 15% of project costs. No more than \$50,000 of available funds in FY 2022-2023 shall be used for microgrants.

b. A "Collaboration Grant" shall be awarded for an eligible project (as defined in Paragraph No. 2) for which a Microgrant is not sought. An application for a Collaboration Grant may be submitted by multiple partners on a single project. The maximum amount of a Microgrant shall be the lesser of \$50,000 or 15% of project costs.

6. *Application procedure.*

a. *Online Applications Only.* An applicant for a grant under the Program shall be submitted through the Commonwealth's Single Application for Assistance online application system at www.esa.decd.state.pa.us.

b. *Application Window.* Applications must be submitted through the Single Application for Assistance online application system between 8 a.m. on Monday August 1, 2022, and 5 p.m. on Friday, September 16, 2022. Applications received outside of that application window will not be considered or reviewed.

c. *Application Requirements.* An application for a grant under the Program shall contain the following information:

i. The applicant's name, business address and contact information.

ii. A statement as to whether the applicant seeks a Microgrant or a Collaboration Grant.

iii. The details of the project for which reimbursement grant money is sought, including the following:

A. A project budget.

B. A statement of the maximum amount of grant money sought for the project.

C. A project construction and implementation schedule.

D. A narrative identifying each entity that will assist in, participate in and benefit from the project.

iv. Separate descriptions of how the project would meet one or more of the following statutory requirements:

A. Improve agricultural infrastructure in an urban area.

B. Improve or facilitates the aggregation of agricultural products in an urban area.

C. Entail the sharing of resources among urban agricultural operations, agricultural producers or community organizations.

D. Support community or economic development in the project area.

v. An attestation signed by the applicant, verifying the accuracy of the information presented on the application.

7. *Disposition and Review of Grant Applications.* The Department will review each application, and supporting documentation submitted therewith, for completeness and accuracy. If an application is found to be incomplete or inaccurate, the Department may request additional documentation and may discontinue further processing of the application until the requested information is received.

8. *Agreement Required.* If the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant shall execute a Grant Agreement which describes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made.

9. *Distribution of Grant Money.* As Program grants are reimbursement grants, the Department will not issue grant money until the successful applicant submits all of the following to the Department:

a. A verified statement that the eligible project has been completed or implemented.

b. A verified statement of the project completion date.

c. Photos of the completed or implemented project with a narrative explanation of each photo.

d. Bills and invoices demonstrating that expenses were incurred for which reimbursement grant funds are sought.

A 30-day public comment period applies to these applications.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 77.522 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

Additional criteria

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan, and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters of this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume, or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing NPDES Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Submittal of comments

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit notice within 30-days of this notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and phone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

Requests or petitions for a public hearing on any NPDES permit applications will be accepted as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92a.82(d). The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30-days of this public notice and contain the name, address, phone number and the interest of the party filing the request and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. The Department may hold a public hearing if the public interest is significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30-days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. 2023 Environmental Education Grants; Notice of Availability

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) announces the opening of a new round of Environ-

mental Education Grants for 2023. The grant round will open August 1, 2022.

The Environmental Education Grants Program (Program) was established by the Environmental Education Act of 1993, which mandates setting aside 5% of the pollution fines and penalties the Department collects annually for environmental education in this Commonwealth. In its 29-year history, the Program has funded more than \$12 million in environmental education projects. Awardees have included schools, nonprofit organizations, colleges and universities, municipalities, county conservation districts and businesses.

Two types of awards, mini grants and general grants, will be offered for projects addressing the 2023 Program priorities of water, climate change and environmental justice.

Mini grants of up to \$5,000 may be awarded for local (school, county, municipality or other defined area) environmental education projects. General grants may be awarded in amounts ranging from \$5,001—\$30,000 (Level I) for implementation of large scale regional or Statewide environmental education projects or in amounts ranging from \$30,001—\$85,000 (Level II), for nonformal education projects that engage youth and teachers from at least 60 Commonwealth counties at 3 levels: National, State and local. Additionally, Level II projects must demonstrate that at least 30% of program participants live or work, or both, within an environmental justice area (as defined by the United States Census). Pennsylvania's 2022 Annual Ambient Air Monitoring Network Plan

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is seeking public comment on Pennsylvania's 2022 Annual Ambient Air Monitoring Network Plan (Plan). The Plan has been updated to address changes that have been made in the Commonwealth's ambient air monitoring network and to identify changes that are anticipated to occur in the remainder of 2022 and in 2023.

On October 17, 2006, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgated final amendments to the National ambient air monitoring requirements for criteria pollutants at 40 CFR Parts 53 and 58 (relating to ambient air monitoring reference and equivalent methods; and ambient air quality surveillance). See 71 FR 61236 (October 17, 2006). The EPA's final rule requires state and local agencies to enhance air monitoring to "improve public health protection and better inform the public about air quality in their communities." Under 40 CFR 58.10 (relating to annual monitoring network plan and periodic network assessment), air quality state and local monitoring agencies must adopt an annual air monitoring network plan and make the plan available for public inspection for at least 30 days prior to final submission to the EPA Regional Administrator. The Plan must include a statement of purpose for each monitor and evidence that siting and operation of each monitor meets Federal requirements. The EPA may also provide an opportunity for review and comment prior to approving or disapproving a state's monitoring network plan. The Plan

was due to the EPA by July 1, 2022. The Department is working as expeditiously as possible to submit the Plan to the EPA.

Pennsylvania Eagles Fast Play Game 5169

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Eagles (hereinafter “Eagles”). The game number is PA-5169.

2. *Definitions*:

(a) *Authorized retailer or retailer*: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *Game Ticket*: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player’s record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(d) *DOWN*: A specific, pre-defined portion of the play area, which contains a 1ST DOWN, 2ND DOWN, 3RD DOWN or 4TH DOWN, three “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols, three “Prize” symbols and a “DOWN MULTIPLIER” in a horizontal line that, when matched against the play symbols in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, determines whether a player wins a prize.

(e) *DOWN MULTIPLIER*: The area at the left of each “DOWN” on an Eagles lottery game ticket which contains either a 1X (NOMULT), 2X (2TIMES), 3X (3TIMES) or 4X (4TIMES) multiplier that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player multiplies any prize won in any “DOWN” by the multiplier shown.

(f) *Lottery Central Computer System*: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(g) *Lottery Terminal*: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.

(h) *WINALL*: The area at the bottom of an Eagles lottery game ticket containing an Eagles score and a Guest score that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area. “WINALL” prizes are not multiplied.

(i) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(j) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.

(k) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(l) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(m) *WINNING NUMBERS*: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(n) *Winning ticket*: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(o) *YOUR NUMBERS*: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. *Price*: The price of an Eagles ticket is \$5.

4. *Description of the Eagles Fast Play lottery game*:

(a) The Eagles lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Eagles tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) Eagles is played by matching any of the play symbols in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area to any of the play symbols located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) Eagles tickets contain a “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area. Whenever any of the play symbols located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area match any of the play symbols located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, the player multiplies any prize won by the multiplier shown for that “DOWN.”

(d) Eagles tickets also contain a “WINALL” area. Whenever the “EAGLES” score is greater than the “GUEST” score, the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area. “WINALL” prizes are not multiplied.

(e) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(f) An Eagles game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(g) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request an Eagles game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(h) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of an Eagles game ticket and select the Eagles option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. *Eagles ticket characteristics:*

(a) An Eagles ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.

(b) *Play Symbols:* Each Eagles ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area, a "DOWN MULTIPLIER" area and a "WINALL" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The multipliers and their captions, located in the "DOWN MULTIPLIER" area, are: 1X (NOMULT), 2X (2TIMES), 3X (3TIMES) and 4X (4TIMES). The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINALL" area, are: 00, 02, 03, 07, 10, 12, 14, 15, 18, 20, 21, 24, 27, 28, 30, 31 and 35.

(c) *Prize Symbols:* The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL), \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL), \$15^{.00} (FIFTEEN), \$20^{.00} (TWENTY), \$50^{.00} (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$75,000 (SVYFIVTHO).

(d) *Prizes:* The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$1,000 and \$75,000. Eagles contains a feature that can multiply the prize won. The "WINALL" prizes cannot be multiplied. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 8 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to 12 times on a ticket.

(e) *Approximate number of tickets available for the game:* Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Eagles lottery game.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which the "EAGLES" score is greater than the "GUEST" score in the "WINALL" area, and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in five of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in six of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the "DOWN MULTIPLIER" area for that "DOWN," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) multiplier appears in the "DOWN MULTIPLIER" area for that "DOWN," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 4X (4TIMES) multiplier appears in the "DOWN MULTIPLIER" area for that "DOWN," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which the "EAGLES" score is greater than the "GUEST" score in the "WINALL" area, and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in five of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in four of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(FIFTEEN) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(cc) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 3X (3TIMES) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(dd) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(ee) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(ff) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

8. *Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning:* The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

(a) *Qualifying Tickets*: Non-winning PA-5169 Eagles (\$5) Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Qualifying Tickets") are eligible for entry in the Drawing.

(b) *Participation and entry*:

(1) Entrants must be members of the Pennsylvania Lottery VIP Players Club to participate in the Drawing. To join the VIP Players Club, visit <https://www.palottery.state.pa.us/vipplayersclub/login.aspx>. Becoming a VIP Players Club member is free.

(2) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at <https://www.palottery.com>, or the Lottery's official mobile application during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. No other method of submission will be accepted, and entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.

(3) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be accepted.

Each Eagles Party Deck Ticket Prize includes two tickets, with beer, water, soft drinks and snacks, for the Philadelphia Eagles home game against the Tennessee Titans, to be held on December 4, 2022.

(ii) The sixth through the sixteenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of one Eagles Club Seats Ticket Prize. Each Eagles Club Seats Ticket Prize includes two tickets, with \$30 of stadium concession or Pro Shop credit loaded onto each ticket, for the Philadelphia Eagles home game against the New Orleans Saints, to be held on January 1, 2023.

(iii) The seventeenth through the twenty-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of one Eagles Mezzanine Level Ticket Prize. Each Eagles Mezzanine Level Ticket Prize includes two tickets, with \$30 of stadium concession or Pro Shop credit loaded onto each ticket, for the Philadelphia Eagles home game against the Tennessee Titans, to be held on December 4, 2022.

(iv) The twenty-eighth through the seventy-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.

(4) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will have the iLottery Bonus Money credited to their Lottery account and will receive an email notifying them that they won a prize.

(5) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site.

(6) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.

(7) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.

(e) *Prize claim procedures:*

(1) Winners of any prize awarded in the Drawing will be contacted by email by the Pennsylvania Lottery to initiate the prize claim procedure.

(2) Winners will have seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery, pursuant to this section, to claim their prizes. In order to claim their prizes, winners must respond to the Pennsylvania Lottery's email regarding prize claim procedures and must submit a properly completed prize claim form within seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery. Failure to comply with the prize claim requirements as set forth herein, for any reason, shall result in the winner forfeiting their right to receive the prize. An alternate winner will be awarded the respective prize, according to Lottery procedure.

(3) By entering a ticket into the Drawing, the entrant agrees to be bound by these rules, the prize claim requirements set forth herein, and expressly waives any claim against the Pennsylvania Lottery for a prize not awarded in conformance with these rules.

(f) *Drawing restrictions:*

(1) Each winner, their respective heirs, legal representatives, and assigns, agree to indemnify, defend, release, and discharge the Pennsylvania Lottery, Philadelphia Eagles, LLC, Eagles Stadium Operator, LLC, and the NFL, as well as their employees, officers, directors and commissioners from and against any loss, claim, damage, suit, or injury arising out of or relating to this promotion. By entering into the Drawing, the winner indemnifies, releases, discharges, and agrees to hold harmless the Pennsylvania Lottery, Philadelphia Eagles, LLC, Eagles Stadium Operator, LLC, and the NFL, as well as their employees, officers, directors and commissioners from unanticipated cancellation, suspension, or postponement of the promotion due to natural disaster, national emergency, or other unforeseen act of God or man. Winners participate solely at their own risk and responsibility.

(2) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.

(3) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.

(4) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.

(5) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.

(6) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole

judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.

(7) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.

(8) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.

(9) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.

(10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

(11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).

(12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.

Any promotional partner reserves the right to revoke full or partial prize from any winner or winner's guest whom it or venue personnel, or both, may deem, in their sole discretion, to be intoxicated, a safety risk, to have violated any venue policy or law or may bring the promotional partner into disrepute.

(17) The winner is responsible for all costs, expenses and transportation, not specifically included in the prize won in the Drawing, arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(18) Prizes are not redeemable for cash.

(19) If a date is provided for a game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9, the date is subject to change at the sole discretion of the Philadelphia Eagles.

(20) If no date is provided for a game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9, the date will be determined by the Philadelphia Eagles and will be communicated to the winner by either the Philadelphia Eagles or the Lottery.

(21) In the event the winner is not available on the date of the game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9, there will be no extensions or substitutions of prizes and the winner will not receive any reimbursement for the unused prize.

(22) In the event a prize described in section 9 is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

(23) The specific seats to be provided as part of any prize described in section 9 will be determined at the sole discretion of the Philadelphia Eagles.

(24) The food and beverages to be provided as part of any prize described in section 9 will be selected at the sole discretion of the Philadelphia Eagles.

(25) Other restrictions may apply.

10. *Ticket responsibility:*

(a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

(c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

11. *Ticket validation and requirements:*

(a) *Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets.* To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

(1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.

(2) The game ticket must be intact.

(3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

(4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.

(5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

(6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets.* A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

12. *Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:*

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may

be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.

(c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

(d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

13. *Funding for prizes:* Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

14. *Unclaimed prizes:* Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

15. *Purchase and prize restrictions:* A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

16. *Governing law:*

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Eagles lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

17. *Retailer compensation:*

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

18. *Retailer Incentive Programs:* The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Eagles lottery game tickets.

19. *Retailer bonus:* The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

20. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Eagles or through normal communications methods.

21. *Applicability:* This notice applies only to the Eagles lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania High Stakes Lake Fast Play Game 5168

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name:* The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania High Stakes Lake (hereinafter "High Stakes Lake"). The game number is PA-5168.

2. *Definitions:*

(a) *Authorized retailer or retailer:* A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *Game Ticket*: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(d) *HOOK A HUNDRED*: The image of a fishing rod printed at four pre-determined "HOOKED" areas within the "YOUR NUMBERS" area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, increases the prize for a winning match by \$100.

(e) *Lottery Central Computer System*: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(f) *Lottery Terminal*: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.

(g) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(h) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.

(i) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(j) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(k) *REEL IT IN*: When four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" area of a High Stakes Lake lottery game ticket, the player wins the "REEL IT IN" prize shown at the end of "THE STREAM." "REEL IT IN" is played separately.

(l) *WINNING NUMBERS*: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols determine whether a player wins a prize.

(m) *Winning ticket*: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(n) *YOUR NUMBERS*: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. *Price*: The price of a High Stakes Lake ticket is \$10.

4. *Description of the High Stakes Lake Fast Play lottery game*:

(a) The High Stakes Lake lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. High Stakes Lake tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) High Stakes Lake is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to

any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) High Stakes Lake tickets contain a "HOOK A HUNDRED" area. Whenever a matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appears in one of the four "HOOKED" areas, the player increases the prize won by \$100.

(d) High Stakes Lake tickets also contain a "REEL IT IN" area and a "THE STREAM" area. When four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM," the player wins the "REEL IT IN" prize shown at the end of "THE STREAM." "REEL IT IN" is played separately.

(e) Players can win the prizes identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(f) A High Stakes Lake game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(g) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a High Stakes Lake game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(h) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a High Stakes Lake game ticket and select the High Stakes Lake option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. *High Stakes Lake ticket characteristics*:

(a) A High Stakes Lake ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.

(b) *Play Symbols*: Each High Stakes Lake ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area, a "HOOK A HUNDRED" area, a "THE STREAM" area and a "REEL IT IN" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The "REEL IT IN" play symbols, located in "THE STREAM" area, are: Wave symbol, Fish symbol, Turtle symbol, Inner Tube symbol and a Stack of Cash symbol.

(c) *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL), \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN), \$20⁰⁰ (TWENTY), \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY), \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO), \$5,000 (FIV THO) and \$150,000 (ONEFTYTHO). The prize symbols and their captions, located at the end of "THE STREAM" area, are: \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL), \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN), \$20⁰⁰ (TWENTY), \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY), \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN) and \$1,000 (ONE THO).

(d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$10, \$15, \$20, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000,

\$5,000 and \$150,000. High Stakes Lake contains a feature that can increase the prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by \$100. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 7 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to 14 times on a ticket.

(e) *Approximate number of tickets available for the game:* Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the High Stakes Lake lottery game.

6. *Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:*

(a) All High Stakes Lake prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.

(b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$150,000 (ONE FIFTYTHO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150,000.

(c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5,000 (FIV THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears at the end of "THE STREAM," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a "REEL IT IN" prize of \$1,000.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears at the end of "THE STREAM," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a "REEL IT IN" prize of \$500.

(h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(i) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears at the end of "THE STREAM," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a "REEL IT IN" prize of \$200.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon

which the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol is "HOOKED," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol is "HOOKED," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150.

(l) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20⁰⁰ (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol is "HOOKED," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$120.

(m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol is "HOOKED," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$115.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(o) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears at the end of "THE STREAM," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a "REEL IT IN" prize of \$100.

(p) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

(q) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" and a prize symbol of \$50⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears at the end of "THE STREAM," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a "REEL IT IN" prize of \$50.

(r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

(s) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" and a prize symbol of \$30⁰⁰ (THIRTY) appears at the end of "THE STREAM," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a "REEL IT IN" prize of \$30.

(t) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20⁰⁰ (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.

(u) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in "THE STREAM" and a prize symbol of

\$20.⁰⁰ (TWENTY) appears at the end of “THE STREAM,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a “REEL IT IN” prize of \$20.

(v) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(w) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in “THE STREAM” and a prize symbol of \$15.⁰⁰ (FIFTEEN) appears at the end of “THE STREAM,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a “REEL IT IN” prize of \$15.

(x) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(y) Holders of tickets upon which four Stack of Cash symbols appear in “THE STREAM” and a prize symbol of \$10.⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears at the end of “THE STREAM,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a “REEL IT IN” prize of \$10.

7. *Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning:* The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

Prizes, including top prizes, are subject to availability at the time of purchase.

8. *Ticket responsibility:*

(a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

(c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

9. *Ticket validation and requirements:*

(a) *Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets.* To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

(1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.

(2) The game ticket must be intact.

(3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

(4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.

(5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

(6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets.* A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

10. *Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:*

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.

(c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

(d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

11. *Funding for prizes:* Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

12. *Unclaimed prizes:* Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

13. *Purchase and prize restrictions:* A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. *Governing law:*

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the High Stakes Lake Fast Play lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

15. *Retailer compensation:*

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

16. *Retailer Incentive Programs:* The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play High Stakes Lake lottery game tickets.

17. *Retailer bonus:* The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

18. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote High Stakes Lake or through normal communications methods.

19. *Applicability:* This notice applies only to the High Stakes Lake lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania Steelers Fast Play Game 5170

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name:* The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Steelers (hereinafter “Steelers”). The game number is PA-5170.

2. *Definitions:*

(a) *Authorized retailer or retailer:* A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar code:* The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *Game Ticket:* A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player’s record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(d) *DOWN:* A specific, pre-defined portion of the play area, which contains a 1ST DOWN, 2ND DOWN, 3RD DOWN or 4TH DOWN, three “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols, three “Prize” symbols and a “DOWN MULTIPLIER” in a horizontal line that, when matched against the play symbols in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, determines whether a player wins a prize.

(e) *DOWN MULTIPLIER:* The area at the left of each “DOWN” on a Steelers lottery game ticket which contains either a 1X (NOMULT), 2X (2TIMES), 3X (3TIMES) or 4X (4TIMES) multiplier that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player multiplies any prize won in any “DOWN” by the multiplier shown.

(f) *Lottery Central Computer System:* The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(g) *Lottery Terminal:* A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.

(h) *WINALL:* The area at the bottom of a Steelers lottery game ticket containing a Steelers score and a Guest score that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area. “WINALL” prizes are not multiplied.

(i) *Play:* A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(j) *Play Area:* The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.

(k) *Play Symbol:* A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(l) *Prize:* A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(m) *WINNING NUMBERS:* The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(n) *Winning ticket:* A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(o) *YOUR NUMBERS:* The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when

matched against the play symbols in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. *Price:* The price of a Steelers ticket is \$5.

4. *Description of the Steelers Fast Play lottery game:*

(a) The Steelers lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Steelers tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) Steelers is played by matching any of the play symbols in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area to any of the play symbols located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) Steelers tickets contain a “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area. Whenever any of the play symbols located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area match any of the play symbols located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area, the player multiplies any prize won by the multiplier shown for that “DOWN.”

(d) Steelers tickets also contain a “WINALL” area. Whenever the “STEELERS” score is greater than the “GUEST” score, the player wins all 12 prizes shown in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area. “WINALL” prizes are not multiplied.

(e) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(f) A Steelers game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(g) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Steelers game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(h) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Steelers game ticket and select the Steelers option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. *Steelers ticket characteristics:*

(a) A Steelers ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.

(b) *Play Symbols:* Each Steelers ticket play area will contain a “WINNING NUMBERS” area, a “YOUR NUMBERS” area, a “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area and a “WINALL” area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the “WINNING NUMBERS” area and the “YOUR NUMBERS” area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The

multipliers and their captions, located in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area, are: 1X (NOMULT), 2X (2TIMES), 3X (3TIMES) and 4X (4TIMES). The play symbols and their captions, located in the “WINALL” area, are: 00, 02, 03, 07, 10, 12, 14, 15, 18, 20, 21, 24, 27, 28, 30, 31 and 35.

(c) *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the “YOUR NUMBERS” area, are: \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL), \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL), \$15^{.00} (FIFTEEN), \$20^{.00} (TWENTY), \$50^{.00} (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$75,000 (SVYFIVTHO).

(d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$1,000 and \$75,000. Steelers contains a feature that can multiply the prize won. The “WINALL” prizes cannot be multiplied. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 8 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to 12 times on a ticket.

(e) *Approximate number of tickets available for the game*: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Steelers lottery game.

6. *Second-Chance Drawing*: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a Steelers Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Steelers lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9.

7. *Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners*:

(a) All Steelers prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.

(b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$75,000 (SVYFIVTHO) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$75,000.

(c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which the “STEELERS” score is greater than the “GUEST” score in the “WINALL” area, and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in five of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in six of the “Prize” areas and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in one of the “Prize” areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the “Prize” area under the

matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 4X (4TIMES) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(h) Holders of tickets upon which the “STEELERS” score is greater than the “GUEST” score in the “WINALL” area, and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in two of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in two of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in four of the “Prize” areas and a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in four of the “Prize” areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(i) Holders of tickets upon which the “STEELERS” score is greater than the “GUEST” score in the “WINALL” area, and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in six of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$15^{.00} (FIFTEEN) appears in five of the “Prize” areas and a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in one of the “Prize” areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which the “STEELERS” score is greater than the “GUEST” score in the “WINALL” area, and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in five of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in four of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in two of the “Prize” areas and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in one of the “Prize” areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 3X (3TIMES) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150.

(l) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which the “STEELERS” score is greater than the “GUEST” score in the “WINALL” area, and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in two of the “Prize” areas, a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in two of the “Prize” areas and a prize

2X (2TIMES) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(ff) Holders of tickets upon which any of the “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbols match any of the “WINNING NUMBERS” play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in the “Prize” area under the matching “YOUR NUMBERS” play symbol, and upon which a

1X (NOMULT) multiplier appears in the “DOWN MULTIPLIER” area for that “DOWN,” on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

8. *Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning:* The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

9. *Second-Chance Drawing:* The Pennsylvania Lottery's (hereafter, the "Lottery") Steelers Second-Chance Drawing for qualifying Fast Play lottery game tickets (hereafter, the "Drawing").

(a) *Qualifying Tickets:* Non-winning PA-5170 Steelers (\$5) Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Qualifying Tickets") are eligible for entry in the Drawing.

(b) *Participation and entry:*

(1) Entrants must be members of the Pennsylvania Lottery VIP Players Club to participate in the Drawing. To join the VIP Players Club, visit <https://www.palottery.state.pa.us/vipplayersclub/login.aspx>. Becoming a VIP Players Club member is free.

(2) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at <https://www.palottery.com>, or the Lottery's official mobile application during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. No other method of submission will be accepted, and entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.

(3) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be accepted.

(4) Only one claimant per entry is allowed.

(5) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.

(6) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.

(7) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.

(c) *Drawing description:*

(1) The Lottery will conduct one Steelers Second-Chance Drawing for qualifying Fast Play Lottery game tickets. All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.

(2) All entries received after 4:59:59 a.m. August 2, 2022, through 11:59:59 p.m. October 6, 2022, will be entered into the Drawing to be held between October 11, 2022 and October 24, 2022.

(3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at <http://www.palottery.com>.

(4) When a Qualifying Ticket is entered into the Drawing, the entry has a chance to be multiplied by two, three or four (hereafter the "Entry Multiplier Prize"). Each Qualifying Ticket will have a predetermined ticket file assigned at the time the ticket is printed that will determine whether an entry will be multiplied. If an entry is multiplied, the entrant will be notified during the entry process.

(5) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered and the Entry Multiplier Prize, if applicable. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5170 Steelers (\$5) = five entries.

(6) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.

(d) *Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:*

(1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 5, or mentioned anywhere else in these rules.

(3) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(c)2.

(i) The first through the seventeenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of one Regular Season Suite Game Ticket Prize. Each Regular Season Suite Game Ticket Prize includes 2 game tickets and pre-game food and beverages

for the Pittsburgh Steelers home game against the Las Vegas Raiders, to be held on December 24, 2022.

(ii) The eighteenth through the forty-second entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of one VIP Hospitality Pass and Game Ticket Prize. Each VIP Hospitality Pass and Game Ticket Prize includes two Hospitality Party Area passes, 2 game tickets and pre-game food and beverages for the Pittsburgh Steelers home game against the Cleveland Browns, to be held on January 8, 2023.

(iii) The forty-third through the ninety-second entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.

(4) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will have the iLottery Bonus Money credited to their Lottery account and will receive an email notifying them that they won a prize.

(5) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site.

(6) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.

(7) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.

(e) *Prize claim procedures:*

(1) Winners of any prize awarded in the Drawing will be contacted by email by the Pennsylvania Lottery to initiate the prize claim procedure.

(2) Winners will have seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery, pursuant to this section to claim their prizes. In order to claim their prizes, winners must respond to the Pennsylvania Lottery's email regarding prize claim procedure, and must submit a properly completed prize claim form within seven business days from the date they are notified by the Pennsylvania Lottery. Failure to comply with the prize claim requirements as set forth herein, for any reason, shall result in the winner forfeiting their right to receive the prize. An alternate winner will be awarded the respective prize, according to Lottery procedure.

(3) By entering a ticket into the Drawing, the entrant agrees to be bound by these rules, the prize claim requirements set forth herein, and expressly waives any claim against the Pennsylvania Lottery for a prize not awarded in conformance with these rules.

(f) *Drawing restrictions:*

(1) Each winner, their respective heirs, legal representatives, and assigns, agree to indemnify, defend, release, and discharge the Pennsylvania Lottery, Pittsburgh Steelers, LLC, Steelers Stadium Operator, LLC, and the NFL, as well as their employees, officers, directors and commissioners from and against any loss, claim, damage, suit, or injury arising out of or relating to this promotion. By entering into the Drawing, the winner indemnifies, releases, discharges, and agrees to hold harmless the Pennsylvania Lottery, Pittsburgh Steelers, LLC, Steelers Stadium Operator, LLC, and the NFL, as well as their employees, officers, directors and commissioners from unanticipated cancellation, suspension, or postponement of the promotion due to natural disaster, national emer-

gency, or other unforeseen act of God or man. Winners participate solely at their own risk and responsibility.

(2) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.

(3) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.

(4) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.

(5) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.

(6) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.

(7) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.

(8) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.

(9) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.

(10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

(11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).

(12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.

(14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 9(d)(4). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery

Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's Lottery account.

(15) Prizes are not transferrable.

(16) Winners and guests must abide by all venue policies. Any promotional partner reserves the right to revoke full or partial prize from any winner or winner's guest whom it or venue personnel, or both, may deem, in their sole discretion, to be intoxicated, a safety risk, to have violated any venue policy or law or may bring the promotional partner into disrepute.

(17) The winner is responsible for all costs, expenses and transportation, not specifically included in the prize won in the Drawing, arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(18) Prizes are not redeemable for cash.

(19) If a date is provided for a game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9, the date is subject to change at the sole discretion of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

(20) If no date is provided for a game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9, the date will be determined by the Pittsburgh Steelers and will be communicated to the winner by either the Pittsburgh Steelers or the Lottery.

(21) In the event the winner is not available on the date of the game or event that is part of a prize described in section 9, there will be no extensions or substitutions of prizes and the winner will not receive any reimbursement for the unused prize.

(22) In the event a prize described in section 9 is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

(23) The specific seats to be provided as part of any prize described in section 9 will be determined at the sole discretion of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

(24) The food and beverages to be provided as part of any prize described in section 9 will be selected at the sole discretion of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

(25) Other restrictions may apply.

10. *Ticket responsibility:*

(a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

(c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

11. *Ticket validation and requirements:*

(a) *Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets.* To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

(1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.

(2) The game ticket must be intact.

(3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

(4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.

(5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

(6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets.* A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

12. *Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:*

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.

(c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

(d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

13. *Funding for prizes:* Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

14. *Unclaimed prizes:* Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by

the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

15. *Purchase and prize restrictions:* A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

16. *Governing law:*

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Steelers lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

17. *Retailer compensation:*

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

18. *Retailer Incentive Programs:* The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Steelers lottery game tickets.

19. *Retailer bonus:* The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single

installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

20. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Steelers or through normal communications methods.

21. *Applicability:* This notice applies only to the Steelers lottery game announced in this notice.

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the May 21, 2022 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the State Board of Auctioneer Examiners (Board) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Whether the regulation conforms to the intention of the General Assembly in the enactment of the statute upon which the regulation is based.

The Majority and Minority Chairs of the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee submitted a joint letter on this rulemaking. This letter relates to the delayed implementation of Act 41 of 2019 (Act 41) (63 Pa.C.S. § 3111) by this Board and other boards and commissions that fall under the jurisdiction of the Department of State's Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs. The letter describes Act 41 as a "bipartisan effort" and states the "lack of regulatory activity to implement Act 41 has continued to cause a barrier to

employment for applicants of other states" which exacerbates the severe workforce shortage in Pennsylvania. The letter points out that all licensing boards and commissions subject to Act 41 should have published final regulations by February 28, 2021. Finally, the letter asks the Board to prioritize the promulgation of this rulemaking.

As suggested by the four Chairs, we urge the Board to fulfill the intent of Act 41 and the General Assembly by returning a final-form version of this rulemaking to this Commission and the designated standing committees noted above as quickly as possible for review, consideration and final publication as a regulation.

2. Comments, objections, or recommendations of a committee.

The House Professional Licensure Committee (Committee) submitted the following comments on the proposed regulation:

1. *Section 1.27(a)(1)(i)*—This section requires an applicant to submit a copy of the current law and regulations along with scope of practice requirements in the jurisdiction that issued a license, certificate, registration, or permit. Act 41 of 2019 does not explicitly state this requirement and the committee recommends changes that remove this responsibility from the applicants and applies it to Board Counsel.

2. *Section 1.27(a)(4)*—This section states that an applicant must not have any discipline by the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration, or permit. The committee recommends clarifying this section to specify the types of discipline (i.e., formal discipline or complaint) and the timeframe when such discipline occurred.

3. *Section 1.28(b)(1)*—This section would give the Board authority to issue a provisional license for less than a year. It is unclear under what circumstances the Board would need to exercise this authority. The Committee asks for clarification.

4. *Section 1.28(d)*—This section states that the Board will not issue subsequent provisional licenses after the provisional license expires. We believe this section is unintentionally vague. Further, Act 41 of 2019 does not specifically state that the Board shall only issue one provisional license. The Committee believes this section should be amended to correct the unintended harm of limiting provisional licenses and would further suggest incorporating a time frame to re-apply.

Under the RRA, the comments, objections, or recommendations of a Committee is one of the criteria the Commission must consider when determining if a regulation is in the public interest. When this proposed regulation is delivered as a final-form regulation to this Commission and the Committees for review, the issues raised by the Committee, and the Board's response to those issues, will be one of the criteria used by this Commission to determine if the regulation is in the public interest.

3. Section 1.27. Licensure by endorsement.—Need; Economic impact; Protection of the public health safety and welfare; Clarity.

Paragraph (a)(2) of this section requires demonstration of competency by practice in two of the past five years in a “substantially equivalent jurisdiction or jurisdictions.” What standard determines whether a jurisdiction is substantially equivalent? This provision, too, seems to place an additional burden on the applicant and/or the Board to prove equivalency since the experience does not have to be in the jurisdiction that the applicant is using for endorsement and also can be in multiple jurisdictions. Has the Board considered, at least for the jurisdictions in the United States, creating and publishing an annual determination of those jurisdictions which have laws and regulations substantially equivalent to Pennsylvania? We ask the Board to explain how these provisions in the final regulation balance protection of the public health, safety, and welfare with the burden and cost to applicants and the Board.

4. Compliance with provisions of the RRA or the regulations of the commission in promulgating the regulation.

Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF) Question 14 requires the promulgating agency to describe the communications with and solicitation of input from the public, any advisory council/group, small businesses and groups in the development and drafting of the regulation. It also requires the agency to list the specific persons and/or groups that were involved. The Board's response states that it solicited comments from “stakeholders and interested parties” in July of 2020. We ask the Board to provide an updated RAF with the final regulation that includes a list of specific persons and/or groups involved in the development and drafting of the proposal.

As noted by the Committee in its comment on Section 1.27(a)(1)(i), an applicant seeking licensure by endorsement shall provide, among other things, a copy of the current applicable law, regulation, or other rule governing

licensure, certification, registration, or permit requirements and scope of practice in the jurisdiction that issued the applicant's license, certificate, registration, or permit. Under Section 1.27(a)(1)(ii), if the applicable law, regulation, or rule is in a language other than English, the document must be translated, at the applicant's expense, by a professional translation service and verified to be complete and accurate. The Board's response to RAF Question 19 does not provide a specific estimate of the costs to the regulated community for translation of an applicable law, regulation or rule. Also, in response to RAF Questions 17, 19, and 23 regarding the financial impact on or cost to the applicant, the Board does not address the cost of a Criminal History Records Check. We ask the Board, when it submits the final version of this rulemaking, to provide an updated RAF that estimates the costs associated with translation and a Criminal History Records Check.

A disciplinary action has been filed against you. You may lose your license, certificate, registration, permit, authorization or approval to practice your profession or occupation. You may be subject to civil penalties of up to \$10,000 for each violation, and the imposition of costs of investigation.

If you wish to defend against the charges in the Order to Show Cause or to present evidence to mitigate any penalty that may be imposed, the procedures for doing so are explained in the Order to Show Cause.

You have the right to retain an attorney. Although you may represent yourself without an attorney, you are advised to seek the help of an attorney. You also have the right to have an interpreter provided should you request one.

All proceedings are conducted under the Administrative Agency Law and the General Rules of Administrative Practice and Procedure.

You are directed to respond to the charges by filing a written answer within thirty (30) days of the date of publication of this notice. **IF YOU DO NOT FILE AN ANSWER, DISCIPLINARY ACTION MAY BE TAKEN AGAINST YOU WITHOUT A HEARING.** Any answer submitted in this matter must be filed with the Prothonotary for the Department of State via one of the following methods:
