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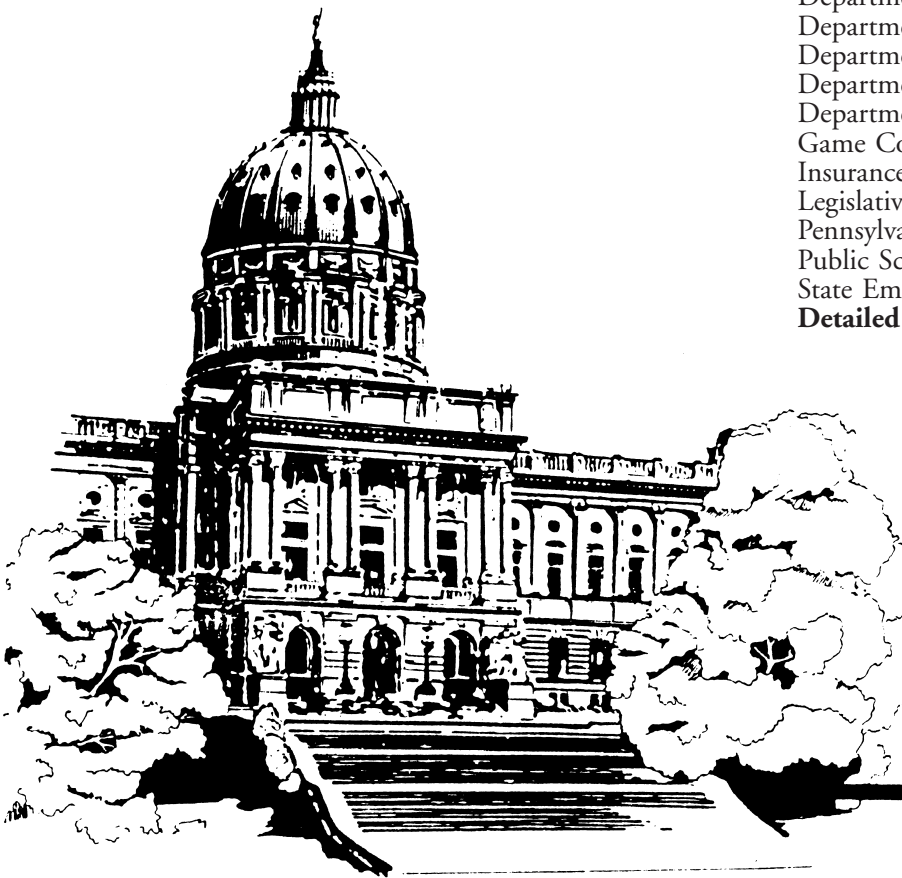

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in **underscored bold face**. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective date of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of 1 Pa.C.S. (relating to prothonotaries to keep files of advance copies of statutes) provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the *Laws of Pennsylvania* are generally available.

Title 231—RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

[231 PA. CODE CH. 1915]

Proposed Adoption of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-3 and Amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-1 and 1915.23

The Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee is considering proposing to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania the adoption of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-3 and the amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-1 and 1915.23 for the reasons set forth in the accompanying publication report. Pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(a)(1), the proposal is being published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* for comments, suggestions, or objections prior to submission to the Supreme Court.

Any report accompanying this proposal was prepared by the Committee to indicate the rationale for the proposed rulemaking. It will neither constitute a part of the rules nor be adopted by the Supreme Court.

Additions to the text of the proposal are bolded and underlined; deletions to the text are bolded and bracketed.

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1915. ACTIONS FOR CUSTODY OF MINOR CHILDREN

(Editor's Note: Rule 1915.11-1 as printed in 231 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Note.")

Rule 1915.11-1. Parenting Coordination.

[If a judicial district implements a parenting coordination program, the court shall maintain a roster of qualified individuals to serve as parenting coordinators and establish the hourly rate at which parenting coordinators shall be compensated. The parenting coordinator shall attempt to resolve issues arising out of the custody order by facilitating

an agreement between the parties and, if unable to reach an agreement, recommend a resolution to the court.

(a) *Appointment of a Parenting Coordinator.*

(1) After a final custody order has been entered, a judge may appoint a parenting coordinator to resolve parenting issues in cases involving repeated or intractable conflict between the parties affecting implementation of the final custody order. A parenting coordinator should not be appointed in every case. The appointment may be made on the motion of a party or the court's motion.

(2) Unless the parties consent and appropriate safety measures are in place to protect the participants, including the parenting coordinator and other third parties, a parenting coordinator shall not be appointed if:

(i) the parties to the custody action have a protection from abuse order in effect;

(ii) the court makes a finding that a party has been the victim of domestic violence perpetrated by a party to the custody action, either during the pendency of the custody action or within 36 months preceding the filing of the custody action; or

(iii) the court makes a finding that a party to the custody action has been the victim of a personal injury crime, as defined in 23 Pa.C.S. § 3103, which was perpetrated by a party to the custody action.

(iv) If a party objects to the appointment of a parenting coordinator based on an allegation that the party has been the victim of domestic violence perpetrated by a party to the custody action, the court shall have a hearing on the issue and may consider abuse occurring beyond the 36 months provided in subdivision (a)(2)(ii).

(3) The appointment of a parenting coordinator shall be for a specified period, which shall not exceed 12 months. A party may petition the court for an extension of the appointment or the court in its discretion may extend the appointment for an additional period.

(4) If the parenting coordinator seeks to withdraw from service in a case, the parenting coordinator shall petition the court and provide a copy of the petition to the parties or the parties' attorneys.

(5) The parenting coordinator shall set forth in a separate written agreement with the parties:

(i) the amount of any retainer;

(ii) the hourly rate to be charged;

(iii) the process for invoices and payment for services;

(iv) information on the parenting coordination process; and

(v) provide a signed copy of the agreement to the parties before initiating any services.

Note: The parenting coordinator shall include in the parties' written agreement the hourly rate established by the judicial district.

(b) Qualifications of the Parenting Coordinator.

(1) A parenting coordinator shall be licensed to practice in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as either an attorney or a mental health professional with a master's degree or higher. At a minimum, the parenting coordinator shall have:

(i) practiced family law for five years or have five years of professional post-degree experience in psychiatry, psychology, counseling, family therapy, or other comparable behavioral or social science field; and

(ii) specialized training by a provider approved or certified by the American Psychological Association, Pennsylvania Psychological Association, American Bar Association, Pennsylvania Bar Association, Pennsylvania Bar Institute, or American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers. The training shall include:

(A) five hours in the parenting coordination process;

(B) ten hours of family mediation;

(C) five hours of training in domestic violence; and

(D) in each two-year period after the initial appointment, ten continuing education credits on any topic related to parenting coordination with a minimum of two hours on domestic violence.

(2) An attorney or a mental health professional seeking an appointment as a parenting coordinator:

(i) shall sign an affidavit attesting that he or she has met the qualifications outlined in (b)(1);

(ii) shall submit the affidavit to the president judge or administrative judge of the judicial district where the parenting coordinator is seeking appointment; and

(iii) after submission of the initial affidavit, a parenting coordinator shall submit a new affidavit every two years attesting that he or she continues to meet the qualifications for a parenting coordinator outlined in (b)(1).

(c) *Appointment Order.* The parenting coordinator's authority as delineated in subdivision (d) shall be included in the order appointing the parenting coordinator, which shall be substantially in the form set forth in Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.22.

(d) *Scope of Authority of the Parenting Coordinator.* The parenting coordinator shall have the authority to recommend resolutions to the court on issues related to the custody order if the parties are unable to reach an agreement.

(1) To implement the custody order and resolve related parenting issues about which the parties cannot agree, the parenting coordinator is authorized to recommend resolutions to the court about issues that include, but are not limited to:

(i) places and conditions for custodial transitions between households;

(ii) temporary variation from the custodial schedule for a special event or particular circumstance;

(iii) school issues, apart from school selection;

(iv) the child(ren)'s participation in recreation, enrichment, and extracurricular activities, including travel;

(v) child-care arrangements;

(vi) clothing, equipment, toys, and personal possessions of the child(ren);

(vii) information exchanges (e.g., school, health, social) between the parties and communication with or about the child(ren);

(viii) coordination of existing or court-ordered services for the child(ren) (e.g., psychological testing, alcohol or drug monitoring/testing, psychotherapy, anger management);

(ix) behavioral management of the child(ren); and

(x) other related custody issues that the parties mutually have agreed in writing to submit to the parenting coordinator, which are not excluded in subdivision (d)(2).

(2) The following issues are excluded from the parenting coordinator's scope of authority:

(i) a change in legal custody as set forth in the custody order;

(ii) a change in primary physical custody as set forth in the custody order;

(iii) except as set forth in subdivision (d)(1)(ii), a change in the court-ordered custody schedule that reduces or expands the child(ren)'s time with a party;

(iv) a change in the residence (relocation) of the child(ren);

(v) determination of financial issues, other than allocation of the parenting coordinator's fees as set forth in subdivision (g)(1);

(vi) major decisions affecting the health, education, or religion of the child(ren); and

(vii) other issues limited by the appointing judge.

(3) Unless the parties consent, the parenting coordinator shall not contact collateral sources or speak with the child(ren) and to effectuate this provision, the parties shall execute releases, as necessary, authorizing the parenting coordinator to communicate with the appropriate individuals. Any communication with the collateral sources or child(ren) shall be limited to the issue(s) currently before the parenting coordinator.

(e) Communications. No Testimony.

(1) Communication between the parties or the parties' attorneys and the parenting coordinator is not confidential.

(2) A party or a party's attorney may communicate in writing with the parenting coordinator, but shall contemporaneously send a copy of the written communication to the other party or the other party's attorney. Documents, recordings, or other material that one party gives to the parenting coordinator shall be promptly made available to the other party or the other party's attorney for inspection and copying.

(3) The parties and their attorneys may receive, but not initiate, oral *ex parte* communication with the parenting coordinator. A parenting coordinator may initiate oral communication with a party or party's attorney, but shall promptly advise the other party or the other party's attorney of the communication.

(4) Communication between the parenting coordinator and the court shall be in writing and copies of the written communication shall be sent contemporaneously to the parties or the parties' attorneys.

(5) A party cannot compel the testimony of a parenting coordinator without an order of court.

(f) *Recommendations. Objecting to the Recommendation. Judicial Review. Record Hearing.*

(1) The parenting coordinator shall provide to the parties notice and an opportunity to be heard on the issues.

(2) The parenting coordinator's recommendation shall be in writing on the Summary and Recommendation of the Parenting Coordinator form set forth in Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.23 and sent to the court for review within two days after hearing from the parties on the issues. The parenting coordinator shall serve a copy of the Summary and Recommendation on the parties or the parties' attorneys.

(3) A party objecting to the recommendation shall file a petition for a record hearing before the court within five days of service of the Summary and Recommendation of the Parenting Coordinator form. The petition must specifically state the issues to be reviewed and include a demand for a record hearing. A copy of the recommendation shall be attached to the petition. In accordance with Pa.R.C.P. No. 440, the objecting party shall serve the petition on the other party or the other party's attorney and the parenting coordinator.

(4) If the parties do not file an objection within five days of service of the parenting coordinator's recommendation, the court shall:

- (i) approve the recommendation;
- (ii) approve the recommendation in part and conduct a record hearing on issues not approved;
- (iii) remand the recommendation to the parenting coordinator for more specific information; or
- (iv) not approve the recommendation and conduct a record hearing on the issues.

(5) As soon as practical, the court shall conduct a record hearing on the issues specifically set forth in the petition. The court shall render a decision within the time set forth in Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.4(d).

(6) If a party makes a timely objection, the recommendation shall become an interim order of court pending further disposition by the court.

(g) *Fees.*

(1) The appointing judge shall allocate between the parties the fees of the parenting coordinator. The parenting coordinator may reallocate the fees, subject to the approval of the court, if one party has caused a disproportionate need for the services of the parenting coordinator.

(2) To limit the financial burden on the parties, a parenting coordinator should meet with the parties only upon a request of a party to resolve an issue about which the parties disagree.

(3) *Waiver of fees or reduced fees.* Judicial districts implementing a parenting coordination program shall effectuate a policy or program by local rule so that indigent or low-income parties may

participate in the parenting coordination program at a reduced fee or no fee.]

(The following text is entirely new.)

(*Editor's Note:* The following text is proposed to be added and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

(a) *Parenting Coordination Program.*

(1) If a judicial district implements a parenting coordination program, the court shall:

- (i) maintain a roster of qualified individuals to serve as parenting coordinators; and
- (ii) establish the hourly rate at which parenting coordinators shall be compensated.

(2) The parenting coordinator shall:

- (i) attempt to resolve issues arising out of the custody order by facilitating an agreement between the parties; and
- (ii) if unable to reach an agreement, recommend a resolution to the court.

(b) *Parenting Coordinator Appointment.*

(1) *Appointment.* After a final custody order has been entered, a judge may appoint a parenting coordinator to resolve parenting issues in cases involving repeated or intractable conflict between the parties, that affects the implementation of the final custody order.

- (i) A parenting coordinator should not be appointed in every case.
- (ii) The appointment may be made on the motion of a party or the court's motion.

(2) *Domestic Violence Exception.* In matters that involve domestic violence, a hearing shall be held to determine if the appointment of a parenting coordinator is appropriate.

(i) Domestic violence matters include the following:

- (a) the parties to the action have a protection from abuse order in effect;
- (b) the court finds that a party has been the victim of domestic violence perpetrated by a party to the action, either during the pendency of the action or within 36 months preceding the filing of the action; or
- (c) the court finds that a party to the action has been the victim of a personal injury crime, as defined in 23 Pa.C.S. § 3103, which was perpetrated by a party to the action.

(ii) In the hearing, the court may consider abuse occurring beyond the 36 months provided in subdivision (b)(2)(i).

(iii) Safety measures shall be in place to protect the parties, parenting coordinator, and third parties if a parenting coordinator is appointed in these matters.

(3) *Duration of Appointment.*

- (i) The appointment of a parenting coordinator shall be for a specified period, which shall not exceed 12 months.
- (ii) A party may petition the court for an extension of the appointment or the court in its discretion may extend the appointment for an additional period.

(4) *Withdraw.* If the parenting coordinator seeks to withdraw from service in a case, the parenting coordinator shall petition the court and provide a copy of the petition to the parties or the parties' attorneys.

(5) *Written Agreement.* The parenting coordinator shall set forth in a separate written agreement with the parties:

- (i) the amount of any retainer;
- (ii) the hourly rate to be charged;
- (iii) the process for invoices and payment for services;
- (iv) information on the parenting coordination process; and
- (v) provide a signed copy of the agreement to the parties before initiating any services.

(c) *Parenting Coordinator Qualifications.*

(1) A parenting coordinator shall be licensed to practice in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as either an attorney or a mental health professional with a master's degree or higher.

(2) At a minimum, the parenting coordinator shall have:

(i) practiced family law for five years or have five years of professional post-degree experience in psychiatry, psychology, counseling, family therapy, or other comparable behavioral or social science field; and

(ii) specialized training by a provider approved or certified by the American Psychological Association, Pennsylvania Psychological Association, American Bar Association, Pennsylvania Bar Association, Pennsylvania Bar Institute, or American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers. The training shall include:

- (A) five hours in the parenting coordination process;
- (B) ten hours of family mediation;
- (C) five hours of training in domestic violence; and

(D) in each two-year period after the initial appointment, ten continuing education credits on any topic related to parenting coordination with a minimum of two hours on domestic violence.

(3) An attorney or a mental health professional seeking an appointment as a parenting coordinator:

(i) shall sign an affidavit attesting that he or she has met the qualifications outlined in subdivisions (c)(1) and (c)(2);

(ii) shall submit the affidavit to the president judge or administrative judge of the judicial district where the parenting coordinator is seeking appointment; and

(iii) after submission of the initial affidavit, a parenting coordinator shall submit a new affidavit every two years attesting that he or she continues to meet the qualifications for a parenting coordinator outlined in subdivision (c)(1) and (c)(2).

(d) *Appointment Order.* The parenting coordinator's authority as delineated in subdivision (e) shall be included in the order appointing the parenting coordinator, which shall be substantially in the form set forth in Rule 1915.22.

(e) *Scope of Authority of the Parenting Coordinator.* If the parties are unable to reach an agreement, the parenting coordinator shall have the authority to recommend resolutions to the court on issues related to the custody order.

(1) *Issues Included.* To implement the custody order and resolve related parenting issues about which the parties cannot agree, the parenting coordinator is autho-

rized to recommend resolutions to the court about issues that include, but are not limited to:

- (i) places and conditions for custodial transitions between households;
- (ii) temporary variation from the custodial schedule for a special event or particular circumstance;
- (iii) school issues, apart from school selection;
- (iv) the child's participation in recreation, enrichment, and extracurricular activities, including travel;
- (v) child-care arrangements;
- (vi) clothing, equipment, toys, and the child's personal possessions;
- (vii) information exchanges (e.g., school, health, social) between the parties and communication with or about the child;

(viii) coordination of existing or court-ordered services for the child (e.g., psychological testing, alcohol or drug monitoring/testing, psychotherapy, anger management);

(ix) the child's behavioral management; and

(x) other related custody issues that the parties mutually have agreed in writing to submit to the parenting coordinator, which are not excluded in subdivision (e)(2).

(2) *Excluded Issues.* The following issues are excluded from the parenting coordinator's scope of authority:

(i) a change in legal custody as set forth in the custody order;

(ii) a change in primary physical custody as set forth in the custody order;

(iii) except as set forth in subdivision (e)(1)(ii), a change in the court-ordered custody schedule that reduces or expands the child's time with a party;

(iv) a change in the child's residence (relocation);

(v) determination of financial issues, other than allocation of the parenting coordinator's fees as set forth in subdivision (h)(1);

(vi) major decisions affecting the child's health, education, or religion; and

(vii) other issues limited by the appointing judge.

(3) *Collateral Sources.*

(i) Unless the parties consent, the parenting coordinator shall not contact collateral sources or speak with the child.

(ii) To effectuate subdivision (e)(3)(i), the parties shall execute releases, as necessary, authorizing the parenting coordinator to communicate with the appropriate individuals.

(iii) Any communication with the collateral sources or child shall be limited to the issue currently before the parenting coordinator.

(f) *Communications. No Testimony.*

(1) Communication between the parties or the parties' attorneys and the parenting coordinator is not confidential.

(2) *Written Communication.*

(i) A party or a party's attorney may communicate in writing with the parenting coordinator.

(ii) Contemporaneously with communications with the parenting coordinator as provided in subdivision (f)(2)(i),

the party shall send a copy of the written communication to the other party or the other party’s attorney.

(3) Documents, recordings, or other material that a party gives to the parenting coordinator shall be promptly made available to the other party or the other party’s attorney for inspection and copying.

(4) *Oral Communication.*

(i) The parties and their attorneys may receive, but not initiate, oral *ex parte* communication with the parenting coordinator.

(ii) A parenting coordinator may initiate oral communication with a party or party’s attorney but shall promptly advise the other party or the other party’s attorney of the communication.

(5) Communication between the parenting coordinator and the court shall be in writing and copies of the written communication shall be sent contemporaneously to the parties or the parties’ attorneys.

(6) A party cannot compel the testimony of a parenting coordinator without an order of court.

(g) *Recommendations. Objecting to the Recommendation. Judicial Review. Record Hearing.*

(1) The parenting coordinator shall provide to the parties notice and an opportunity to be heard on the issues.

(2) The parenting coordinator’s recommendation shall be in writing on the Summary and Recommendation of the Parenting Coordinator form, which shall be substantially in the form set forth in Rule 1915.23.

(i) The parenting coordinator shall send the recommendation to the court for review within two days after hearing from the parties on the issues.

(ii) The parenting coordinator shall serve a copy of the recommendation on the parties or the parties’ attorneys, concurrently with sending the recommendation to the court.

(iii) The parenting coordinator’s recommendation shall be binding on the parties pending the court’s disposition pursuant to subdivisions (3) or (4) below.

(3) A party objecting to the recommendation shall file a petition for a record hearing before the court within five days of service of the recommendation.

(i) The petition must specifically state the issues to be reviewed and include a demand for a record hearing. A copy of the recommendation shall be attached to the petition.

(ii) In accordance with Rule 440, the objecting party shall serve the petition on the other party or the other party’s attorney and the parenting coordinator.

(iii) As soon as practical, the court shall conduct a record hearing on the issues specifically set forth in the petition.

(4) If the parties do not file an objection within five days of service of the parenting coordinator’s recommendation, the court shall:

(i) approve the recommendation;

(ii) approve the recommendation in part and conduct a record hearing on issues not approved;

(iii) remand the recommendation to the parenting coordinator for more specific information; or

(iv) not approve the recommendation and conduct a record hearing on the issues.

(5) The court shall render a decision within the time set forth in Rule 1915.4.

(6) The court’s decision shall be served on the parties and the parenting coordinator.

(h) *Fees.*

(1) *Allocation.*

(i) The appointing judge shall allocate between the parties the fees of the parenting coordinator.

(ii) The parenting coordinator may reallocate the fees, subject to the approval of the court, if one party has caused a disproportionate need for the services of the parenting coordinator.

(2) *Limitation.* To limit the financial burden on the parties, a parenting coordinator should meet with the parties only upon a request of a party to resolve an issue about which the parties disagree.

(3) *Enforcement.* If one or both parties fail to pay according to the parenting coordinator’s agreement, the parenting coordinator may file a recommendation with the court to order the parties to pay.

(4) *Waiver of Fees or Reduced Fees.* Judicial districts implementing a parenting coordination program shall effectuate a policy or program by local rule so that indigent or low-income parties may participate in the parenting coordination program at a reduced fee or no fee.

Comment:

The parenting coordinator shall include in the parties’ written agreement the hourly rate established by the judicial district.

(Editor’s Note: The following rule is proposed to be added and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

Rule 1915.11-3. Certification of Parenting Coordination Program.

(a) *Implementation.* Each judicial district may determine if they are implementing a parenting coordination program.

(b) *Certification.* The president judge or the administrative judge of the Family Division of each judicial district shall certify if they have established a parenting coordination program. The certification shall be filed with the Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee, and shall be substantially in the following form:

PUBLICATION REPORT

The Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee (Committee) proposes the adoption of Pennsylvania Rule of Civil Procedure 1915.11-3 and the amendment of Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure 1915.11-1 and 1915.23. These rules pertain to parenting coordination.

The Committee received a written request to publicly provide a list of all counties that have adopted local rules related to parenting coordination. It was suggested that this will assist attorneys, particularly those who have multiple county practices in advising their clients on the availability of parenting coordination. To address this request, the Committee proposes Rule 1915.11-3, which requires certification by counties that have implemented parenting coordination procedures. This approach is similar to the requirement that counties certify their conference procedures in support, custody, and divorce. *See* Pa.R.Civ.P. 1910.10, 1915.4-1, and 1920.55-1.

The Committee was also requested to amend Rule 1915.11-1. Initially, the Committee proposes that the rule be re-structured stylistically for ease of reading and reference.

It was suggested that the current requirement of consent from both parties in matters that involve domestic violence creates the opportunity for the abuser to further control the victim by withholding consent to parenting coordination, and therefore requiring more costly litigation, rather than resolving issues through the parenting coordinator. After discussing the complexities of this issue, the Committee proposes that subdivision (b)(2) of the rule be amended to remove the consent provision and to require that the court hold a hearing before appointing parenting coordinators in all matters that involve domestic violence. This would allow the court to determine the appropriateness of parenting coordination and ascertain if appropriate safety measures are possible.

The Committee also considered methods for parenting coordinators to enforce payment of their fees. In the absence of a provision related to the enforcement of their fee agreement, the parenting coordinator cannot enforce the agreement except by reaching out directly to the judge who assigned the case to them. To address this issue, the Committee proposes that the rule be amended in subdivision (h)(3) to permit, if one or both parties fail to pay according to the parenting coordination agreement, the parenting coordinator to file a recommendation with the court requiring the parties to pay before seeking to withdraw from the case.

An additional proposal is to add language to subdivision (g)(2)(iii) to confirm that the parenting coordinator's recommendation is binding pending the disposition by the court even if objections are not filed. This is the current practice; however, it is not specifically stated in the rule.

Some parties or courts may interpret this omission as the parenting coordinator's recommendation having no effect until the court approves it.

The Committee also proposes that language be added to subdivision (g)(6) stating that the court will serve the parenting coordinator with decisions regarding recommendations. Currently, there is no such requirement which may result in the parenting coordinator not being aware of the terms of the final order.

Finally, the Committee received a request to amend the form in Rule 1915.23 to include a recitation of the parties' agreement if one is reached. Currently, there is no uniform method for parenting coordinators to submit agreements to the court. The Committee believes revising this form will allow parenting coordinators to record the parties' agreement quickly and efficiently. The revision may also assist the court to have a record of the agreement for purposes of enforcement and context in any subsequent modification or special relief hearings.

The Committee invites comments, concerns, and suggestions regarding this rulemaking proposal.

Order Amending Rule of Civil Procedure No. 4019(g)(1)(c); Administrative Order No. 61

Order of Court

And Now, this 27th day of June 2023, Bucks County Rule of Civil Procedure No. 4019(g)(1)(c), promulgated by Administrative Order No. 61, is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

Rule 4019(g)(1)(c). Discovery Motions Court.

(1) In lieu of the procedure set forth in B.C.R.C.P. No. 4019(g)(1)(a), counsel in any civil action, excluding Family Court matters, may present any motion regarding discovery in Discovery Motions Court. The motion must comply with the requirements of Pa.R.C.P. No. 208.2, but need not include the alternative language set forth in B.C.R.C.P. No. 4019(g)(1)(a) in its proposed order.

Note: All actions filed in the Criminal and Orphans' Court divisions are specifically excluded from the procedures set forth by the rule. For the purpose of this rule, "Family Court matters" are actions before the Domestic Relations Section [actions for Support (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1910.1 et seq.)] and family court matters such as actions pursuant to the Protection from Abuse Act (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1901 et seq.), actions for Custody (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.1 et seq.), and actions for Divorce (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1920.1 et seq.).

(2) Discovery Motions Court shall be held each Friday morning at 9:30 a.m. Discovery motions may be presented to the motions judge only after a copy of the motion and the proposed order of court have been served on all counsel of record and any unrepresented party not later than the Friday preceding the intended date of presentation.

Note: Motions shall be filed in the Prothonotary's office immediately prior to presentation. Counsel shall appear in the designated courtroom no later than 9:00 a.m. to check in with Court Administration staff.

(3) Notice of the date, time and place of presentation must accompany the copy of the motion and the proposed order of court. Service may be made in any manner as authorized by the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure, including facsimile transmission pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. No. 440(a)(1)(ii) and/or e-mail pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. No. 205.4(g)(1), with service of the required documents to be completed no later than the Friday preceding the date of presentation. Motions seeking sanctions in the form of dismissal of an action or any claim therein, or for a financial penalty levied against a party, must be served upon the party as well as upon his or her counsel.

(4) The presenting party must attach to the motion a certification of compliance with this rule setting forth the date on which the motion was served on counsel, unrepresented parties, and represented parties against whom sanctions are sought, the manner of service, and that such service was made in compliance with the Rule of Civil Procedure under which it was effected.

(5) Prior to serving a motion and proposed order of court, the parties have an obligation to make a good faith

effort to resolve their discovery dispute. At least one writing evidencing such a good faith effort shall be sent by the movant to the respondent prior to filing a motion pursuant to this rule. The motion shall further specifically identify what good faith efforts were made in an attempt to resolve the discovery dispute without court action, and shall include as attachments:

a. copies of any and all writings sent to respondent(s) which evidence good faith efforts to resolve the dispute; and

b. an affidavit pursuant to B.C.R.C.P. No. 208.2(e).

EXPLANATORY COMMENT: The purpose of this rule is to foster the use of Discovery Motions Court practice. At the hearing, the Motions Court Judge may in the judge's discretion determine that the matter is too complex to handle during Motions Court and refer the matter to the judge assigned to the said case. Sufficient notice and receipt of the motion or petition and proposed order of court is required by law and fundamental fairness. Counsel desiring to take advantage of Discovery Motions Court practice must be diligent in complying with the notice requirement.

This Order shall become effective 30 days from the date of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

STATEMENTS OF POLICY

Title 55—HUMAN SERVICES

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

[55 PA. CODE CH. 1101]

Rescission of the Statement of Policy—Clarifying the Term “Within a Provider’s Office”

This statement of policy applies to all providers enrolled in the Medical Assistance (MA) Program.

Purpose

The purpose of this statement of policy is to delete the statement of policy in § 1101.51a (relating to clarification of the term “within a provider’s office”—statement of policy), which clarified the term “within a provider’s office” under § 1101.51(c)(3) (relating to ongoing responsibilities of providers).

Background

Section 1407(a)(2) of the Human Services Code (code) (62 P.S. § 1407(a)(2)) provides that it is unlawful to:

Solicit or receive or to offer or pay any remuneration, including any kickback, bribe or rebate, directly or indirectly, in cash or in kind from or to any person in connection with the furnishing of services or merchandise for which payment may be in whole or in part under the medical assistance program or in connection with referring an individual to a person for the furnishing or arranging for the furnishing of any services or merchandise for which payment may be made in whole or in part under the medical assistance program.

The Department of Human Services (Department) promulgated the regulation under § 1101.51(c)(3) to provide specific examples of the types of arrangements that section 1407(a)(2) of the code prohibits. Among the examples is that providers may not “lease or rent space, shelves or equipment within a provider’s office to another provider or allowing the placement of paid or unpaid staff of another provider in a provider’s office.”

As advancements in the healthcare industry continued to support integrated care, the Department determined that a narrow interpretation of § 1101.51(c)(3) is more restrictive than required to comply with the code and prevented co-locating providers who are otherwise eligible from enrolling in the MA Program. The Department published the “clarification of [the term] ‘within a provider’s office’” statement of policy at 46 Pa.B. 2683 (May 28, 2016), which was then codified at § 1101.51a.

The Department subsequently promulgated the Interrelationship of Providers final-form rulemaking, which was

published at 53 Pa.B. 376 (January 14, 2023). That final-form rulemaking deleted the language under § 1101.51(c), which previously prohibited co-located providers from enrolling in the MA Program.

Discussion

As a result of the promulgation of the Interrelationship of Providers final-form rulemaking, which deleted § 1101.51(c)(3), the Department is deleting the corresponding statement of policy under § 1101.51a.

This deletion does not invalidate other rules affecting co-locating providers if, for example, they are prohibited by licensing or certification requirements from leasing or renting space, shelves or equipment or otherwise shared space.

Providers must continue to comply with any other applicable law, including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (Pub.L. No. 104-191), Federal and State anti-kickback and self-referral laws, and the requirement to provide MA beneficiaries with freedom of choice.

Effective Date

This statement of policy is effective immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Board; Grant Solicitation and Application Procedures for Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act Funding

1. *Introduction.* The Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program Board (Board) annually, or more frequently as the availability of fund permits, solicits applications for grants to conduct promotion, marketing and research projects to increase the quality, profitability, production and sale of wines, enhance the wine industry and benefit wine producers of this Commonwealth. The Board was established by the Department of Agriculture (Department) under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4501—4513 (relating to Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act) (ACMA). Its composition, funding and duties were subsequently expanded by section 488.1 of the Liquor Code (47 P.S. § 4-488.1). The Board makes recommendations for the awarding of grants by the Liquor Control Board from funds provided through the Liquor Code (47 P.S. §§ 1-101—10-1001) for Liquor Control Board Act 39 of 2016 funding. This notice establishes the procedures by which grant applications will be solicited, reviewed and grants awarded. The purpose of this solicitation is to procure proposals to complete an economic impact study regarding the wine industry within this Commonwealth for 2023.

2. *Solicitation.* The Board will be accepting grant applications for the purposes, in the form and grant according to the schedule set forth herein for not less than 30 days beginning on the date of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Additional publication and dissemination of this notice shall be made and may include direct dissemination to qualified entities that perform this type of work. The maximum award available is \$40,000.

3. *Process overview.* The Board will employ the review process described as follows.

a. The Department will receive proposals and disseminate them to the Board for review. The Board will meet on Tuesday, August 29, 2023, at 10 a.m. and score the proposals to determine to whom they will award the funds. Within 3 days of this decision the Department will communicate the results to all who submitted proposals.

4. *Application deadline.* Applicants should submit a Project Proposal and Grant Application, in the form set forth in paragraph 5 of this notice, to the Board by 4 p.m. on Friday, August 18, 2023. Proposals should be sent electronically as a PDF file, to RA-AGCommodities@pa.gov. The file should not exceed 5MB.

5. *Format of the project proposal and grant application.* Failure to follow this format could result in rejection of the proposal. Applicants may submit up to three one-page letters of support which do not count toward the page limit. The project proposal and grant application cannot exceed ten pages total for project and budget narratives, plus one additional page for the budget table and shall be formatted as follows:

a. A cover page, titled Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program—Project Proposal and Grant Application, providing: the title of the proposed project; the full legal name and street address of the applicant; the

name, address, telephone number and e-mail address of the applicant's principal contact person for matters relating to the application; the name, title, address, telephone number and e-mail address of the individual authorized to contractually bind the applicant to the grant agreement; and the total maximum grant amount sought for the proposed project or program.

b. Addendum, titled Demonstrated Qualifications, should be attached as a maximum three-page addendum which does not count toward the page limit of the proposal.

i. Describe how previous industry market research has been employed by the industries in this Commonwealth or other states;

ii. List any reports or projects presented at meetings in this Commonwealth, other states or countries.

c. Section 1, titled Project Narrative, explaining or identifying methods for measuring and reporting data; details of the proposed project, including a timeline, statement of expected impact of data, staffing for the project, and objectives and methodologies; and whether, how and to what anticipated extent, the proposed report can be leveraged to impact quality, profitability, production and sale of wines, enhance the wine industry and benefit wine producers of this Commonwealth.

d. Section 2, titled Data Points of Economic Impact Report. At minimum, the report must cover all data points from the 2018 economic impact report and should explore any new recommended areas by the applicant. Applicants can download the 2018 report at https://pennsylvaniawine.com/wp-content/uploads/2020/02/PWA_EconomicImpact-FNL.pdf. The report must capture how this Commonwealth ranks in the industry Nationally.

e. Section 3, titled Evaluation and Reporting, in this section individuals should describe in detail the approach to methodology and include a narrative describing data collection to inform the outcome measures. This section must be clear and unambiguous as it will inform expectations of progress reports and the final report.

f. Section 4, titled Budget, presenting a detailed budget for the proposed project or program, including any other matching funds and the value of any noncash resources that will be included in the project.

For all applications, each and every item of direct expense to be incurred in the project shall be separately set forth, including all purchases of consumable or non-consumable goods or equipment, listing the disposition of all nonconsumable goods or equipment upon completion of the project; all travel by dates, purpose, destination, mode of transportation and rate; a full breakdown of other costs, if any, and the method used to calculate those costs. See also paragraph 12.

i. *Personnel*—Includes employed personnel. Those employed elsewhere should be listed as subcontractors or consultants in the contractual cost category. Provide details of all personnel by name devoted to the project, their professional qualifications, the amount of time calculated by hours and the tasks to be performed by each of the named personnel.

ii. *Fringe benefits*—Provide the rate of fringe benefits for each project participant's salary. Identify the total for all funded fringe benefits.

iii. *Travel*—Calculate the costs for travel by considering destinations, number of trips, days traveling, transportation costs, estimated lodging and meal costs and estimated mileage rate.

iv. *Supplies*—This could be anything from office supplies and software to education or field supplies.

v. *Contractual*—If contractual work will be involved with carrying out the work of the project, identify the total contractual expenses. When determining the total cost for this category, include the fees for the professional services, travel costs, lodging expenses, indirect costs as provided in paragraph 12 and any other related contractual expenses.

vi. *Other*—This category includes fees for conferences or meetings, facility and equipment rental costs, lodging and meal expenses, communication costs, speaker fees, publication costs and data collection.

g. Section 5, titled Budget Narrative, providing details of how individuals arrived at the estimated expenses in the budget and describing how each expense will lead to the success of the project.

h. Section 6, titled Industry Participation, addressing the extent of support, participation and data that will be derived directly from the Commonwealth's wine industry, including wineries, associations, organizations or agencies, or both, with an interest in the project outcome. Letters or written confirmation of that support, or participation should be included in this section.

6. *Scoring of applications*. The Board will evaluate each complete and timely-filed project proposal and grant application it receives, which shall include a 100-point scale assessing:

a. Up to 20 points for research methodology including data retrieval.

b. Up to 40 points for previous experience or demonstrated expertise.

c. Up to 20 points for overall project evaluation.

d. Up to 20 points for plan to garner support and participation from the industry.

7. *Evaluation and awards*. The Board reserves the right to request modifications or clarifications, or both, of project proposals and grant applications, including but not limited to additional detail of purpose, reduced or modified budgets, and the like. Upon completion of evaluations, the Board will prepare a record identifying each complete and timely-filed project proposal and grant application received and the numerical score assigned to each.

8. *Term of grants*. Grant agreements will become effective on the date of the last required signature affixed to the contract. The contract shall have a term of no longer than 12 months, except in cases where a nocost extension is requested and agreed to in accordance with paragraph 11.

9. *Progress report*. Progress reports are to include the deliverables from paragraph 5.d. A progress report must be delivered by e-mail to RA-AGCommodities@pa.gov no later than six months from the execution of the contract. The Board may request subsequent progress reports prior to the conclusion of the project. Final reports should be submitted within 60 days of contract end date. Failure to meet these deadlines constitutes a breach of the grant agreement, will result in non-payment of invoices and could jeopardize future grant awards.

10. *Grant agreement*. After the Secretary of Agriculture (Secretary) approves a grant application and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant will execute a written or electronic grant agreement which establishes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made. The grant agreement will not be effective, and work should not begin, until all required signatures have been applied to the grant agreement. The grant agreement will contain and conform to the requirements of this notice and will also contain special terms and conditions as required by the Secretary. Among the terms of the grant agreement will be a requirement that the grant recipient provide the Department full and complete access to all records relating to the performance of the project and submit such information as the Department may require. Applicants who wish to view the full terms and conditions of the grant agreement in advance of submitting an application may contact the Department at the e-mail address set forth in Section 13. Applicants who are unable to agree to the terms and conditions should not submit an application.

11. *No-cost extensions and budget adjustments*. Requests for contract modifications must be received no later than 60 days prior to the end of the agreement.

12. *Cost-reimbursement grant and indirect costs cap*. Grants made hereunder do not require the applicant to secure or to devote a matching sum to the project. Payment of grant funds will occur on a reimbursement basis only. Grant awards may include an allowance for indirect costs of up to 10%. In the case of graduate student participation, reasonable stipends will be allowed and tuition will not be allowed.

Program Requirements for the Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program

The Department of Agriculture (Department) hereby provides notice of the standards and requirements for the Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program (Program).

The Program is established under authority of 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 10702—10705 (relating to Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program), referred to as the Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program Act (act). The Program allows the Department to award reimbursement grants for certain eligible projects to improve urban agricultural infrastructure in an urban area, improve or facilitate the aggregation of agricultural products in an urban area, entail the sharing of resources among urban agricultural entities or community organizations and support community development in the project area.

This notice establishes the procedures by which grant applications will be solicited, reviewed and by which grants will be awarded, drawing on funding available in

Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-2024. The Department intends to make no less than \$500,000 available for grants under the Program.

1. *Program Objective.* The Program's objective is to provide grants to reimburse some portion of the costs of implementing projects that improve agriculture infrastructure in urban areas and that focus on aggregation of agricultural products, sharing of resources and support for community development resources.

2. *Definitions.* The following words and phrases apply to the Program:

Department. The Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth

Eligible project. A project that the Department determines does one or more of the following:

a. Improves agricultural infrastructure in an urban area.

b. Improves or facilitates the aggregation of agricultural products in an urban area.

c. Entails the sharing of resources among urban agricultural operations, agricultural producers or community organizations.

d. Supports community or economic development in the project area.

Person. An individual, partnership, association, firm, corporation, cooperatives or any other legal entity.

Program. The Urban Agricultural Infrastructure Grant Program.

Secretary. The Secretary of the Department.

Urban municipality. A municipality with a population density equal to or greater than 291 persons per square mile and a total population equal to or greater than 2,500, or a municipality in which more than 50% of the population lives in an urbanized area, as defined by the United States Census Bureau. A listing of urban municipalities can be found on the Center for Rural Pennsylvania's list of municipalities, currently found at <https://www.rural.pa.gov/download.cfm?file=Resources/PDFs/data/List%20of%20Municipalities%20web%202022.xlsx>.

3. *Reimbursement Grant Program.* Program grants shall be reimbursement grants. The following shall apply:

a. The amount of a grant is based on actual eligible costs submitted by an approved applicant for an approved project.

b. Grant money shall not exceed 85% of the costs of an eligible project.

c. Grant money shall not be used to reimburse any portion of an in-kind contribution to an eligible project.

d. Grant money may not be used to pay or reimburse wages or salaries of grant recipient staff.

e. Grant money may not be used to reimburse any portion of the project costs which are being paid or reimbursed under another Federal or State grant program.

f. A single applicant may not be awarded more than \$100,000 in grants in any 5-year period, calculated from the date the Department awards the grant.

g. Grants will only be offered to the extent that funding is made available to the Department. In the event funding is exhausted or otherwise unavailable, the Department will be under no obligation to provide grants. Grant money may be prorated or offered as a percentage

of actual costs, as determined by the Department, and set forth in an order by the Secretary, to spread available money to a larger number of eligible applicants.

4. *Eligibility.* A person may apply to the Department for a grant for an eligible project in an urban municipality under the Program.

5. *Grant Types.* An applicant for a grant under the Program shall specify whether the applicant seeks a Microgrant or a Collaboration Grant.

a. A Microgrant shall be awarded for one-time project or to a single entity applicant. The maximum amount of a Microgrant shall be the lesser of \$2,500 or 85% of project costs.

b. A Collaboration Grant shall be awarded for an eligible project (as defined in paragraph No. 2) for which a Microgrant is not sought. An application for a Collaboration Grant may be submitted by multiple partners on a single project. The maximum amount of a Collaborative shall be the lesser of \$50,000 or 85% of project costs.

6. *Application Procedure.*

a. *Online Applications Only.* An applicant for a grant under the Program shall be submitted through the Commonwealth's Single Application for Assistance online application system at www.esa.dced.state.pa.us.

b. *Application Window.* Applications must be submitted through the Single Application for Assistance online application system between 8 a.m. on Monday, July 17, 2023, and 5 p.m. on Friday, September 1, 2023. Applications received outside of that application window will not be considered or reviewed.

c. *Application Requirements.* An application for a grant under the Program shall contain the following information:

i. The applicant's name, business address and contact information.

ii. A statement as to whether the applicant seeks a Microgrant or a Collaboration Grant.

iii. The details of the project for which reimbursement grant money is sought, including the following:

A. A project budget.

B. A statement of the maximum amount of grant money sought for the project.

C. A project construction and implementation schedule.

D. A narrative identifying each entity that will assist in, participate in and benefit from the project.

iv. Separate descriptions of how the project would meet one or more of the following statutory requirements:

A. Improve agricultural infrastructure in an urban area.

B. Improve or facilitates the aggregation of agricultural products in an urban area.

C. Entail the sharing of resources among urban agricultural operations, agricultural producers or community organizations.

D. Support community or economic development in the project area.

v. An attestation signed by the applicant, verifying the accuracy of the information presented on the application.

7. *Disposition and Review of Grant Applications.* The Department will review each application, and supporting documentation submitted therewith, for completeness and

accuracy. If an application is found to be incomplete or inaccurate, the Department may request additional documentation and may discontinue further processing of the application until the requested information is received.

8. *Grant Agreement.* After the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant shall execute a written or electronic grant agreement which establishes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made. The grant agreement will not be effective, and work should not begin, until all required signatures have been applied to the grant agreement. The grant agreement will contain and conform to the requirements of this notice and will also contain special terms and conditions as required by the Secretary. Among the terms of the grant agreement will be a requirement that the grant recipient provide the Department full and complete access to the records relating to the performance of the project and submit the information as the Department may require. Applicants who wish to view the full terms and conditions of the grant agreement in advance of submitting an application may contact the Department at the phone number or e-mail address set forth in section 10. Applicants who are unable to agree to the terms and conditions should not submit an application.

9. *Distribution of Grant Money.* As Program grants are reimbursement grants, the Department will not issue grant money until the successful applicant submits all of the following to the Department:

- a. A verified statement that the eligible project has been completed or implemented.
- b. A verified statement of the project completion date.
- c. Photos of the completed or implemented project with a narrative explanation of each photo.
- d. Bills and invoices demonstrating that expenses were incurred for which reimbursement grant funds are sought.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of August 2023

The Department of Banking and Securities (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P.L. 13, No. 6) (41 P.S. § 301), determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of August 2023, is 6 1/2%.

The interest rate limitations under the Commonwealth's usury statute were pre-empted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub.L. No. 96-221). Further pre-emption was instituted with the signing of Pub.L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board or the United States Treasury, or both. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 3.89 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 6.39 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 6 1/2%.

Box 8457, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8457, 717-787-3483. Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30-days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. The appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure are also available in Braille or on audiotape from the Secretary of the Board at 717-787-3483. This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create a right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decision law.

For individuals who wish to challenge actions, appeals must reach the Board within 30-days. A lawyer is not needed to file an appeal with the Board.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Pennsylvania Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act ("HSCA") proposes to enter into a Prospective Purchaser Agreement ("PPA") with 960 Rittenhouse Road Associates LLC ("Purchaser"), 338 Sun Valley Drive, Ambler, PA 19002. The property at issue is located in Lower Providence Township, Montgomery County.

Purchaser intends to purchase real property located at 960 Rittenhouse Road (the 960 Property) for commercial or industrial purposes, which will result in beneficial reuse of the 960 Property. The 960 Property is located within the Commodore Semiconductor Superfund Site ("the Site"). This site was added to the United States Environmental Protection Agency ("USEPA")'s National Priorities List in October 1989. USEPA divided the Site into three Operable Units for purposes of cleanup. Operable Unit 3 consists of the 960 Property.

In 2013, offsite investigations were performed at the 960 Property to better define upgradient contamination. The results indicated a localized volatile organic compound ("VOC") source not associated with what was previously understood by USEPA to be the source of

contamination at the Site. Previous testing and studies at the 960 Property have identified the presence of VOCs in soil and groundwater, as well as the presence of certain metals in soil.

As part of its responsibility under HSCA, the Department has incurred and will continue to incur response costs with respect to the Commodore Site and/or 960 Property, authorized and recoverable under Section 507 of HSCA, 35 P.S. § 6020.507. The Department has determined that, upon acquisition of the 960 Property, Purchaser could become a potentially responsible person within the meaning of Section 701(a) of HSCA for the releases or threatened releases of hazardous substances or contaminants at the Site and/or the 960 Property. Purchaser has represented to the Department that it has not caused, contributed to, or is not otherwise liable under environmental law for the Existing Contamination at the Site or at or from the 960 Property. Existing Contamination includes any and all releases or threats of releases of hazardous substances and contaminants identified and addressed or intended to be addressed at the Site as of the effective date of the PPA. In accordance with the proposed PPA, Purchaser intends to complete a removal action consisting of excavation and offsite disposal of soil contaminated with VOCs at the 960 Property. The Purchaser will also record an environmental covenant on the deed of the 960 Property. Purchaser desires, through the PPA, to resolve any potential liability it may have upon purchase of the 960 Property.

The Department has reserved the right to withdraw its consent to the PPA if comments submitted during the public comment period disclose facts or considerations which indicate, in the Department's discretion, that the PPA is inappropriate or not in the public's interest.

Draft National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System General Permit for Discharges from Small Flow Treatment Facilities (PAG-04)

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is announcing the availability of a draft National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit for Discharges from Small Flow Treatment Facilities (SFTF) (PAG-04). The draft General Permit and related documents are available online in the Department's eLibrary at www.depgreenport.state.pa.us/elibrary/ (select "Permit and Authorization Packages," then "Clean Water," then "DRAFT—PAG-04 NPDES General Permit for Discharges from Small Flow Treatment Facilities Comments due December 5, 2022 3800-PM-BCW0093").

The PAG-04 General Permit is intended to provide NPDES permit coverage to existing or proposed SFTFs. SFTFs are treatment works designed to adequately treat sewage flows of not greater than 2,000 gallons per day for final disposal to surface waters. The General Permit may not be used to cover other types of treatment facilities including those that process industrial wastes.

A draft PAG-04 General Permit was published at 52 Pa.B. 6933 (November 5, 2022) for a 30-day public comment period. The Department has made additional changes to the draft General Permit and is publishing the

redrafted General Permit for an additional public comment period. Upon final issuance of the General Permit, the Department will provide responses to all public comments received on the initial draft General Permit and the redrafted General Permit. The additional proposed changes to the General Permit are:

- The Department proposes that, under 25 Pa. Code § 92a.23(c) (relating to NOI for coverage under an NPDES general permit), a Notice of Intent (NOI) will not be required for existing permittees to remain covered under the reissued General Permit. This determination was based on the expected nature of SFTF discharges and the level of treatment required and performed by these systems. The determination was also based on the expected minimal volume of discharges, the low potential for toxic or conventional pollutants in the discharges and other methods of identifying discharges covered under this permit.
- An NOI fee will only be required with submission of an NOI. An annual installment payment of the NOI fee will not be required.

Written Comments: Interested persons are invited to submit written comments regarding the redrafted PAG-04 General Permit and associated documents through Monday, August 14, 2023. Commentators are encouraged to submit comments using the Department’s online eCom-

ment system at www.ahs.dep.pa.gov/eComment. Written comments can also be submitted by e-mail to ecomment@pa.gov or by mail to the Department of Environmental Protection, Policy Office, Rachel Carson State Office Building, P.O. Box 2063, Harrisburg, PA 17105-2063. Comments, including comments submitted by e-mail, must include the commentator’s name and address. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

Written comments submitted during the 30-day comment period will be retained by the Department and considered in finalizing the General Permit. Designated Exceptional Durable Medical Equipment; Correction

An error occurred in the document published at 53 Pa.B. 3481 (July 1, 2023). An incorrect e-mail address was inadvertently published. The following notice replaces the version published at 53 Pa.B. 3481 in its entirety.

In accordance with the Department of Human Services' (Department) currently approved State Plan, the Department is required to publish an annual list of exceptional Durable Medical Equipment (DME) by notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in July of each year for nursing facilities Statewide. Interested persons may petition the Department to consider additions to the exceptional DME list by submitting a written request to the Department. Requests received on or before December 31 will be considered in developing the list for the following July.

During calendar year 2022, the Department received no written requests to add or remove items of DME from the list of exceptional DME. Therefore, this notice makes no changes in either the acquisition cost or the list of qualifying DME.

"Exceptional DME" is defined as DME that has an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more and is either Specially Adapted DME or other DME that is designated as exceptional DME by the Department annually by notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

"Specially Adapted DME" is DME that is uniquely constructed or substantially adapted or modified in accordance with the written orders of a physician for the particular use of one resident, making its contemporaneous use by another resident unsuitable.

The list of exceptional DME that has been designated by the Department is as follows:

(1) *Air fluidized beds*. The pressure relief provided by this therapy uses a high rate of airflow to fluidize fine particulate material (for example, beads or sand) to produce a support medium that has characteristics similar to liquid. It may have a Gore-Tex cover.

(2) *Powered air flotation bed (low air loss therapy)*. A semi-electric or total electric bed with a fully integrated powered pressure-reducing mattress, which is characterized by all of the following:

(a) An air pump or blower with a series of interconnected woven fabric air pillows which provides sequential inflation and deflation of the air cells or a low interface pressure throughout the mattress allowing some air to escape through the support surface to the resident. It may have a Gore-Tex cover.

(b) Inflated cell height of the air cells through which air is being circulated is 5 inches or greater.

(c) Height of the air chambers, proximity of the air chambers to one another, frequency of air cycling (for alternating pressure mattresses) and air pressure provide adequate patient lift, reducing pressure and prevent bottoming out.

(d) A surface designed to reduce friction and shear.

(e) May be placed directly on a hospital bed frame.

(f) Automatically readjusts inflation pressures with change in position of bed (for example, head elevation).

(3) *Augmentative communication devices*. Used by residents who are unable to use natural oral speech as a

primary means of communication. The specific device requested must be appropriate for use by the resident and the resident must demonstrate the abilities or potential abilities to use the device selected. Portable devices need to supplement, aid or serve as an alternative to natural speech for residents with severe expressive communication disorders. Nonportable devices may be covered only if required for visual enhancement or physical access needs that cannot be accommodated by a portable device.

(4) *Ventilators (and related supplies).*

(a) Used by residents 21 years of age and older who require full ventilator support for a minimum of 8 hours per day to sustain life.

(b) Used by residents 20 years of age and younger who require ventilator support to sustain life (no minimum time requirement).

Disproportionate Share Payments and Supplemental Payments to Qualifying Hospitals

The Department of Human Services (Department) is providing final notice of its funding allocation for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 for several classes of inpatient disproportionate share hospital and supplemental payments to Medical Assistance (MA) enrolled, qualifying inpatient acute care general hospitals. The Department is not otherwise changing the qualifying criteria or payment methodology for these payments.

The Department published notice of its intent to allocate funding for these payments at 53 Pa.B. 1021 (February 18, 2023). The Department increased the funding allocation for one payment that was announced in its notice of intent. Supplemental payments to qualifying acute care general hospitals that treat a high percentage of MA patients under 18 years of age were increased to

an allocation of \$61.249 million in total funds. This revised funding allocation appeared on the State Plan page submitted to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services and approved on April 14, 2023.

The Department received no comments during the 30-day comment period. The Department will implement the total payment set forth in the notice of intent and as previously noted.

Fiscal Impact

The FY 2022-2023 impact, as a result of the funding allocation for these payments, is \$118.281 million in total funds.

(p) Holders of tickets upon which a Fingers Crossed (WINPRZ) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under that Fingers Crossed (WINPRZ) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(q) Holders of tickets upon which a prize symbol of \$10⁰⁰ (TEN DOL) appears in "LUCKY SPOT 1" and "LUCKY SPOT 2" within the "FEELING 10X LUCKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

11. *Unclaimed prize money:* For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Feeling Lucky, prize money from winning Feeling Lucky instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Feeling Lucky instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

12. *Governing law:* In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

13. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be

disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Feeling Lucky or through normal communications methods.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 819.203 (relating to notice of instant game rules), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following instant lottery game:

1. *Name:* The name of the game is Pennsylvania Watts of Cash ("Watts of Cash"). The game number is PA-1648.

2. *Price:* The price of a Watts of Cash instant lottery game ticket is \$5.

3. *Play symbols:* Each Watts of Cash instant lottery game ticket will contain one play area, which includes two "ON BULB" spots, and a "BULB BONUS" area. The "ON BULB" spots can win a prize in two ways, as described in section 7 (relating to determination of prize winners). The “BULB BONUS” area prizes that can be won in the two “ON BULB” spots, are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$50, \$75, \$100, \$200 and \$500. A player can win up to 14 times on a ticket. Watts of Cash contains a feature that can multiply certain prizes. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 8 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate odds).

6. *Approximate number of tickets printed for the game:* Approximately 10,800,000 tickets will be printed for the Watts of Cash instant lottery game.

7. *Determination of prize winners:*

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles

the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

11. *Unclaimed prize money:* For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Watts of Cash, prize money from winning Watts of Cash instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Watts of Cash instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize

money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

12. *Governing law:* In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

13. *Termination of the game:* The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Watts of Cash or through normal communications methods.

Election for the Office of Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County

On June 16, 2023, the Secretary of the Commonwealth (Secretary) received written notice that Judge Rayford A. Means has revoked his declaration of candidacy for retention as a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County. Under the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth, an election for the judicial office held by Judge Means will occur as part of the Municipal Election to be held November 7, 2023.

In the Municipal Election, the electors of Philadelphia County will now elect 11 Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County. Each elector will be entitled to vote for up to 11 candidates, with the 11 candidates receiving the largest number of valid votes being elected.

In the Municipal Primary held May 16, 2023, the electors of the Democratic Party nominated ten candidates for the office of Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County. No Republican candidates appeared on the ballot in the Republican Municipal Primary. Now, due to Judge Means' retention revocation, by law, each of the certified Statewide political parties of the Commonwealth—the Democratic Party, the Republican Party and the Libertarian Party—will be permitted to nominate one additional candidate for Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County by submitting to the Secretary, no later than September 18, 2023, a nomination certificate in the form prescribed by law and prepared in accordance with the applicable rules of the political party. See 25 P.S. §§ 2938.3, 2953 and 2954. Political bodies will be permitted to nominate a candidate by filing with the Secretary, no later than September 18, 2023, nomination papers prepared and submitted in accordance with the requirements of the Pennsylvania Election Code (25 P.S. §§ 2600—3591).

Chronic Wasting Disease—Designation of Disease Management Areas and Endemic States and Canadian Provinces Order # 13

Executive Order

Whereas, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is an infectious and progressive neurological disease that is found in, and always proves fatal to, members of the family Cervidae (deer, elk or moose, and other susceptible species, collectively called cervids); and

Whereas, There are no known treatments for CWD infection, no vaccines to protect against CWD infection, and no approved tests that can detect the presence of CWD in live cervids; and

Whereas, CWD is designated as a “dangerous transmissible disease” of animals by order of the Secretary of Agriculture under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d) (relating to dangerous transmissible diseases); and

Whereas, The Game and Wildlife Code (Code) (34 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder (58 Pa. Code §§ 131.1 et seq.) collectively provide broad authority to the PGC to regulate activities relating to the protection, preservation, and management of game and wildlife, including cervids; and

Whereas, On March 28, 2017 (effective May 16, 2017), the Commission added 58 Pa. Code § 137.35 (relating to Chronic Wasting Disease Restrictions) to give more permanent status and structure to the CWD requirements and restrictions previously established and maintained over the prior decade by and through executive orders; and

Whereas, Section 137.35(d) provides the Executive Director with the authority to designate CWD Disease Management Areas (DMAs) and Established Areas (EAs) within this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, Previous executive orders concerning designation of CWD DMAs and EAs within this Commonwealth were issued by the Commission on June 1, 2017, July 24, 2017, October 6, 2017, February 16, 2018, May 21, 2018, October 22, 2018, June 17, 2019, June 2, 2020, May 28, 2021, October 21, 2021, April 5, 2022, and August 18, 2022; and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that further designations of CWD DMAs and EAs are required to implement necessary updates to the Commission's CWD program.

Now Therefore, I, BRYAN J. BURHANS, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder, do hereby order and direct the following:

1. DMAs within this Commonwealth are designated as set forth below. These DMAs are more graphically illustrated on the maps titled “DMA 2,” “DMA 3,” “DMA 4,” “DMA 5,” “DMA 6,” “DMA 7,” “DMA 8” and “DMA OVERVIEW” attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundaries and maps of DMA 2, DMA 3, DMA 4, DMA 5, DMA 6, DMA 7, DMA 8 and DMA OVERVIEW, the written descriptions shall prevail.

a. *DMA 1:* Eliminated.

b. *DMA 2:* Adams, Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Centre, Clearfield, Cumberland, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon,

Indiana, Juniata, Mifflin, Perry, Snyder, Somerset, Union, Westmoreland, and York counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of Taneytown Road (State Highway 134) and the Maryland State Line, proceed north on State Highway 134 for approximately 4 miles to US Highway 15. Follow US Highway 15 north for 36.4 miles to the intersection where State Route 581 becomes US-11. Continue north on US Highway 11 for 2.4 miles to the point it meets the west shore of the Susquehanna River at Front Street in Wormleysburg. Follow the Susquehanna River north for approximately 62.6 miles to the river bridge (State Highway 45) in Lewisburg. Continue west on State Highway 45 for approximately 45.6 miles to State Highway 144 in Old Fort. Continue south on State Highway 144 for approximately 3.8 miles to US Highway 322 in Potters Mills. Proceed west on US 322 for approximately 17 miles, merging onto Interstate 99 and continuing west along Interstate 99 for approximately 7.2 miles to Exit 62 and returning to US Highway 322. Continue west on US 322 for another 10.9 miles to State Highway 504 in Philipsburg. Proceed west on State Highway 504 and follow 0.6 miles to State Highway 53. Continue west on State Highway 53 for 9.5 miles to State Route 153 in Houtzdale. Proceed south on State Route 153 for 5.9 miles to State Highway 253 (Viola Pike). Follow State Highway 253 south for 8.6 miles to State Highway 53 in Van Ormer. Continue south on State Highway 53 for 1.7 miles to Marina Road. Continue west on Marina Road for 5.5 miles where the road becomes Glendale Lake Road. Continue west on Glendale Lake Road for 3 miles State Highway 36. Follow State Highway 36 west for .5 miles into the town of Patton. Continue north on State Highway 36 for 3.5 miles to Bridge Street. Continue west on Bridge Street for 1.6 miles to Spangler Street. Follow Spangler Street south for .9 miles to Municipal Road (SR 4016). Proceed north on Municipal Road for 3.6 miles west to US Highway 219 (Crawford Avenue) in Northern Cambria. Follow US Highway 219 south for 1.3 miles to State Highway 271. Follow State Highway 271 south for 2.8 miles to State Highway 553 near Nicktown. Follow State Highway 553 west for 6.9 miles to State Highway 403 near Heilwood. Continue south on State Highway 403 for 15.8 miles to US Highway 22. Follow US Highway 22 west for 14 miles to State Highway 217 South in Blairsville. Continue south on State Highway 217 for 12.5 miles to US Highway 30. Follow US Highway 30 east for 21.3 miles to US Highway 219. Proceed south along State Highway 219 for 32.6 miles to the Maryland border. Finally, continue east along the Maryland border 100.05 miles to Taneytown Road (State Highway 134) at the place of beginning.

c. *DMA3*: Armstrong, Cambria, Clarion, Clearfield, Elk, Indiana, and Jefferson counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of Campbells Mill Road and US Highway 119 in the town of Black Lick, proceed north on US Highway 119 for 5.3 miles to State Highway 56. Follow State Highway 56 east for 5.5 miles to State Highway 259. Continue north on State Highway 259 for 5.4 miles to US Highway 422. Follow US Highway 422 west for 3.4 miles to State Highway 553. Follow State Highway 553 east for 1.9 miles to Spaulding Road. Continue north on Spaulding Road for 3 miles to State Highway 403. Follow State Highway 403 north for 2.2 miles to State Highway 286. Continue east on State Highway 286 for 4.9 miles to State Highway 240. Follow State Highway 240 east for 8.5 miles to US Highway 219. Follow US Highway 219 north for 2.4 miles to Sylvis Road. Follow Sylvis Road east for 5.8 miles to State Highway 36. Follow State

Highway 36 east for 8.8 miles to La Jose Road (SR-3016) in Newburg. Follow La Jose Road east for 3.6 miles becoming Cherry Corner Road (SR-3005) for another .3 mile to Marron Road (SR-3016). Proceed northeast on Marron Road for 2.7 miles to State Road 729. Follow State Road 729 north for .9 miles to Old Station Road. Follow Old Station Road (SR-2012) east for 2.4 miles to Douglas Road (SR-3007). Continue east on Douglas Road for .3 miles to Zion Road (SR-2012) near New Millport. Follow Zion Road east for 4.5 miles to Faunce Road (SR-2012). Follow Faunce Road east for 3.1 miles becoming Sanborn Road (SR-2012). Continue east on Sanborn Road for 2.5 miles to State Highway 153. Follow State Highway 153 north for 5 miles to Valley Road (SR-2027). Follow Valley Road north for 2.1 miles becoming Hogback Hill Road (SR-2027). Continue north on Hogback Hill Road for 1 mile to Main Street in Mineral Springs. Continue east on Main Street for .2 miles to Bigler Cutoff Road. Follow Bigler Cutoff Road north for .1 miles to US Highway 322. Proceed east on US Highway 322 for .7 miles to State Highway 970. Follow State Highway 970 north for 1.5 miles to Interstate Highway 80. Follow I-80 west for 26.4 miles to State Highway 219. Follow State Highway 219 north for 21.2 miles to Boot Jack becoming State Route 948. Follow State Route 948 for 4.2 miles to the Clarion River in Ridgway. Follow the Clarion River west for 28.3 miles to Bridge Road. Continue south on Bridge Road for 0.05 mile to State Highway 949. Follow Pine Creek south for 0.9 miles to East Branch Octoraro Creek. Continue south on East Branch Octoraro Creek for 18.2 miles to Octoraro Creek. Follow Octoraro Creek south along the Chester/Lancaster County border for 13.1 miles to the intersection with the Maryland border. Continue west along the Maryland border for 4.7 miles to the shoreline of the Susquehanna River. Proceed north along the Susquehanna River shorelines for 26.0 miles to a point abeam State Route 999. Continue east on State Route 999 for 7.0 miles to State Route 741 (Rohrerstown Road). Follow State Route 741 (Rohrerstown Road) north for 3.6 miles to U.S. Route 30 (Lincoln Highway). h. *DMA 8*: Dauphin, Lebanon, Northumberland, and Schuylkill Counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of Interstate 81 and US Highway 22, proceed west on Interstate 81 for 2.1 miles to the west shore of the Susquehanna River. Follow the west shore of the Susquehanna River north for 48.8 miles to State Route 147 in Shamokin Dam. Continue east on State Route 147 for 0.47 mile to State Route 61. Follow State Route 61 east for 2.6 miles to State Route 890. Continue southeast on State Route 890 for 9.0 miles to State Route 225. Continue east on State Route 225 for 6.2 miles to State Route 61. Follow State Route 61 southeast for 0.3 mile to State Route 125. Continue south on State Route 125 for 21 miles to Interstate 81. Follow Clement Avenue west for 2.4 miles where Clement Avenue becomes State Route 443. Continue west on State Route 443 for 17.7 miles to US Highway 22. Follow US Highway 22 south for 3.6 miles to Interstate 81 at the place of beginning.

2. Established areas within this Commonwealth are designated as set forth below. The sole EA is more graphically illustrated on the map titled "DMA 2" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundary and map of "DMA 2", the written descriptions shall prevail.

a. *Established Area in DMA 2*: Bedford, Blair, Franklin, Fulton, and Huntingdon counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of State Highway 75 (Fort Loudon Road) and the Maryland State Line near Kasiesville, proceed north on State Highway 75 (Fort Loudon Road) for 13.9 miles to US Highway 30. Follow US Highway 30 west for 7.8 miles to US Highway 522 just north of McConnellsburg. Continue north on US Highway 522 for 37.5 miles to US Highway 22. Follow US 22 west for 42.4 miles to Old Route 22 in Duncansville. Continue west on Old Route 22 for 2.0 miles to Valley Forge Road. Follow Valley Forge Road south for 3.4 miles to the Poplar Run Road. Continue southeast on Poplar Run Road for 0.5 mile to Knob Run Road. Follow Knob Run Road southwest for 4.3 miles where the road becomes Knob Road. Continue south on Knob Road for 3.4 miles to the Bedford/Blair County Line, where the road becomes Blue Knob Road. Follow Blue Knob Road south for approximately 1.0 mile to State Forrest Road in Blue Knob State Park. Follow State Forrest Road south for 3.5 miles where the road becomes Pavia Road. Continue south on Pavia Road for 0.25 miles to State Highway 869. Follow State Highway 869 south for 3.4 miles to State

Highway 96. Continue south on State Highway 96 south for 14.4 miles to US Highway 30 in Schellsburg. Follow US Highway 30 east 4.75 miles to State Highway 31. Follow State Highway 31 southwest for 3.4 miles to State Highway 96 in Manns Choice. Continue south on State Highway 96 for 22.25 miles to the Maryland border. Finally, follow along Maryland border east for 47.1 miles to State Route 75 at place of beginning.

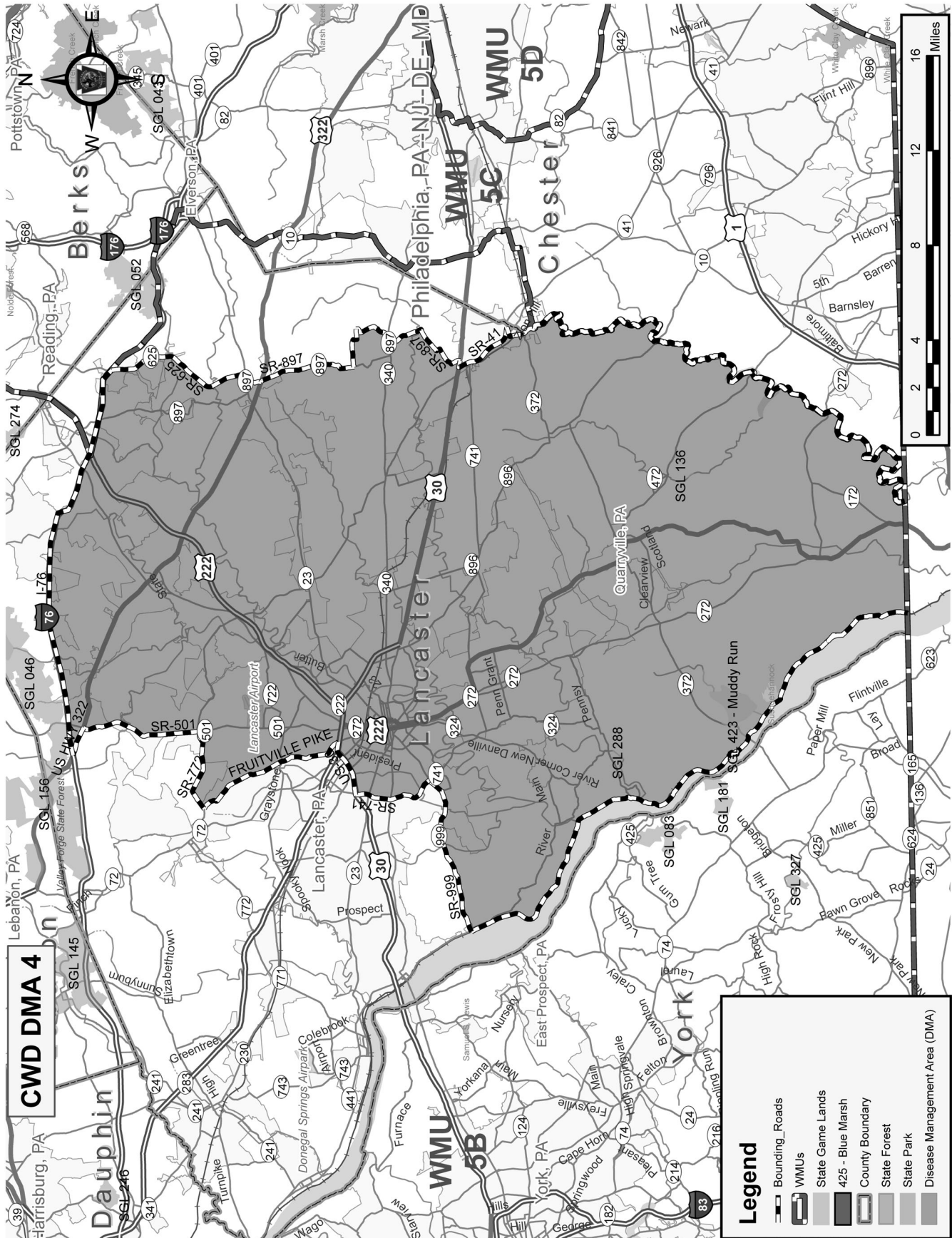

Pennsylvania Compensation Rating Bureau; Workers' Compensation Loss Cost Filing

On June 23, 2023, the Insurance Department received from the Pennsylvania Compensation Rating Bureau (Bureau) a filing to revise its experience rating plan for workers' compensation insurance. The filing was made in accordance with section 709(c)(1)(iv) of the Workers' Compensation Act (77 P.S. § 1035.9(c)(1)(iv)).

The filing proposes an April 1, 2024, effective date for both new and renewal business and includes revisions to the following:

- The eligibility criteria, which, if approved, will result in more employers qualifying for the experience rating plan.

- Various parameters used in the experience rating plan including the re-introduction of variable split points, which vary by the size of the employer, and function as a per accident maximum limit for the actual primary losses used in the experience rating plan's algorithm.

- The annual caps that apply to changes to an individual employer's experience rating modifier (E-Mod):

○ Currently, there are two mechanisms that cap an employer's E-Mod: 1) a $\pm 25\%$ cap that applies to the annual change in an employer's E-Mod; and 2) a secondary "cap" that sets an employer's E-Mod at 1.000 if it would have been less than 1.000 if not for the application of the -25% cap. These caps are being eliminated, although they will continue to apply through a "transition period" until March 31, 2026.

○ Replacing the previously-mentioned existing caps are: 1) A formula-based maximum E-Mod that will vary based on the expected losses of an individual employer (meaning that smaller employers will generally have lower maximum E-Mod). This new cap will begin to apply on April 1, 2024, in conjunction with the current capping rules; and 2) A $+40\%$ cap that applies to the annual change in an employer's E-Mod. This new cap will begin to apply on April 1, 2026, after the transition period ends.

Investigation into Conservation Service Provider and Other Third-Party Access to Electric Distribution Company Customer Data; Doc. No. M-2021-3029018

On April 16, 2019, Enerwise Global Technologies, LLC, d/b/a CPower (Enerwise) applied to become a licensed electric generation supplier (EGS) within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, at Docket No. A-2019-3009271. In its application, Enerwise acknowledged that it would not provide electric marketing services within the Commonwealth. Enerwise stated that it applied for an EGS license solely for the purpose of obtaining access to EDC data systems on behalf of its customers. This access would allow Enerwise to verify customer performance in demand response programs and assist the customers in analyzing their electricity usage and capabilities.

Prior to entry of the Final Order on Enerwise's application, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) entered a Tentative Order.¹ Through the Tentative Order, the Commission, among other things, requested comments regarding Enerwise's application for it, as a CSP, to obtain customer usage information electronically from EDC data systems.²

By Final Order entered October 7, 2021,³ the Commission denied Enerwise's application, determining that voluntary licensing of a conservation service provider (CSP) as an EGS is not permitted under the Code. The Final Order also directed the Commission's Office of Competitive Market Oversight (OCMO), Law Bureau and Bureau of Technical Utility Services (TUS) to initiate a new proceeding to determine if a safe, acceptable path exists for registered CSPs and other third parties to gain access to customer data electronically from EDC data systems, with customer consent, as permitted under Section 2807(f) of the Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 2807(f).⁴

In response to the comments and reply comments received and the Commission's directive in the Final Order, the Commission initiated a new proceeding at Docket No. M-2021-3029018 to determine whether a secure method could be found to allow third parties to

access EDC customer data. Accordingly, on February 8, 2022, the Commission issued a Secretarial Letter with a list of questions regarding CSP and other third-party access to EDC customer data.

On August 4, 2022, the Commission approved a Petition by Metropolitan Edison Company, Pennsylvania Electric Company, Pennsylvania Power Company, and West Penn Power Company (collectively FirstEnergy) at Docket No. P-2021-3030012, et al., for approval of the Default Service Plan (DSP) from 6/1/23 through 5/31/27. The FirstEnergy DSPs include a third-party data access tariff that (1) establishes a registration process for CSPs to obtain electronic access to FirstEnergy customer data and (2) imposes continuing obligations on registered third parties to ensure the confidentiality of customer data.⁵

On September 6, 2022, the Commission issued a second Secretarial Letter at Docket No. M-2021-302918 with a list of follow up questions regarding the First Energy third-party data access tariff.

A potential path for third-party access has been shown through the approval of FirstEnergy's DSP proceeding and related tariff. An EDC can voluntarily file a limited non-EGS third-party data access tariff and, upon Commission approval of that tariff, can grant non EGS third parties' access to its data systems under the conditions established in the approved tariff. Therefore, this proceeding at Docket No. M-2021-3029018 is closed.
