

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Per Curiam

And Now, this 11th day of September, 2023, the proposal having been published for public comment at 49 Pa.B. 1645 (April 6, 2019), it is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that:

- (a) Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration 5101—5105 are adopted in the attached form.
- (b) Local rules of judicial administration deemed necessary to comply with Pa.R.J.A. 5101—5105 shall be promulgated pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(c) to be effective no later than April 1, 2024.
- (c) Existing local rules of judicial administration governing the custody of exhibits shall be reviewed by the President Judge or his or her designee for compliance with Pa.R.J.A. 5101—5105. An amendment to an existing local rule of judicial administration governing custody of exhibits deemed necessary shall be promulgated pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(c) to be effective no later than April 1, 2024.

This Order shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b), and shall be effective April 1, 2024.

Annex A

TITLE 201. RULES OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

CHAPTER 51. CUSTODY OF EXHIBITS IN COURT PROCEEDINGS

The following text is entirely new.

(*Editor's Note*: The following rules are new and are printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

Rule 5101. Definitions.

- (a) The following words and phrases when used in these rules shall have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, or the particular word or phrase is expressly defined in the chapter in which the particular rule is included:
- (1) "Court Proceeding." Any trial, hearing, argument or similar event before a judge, panel, or hearing officer where evidence, if entered, is on the record. It does not include a proceeding before a magisterial district court, a non-record proceeding before the Philadelphia Municipal Court, a judicial arbitration matter pursuant to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1301 et seq., a hearing before a register of wills pursuant to Pa.R.O.C.P. 10.3, or any matter that is not a record proceeding;
- (2) "Custodian." The person or persons designated by local rule of judicial administration to safeguard and maintain exhibits offered into evidence in a court proceeding. The custodian shall either be a member of court staff,

- e.g., court reporter, clerk of court, hearing officer, or the proponent of the exhibit. Custodian shall also include the custodian's designee;
- (3) "Exhibit." A document, record, object, photograph, model, or similar item offered into evidence, whether or not admitted, in a court proceeding;
- (4) "Judicial District." A geographic area established by the General Assembly of Pennsylvania in which a court of common pleas is located;
- (5) "Local Rule." A local rule of judicial administration, however titled, adopted by a judicial district pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(c) or an Internal Operating Procedure adopted by an appellate court;
- (6) "Proponent." A party seeking the admission of an exhibit into the record in a court proceeding; and
- (7) "Records office." The entity with the responsibility and function to maintain and retain the official case file and list of docket entries as required by rule or law.
- (b) For any words and phrases not defined by these rules, a meaning may be discerned through examination of its dictionary definition and its legal meaning may be gleaned from its use in an applicable body of law.

Comment:

The definition of "court proceeding" includes, but is not limited to, civil and criminal trials, ancillary arguments, and hearings, as well as divorce, custody, support, delinquency, and dependency hearings before hearing officers and made of record.

A judicial district may promulgate a local rule to exclude from the provisions of this chapter proceedings that can be appealed *de novo* to a court of common pleas or upon which exceptions or objections can be filed to a court of common pleas. *See* Pa.R.J.A. 5104(b).

The definition of "exhibit" includes items admitted or rejected by the court after being offered into evidence by a proponent.

The definition of "judicial district" is derived from 42 Pa.C.S. § 901.

A "records office" includes the prothonotary of a court, the clerk of courts, the clerk of an orphans' court, or the equivalent office by whatever name known.

Rule 5102. Custody of Exhibits. General Provisions.

- (a) During Court Proceedings. By local rule, either a member of court staff or the proponent may be designated as the custodian during a court proceeding. The custodian shall secure and maintain all exhibits during a court proceeding, including breaks and recesses, unless otherwise provided in Pa.R.J.A. 5103(c)-(d).
- (b) After Court Proceedings. By local rule, either a member of court staff or the proponent may be designated as the custodian after court proceedings have concluded.
 - (1) Custodian. The custodian shall:
- (i) retain or take custody of all documentary exhibits, photographs, and photographs of non-documentary exhibits accepted or rejected during the court proceeding;
- (ii) file all documentary exhibits, photographs, and photographs of non-documentary exhibits with the re-

cords office within five business days of the conclusion of the court proceeding unless otherwise directed by the court; and

- (iii) secure and maintain all other non-documentary exhibits as:
 - (A) directed by the court; or
 - (B) agreed to by the parties.
- (2) Index of Exhibits. The custodian filing the exhibits with the records office shall include a numbered list of exhibits, and for each exhibit identify the proponent, whether the exhibit was admitted or rejected from evidence, and a textual description or identification of the exhibit.
- (3) Confirmation. If the exhibits are transferred from a court staff-custodian to a proponent-custodian pursuant to local rule, the court staff-custodian shall confirm that the proponent-custodian has complied with subdivision (b)(1)(ii).
- (4) *Relief.* If the custodian does not file the exhibits as required by subdivision (b)(1)(ii), the proponent, if not designated as the custodian or in possession of the exhibits by local rule, may seek appropriate relief with the court.

Comment:

The custodian, if a member of court staff, may direct the proponent to secure and maintain exhibits that are bulky, oversized or otherwise physically impractical for the custodian to maintain during court proceedings. *See* Pa.R.J.A. 5103(c)(3).

Subdivision (b) reflects that the local rule shall establish the method for filing exhibits with the records office at the close of the court proceeding. Documentary exhibits, including photographs, filed with the records office are subject to existing record retention schedules. See, e.g., 16 P.S. §§ 13001 et seq. (requiring a County Records Committee to establish schedules for the disposal and retention of county records); Pa.R.J.A. 507. A judicial district may establish a local rule on the subject of records retention providing guidance to proponents who are maintaining non-documentary exhibits. See Pa.R.J.A. 5104(a)(4).

Non-documentary exhibits typically will be returned to the proponent at the conclusion of the court proceeding. See Pa.R.J.A. 5103 for special provisions relating to oversized documents, photographs, non-documentary exhibits, and digital media. If the court has concerns about the proponent's ability to retain an exhibit through the exhaustion of all appeals and post-trial actions, the court may direct other provisions for securing the exhibit. The court should take into consideration the possibility that a proponent may be incapable or unable to maintain and secure an exhibit, as well as the possibility that a proponent may tamper with or otherwise permit the degradation of an exhibit. The court should also consider any cases that may require special instructions for retention of non-documentary exhibits, such as in capital cases.

The exhibit list required by subdivision (b)(2) will enable the parties to easily determine the contents of a case record.

Rule 5103. Custody of Exhibits. Special Provisions.

- (a) Documentary Exhibits.
- (1) If a proponent offers into evidence an exhibit such as a letter, report, drawing, map, photograph, or other document that is larger in size than 8-1/2 x 11 inches, the

proponent shall ensure that a copy of the document reduced to $8\text{-}1/2 \times 11$ inches (or smaller) is entered into the record.

- (2) A proponent who provides a reduced copy of an oversized exhibit shall ensure that the reproduced document is clear and capable of further reproduction or transfer to digital media.
 - (b) Photographs.
- (1) If a proponent offers into evidence a photograph, the proponent shall ensure that the original or a copy of the photograph in lieu of the original (no larger in size than $8\text{-}1/2 \times 11$ inches) is entered into the record.
- (2) A proponent who provides a copy of a photograph shall ensure that the reproduced document is clear and capable of further reproduction or transfer to digital media.
 - (c) Non-documentary Exhibits: Generally.
- (1) If a proponent offers into evidence a non-documentary exhibit, the proponent shall ensure that a photograph (no larger in size than 8-1/2 x 11 inches) of the exhibit is entered into the record in lieu of the non-documentary exhibit.
- (2) A proponent who provides a photograph of a nondocumentary exhibit shall ensure that the photograph is clear and capable of further reproduction or transfer to digital media.
- (3) If the exhibit is bulky, oversized or otherwise physically impractical for a court staff-custodian to maintain, the court staff-custodian may direct that the proponent offering the exhibit maintain custody of it and secure it during the court proceeding.
- (d) Non-documentary Exhibits: Weapons, Contraband, Hazardous Materials.
- (1) In any proceeding in which weapons, cash, other items of value, drugs, or other dangerous materials are offered into evidence, the proponent shall secure the exhibits while the court proceeding is in session, as well as during all breaks and recesses.
- (2) During the proceeding, the proponent shall exercise all appropriate safeguards necessary to protect the public based on the nature of the exhibit.
- (3) Exhibits comprised of weapons, cash, other items of value, drugs, or other dangerous materials are prohibited from viewing in the jury room. The court may direct alternative viewing arrangements for such exhibits upon the request of the jury.
- (e) *Use of Digital Media*. A proponent shall ensure that an exhibit in a digital format entered into the record is in a format acceptable to the court.
- (f) *Duplicates*. The court may direct that the original item, and not a duplicate, be entered into the record.

Comment:

If a local rule designates the proponent as the custodian, the proponent will be responsible for the safekeeping of exhibits during the court proceeding. If the proponent is designated as the custodian, in no event is the proponent required to take separate action to transfer an exhibit to himself or herself.

When documents and photographs are reduced in size and copied to comply with subdivisions (a)-(b) of this rule, the proponent must ensure that the quality of the document or photograph is not compromised. All documentary exhibits must be capable of clear reproduction.

Subdivision (b) recognizes that a proponent may have a sentimental attachment to a photograph and may not want to relinquish it for inclusion in the record.

In subdivision (c), non-documentary exhibits comprise a broad spectrum of objects, including, but not limited to, jewelry, clothing, automobiles, furniture, as well as the items listed in subdivision (d). Each judicial district shall promulgate a local rule to establish standards for the handling of non-documentary exhibits that are bulky, oversized, or otherwise physically impractical for the custodian to maintain. See Pa.R.J.A. 5104(a)(4).

In subdivision (d), the phrase "weapons, cash, other items of value, drugs, or other dangerous materials" includes, but is not limited to, guns, knives, explosives, controlled substances, narcotics, intoxicants, currency, money, negotiable instruments, toxic materials, and biohazards. For purposes of this rule, "secured" means inaccessible by unauthorized persons. See UJS Pennsylvania Court Safety Manual for best practices on firearms handling. Courts should consider additional safety measures if substances likely to cause bodily harm are present in the courtroom, for example, fentanyl and its derivatives, or other substances known to be especially lethal or toxic.

Neither documentary exhibits of unusual bulk or weight nor non-documentary exhibits should be transmitted unless authorized by a party or by the prothonotary of the appellate court. See Pa.R.A.P. 1931(c). In the case of exhibits under subdivision (d) of this rule, such exhibits should only be transmitted by law enforcement personnel who are authorized to transport such items to the appellate court.

Regarding the use of media in the courtroom, technology is constantly evolving and judicial districts have access to varying levels of technology. As set forth in subdivision (e), a proponent offering an audio, visual, or computer file into evidence is solely responsible for ensuring the court has the means to access it during a court proceeding. Current technology may include the use of portable formats, such as flash drives and compact discs. A judicial district may identify acceptable formats for digital media by local rule.

With regard to other limitations on the use of duplicates, see Pa.R.E. 1003.

Rule 5104. Local Rule. Prohibition.

- (a) Content of Local Rule. Every judicial district shall promulgate a local rule of judicial administration pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(c) establishing the judicial district's policies and procedures for the custody of exhibits in court proceedings. The local rule shall:
- (1) designate the custodian to safeguard and maintain exhibits introduced in a court proceeding;
- (2) establish standards to ensure exhibits are filed with the records office for incorporation into the docket no later than five business days after the end of the court proceeding;
- (3) establish standards for the reproduction of oversized or voluminous documentary exhibits; and
- (4) establish standards for the maintenance and security of bulky or oversized non-documentary exhibits during and after the court proceeding.
- (b) Optional Provision. The judicial district may include a provision in its local rule to exclude record hearings that may be appealed de novo to a court of

common pleas or upon which exceptions or objections can be filed to a court of common pleas from the provisions of this chapter.

(c) Prohibition. The automated systems of the Unified Judicial System (e.g., Common Pleas Case Management System, Pennsylvania Appellate Case Court Management System, and PACFile) shall not be used for submitting or storing exhibits as required by this chapter.

Comment:

A local rule includes an Internal Operating Procedure adopted by an appellate court. *See* Pa.R.J.A. 5101(a)(5) (definition of local rule).

A "custodian" will either be a member of court staff, e.g., court reporter, clerk of court, hearing officer, or the proponent of the exhibit. See Pa.R.J.A. 5101(a)(2) (definition of custodian). When the proponent is designated as the custodian, the proponent will fulfill all the responsibilities of a custodian in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 5102.

A local court security committee makes recommendations to the president judge on protocols, policies, and procedures that should be implemented to protect the public, court personnel, and court facilities in the event of an emergency. See Pa.R.J.A. 1954 (Court Security). The judicial district may consult with the local court security committee to identify best practices for the handling of exhibits.

The local rule shall designate the filing method, which may include electronic filing, although not via the automated systems of the Unified Judicial System. The designated method of filing exhibits with the records office will depend on the capabilities available to the judicial district. It is anticipated that some judicial districts will require the custodian to file exhibits with the records office immediately following the close of the court proceeding. Other judicial districts may require the proponents to file exhibits with the records office no later than five business days after the close of the court proceeding.

Subdivision (b) permits a judicial district to exempt certain record hearings from the provisions of this chapter by establishing a local rule. Under this exception, for example, proceedings before hearing officers in divorce, custody, support, delinquency, and dependency matters could be excluded from the general rules. While these proceedings are of record, some judicial districts may find that the burden of compliance outweighs the benefit of a statewide procedure for records handling.

Rule 5105. Confidentiality. Exhibits Under Seal.

- (a) If an exhibit offered into evidence contains confidential information or confidential documents as defined in the Case Records Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania ("Policy"), the proponent shall give a copy of the exhibit and a certification prepared in compliance with the Policy and any related local rule to the records office no later than five days after the conclusion of the court proceeding.
- (b) Any exhibit sealed by the court during the court proceeding shall not be accessible to the public.

Comment:

Subdivision (a) of this rule relates to the confidentiality of information contained in exhibits. Although the Policy does not apply directly to exhibits, important policy considerations are set forth therein, particularly as it relates to personal identification information, as well as highly sensitive financial, medical, and psychological information. While the Policy does not address the handling of non-documentary exhibits, it is expected that parties will adhere to the policy considerations set forth therein and ensure that otherwise confidential information and documents are not made available through the record. Adhering to the guidance of the Policy will ensure that a protected version of the exhibit is maintained in the record for public viewing.

Subdivision (b) recognizes that some exhibits contain such highly sensitive information or images that they are sealed by the court during the court proceeding.

CUSTODY OF EXHIBITS WORKGROUP ADOPTION REPORT

Adoption of Pa.R.J.A. 5101-5105

On September 11, 2023, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania adopted Rules 5101—5105 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration, pertaining to the custody and retention of trial exhibits. The Custody of Exhibits Workgroup has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process as it relates to these changes. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. See Pa.R.J.A. 103, cmt. The statements contained herein are those of the Workgroup, not the Court.

The issue of custody of exhibits was initially considered by the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee following reports of cases where court personnel were found to have misused trial exhibits. The Committee contemplated developing procedural rules that would have prohibited the retention by the court of exhibits consisting of "contraband," *i.e.*, drugs or weapons. Additionally, the Committee identified issues that could arise from the handling of non-contraband exhibits, such as documentary exhibits that contain confidential information.

The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee undertook a statewide survey of judicial districts to identify practices relative to custody of trial exhibits. The survey revealed a substantial divergence of practice regarding the custody of exhibits among the judicial districts. Upon review of the survey findings, the Committee realized that there were broader issues related to the custody of exhibits, including the need to retain exhibits for matters on appeal, as well as logistical considerations impacting court administration, such as exhibit storage space. The Supreme Court directed the formation of a workgroup of stakeholders to study local practices and advise whether statewide rules on the custody and retention of exhibits should be promulgated.

The Custody of Exhibits Workgroup was comprised of representatives from stakeholder organizations: the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Court Judges, Pennsylvania State Association of Prothonotaries and Clerks of Court, Pennsylvania Court Reporters Association, Pennsylvania Association of Court Managers, Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts, and Supreme Court Rules Committees. The Workgroup met several times, developed draft rules, and circulated the draft rules to stakeholder groups for review and comment. The Workgroup published the proposal for public comment at 49 Pa.B. 1645 (April 6, 2019). The comment period ran through June 5, 2019. Following review and discussion of public comments, the Workgroup made further revisions to the proposal.

The framework of the rules relies on a custodian of exhibits to safeguard exhibits entered into evidence in a court proceeding. A custodian is defined as:

the person or persons designated by local rule of judicial administration to safeguard and maintain exhibits offered into evidence in a court proceeding. The custodian shall either be a member of court staff, e.g., court reporter, clerk of court, hearing officer, or the proponent of the exhibit. Custodian shall also include the custodian's designee.

Pa.R.J.A. 5101(a)(2).

The custody of exhibit rules establish statewide guidelines for the handling of exhibits during and after a court proceeding. See Pa.R.J.A. 5102. Additionally, certain matters, such as designation of the custodian and establishing standards for maintenance and security of bulky or oversized non-documentary exhibits, are left to local rules subject to Pa.R.J.A. 5104.

Pa.R.J.A. 5102(b) provides specific instructions for filing of documentary exhibits and photographs of non-documentary exhibits with the records office within five days of the conclusion of the court proceeding unless otherwise directed by the court. See Pa.R.J.A. 5102(b)(2). These rules are not intended to govern the transmission of records from the trial court to the appellate court. See, e.g., Pa.R.A.P. 1931.

Finally, the rules reference the Case Records Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System and apply it to exhibits filed with a records office. See Pa.R.J.A. 5105.

The certificate of mailing or other similar Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified shall be cancelled by the Postal Service, shall show the docket number of the matter in the Commonwealth Court and shall be either enclosed with the notice of appeal or separately mailed to the prothonotary. Upon actual receipt of the notice of appeal the prothonotary shall immediately stamp it with the date of actual receipt. The petitioner must file the original and one copy. Upon actual receipt of the petition for permission to appeal, the prothonotary of the appellate court shall immediately stamp it with the date of actual receipt. That date, or the date of earlier deposit in the United States mail as prescribed in this paragraph subdivision, shall constitute the date when permission to appeal was sought, which date shall be shown on the docket. The prothonotary of the appellate court shall immediately note the appellate docket number assignment upon the petition for permission to appeal and give notice of the docket number assignment to the government unit or clerk of the trial court, to the petitioner, and to the other persons named in the proof of service accompanying the petition.

(b) Manner of Filing.—If the application for reargument is transmitted to the prothonotary of the appellate court by means of first class, express, or priority United States Postal Service mail, the application shall be deemed received by the prothonotary for the purposes of [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 121(a) (filing) on the date deposited in the United States mail as shown on a United States Postal Service Form 3817 Certificate of Mailing, Form 3800 Receipt for Certified Mail, Form 3806 Receipt for Registered Mail, or other similar United States Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified. The certificate of mailing or similar Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified shall be cancelled by the Postal Service, shall show the docket number of the matter in the court in which reargument is sought and shall be enclosed with the application or separately mailed to the prothonotary. Upon actual receipt of the application, the prothonotary shall immediately stamp it with the date of actual receipt. That date, or the date of earlier deposit in the United States mail as prescribed in this subdivision, shall constitute the date when application was sought, which date shall be shown on the docket.

[Official Note: Former Supreme Court Rule 64, former Superior Court Rules 55 and 58 and former Commonwealth Court Rule 113A required the application for reargument to be filed within ten days of the entry of the order.]

Comment:

Under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 105(b) (enlargement of time) the time for seeking reargument may be enlarged by order, but no order of the Superior Court or of the Commonwealth Court, other than an actual grant of reargument meeting the requirements of [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 1701(b)(3) (authority of lower court or agency after appeal), will have the effect of postponing the finality of the order involved under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 1113 (time for petitioning for allowance of appeal).

The application shall be deemed filed on the date received by the prothonotary unless it was on an earlier date deposited in the United States mail and sent by first class, express, or priority United States Postal Service mail as shown on a United States Postal Service Form 3817 Certificate of Mailing, Form 3800 Receipt for Certified Mail, Form 3806 Receipt for Registered Mail, or other similar United States Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified. The certificate of mailing or similar Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified shall be cancelled by the Postal Service, shall show the docket number of the matter, if known, and shall be either enclosed with the application or separately mailed to the prothonotary. Appearances shall be filed as in other original actions. An adverse party may file an answer no later than 14 days after service of the application. The answer shall be deemed filed on the date of mailing if first class, express, or priority United States Postal Service mail is utilized. An adverse party who does not intend to file an answer to the application shall, within the time fixed by these rules for the filing of an answer, file a letter stating that an answer to the application will not be filed. Upon receipt of the answer to the application, or a letter stating that no answer will be filed, from each party entitled to file such, the application, pleadings, and answer to the application, if any, shall be distributed by the prothonotary to the Supreme Court for its consideration.

* KING'S BENCH MATTERS

Rule 3309. Applications for Extraordinary Relief.

*

(a) General [rule.—] Rule. An application for relief under 42 Pa.C.S. § 726 (extraordinary jurisdiction), or under the powers reserved by the first sentence of Section 1 of the Schedule to the Judiciary Article, shall show service upon all persons who may be affected thereby, or their representatives, and upon the clerk of any court in which the subject matter of the application may be pending. The application shall be deemed filed on the date received by the prothonotary unless it was on an earlier date deposited in the United States mail and sent by first class, express, or priority United States Postal Service mail as shown on a United States Postal Service Form 3817 Certificate of Mailing, Form 3800 Receipt for Certified Mail, Form 3806 Receipt for Registered Mail, or other similar United States Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified. The certificate of mailing or similar Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified shall be cancelled by the Postal Service, shall show the docket number of the matter if known and shall be either enclosed with the application or separately mailed to the prothonotary. Appearances shall be governed by [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 1112 (entry of appearance) unless no appearances have been entered below, in which case appearances shall be filed as in original actions.

CHAPTER 37. BUSINESS OF THE COMMONWEALTH COURT

SUMMARY AND FORMAL PROCEEDINGS AGAINST INSURERS

Rule 3781. Claim Procedure in Liquidation Proceedings.

(a) Filing a [proof of claim.] Proof of Claim.

- (1) A creditor asserting a monetary claim against the insurer's estate shall file a proof of claim with the liquidator in accordance with Article V.
- (2) In the notice to potential creditors of the insurer's estate, the liquidator shall provide a proof of claim form that complies with Article V.
- (3) The completed proof of claim form and supporting documentation shall be filed with the liquidator. A proof of claim form is filed when received by the liquidator except as described below. The liquidator is deemed to have received the proof of claim form on the date of mailing as established by a United Postal Service Form 3817 Certificate of Mailing, Form 3800 Receipt for Certified Mail, Form 3806 Receipt for Registered Mail, or by any similar form from which the date of deposit in the mail can be verified or the date of transmission by facsimile (fax) or electronic mail (e-mail), as documented by the sender's fax or computer. If filing is accomplished by fax, the claimant shall also comply with the requirements of [Pa.R.C.P. No.] Pa.R.Civ.P. 440(d)(2), relating to a fax cover sheet. * * * *

CHAPTER 40. APPEALS ARISING UNDER THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE OF MILITARY JUSTICE

Rule 4002. Manner of Taking Appeal.

An appeal shall be taken by filing, in person or by first class, express, or priority United States Postal Service mail, a notice of appeal with the State Judge Advocate for the respective branch of service in which the courtmartial has been convened.

If the notice of appeal is filed by first class, express, or priority United States Postal Service mail, the notice shall be deemed received by the State Judge Advocate for the purposes of filing on the date deposited in the United States mail, shown on a United States Postal Service Form 3817[,] Certificate of Mailing, Form 3800 Receipt for Certified Mail, Form 3806 Receipt for Registered Mail, or other similar United States Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified. The certificate of mailing or other similar Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified shall be cancelled by the Postal Service and shall show the docket number of the matter in the government unit, and shall be either enclosed with the petition or separately mailed to the State Judge Advocate.

ADOPTION REPORT

Amendment of Pa.R.A.P. 1101, 1112, 1123, 1311, 1514, 1602, 1925, 2542, 3307, 3309, 3781, and 4002

On September 11, 2023, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania adopted amendments to Rules of Appellate Procedure 1101, 1112, 1123, 1311, 1514, 1602, 1925, 2542, 3307, 3309, 3781, and 4002. The Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. See Pa.R.J.A. 103, cmt. The statements contained herein are those of the Committee, not the Court.

The Committee proposed the amendment of these rules to update and reference the forms used by the United States Postal Service and commonly accepted by the prothonotaries of the appellate courts as proof of mailing to satisfy Pa.R.A.P. 121. In addition to USPS form 3817 Certificate of Mailing, each rule now specifies that two commonly used forms, USPS Form 3800 Receipt for Certified Mail and Form 3806 Receipt for Registered Mail, may be used to confirm the date of deposit in the USPS mail. Stylistic revisions to the text of each rule were also made.

The Committee did not previously publish these amendments for comment because they are technical in nature and do not affect current practice or procedure.

The amendments become effective on January 1, 2024. The following commentary from Pa.R.A.P. 2542 has been removed by this rulemaking:

(*Editor's Note*: Pa.R.Civ.P. 220.3 as printed in 231 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Note" and the "Explanatory Comment" text is not codified.)

Rule 220.3. [Voir Dire.] Voir Dire of Jurors.

- (a) Judge's Presence Required. Voir dire of prospective jurors shall be conducted, and the jurors shall be selected, in the presence of a judge, unless the judge's presence is waived by all parties with the consent of the court.
- (b) Instruction of Juror Duties. Upon completion of the oath, the judge shall instruct the prospective jurors upon their duties and restrictions while serving as jurors, and of any sanctions for violation of those duties and restrictions, including those in Rules 220.1 and 220.2.
- [(b)] (c) [Voir dire] Juror Information. Voir dire shall be conducted to provide the opportunity to obtain, at a minimum, a full description of the following information, where relevant, concerning the prospective jurors and their households:
 - (1) [Name] name;
 - (2) **[Date] year** and place of birth;
- (3) [Residential] residential neighborhood and zip code (not street address);
 - (4) [Marital] marital status;
 - (5) [Nature] nature and extent of education;
 - (6) [Number] number and ages of children;
- (7) [Name] <u>name</u>, age, and relationship of members of prospective juror's household;
- (8) [Occupation] occupation and employment history of the prospective juror, the juror's spouse and children, and members of the juror's household;
- (9) [Involvement] involvement as a party or a witness in a civil lawsuit or criminal case;
- (10) [Relationship] relationship, friendship, or association with a law enforcement officer, a lawyer, or any person affiliated with the courts of any judicial district;
- (11) **Relationship** I <u>relationship</u> of the prospective juror or any member of the prospective juror's immediate family to the insurance industry, including employee, claims adjuster, investigator, agent, or stockholder in an insurance company;
 - (12) [Motor] motor vehicle operation and licensure;

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- (13) [Physical] physical or mental condition affecting ability to serve on a jury;
- (14) **[Reasons]** <u>reasons</u> the prospective juror believes **[he or she]** <u>the prospective juror</u> cannot or should not serve as a juror;
- (15) [Relationship] <u>relationship</u>, friendship, or association with the parties, the attorneys, and prospective witnesses of the particular case to be heard;
- (16) [Ability] ability to refrain from using a computer, cellular telephone, or other electronic device with communication capabilities in violation of the provisions of Rule 220.1; and
- (17) [Such] <u>such</u> other pertinent information as may be appropriate to the particular case to achieve a competent, fair, and impartial jury.

[Note: For example, under presently prevailing law as established by the Superior Court, voir dire should have been allowed with respect to the effect of pre-trial publicity on prospective jurors' "attitudes regarding medical malpractice and tort reform." Capoferri v. Children's Hosp. of Phila., 893 A.2d 133 (Pa. Super. 2006) (en banc).]

[(c)] (d) Voir Dire by Written Questionnaire Permitted. The court may provide for [voir dire] voir dire to include the use of a written questionnaire. [However, the] The use of a written questionnaire without the opportunity for oral examination by the court or counsel is not a sufficient [voir dire] voir dire.

[Note: The parties or their attorneys may conduct the examination of the prospective jurors unless the court itself conducts the examination or otherwise directs that the examination be conducted by a court employee. Any dispute shall be resolved by the court.

A written questionnaire may be used to facilitate and expedite the voir dire examination by providing the trial judge and attorneys with basic background information about the jurors, thereby eliminating the need for many commonly asked questions.

- [(d)] (e) *Individual Voir Dire Permitted*. The court may permit all or part of the examination of a juror out of the presence of other jurors.
- (f) Recording of Voir Dire. Voir dire, including all rulings by a judge, shall be recorded in full. The recording shall be transcribed only upon written request of a party or order of court.

Comment:

Subdivision (a)—The permitted waiver is a waiver only of the judge's physical presence during voir dire. It is not a waiver of a party's opportunity to create a record or to have the judge make decisions based upon that record. This subdivision is also intended to provide flexibility to permit another judge, or a senior judge, in the judicial district to preside over voir dire, as circumstances warrant.

Subdivision (c)(17)—See Capoferri v. Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, 893 A.2d 133 (Pa. Super. 2006) (en banc) (voir dire should have been allowed with respect to the effect of pre-trial publicity on

prospective jurors' "attitudes regarding medical malpractice and tort reform"), as an example of the type of information that may be sought from potential jurors to achieve a competent, fair, and impartial jury in a particular case.

Subdivision (d)—The parties or their attorneys may conduct voir dire of the prospective jurors unless the court itself conducts voir dire or otherwise directs that the voir dire be conducted by a court employee. Any dispute shall be resolved by the court.

A written questionnaire may be used to facilitate and expedite the *voir dire* by providing the trial judge and attorneys with basic background information about the jurors, thereby eliminating the need for many commonly asked questions.

Historical Commentary

The following commentary is historical in nature and represents statements of the Committee at the time of rulemaking:

EXPLANATORY COMMENT—1997

New Rule 220.1 governing voir dire, the examination of prospective jurors, furthers the goal of establishing a uniform civil practice throughout the Commonwealth with respect to the information which the parties may obtain concerning prospective jurors.

The rule specifies the information which the parties should be able to obtain through voir dire but does not require a particular manner of voir dire. Subdivision (a) is devoted to listing the information to which the parties are entitled.

The rule does not dictate the mechanics of voir dire, but leaves the method of voir dire to the local courts of common pleas. Subdivision (b) does give some guidance, however. Voir dire may include the use of a written questionnaire, but no form of questionnaire is mandated or suggested. The note observes that a written questionnaire may "facilitate and expedite" voir dire by providing basic background information. The rule provides that "the use of a written questionnaire without the opportunity for oral examination is not a sufficient voir dire." The parties are entitled to both hear prospective jurors and observe their demeanor.

The rule recognizes that service upon a jury may be a new and disquieting experience to citizens called as prospective jurors. Information may be sought which a prospective juror feels uncomfortable revealing in open court. Thus, subdivision (c) provides that the "court may permit all or part of the examination of a juror out of the presence of other jurors."

EXPLANATORY COMMENT—2008

Rule 220.1 governing *voir dire* has been amended with the addition of a note to subdivision (a)(16). Subdivision (a) lists the information to which parties are entitled to obtain during *voir dire*, concluding with a catch-all provision in subparagraph (16). The note cites *Capoferri v. Children's Hospital of Philadelphia*, 893 A.2d 133 (Pa. Super. 2006) (en banc), as an example of the type of information that may be sought from potential jurors pursuant to subparagraph (16) to achieve a competent, fair and impartial jury in a particular case.

EXPLANATORY COMMENT—2015

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania has adopted new Rules 220.1 and 220.2 and the amendment of current Rules 220.1 and 223.1. The changes are intended to

provide guidance to the bench and bar regarding the use of electronic devices by jurors in civil cases.

The new rules and amendments provide for jurors to be instructed that the use of electronic devices is restricted during their tenure as a prospective juror, i.e. a member of the jury pool, and as a selected juror. The new provisions require the trial court to instruct jurors that they may not conduct independent research on the Internet about the case, communicate about the case electronically, e.g. "tweet" or "blog," or use such devices during juror service. A trial court is required to instruct jurors at the earliest opportunity of interaction between the juror and the trial court, and then repeat those instructions as often as practicable. The new rules and amendments provide for sanctions against any person who violates the provisions of these rules. It should also be noted that a note to new Rule 220.1 cross-references Section 1.180 of the Pennsylvania Suggested Civil Jury Instructions, Pa. SSJI (Civ), § 1.180. These instructions specifically address the use of electronic devices by jurors.

While the proposal focuses on the use of electronic devices by jurors, it remains silent as to their use in the courtroom by the public and media. Rule of Judicial Administration 1910 outlines the responsibility of a trial court regarding the broadcasting, televising, or taking of photographs in the courtroom in civil proceedings.

SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA PUBLICATION REPORT

Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P. 220.3

The Civil Procedural Rules Committee is considering recommending the amendment of Pennsylvania Rule of Civil Procedure 220.3 to require *voir dire* of jurors to be conducted in the presence of a judge unless the parties and the judge agree to waive that requirement.

In Trigg v. Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh of UPMC, 229 A.3d 260 (Pa. 2020), the Supreme Court examined voir dire procedures set forth in Allegheny County Local Rule 220.1. Pursuant to this local rule, Allegheny County did not require the trial judge to preside over jury selection. Rather, potential jurors met with a court clerk assigned by the Calendar Control Judge and the parties' attorneys. The potential jurors were asked standard questions by the clerk; the attorneys were then permitted to ask five additional questions. Follow-up questions were permitted to clarify a juror's answer. When challenging a juror for cause, the attorneys and the juror returned to the Calendar Control Judge, who read a transcript of the voir dire of the juror and then ruled on the challenge for cause. ¹

The trial court in *Trigg* denied the plaintiffs' request to strike prospective jurors for cause. Instead, the plaintiffs were required to use peremptory challenges. On appeal to the Superior Court, the plaintiffs argued that the trial court erred by failing to observe the demeanor and tenor of prospective jurors during the initial questioning by the court clerk.

In its opinion, the Superior Court acknowledged that deference is given to the trial court in jury selection unless there is a palpable error. See McHugh v. Proctor & Gamble, 776 A.2d 266 (Pa. Super. 2001). The court concluded that this standard could not be extended to trial judges who fail to observe voir dire in person. It emphasized the importance for the trial judge to view the demeanor of prospective jurors. Without doing so, the

trial judge does not acquire "the wisdom or insight that he could have from noting a jurors' [sic] furtive glance, a tremor of voice, a delayed reply, a change in posture, or myriads of other body language." Trigg v. Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh of UPMC, 187 A.3d 1013, 1017 (Pa. Super. 2018). The court stated that "re-questioning prospective jurors could never reproduce the authentic reactions that they displayed when the questions were originally asked," and concluded that "[a] judge personally witnessing the original voir dire is essential, because it justifies our—and a losing party's—faith in the trial court's rulings on challenges for cause." Id. at 1017-18.

On appeal to the Supreme Court, the majority vacated and remanded the Superior Court judgment on the basis that the issue had been waived for appellate review because no objection to the trial judge not being present during *voir dire* was placed on the record. Notwithstanding finding waiver, the majority urged the adoption of a Rule of Civil Procedure similar to Pa.R.Crim.P. 631 requiring the judge to preside at *voir dire*.

Both Justice Donohue and Justice Wecht wrote concurring opinions. They each wrote separately to assert the importance of the trial judge presiding over *voir dire* as fundamental to ensuring a fair and impartial jury. Notably, both pointed out the disparity in *voir dire* requirements in the procedural rules. Pa.R.Crim.P. 631 sets forth the mechanics for *voir dire* in criminal jury trials and requires, *inter alia*, *voir dire* to be conducted in the presence of a judge unless the parties and the judge agree to waive that requirement. In contrast, there is a lack of similar specific requirements in the Rules of Civil Procedure; such requirements have been left to the individual courts of common pleas. Both Justices concluded by asserting that this disparity should be referred to the Committee for examination.

Consistent with the Supreme Court's urging, the Committee undertook review of current practices of voir dire in civil cases and the provisions of Pa.R.Crim.P. 631 requiring the judge to preside over voir dire. It was reported to the Committee that the practice in counties with a high volume of cases is for the trial judge to perform other duties while jurors are being selected. For example, a judge may be concluding a trial while a jury is being selected for the next trial. Or, a judge may be presiding over a non-jury arbitration appeal while the jurors are selected for the next trial on that judge's docket. The Committee acknowledges that these practices enhance the efficiency and efficacy of judicial resources to timely try cases. Moreover, the Committee is cognizant that changing these practices may impact judicial operations and create logistical burdens to overcome.

The Committee has incorporated two aspects of Pa.R.Crim.P. 631 into the proposed amendment. The first aspect is new subdivision (a). This subdivision would be added to require a judge to preside over voir dire unless the judge's presence is waived by the parties and with the consent of the court. This provision is intended to comply with the Supreme Court's directive in Trigg. It should be noted that the waiver permitted in subdivision (a) is a waiver only of the judge's physical presence during voir dire. It is not a waiver of a party's opportunity to create a record or to have the judge make decisions based upon that record. To afford some flexibility to address logistical concerns, this new subdivision is intended to permit another judge, or a senior judge, in the judicial district to preside over voir dire, as circumstances warrant. Commentary has been added to advise of these nuances to the proposed amendment.

 $^{^1}$ Allegheny County has subsequently amended Local Rule 212.2 governing pre-trial statements to permit, $inter\ alia,$ a party to request that a judge preside over $voir\ dire.$

The second aspect is new subdivision (f). This subdivision would require *voir dire* to be recorded in full, including all rulings by the trial judge. The recording would only be transcribed upon the written request of a party or by order of court. Adding this provision will make Rule 220.3 consistent with the procedures in Pa.R.Crim.P. 631.

The Committee also considered whether subdivision (d) (voir dire by written questionnaire permitted) should be amended to add procedures addressing the preservation of the written questionnaire as an exhibit to the proceeding for appellate review. At this juncture, the Committee believes that the creation of an adequate record is more a matter of practice than procedure. The Committee specifically requests input from the bench and bar on whether such an amendment is necessary and would provide needed clarity.

TITLE 234. RULES OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE CHAPTER 5. PRETRIAL PROCEDURES IN COURT CASES

PART G. Procedures Following Filing of Information

(Editor's Note: Rule 574 as printed in 234 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Note.")

Rule 574. Forensic Laboratory Report; Certification In Lieu of Expert Testimony.

[(A)] (a) In any trial, the attorney for the Commonwealth may seek to offer into evidence a forensic laboratory report supported by a certification, as provided in

[paragraph (E)] <u>subdivision (e)</u>, in lieu of testimony by the person who performed the analysis or examination that is the subject of the report.

[(B)] (b) *Notice*.

- (1) If the attorney for the Commonwealth intends to offer the forensic laboratory report and accompanying certification as provided in [paragraph (A)] subdivision (a) as evidence at trial, the attorney for the Commonwealth shall file and serve, as provided in Rule 576, upon the defendant's attorney or, if unrepresented, the defendant a written notice of that fact at the time of the disclosure of the report but no later than 20 days prior to the start of trial.
- (2) The notice shall include a statement informing the defendant that, as provided in **[paragraph (C)(3)]** subdivision (c)(3), if no written demand for testimony by the person who performed the analysis or examination that is the subject of the forensic laboratory report is made within 10 days of the service of the notice, the forensic laboratory report and accompanying certification are admissible in evidence without the person who performed the analysis or examination testifying.
- (3) Except as provided in [paragraph (C)] subdivision (c), the laboratory report and accompanying certification are admissible in evidence to the same effect as if the person who performed the analysis or examination had personally testified.

[(C)] (c) Demand.

- (1) Within 10 days of service of the notice provided in **[paragraph (B)]** subdivision (b), the defendant's attorney, or if unrepresented, the defendant may file and serve, as provided in Rule 576, upon the attorney for the Commonwealth a written demand for the person who performed the analysis or examination that is the subject of the forensic laboratory report to testify at trial.
- (2) If a written demand is filed and served, the forensic laboratory report and accompanying certification are not admissible under [paragraph (B)(3)] subdivision (b)(3) unless the person who performed the analysis or examination testifies.
- (3) If no demand for live testimony regarding the forensic laboratory report and accompanying certification is filed and served within the time allowed by this section, the forensic laboratory report and accompanying certification are admissible in evidence without the person who performed the analysis or examination testifying.
- [(D)] (d) Extension. For cause shown, the judge may:
- (1) extend the time period for filing the notice or <u>for</u> filing the demand for live testimony[,]; or
 - (2) [may] grant a continuance of the trial.

[(E)] (e) Certification.

The person who performed the analysis or examination that is the subject of the forensic laboratory report shall complete a certification in which the person shall state:

- (1) the education, training, and experience that qualify him or her to perform the analysis or examination;
- (2) the entity by which he or she is employed and a description of his or her regular duties;
- (3) the name and location of the laboratory where the analysis or examination was performed;

- (4) any state, national, or international accreditations of the laboratory at which the analysis or examination was performed; [and]
- (5) that the analysis or examination was performed under industry-approved procedures or standards; and
- (6) the report accurately reflects the findings and opinions of the person who performed the analysis or examination regarding the results of the analysis or examination.

Comment:

This rule was adopted in 2014 to address the issues raised by the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Melendez-Diaz v. Massachusetts*, [129 U.S. 2527] 557 U.S. 305 (2009), that held that the 6th Amendment confrontation right precluded presentation of laboratory reports without a live witness testifying in the trial. In *Melendez-Diaz*, the U.S. Supreme Court noted with approval the use of "notice and demand" procedures as a means of permitting routine laboratory reports to be admitted without the expense of supporting the admission by live expert testimony while protecting a defendant's confrontation rights.

This rule provides a "notice and demand" procedure for Pennsylvania. Under the rule, the attorney for the Commonwealth may seek to admit a forensic laboratory report as evidence without the testimony of the analyst who performed the testing that was the subject of the report if notice requirements are met and no demand for the presence of the analyst is made. If the defendant makes such a demand, the analyst would be required to testify before the report could be admitted into evidence.

Nothing in this rule is intended to preclude a stipulation agreed to by the parties for the admission of the laboratory report without the analyst's presence.

Nothing in the rule would prevent further stipulation by the parties in light of the admission of the report and certification.

Nothing in this rule is intended to change the requirement for the provision of discovery under Rule 573.

Under [paragraph (D)] subdivision (d), the trial judge may permit filing of the notice or demand after the time period required in the rule if the party seeking the late filing shows cause for the delay. In the situation where the judge permits the late filing of the notice, the defendant still has 10 days in which to make the demand for the live testimony of the analyst. This may necessitate a continuance of the trial.

The certification in [paragraph (E)] subdivision (e) does not require a description of the actual tests performed for the analysis. This information more properly belongs in the report itself. Since one of the goals of this rule is to permit the defendant to make an informed decision regarding whether to demand the live testimony of the analyst, the report should provide information sufficient to describe the methodology by which the results were determined.

For purposes of this rule, a laboratory is "accredited" when its management, personnel, quality system, operational and technical procedures, equipment and physical facilities meet [standards established by a recognized state, national, or international accrediting organization such as the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accrediting Board (ASCLD/LAB) or Forensic Quality Services—International (FQS-I)] the ISO/IEC 17025 standard in

the forensic field of testing as determined by an International Laboratory Accreditation Cooperation recognized accreditation organization that has been evaluated to meet the ISO/IEC 17011 standard and that has expertise in the forensic laboratory accreditation field.

SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA CRIMINAL PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE

ADOPTION REPORT

Amendment of Pa.R.Crim.P. 574

On September 11, 2023, the Supreme Court amended Pennsylvania Rule of Criminal Procedure 574 governing the admission of a certified forensic lab report in lieu of the expert appearing and testifying in court. The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. See Pa.R.J.A. 103, cmt. The statements contained herein are those of the Committee, not the Court.

The Juvenile Court Procedural Rules Committee was asked to consider a new Rule of Juvenile Court Procedure similar to Pa.R.Crim.P. 574 (Forensic Laboratory Report; Certification In Lieu of Expert Testimony). The proposed rule would govern the admission of a certified forensic lab report in lieu of the expert appearing and testifying in court. One reason for the requested rulemaking was to increase consistency among the bodies of rules for prosecutors and defenders crossing over from criminal proceedings to delinquency proceedings. To that end, the Juvenile Court Procedural Rules Committee published for comment proposed Pa.R.J.C.P. 405. See 52 Pa.B. 7266 (November 26, 2022).

One commenter, the American Association of Laboratory Accreditation, recommended that the Comment not name specific certifying organizations because the certifying organization contained in the Comment no longer exists as named. Instead, the Association suggested referencing the forensic testing standard and the standard for the accrediting body. The Association provided information as to the specific standards. That suggestion was incorporated into the Comment to Pa.R.J.C.P. 405. Because the same certifying organization was referenced in the Comment to Pa.R.Crim.P. 574, the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee has likewise incorporated the Association's suggestion into the Comment to Pa.R.Crim.P. 574. Additionally, Pa.R.Crim.P. 574 has been restyled, subdivision (d) and (e) have been deconstructed to improve readability, and a citation to authority has been corrected.

TITLE 237. JUVENILE RULES PART I. RULES

Subpart A. DELINQUENCY MATTERS CHAPTER 4. ADJUDICATORY HEARING

The following text is entirely new.

(*Editor's Note*: The following rule is new and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

Rule 405. Forensic Laboratory Report and Certification.

- (a) Report and Certification In Lieu of Expert Testimony.
- (1) If the requirements of this rule have been met, the attorney for the Commonwealth may seek to offer a forensic laboratory report into evidence in lieu of testimony in any adjudicatory hearing of a non-detained iuvenile.
- (2) The report shall be supported by a certification, as provided in subdivision (e), from the expert who drafted the report and performed the analysis or examination.
 - (b) Notice.
- (1) The attorney for the Commonwealth shall file the written notice and serve the written notice, together with the report and certification, upon the juvenile's attorney.
- (2) The notice shall include a statement informing the juvenile that:
- (i) if no written demand for testimony is made within 10 days of the service of the notice, the forensic laboratory report and certification are admissible in evidence, as provided in subdivision (c)(3); and
- (ii) the expert who drafted the report does not have to testify.

- (3) Service shall occur no later than 20 days prior to the adjudicatory hearing.
- (4) Once entered into evidence, the report and certification shall qualify as if the expert had testified personally.
 - (c) Demand
- (1) Within 10 days of service of the notice, the juvenile's attorney may file and serve a written demand upon the attorney for the Commonwealth requiring the expert to testify at the adjudicatory hearing.
- (2) If a written demand is filed and served, the expert must testify.
- (3) If no demand is filed and served as required by subdivision (c)(1), the report and certification are admissible in evidence without the expert's testimony.
 - (d) *Extension*. For cause shown, the judge may:
 - (1) extend the time requirements of this rule; or
 - (2) grant a continuance of the adjudicatory hearing.
- (e) Certification. The expert shall complete a certification providing:
- (1) the education, training, and experience that qualify the expert to perform the analysis or examination;
- (2) the entity by which the expert is employed and a description of the expert's regular duties;
- (3) the name and location of the laboratory where the analysis or examination was performed;
- (4) any state, national, or international accreditations of the laboratory at which the analysis or examination was performed;
- (5) that the analysis or examination was performed under industry-approved procedures or standards; and
- (6) the report accurately reflects the findings and opinions of the expert.

Comment:

This rule is intended to establish a uniform procedure for delinquency proceedings, similar to Pa.R.Crim.P. 574, for the admission of laboratory reports without the expense of live expert testimony while protecting a juvenile's confrontation rights. The rule provides a "notice and demand" procedure for delinquency proceedings. Under this rule, the attorney for the Commonwealth may seek to admit a forensic laboratory report as evidence without expert testimony if the notice requirements are met and no demand for the presence of the expert is made. If the juvenile makes such a demand, the expert is required to testify before the report can be admitted into evidence.

Given the prompt adjudicatory hearing requirement of the Juvenile Act, 42 Pa.C.S. § 6335(a) (if the juvenile is detained, then the adjudicatory hearing must be held within 10 days of the filing of a petition), this rule is only available for adjudicatory hearings of non-detained juveniles. See Pa.R.J.C.P. 404(B) (if the juvenile is not detained, then the adjudicatory hearing must be held within a reasonable time).

Nothing in this rule is intended to: 1) preclude a stipulation agreed to by the parties for the admission of the report without the expert's presence; 2) prevent further stipulation by the parties in light of the admission of the report and certification; or 3) change the discovery requirements pursuant to Rule 340.

Pursuant to subdivision (d), the court may permit filing of the notice or demand after the time period required in the rule if the party seeking the late filing shows cause for the delay. In the situation where the judge permits the late filing of the notice, the juvenile still has ten days to make the demand for the live testimony of the expert. This may necessitate a continuance of the adjudicatory hearing.

The certification in subdivision (e) does not require a description of the actual tests performed for the analysis. This information more properly belongs in the report itself. Because one of the goals of this rule is to permit the juvenile to make an informed decision regarding whether to demand the live testimony of the expert, the report should provide information sufficient to describe the methodology by which the results were determined.

For purposes of this rule, a laboratory is "accredited" when its management, personnel, quality system, operational and technical procedures, equipment, and physical facilities meet the ISO/IEC 17025 standard in the forensic field of testing as determined by an International Laboratory Accreditation Cooperation recognized accreditation organization that has been evaluated to meet the ISO/IEC 17011 standard and that has expertise in the forensic laboratory accreditation field.

See Rule 345 for filing and service requirements.

SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA JUVENILE COURT PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE

ADOPTION REPORT

Adoption of Pa.R.J.C.P. 405

On September 11, 2023, the Supreme Court adopted Pennsylvania Rule of Juvenile Court Procedure 405 governing the admission of a certified forensic lab report in lieu of the expert appearing and testifying in court. The Juvenile Court Procedural Rules Committee has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. See Pa.R.J.A. 103, cmt. The statements contained herein are those of the Committee, not the Court.

The Committee was requested to consider a new Rule of Juvenile Court Procedure mirroring Pa.R.Crim.P. 574 (Forensic Laboratory Report; Certification In Lieu of Expert Testimony) governing the admission of a certified forensic lab report in lieu of the expert appearing and testifying in court. The reasons for rulemaking include increased consistency among the bodies of rules for prosecutors and defenders crossing over from criminal proceedings to delinquency proceedings. Also, responses to offers of stipulation are sometimes not received so having a formal mechanism would be beneficial. Further, experts seem increasingly busy, and a rule that operates to relieve the burden of appearing when reports are uncontested would allow the experts to focus on the proceedings where reports are contested and would reduce lab testing backlogs.

The Committee previously published proposed Pa.R.J.C.P. 405, which provided for "notice and demand" procedures nearly identical to Pa.R.Crim.P. 574. See 44 Pa.B. 3306 (June 7, 2014). The Committee ultimately discontinued rulemaking because the timeframes were not compatible with adjudicatory hearings for detained juveniles. See Pa.R.J.C.P. 404(A) (hearing to be held within 10 days of the petition's filing). Further, several commenters indicated that stipulations were a widely used and effective alternative to live expert witness testimony.

Given the prior comments, the Committee considered a rule largely modeled after Pa.R.Crim.P. 574 but that would exclude juveniles who were in pre-adjudication detention given the 10-day adjudicatory window for detained juveniles. The rate of pre-adjudication detention appears to be declining over time and most detention now occur post-adjudication. Consequently, the "detention exclusion" would not erode the value of the rule. Additionally, the proposed rule would only be applicable in adjudicatory hearings pursuant to Pa.R.J.C.P. 406; it would not apply to probation revocation hearings.

The proposal was published for comment. See 52 Pa.B. 7266 (November 26, 2022). Two comments were received. The first commenter believed the proposed rule was necessary because stipulations to admit laboratory reports are "not necessarily the norm."

The second commenter was the American Association for Laboratory Accreditation, which generally supported the rule. The Association recommended that the Comment not name specific certifying organizations because the certifying organization contained in the Comment no longer exists as named. Instead, the Association suggested referencing the forensic testing standard and the standard for the accrediting body. The Association provided information as to the specific standards. That suggestion was incorporated into the Comment.

This rule becomes effective January 1, 2024.

Administrative Order for Crime Victim Services and Compensation Fund, Local Victim Services Fund; AD 40 2023

Administrative Order

And Now this 11th day of September, 2023, pursuant to Act 77 of 2022, Amendments to the Crime Victims Act, Title 18, Section 11.1101, Subsection (b), and the petition of Commonwealth, it is *Hereby Ordered*, this Court Approves the assessment of \$100, unless otherwise ordered by the Court, to the Crime Victim Services and Compensation Fund ("CVSC") and Local Victim Services Fund. This Cost shall be imposed at both the Magisterial District Courts and the Court of Common Pleas of this Judicial District notwithstanding any statutory provision to the contrary.

Pursuant to Act 77, the disposition of this assessment is hereby amended as follows:

- (1) Cost imposed under subsection (a) shall be paid into the newly established fund entitled, Crime Victim Services and Compensation Fund ("CVSC"); this fund will replace both existing Crime Victim's Compensation Fund, and the Victim Witness Services Fund.
- (2) 30% of any costs in excess of \$60 shall be paid to Crime Victim Services and Compensation Fund ("CVSC").
- (3) 70% of any costs in excess of \$60 shall be paid to Local Victim Services Fund, to be established and administered by the Lehigh County Fiscal Officer. The money in this fund shall be used only for victim services.

(4) The Lehigh County Fiscal Officer shall disperse money from Local Victim Services Fund at the discretion of the Lehigh County District Attorney.

As stipulated in Act 77 of 2022 as Amended, herein as follows and incorporated into this Order are the "Guidelines for Counties Establishing a Local Victim Services Fund" which was approved by the Victims Services Advisory Committee (VSAC) and approved by the PCCD Commission, to be followed for the administration of the Local Victim Services Fund.

- It Is Ordered that this Administrative Order shall be effective on the date of this Order.
- It Is Further Ordered that in accordance with Pa.R.Crim.P. 105, the District Court Administrator shall:
- (a) File one (1) certified copy of this Order with the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts;
- (b) File two (2) certified copies and (1) disk copy of this Order with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*;
- (c) File one (1) certified copy of this Order with Pennsylvania Criminal Procedural Rules Committee;
- (d) File one (1) certified copy of this Order with the Clerk of Judicial Records Criminal Division of the Court of Common Pleas of Lehigh County; and
- (e) Forward one (1) copy of this Order for publication in the *Lehigh County Law Journal*.

Title 17—CONSERVATION AND NATURAL RESOURCES

DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION AND NATURAL RESOURCES [17 PA. CODE CH. 45]

Conservation of Pennsylvania Native Wild Plants

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (Department), under the authority of section 7(c) of the Wild Resource Conservation Act (WRCA) (32 P.S. § 5307(c)) and sections 305(a)(9) and 313(g) of the Conservation and Natural Resources Act (CNRA) (71 P.S. §§ 1340.305(a)(9) and 1340.313(g)), amends Chapter 45 (relating to conservation of Pennsylvania native wild plants) as set forth in Annex A.

Purpose

The purpose of this final-form rulemaking is to amend Chapter 45 by updating Pennsylvania native wild plant species classification lists, including certain scientific names, common names and reference sources. (32 P.S. § 5307(c) and 71 P.S. §§ 1340.305(a)(9) and 1340.313(g)).

Discussion

The WRCA (32 P.S. §§ 5301—5314), inter alia, established a procedure for protection of wild flora/plants in this Commonwealth, including imposing powers and duties on the Department of Environmental Resources to investigate, classify and provide for the conservation of Pennsylvania wild plant populations.

The CNRA (71 P.S. §§ 1340.101—1340.1103), which, inter alia, created the Department under section 301 of the CNRA (71 P.S. § 1340.301) and under section 501 of the CNRA (71 P.S. § 1340.501) renamed the Department of Environmental Resources as the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), provided that the Department shall exercise the powers and duties conferred upon the Department of Environmental Resources by section 305(a)(9) of the WRCA, including issuing and modifying regulations under section 313(g) of the WRCA.

The Department amends the conservation of Pennsylvania native wild plants regulations to update the following Pennsylvania native wild plant species classification lists, including updating certain scientific names, common names and reference sources: Pennsylvania Extirpated (§ 45.11), Pennsylvania Endangered (§ 45.12), Pennsylvania Threatened (§ 45.13), Pennsylvania Rare (§ 45.14) and Tentatively Undetermined (§ 45.21). The updates to the Pennsylvania native wild plant species classification list include the following: (1) adding plant species to a classification list that are currently unclassified, (2) reclassifying plant species already on a classification list to a new classification and (3) removing plant species from the classification lists altogether (declassifying them).

This final-form rulemaking includes a total of 82 substantive changes to the conservation of Pennsylvania native wild plant regulation species classification lists as follows: (1) 24 currently unclassified native wild plant species will be newly classified, (2) 28 currently classified native wild plant species will be reclassified, including 3 species whose scientific names are changing/being updated (technically these are shown as the "old" name

being unclassified and the "new" name being classified) and (3) 30 currently classified native wild plant species will be unclassified.

The amendments to the Pennsylvania native wild plant species classification lists include updates to the scientific names for three native wild plant species and the common name for one native wild plant species. As botanical taxonomists make new discoveries about species, the Department's standard reference, Ann Fowler Rhoads and Timothy A. Block, The Plants of Pennsylvania: An Illustrated Manual Second Edition (2007), Philadelphia, Pennsylvania: University of Pennsylvania Press (The Plants of Pennsylvania), may not include the most up-to-date nomenclature. In this final-form rulemaking, when the new name is not found in the standard reference, the alternate source is provided in parentheses.

Process of classifying native wild plants in this Commonwealth

Native wild plant species are those plant species that existed in this Commonwealth prior to European settlement. There are approximately 2,800 native wild plant species that currently exist or formerly existed in this Commonwealth. The Department classifies approximately 1/5 of these species because they are a conservation concern. The other 4/5 of these species are considered secure and thus not classified.

The Department begins the process of classifying native wild plants by collecting and analyzing data on native wild plant species in this Commonwealth. The Department uses the following data to make its classification decisions: numbers of populations known in this Commonwealth; number of individuals within populations; the plant's range (within the United States and within this Commonwealth); threats such as pests, invasive species and habitat loss; decrease or increase in population numbers; and taxonomic information. (Note, this list is not exhaustive.) The Department analyzes this data to determine the population, distribution, habitat needs, limiting factors and other biological and ecological information about each plant species.

To make classification decisions, the Department uses data referred to as "State ranks." In this Commonwealth, each plant species receives a State rank from the Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program (Program). The Program assigns these ranks based on a methodology created by NatureServe, an international network of natural heritage programs. The purpose of NatureServe's methodology is to bring consistency to the biodiversity conservation efforts of individuals and organizations throughout the Western Hemisphere. This methodology is used across North America, Central America and South America. By using this standard tool, the Department ensures its evaluation methods are, at a minimum, equivalent to those of other states and countries in the western hemisphere and that its classification decisions are based on sound science.

Throughout this process, the Department also receives data, information and recommendations from the Pennsylvania Biological Survey's Vascular Plant Technical Committee (Committee). The Committee is composed of professional botanists working throughout this Commonwealth in academic, consulting, governmental and conservation organizations. Each year, the Committee makes

classification recommendations for native wild plants based on the research and expertise of its professional botanists

The Department assimilates and reviews all data and recommendations it collects and receives and determines the appropriate classifications for each native wild plant species under the definitions in Chapter 45. This review process occurs continuously, as botanists are continually learning more about native wild plant species populations and threats. The Department will continue to update its classification lists as needed to reflect changes to native wild plant conservation needs.

Native wild plant classifications

How plants are classified determines the "management measures necessary for their continued ability to sustain themselves successfully." (32 P.S. § 5307(a)). Native wild plant species that are at risk of extinction in this Commonwealth need greater protection than those less susceptible to that risk. Chapter 45 designates the level of risk facing Pennsylvania's native wild plant species by classifying them as follows:

Pennsylvania Extirpated (§ 45.11)—A classification of plant species believed to be extinct in this Commonwealth. If a plant species classified as Pennsylvania Extirpated is later found to exist in this Commonwealth, it will automatically be considered classified as Pennsylvania Endangered.

Pennsylvania Endangered (§ 45.12)—A classification of plant species that are in danger of extinction throughout most or all of their natural range in this Commonwealth, if critical habitat is not maintained or if the species is greatly exploited by man. This classification also includes populations of plant species that have been classified as Pennsylvania Extirpated, but are subsequently found to exist in this Commonwealth.

Pennsylvania Threatened (§ 45.13)—A classification of plant species that may become endangered throughout most or all of their natural range in this Commonwealth, if critical habitat is not maintained to prevent their further decline, or if the species is greatly exploited by man.

Pennsylvania Rare (§ 45.14)—A classification of plant species that are uncommon in this Commonwealth because they have low population numbers, or are only found in restricted geographic areas.

Pennsylvania Vulnerable (§ 45.15)—A classification of plant species that are in danger of population decline in this Commonwealth because of their beauty, economic value, use as a cultivar or other factors which indicate that persons may seek to remove these species from their native habitats.

Special Concern Population (§ 45.20)—A classification of plant species that the Department has determined to be a unique occurrence deserving protection. Among the factors used to classify a plant species as a Special Concern Population are the existence of unusual geographic locations, unisexual populations or extraordinarily diverse plant populations.

Tentatively Undetermined (§ 45.21)—A classification of plant species that are in danger of population decline, but do not meet the criteria for any other classification due to taxonomic uncertainties, limited historical records or insufficient data.

Updating species nomenclature

This final-form rulemaking updates the scientific and common names of certain native wild plant species to conform to the Department's taxonomic source material. The Department's reference source for the nomenclature used to identify species taxonomy in Chapter 45 is *The Plants of Pennsylvania*. When the species name is not found there, the reference source will be provided in parentheses. Additionally, this final-form rulemaking corrects minor grammatical errors and misspellings of species names.

Pennsylvania Natural Diversity Inventory

The amendments will be incorporated into the Pennsylvania Natural Diversity Inventory (PNDI). PNDI is a database that maintains the Department's list of native wild plant classifications, as well as native rare wildlife classifications from the Game Commission, the Fish and Boat Commission and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. PNDI provides the most current, reliable and objective scientific information about ecological resources in this Commonwealth and it is used to help inform environmental decisions in this Commonwealth. Most notably, DEP uses PNDI to inform its environmental permitting decisions.

The overwhelming majority of PNDI users use PNDI as part of the process of obtaining a DEP permit. DEP requires permit applicants to screen their land use projects through PNDI for potential impacts to threatened or endangered species to receive a DEP permit. Threatened and endangered plant species are thereby protected by DEP's permitting process.

Although this final-form rulemaking will result in updates to the plant data in PNDI, it will not affect DEP's permitting process. The process of obtaining a DEP permit is beyond the scope of this final-form rulemaking; instead, PNDI's connection to this final-form rulemaking is limited to its use of the plant data that will result from the amendments made by this final-form rulemaking. A person, business, small business or organization will not be required to invest in any additional administrative procedures as a direct result of this final-form rulemaking.

Finally, because this final-form rulemaking removes more species from classifications than it adds, there may be fewer classified plant species for prospective DEP permit applicants to account for when applying for a DEP permit. Depending on the project type, location and classified plant species in question, prospective DEP permit applicants may see no change in the amount of mitigation required to address impacts to threatened and endangered species in fulfilling permit requirements.

The proposed rulemaking was published at 52 Pa.B. 5476 (August 27, 2022). The public comment period closed on September 26, 2022. The Department received no public comments or comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). On October 26, 2022, IRRC advised the Department that IRRC has reviewed the proposed regulation and has no objections, comments or recommendations regarding the same. IRRC also advised that if the Department delivers this final-form rulemaking without revisions, and the Committees do not take any action, the final-form rulemaking will be deemed approved.

Plant Species Name Changes/Updates

The names of the following native wild plant species are changed/updated:

Spiraea betulifolia Pallas var. corymbosa (Raf.) Maxim. is deleted from Pennsylvania Threatened (§ 45.13) classification and Spiraea corymbosa Rafinesque (Source: Flora of the Southeastern United States, Weakley 2020) is added to Pennsylvania Endangered (§ 45.12) classification. Spiraea

corymbosa is the accepted taxonomy for this species and the appropriate classification is Pennsylvania Endangered.

Marshallia grandiflora Beadle & F. E. Boynton is deleted from Pennsylvania Endangered (§ 45.12) classification and Marshallia pulchra W. M. Knapp, D. B. Poind. & Weakley (Source: Flora of the Southeastern United States, Weakley 2020) is added to Pennsylvania Endangered (§ 45.12) classification. The correct name for this

species is *Marshallia pulchra* and the correct classification is Pennsylvania Endangered.

Viola tripartita Elliot is deleted from Tentatively Undetermined (§ 45.21) classification and Viola glaberrima (Ging.) House (Source: Flora of the Southeastern United States, Weakley 2020) is added to Pennsylvania Endangered (§ 45.12) classification. The correct name for these plants is Viola glaberrima and the correct classification is Pennsylvania Endangered.

The common name of *Carex sterilis* Willd. is changed from Atlantic Sedge to Sterile Sedge. Both names are accepted common names. However, the Department prefers Sterile Sedge, as it is a more descriptive name.

Fiscal Impact

Commonwealth. This final-form rulemaking will not have a fiscal impact on this Commonwealth.

Political subdivisions. This final-form rulemaking will not have a fiscal impact on political subdivisions.

Public. This final-form rulemaking will not have a fiscal impact on the public.

Benefits, Costs and Compliance

Benefits. This final-form rulemaking will benefit State, county and municipal conservation planning officials, environmental regulatory agencies, landowners, conservation districts, conservation groups and other organizations concerned with the welfare of the environment, because it more accurately represents the native wild plants in this Commonwealth in need of the most protection. This final-form rulemaking also benefits the citizens of this Commonwealth by protecting this Commonwealth's natural resources, which is a constitutional right. See Pa.Const. Art. I, § 27.

Keeping up-to-date classifications of native wild plants ensures that the Department and other public and private conservation organizations are targeting the appropriate species in their conservation efforts. This will help maintain a healthy biodiversity of ecological systems in this Commonwealth.

Costs and compliance. This final-form rulemaking will not impose additional compliance costs.

Paperwork requirements. There are no additional paperwork requirements associated with this final-form rule-making.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on August 17, 2022, the Department submitted a copy of the proposed rulemaking, published at 52 Pa.B. 5476, to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Environmental Resources and Energy Committees. The Department received no public comments or comments from IRRC.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on July 12, 2023, this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. As the Department delivered the final-form regulation without revisions, and the Committees did not take any action, the final-form regulation was deemed approved by IRRC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on July 13, 2023, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Effective Date

The regulation will become effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Findings

The Department finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the regulations has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202), referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law, and regulations promulgated thereunder at 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).
- (2) At least a 30-day public comment period was provided as required by law and no public comments were submitted.
- (3) This final-form rulemaking does not enlarge the purpose of the proposed rulemaking published at 52 Pa.B. 5476.
- (4) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing acts identified in this preamble.

Order

The Department, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (1) The regulations of the Department, 17 Pa. Code Chapter 45, are amended by amending §§ 45.11—45.14 and 45.21 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (2) The Department shall submit this final-form rule-making and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as to legality, as required by law.
- (3) The Department shall submit this final-form rule-making and Annex A to IRRC and the House and Senate Committees, as required by law.
- (4) The Department shall certify this final-form rule-making and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (5) This final-form rulemaking shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CHS. 57, 63, 71, 71a AND 73]

Fishing; Propagation and Introduction of Fish into Commonwealth Waters

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) deletes Chapters 71 and 73. The Commission regulated the introduction and transportation of fish into this Commonwealth through Chapters 71 and 73. In addition, both chapters contained provisions concerning artificial propagation, stocking of Commission fish, prohibited species, triploid grass carp and species susceptible to viral hemorrhagic septicemia (VHS). This final-form rulemaking updates the regulations to address current conservation challenges, improve fisheries management and fish health, and simplify the chapters for consistency, flow and ease. Therefore, the addition of new provisions, such as a Notice of Stocking (NOS), retention of some existing language, and the consolidation of Chapters 71 and 73 into a single chapter accomplishes the goals set forth.

To facilitate the implementation of an NOS, fish health requirements and watercraft inspection necessities, the Commission submits this final-form rulemaking that deletes and reserves Chapters 71 and 73 and adds Chapter 71a (relating to propagation and introduction of fish into Commonwealth waters). The Commission also submits final-form rulemaking amendments for §§ 57.8a and 63.51 (relating to Class A wild trout streams; and sale of VHS-susceptible species of fish) that update the citations to align with Chapter 71a. This final-form rulemaking is set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective Date

Unless otherwise specified in Chapter 71a, this final-form rulemaking will go into effect January 1, 2024.

C. Statutory Authority

The Commission is publishing this final-form rule-making under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). The deletion of Chapters 71 and 73, the addition of Chapter 71a and the amendments to §§ 57.8a and 63.51 are published under the statutory authority of section 2102(a) and (c) of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

In this Commonwealth, thousands of lakes, ponds and stream sections are stocked by private individuals each year. To improve the Commission's understanding of stockings occurring in this Commonwealth, protect aquatic resources and address increased risks associated with aquatic invasive species and pathogens, there is a need to collect information on non-Commission fish stockings occurring in this Commonwealth. Commission staff have undertaken an effort to improve management and oversight of fish and aquatic life transportation and stocking in this Commonwealth through the development of an NOS.

In the United States, over 30 states have requirements for tracking how and when fish are stocked in state waters. Notably, all states in the Northeast except Pennsylvania, require some form of documentation when individuals or entities stock fish in state waters. Section 2102 of the code allows the Commission to develop rules and regulations concerning fish and fishing in waters of this Commonwealth, and for the protection, preservation and management of fish and fish habitat. Regulations may be developed for the transport, introduction, import and export of fish, as well as inspection for disease. Section 73.1 addressed this topic; however, there is need for updated regulations to ensure adequate protection, preservation and management of aquatic resources are in place.

In conjunction with the creation of the NOS, Commission staff have also developed a fish health inspection protocol to provide additional protection to the Commonwealth's aquatic resources, prevent the introduction of serious pathogens not known to be present in this Commonwealth, and to control the spread and the prevalence of pathogens already present in this Commonwealth. The Commission recognizes that the NOS requirement, fish health inspection protocol and accompanying regulations will result in changes to the stockings undertaken by private individuals and the aquaculture industry. Implementation of an NOS and applicable fish health requirements will strike a balance of avoiding serious ecological and financial damages to this Commonwealth's aquatic resources and aquaculture industry, while still allowing interested persons to stock fish for angling purposes.

In addition to stocking and fish health necessities, watercraft inspection requirements can prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species by watercraft throughout this Commonwealth. For example, in 2021, invasive zebra mussels were discovered in Raystown Lake in Huntingdon County and were likely introduced by a watercraft. Boaters (with limited exceptions) will be required to drain live wells and bilges by removing the drain plug before transporting watercraft away from a water of this Commonwealth. Moreover, boaters will be prohibited from placing a watercraft, trailer or related equipment into a water of this Commonwealth if aquatic plants or prohibited species are present. At least 19 states have created watercraft inspection or decontamination programs.

In addition, Commission staff have created a regulatory section that prohibits the release or disposal of live bait fish into waters of this Commonwealth. An individual may continue to collect live bait fish for angling purposes, provided that a bait fish species is not transferred into another drainage the species is not already present.

Besides the creation of new regulatory provisions as outlined previously, Commission staff retained several existing sections from Chapters 71 and 73 relating to closed system propagation, introduction and transportation of VHS-susceptible species, stocking of designated waters and Commission fish, triploid grass carp requirements and prohibited species. Through the inclusion of new sections and the retention of existing language, Commission staff believe Chapter 71a provides adequate protection for this Commonwealth's aquatic resources in relation to current conservation challenges, aligns with the regulations of several neighboring states, and provides improved flow and clarity for regulatory interpretation

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 52 Pa.B. 3423 (June 18, 2022). The Commission received a total of 1,073 public comments regarding the initial proposal: 88 supported the proposal, 56 supported por-

tions of the proposal, 523 opposed the proposal, 306 opposed portions of the proposal and 100 did not pertain to the proposal. Upon consideration of these comments, feedback received from numerous stakeholders and public, and further review of the proposed rulemaking brought before the Commission at the April 25, 2022, quarterly Commission meeting, the Commission conducted Fisheries and Hatcheries Committee meetings on September 28, 2022; January 4, 2023; April 5, 2023; and June 27, 2023, to further consider and refine the proposal. In addition to Commission and committee meetings, Commission staff actively pursued outreach efforts to solicit additional feedback from various stakeholders through participation and presentation at multiple meetings with the Pennsylvania Aquaculture Advisory Committee, the Department of Agriculture, Commission cooperative nurseries and private fishing clubs. Throughout this process, revised drafts of the proposal were shared with stakeholders to solicit feedback.

E. Summary of Changes

The broad rationale for the proposed changes is set forth previously in the Purpose and Background section. After multiple Commission Board and Committee meetings and multiple opportunities for public comment, amendments were made to this final-form rulemaking to address concerns brought forth by the public and industry. Those changes narrow the scope of the original proposed rulemaking as it was published at 52 Pa.B. 3423 and include:

§ 71a.1. Authority and definitions

• Definition of "ornamental pond" is added to clarify what is not subject to an NOS requirement.

§ 71a.2. General

• This section is updated to reflect an NOS requirement, instead of a stocking authorization.

§ 71a.3. Fish propagation and introductions list

• Replaces stocking authorization language with "written approval from Commission" for potential stocking of genetically modified fish because of the NOS update.

§ 71a.5. Notice of Stocking to the Commission

- Eliminates reference to a stocking authorization for consistency and put focus on an NOS requirement to gather stocking data.
- Eliminates language requiring a person to ensure water used to transport fish was free of injurious pathogens due to the practical challenges of testing and compliance.
- Eliminates language that a stocking authorization may be amended by the Commission because an NOS will not require approval to stock.
- Eliminates all language referring to staff review, appeals, procedure and final agency action on a stocking authorization because an NOS will not be approved or denied by staff.
- Updates the effective date of the section to make the NOS effective on January 1, 2024.
- Inserts language to clarify species approved for stocking through an NOS includes those on the Propagation and Introduction list (for example: a stray bluegill is stocked on a truck full of bass but both species can be stocked Statewide).
- Inserts a subsection that uses identical language as in deleted § 73.1 with a focus on not stocking fish species

in watersheds where they are not present, as well as reserving authority for the agency to require fish health inspections on lots of fish transported into this Commonwealth.

- Inserts a subsection clarifying an NOS does not allow individuals to stock waters with fish currently prohibited from stocking.
- § 71a.6. Fish health certificate requirements
- Eliminates language that prohibits fish from being stocked with visible lesions, hemorrhaging, fungi and signs of disease because aquaculture propagators currently engage in the practice of stocking healthy fish.
- Updates the effective date of the fish health protocol to January 1, 2026.
- § 71a.7. Introduction or transportation of VHS-susceptible species of fish
- Updates the definition of "VHS-susceptible species" to include the World Organization for Animal Health's Aquatic Manual and species listed in the Commission's Propagation and Introduction list.
- § 71a.11. Prohibited species
- Removes reference to aquatic noxious weeds in the prohibited species list because of enforcement challenges and plant identification difficulties; instead, the watercraft inspection requirements section will have the same practical effect.
- Removes New Zealand mudsnail from the prohibited species list because of organisms in trade limitations and compliance challenges.
- § 71a.13. Bait fish importation and use
- Replaces stocking authorization language with NOS language.

To facilitate the implementation of an NOS, fish health requirements and watercraft inspection necessities, the Commission deletes and reserves Chapters 71 and 73 and adds Chapter 71a. The Commission amends §§ 57.8a and 63.51 to update the citations to align with Chapter 71a.

F. Paperwork

This final-form rulemaking will increase paperwork and will create new paperwork requirements in that persons intending to stock fish in waters of this Commonwealth will submit an NOS to the Commission. In addition, persons transporting fish into this Commonwealth or stocking fish in the waters of this Commonwealth, may be required to possess a fish health certificate when conducting those activities to ensure fish are free of specific pathogens, diseases or parasites.

G. Fiscal Impact

This final-form rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. This final-form rulemaking will have an estimated adverse impact of approximately \$1.3 million on the Commission. This is the cost to develop, implement and maintain the proposed NOS process and will be spread over 7 fiscal years. In addition, this final-form rulemaking will impose new costs on the private sector in that prior to fish being imported into this Commonwealth or stocked in waters of this Commonwealth, the fish or artificial propagation facility where the fish are raised will have to be tested and certified as negative for specific pathogens, diseases and parasites as determined by the Commission. Many of these requirements are already in place in neighboring states.

H. Public Comments

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 52 Pa.B. 3423. The Commission received a total of 1,073 public comments regarding the initial proposal: 88 supported the proposal, 56 supported portions of the proposal, 523 opposed the proposal, 306 opposed portions of the proposal and 100 did not pertain to the proposal.

Four themes emerged in the public comments supporting the proposed rulemaking. The first was that the unauthorized stocking of streams by individuals and clubs can be detrimental to the native populations and is vital for fisheries managers to understand what is being introduced into the waters of this Commonwealth. Second was that regulation is necessary to prevent the introduction and spread of aquatic invasive species. Third was support for the stocking authorization and the NOS as there is significant justification for requiring approval of fish being introduced to the waters of this Commonwealth by private stockings. Finally, the fourth theme was that the proposed rule would not diminish opportunities for private stockings or inhibit private hatcheries from raising and supplying fish. The Commission agrees with these four themes.

Five themes emerged in the public comments opposed to the proposed rulemaking. The first was that, as written, the proposed rule created additional barriers to those wanting to stock fish in this Commonwealth and created a situation of impossible compliance causing individuals or groups, or both, stocking fish to stop stocking or violate the regulations. The Commission addressed these concerns by removing the requirement to receive an approved stocking authorization from the Commission and replaced it with the NOS that does not require Commission approval.

The second theme in opposition was that no economic impact analysis was completed to determine the economic effect on the commercial fish farming industry, Pennsylvania fishing clubs, tourism or the general public. The Commission addressed this concern by developing a nofee NOS that does not require approval to stock fish in waters of this Commonwealth. Furthermore, the Commission determined there would be no negative fiscal impact to the Commonwealth or political subdivisions.

The third theme in opposition was that the stocking authorization should not be included in the rulemaking. The Commission agreed.

The fourth theme in opposition was that stocking by private individuals, groups and cooperative nurseries have supplemented trout stockings for years with very little, or no, adverse effects. The Commission agrees that this Commonwealth has not yet experienced an adverse effect; however, the proposed rulemaking was designed as a proactive measure to lower the likelihood of a future adverse effect.

The fifth and final theme in opposition was that regulations already require fish being transported into this Commonwealth to be tested for diseases, parasites and aquatic invasive species, in-State hatcheries are constantly monitored for fish health, and there are regulations for which species of fish can be stocked and in which bodies of water. The Commission acknowledges that these regulations exist; however, these regulations are insufficient in regard to the protection of this Commonwealth's aquatic resources in relation to current conservation challenges and alignment with the regulations of several neighboring states.

The Commission addressed the comments received through the revisions it made to the proposed rulemaking, which are detailed previously in the Summary of Changes section, that narrowed the scope of the regulation.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendment adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law, and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).
- (2) A public comment period was provided and public comments were received.
- (3) The adoption of the amendment of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (A) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 57, 63, 71, 71a and 73, are amended by amending § 57.8a and 63.51, adding §§ 71a.1—71a.14 and deleting §§ 71.1—71.8 and 73.1—73.3 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.
- (B) The Executive Director will submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality and form as required by law.
- (C) The Executive Director shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (D) This order shall take effect January 1, 2024, unless otherwise specified in Chapter 71a.

§ 57.8a. Class A wild trout streams.

It is the policy of the Commission to manage selfsustaining Class A wild trout populations as a renewable natural resource to conserve that resource and the angling it provides. Class A wild trout populations represent

the best of this Commonwealth's naturally reproducing trout fisheries. With rare exceptions, these stream sections are managed solely for the perpetuation of the wild trout fishery with no stocking. However, there may be circumstances that justify stocking a Class A wild trout stream. Prior to granting permission to stock a Class A wild trout stream under § 71a.8 (relating to stocking of designated waters), the Executive Director will consult internal decision-making criteria set forth in the Operational Guidelines for the Management of Trout Fisheries in Pennsylvania Waters to consider the need for continued stocking at newly designated Class A wild trout streams and obtain the approval of the Commission. Consideration will only be given to requests for continued stocking in stream sections within 1 year of the section being designated as Class A and posted in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*; however, entities that previously received an exemption or a Special Activities Permit for continued stocking from the Commission between 2010 and the effective date of this amendment will be eligible for consideration.

71a.2. General.

§ 71a.1. Authority and definitions.

- (a) Authority. Under section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations), the Commission may promulgate rules and regulations to preserve, protect and enhance the fishery interests of the Commonwealth.
- (b) Definitions. The following words, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.

Department—The Department of Agriculture of this Commonwealth.

Diploid-Having two haploid sets of homologous chromosomes.

Genetically modified—An organism whose genome, chromosomal or extrachromosomal, is modified permanently and heritably, using recombinant nucleic acid techniques and includes the progeny of any genetically modified organism derived therefrom.

Grass carp—Ctenophryngodon idella, also known as white amur.

Ornamental pond—An outdoor pond constructed as an aesthetic landscape feature that has a closed system of water circulation with no risk of contacting the surface waters of this Commonwealth; this does not include aquaculture facilities, ponds constructed to provide fishing opportunity, or ponds used for the confinement or production of baitfish.

Triploid—Having three haploid sets of homologous chromosomes.

§ 71a.2. General.

No species of fish may be introduced into waters of this Commonwealth, unless baited on a hook for angling purposes, without prior submission of a Notice of Stocking to the Commission on a form prescribed by the Commission. For the purposes of this subsection, "waters of this Commonwealth" does not include waters contained within a property or premise of a propagation or dealer facility licensed under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4201—4223 (relating to Aquaculture Development Law). Fish health certification requirements provided in § 71a.6 (relating to fish health certificate requirements) shall be adhered to, when applicable.

§ 71a.3. Fish propagation and introduction list.

- (a) General. The Bureau of Fisheries will maintain a list of species by watershed for which the Department may issue registrations for artificial propagation and registrations for dealers of live aquatic animals. The Director of the Bureau of Fisheries may update or modify the list of authorized species by adding species to, or deleting species from, the list as necessary to provide for the protection and management of fish and fishing in this Commonwealth. The Commission will provide the list to the Department on or before January 31 each year and whenever the Commission updates or modifies the list. Copies of the list of authorized species are available upon request from the Fish and Boat Commission, Bureau of Fisheries, 595 East Rolling Ridge Drive, Bellefonte, Pennsylvania 16823.
 - (b) Grass carp.
- (1) It is unlawful to propagate grass carp, diploid or triploid, in this Commonwealth.
- (2) The introduction or importation of grass carp into this Commonwealth or waters of this Commonwealth is prohibited, except that triploid grass carp may be introduced as provided in § 71a.10 (relating to triploid grass carp)
- (c) Genetically modified fish. A genetically modified fish may not be propagated and introduced into waters of this Commonwealth, without prior written approval from the Commission.

§ 71a.4. Closed system propagation.

- (a) Closed (no discharge) system.
- (1) A propagating system may be designated as a closed system only if all of the following criteria are met:
- (i) There will be 100% recycling water as normal operations.

- (ii) The system will be housed indoors in a structure enclosed by solid walls, floor and roof. For purposes of this subsection, a wall, floor or roof will be considered solid if it is constructed and maintained to prevent unauthorized human or animal intrusions into the closed system facility and to prevent release or escape of aquatic organisms from the closed system.
- (iii) Water can be added to the system only for making up evaporative loss, cleaning and fish harvesting or to reduce toxic ammonia/nitrates by diluting.
- (iv) The system does not discharge water into waters of this Commonwealth.
- (v) No live fish or live fish eggs may be allowed to escape with water discharges. Accidental spillage of live fish or live fish eggs, including truck loading, and the like, will be contained within the facility in a manner that will prevent fish and fish eggs from escaping into the waters of this Commonwealth.
- (vi) The system operator is registered with the Department.
- (2) The Department will notify the Commission when it receives an application to register a proposed closed system, and the Commission may, within 30 days of receipt of the notice, inspect the system to ensure that it is designed and constructed in a manner to prevent escapement of live fish or live fish eggs into the waters of this Commonwealth. Closed systems registered under this subsection shall, in addition to an initial inspection, be subject to inspection at any time to ensure compliance with the requirements of this section and the Commission may issue an order to suspend operations of any closed system when an inspection discloses that it is not in compliance.
- (3) The Commission will invite the Department's Aquaculture Advisory Committee or a subcommittee thereof to draft and periodically update construction guidelines for closed system propagators to help them ensure enclosed facilities prevent escape of aquatic organisms into the waters of this Commonwealth. These guidelines will assist registered propagators in the design, construction and maintenance of closed systems and will assist the Commission in inspecting these systems.
- (b) Systems with discharges rendered incapable of containing living organisms. A system whose discharge of water is rendered incapable of containing self-perpetuating living organisms shall be registered with the Department. The Department will notify the Commission when it receives an application to register a proposed system under this subsection, and the Commission may, within 30 days of receipt of the notice, inspect the system to ensure that it is designed and constructed so that its discharge is rendered incapable of containing live fish or live fish eggs. Systems registered under this subsection shall, in addition to an initial inspection, be subject to inspection at any time to ensure compliance with this section and the Commission may issue an order to suspend operations of any system when an inspection discloses that it is not in compliance. The registration of this system may include any species of fish with the approval of the Department.
- (c) Escape of fish into waters of this Commonwealth. It is unlawful for an operator of any system registered under subsection (a) or subsection (b) to allow fish to escape into the waters of this Commonwealth.
- (d) Written plans for discharge. An operator of any system registered under subsection (a) or subsection (b)

shall develop, maintain and make available for immediate inspection by the Commission and the Department upon request a written plan for containing or treating discharge in the event of a discharge system failure.

(e) Notification in event of discharge. An operator of any system registered under subsection (a) or subsection (b) shall notify both the Commission's Director of the Bureau of Fisheries and the Department's Aquaculture Coordinator immediately in the event of a discharge system failure that is likely to contain viable living organisms.

§ 71a.5. Notice of Stocking to the Commission.

(a) General

- (1) No person may introduce any species of fish into waters of this Commonwealth (except baited on a hook for angling purposes) without prior submission of a Notice of Stocking to the Commission. For the purposes of this subsection, "waters of this Commonwealth" does not include waters contained within a property or premise of a propagation or dealer facility licensed under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4201—4223 (relating to Aquacultural Development Law). Persons who notify the Commission of an intent to stock fish through a Notice of Stocking should also ensure that fish intending to be stocked are limited to those listed on the Notice of Stocking and the Commission's Species by Watershed Approved for Open System (Flow Through) Propagation and Introductions list. An electronic or hard copy of the Notice of Stocking shall be present at the location during the time fish are stocked. In the event the person(s) who filed a Notice of Stocking is not present during the time of stocking, an entity stocking fish on behalf of the authorized person shall possess a copy of the Notice of Stocking.
- (2) In addition to the Notice of Stocking requirement set forth in paragraph (1), species of fish may not be transported into this Commonwealth from another state, province or country and liberated in a watershed of this Commonwealth without previous written permission from the Commission, nor may a species of fish be transferred from waters in this Commonwealth into another drainage of this Commonwealth where this particular species is not always present without prior written consent from the Commission. Inspection for species composition or presence of disease, or both, will be required at the discretion of the Commission on all lots of fish transported into this Commonwealth. Written permission from the Commission may be obtained by sending a request to the Executive Director, P.O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17106.
 - (3) The following apply:
- (i) The following do not require submission of a Notice
- (A) Fish not on a Commission prohibited species list and raised and sold for the intended uses of indoor aquaria.
- (B) Fee fishing operations located on the same property as a propagation facility licensed under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4201—4223.

- (C) Outdoor ornamental ponds not discharging into a water of this Commonwealth.
- (ii) Species obtained through or originating from pet stores or tropical and ornamental fish dealers may not be released into waters of this Commonwealth.
- (4) Submission of a Notice of Stocking does not authorize individuals or organizations to stock waters that are prohibited from stocking as defined in §§ 57.8a (relating to Class A wild trout streams) and 71a.8 (relating to stocking of designated waters).
- (b) Notice of Stocking Form. A Notice of Stocking shall be made on a form prescribed by the Commission. In addition to the information required under 1 Pa. Code § 35.2 (relating to contents of applications), persons notifying the Commission of intent to stock must provide other information as may be required by the Commission to fully describe the details of the planned stocking.
- (c) Exceptions. Exceptions from a Notice of Stocking submission will require prior written approval from the Executive Director or their designee.
- (d) Effective Date. Beginning on January 1, 2024, the provisions of § 71a.5(a)—(c) shall be effective.

§ 71a.6. Fish health certificate requirements.

- (a) A fish health certificate may be required, as specified in subsection (b), for fish being imported into this Commonwealth and shall certify fish intending to be introduced, place or stocked in waters of this Commonwealth are free of specific diseases, pathogens or parasites determined by the Commission to be of a risk to the fishery interests of the Commonwealth. The Commission will consult with the Department for potential testing of dangerous transmissible diseases of fish.
- (b) The Commission shall develop a Fish Health Inspection Protocol for Importation into the Commonwealth and Introduction into Waters of this Commonwealth (protocol). The Commission shall determine which diseases, pathogens or parasites are required for testing for species of fish intending to be introduced into waters of this Commonwealth. The Commission will consult with the Department for potential testing of dangerous transmissible diseases of fish. Fish health certification requirements and procedures shall be modified or updated by the Commission, as necessary. When updates to the protocol occur, the Commission shall publish the protocol as a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and notify the Department of the changes.
- (c) The Commission may require testing for intrastate introduction, placement or stocking of fish, as specified in subsection (b), to prevent the introduction or spread of specific diseases, pathogens or parasites that pose a risk to the fishery interests of the Commonwealth. The Commission will consult with the Department for potential testing of dangerous transmissible diseases of fish.
- (d) The following fish health requirements apply to the importation of fish into this Commonwealth:
- (1) Fish and fish eggs imported into this Commonwealth must originate from sources with a copy of the fish health certification report for all applicable fish being stocked as indicated in the protocol, or a copy of the fish health certification report for the artificial propagation facility if the fish are from a facility that has been

certified as having tested negative for all applicable fish pathogens, unless the fish meet one of the following requirements:

- (i) The fish are being transported through this Commonwealth, the shipping container remains bio-secure in transit, and the fish are accompanied by documentation stating the point of origin of the fish and the location outside of this Commonwealth where they are to be delivered.
- (ii) The fish are being transported to facilities located within this Commonwealth for testing and scientific purposes, the persons transporting the fish have taken adequate measures to prevent escape and to disinfect discharged water and equipment used in the transportation of the fish, and the fish are accompanied in transit by documentation stating the point of origin of the fish and the destination where they are to be delivered for testing or scientific purposes.
- (iii) The fish are being transported to a slaughter facility, processing plant or restaurant within this Commonwealth, and the fish are accompanied in transit by documentation stating the point of origin of the fish and the destination where they are to be delivered for slaughter, processing or consumption.
- (iv) The fish are dead, recreationally caught fish that are being transported solely for the purpose of human consumption or taxidermy.
- (2) Specific testing requirements may vary depending on the species of fish, geographical location of the shipping facility or source, and the final designated end use of the fish being imported into this Commonwealth. The Commission's protocol shall specify these requirements.
- (3) Documentation of testing results shall remain with the fish during transport and produced upon request.
- (e) The following fish health requirements apply to the introduction of fish into waters of this Commonwealth:
- (1) Fish being introduced into waters of this Commonwealth must originate from sources that comply with the fish health inspection process described in the Commission's protocol.
- (2) Specific testing requirements may vary depending on the species, origin and final location of where the fish are being introduced into waters of this Commonwealth. The Commission's protocol shall specify these requirements.
- (3) When applicable, persons who have filed a Notice of Stocking with the Commission or their agent shall have in their possession, and present upon the request of an officer authorized to enforce the code:
- (i) a copy of the fish health certification report for all applicable fish being stocked as indicated in the protocol and the Notice of Stocking; or
- (ii) the Notice of Stocking and a copy of the fish health certification report for the artificial propagation facility if the fish are from a facility that has been certified as having tested negative for all applicable fish pathogens as indicated in the protocol and Notice of Stocking.
- (f) The Commission grants a grace period for full implementation of the protocol through December 31, 2025. Beginning on January 1, 2026, the provisions of this section and the protocol shall be effective.

§ 71a.7. Introduction or transportation of VHS-susceptible species of fish.

(a) Intrastate transportation. It is unlawful to introduce, transport or cause the transportation of VHS-

- susceptible species of fish from the portion of the Lake Erie watershed in this Commonwealth into other watersheds of this Commonwealth, except in accordance with § 69.3(b) and (d) (relating to transportation, introduction and sale of VHS-susceptible species of fish out of the Lake Erie watershed).
- (b) Interstate transportation. It is unlawful to introduce, transport or cause the transportation into the waters of this Commonwealth VHS-susceptible species of fish from a VHS-affected or VHS-at risk region or VHS-affected or VHS-at risk state unless the fish meet the requirements one of the following requirements:
- (1) The fish are from a group of fish certified as having tested negative for VHS or are from an artificial propagation facility certified as having tested negative for VHS in accordance with the testing protocols adopted by the Department and approved by the Commission. Persons transporting these fish shall have in their possession, and present upon the request of an officer authorized to enforce the code, a copy of the fish health certification reports for all VHS-susceptible fish being transported or a copy of the fish health certification report for the artificial propagation facility if the fish are from a facility that has been certified as having tested negative for VHS.
- (2) The fish are being transported through this Commonwealth and the shipping container including a tank, trailer, holding vessel or other container remains biosecure in transit and the fish are accompanied in transit by documentation stating the point of origin of the fish and the location outside of this Commonwealth to which they are to be delivered.
 - (3) All of the following apply:
- (i) The fish are being transported to facilities located within this Commonwealth for testing and scientific purposes.
- (ii) The persons transporting the fish have taken adequate measures to prevent escape and to disinfect discharged water and equipment used in the transportation of the fish.
- (iii) The fish are accompanied in transit by documentation stating the point of origin of the fish and the destination to which they are to be delivered for testing or scientific purposes.
- (4) The fish are being transported to a slaughter facility, processing plant or restaurant within this Commonwealth and the fish are accompanied in transit by documentation stating the point of origin of the fish and the destination to which they are to be delivered for slaughter, processing or consumption.
- (5) The fish are dead, recreationally caught fish that are being transported solely for the purpose of human consumption.
 - (c) International movement.
- (1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), it is unlawful to import or cause the importation of VHS-susceptible species of fish into this Commonwealth from a VHS-affected or VHS-at risk region.
- (2) VHS-susceptible species of dead fish may be imported into the United States if the fish are recreationally caught and are for human consumption.
- (d) *Definitions*. The following terms, when used in this section, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

VHS-affected or VHS-at risk region—Includes the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Quebec or other region that the Animal and Plant Inspection Services of the United States Department of Agriculture (APHIS) later designates by order, or the Commission later defines by notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* as being a VHS-affected region or VHS-at risk region.

VHS-affected or VHS-at risk state—Includes Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Ohio and Wisconsin or other state that APHIS later designates by order, or the Commission later defines by notice in the Pennsylvania Bulletin as being a VHS-affected state or VHS-at risk state.

VHS-susceptible species—Those listed as a susceptible host species by the World Organization for Animal Health's Aquatic Manual and listed on the Commission's Species by Watershed Approved for Open System (Flow Through) Propagation and Introductions list or as the Commission defines by notice in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. The term:

- (1) Includes fish that are dead or alive, preserved or unpreserved, and the parts of the fish.
 - (2) Does not include the eggs of these species.

§ 71a.8. Stocking of designated waters.

It is unlawful to introduce, place or stock fish in waters that have been designated by the Commission as catch and release, wilderness trout or wild trout management waters except with the express written consent of the Executive Director or their designee. This section does not prohibit a person from returning fish unharmed to the waters from which they were caught or taken.

§ 71a.9. Improper stocking of Commission fish.

When stocking fish reared or salvaged by the Commission or a cooperative nursery recognized by the Commission, the following acts are prohibited:

- (1) Failure to stock fish in waters designated by Commission personnel.
- (2) Diversion of fish to be stocked to waters not open or accessible to free public fishing.
- (3) Mishandling or misuse of fish being stocked in a manner so as to damage or destroy the fish.

§ 71a.10. Triploid grass carp.

- (a) Policy. As a limited exception to the prohibition of grass carp in this Commonwealth, it is the policy of the Commission to permit triploid grass carp, certified by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and procured from a producer participating in the USFWS certification program, to be introduced into Commonwealth waters and imported and transported into this Commonwealth in accordance with this section.
 - (b) Status. The triploid grass carp is not a game fish.
 - (c) Permit required.
- (1) The Commission finds, under section 2904 of the code (relating to permits for protection and management of particular fish), that permits shall be required for possessing triploid grass carp or introducing them into Commonwealth waters and for importing or transporting triploid grass carp into this Commonwealth to provide for proper protection and management of these fish and other fish in the waters of this Commonwealth. A pond owner, landowner or other person who wishes to possess triploid grass carp and introduce them into a pond or waters located on property owned, leased or otherwise

- controlled by the person shall, before placing triploid grass carp in the waters, obtain from the Commission a triploid grass carp possession/introduction permit, for a fee of \$85. A person who wishes to import triploid grass carp into this Commonwealth shall, before doing so, obtain from the Commission a triploid grass carp importation/transportation permit, for a fee of \$85. Permits shall be applied for on forms supplied by the Commission. Live triploid grass carp imported and intended for introduction into waters of this Commonwealth shall be in compliance with § 71a.6 (relating to fish health certificate requirements).
- (2) A person aggrieved by a Commission staff action on a permit application may appeal under Chapter 51, Subchapter E (relating to permit procedures) and 1 Pa. Code Part II (relating to the General Rules of Administrative Practice and Procedure).
- (d) Dealers and importers. In addition to the triploid grass carp permit required by subsection (c), dealers and importers shall obtain and maintain all licenses, permits and registrations required by the Department for the sale or transportation of fish.
 - (e) Restrictions on introduction of triploid grass carp.
- (1) The Commission will not approve the stocking or release of triploid grass carp into a water body wholly or partially in this Commonwealth that is currently known to be inhabited by a species of animal or plant currently listed as status endangered, threatened, candidate or other special concern status, by a state or Federal agency with jurisdiction for the species, without prior written approval for the stocking or release by the agency or agencies which classified the species as endangered, threatened, candidate or of special concern.
- (2) The Commission will not approve stocking or release of triploid grass carp into wetlands under Federal or state jurisdiction except in compliance with applicable Federal or state regulations including, when required, the written approval for the stocking or release by the involved agency or agencies.
- (3) The Commission will not approve stocking or release of triploid grass carp into a body of water more than 5 acres in surface area until the applicant submits an environmental inspection report prepared by a biologist, fisheries scientist or environmental scientist acceptable to the Commission. The environmental inspection report shall include all of the following:
- (i) A certification that the preparer has personally inspected the pond or body of water and that the stocking of triploid grass carp will have no adverse environmental impacts on the waters where stocked or waters upstream or downstream of the waters.
- (ii) A description of the measures taken by the applicant to prevent the escape of the grass carp into waters upstream or downstream of the stocked waters.
- (iii) Additional information as the Commission may require.
- (4) The Commission may require an applicant for a permit to stock triploid grass carp in a pond or body of water of 5 or less acres in surface area to submit an environmental inspection report in the format described in paragraph (3) when the staff's review of the application indicates that further inspection or review of the proposed stocking is appropriate under the circumstances.
- (5) The issuance of permits under this section will be subject to the public notice and comment provisions of Chapter 51, Subchapter E.

- (f) Prohibited acts.
- (1) It is unlawful to transport, import, possess or introduce triploid grass carp in this Commonwealth unless the person possessing, transporting, importing or introducing the grass carp obtains and maintains required permits, possesses a valid bill of sale or bill of origin from a producer participating in the USFWS triploid grass carp certification program and the grass carp are certified by the USFWS to be triploid grass carp. Permits shall be displayed upon request to an officer authorized to enforce the code or this part. The certification of triploid status shall be obtained from the producer at the time of purchase.
- (2) Persons, organizations or companies are prohibited from giving, trading or exchanging triploid grass carp except to persons holding valid triploid grass carp possession/introduction permits.
- (g) Revocation or suspension of permits. Failure to abide by regulations, permits and permit conditions pertinent to triploid grass carp possession, transportation and introduction may result in suspension or revocation of the applicable permits in accordance with Chapter 51, Subchapter C (relating to suspension, denial or revocation of licenses, permits, registrations or privileges). Revocation or suspension shall be in addition to other applicable penalties provided by law or regulation.

Subchapter D. PROHIBITED SPECIES, AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES AND VECTOR PREVENTION

71a.11. Prohibited species.

71a.12. Watercraft requirements and prohibitions.

71a.13. Bait fish importation and use.

§ 71a.11. Prohibited species.

- (a) It is unlawful to introduce, import, possess or transport in or through this Commonwealth, or the waters of this Commonwealth, the following species:
 - (1) Snakeheads (all species).
 - (2) Black carp (Mylopharyngodon piceus).
 - (3) Bighead carp (Hypophthalmichtys nobilis).
 - (4) Silver carp (Hypophthalmichtys molitrix).
 - (5) Zebra mussel (Dreissena polymorpha).
 - (6) Quagga mussel (Dreissena rostriformis bugensis).
 - (7) Round goby (Neogobius melanostomus).
- (8) Freshwater tubenose goby (Proterorhinus semi-lunaris).
 - (9) European rudd (Scardinius erythrophthalmus).
- (10) Crayfish (all live species), except when any of the following apply:
- (i) Possessed and used as bait on, in or about the water from which taken.
- (ii) Possessed or imported for testing and scientific purposes or restaurant consumption, adequate measures have been taken to prevent their escape, and they are accompanied by documentation stating the point of origin and the destination to which they are to be delivered.
- (iii) Dead with the head removed or salted and dried for angling purposes.
 - (11) Ruffe (Gymnocephalus cernua).
- (b) Exceptions. Species in subsection (a)(1)—(4) may be possessed in this Commonwealth for the purposes of consumption or slaughter only. Other exceptions for spe-

cies in subsection (a) shall require prior written approval from the Commission's Executive Director.

§ 71a.12. Watercraft requirements and prohibitions.

- (a) General. No person may intentionally place or attempt to place a watercraft, trailer or water-related equipment into waters of this Commonwealth, including aquatic plant harvesting or control equipment, that has aquatic plants or prohibited species attached, in whole or in part, except as provided in this section.
 - (b) Removal and confinement.
- (1) A waterways conservation officer may order the following:
- (i) The removal of aquatic plants or prohibited species listed in § 71a.11(a) (relating to prohibited species) from a watercraft, trailer or water-related equipment before being transported or before it is placed into waters of this Commonwealth.
- (ii) Confinement of the watercraft at a mooring, dock or other location until the related equipment is removed from the water.
- (iii) Removal of watercraft from a water of this Commonwealth to remove prohibited invasive species if the water has not been listed by the Commission as being infected with that species.
- (iv) A prohibition on placing a watercraft into a water of this Commonwealth when the watercraft has aquatic plants or prohibited invasive species attached in violation of subsection (a) or when water has not been drained or the drain plug has not been removed in violation of subsection (c).
 - (v) Decontamination of a watercraft, if possible, on site.
- (2) An order for removal of prohibited invasive species under paragraph (1)(i) or decontamination of a watercraft under paragraph (1)(v) may include issuing a notice that specifies a time frame for completing the removal or decontamination, and re-inspection of the watercraft.
 - (c) Persons transporting watercraft.
- (1) When leaving a water of this Commonwealth, a person must drain a watercraft holding water (including those without plugs) and live wells and bilges by removing the drain plug before transporting the watercraft. Transporting includes moving the watercraft over land between connected or unconnected waterbodies but does not include moving watercraft within the immediate area required for loading and preparing the watercraft for transport over land. A person transporting game fish as a result of a tournament for weigh-in purposes is not subject to this subsection.
- (2) Drain plugs, bailers, valves or other devices used to control the draining of water from ballast tanks, bilges and live wells must be removed or opened while transporting watercraft.
- (3) A person shall ensure the watercraft, trailer, motor, boating gear and conveyance used to transport the watercraft and trailer are free of aquatic organisms, including vegetation.

§ 71a.13. Bait fish importation and use.

(a) A person may not release or dispose live bait fish into any water of this Commonwealth, except live bait fish baited on a hook for angling purposes, without prior submission of a Notice of Stocking to the Commission. A person may collect live bait fish for angling. A species of bait fish collected for use as bait may not be transferred

from waters in this Commonwealth into another drainage of this Commonwealth where this particular species does not already exist. This subsection does not apply to the Commission, or a propagation facility licensed by the Department under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4201—4223 (relating to Aquaculture Development Law) for the purpose of releasing bait fish into waters of this Commonwealth as food for aquaculture or fisheries management purposes.

- (b) Live bait fish imported and intended for introduction into waters of this Commonwealth shall be in compliance with § 71a.6 (relating to fish health certificate requirements).
- (c) This subsection does not apply to dead bait fish (salted or frozen) sold for angling purposes outside the Lake Erie watershed. The provisions of § 71a.7 (relating to introduction or transportation of VHS-susceptible species of fish) shall be adhered to for purposes of this section.

Title 58—RECREATION

PENNSYLVANIA GAMING CONTROL BOARD [58 PA. CODE CHS. 623b AND 633b]

Craps and Mini-Craps Side Wagers and Variations; Blackjack Side Wagers and Variations—Temporary Regulations

The Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board (Board), under the general authority in 4 Pa.C.S. § 1202(b)(30) (relating to general and specific powers) and the specific authority in 4 Pa.C.S. § 13A02(1) and (2) (relating to regulatory authority) and § 13A03 (relating to temporary table game regulations), adopts the temporary regulations in §§ 623b.5 and 633b.16 (relating to power odds; and EZ Bust Blackjack) to read as set forth in Annex A. The Board's temporary regulations will be added to Part VII (relating to Gaming Control Board) as part of Subpart K (relating to table games).

Purpose of this Temporary Rulemaking

This temporary rulemaking adds new side wagers and variations to existing games available for play in this Commonwealth.

Explanation

The addition to Chapter 623b (relating to Craps and Mini-Craps side wagers and variations—temporary regulations) adds Power Odds. Power Odds incorporates increased payout odds to be randomly applied to certain wagers in the game of Craps.

The addition to Chapter 633b (relating to Blackjack side wagers and variations—temporary regulations) adds EZ Bust Blackjack, a side wager. EZ Bust Blackjack allows for players to place the side wager when the dealer's hand shows a two, three, four, five or six card. The wager wins when the dealer's hand busts after drawing additional card(s) consistent with the rules for dealer's hands being dealt additional cards. Winning EZ Bust Blackjack wagers pay odds of 1 to 1.

Fiscal Impact

Commonwealth. The Board does not expect that this temporary rulemaking will have a fiscal impact on the Board or other Commonwealth agencies. Updates to Rules Submission forms and internal control procedures will be reviewed by existing Board staff.

Political subdivisions. This temporary rulemaking will not have a fiscal impact on political subdivisions of this Commonwealth.

Private sector. This temporary rulemaking will provide certificate holders with an additional table game option. If a certificate holder decides to offer any of the side wagers or variations, or both—temporary regulations within the licensed facility, the certificate holder will be required to train its dealers on the rules of play and purchase new equipment—specifically table layouts corresponding to the game and wagers offered. Costs incurred to train employees or purchase/lease equipment should be offset by the proceeds of gaming.

General public. This temporary rulemaking will not have fiscal impact on the general public.

Paperwork Requirements

If a certificate holder seeks to offer any of the side wagers or variations contained in these temporary regulations the certificate holder will be required to submit a Rules Submission form reflecting the choices in how the game will be offered and with the selected side wagers and variations identified. These forms are available on the Board's public web site and submitted to Board staff electronically.

Effective Date

This temporary rulemaking will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will expire 3 years from the date of publication.

Public Comments

While this temporary rulemaking will be effective upon publication, the Board is seeking comments from the public and affected parties as to how this temporary regulation might be improved. Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, suggestions or objections regarding this temporary rulemaking within 30 days after the date of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* to Robert Wood, Assistant Chief Counsel, Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, 303 Walnut Street, 5th Floor, Harrisburg, PA 17106-9060, Attention: Public Comment on Regulation # 125-245.

Regulatory Review

Under 4 Pa.C.S. § 1303A, the Board is authorized to adopt temporary regulations which are not subject to the provisions of sections 201—205 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240), referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL) (45 P.S. §§ 1201—1205); the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. §§ 745.1—745.14); and sections 204(b) and 301(10) of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (CAA) (71 P.S. §§ 732-204(b) and 732-301(10)). These temporary regulations expire 3 years after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Findings

The Board finds that:

- (1) Under 4 Pa.C.S. § 1303A, the temporary regulations are exempt from the requirements of the RRA, sections 201—205 of the CDL and sections 204(b) and 301(10) of the CAA.
- (2) The adoption of the temporary regulations is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of 4 Pa.C.S. Part II (relating to gaming).

Order

The Board, acting under 4 Pa.C.S. Part II, orders that:

- (1) The regulations of the Board, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 623b and 633b, are amended by adding §§ 623b.5 and 633b.16 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (2) The temporary regulations are effective September 23, 2023.
- (3) The temporary regulations will be posted on the Board's web site and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- (4) The temporary regulations shall be subject to amendment as deemed necessary by the Board.
- (5) The Chairperson of the Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

Annex A

CHAPTER 623b. CRAPS AND MINI-CRAPS SIDE WAGERS AND VARIATIONS—TEMPORARY REGULATIONS

§ 623b.5. Power Odds.

- (a) A certificate holder may, if specified in its Rules Submission under § 601a.2 (relating to table games Rules Submissions), offer to players Power Odds, which provides the ability to win an increased payout based upon the results of a random number generator.
- (b) Craps, Mini-Craps, or variations that offer Power Odds shall be played consistent with Chapters 623a or 623b (relating to Craps and Mini-Craps; and Craps and Mini-Craps side wagers and variations—temporary regulations), unless otherwise provided under this section.
- (c) After all wagers have been placed consistent with § 623a.4 (relating to making and removal of wagers), but before the dice are thrown and the results known, the random number generator shall be initiated and shall display which bet or bets have been selected for which, if any, Power Odds increased payouts.
- (d) The following wagers shall be eligible for the increased Power Odds:

CHAPTER 633b. BLACKJACK SIDE WAGERS AND VARIATIONS—TEMPORARY REGULATIONS

§ 633b.16. EZ Bust Blackjack.

- (a) A certificate holder may, if specified in its Rules Submission under § 601a.2 (relating to table games Rules Submissions), offer to players who have made a Blackjack Wager under § 633a.6(d) (relating to wagers) the option to place an EZ Bust Blackjack side wager.
- (b) Except as provided under this section, Blackjack games which offer the EZ Bust Blackjack side wager shall follow the rules and procedures outlined in Chapter 633a (relating to Blackjack).
- (c) A patron shall have the option to place an EZ Bust Blackjack wager if after dealing the initial two cards to the dealer's hand under § 633a.7(f) (relating to procedure for dealing the cards; completion of each round of play) the dealer's up card is a two, three, four, five or six.
- (1) A patron shall have the option to place an EZ Bust Blackjack wager even if the patron was dealt a Blackjack.
- (2) A patron shall have the option to place an additional EZ Bust Blackjack wager each time they split their hand under § 633a.11 (relating to splitting pairs).

- (d) The patron may place an EZ Bust Blackjack wager up to an amount equal to their initial Blackjack wager.
- (e) After the placement of any EZ Bust Blackjack wagers, the Blackjack round of play shall be completed consistent with § 633a.7.
 - (f) An EZ Bust Blackjack wager shall:
- (1) Win if the dealer, having drawn a third card or more under § 633a.7(l)—(n), results in the dealer's hand having a point count greater than 21—that is, busting.
- (2) Lose if the dealer, having drawn a third card or more under § 633a.7(l)—(n), results in the dealer's hand resulting in a point count less than or equal to 21.
- (g) The certificate holder may, if specified in the rules submission, treat all EZ Bust Blackjack wagers as a push, if all players Blackjack wagers have resulted in a Blackjack or have busted.
- (h) EZ Bust Blackjack wagers shall be settled prior to the settlement of the player's Blackjack wager, and the removal of the player's cards.
- (i) Winning EZ Bust Blackjack wagers shall be paid at odds of 1 to 1. $\,$

Proposed Policy Statement Order

By the Commission:

On December 3, 2020, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) initiated a proceeding to obtain stakeholder comment on the usage of electric storage to enhance reliability and resiliency in the electric distribution grid. With this Order the Commission issues, for comment, a proposed policy statement in Annex A that sets forth proposed guidelines for usage of electricity-storage assets as electric distribution assets in the Commonwealth.

Background

On December 3, 2020, the Commission initiated a proceeding at the above-referenced docket, via Secretarial Letter, related to electric storage to encourage electric distribution companies (EDC) transition toward a future that accommodates evolving needs of customers with increased reliability and resiliency. In the Secretarial Letter, the Commission posed the following questions for the regulated community for comment:

What applications can electric storage provide as a distribution asset for utilities that would facilitate improved reliability and resiliency?

What are the defining characteristics of electric storage used for distribution asset planning as distinguished from generation resources?

What thresholds, if any, would classify electric storage as a generation resource and therefore outside permitted distribution ratemaking and recovery?

Is it prudent for utilities to include electric storage in their distribution resource planning and, if so, where and under what circumstances?

Further, is it appropriate for utilities to include such investments in rate base?

The Commission received initial comments from the following: Advanced Energy Management Alliance (AEMA); Calpine Retail Holdings, LLC (Calpine); Clean Air Council, Sierra Club, Philadelphia Solar Energy Association, POWER Interfaith, and the Union of Concerned Scientists (collectively Clean Energy Advocates (CEA)); Convergent Energy and Power; the Pennsylvania

Department of Environmental Protection (DEP);¹ Duquesne Light Company (Duquesne Light); Energy Association of Pennsylvania (EAP); Edison Electric Institute (EEI); Energy Storage Association (ESA); Metropolitan Edison Company, Pennsylvania Electric Company, Pennsylvania Power Company, and West Penn Power Company (collectively FirstEnergy); Monitoring Analytics, LLC (Market Monitor); Natural Resources Defense Council; the Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA); PECO Energy; Pennsylvania Energy Consumer Alliance (PECA), Met-Ed Industrial User Group (MEIUG), Penelec Industrial Customer Alliance (PICA), Philadelphia Area Industrial Energy Users Group (PAIEUG), PP&L Industrial Customer Alliance (PPLICA), West Penn Power Industrial Intervenors (WPPII) (collectively, Large Customer Groups); PJM Power Providers Group (P3); PPL Electric Utilities Corporation (PPL); Retail Energy Supply Associations (RESA); Solar Energy Industries Association (SEIA); and UGI Utilities, Inc.—Electric Division (UGI).

Based upon the initial comments received in response to the Commission's December 3, 2020 Secretarial Letter, the Commission issued a subsequent Secretarial Letter on August 12, 2021, posing several follow-up questions:

- 1. What are the parameters that would allow for the use of energy storage on the distribution grid? For example, what factors should be used in the consideration of the energy-storage project? Should the energy-storage project meet certain thresholds and demonstrate certain requirements, e.g., demonstration of cost-effectiveness as compared to alternate measures, demonstration of need, required RFPs to solicit potential third-party providers, limitations on project size and scope, etc.
- 2. What EDCs have undertaken energy-storage initiatives as a pilot program and what were the results and lessons-learned?
- 3. Under what circumstances is it appropriate to deploy energy storage as compared to traditional infrastructure upgrades?
- 4. Who should own an energy-storage asset? EDCs, third-party vendors, or some combination of both?
- 5. What processes should the Commission use to review requests to utilize energy storage as a distribution asset and recover associated costs?
- 6. What cost recovery mechanisms should be implemented for the ownership and operation of energy-storage assets?
- 7. What are the appropriate models and limitations necessary to allow energy storage to participate in wholesale power markets?

After requesting further clarification from the interested parties, the Commission received supplemental comments from Calpine; CEA; DEP; Duquesne Light; EAP; EEI; FirstEnergy; Industrial Energy Consumers of Pennsylvania (IECPA); Large Customer Groups; OCA; PECO; P3; PPL; Pennsylvania Utility Law Project (PULP); SEIA; and UGI.

 $^{^1}$ DEP did not directly address the individual questions posed in the Commission's August Secretarial Letter. Instead, DEP's comments focus on support of the Commission's recommendations to explore the viability of utility investment in energy storage as a distribution asset for the purpose of enhancing or maintaining reliability of the electric distribution grid. Discussion

As a preliminary matter, we note that any comments that we do not specifically delineate shall be deemed to have been duly considered and denied without further consideration. The Commission is not required to consider expressly or at length each contention or comment raised by the parties. Consolidated Rail Corp. v. Pa. Pub. Util. Comm'n, 625 A.2d 741 (Pa. Cmwlth. 1993); see also, generally, Univ. of Pa. v. Pa. Pub Util. Comm'n, 485 A.2d 1217 (Pa. Cmwlth. 1984).

The Commission received comments to each of the seven questions it posed in its August 21, 2021 Secretarial Letter. In addition to receiving responses to these seven questions, some commenters included discussion on topics upon which the Commission did not request comments. Based upon the responses the Commission received from the commenters, the Commission will move forward with an Energy Storage Asset Policy Statement.

A. Definitions

As will be addressed, infra, the Commission proposes to establish defined terms that will be used in the Energy Storage Asset Policy Statement. A definitions section is necessary to define terms that are not defined elsewhere in the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 101—3316. Accordingly, the Commission proposes the following definitions.

Energy-storage asset. The Commission proposes to use the definition that the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) used in Order No. 841 to define "electric-storage resource," that is, "a resource capable of receiving electric energy from the grid and storing it for later injection of electric energy back to the grid." See Order No. 841, 162 FERC ¶ 61,127 at 29.

Non-wires solution. The Commission proposes to use the definition of "non-transmission alternative" or "NTA" from the National Regulatory Research Institution (NRRI) to define "non-wires solutions." NRRI describes an NTA as "electric utility system investments and operating practices that can defer or replace the need for specific transmission projects, at lower total resource cost, by reliably reducing transmission congestion at times of maximum demand in specific grid areas." NRRI Study at iv. NRRI also describes an NTA as "any combination of equipment and operating practices that is capable of deferring or replacing the need for a specific electric power transmission project, by reliably alleviating transmission congestion in a specific area." NRRI Study at 1. NRRI uses the term "non-transmission alternatives," but since commenters here used the term "non-wires solutions," we will use the term "non-wires solution."

B. Electricity-Storage as a Distribution System Asset

The Commission proposes adding a section that establishes a policy for when an electricity-storage asset should be considered a distribution system asset. As noted above, in its December 3, 2020 Secretarial Letter, the Commission posed a series of questions to identify what areas, if any, could benefit from electricity-storage on the distribution grid and to understand what issues or concerns may occur as a result of the deployment of electricity-storage on the distribution grid.

Commenters provided a variety of nuanced responses that ranged from describing how an electricity-storage asset can improve resiliency and reliability, to proposing alternate frameworks for assessing the cost-effectiveness of the storage asset. The comments and recommendations from the various parties are summarized as they relate to electricity-storage deployed as a distribution system asset.

In defining the scope of "electricity-storage for distribution purposes", FirstEnergy proposes that the Commission should generally allow for the use of electricity-storage to support distribution grid reliability and resiliency, provide voltage support and volt-amps reactive (VAR) control, and manage short-term peak line or system loading or other distribution system constraints arising from electric vehicle (EV) adoption and other electrification. FirstEnergy stresses that regardless of the reason for electricity-storage use, the optimal amount and placement of electricity-storage will be dependent on the unique needs of each EDC and the details of the EDC's current and projected system needs. FirstEnergy Supplemental Comments at 6, 8.

FirstEnergy contends that for distribution use cases, while electricity-storage may not be the most cost-effective solution in every case, it should be considered and evaluated in the EDC's processes along with evaluating other factors that would ultimately lead to a traditional wires solution. FirstEnergy Supplemental Comments at 11.

FirstEnergy, PPL, and UGI enumerate some use cases including:

- 1. Options for addressing general load growth or a derating of an existing asset (such as a substation transformer) in an area that is transmission or subtransmission constrained.
- 2. Options to provide capacity for areas that are a long distance from an existing transmission or subtransmission lines.
- 3. Providing capacity relief for areas with high seasonal peak loads such as an island with a high summer peak and almost no load during the off season.
- 4. Providing a supplemental energy source and tie point to support a distribution circuit as opposed to constructing a new circuit.
- 5. Deployment in conjunction with distribution automation schemes where the electricity-storage system could be used and for voltage regulation or phase balancing to extend load transfers and restore a greater number of customers more rapidly.
- 6. Voltage Support for distributed energy resources (DERs) where an energy-storage system could provide voltage support for a distribution circuit that has a high penetration of inverter-based DERs which may have voltage fluctuations which are abrupt and intermittent, such as a reduction in kilowatt output due to a cloud passing over solar installations.
- 7. Use of emergency Demand Response to prevent emergency or temporary overloads on the distribution system and potentially avoid or defer costly system upgrades or keep customers in power during emergency conditions.
- 8. Reliability and restoration support where EDCs could use electricity-storage for reliability purposes where traditional alternatives would be less than ideal and/or cost prohibitive.

FirstEnergy Supplemental Comments at 11, PPL Supplemental Comments at 5-6, and UGI Supplemental Comments at 11-12.

EDCs generally agreed that, given the rapid evolution of technology, the Commission should not impose limits or parameters on electricity-storage systems and that such projects should be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. PPL believes that the Commission should generally defer to the expertise and experience of the EDCs to determine the parameters on how the electricity-storage systems are used and that classification of electricity-storage systems as distribution, generation, or transmission is a factintensive inquiry that should be resolved on a case-bycase basis and take into consideration the location and use of the systems. PPL Comments at 2. However, PPL and FirstEnergy note that if the electricity-storage system is used by an EDC to solve distribution problems, provide benefits to distribution customers, and support the provision of safe and reliable service at a prudent and reasonable cost, then it should be considered a distribution asset. PPL Comments at 6 and FirstEnergy Comments at 5.

Furthermore, PPL and FirstEnergy assert that they bear responsibility for the safety of their workers and the safe and reliable operation of the distribution system on behalf of their customers and the public. PPL believes that EDCs should be required to comply with all industry safety standards for electricity-storage, including any American National Standards Institute (ANSI) and fireprotection requirements, when deploying and utilizing energy-storage systems. PPL Comments at 3 and FirstEnergy Comments at 5.

UGI asserts that EDCs are best suited to determine the appropriate methods and manners for integrating batteries into their systems to address reliability hazards, reduce distribution-system costs and enhance the customer experience. UGI Comments at 3. EAP contends that such parameters are better addressed in the context of a particular project rather than in a generic policy proceeding and asserts that providing guidance and not prescriptive rules or requirements is appropriate and lawful, and that such an approach is particularly warranted here when dealing with an evolving technology that can address a number of challenges faced by EDCs as they seek to modernize and invest in the distribution grid to accommodate customer needs for increased reliability and resiliency. EAP Comments at 5.

By contrast, SEIA, IECPA, and P3 argue that in a restructured market like the Commonwealth, additional parameters must be established to allow for the use of electricity-storage on the distribution grid if an electricity-storage asset is owned by a public utility. These commenters assert that when energy, capacity, or other ancillary resources are sold into competitive markets by EDCs, they are in direct competition with independently owned energy resources, that is, fundamentally in the realm of generation related to the bulk power system. In addition, these solutions are best provided by customers behind-the-meter. SEIA Comments 5-6, IECPA Comments at 2-3 and P3 Comments at 3.

Duquesne Light submits that the Commission should recognize that the value of electricity-storage lies in its versatility. Duquesne Light, EAP, and PECO believe that adhering to strict limitations and cost tests will artificially constrain the deployment of electricity-storage and that the Commission should exercise care to not unintentionally restrict the potential use cases for storage by establishing narrow thresholds and limits. Duquesne Light further contends that the principal limitation that should be placed on electricity-storage is its primary purpose and that the Commission should avoid narrowly

defining what types of distribution services electricitystorage can provide. Duquesne Light Comments at 6, EAP Comments at 9 and PECO Comments at 6-7. When considering parameters that would enable utility use of electricity-storage on the distribution grid, PECO recommends that the Commission prioritize electricity-storage applications that have the potential to further enhance system reliability and provide other benefits. PECO Comments at 3.

C. Cost effectiveness

Duquesne Light agrees with other commenters that electricity-storage as a distribution asset must be cost effective but asserts that it is important to distinguish between "cost" and "value." A simple cost-benefit test, like the Total Resource Cost (TRC) test³ used in the implementation of Act 1294, should be avoided. Duquesne Light asserts that to adequately assess the value of storage it should be compared to the cost and value of a more traditional alternative. Duquesne Light goes on to enumerate examples of the value of storage that could be missed by applying the TRC, such as resiliency, enabling clean energy, time, reduced disruption to the community, reduced need to access private property for infrastructure, reduced environmental disruption, improved aesthetics, and equity. In support of utilizing electricity-storage as a distribution asset, Duquesne Light points to the Implementation Order for Phase I of Pennsylvania's Energy Efficiency and Conservation Program⁵, which permitted public utilities to select the option that provides the greatest value to customers. Duquesne Light Supplemental Comments at 7-8.

PECO discourages the Commission from evaluating energy-storage projects to support distribution operations based strictly on a benefit-cost analysis (BCA). PECO asserts that public utility pilot projects would provide valuable insight on how to access multiple electricitystorage value streams and help to quantify what the likely benefits will be. PECO also asserts that application of a rigid cost-effectiveness requirement could limit the opportunity for demonstration projects and pilots that involve uncertain revenues or costs. PECO Comments at 3-5.

SEIA proposes that EDCs be required to compare the costs and benefits of a cost-of-service, rate based proposed energy-storage project with that of a private developer's project. SEIA posits that this approach would best serve the interests of ratepayers, effectively ensuring that EDCs weigh the pros and cons of utility ownership of storage as a distribution asset against the pros and cons of contracting with third-party developers who may offer a more cost-effective storage solution or who may own and operate a portfolio of behind-the-meter energy-storage resources—either commercial and industrial (C&I) or residential—and synchronize them as a larger, unified and flexible resource to meet the utility's distribution needs. SEIA Comments at 16.

In contrast to other commenters, the Large Customer Groups contend that EDCs should only adopt battery energy-storage system (BESS) projects where the benefits of such projects exceed their costs. They assert that, currently, conventional distribution system infra-

efficiency and conservation program), directs the Commission to analyze the benefits and costs of the energy efficiency and conservation (EE&C) plans that certain EDCs

structure upgrades remain the least expensive solution to resolve most reliability and resiliency issues along the distribution grid. However, when a BESS project is less expensive than a conventional solution, or the EDC can demonstrate that the benefits of the BESS project would outweigh the costs, then it would be reasonable for the EDC to consider adoption of the BESS project. Large Customer Groups Comments at 2-3.

OCA notes that there is also the question of cost effectiveness of any storage project and whether a definitive showing must be made to establish a certain level of costs versus benefits. Electricity-storage is just one possible solution to distribution system upgrade concerns and the costs and benefits of any project should be adequately weighed against more traditional infrastructure upgrades. OCA Comments at 4-5.

Disposition

A. Definitions

The Commission proposes to define "energy storage asset" as "a resource capable of receiving electric energy from the grid and storing it for later injection of electric energy back to the grid." The Commission proposes to define "no-wires solution" as "an EDC investment and operating practice that can defer or replace the need for specific transmission and/or distribution projects, at lower total resource cost, by reliably reducing transmission congestion or distribution system constraints at times of maximum demand in specific grid areas." As proposed, this term would have the same meaning as "non-transmission alternative," which is the term used by NRRI.

B. Electricity-Storage as a Distribution System Asset

Commenters stated that it is impossible to list all the cases where electricity-storage may be appropriate compared to traditional investments but suggested some examples, including voltage support for DERs, and emergency-demand response, reliability/restoration support. Nearly all commenters agreed that the Commission should avoid narrow definitions of electricity-storage and that every project that may be suitable for electricity-storage should be assessed and reviewed on its individual merits. These same commenters agree that electricity-storage should be considered as another tool for EDCs to use to solve an issue. The Commission agrees with these comments, and views electricity-storage as another tool for EDCs to use to solve electric distribution system problems.

The Commission further agrees with commenters that EDCs' primary goal should be the safe, reliable delivery of electricity to customers and that EDCs' usage of electricity-storage should meet this goal. EDCs are uniquely positioned to best ensure that the distribution grid is properly managed, and the Commission sees no reason to prohibit the EDCs from utilizing electricity-storage systems to continue to solve electric distribution system problems and provide grid resiliency.

With respect to comments suggesting the use of pilot programs, the Commission agrees that pilot programs can provide valuable lessons. However, we are concerned that a focus predicated solely or predominantly on pilot-program outcomes would unnecessarily delay the deployment and utilization of electricity-storage as an electric distribution-grid asset in Pennsylvania. However, it is important to note that two Commonwealth-specific systems were discussed by commenters—UGI's Ruckle Hill

Road Distribution Circuit⁶ and PPL's battery in Harrisburg.⁷ Both provided valuable lessons on electricity-storage.

The Commission approved a pilot storage project by UGI, using a small-scale, 1.25 MWh battery-storage system that was proposed as a targeted means to enhance resiliency and improve reliability on a worst performing distribution circuit located in Wapwallopen, Pennsylvania, known as the Ruckle Hill Road distribution circuit. Calpine Comments at 3. In determining that the battery solution was the preferable approach to address the ongoing outage concerns, UGI compared the use of a battery solution to other traditional infrastructure solutions. Compared with these solutions, which range from \$3.0 million to \$5.1 million, the \$1.5 million cost of the battery presented the lowest cost solution to address the performance issues on the identified worst performing distribution circuit. UGI asserts that its rate case shows that battery solutions can and should be considered and assessed in the same way other infrastructure and reliability solutions are considered. UGI Comments at 9, 10.

While UGI has not yet implemented the battery-storage project, a review of the historic-outage conditions on the distribution circuit provides an idea of the impact the battery may have on reliability. Looking at recent outage data, UGI determined that if the battery had been installed it would have covered the entire outage for 22 of the 26 outages experienced on the distribution circuit between 2016 and 2020. Further, of the remaining four outages, there was only one outage where the battery would not have covered most of the outage minutes. For that one outage, the battery would have covered 54.46% of the outage duration for all impacted customers. If the battery performs as expected, it will have a significant impact on the reliability of service for the customers served off this distribution circuit. Id. Calpine believes these steps are prudent and illustrate a reasonable and cautious approach to the use of battery storage facilities by incumbent utilities. However, Calpine believes there is no basis at this point to launch a largescale series of projects when the first pilot is only getting underway and when the lessons learned from this first pilot are still more than a year away. Calpine Comments at 3.

PPL installed a 50-kilowatt (kW) battery in the Harrisburg area in 2018 and has learned several lessons from deploying and using that energy-storage system on its distribution system, including: (1) how to maintain public safety and the distribution system's integrity; (2) how to communicate with the battery using its Advanced Distribution Management System (ADMS); (3) how to safely isolate PPL's distribution system from the "intentional island" PPL created when using the battery to restore customers during an outage; and (4) how to protect the distribution system and the public if a fault were to occur on the "intentional island." PPL worked with local fire departments to increase their knowledge and training in the event they are required to respond to a fire at the Harrisburg battery. PPL believes that EDCs are in the best position to work with state and local municipalities to address concerns and share knowledge on energystorage systems. PPL's experience with deploying and utilizing the 50-kW battery is very valuable and will enable PPL to deploy and utilize additional energystorage systems in a safe and effective manner. PPL Comments at 4.

Some commenters expressed that behind-the-meter (BTM) electricity-storage should be provided by customers or third-party vendors. However, the purview of this proceeding is electricity-storage on the distribution grid for the purposes of reliability and resiliency. Thus, we are not considering BTM storage in this context and will not address it in this proceeding. Regarding cost effectiveness, the Commission declines to adopt a specific cost-effectiveness test or methodology in this proceeding. EDCs may consider using electricity-storage and would need to justify the costs like any other traditional infrastructure upgrade.

Conclusion

The Commission is proposing this policy statement in accordance with its authority under Sections 501, 504, 505, 506, and 2806.1 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 501, 504, 505, 506, and 2806.1. Based on the foregoing discussion, we will propose this Policy Statement regarding Energy-Storage Assets as set forth in Annex A; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered:

- 1. That the proposed Energy Storage Asset Policy Statement set forth in Annex A is issued for comment.
- 2. That the Law Bureau shall submit this Order and Annex A to the Governor's Budget Office for review of fiscal impact.
- 3. That, upon receipt of a fiscal note from the Governor's Budget Office, the Secretary shall certify this Order and Annex A and the Law Bureau shall deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 4. That interested parties shall have 30 days from the date of publication of this Order and Annex A setting forth the proposed policy statement in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* to file comments with the Secretary.
- 5. That interested parties shall have 45 days from the date of publication of this Order and Annex A setting forth the proposed policy statement in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* to file reply comments with the Secretary.

Joint Statement of Chairperson Gladys Brown Dutrieuille and Vice Chairperson Stephen M. DeFrank

Before the Commission is the Proposed Policy Statement Order (Proposed Policy Statement) regarding the utilization of storage resources as electric distribution assets. Today the Commission considers issuance of this Proposed Policy Statement for comments from the electric utility industry and interested stakeholders.

Continued advancement in energy storage technology, namely batteries, has led it to become both a viable generation resource as well as a newly viable non-wires alternative for transmission and distribution planning. Because of this, the Commission commenced this very proceeding to provide electric distribution companies (EDCs) regulatory clarity on the Commission's stance regarding the use of storage in distribution system planning and management.

Electricity distribution systems are changing quickly. Distributed energy resources are interconnecting at an almost exponential pace. Electric vehicle adoption continues accelerating. Data centers are establishing themselves in various EDC territories, demanding remarkable amounts of electrical power. These factors, among others, have significantly altered the dynamics of managing the distribution grid. It is apparent that energy storage may offer EDCs a tool to better manage these new dynamics. Energy storage can provide grid stability through services such as peak demand shifting, supplemental power, restoration, and voltage support.

Therefore, we are pleased to take this next step in encouraging EDCs to utilize cost effective energy storage as a distribution resource. We look forward to reviewing stakeholder comments on this Proposed Policy Statement.

ENERGY STORAGE ASSET POLICY STATEMENT § 69,XXX1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this section and § 69.XXX2 have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

EDC—Electric distribution company—The term has the same meaning as defined in 66 Pa.C.S. § 2803 (relating to definitions).

Electricity-storage asset—A resource capable of receiving electric energy from the grid and storing it for later injection of electricity back to the grid.

Non-wires solution—An EDC investment and operating practice that can defer or replace the need for specific transmission and/or distribution projects, at lower total resource cost, by reliably reducing transmission congestion or distribution system constraints at times of maximum demand in specific grid areas. This term is synony-

mous with "non-transmission alternative" or "NTA" which is the term used by the National Regulatory Research Institution.

§ 69.XXX2. Electricity-storage as a distribution system asset.

The Commission acknowledges that electricity-storage assets can assist in various engineered reliability solutions. As such, the Commission recognizes that electricity-storage assets can be used by EDCs to maintain or to increase the reliability or the resilience of the electric distribution system. The Commission encourages the consideration of these assets when cost effective and proper, specifically as an alternative non-wires solution. The Commission encourages EDCs to consider electricity-storage assets as part of their system planning.

Managed Care Quality Strategy for the Commonwealth

The Department of Human Services (Department) is making available for public review and comment the Medical Assistance (MA) and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) Managed Care Quality Strategy for the Commonwealth.

Background

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) requires states to draft and implement a written quality strategy for assessing and improving the quality of health care and services furnished by managed care organizations (MCO) that have an agreement with the Department (see 42 CFR 438.340(a) and 457.1240(e) (relating to managed care State quality strategy; and quality measurement and improvement)). As a result, the Department has developed the MA and CHIP Managed Care Quality Strategy (MCQS), which discusses the various initiatives the Department has implemented to improve the quality of care for individuals receiving services through its managed care programs. The MCQS for the Commonwealth is not intended to comprehensively describe all the activities the Department undertakes to assure the quality of care rendered to individuals who are receiving services through its managed care programs.

The MCQS is an updated version of the previous quality strategy submitted to CMS in December 2020, and describes initiatives, strategies and processes to improve, evaluate and monitor member access to high quality, timely care through the Medicaid and CHIP managed care delivery system. The novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic and ongoing post-pandemic delivery system pressures have affected and changed how the MCOs deliver care. As a result of these and other changes in how the MCOs deliver care, the Department has refocused and revised its quality goals, objectives and strategies.

Discussion

As the delivery system landscape continues to respond and evolve, this MCQS provides a roadmap for the Department to support improved quality for all MA managed care and CHIP members. Across the Department and as detailed throughout the MCQS, the Department strives to improve the health of members in each of its managed care programs through the implementation of strategic initiatives that support its three main goals:

- 1. Increase access to health care services.
- 2. Improve the health outcomes of populations.
- 3. Promote efficient and effective use of taxpayer resources.

The MCQS takes a broad view of opportunities to improve member health by focusing on domains of increasing value, supporting health equity and addressing Social Determinates of Health (SDOH) in its managed

care programs using the MCO agreements and programmatic initiatives. The Department is working on a Value-Based purchasing strategy to align the program offices. The Department is also using several CMS-approved State directed payments to support the goals of increasing access, improving health outcomes and promoting the effective use of resources. At the same time the Commonwealth, MCOs, providers and members are all emerging from the COVID-19 pandemic with new approaches and opportunities, as well as facing ongoing challenges, including workforce and supply chain issues.

The Office of Medical Assistance Programs' (OMAP) key initiatives continue to be centered around value-based purchasing and requiring the MCOs to incorporate the use of community-based organizations in their value-based purchasing strategies to address SDOH domains. OMAP is also encouraging expanded use of Opioid Use Disorder Centers of Excellence as well as using pay-for-performance to improve the health for the population in HealthChoices.

The Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services' (OMHSAS) key quality improvement initiatives include value-based purchasing arrangements, like OMAP, that incorporate the use of community-based organizations to address SDOH domains. OMHSAS continues to use Integrated Community Wellness Centers to increase SDOH screenings and promote integrated physical and behavioral health care for patients, as well as pay-for-performance to improve performance and outcomes.

The Office of Long-Term Living quality improvement initiatives included requiring value-based purchasing models for long-term services and supports, requiring a pay-for-performance program to improve the quality of nursing facility services as well as Performance Improvement Program for performance around assessments, care plans reassessments and planning after discharge, Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems health plan satisfaction and meeting nursing home transition benchmarks.

The CHIP key quality improvement initiatives include developing a pay-for-performance incentive for meeting or exceeding benchmarks on health care performance measures.

Finally, key quality improvement initiatives for the Adult Community Autism Program include decreasing social isolation among members.

- 4. On January 6, 2023, through April 21, 2023, Supervisor Murray spoke with and/or texted Respondent requesting contact with Supervisor Murray.
- 5. On April 27, 2023, a first class and certified letter was sent from the Western Regional Office to the mailing address of the Respondent requesting contact PA PUC Enforcement Supervisor Murray within 10 days. The certified letter was delivered returned to the Regional Office unclaimed on June 20, 2023. No response has been received.
- 6. That Respondent, by failing to achieve a satisfactory evaluation on a safety fitness review, violated 66 Pa § 501(c) and, for failure to maintain adequate, efficient, and safe service and facilities, violated 66 Pa. § 1501. The penalty for this violation is cancellation of the certificate held by Respondent with this Commission at utility code 8925718.

Wherefore, the Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement hereby requests that the Commission revoke the certificate of public convenience issued to K3 Trucking, LLC at PUC utility code number 8925718.
