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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201–246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

THE GOVERNOR Title 4—ADMINISTRATION PART I. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE [4 PA. CODE CH. 7] [EXECUTIVE ORDER 2023-04] Executive Branch Employee Gift Ban

January 20, 2023

Whereas, public trust and confidence in the integrity of those individuals appointed and employed to serve the Commonwealth is of paramount importance; and

Whereas, the Governor is responsible to establish standards for the integrity of Commonwealth Executive Employees with regard to the receipt of gifts, gratuities, entertainment, loans, or any other thing of monetary value, including in-kind gifts, from persons doing or seeking to do business with the Commonwealth or with interests that are substantially affected by decisions of the Commonwealth.

Now, Therefore, I, Josh Shapiro, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby reaffirm the Code of Conduct for Commonwealth Employees, Executive Order 1980-18 Amended, and promulgate the following amendments to such Code of Conduct regarding prohibitions on the receipt of gifts.

Annex A

TITLE 4. ADMINISTRATION PART I. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE CHAPTER 7. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS Subchapter K. CODE OF CONDUCT FOR APPOINTED OFFICIALS AND STATE EMPLOYEES RESTRICTED ACTIVITIES: CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

§ 7.153. Gifts and favors.

(a) *Policy*.

(1) No employee, appointee or official of the Executive Branch of the Commonwealth shall accept or solicit cash or cash equivalent; a gift or other item of more than nominal or de minimis value; admission to a recreational event; a personal loan; or a personal or professional service in connection with their employment, from another person or entity whom the employee, appointee or official knows:

(i) Is seeking to obtain business or an outcome from or has financial relations with the Commonwealth.

 (ii) Conducts operations or activities that are regulated by the Commonwealth.

(iii) Is engaged, either as principal or attorney, in proceedings before the Commonwealth or in court proceedings in which the Commonwealth is an adverse party.

THE GOVERNOR

(iv) Has interests that may be substantially affected by the performance or nonperformance of the official duty of the employee, appointee or official.

(b) *Limited exceptions*.

(1) Ordinary social hospitality may be accepted only when incidental to officially sanctioned Commonwealth trainings (for example, approved continuing education and working lunches); or in connection with an official government function or other event in which the employee, appointee or official is representing the Commonwealth in an official capacity.

(2) Gifts from a friend, parent, spouse, child or other close relative may be accepted when the circumstances make it clear that the motivation for the action is a family or personal relationship.

(3) Receipt of a plaque, certificate or other similar item of de minimis value may be accepted for recognition of the employee's, appointee's or official's professional work or personal community service.

(4) Tangible items, benefits or discounts which are unsolicited may be accepted when the same or similar benefit or discount is available to members of the general public.

(5) Food or refreshment of nominal value on infrequent occasions in the ordinary course of a luncheon or dinner meeting or other meetings may be accepted and recreation, entertainment, food or refreshments of nominal value in the furtherance of a charitable event may be accepted.

(6) Unsolicited advertising or promotional material, such as pens, pencils, note pads, mugs, t-shirts, calendars and other items of nominal intrinsic value may be accepted.

(7) Bona fide reimbursement for actual expenses for travel and other necessary subsistence may be received if it is compatible with other restrictions set forth in this section and if no Commonwealth payment or reimbursement is made. However, an employee, appointee or official may not be reimbursed and payment may not be made on his/her behalf for excessive personal living expenses, gifts, entertainment or other personal benefits nor may an employee, appointee or official be reimbursed by a person for travel on official business under Commonwealth orders.

(8) Participation in the affairs of or acceptance of an award for a meritorious public contribution or achievement from a charitable, religious, professional, social, fraternal or nonprofit educational, recreational, public service or civic organization is permitted.

(9) A voluntary gift of nominal value or donation in a nominal amount made on a special occasion such as marriage, illness or retirement may be accepted.

(10) The Commonwealth reserves the right to make determinations regarding the appropriate application of these exceptions in its sole discretion.

(c) *Applicability.* The limited exceptions contained in subsection (b) are not applicable to any gifts, cash, cash equivalent, discounts, loans, services or any other items or other benefits of any kind or of any value received from a lobbyist, lobbying firm or principal as those terms are defined by 65 Pa.C.S. § 13A03 (relating to definitions).

(d) *Personal time*. This policy does not prohibit attendance at or acceptance of ordinary social hospitality in accordance with the guidelines set forth in this policy, at functions, events or fundraisers scheduled on the employee's, appointee's or official's personal time unrelated to the individual's Commonwealth employment.

(e) *Financial disclosure forms*. Nothing in this policy shall override an employee's, appointee's or official's duty to comply with and timely file Federal, State or local, financial disclosure forms.

(f) *Definitions*.

(1) *Cash equivalent*. An asset that is readily convertible to cash (for example, credit/debit card, prepaid gift card for any commercial establishment, foreign currency, certified check, cashier's check, money order or similar negotiable instrument).

(2) *De minimis.* An item of nominal value or a meal which is equal to or less in value than that of ordinary social hospitality.

(3) *Gift.* A gratuity, entertainment, loans or any other thing of monetary value, including in-kind gifts offered to an employee, during the course of their employment.

(4) Ordinary social hospitality. The value of food or refreshment not to exceed the General Services Administration rate for the applicable time period and location.

(5) *Person.* An individual, partnership, corporation, non-profit organization, political subdivision or other entity, but does not include State agencies or agencies of the United States government.

(6) *Personal loan.* A temporary financial assistance requiring repayment to an individual or organization, with or without interest.

(7) *Personal or professional service*. An intangible service of economic value or benefit performed by a person or business.

(8) *Recreational event*. A professional or semi-professional sports event, theater event, musical concert or similar event, including transportation thereto and therefrom.

(9) *Tangible item*. A material item or item of more than nominal or de minimis intrinsic value.

And Now, this 27th day of January, 2023, upon the recommendation of the Domestic Relations Procedural Rules Committee; the proposal having been published for public comment at 50 Pa.B. 7007 (December 12, 2020) and re-published for public comment at 51 Pa.B. 6141 (September 25, 2021):

It is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that Rules 1915.11-2 and 1915.21 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure are amended in the attached forms.

This Order shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b), and shall be effective April 1, 2023.

Additions to the rule are shown in bold and are underlined.

Deletions from the rule are shown in bold and brackets.

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1915. ACTIONS FOR CUSTODY OF MINOR CHILDREN

Rule 1915.11-2. [Appointment of Guardian Ad Litem] Guardian Ad Litem.

(*Editor's Note*: Pa.R.C.P. 1915.11-2 as printed in 231 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Note.")

[(a) The court may, on its own motion or the motion of a party, appoint a guardian ad litem to represent the best interests of the child in a custody action. The guardian ad litem shall be a licensed attorney or licensed mental health professional. The guardian ad litem shall not act as the child's counsel or represent the child's legal interests. Prior to appointing a guardian ad litem, the court shall make a finding that the appointment is necessary to assist the court in determining the best interests of the child.

(b) The court may order either or both parties to pay all or part of the costs of appointing a guardian ad litem.

(c) The guardian ad litem shall file of record and provide copies of any reports prepared by the guardian ad litem to each party and the court not later than 20 days prior to trial. The admissibility of the report shall be determined at the hearing. Prior to disclosure to the parties of confidential information prohibited by 23 Pa.C.S. § 5336, the court shall make a determination of whether the information may be disclosed. The guardian ad litem shall attend all proceedings and be prepared to testify. The guardian ad litem shall be subject to cross-examination if called to testify by either party or the court.

(d) The order appointing a guardian ad litem shall be in substantially the form set forth in Rule 1915.21.

Note: 23 Pa.C.S. § 5334 is suspended insofar as it (1) requires that a guardian ad litem be an attorney, (2) permits the guardian ad litem to represent both the best interests and legal interests of the child, (3) provides the guardian ad litem the right to examine, cross-examine, present witnesses and present evidence on behalf of the child, and (4) prohibits the guardian ad litem from testifying.]

(This is entirely new text.)

(*Editor's Note*: The following text is proposed to be added and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

(a) Appointment.

(1) On its own motion or a party's motion, the court may appoint a guardian *ad litem* if the court finds that the appointment is necessary for determining the child's best interest.

(2) As set forth in Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.21, the court's order appointing the guardian *ad litem* may apportion to the parties the reasonable cost of the guardian *ad litem*.

(b) *Qualifications*. The guardian *ad litem* shall be a licensed attorney or licensed mental health professional.

(c) *Duties*.

(1) As provided in 23 Pa.C.S. § 5334, which has been suspended in part by Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.25, the guardian *ad litem* shall perform the duties as enumerated in Section 5334, including representing the child's best interest.

(2) The guardian *ad litem* shall not represent the child's legal interest or act as the child's legal counsel.

(d) *Report.* The guardian *ad litem* shall prepare a written report, which shall include specific recommendations relating to the child's best interest.

(1) Child's Statement.

(i) The written report may include a subject child's statement to the guardian *ad litem* that would be otherwise inadmissible as hearsay under the Pennsylvania Rules of Evidence, provided the requirements of Pa.R.E. 703 are satisfied.

(ii) A child's statement included in the written report under subdivision (d)(1)(i) shall not be considered substantive evidence.

(2) The guardian *ad litem* shall file the written report with the prothonotary, which shall become part of the record.

(3) Confidential. The guardian *ad litem*'s filed report and a party's filed response to the report as provided in subdivision (d)(5) shall be confidential and shall not constitute a public record.

(4) The guardian *ad litem* shall provide the report to the parties and the court when filed but not later than 20 days prior to a hearing or trial or as otherwise ordered by the court.

(5) Comments. Objections.

(i) Within ten days of receiving the guardian *ad litem*'s report, a party may file with the prothonotary and serve on the other party and the court:

 $\left(A\right)$ a comment to the report, which shall become part of the record; or

(B) an objection to the report's admissibility, in whole or in part, including a subject child's statement to the guardian *ad litem*.

(ii) The court shall determine the report's admissibility prior to the hearing or trial.

(6) Subject to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11, a party may subpoena:

(i) an individual interviewed by the guardian *ad litem* or identified in the report to appear and testify at the hearing or trial; or

(ii) the guardian *ad litem* for the production of a document relied upon by the guardian *ad litem* in preparing the report.

(e) Testimony.

(1) When determined necessary by the trial court, the guardian *ad litem* shall participate in court proceedings by attending, and by providing sworn testimony if called to testify by a party or the court. The guardian *ad litem* shall not be permitted to provide argument, unsworn opinions, or unsworn testimony to the court.

(2) If called to testify by a party, the guardian *ad litem* shall be subject to cross-examination by opposing parties. If called to testify by the court, the guardian *ad litem* shall be subject to cross-examination by any party.

(3) Child's Statement.

(i) Except as precluded by the court in subdivision (d)(5)(ii), the guardian *ad litem*'s testimony may include the subject child's statement to the guardian *ad litem* that would be otherwise inadmissible as hearsay under the Pennsylvania Rules of Evidence, provided the requirements of Pa.R.E. 703 are satisfied.

(ii) A child's statement included in the guardian *ad litem*'s testimony under subdivision (e)(3)(i) shall not be considered substantive evidence.

(f) Order. The order appointing a guardian *ad litem* shall be substantially in the form set forth in Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.21.

Comment:

Subdivision (a)(1) states that the guardian *ad litem* may be appointed when "the appointment is necessary." Such appointments should be limited to extraordinary cases in which the trial judge determines that the level of conflict is unusually high or that the parties will be absolutely unable to provide the court with the information necessary to evaluate and determine the subject child's best interests. Regardless of appointment of a GAL, the duty and responsibility to determine the best interests of the children involved lies solely with the trial judge.

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania suspended 23 Pa.C.S. § 5334 insofar as it (1) requires that a guardian *ad litem* be an attorney, (2) permits the guardian *ad litem* to represent both the best interests and legal interests of the child, (3) provides the guardian *ad litem* the right to examine, cross-examine, present witnesses, and present evidence on behalf of the child, and (4) prohibits the guardian *ad litem* from testifying.

See 23 Pa.C.S. § 5336, prohibiting disclosure of certain records and information to parents and parties.

Subdivision (d)(1) and (e)(3) reference the requirements of Pa.R.E. 703. Rule 703 relates to the bases for expert opinion testimony. While the requirements of Rule 703 must be satisfied for any written report that includes statements made by a subject child, the guardian *ad litem* is not an expert witness and need not be qualified as an expert prior to testifying. However, the guardian *ad litem* remains subject to questions and cross-examination regarding qualifications and experience.

In addition, the guardian *ad litem* cannot serve as a mere conduit for hearsay or for the opinions of another person, including the subject child. The guardian *ad litem* cannot relate the opinion of a non-testifying witness unless the guardian *ad litem* has reasonably relied upon it. Upon appropriate objection from any party, the trial court shall strike any testimony or portion of the guardian *ad litem*'s written report that is inadmissible as hearsay if the requirements for Pa.R.E. 703 are not met.

Subdivision (d)(6) provides that a party may subpoena an individual interviewed by the guardian *ad litem*, an individual that is identified in the guardian *ad litem*'s report, or a document relied upon by the guardian *ad litem* in producing the report. The subdivision shall not be construed to limit a party's ability to subpoena other individuals or for the production of documents for a trial or hearing, or for discovery purposes, if the court had previously authorized discovery pursuant to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.5(c).

Rule 1915.21. Form of Order Appointing Guardian Ad Litem.

The order appointing a guardian *ad litem* in a child custody action pursuant to Rule 1915.11-2 shall be in substantially the following form:

(Caption)

ORDER OF COURT

AND NOW, THIS _____ day of _____, 20 ____, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Pursuant to Pa.R.[C]Civ.P. No. 1915.11-2, is appointed as guardian *ad litem* for the minor child _______(D.O.B. ______) in connection with the civil proceedings related to the custody of the minor child.

The child's guardian *ad litem* shall represent the best interests of the child. The guardian *ad litem* shall not act as the child's attorney or represent the child's legal interests.

It is ordered and decreed that all relevant schools, police departments, hospitals and social service agencies including home and school agencies who have records, reports and/or information pertaining to the child relevant to the custody of the child, shall allow the guardian ad litem access to all files and records in its possession, custody or control and shall cooperate in responding to all relevant inquires. These files/records may include but are not limited to medical, psychological or psychiatric charts including evaluations and progress notes and records, X-rays, photographs, tests, test evaluations, intake and discharge summaries, police records, and school records including report cards, educational assessments and educational plans, relevant to this custody dispute and/or relevant to any special needs or requirements of the child. The guardian *ad litem* shall have the right to copy any part of the files and records maintained in connection with the child.

It is further ordered and decreed that the guardian *ad litem* shall be permitted to see and speak with the child, and family, medical and/or social service providers connected with this case, and take all steps appropriate to and consonant with this order.

The guardian *ad litem* shall provide copies of any reports prepared by the guardian *ad litem* to each party, or to their counsel, and to the court **when filed but** not later than 20 days prior to **a hearing or** trial **or as otherwise ordered by the court**.

The guardian *ad litem* shall attend all proceedings and be prepared to testify. The guardian *ad litem* shall be subject to cross-examination <u>in accordance with</u> <u>Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-2(e)(2)</u> if called to testify [by either party or the court].

The fees for the guardian *ad litem* shall be paid as follows:

This appointment shall terminate upon the entry of a final order resolving the petition pending as of the date of this order or as provided in subsequent order of court.

SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA DOMESTIC RELATIONS PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE ADOPTION REPORT

On January 27, 2023, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania amended Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-2 and 1915.21, which address the appointment of a guardian *ad litem* (GAL) in a custody action, as authorized by 23 Pa.C.S. § 5334. Specifically, the amendments permit a GAL to include the subject child's statement to the GAL in the GAL's report, and to testify at trial about the statement as well, provided the requirements of the Pennsylvania Rule of Evidence 703 are satisfied. The Committee has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. *See* Pa.R.J.A. 103, cmt. The statements contained in this Adoption Report are those of the Committee, not the Court.

The Committee received a request for rulemaking on the admissibility of a child's statement to a GAL in a custody hearing or trial. The Rules of Civil Procedure provide for a GAL's appointment when the court finds that a GAL is necessary for the court to determine the child's best interest. As set forth in 23 Pa.C.S. § 5334(b), a GAL is required to meet with a child of an appropriate age to ascertain the facts. The GAL shall also interview potential witnesses, investigate facts and documents, and make specific recommendations in a written report to the court relating to the best interests of the child.

While meeting with the GAL, a child may make a statement to the GAL that could impact a court's best interest analysis. However, the Pennsylvania Rules of Evidence do not provide a categorical exception to Pa.R.E. 802 (Rule Against Hearsay) for a child's statement made to a GAL. Unlike dependency actions under the Juvenile Act, 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301 *et seq.*, in which a hearsay statement may be admissible in dispositional hearings, similar statements in a child custody action do not have a similar statutory exception and, as such, are inadmissible unless an enumerated hearsay exception applies. Never-

theless, as a matter of practice, a child's statement is often included in a GAL's report or testimony in custody matters.

As reported to the Committee, the admissibility of a child's hearsay vis-á-vis a GAL varies from court to court. Some courts will allow the statement into evidence because it could impact the child's best interest. Other courts will disallow the statement as hearsay unless a hearsay exception applies. To remedy the disparate treatment of the child's statement to a GAL, the Committee proposed amending the rules.

The Committee originally published proposed amendments for public comment in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, 50 Pa.B. 7007 (December 12, 2020). After reviewing the comments received from the original publication and additional deliberations, the Committee re-published the proposal for comment in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, 51 Pa.B. 6141 (September 25, 2021).

Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-2 is rewritten in its entirety. In addition to substantive amendments, the rule reflects stylistic and format changes. Further, the Note was removed, and its content placed in a Comment.

One of the substantive amendments includes subdivision (d)(1), which addresses the admissibility of a child's hearsay statement to a GAL. The GAL's report and testimony may include the child's statement to the GAL. If the child's statement complies with Pa.R.E. 703 (Bases of an Expert's Opinion Testimony), i.e., is the type of statement or information a GAL would rely upon in forming their recommendation on the child's best interest, the statement or information should be admissible and may be incorporated into the GAL's report or testimony. The revised rule reflects that a GAL may rely upon hearsay, as may be permitted pursuant to Pa.R.E. 703, as a basis for their recommendation. The amendment also confirms that a child's statement included in the GAL's report or testimony shall not be considered substantive evidence by the court.

Subdivision (d)(5) allows parties to file with the prothonotary, and serve on the other party and the court, a comment to the report or an objection to the report's admissibility, in whole or in part. The objection may be related to the child's statement.

Post-publication, the Committee added a subdivision related to the confidentiality of the report and a party's filed response. Subdivision (d)(3) states that the report and response shall be confidential and shall not constitute a public record.

Another substantive change is the deletion of the reference to 23 Pa.C.S. § 5336 in the rule text. Section 5336(b) identifies specific information that is expressly prohibited from disclosure to the parties. Of course, the court retains the discretion under Section 5336(c) to limit a party's access to certain records or information set forth in Section 5336(a). A reference to 23 Pa.C.S. § 5336 is included in the Comment.

The revised rule also clarifies that a party may subpoena an individual interviewed by the guardian *ad litem* or identified in the report to appear and testify at the hearing or trial. A party may also subpoena the guardian *ad litem* for the production of a document relied upon by the guardian *ad litem* in preparing the report. Postpublication, the rule was further revised in subdivision (d)(6) confirming a subpoena shall be "subject to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11," related to the appointment of an attorney for the child. Commentary was added confirming that this subdivision shall not be construed to limit a party's ability to subpoen oother individuals, or limit the production of documents, if the court previously authorized discovery pursuant to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.5(c).

There were several post-publication revisions to the Comment to provide further guidance to the reader. The amended Comment confirms that "appointments should be limited to extraordinary cases..." and "the duty and responsibility to determine the best interests of the children involved lies solely with the trial judge." Furthermore, while the requirements of Pa.R.E. 703 (Bases of an Expert's Opinion Testimony) must be satisfied, the guardian *ad litem* is not an expert witness and need not be qualified as an expert prior to testifying. Finally, the amendments clarify the guardian *ad litem* cannot simply relate the opinion of a non-testifying witness unless the guardian *ad litem* has reasonably relied upon it.

Additional post-publication revisions include amending Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.21 concerning the form order appointing a guardian *ad litem*. Specifically, the form order was revised to align with the language of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-2(d)(4) governing the guardian *ad litem*'s report. The general language informing the guardian *ad litem* that they may be subject to cross-examination "by either party or the court" was also amended to refer the reader to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1915.11-2(e)(2).

The following text in the Note was removed:

23 Pa.C.S. § 5334 is suspended insofar as it (1) requires that a guardian *ad litem* be an attorney, (2) permits the guardian *ad litem* to represent both the best interests and legal interests of the child, (3) provides the guardian *ad litem* the right to examine, cross-examine, present witnesses and present evidence on behalf of the child, and (4) prohibits the guardian *ad litem* from testifying.

The amendments become effective April 1, 2023. [Pa.B. Doc. No. 23-175. Filed for public inspection February 10, 2023, 9:00 a.m.]

This rule is effective thirty (30) days after the date of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

V.C.R.Crim.P. 576.1. Electronic Filing and Service of Legal Papers.

(A) Agreement. The Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts and the 28th Judicial District of Venango County have agreed upon an implementation plan for electronic filing, as that term is defined Pa.R.Crim.P. 576.1(C), in the 28th Judicial District of Venango County through the statewide system known as PACFile, effective April 4, 2022.

(B) Purpose.

1) The electronic filing of legal papers and the electronic service of such papers through the PACFile system with the Venango County Clerk of Court for criminal cases in the Venango County Court of Common Pleas is permitted under the terms described in this Local Rule.

2) The exclusive system for electronic filing is the PACFile System, developed and administered by the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts and located on Pennsylvania's Unified Judicial System Web Portal at https://ujsportal.pacourts.us/PACFile.aspx.

3) The applicable general rules of court and court policies that implement the rules shall continue to apply to all filings regardless of the method of filing.

(C) *Definitions*. As used in this rule, the following words shall have the following meanings:

"electronic filing," the electronic transmission of legal papers by means other than facsimile transmission and the acceptance of the document by the clerk of courts;

"filing party," an attorney, party, or other person who files a legal paper by means of electronic filing;

"legal paper," a pleading or other submission to the court, including motions, answers, notices, or other documents, of which filing is required or permitted, including orders, copies of exhibits, and attachments, but excluding:

(1) applications for search warrants,

(2) applications for arrest warrants,

(3) any grand jury materials, except the indicting grand jury indictment or the investigating grand jury presentment,

(4) submissions filed ex parte as authorized by law,

 $\left(5\right)$ submissions filed or authorized to be filed under seal, and

(6) exhibits offered into evidence, whether or not admitted, in a court proceeding;

(7) confidential documents, including but not limited to: drug & alcohol assessments and reports, mental health evaluations and reports, and medical records

"original document," a legal paper filed electronically shall be deemed the original document, but copies of exhibits electronically filed do not constitute the original exhibit for evidentiary purposes.

(D) Participation.

1) All attorneys and defendants proceeding without counsel shall be permitted to file legal papers electronically in accordance with this local rule.

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2) In order to participate in the PACFile system, an attorney shall establish an account in the PACFile system by procedures established by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

3) A defendant who is proceeding without counsel shall be permitted to utilize the PACFile system through an authorization process established by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

4) Establishment of an account by an attorney or authorization of a defendant proceeding without counsel in the PACFile system, to the extent permitted under this local rule and authorized by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts, shall constitute consent to participate in electronic filing, including acceptance of service electronically of any document filed in the PACFile system.

5) Any attorney or defendant participating in the PACFile system is permitted to file a legal paper either in an electronic or in a physical paper format. Service upon an attorney or defendant participating in the PACFile system shall be done electronically.

6) Any party who declines to participate in the PACFile electronic filing system, or who is unable to electronically file or accept service of legal papers which were filed electronically, or who is otherwise unable to access the PACFile system, shall be permitted to file legal papers in a physical paper format ('hard-copy') and shall be served legal papers in a physical paper format by the Clerk of Courts and other parties, whether electronically filed or otherwise, as required by Pa.R.Crim.P. 576.

7) The following offices must be served in accordance with Pa.R.Crim.P. 576: Sheriff, Adult Probation, Court Reporter, and Court Administration. This applies to the service of court orders and notices. Distribution to those parties not automatically served via PACFile with a court order or notice must be filed with the Clerk of Courts office with a complete distribution list including the names and addresses of all parties required to be served with a paper copy.

(E) Retention, Conversion, and Use of Legal Papers.

1) All legal papers electronically filed shall be maintained and retained by the clerk of courts in an electronic format. Neither the clerk of courts nor the court is required to maintain in a physical paper format any legal paper filed electronically as provided in this rule.

2) Any legal paper submitted for filing to the Clerk of Courts in a physical paper (or 'hard-copy') format shall be accepted by the Clerk of Courts in that format and shall be retained by the Clerk of Courts as may be required by applicable rules of court and record retention policies. The Clerk of Courts shall convert such hard-copy legal paper to .pdf and add it to the system, except those legal papers excluded from electronic filing pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 576.1(C) and this rule.

3) Once converted to .pdf, the .pdf version of the legal paper shall be deemed and treated as the original legal paper and may be used by the parties and the Court for all purposes, including but not limited to, court hearings and trials in the Venango County Court of Common Pleas.

4) Those legal papers that are not permitted to be electronically filed pursuant to this rule shall be maintained in a physical paper format only.

(F) Filing.

1) When a legal paper is to be electronically filed, it shall be submitted to the PACFile system at the Unified Judicial System web portal at http://ujsportal.pacourts.us, in accordance with Pa.R.Crim.P. 576.1, this rule, and any filing instructions as may be otherwise provided at the web portal site.

2) Electronic filings may be submitted at any time, except during times of periodic maintenance. The electronic submission must be completed by 11:59:59 p.m. EST/EDT to be considered filed that day.

3) A legal paper shall be considered filed upon submission of the legal paper to the system and acceptance of the filing by the clerk of courts. If the clerk of courts determines that the requirements for filing have been met, the time and date of filing shall be the time and date that the legal paper was submitted to the system. If the clerk of courts finds that the requirements for filing are not met, the clerk may reject the filing.

4) No legal paper that complies with the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure shall be refused for filing by the clerk of courts or the electronic filing system based upon a requirement of a local rule or local administrative procedure or practice pertaining to the electronic filing of legal papers.

5) A filing party shall be responsible for any delay, disruption, and interruption of the electronic signals and legibility of the document electronically filed, except when caused by the failure of the system's website.

6) Legal papers shall be presented for filing in portable document format (".pdf").

(G) Signature.

1) Except as provided in paragraph (G)(3), an electronic signature of the filer as provided for in the system is permitted on electronic filings in the following form: /s/ John L. Doe.

2) The electronic filing of a motion or answer that includes an electronic signature constitutes a certification pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 575 that the filing party or attorney has read the legal paper, that to the best of the filing party's or attorney's knowledge, information and belief there is good ground to support the motion or answer, and that it is not interposed for delay.

3) Any motion that, pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 575(A)(2)(g), avers facts not of record and requiring a sworn affidavit must be created in a physical paper form, have a physical signature placed on it, and then be converted into a .pdf before it may be electronically filed.

4) The original of a sworn or verified legal paper that is an electronic filing or is contained within an electronic filing shall be maintained by the electronic filer in paper format and made available upon direction of the court or reasonable request of the signatory or opposing party.

(H) Confidential Information. Counsel and unrepresented parties must adhere to the Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania and refrain from including confidential information in legal papers filed with the Clerk of Courts or the Court whether filed electronically or in a paper format.

(I) *Fees.* Applicable filing fees shall be paid through procedures established by the Clerk of Courts and at the same time and in the same amount as required by statute, Court rule or order, or published fee schedule.

(J) *Record on Appeal.* Electronically filed legal papers, and copies of legal papers filed in a paper format as provided in subsections (D) and (E), shall become the record on appeal.

Notice of Implementation—Industrialized Buildings and Components

The Department of Community and Economic Development (Department), is providing notice of the implementation of the regulations published at 46 Pa.B. 6976 (November 5, 2016) found at http://www.pacodeandbulletin. gov/Display/pabull?file=/secure/pabulletin/data/vol46/ 46-45/1901.html.

Under section 5 of the Industrialized Housing Act (act) (35 P.S. § 1651.5), the amendments of Chapter 145 (relating to industrial housing and components) expanded the Department's role to include monitoring the production of industrialized buildings and building components.

The implementation of the regulations published at 46 Pa.B. 6976 begins on February 22, 2023.

The certification program under Chapter 145 requires the Department to oversee the production, installation and inspection of new industrialized buildings. Industrialized buildings that are produced under this certification program, by evidence of the notice of approval, will be deemed to comply with the Pennsylvania Construction Code Act (35 P.S. §§ 7210.101—7210.1103). This type of certification program mirrors the current program established for industrialized housing.

This will be a "phase-in" period. As manufacturers are approved under the program, the notice of approval for industrialized buildings, like industrialized housing, will be issued. This period will end on December 31, 2023. At that time, all industrialized buildings and building components must be certified under the act (35 P.S. §§ 1651.1—1651.12) and Chapter 145, to be approved for placement in the Commonwealth.

All other aspects of Chapter 145 remain the same.

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION [25 PA. CODE CHS. 901 AND 903]

Importations of Water Into and Exportations of Water From the Delaware River Basin; Discharges of Wastewater from High Volume Hydraulic Fracturing and Related Activities

Proposed: Pennsylvania Bulletin (51 Pa.B. 7471 (December 4, 2021)).

Adopted: December 7, 2022, by the Delaware River Basin Commission, Pamela M. Bush, Esq., Commission Secretary.

Filed: December 12, 2022, as a final regulation.

Summary: By Resolution No. 2022-04 on December 7, 2022, the Delaware River Basin Commission ("DRBC" or "Commission") approved amendments to its Comprehensive Plan and the Delaware River Basin Water Code concerning importations of water into and exportations of water from the Delaware River Basin; its Special Regulations—High Volume Hydraulic Fracturing, to prohibit discharges to waters or land within the basin of wastewater from high volume hydraulic fracturing ("HVHF") and HVHF-related activities; and its Water Quality Regulations, to facilitate the implementation in state-issued permits of the prohibition on such discharges.

Dates: This final rule is effective thirty days after publication in the *Federal Register*.

Supplementary Information: The Delaware River Basin Commission is a Federal-interstate compact agency charged with managing the water resources of the Delaware River Basin on a regional basis without regard to political boundaries. Its members are the governors of the four basin states—Delaware, New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania—and the Division Engineer, North Atlantic Division of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, representing the Federal Government.

Background

By a Resolution for the Minutes on February 25, 2021, the DRBC Commissioners directed the Executive Director to prepare and publish for public comment a set of amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and implementing regulations to update the Commission's policies and provisions concerning inter-basin transfers of water and wastewater from and into the basin and to "include in the draft regulations such other proposed amendments...as [the Executive Director, in consultation with the Commissioners] deem necessary or appropriate." The directive accompanied the Commission's decision not to include in its final rule adopted in 2021, portions of a proposed rule published in the Federal Register in January 2018 that concerned the exportation of water to support high volume hydraulic fracturing and the importation, treatment, and discharge of "produced water" and "CWT wastewater" (with accompanying definitions).¹ In accordance with the Commission's February 25, 2021 directive, the Commission published a new proposed rule on its website on October 28, 2021.² A notice of proposed rulemaking and accompanying rule text appeared in the Federal Register, 86 Fed. Reg. 66250, on November 22, 2021; the Delaware Register of Regulations, 25 Del. Reg. 548, 559, on December 1, 2021; the New Jersey Register, 53 N.J.R. 1994, on December 6, 2021; the New York Register on November 17, 2021, p. 2; and the Pennsylvania Bulletin, 51 Pa.B. 7471, on December 4, 2021.

Opportunity for public input on the proposed rules was provided during a comment period that ran from October 28, 2021, through February 28, 2022. In addition to accepting written comments, the Commission accepted oral comment at five hearings conducted via Zoom and telephone. The fifth hearing included toll-free telephone access and real-time English-to-Spanish and Spanish-to-English professional translation, which allowed attendees to listen and participate in either English or Spanish. The Commission received a total of 2,461 public comment submissions, consisting of 2,388 in writing and 73 oral comments. Notably, in many cases, a single written submission consisted of comments with multiple signatories or parts, and many similar or identical comments were separately submitted by multiple commenters using form letters or template language provided by organizations.

The Commission reviewed the statements, consultant reports, scientific literature and other materials submitted by commenters. The staff, in consultation with the Commissioners, prepared a Comment and Response Document summarizing the comments on the proposed rule and setting forth the Commission's responses and revisions in detail. By Resolution No. 2022-04 on December 7, 2022, the Commission adopted the Comment and Response Document simultaneously with its adoption of the final rule.

Final Rule

The elements of the Commission's final rule are summarized below.

Water Code. With respect to imports and exports of water into and from the Delaware River Basin, the Commission in its proposed and final rule reaffirms and expands on findings and policies it previously added to the Water Code (at Section 2.30) and Comprehensive Plan by Resolution No. 1991-9 in June of 1991. The December 2022 amendments restate and provide for the implementation of these policies with greater specificity.

Special Regulations—High Volume Hydraulic Fracturing. The final amendments to the Special Regulations at 18 CFR part 440 include as proposed a new Section 440.4(a) comprising the Commission's determination that "[t]he discharge of wastewater from HVHF and HVHFrelated activities poses significant, immediate and longterm risks to the development, conservation, utilization, management, and preservation of the basin's water resources" and further, that "[c]ontrolling future pollution by prohibiting discharges of wastewater from HVHF and HVHF-related activities to waters or land within the basin is required to effectuate the Comprehensive Plan, avoid injury to the waters of the basin as contemplated by the Comprehensive Plan, and protect the public health and preserve the waters of the basin for uses in accordance with the Comprehensive Plan." The final amendments at new Section 440.4(b) prohibit the discharge of wastewater from high volume hydraulic fracturing and HVHF-related activities (hereinafter "HVHF wastewater") to waters or land within the basin.

Water Quality Regulations. The amendments to the Commission's Water Quality Regulations, consisting of a new Section 4.50, facilitate the implementation in stateissued permits of the prohibition set forth in the Special Regulations at 18 CFR 440.4.

Incorporation by Reference. The final rule incorporates by reference into the Code of Federal Regulations at 18 CFR part 410 the Commission's Water Quality Regulations and the Delaware River Basin Water Code as amended by the Commission on December 7, 2022.

Changes From the Proposed Rule

Water Code. After careful consideration of the comments received, the Commission revised its proposed amendments to Section 2.30 of the Delaware River Basin Water Code (the "Water Code") concerning the exportation of wastewater to better align these aspects of the rule with the Commission's polices for water conservation and pollution prevention.

The language originally proposed at Section 2.30.2 C.3 of the Water Code would have allowed the Commission to approve any exportation of wastewater, subject to an evaluation of factors designed to ensure no harm to the basin's water resources or the health and safety of the basin community. Many commenters were concerned that this exception was too broad. Upon further consideration, the Commission agrees. It concluded that to consider and, subject to an evaluation of the factors set forth at Section 2.30.3, approve any exportation of wastewater risks undercutting the conservation objectives served by limiting exportations of basin water in accordance with the introductory paragraph and paragraphs 1 and 2 of Section 2.30.2 C. of the proposed, now final, amendments. Accordingly, the final language of section 2.30.2 C.3 narrows the circumstances in which the Commission may approve an exportation of wastewater to instances in which the project sponsor demonstrates either (i) that the wastewater is to be conveyed to a straddled or adjacent public wastewater collection system; or (ii) that the wastewater may not lawfully be discharged to a public wastewater collection system and is being exported to a waste management facility that has all state and federal approvals required to lawfully receive it.

Thus, the final rule subjects proposed exportations of wastewater to limitations that are consistent with those applicable to exportations of water generally. Because water and wastewater service areas often straddle basin boundaries, the final rule also ensures that straddled and adjacent wastewater collection systems, including for both sewered and hauled septage, may continue to operate, and if necessary, expand, normally. And it recognizes that in the interest of preserving water quality, state-

permitted facilities and federal-permitted facilities for the proper treatment and disposal of difficult-to-treat wastewater that may be located outside the basin must remain available to wastewater generators within the basin.

To clarify the changes to Section 2.30.2 C.3 of the Water Code, Section 2.30.1 of the final rule includes definitions of "Public wastewater collection system," "Adjacent public wastewater collection system," and "Straddled public wastewater collection system" that were not included in the proposed rule. The definitions are designed to parallel those previously proposed for "Public water system," "Adjacent public water system," and "Straddled public water system," respectively.

The final rule includes additional non-substantive changes in two sections. Language in Section 2.30.1 A., defining "Adjacent public water system," was revised for greater stylistic consistency and clarity. The wording of Section 2.30.2 C.2. was changed slightly to make clear that any exportation under that provision must be for the purpose of meeting public health and safety needs of the receiving system regardless of whether the exportation is intended to be temporary, short-term, or in response to an emergency.

Special Regulations—High Volume Hydraulic Fracturing. The final rule in § 440.2 includes a new defined term, "Discharge of wastewater from HVHF and HVHFrelated activities," to make the meaning of the rules more explicit. In the same section, two words were added to subsection (1) of the definition of "Wastewater from HVHF and HVHF-related activities". The words "or" and "containing" were inserted to clarify that the definition refers to wastewater, brine, or sludge containing (as opposed to constituting) the various listed contaminants. Additional non-substantive changes were made to conform proposed rule text in § 440.2 to Code of Federal Regulations standards.

Water Quality Regulations. The final rule includes no changes from the amendments proposed to the Water Quality Regulations.

Activities Prohibited and Activities not Regulated by the Final Rule

Many commenters urged the Commission to prohibit activities that were prohibited by the language of the rule as proposed and are now prohibited by the final rule at 18 CFR 440.4. The final rule at Section 440.4(b) prohibits the discharge of wastewater "from high volume hydraulic fracturing and HVHF-related activities to waters or land within the basin." The terms "HVHF-related activities" and "wastewater from HVHF and HVHF-related activities" are defined in detail in Section 440.2. Activities about which multiple commenters expressed concern and that are prohibited by the final rule include (but are not necessarily limited to) the following:

• discharge of HVHF wastewater to waters or land within the basin;

• road spreading of HVHF wastewater;

• injection of HVHF wastewater into deep wells within the basin;

• disposal of HVHF wastewater in basin landfills;

• discharge of leachate from any landfill in the basin that accepts HVHF waste after the effective date of the final regulations, including after treatment at an onsite or off-site leachate or wastewater treatment plant; and

• spills and leaks during transport, transfer, or storage of HVHF wastewater within the basin if not fully cap-

tured by a containment system in place throughout the duration of the spill or leak and thereafter promptly removed or remediated.

Other commenters urged the Commission to prohibit activities that are beyond the scope of the proposed rule. As explained in detail in the Commission's Comment and Response document, the final rule does not:

• regulate air emissions from HVHF activities;

• categorically prohibit the transfer of HVHF wastewater into the basin when no resulting discharge is proposed;

• regulate the transportation and storage of HVHF materials, which are regulated under detailed state and federal programs focused on these activities;

• categorically prohibit the transfer of water from the basin if it would be used to support HVHF (or any other specified activity). However, the rule does limit the circumstances under which transfers of water from the basin will be considered and provides for an evaluation of such proposals based on factors designed to ensure no harm to the basin's water resources or the health and safety of the basin community; or

• prohibit road spreading of wastewater from conventional drilling activities, an activity not within the scope of DRBC's proposed rulemaking. The Commission will continue to coordinate with the basin states to review the scientific evidence regarding harm to water resources caused by road spreading of conventional oil and gas production wastewater and may in the future consider whether additional regulation of the practice is needed in the basin.

For the reasons set forth in the preamble, effective thirty days after publication in the *Federal Register*, the Commission's rule adoption amends the *Pennsylvania Code*, Title 25, Part V, Chapters 901 and 903 (incorporating by reference the appropriate sections of 18 CFR chapter III). The rule text is set forth below:

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN WATER CODE

1. Amend Section 2.30 of the Delaware River Basin Water Code by repealing the existing text and replacing it in its entirety as set forth below:

2.30 IMPORTATIONS AND EXPORTATIONS OF WA-TER, INCLUDING WASTEWATER

2.30.1 Definitions (Resolutions Nos. 91-9 and 2022-04). For purposes of this section 2.30:

A. "Adjacent public water system" means a public water system (as defined herein) located outside the

Delaware River Basin that has a service area directly bordering the service area of a public water system located in whole or in part within the Basin.

B. "Adjacent public wastewater collection system" means a public wastewater collection system (as defined herein) located outside the Delaware River Basin that has a service area directly bordering the service area of a public wastewater collection system located in whole or in part within the Basin.

C. "Basin water" (also, "waters of the Basin") means water in, on, under or above the ground within the Delaware River Basin. "Basin water" includes wastewater.

D. "Delaware River Basin" (or "Basin") has the meaning assigned to it by Section 1.2(a) of the *Delaware River Basin Compact*—the area of drainage into the Delaware River and its tributaries, including Delaware Bay.

E. "Exportation" means the conveyance, transfer, or diversion of Basin water from a source within the Delaware River Basin to a location outside the Basin without return of such water to the Basin. Exportations from the Basin of consumer goods or foods that have been manufactured, bottled, packaged, or processed using Basin water are not considered "exportations" for purposes of this rule.

F. "Importation" means the conveyance, transfer, or diversion of water, including wastewater, into the Delaware River Basin from a source outside the Basin, resulting in a discharge of the imported water to land or water within the Basin, with or without prior treatment.

G. "Public water system" means a system primarily for the provision to the public of piped water for human consumption, if such system has at least fifteen service connections or regularly serves at least twenty-five individuals. A "public water system" may be publicly or privately owned.

H. "Public wastewater collection system" means a system with all required state and federal approvals that serves more than 250 people or conveys more than 25,000 gallons of wastewater per day and is primarily for the collection and conveyance of domestic sewage from private, commercial, institutional, or industrial sources, to a treatment system with all necessary state and federal approvals. A "public wastewater collection system" may be publicly or privately owned.

I. "Straddled public water system" means a public water system that serves an area partially within and partially outside of the Delaware River Basin.

J. "Straddled public wastewater collection system" means a public wastewater collection system that serves an area partially within and partially outside of the Delaware River Basin.

K. "Wastewater" means water that is stored, transported or discharged after use, including, but not limited to, any water for which a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit under the federal Clean Water Act or any state or DRBC approval is required before the water can lawfully be discharged to waters or land within the Basin.

2.30.2 Protection and Preservation

A. The waters of the Delaware River Basin are limited in quantity, and the Basin is frequently subject to drought warnings, drought declarations, and drought operations due to limited water supply storage and streamflow during dry periods. In addition, portions of the Basin have been delineated by the Commission as groundwater protected areas due to water shortages. Therefore, it is the policy of the Commission to promote the conservation and preservation of water and related natural resources, including aquatic ecosystems, and effectuate the Comprehensive Plan and the uses of the water resources of the Basin identified therein, by discouraging, limiting, or placing conditions on the exportation of Basin water as may be required to protect the health and safety of Basin residents, aquatic ecosystems and the uses of water identified in the Compact and Comprehensive Plan.

B. The Commission shall review a proposed new exportation of Basin water, including any proposed increase in the rate or volume of an existing exportation, and may impose conditions, obligations and release requirements related thereto, pursuant to Sections 3.3, 3.8, 5.2, 10.3, 10.4 and Article 11 of the Compact and the regulations and docket approvals implementing these provisions.

C. A proposed new exportation of Basin water that is subject to review under the Compact and implementing regulations, including any proposed increase in the rate or volume of an existing exportation, may be approved by the Commission after consideration of the factors set forth at Section 2.30.3 below, if:

1. the sponsor demonstrates that the exportation of Basin water is required to serve a straddled or adjacent public water system;

2. the sponsor demonstrates that the exportation of Basin water is required to meet public health and safety needs on a temporary, short-term, or emergency basis; or

3. the sponsor is proposing an exportation of wastewater and demonstrates either (i) that the wastewater is being conveyed to a straddled or adjacent public wastewater collection system; or (ii) that the wastewater may not lawfully be discharged to a public wastewater collection system and is being exported for treatment, disposal or both at a waste management facility that has all required state and federal approvals to lawfully receive it.

D. Basin waters have limited capacity to assimilate pollutants without significant impacts to the health and safety of Basin residents, the health and functioning of aquatic ecosystems in the Basin, and the effectuation of the Comprehensive Plan. Accordingly, it is the policy of the Commission to discourage, limit, or condition the importation of wastewater into the Delaware River Basin as necessary to avoid impairment of Basin waters. A proposed new importation of water, including any proposed increase in the rate or volume of an existing importation, shall be reviewed by the Commission consistent with the factors set forth at Section 2.30.3 below.

E. This Section 2.30 shall not apply to importations and exportations of water, including wastewater, that existed prior to enactment of the Compact or that were approved by the DRBC prior to December 7, 2022.

2.30.3 Commission Considerations (Resolutions Nos. 91-9 and 2022-04). In evaluating importations and exportations, the Commission's review will include consideration of the following factors:

A. For exportations of Basin water (including wastewater):

1. the effect of the exportation on the health and safety of the Basin community;

2. the effect of the exportation on existing or future water availability or shortages, including, but not limited

to, sources within areas designated by the Commission as protected areas pursuant to Section 10.2 of the Compact, sources within Delaware River reaches with flows that are frequently augmented by reservoir releases due to low flows, and sources in areas subject to DRBC drought operations or state drought declarations within the past five years;

3. the effect of the exportation on aquatic ecosystems;

4. the effect of the exportation on water quality and waste assimilation;

5. the effect of the exportation on salinity concentrations:

6. the effect of the exportation on the water uses protected by the Comprehensive Plan, DRBC regulations or DRBC docket approvals, or on the ability of DRBC to effectuate the Comprehensive Plan;

7. the effect of the exportation, including its volume, rate, timing and duration, on passby or instream flow requirements contained in DRBC regulations or project approvals;

8. the sponsor's planned use for the water and any resulting public benefits;

9. the availability to the sponsor of alternatives to the exportation of Basin water and whether these alternatives have been diligently pursued, including without limitation a review of the sponsor's uses of water outside the sponsor's service area, if any; conservation measures undertaken by the sponsor or a public water system in the service area where the sponsor is located to forestall the need for a transfer of Basin water; and the results of a water audit (or audits) performed by the sponsor in accordance with Section 2.1.8 of the Delaware River Basin Water Code; and

10. whether the exportation would contravene sections 3.3 and 3.5(a) of the Compact by impeding or interfering with the rights, powers, privileges, conditions or obliga-tions contained in the Supreme Court Decree in New Jersey v. New York, 347 U.S. 995 (1954), as modified by the Commission with the unanimous consent of the parties to the Decree.

B. For importations of water (including wastewater):

1. the effect of the importation on the health and safety of the Basin community with due consideration of the available alternatives to the importation;

2. the characterization and treatability of the water, if it consists of wastewater;

3. the potential impacts on water resources of the Delaware River Basin of the proposed importation and of each available alternative, including alternatives that avoid an importation of water, including wastewater. The potential impacts considered will include the effects of the quality, volume, flow rate, timing and duration of the proposed importation in relation to:

a. flow objectives or passing or instream flow requirements contained in DRBC regulations or project approvals;

b. the record of hydrologic conditions in the proposed receiving region and the larger Delaware River Basin;

c. water uses as established by the Comprehensive Plan, including the DRBC Water Code;

d. the effect of the importation on aquatic ecosystems;

e. water quality and waste assimilation capacity in the affected receiving streams; and

f. prior regulations or orders of the Commission which may be identified during the course of the Commission's review

- 2.30.4 Analyses by Applicant for Section 3.8 Approval. When an importation or exportation of water or wastewater is subject to review by the Commission, the applicant shall furnish the Commission with such analyses of the factors set forth in Sections 2.30.2 and 2.30.3 above and as the Commission may direct.
- 2.30.5 Water Charges (Resolutions Nos. 91-9 and 2022-04). Exportation of Basin water constitutes consumptive water use and will be subject to the water charges in effect at the time of transfer in accordance with the Commission's Water Supply Charges regulations (18 CFR Part 420), as amended.
- 2.30.6 Wastewater Treatment Requirements (Resolution No. 91-9). It is the policy of the Commission to give no credit toward meeting wastewater treatment requirements for importations of wastewater. An effluent loading or concentration authorized in accordance with a water-quality-based effluent limit such as a wasteload allocation may not include loadings attributable to an importation of wastewater.
- 2.30.7 Existing Allocations (Resolution No. 91-9). It is the policy of the Commission to charge all exportations of Basin water against any special regional allocation or any depletive use allocation as may exist at the time of receipt of a completed application for exportation.
- 2.30.8 1954 Supreme Court Decree. This Section 2.30 is intended to preserve the diversions, compensating releases, rights, conditions, and obligations of the parties to the U.S. Supreme Court Decree of 1954 in New Jersey v. New York, 347 U.S. 995 (1954), as modified by the Commission with the unanimous consent of the parties to the Decree.

WATER QUALITY REGULATIONS

1. Amend Section 4.40.2 by replacing references to "Section 4.50" with references to "Section 4.60" as set forth below:

Section 4.40.2 Enforcement Procedures. The enforcement procedure of Section 4.60 with respect to effluent quality requirements for discharges shall be deemed applicable to the enforcement of this Section and Section 3.40. For the purposes thereof, the word "dis-charger" as used in Section 4.60 includes any party affected by this Section.

2. Amend Article 4 by adding a new Section 4.50 as set forth below:

Section 4.50 Wastewater from High Volume Hydraulic Fracturing. The provisions of 18 CFR 440.4 and the purpose and definitions applicable thereto, encom-passing 18 CFR 440.1 and 18 CFR 440.2, are hereby incorporated into these Water Quality Regulations.

3. Amend Article 4 by renumbering prior Section 4.50 as new Section 4.60 as set forth below. Asterisks represent no change to existing text:

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Section 4.60 Enforcement Procedures.

4.60.1 Scope. * * *

4.60.2 Abatement Schedules and Permits. *

* 4.60.3 Waste Load Allocations. * * *

* * * * * 4.60.4 Inspection and Surveillance.

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4.60.5 Noncompliance; Notice. *

* 4.60.6 Order of Abatement; Sanctions. * * *

(c) Work, services, activities and facilities affecting the conservation, utilization, control, development or management of water resources within the Delaware River Basin are subject to regulations contained within the Delaware River Basin Water Code with Amendments through December 7, 2022 and the Administrative Manual-Part III Water Quality Regulations with Amendments through December 7, 2022. Both the Delaware River Basin Water Code and the Administrative Manual-Part III Water Quality Regulations are incorporated by reference into this part with the approval of the Director of the Federal Register under 5 U.S.C. 552(a) and 1 CFR part 51. 3. The authority citation for part 440 continues to read as follows:

Authority: Delaware River Basin Compact (75 Stat. 688).

4. Amend § 440.1 by revising paragraph (d) to read as follows:

§ 440.1 Purpose, authority, and relationship to other requirements.

(d) Relationship to other Commission requirements. The provisions of this part are in addition to all applicable requirements in other Commission regulations, dockets, permits, and determinations.

> * *

5. Amend § 440.2 by revising the introductory paragraph, adding in alphabetical order definitions for "Discharge of wastewater from HVHF and HVHF-related activities," "HVHF-related activities," and "Wastewater from HVHF and HVHF-related activities", and revising the definition of "Water resource(s)", to read as follows:

§ 440.2 Definitions.

For purposes of this part, the following terms and phrases have the meanings provided. Some definitions differ from those provided in regulations of one or more agencies of the Commission's member states and the Federal Government. Other definitions are consistent with terms defined by the Delaware River Basin Compact.

Discharge of wastewater from HVHF and HVHF-related activities is an intentional or unintentional action or omission resulting in the releasing, spilling, leaking, pumping, pouring, emitting, emptying, spreading, spraying, injecting, leaching, dumping, or disposing of such wastewater to waters or land within the Basin, and including the abandonment or discarding of barrels, containers, and other receptacles containing such wastewater.

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HVHF-related activities are:

(1) Construction of an oil or natural gas production well that is to be stimulated using HVHF as defined in this section;

(2) Chemical mixing or storage of proppant, chemicals and other additives to make fracturing fluid; and

(3) Management of wastewater from hydraulic fracturing, including storage, disposal, treatment, or reuse in hydraulic fracturing operations or other uses.

Wastewater from HVHF and HVHF-related activities is:

(1) Any wastewater, brine, or sludge containing chemicals, naturally occurring radioactive materials, heavy metals or other contaminants that have been used for or generated by high volume hydraulic fracturing or HVHFrelated activities;

(2) Leachate from solid wastes associated with HVHFrelated activities, except if the solid wastes were lawfully disposed of in a landfill within the Basin prior to March 6, 2023; and

(3) Any products, co-products, byproducts or waste products resulting from the treatment, processing or modification of the wastewater described in paragraphs (1) and (2) of this definition.

Water resource(s) is, in accordance with section 1.2(i) of the Delaware River Basin Compact, "water and related natural resources in, on, under, or above the ground, including related uses of land, which are subject to beneficial use, ownership or control" within the Delaware River Basin.

6. Add § 440.4 to read as follows:

§ 440.4 Wastewater from high volume hydraulic fracturing and related activities.

(a) Determination. The Commission has determined that the discharge of wastewater from high volume hydraulic fracturing and HVHF-related activities poses significant, immediate and long-term risks to the development, conservation, utilization, management, and preservation of the Basin's water resources. Controlling future pollution by prohibiting such discharge is required to effectuate the Comprehensive Plan, avoid injury to the waters of the Basin as contemplated by the Comprehensive Plan and protect the public health and preserve the waters of the Basin for uses in accordance with the Comprehensive Plan.

(b) *Prohibition.* No person may discharge wastewater from high volume hydraulic fracturing or HVHF-related activities to waters or land within the Basin.

CHAPTER 901. GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 901.2. Comprehensive Plan and water quality.

The Comprehensive Plan regulations as set forth in 18 CFR Part 401, Subpart A (2014) and the Water Code and Water Quality Regulations as set forth in 18 CFR Part 410 (2023) are hereby incorporated by reference and made a part of this title.

CHAPTER 903. HYDRAULIC FRACTURING IN SHALE AND OTHER FORMATIONS

§ 903.1. Hydraulic fracturing in shale and other formations.

The hydraulic fracturing in shale and other formation regulations, as set forth in 18 CFR Part 440 (2023), are hereby incorporated by reference and made part of this title.

General Permit Standards and Requirements for Hemp

Recitals.

This Notice amends and replaces the previous Notice "General Permit Standards and Requirements for Hemp" published in the April 3, 2021 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* (51 Pa.B. 1831, Saturday, April 3, 2021).

A. The Act relating to Controlled Plants and Noxious Weeds ("Act") (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 1501 et seq.) authorizes the Department of Agriculture (Department) through the Controlled Plant and Noxious Weed Committee (Committee) to establish a controlled plant list and to add plants to or remove plants from the controlled plant list (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 1511(b)(3)(ii)(iii)).

B. The Act provides for publication of the noxious weed and the controlled plant list and additions or removals or changes thereto to be published as a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and for such additions or removals to become effective sixty (60) days from publication (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 1511(b)(3)(iv)).

C. Pursuant to that authority, the Committee acted to add hemp to the Controlled Plant List and published such Notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on April 6, 2019 (49 Pa.B. 1667, Saturday April 6, 2019).

D. Section 1513 of the Act authorizes the Department to issue General Permits, on a Statewide or Regional basis, for the research, marketing, retail, wholesale, transport, storage, warehousing, display, distribution, cultivation or propagation of controlled plants, where the controlled plants have similar characteristics and are capable of being cultivated, propagated, processed and controlled or eradicated in a similar fashion (3 Pa.C.S.A § 1513(1)).

E. General Permits and applications for General Permits must address at least those requirements set forth at section 1514(5)(i)—(viii) (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 1514(5)(i)—(viii)), but may include and address additional requirements as established by the Department herein (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 1513(3)).

F. General permits shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and become effective upon publication (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 1513(2)).

G. Hemp is also regulated on the Federal level by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) as authorized by the Agricultural Improvement Act of 2018 (115-334), (2018 Farm Bill).

H. The 2018 Farm Bill defined "hemp" as the plant species *Cannabis sativa L.* and any part of that plant, including the seeds thereof and all derivatives, extracts, cannabinoids, isomers, acids, salts, and salts of isomers, whether growing or not, with a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of not more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis.

I. The 2018 Farm Bill directed USDA to establish guidelines for states to follow in establishing plans to allow for state primacy in the regulation of growing or cultivation of hemp plants.

J. With the designation of hemp as a Controlled Plant under the authority of the Act, persons are required to obtain a permit from the Department prior to cultivating, propagating, growing or processing hemp.

K. Hemp has been designated a controlled plant in Pennsylvania and its propagation, cultivation, testing, transportation, warehousing and storage, processing, distribution and sale is of a statewide concern.

L. This General Permit establishes rules and requirements for the distribution and sale of hemp planting materials, and for the propagation, cultivation, testing, transportation, warehousing, storage, and processing of hemp as authorized by the Act.

M. This General Permit does not and may not abrogate the provisions of the act related to industrial hemp research, at 3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 701—710, including, permitted growers must still submit fingerprints to the Pennsylvania State Police for the purpose of obtaining criminal history record checks. The Pennsylvania State Police or its authorized agent shall submit the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the purpose of verifying the identity of the applicant and obtaining a current record of any criminal arrests and convictions.

General Permit.

With the forgoing recitals incorporated into this General Permit by reference, the Department hereby establishes a General Permit, under the authority of the act related to controlled plants and noxious weeds (Act) (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 1501 et seq.), for the Controlled Plant, hemp. The terms of the General Permit are as follows:

Article I. General Provisions and Definitions.

(a) Establishment of the Hemp General Permit. A General permit is hereby established for the Controlled Plant, hemp, defined as the plant Cannabis sativa L. and any viable part of that plant, with a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) concentration of not more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis. This General Permit covers the entire Commonwealth.

(b) *Purpose of the General Permit*. The purpose of this general permit is as follows:

(1) To establish provisions to control the planting, growing, propagation and cultivation of hemp.

(2) To establish requirements under which persons may apply to plant, grow, propagate or cultivate hemp in the Commonwealth for the purpose of research or commercial production.

(3) To establish requirements detailing where hemp may be planted, grown, propagated and cultivated in the Commonwealth.

(4) To establish requirements for sale and distribution of hemp nursery stock.

(5) To establish requirements under which persons may apply to process hemp in the Commonwealth.

(6) To establish requirements for tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) testing of hemp planted, grown, propagated, cultivated or processed in the Commonwealth.

(7) To establish requirements for the transportation of hemp planted, grown, propagated and cultivated in the Commonwealth.

(8) To establish requirements for storage and warehousing of hemp planted, grown, propagated and cultivated in the Commonwealth.

(9) To establish requirements for the disposal of a permitted crop where the THC concentration exceeds 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis.

(c) Definitions

Acceptable hemp THC level. When a laboratory tests a sample, it must report the total delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol content concentration level on a dry weight basis and the measurement of uncertainty. The acceptable hemp THC level for the purpose of compliance with the requirements of this General Permit is when the applica-tion of the measurement of uncertainty to the reported total delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol content concentration level on a dry weight basis produces a distribution or range that includes 0.3 percent or less. For example, if the reported total delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol content concentration level on a dry weight basis is 0.35 percent and the measurement of uncertainty is \pm 0.06 percent, the measured total delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol content concentration level on a dry weight basis for this sample ranges from 0.29 percent to 0.41 percent. Because 0.3 percent is within the distribution or range, the sample is within the acceptable hemp THC level for the purpose of plan compliance.

Act. The act of October 30, 2017, P.L. 774, No. 46, at 3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 1501—1562, related to controlled plants and noxious weeds.

Agent or inspector. A representative of the Department of Agriculture duly appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out the provision of the Act and this General Permit.

Applicant. A person(s) signing and submitting a hemp application and responsible for ensuring compliance with the terms of the application and permit.

Committee. The Controlled Plant and Noxious Weed Committee established in section 1511 (relating to designation of noxious weeds and controlled plants).

Control order: A written order issued by the department to a person detailing required treatment measures to control noxious weeds or controlled plants.

Controlled plant. A plant species or subspecies that has been designated by the Committee as a controlled plant and is regulated to prevent uncontained growth and to negate undesirable characteristics.

Controlled Substances Act (CSA). The Federal statute codified in 21 U.S.C. 801—971, establishing Federal U.S. drug policy under which the manufacture, importation, exportation, possession, use and distribution of certain substances is regulated.

Conviction. Any plea of guilty or nolo contendere, or any finding of guilt, except when the finding of guilt is subsequently overturned on appeal, pardoned, or expunged.

Culpable mental state greater than negligence. To act intentionally, knowingly, willfully or recklessly.

Decarboxylation. The removal or elimination of carboxyl groups from a molecule or organic compound. Refers to the completion of the chemical reaction that converts THCA into delta-9 THC, the intoxicating component of cannabis. The decarboxylated value is also calculated using a molecular mass conversion ratio that sums delta-9 THC and eighty-seven and seven tenths (87.7) percent of THC-acid ((delta-9 THC) + (0.877*THCA)).

Delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol. Also referred to as "Delta-9 THC" or "THC" is the primary psychoactive component of cannabis. For the purposes of this General Permit, delta-9 THC and THC are interchangeable.

Department. The Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth.

Distribute or *distribution*. To barter, consign, exchange, give away, import, in any way transfer, offer for sale, sell or otherwise supply or transport a noxious weed or controlled plant in this Commonwealth.

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). A Federal law enforcement agency under the United States Department of Justice, and the lead agency for domestic enforcement of the Controlled Substances Act.

Dry weight basis. The ratio of the amount of moisture in a sample to the amount of dry solid in a sample. A basis for expressing the percentage of a chemical in a substance after removing the moisture from the substance. Percentage of THC on a dry weight basis means the percentage of THC, by weight, in a cannabis item (plant, extract, or other derivative), after excluding moisture from the item.

Eradication. The elimination or removal of a noxious weed or controlled plant so that no further growth occurs for at least three consecutive years.

Farm Service Agency (FSA). An agency of the United States Department of Agriculture that provides services to farm operations.

General permit. A Statewide or regional permit that is issued by the Department for a controlled plant and specifies terms and conditions for distribution, cultivation or propagation of the controlled plant.

Hemp. The plant *Cannabis sativa L.* and any viable part of that plant, with a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) concentration of not more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis.

Key participants. A sole proprietor, a partner in partnership, or a person with executive managerial control in a corporation. A person with executive managerial control includes persons such as a chief executive officer, chief operating officer, and chief financial officer. This definition does not include non-executive managers such as farm, field, or shift managers.

Landowner. A person in whom is vested the title of property or with any rights in real property that permit possession or control of surface activities on the real property. The term includes a department, board, commission, agency and instrumentality of the Federal Government and the Commonwealth and any of its political subdivisions.

Lessee. A person who has entered into a contract granting the person occupation or use of property during a certain period of time in exchange for a specified rent.

Lot. The term "lot", as defined in the Agricultural Marketing Service Final Rule (FR) on the Establishment of a Domestic Hemp Production Program (86 FR 5596), refers to a contiguous area in a field, greenhouse or indoor growing structure containing the same variety or strain of cannabis throughout the area. In addition, "lot" refers to the batch of contiguous, homogeneous whole of a product being sold to a single buyer at a single time. To be defined by the producer in terms of farm location, field acreage and variety (i.e. cultivar) and to be reported as such to the Department and the FSA.

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Negligence. Failure to exercise the level of care that a reasonably prudent person would exercise in complying with the regulations and standards established.

Permit. A document issued by the Department authorizing a person to perform functions and activities related to hemp which require adherence to the rules and requirements established by this General Permit.

Person. An individual, corporation, association, partnership, municipality or any other entity.

Processor. Any person who converts hemp material from its form while in the field into a different form or product, as well as any person who receives viable hemp material from a secondary supplier, to further convert into a different form or product

Propagate. To increase, multiply or spread a plant or crop through planting, cultivation or any means of reproduction.

Remediation. The process of rendering non-compliant cannabis, compliant. Remediation can occur by removing and destroying flower material while retaining stalk, stems, leaf material, and seeds. Remediation can also occur by shredding the entire plant into a bio-mass like material, then re-testing the shredded biomass material for compliance.

School Property. Any property used by students that is under the jurisdiction of a public school district, intermediate unit, area vocational-technical school, charter school or non-public school.

THC. The chemical delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol. For the purposes of this General Permit, THC shall include total potential delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol in a plant or product. THC value is determined after the process of decarboxylation, or the application of a conversion factor if the testing methodology does not include decarboxylation, that expresses the potential total delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol content derived from the sum of the THC and THCA content and reported on a dry weight basis. This post-decarboxylation value of THC can be calculated by using a chromatograph technique using heat, such as gas chromatography, through which THCA is converted from its acid form to its neutral form, THC. Thus, this test calculates the total potential THC in a given sample. The total THC can also be calculated by using a liquid chromatograph technique, which keeps the THCA intact. This technique requires the use of the following conversion: (Total THC = $(0.877 \times \text{THCA}) + \text{THC}$) which calculates the potential total THC in a given sample.

USDA. The United States Department of Agriculture.

Article II. Procedure for Application and Permitting.

(a) *Permit Application Process*. The following rules and requirements apply to permitting and the application for a permit.

(1) To produce, process or research hemp under the Pennsylvania Hemp General Permit, a person must apply for and be issued a Permit from the Department.

(2) No permit shall be issued to grow, cultivate or propagate hemp for personal use.

(3) Research permits shall only be issued to Institutions of Higher Education or established research institutes.

(4) Conditions and terms of this General Permit may change upon future conditions, including requirements imposed by USDA in acceptance of the Pennsylvania State Hemp Plan, legal standards imposed by another Federal agency, statutory or regulatory changes or changes in other legal requirements.

(5) Application periods will be announced by the Department and published at https://agriculture.pa.gov/ hemp. Persons anticipating late season or indoor planting must submit their applications during published application periods.

(6) The permit application will be available for download from the Department's Hemp Program website at https://agriculture.pa.gov/hemp. At that website, there will also be announcements of availability of the hemp application process online through PA Plants. Applications may also be requested by contacting The Bureau of Plant Industry Hemp Program at 223-666-2561 or by mail at:

(7) Applications shall be submitted with the application fee and supporting documents. The completed application along with all required reporting constitutes a written plan as required by the Act. Incomplete applications will not be processed.

(8) Any persons who materially falsify any information in their application shall be deemed ineligible to participate in the program.

(9) Upon successful review of completed applications, the Department will issue permit documents to approved applicants.

(b) *Application Contents*. All applications shall comply with the requirements established herein.

(1) Contact Information. Set forth contact information including at a minimum, legal name, address, day and evening telephone numbers, and email address (if available). If the applicant is a business entity, the applicant shall provide the full name of the business, address of the principal business location, full name and title of the key participants, an email address if available, and an EIN number of the business entity.

(2) Location Information. Provide the physical location, including a detailed plot map and description of the site to be planted or the site where the hemp will be propagated, cultivated, stored or processed. A separate "Permit Location Information" page is required and shall be submitted for each physical address (individually titled property) of a growing, cultivating, propagating, researching or processing location. Storage location information is optional at time of application but must be provided before any hemp is moved into storage.

(i) The description of the location shall include the county and municipality.

(ii) Contain a legal description of the land, plot map and geospatial location of the overall site and each separate field, greenhouse, building or other site where hemp will be produced, warehoused or processed. The plot map must show the name of each road bordering the physical location.

 $(\ensuremath{\text{iii}})$ If the address/facility is not owned by the applicant:

(A) The applicant must attest to the fact that the property is completely controlled by this applicant.

(B) A lease shall be executed between the property owner and the permit holder for the land on which hemp will be planted, propagated, cultivated, stored or processed and must be retained by the applicant and provided to the Department upon request. This lease shall specifically grant access to the property by the Department during the entirety of the lease agreement.

(C) With the application, the applicant must provide an agreement signed by both the property owner and the lessee granting the Department access to the property for up to 3 years following the termination of the lease and allowing for the destruction of any hemp plants found on the property (at the expense of the hemp permit holder) in that time. A template of this access agreement is available on the Department's website.

(iv) Location Restrictions:

(A) Given the potential of hemp pollen to interfere with medical marijuana crops, hemp may not be planted within three miles of an approved medical marijuana growing facility.

(B) Hemp may not be grown, cultivated, propagated or planted in or within 200 feet of any structure that is used for residential purposes, without prior written approval from the Department. Any written approval may establish additional requirements set forth by the Department therein.

(C) A person shall not handle, process, warehouse or store leaf or floral material from hemp in a facility or field location that is in or within 200 feet of any structure that is used for residential purposes, without prior written approval from the Department. Any written approval may establish additional requirements set forth by the Department therein.

(D) A person may not plant less than 50 hemp plants in any outdoor location nor less than 1,000 square feet and 50 hemp plants in any indoor facility, unless prior written approval is provided by the Department. Any written approval may establish additional requirements set forth by the Department therein.

(E) A person shall not grow, plant, cultivate or propagate hemp within 1,000 feet of a pre-kindergarten through 12th grade school property or a public recreational area, unless prior written approval is provided by the Department. Any written approval may establish additional requirements set forth by the Department therein.

(F) A person shall not include on application or Site Modification Request any property for growing, planting, cultivating or propagating hemp that is not owned or completely controlled by the applicant or permitted grower.

(G) Hemp shall be physically segregated from other crops unless prior written approval is obtained in writing from the Department. Any written approval may establish additional requirements set forth by the Department therein.

(H) Each hemp lot planted must be distinct and separate from any other planted hemp lot, so that plants from separate lots are not co-mingled and may be clearly distinguished for sampling purposes.

(I) The use of land, properties and facilities shall comply with all laws, regulations and requirements of any governmental agency or other regulating authority, including building, commercial, environmental, zoning and other regulated categories. (3) *Hemp Variety Information*. Applicants shall list the type and amount of seed, clones, propagules or cuttings they have acquired or intend to acquire and hemp varieties they intend to plant, propagate and cultivate. (The Planting Report Form will provide a field to report changes to this information at the time of planting.)

(i) For all hemp seed, clones, propagules or cuttings which will be grown, cultivated, propagated or planted the source, including the legal name and address, shall be listed.

(ii) The anticipated acreage or indoor sq. footage for each type or variety of hemp shall be listed.

(iii) The type of product(s), (such as fiber, seed, dried flower, CBD or other) to be produced or processed.

(4) Criminal History Information. Applications shall be accompanied by proof of completed criminal history reports for the applicant and any other key participants in hemp program activities. This shall include a Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) background check. These must be dated no more than sixty (60) days prior to the date the application is received by the Department in the initial year the information is submitted.

(i) Key participants are a person or persons who have a direct or indirect financial interest in the entity producing hemp, such as a sole proprietor, a partner in partnership, or a person with executive managerial control in a corporation.

(ii) Key participant does not include other management positions like farm, field or shift managers.

(iii) Any key participant having a disqualifying criminal history background, such as a disqualifying felony as provided for by section 297B(e)(3)(B)(i) of the 2018 Farm Bill, will not meet the requirements of this General Permit and may not participate in the Hemp Program. A disqualified key participant will result in rejection of the Hemp Program application.

(iv) The criminal history reports must indicate that the applicant and key participants have not been convicted of a State or Federal felony related to a controlled substance for a period of 10 years prior to the date when the report was completed.

(v) FBI background checks are valid for 3 years. Directions for obtaining FBI background checks meeting the Hemp Program requirements are available on the Department's website at https://agriculture.pa.gov/hemp.

(5) Attestations. The applicant shall attest to all the following:

(i) That subject to the criminal penalties for unsworn falsifications to authorities, at 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 4904, they have not had a felony drug conviction in the past 10 years, and that during the time period of the application, this permit and the General Permit, they will immediately report to the Department any key participant of the permit that is convicted of a state or Federal controlledsubstance-related felony.

(ii) That subject to the criminal penalties for unsworn falsification to authorities, at 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 4904, the plant materials shall be selected from apparently disease-free and pest-free sources.

(iii) That in growing, propagating, cultivating, harvesting, transporting and processing of hemp, all biosecurity safeguards will be utilized in order to assure isolation from the domestic environment outside of permitted locations. (iv) That subject to the criminal penalties for unsworn falsification to authorities, at 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 4904, the approved applicant and permit holder will continue to comply with the permit and General Permit requirements for the duration of time the hemp plants, plant parts or hemp materials are in the permit holder's possession, including any regrowth of the hemp.

(c) *Hemp Permit Approval and Renewal.* Once a Permit application has been approved by the Department, the Department will issue a Permit to the applicant for the approved site. Permits are issued and renewed on a calendar year basis. All the following rules and requirements apply.

(1) Permits are not transferrable in any manner.

(2) An applicant whose application has been approved will not be considered permitted under this General Permit and shall not commence any activities, including purchase or planting of any hemp seeds, hemp plants, hemp plant parts, hemp materials or hemp products until the applicant is issued a Permit by the Department for that year.

(3) Permits are issued on a calendar year basis, do not renew automatically and must be renewed every calendar year.

(4) Applications for renewal will be subject to the same terms, conditions and approval process as set forth in the General Permit and application for initial or new permits.

(5) Permits will be valid until December 31 of each calendar year. Extensions may be announced, at the discretion of the Department, if application and renewal processes do not allow for continuity of operations.

(d) Permit Holder Responsibilities.

(1) An approved applicant and permit holder, or any person propagating, cultivating, transporting, storing, warehousing, distributing, retailing, wholesaling, processing or researching hemp and required to have a permit, shall comply with all the provisions of this General Permit.

(2) *Compliance.* The approved applicant and permit holder shall continue to comply with the permit requirements established in this General Permit for the duration of time the hemp or hemp materials are in the permit holder's possession, including any regrowth of the hemp.

(3) Upon receipt of a Hemp Program permit, the permit holder shall provide their unique Department hemp permit number and associated hemp production locations and acreage information to the Farm Service Agency (FSA).

(4) Change in Information or Status. The following rules and requirements apply to any change in Permit information.

(i) A Permit holder must notify the Department immediately should there be any change in the contact information provided on the Permit application or any change in ownership of the permitted land, via a Hemp Permit Change form provided by the Department.

(ii) A Permit holder must report changes to hemp varieties and/or sources, hemp plant part planted, type of hemp cultivated and/or size of plantings to the Department via the Hemp Planting Report form.

(iii) If at any time, there is a change to the information submitted in the permit application, a permit modification is required. FSA must also be notified of changes. (iv) Any change to the growing, planting, cultivating or propagation location or control of the location shall require a new permit and must be submitted during the permit submission time period for that calendar year.

(5) Abandonment or closure of permitted hemp site. The permitted hemp grower shall, prior to abandonment or closure of the permitted site, notify the Department in writing of his intent to close or abandon the site. Failure to do so will result in the permitted grower being charged and responsible for any destruction costs, including destruction of hemp that may have escaped the boundaries of the permit location and may result in the assessment of other penalties as allowed under the Act.

(6) Permit holders, including all key participants, are responsible for and shall immediately notify the Department of any drug related convictions they receive during the time period of a permit.

Article III. Propagation and Cultivation.

The following rules and requirements apply to the propagation and cultivation of hemp.

(a) *Hemp Source Materials.* The permit holder is responsible for sourcing, purchasing, and acquiring the hemp seed, clones, propagules or cuttings which they will be growing, planting, cultivating or propagating and shall ensure that this complies with all the requirements of this general permit.

(1) Prohibited Hemp Varieties and Varieties of Concern. A permit holder shall check the Department's website or request a list of Prohibited Hemp Varieties and Varieties of Concern.

(i) *Prohibited Hemp Varieties*. Prohibited Hemp Varieties have consistently tested higher than 1.0% THC in previous years and resulted in required crop destruction.

(A) Prohibited Hemp Varieties and the seed thereof, listed by the Department, shall not be approved for planting, propagation, cultivation, sale, transfer, retail, wholesale, distribution, transportation, storage or warehousing in the Commonwealth.

(B) Prohibited Hemp Varieties and the seed thereof shall be illegal in the Commonwealth and shall be subject to a Control Order, ordering its destruction, a stop-sale order or a seizure and condemnation order or any combination of the above and the imposition of penalties as allowed under the Act.

(ii) Hemp Varieties of Concern. Hemp Varieties of Concern are varieties that have tested higher than 0.3% THC in some Pennsylvania planting locations in previous years, or have tested high in other states, resulting in crop destruction. Hemp Varieties of Concern are listed by the Department as an aid to growers making variety choices, since these varieties may present greater risk for loss. There is, however, no prohibition on planting, propagation, cultivation, sale, transfer, retail, wholesale, distribution, transportation, storage, warehousing, or processing of Hemp Varieties of Concern in the Commonwealth.

(2) *Hemp seed source*. All the following requirements shall be met:

(i) The permit holder shall be responsible for sourcing and purchasing all hemp seed and shall assure the seed, whether internationally or domestically sourced, meets all phytosanitary requirements for movement of seed.

(ii) *Hemp seed labeling*. All seed shall meet the labeling requirements of the PA Seed Act (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 7101 et

seq.). A summary of these requirements is available on the Department's Hemp Program webpage: https:// agriculture.pa.gov/hemp.

(iii) The permit holder shall obtain a statement from the licensed producer or guarantor supplying the seed that the variety has a THC content equal to or less than 0.3% on a dry weight basis, as determined by an independent third-party laboratory.

(iv) *Reuse of hemp seed.* Seed produced by a permit holder may only be saved or used for future planting under the following conditions:

(A) The original seed source holding rights to the seed grants such permission to the permit holder and provides written approval and documentation of their authority to grant that permission.

(B) The permit holder has registered with the Department's certified seed program and met the requirements of the Seed Act (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 7101 et seq.) and its attendant regulations.

(C) Any seed produced from a permit holder's hemp breeding may only be sold/planted for production upon the variety's acceptance by AOSCA Variety Review Board or USDA's Plant Variety Protection Office.

(v) Sale of hemp seed. The provisions of the Seed Act (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 7101 et seq.), its attendant regulations and this General Permit shall apply to the sale of hemp seeds.

(3) *Hemp nursery stock*. Hemp clones, cuttings and seedlings for planting, propagation and cultivation are permitted under the following conditions:

(i) Hemp clones, cuttings and propagules being shipped into the Commonwealth for planting, propagation, cultivation or sale or transfer shall be accompanied by a Federal Phytosanitary certificate, a state of origin-issued health certificate or certification that the plants were grown at a state licensed and inspected nursery.

(ii) Any permit holder receiving hemp nursery stock, whether for propagation of additional nursery stock or for production planting, shall obtain a statement from the licensed producer or guarantor supplying the hemp clones, cuttings or propagules that mature plants from the variety have a THC content of less than 0.3% on a dry weight basis, determined by an independent thirdparty laboratory.

(iii) Production of hemp nursery stock is permitted under the following conditions:

(A) Any permit holder who is vegetatively propagating plant material must have documentation verifying that the person holding rights to the source material has granted permission to the permit holder for this activity.

(B) Permit holders who intend to sell or distribute hemp nursery stock

1. shall hold a Pennsylvania Nursery License under the Plant Pest Act (PPA) (act of December 16, 1992, P.L. 1228, No. 162) (3 P.S. § 258.1 et seq.), and make all transactions in accordance with provisions of the PPA and its attendant regulations.

2. shall only sell hemp stock plants to permit holders within Pennsylvania or to out-of-state persons that meet the requirements of the hemp program rules in their state, which may be verified by requesting visible proof of state permit or referencing a state listing of permit or license holders.

3. Records of planting material sales: Records of the sale or distribution of hemp nursery stock shall be

maintained for a minimum of three (3) years and shall contain the following information for each sale or distribution.

(aa) Date of the sale or distribution.

(bb) Date of shipment.

(cc) Name, address, telephone number, license or permit number of the purchaser and final grower, cultivator or propagator if different.

(dd) Quantity of plants in shipment, by variety and stage of development (cutting, seedling, rooted cutting, etc.)

(ee) Source of mother plants for nursery stock.

(ff) Seed information including a seed tag for plants started from seed.

(gg) The Federal Phytosanitary certificate, state of origin-issued health certificate or certification that the plants were grown at a state licensed and inspected nursery for each sale, distribution or shipment.

(hh) A copy of all attestations required above for seeds, clones, cuttings and propagules.

(ii) A copy of all Reports required for seeds, clones, cuttings and propagules.

(jj) A copy of all written grants of permission required for seeds, clones, cutting and propagules.

(b) *Inspection*. The Department may conduct unannounced inspections during normal business hours. The permit holder shall grant Department inspectors unrestricted access, during normal business hours, to all permitted sites or sites required to be permitted under the provisions of the Act and this General Permit, including all growing, planting, cultivation and propagation locations and adjacent areas, buildings, storage and processing areas and all other grounds, structures, and facilities involved in the hemp production.

(1) Where practicable the Department will notify the permit holder of an inspection.

(2) Where the permit holder is given notice of an inspection the permit holder, or a designated representative thereof, shall be present to accompany the Department inspector.

(c) *Reporting and Recordkeeping*. Permit holders shall comply with the following.

(1) *Reports*. The following reports are required from Permit Holders:

(i) Report of production acreage, filed with FSA; FSA Report detail. Permitted growers are required to report their hemp crop acreage with the Farm Service Agency (FSA), and to provide FSA with specific information regarding field acreage, greenhouse, or indoor square footage of hemp planted. Information reported to FSA shall include all the following:

(A) Name, street address, geospatial location or other comparable identification method specifying where the hemp will be produced, and the legal description of the land.

(B) Geospatial location or other methods of identifying the production locations.

(C) The information shall be provided for each field, greenhouse, building, or site where hemp will be grown, planted, cultivated or propagated.

(D) Follow the specific procedures for reporting hemp acreage to FSA which will be posted on the USDA Domestic Hemp Production Program website.

(ii) *Planting Report, filed with the Department.* The permit holder shall submit to the Department on forms provided by the Department, within 10 days after planting. The Report shall set forth all the following:

(A) Date planted.

(B) Stage of development at the time of planting (seed, cutting, etc).

(C) Variety and quantity of each variety planted.

(D) The plot map and geospatial location where each lot was planted including each separate field, greenhouse, building or other site and the square footage, acreage or plot dimensions of each.

(iii) Inactive Permit report, filed with the Department. The permit holder shall submit this report to the Department on a form provided by the Department, when the permit holder determines that there will be no activity under the permit.

(iv) Crop Loss Report, filed with the Department. The permit holder shall submit this report to the Department on a form provided by the Department, if the crop is not suitable for harvest and rendered useless at the planting, cultivation, propagation or growing site. To be submitted within ten (10) business days of destruction of any surviving hemp plants.

(vi) Harvest Report, filed with the Department. The permit holder shall submit this report to the Department on a form provided by the Department. The report shall include harvested quantities and disposition of crop, by lot.

(2) *Recordkeeping Requirements.* Permitted growers shall maintain copies of all records and reports necessary to demonstrate compliance with the permit program. These records include those that support, document, or verify the information provided in the forms submitted to the Department, including:

(i) For each permitted location.

 $\left(A\right)$ The information provided on the application for a permit.

(B) Permit document received from the Department.

(C) A detailed map of the permitted site meeting all the requirements of subsection above (Article II(b)(2)).

(D) For each leased location, a copy of the fully-executed lease.

(E) At least one label from every different lot of seed or nursery stock, along with any Material Transfer Agreements or THC testing documentation received from the source.

(F) Invoice(s) showing the amount of seed and hemp plants, hemp parts, hemp material and hemp products purchased and the name and address of the source of the material. This information shall cross reference the Permit number under which the materials were procured.

(G) The specific field and location where the seed, hemp plants, hemp parts, hemp material and hemp products were planted, cultivated and propagated (site map with planting sites indicated) and the corresponding permit for each.

(ii) For each individual lot

(A) Acreage (outdoor) or square footage (indoor).

(B) Variety name and amount planted, cultivated and propagated and the corresponding permit number.

(C) Type of Hemp—Fiber, Grain, Seed, CBD.

(D) Planting Date.

(E) Harvest Date.

 $(F)\ THC$ test date and results (copy of analysis report(s)).

(G) The yield of the site at harvest.

(H) Any factors impacting harvest, including seed pressure, irrigation, storm damage, flooding, drought or any other issue arising).

(3) All records, reports and documents shall be kept and maintained for a minimum of three years and made available to the Department for inspection upon request.

(d) General Responsibilities.

(1) Assure all hemp plants and products are within the boundaries of the legal description of the land, plot map and geospatial location submissions made to the Department as required by subsection (ii) above. Cannabis plants found planted, cultivated, propagated or growing outside of the boundaries will not be covered by the permit, will constitute a violation of this General Permit and will be subject to destruction.

(2) Cessation of propagation. If the permit holder intends to stop planting, growing, propagating or cultivating hemp, the permit holder shall notify the Department and implement all measures ordered by the Department to destroy the hemp, including all regrowth, seeds, plantings, cultivars and parts of the hemp plant.

(3) Abandonment. If the permit holder abandons, relinquishes possession or ownership of, control over or responsibility for the hemp in a manner inconsistent with the provisions of this General Permit, all plant material, regrowth, seeds, plantings, cultivars and parts of the hemp plant shall be destroyed in a manner ordered and approved by the department.

(4) Continued responsibility. The original permit holder shall continue to be responsible for the hemp and hemp materials, seeds, regrowth, plantings, cultivars and parts of the hemp plant and the cost of destruction and eradication thereof.

(5) *Penalties.* The original permit holder shall continue to be subject to the penalties imposed under the Act and this General Permit.

Article IV. Sampling and Testing for THC.

(a) Sampling and testing for THC. All hemp planted, cultivated, propagated or growing in Pennsylvania shall be sampled and tested to determine THC concentration levels.

(1) *Sampling*

(i) Official samples must be collected by a Departmentcertified sampling agent and in accordance with the sampling procedures and requirements established by the Department and set forth on the Department's Hemp Program webpage: https://agriculture.pa.gov/hemp.

(ii) The sampling procedures shall assure a representative sample of each variety and lot is procured for testing and address the process and procedures to be followed from entering a growing area and collecting the minimum number of plant specimens necessary to accurately represent the THC content, through laboratory testing of the samples and reporting results. At a minimum samples

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shall be obtained from the flowering tops of plants when flowering tops are present, and shall be approximately five to eight inches in length from the "main stem" (that includes the leaves and flowers), "terminal bud" (that occurs at the end of a stem), or "central cola" (cut stem that could develop into a bud) of the flowering top of the plant.

(iii) The method used for sampling must be sufficient at a confidence level of 95 percent that no more than one percent of the plants in each lot would exceed the acceptable hemp THC Level and ensure that a representative sample is collected that represents a homogeneous composition of the lot. Alternatively, the Department may adopt a performance-based alternative sampling procedure following the standard in parts (A) through (E) below:

(A) Detailed description of the performance-based sampling procedure will be published on the Department's Hemp Program webpage: https://agriculture.pa.gov/hemp, and will be subject to USDA approval.

(B) The performance-based sampling method will have the potential to ensure, at a confidence level of 95 percent, that the lots subject to this alternative sampling will not test above the acceptable hemp THC level.

(C) Performance based sampling will be considered for situations in which material obtained from a single source has been planted in non-contiguous areas that may be identified and tracked independently from other source materials. In this case, a composite sample across multiple lots may be allowable.

(D) Performance based sampling will be considered for lots for which a seed certification process has consistently demonstrated the variety represented in that lot to be compliant, or when the Department can demonstrate the variety to have tested compliant on a consistent basis in previous years.

(E) Alternative sampling will be considered when a permittee is conducting research on hemp.

(iv) Samples must be collected no more than thirty (30) days prior to harvest. If THC results are returned within the THC compliance level, but the permittee fails to complete harvest within thirty (30) days of sample collection, a second pre-harvest sample of the lot shall be required to be submitted for testing.

(v) A Chain of Custody Form developed by the Department shall be utilized by all persons authorized to take official samples.

(vi) A sample receipt shall be completed by the certified sampling agent or Department employee conducting the sampling and signed by the hemp permit holder or an authorized representative thereof, who must be present at the growing site.

(vii) No sample(s) may be removed from the permitted site prior to the chain of custody form and sample receipt being completed and signed.

(2) It shall be the responsibility of the hemp permit holder to assure that each hemp lot described in their permit is sampled and tested according to the standards established in this Order, including any alternative standards as allowed above.

(i) The hemp permit holder shall hire a Departmentcertified sampling agent to take a representative sample of each lot of hemp planted, cultivated, propagated or grown, to submit for testing. (ii) It is the responsibility of the permit holder to schedule official sampling and testing prior to harvest and to be present or have an authorized representative present at the growing site at the time of sampling.

(iii) The permit holder shall designate the specific laboratory where samples will be sent for THC testing. The laboratory shall be an independent laboratory approved by the Department and able to meet all requirements for testing and reporting outlined in Article IV sections (e) and (f) below.

(iv) The hemp permit holder shall pay any fees charged and costs associated with sampling and testing.

 $\left(v\right)$ A permit holder may request that the laboratory run a second test on an official sample retained by the laboratory, if the grower questions the results of that first test. The permitted grower shall pay the fees and costs of retesting.

(vi) A permit holder may request a second official pre-harvest sampling and testing if it is believed that the original results were in error. The permittee may choose to use the same or a different laboratory for the test. No more than two official samples per lot will be considered by the Department; only the final official sample will be considered by the Department when determining compliance. The permitted grower shall pay the fees and costs of resampling and retesting.

(vii) The permitted grower shall agree to the release of all official test results from the laboratory directly to the Department.

(3) The Department may conduct random audits of hemp permit holders and take its own samples for testing.

(i) A Department employee may take official samples to audit samples taken by a certified sampling agent. Such audits will be done on a random basis and may be done at the Department's discretion.

(ii) The Department may also take official samples pursuant to an investigation, as the result of a complaint or where an official sample tests above the 0.3% THC concentration threshold.

(b) Prohibition Against Harvest Prior to Testing.

(1) Hemp may not be harvested prior to an official sample being taken by the Department or a Department certified sampling agent.

(2) Any sample taken after harvest shall not be accepted, the crop will no longer be compliant, a notice of violation may be issued, and the harvested material may be required to be destroyed. Limited exceptions may be made, at the discretion of the Department, if errors in the process of sampling and testing rendered an official sample suspect or untestable, and the permit holder had already begun legal harvest before a second sample could be obtained.

(c) Movement Prohibition. The following rules and requirements shall apply to the movement of hemp plants, parts and products. No hemp plants, plant parts or products are permitted to be removed from the permitted growing site until all the following rules and requirements have been met:

(1) THC testing has been completed on all samples by the Department or an independent laboratory able to meet all requirements for testing and reporting outlined in Article IV sections (e) and (f) below. (2) The testing confirms acceptable THC level(s) at or below 0.3% on a dry weight basis for all samples from each representative lot.

(d) THC Testing.

(1) THC levels in representative samples must test at or below a THC level of 0.3% on a dry weight basis.

(2) Hemp plant, plant parts or products testing above 0.3% may be subject to a control order and may be required to be destroyed.

(3) Harvested plants and plant parts must be separated and stored separately from each other according to lot, in a manner that maintains identity sufficient to associate that harvested material with specific THC test results, such as signage on bays of a storage facility, or tags on bales or packages, that provide lot or sample information.

(e) *THC Testing Laboratory Standards and Methods.* All the following shall comprise the rules and requirements for THC testing.

(1) Testing shall be done at the Department laboratory or an independent laboratory approved by the Department and able to meet all requirements for testing and reporting outlined in Article IV sections (e) and (f). The Department's approval process for laboratories will be published on the Department's Hemp Program webpage: https://agriculture.pa.gov/hemp.

(2) USDA has required that all testing of samples for THC potency be conducted by DEA-registered laboratories, however, enforcement of this requirement will be delayed until a date specified on the USDA AMS Hemp Production website: https://www.ams.usda.gov/rulesregulations/hemp. The Department will delay its enforcement of this requirement until the date specified by USDA.

(3) Sample preparation shall include grinding of entire sample to ensure homogeneity of plant material prior to testing.

(4) Testing for THC will be conducted using postdecarboxylation or other similarly reliable method approved by the Department and by USDA where the THC concentration level measured includes the potential to convert tetrahydrocannabinolic acid (THCA) into THC. Testing methodologies currently meeting these requirements include those using gas or liquid chromatography with detection. The Department will provide additional instructions to laboratories on approved procedures via posting on the Department's hemp website.

(5) Testing shall be done and reported on a dry weight basis, determined either through testing of dried samples or calculation using moisture content analysis of samples.

(6) The laboratory must report a Measurement of Uncertainty (MU) with each hemp test result. The laboratory must be able to provide documentation for derivation of the measurement of uncertainty if requested by the Department. Laboratories shall use appropriate, validated methods and procedures for all testing activities and evaluate measurement of uncertainty.

(7) If through audit sampling, records review or other means the Department determines that a laboratory is not meeting an acceptable standard of quality in required hemp testing, it may prohibit permittees from using that laboratory for the purpose of the regulatory testing required under this General Permit.

(f) Test Results.

(1) Laboratories performing THC testing for hemp produced under this program shall submit certified electronic copies of all test results to the Department.

(2) The Department will provide instructions, to all laboratories performing testing for Pennsylvania permitted growers, on the information required to be included on the test report and the manner to electronically submit test results to the Department.

(3) Permitted growers shall receive and be able to provide a copy of all test results to the Department at the Department's request.

(4) Permitted growers shall be responsible for maintaining a copy of all test results for a period of 3 years and making them available to the Department upon request.

Article V. Disposal or Remediation of Non-compliant Products.

(a) Where test results evidence THC levels exceeding the acceptable hemp THC level of 0.3%, the laboratory conducting the test shall promptly notify the permitted grower and the Department and provide a copy of the test results.

(b) All non-compliant hemp plants, plant parts and products shall be subject to destruction or remediation measures. The Department will issue a control order outlining options for destruction and remediation, as well as procedures the Department will use for verification of crop destruction or remediation.

(c) If the permittee opts to destroy the crop, that non-compliant crop shall be held for disposal in a manner that complies with the provisions of the control order. The disposal must be conducted either on site at the farm or hemp production facility, or by using a DEA-registered reverse distributor or law enforcement.

(d) If a producer elects to perform remediation activities, only those remediation activities outlined in the control order may be considered. An additional official sampling and testing of the post-remediated crop must occur to determine THC concentration levels, with results sent directly from the laboratory to the Department. Any non-compliant material resulting from the remediation process shall be disposed of in a manner established by the Department in the control order.

(e) If testing of a remediated lot results in a THC level above 0.3% (with the measurement of uncertainty taken into account), then that lot would be considered non-compliant and will receive a control order for crop destruction.

(f) Prior to the disposal of non-compliant hemp plants, plant parts or products, the permit holder must provide the following information and obtain approval from Department. Information shall include all the following.

(1) DEA or USDA issued order of destruction, if any.

- (2) Anticipated date of removal, if any.
- (3) Anticipated date of destruction.
- (4) Method of destruction.

(g) Documentation of removal and destruction of the non-compliant hemp plants, hemp parts and hemp products. Documentation shall be submitted to the Department within five (5) business days of completion of the removal and destruction and shall include: (1) Removal and destruction shall be performed by an entity approved by the Department.

(2) The permittee shall provide the Department with a copy of the documentation, including verification statements, pictures, videos or other proof approved by the Department, of disposal provided by the approved entity performing the removal and destruction; and

(3) Compliance with the reporting requirements established by the Department and USDA.

Article VI. Transportation.

(a) All hemp plants, hemp parts and hemp products being transported in the Commonwealth shall be packaged in a manner that complies with and allows for all the following:

(1) Conspicuous marking and individual identification of each package, bale, or load.

(2) Provides permit information to the transporter that can be utilized by law enforcement to verify the material is hemp, sets forth the manner of packaging, variety(s) and quantity and variety of material in each package.

(3) Provides information setting forth each variety of hemp plant, hemp part and hemp product in the shipment.

(4) Provides test results for all hemp, hemp parts and hemp product being transported, verifying they meet the THC standards established by law and regulation.

(b) All movement of hemp plants, plant parts and hemp products from a planting, cultivation, propagation or growing site or initial processing site shall be conducted in a manner to prevent any release of viable plant material to the environment and to maintain the identification of the producer, permit number and lot information.

(c) All shipments must be accompanied by shipping documents produced by the permit holder that shall include the following information (excluding samples being submitted for laboratory analysis):

(1) Shipping date,

- (2) Origin of the shipment,
- (3) Permit holders name, address, phone number,
- (4) Growing location address (if different),
- (5) Permit number,
- (6) Variety information,

(7) Copy of the certificate(s) of THC analysis covering all material in the shipment, (not required for seedlings),

(8) Number of packages included in the shipment by variety,

(9) Description of the plant or plant parts in the packaging (Ex. Seedlings, mature whole plants, buds, leaf, retted stems),

(10) Destination of the shipment,

(11) For seedlings and clones, variety information and producers permit number shall be available for each tray or box, and accompanying documentation shall also include permit number of the person receiving the shipment,

(12) For harvested material in packaging of any weight, each container shall be individually identified by a label secured to the package with the following information.

- (i) Permit holders name, address, phone number,
- (ii) Growing location address (if different),
- (iii) Permit number,
- (iv) Variety information.

(13) For harvested material shipped in bulk, including bales, in addition to the accompanying documentation listed above, the shipping documents shall include the approximate weight of the shipment and if baled the number of bales and a description of the plant material included in the shipment.

Article VII. Warehousing and Storage.

(a) Movement Off the Permitted Site Prior to Results. Hemp harvested prior to receiving THC test results, including hemp plants, hemp parts, hemp materials and hemp products, may not be moved from the permitted site until testing of an official sample at or below the acceptable THC level of 0.3% is received by the permit holder.

(b) Movement Upon Notification of Acceptable Test Results. Once documentation of acceptable test results are received, movement of hemp, including hemp plants, hemp parts, hemp materials and hemp products to an offsite storage location, buyer, processor or any other location shall be accompanied by all required transportation and shipping documents required under this General Permit, Article VI.

(c) *Containment*. All transportation, warehousing and storage of hemp plants, hemp parts, hemp materials and hemp products shall be conducted in a manner to prevent any release of viable plant material to the environment and to maintain the identification of the producer, permit number and varietal information for the material in storage.

(d) Off-site Storage or Warehousing Location. The permitted grower shall provide the Department with the following information for storage or warehousing locations that are not on the permitted growing site but where the hemp crop shall remain under the permit holder's control/ possession. If not provided directly on the initial application, this information shall be provided either on a form provided by the Department or via the PaPlants web application.

(1) The legal name of the entity owning the storage location or warehouse.

 $\left(2\right)$ The physical address and GPS location of the facility.

(3) Date of each delivery.

(4) Quantity, type, variety and amount of each, shipped to the facility.

(5) Total amount of hemp in storage at each off-site location.

(6) Permit number under which each separate load was shipped.

Article VIII. Processing.

(a) Hemp processers located in the Commonwealth are required to obtain a permit before receiving hemp materials at their facility. Some examples of processing hemp material include drying, grinding, trimming, bucking, extracting, etc. Further guidance for processing permits can be found on the Department's Hemp Program webpages.

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(1) No separate processing permit is required if all hemp being processed is from a growing permit under the same permittee and address.

(2) If hemp is received from another address, a processing permit must be obtained. A processing permit is required if receiving hemp material from other permittees or moving hemp from sites with separate permits, but all under the same permittee.

(3) No permit is required for secondary or tertiary processors that do not receive any potentially viable hemp material.

(b) A permitted processor may not accept hemp plants or plant parts unless they are:

(1) From a permitted or licensed grower; and

(2) Accompanied by a certificate of analysis from a laboratory confirming the THC level of the material is not above the 0.3% limit.

(3) Hemp material received from out-of-state must meet the same sampling and testing requirements required for Pennsylvania hemp growers, as described in Article IV of this General Permit.

(c) A permit holder shall keep and make available to the Department upon request, at a minimum, the following records and documentation:

(1) Information on all shipments of hemp plants and plant parts received from all in-state and out-of-state hemp growers, including

(i) Permit or license number of the grower.

(ii) Name address and phone number of the permitted or licensed grower.

(iii) Certificate of analysis evidencing compliance with THC levels for each lot received.

(iv) Date of delivery.

(v) Amount and description of materials received.

(2) Processors shall document procedures used to render all plant material non-viable, and how that non-viable material leaves the facility (whether as usable product or waste).

(d) Processors are required to notify the Department of any attempt to sell or distribute hemp or cannabis material to them by a person who does not hold a valid permit or license from the state of origin of the shipment. The documentation shall include, if known, the name, address, phone number, amount of material offered, source of the material, and varieties.

(e) Processors are required to report to the Department any shipment of material that does not contain all the information required by section (b) of this Article VIII (related to processing).

Article IX. Distribution and Sale.

(a) Legal Responsibility. Growers, cultivators or propagators of hemp and processers of finished hemp products shall meet all laws, regulations, orders and requirements of all authorities that regulate any produced, marketed, labeled, or distributed hemp plant, plant part or product or such material that is sold as part of the permitted hemp program.

(b) *Branding.* The name, symbols, and logos of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania or any of its agencies, including the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, may not in any way be used in the labeling, promotion or

marketing of any hemp products associated with the permit without explicit written permission from the Department.

Article X. Hemp Permit Denial, Revocation and Suspension.

(a) Denial, Suspension or Revocation of Hemp Permit. A hemp permit may be suspended or revoked if the Department or its representative receives credible information that a permittee has done any of the following:

(1) Violated a provision of the Act, the General Permit or the Department-issued Permit.

(2) Failed to comply with a written order of the Department.

(3) Failed to comply with a statutory or regulatory requirement of the USDA or other Federal agency with jurisdiction over the growing, planting, cultivation, propagation, distribution, sale, transportation, processing, warehousing, storage or marketing of hemp.

(b) Action Upon Suspension, Revocation or Denial. Upon suspension, revocation or denial of a permit the permit holder shall cease all activities, including planting, cultivation, propagation, selling, distribution, transportation, harvesting, and handling of any hemp plant, hemp plant part, hemp product or hemp material and shall not remove hemp or cannabis from the permitted site or location where hemp or other cannabis was located at the time when the Department issued the suspension, revocation or denial order.

Article XI. Violations and Effective Date.

(a) The Department will carry out all enforcement provisions of the Act.

(b) When the Department determines that a negligent violation has occurred, the Department may issue a Notice of Violation and require a corrective action plan to be developed and implemented.

(c) Negligent violations include (but are not limited to):

(1) failure to provide a legal description of the land on which the hemp is produced;

(2) failure to obtain a permit before engaging in production or processing;

(3) production of plants exceeding the acceptable hemp THC level. The Department will not consider hemp producers as committing a negligent violation if they produce plants exceeding the acceptable hemp THC level if they use reasonable efforts to grow hemp and the lot does not have a THC concentration of more than 1.0 percent on a dry weight basis.

(4) Failing to file required reports with the Department in a timely manner.

(i) Planting Report or Inactive Permit Report must be submitted to the Department by September 1 of the permit year. Extensions may be granted at the discretion of the Department.

(ii) Harvest Report or Crop Loss Report must be submitted to the Department by November 15 of the permit year. Extensions to filing deadline may be granted at the discretion of the Department.

(d) Producers shall not receive more than one negligent violation per growing season in respect to part XI (c)(3)

above. The Department may assign more than one negligent violation in a growing season, when violations include more than one type described in Section XI (c) (1-4).

(e) A corrective action plan shall include a reasonable date by which the permit holder will correct the violation and requirements for reporting back to the Department on its compliance with the plan, for a period of not less than the next two calendar years.

(f) The Department shall approve and review a corrective action plan with the permittee and its implementation may be verified during a future audit or site visit.

(g) A permit holder who has received three negligent violations in a five-year period is ineligible to produce hemp for a period of five years from the date of the third violation. Negligent violations are not subject to criminal enforcement.

(h) If the Department determines that a violation is made with a culpable mental state greater than negligence, the Department shall report the violation to the Attorney General and the chief law enforcement officer of the Commonwealth, as applicable, in addition to its own enforcement action.

Effective date. This General Permit shall become effective upon signature and publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and shall remain in effect until rescinded by subsequent order.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

Addition of Mucopolysaccharidosis Type II to the Supplemental Conditions Mandated for Screening in this Commonwealth; Public Comment

The Secretary of Health and Human Services approved the Advisory Committee on Heritable Disorders in Newborns and Children's recommendation to add Mucopolysaccharidosis Type II Disorder (MPS II) to the Recommended Uniform Screening Panel on August 2, 2022. The Department of Health's (Department) Division of Newborn Screening and Genetics, with support of the Newborn Screening and Follow-up Technical Advisory Board (Board) and its lysosomal storage disorder subcommittee, is proposing that MPS II screening be added effective July 1, 2023, to the supplemental conditions mandated for screening and follow-up by Commonwealth submitters and follow-up by the Commonwealth newborn screening program.

MPS II, also referred to as Hunter Syndrome, is an X-linked lysosomal storage disorder caused by the deficiency of the enzyme iduronate 2- sulfatase, which is needed to break down complex sugars, glycosaminoglycans within the lysosomes. The severe form is characterized by progressive intellectual disability, the development of characteristic facial features, progressive joint stiffness that can limit mobility and progressive involvement of the liver, spleen and heart.

Under section 3 of the Newborn Child Testing Act (35 P.S. § 623), a 30-day public comment period is required before changes are made to the list of conditions for which newborn children are screened and laboratory screening results reported. Written comments regarding the Department and Board's proposal to add MPS II to

the list of conditions may be sent to RA-TCNBSAdmin_ Fax@pa.gov or to the Department of Health, Division of Newborn Screening and Genetics, 625 Forster Street, 7th Floor East, Harrisburg, PA 17120. Written comments must be received by March 13, 2023, to be considered.

The Pennsylvania Lottery intends to update the requirements related to Second-Chance Drawing participation and entry. The correct version of this document is as follows, with ellipses referring to the existing text as it appeared at 52 Pa.B. 7985—7990:

(b) *Participation and entry*:

(1) Entrants must have a registered lottery account in order to participate in the Drawing. To create a lottery account, visit https://www.pailottery.com. Creating a lottery account is free.

(2) A registered lottery account holder is subject to the iLottery regulations and specifically agrees to be bound by the iLottery terms and conditions located at https://www.pailottery.com/signup/terms-and-conditions/, as well as any related policies.

(3) To establish a lottery account, players must provide the following information:

(i) The player's name as it appears on a valid government-issued identification or tax documents;

(ii) The player's date of birth;

(iii) The entire or last four digits of the player's Social Security Number, or comparable equivalent;

(iv) The player's address;

(v) The player's telephone number;

(vi) The player's email address;

(vii) Any other information established by the Lottery to be necessary to verify the age and identity of the player.

(4) An individual may be required to provide additional information or documentation, as set forth in the iLottery terms and conditions, to establish a lottery account or register for iLottery. The information may be used for iLottery registration or to confirm information provided by that individual during the registration process.

(5) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at https://www.palottery.com, or the Pennsylvania Lottery's official mobile application, during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted. Entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Pennsylvania Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.

(6) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be submitted.

(7) Only one claimant per entry allowed.

(8) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.

(9) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.

 $\left(10\right)$ Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.

(2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Classification of Wild Trout Streams; Proposed Additions; April 2023

Under 58 Pa. Code § 57.11 (relating to listing of wild trout streams), it is the policy of the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) to accurately identify and classify stream sections supporting naturally reproducing populations of trout as wild trout streams. The Commission's Fisheries Management Division maintains the list of wild trout streams. The Executive Director, with the approval of the Commission, will from time-to-time publish the list of wild trout streams in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The listing of a stream section as a wild trout stream is a biological designation that does not determine how it is managed. The Commission relies upon many factors in determining the appropriate management of streams.

At the next Commission meeting on April 24 and 25, 2023, the Commission will consider changes to its list of wild trout streams. Specifically, the Commission will consider the addition of the following streams or portions of streams to the list:

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Proposed Changes to List of Class A Wild Trout Waters; April 2023

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) is considering changes to its list of Class A Wild Trout Streams. Under 58 Pa. Code § 57.8a (relating to Class A wild trout streams), it is the Commission's policy to manage selfsustaining Class A wild trout populations as a renewable natural resource to conserve that resource and the angling it provides. Class A wild trout populations represent the best of this Commonwealth's naturally reproducing trout fisheries. With rare exceptions, the Commission manages these stream sections solely for the perpetuation of the wild trout fishery with no stocking.

Criteria developed for Class A wild trout fisheries are species specific. Wild Trout Biomass Class Criteria include provisions for:

(i) Wild Brook Trout Fisheries

(A) Total brook trout biomass of at least 30 kg/ha (26.7 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brook trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(C) Brook trout biomass must comprise at least 75% of the total trout biomass.

(ii) Wild Brown Trout Fisheries

(A) Total brown trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brown trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(C) Brown trout biomass must comprise at least 75% of the total trout biomass.

(iii) Mixed Wild Brook and Brown Trout Fisheries

(A) Combined brook and brown trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brook trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(C) Total biomass of brown trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(D) Brook trout biomass must comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

(E) Brown trout biomass must comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

(iv) Wild Rainbow Trout Fisheries

Total biomass of rainbow trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 2.0 kg/ha (1.78 lbs/acre).

(v) Mixed Wild Brook and Rainbow Trout Fisheries

(A) Combined brook and rainbow trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brook trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(C) Total biomass of rainbow trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(D) Brook trout biomass shall comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

(E) Rainbow trout biomass shall comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

(vi) Mixed Wild Brown and Rainbow Trout Fisheries

(A) Combined brown and rainbow trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brown trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(C) Total biomass of rainbow trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lbs/acre).

(D) Brown trout biomass shall comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

(E) Rainbow trout biomass shall comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

During recent surveys, Commission staff documented the following stream sections to have Class A wild trout populations. The Commission intends to consider adding these waters to its list of Class A Wild Trout Streams at its meeting on April 24 and 25, 2023.

Surplus Lines Agents and Interested Parties; Export List of Insurance Coverages

In April 2022, the Insurance Commissioner (Commissioner) determined that certain insurance coverages were generally unavailable in the authorized market and declared those coverages as exportable. A list of exportable coverages was published at 52 Pa.B. 2194 (April 9, 2022). Accordingly, for those insurance coverages that are included on the export list, a diligent search among insurers admitted to do business in this Commonwealth is not required before placement of the coverages in the surplus lines market.
