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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

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Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the [Legislative Reference] Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Pennsylvania Early Learning Investment Commission

December 13, 2023

Whereas, the early learning, development, and education of young children is of critical importance to Pennsylvania's families, education system, workers, and employers; and

Whereas, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania continues to increase its investment in early learning, development, and education programs, and has made steady progress to assure that more children receive quality early learning and development services; and

Whereas, the continued development of an effective sustainable system of early care and education is critical to Pennsylvania's future economic and workforce development; and

Whereas, the input, perspective, and support of business leaders is essential to the development of a successful early childhood system; and

Whereas, fostering public and private sector investment in continued economic growth by addressing the needs of and challenges faced by all families with children, especially the Commonwealth's low-income families with children, is essential to assure Pennsylvania's edge in the national and global marketplace; and

Whereas, connecting existing workforce development initiatives with early learning practices is educationally and economically beneficial for all people within Pennsylvania.

Now, Therefore, I, Josh Shapiro, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws, do hereby reestablish the Pennsylvania Early Learning Investment Commission (hereafter referred to as the "Commission") and, further, order and direct as follows:

§ 6.961. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Commission—Pennsylvania Early Learning Investment Commission.

OCDEL—Office of Child Development and Early Learning.

§ 6.962. Purpose.

The purpose of the commission is to secure support for public and private-sector investment in early learning by focusing on practices that are educationally, economically and scientifically sound.

§ 6.963. Responsibilities.

The commission shall have all of the following responsibilities:

- (1) Make strategic recommendations for the Commonwealth to coordinate with business and civic leaders and organizations in early learning to plan and advocate for investment at the State and local level.
 - (2) Develop and recommend a plan and implementation strategy to:
- (i) Stabilize the early childcare workforce and increase access to affordable, available and accessible childcare for all families in this Commonwealth, regardless of income.
- (ii) Ensure the availability of universal pre-K for children in this Commonwealth.
- (iii) Expand the availability of all-day kindergarten in the public school districts and charter schools in this Commonwealth.
- (3) Develop and recommend strategies to increase business, civic and public awareness of the importance of early childhood education.
- (4) Make recommendations as to the planning, implementing and hosting of an annual economic summit on early childhood investment. The annual economic summit on early childhood investment shall include outreach to business, civic, educational and governmental leaders.
- (5) Make recommendations as to the planning and implementation of an annual meeting for legislators and legislative staff to assist them with understanding the economic, educational and social impact of investing in quality early childhood education.
- (6) Develop and recommend updates to a multi-year plan for the expansion of effective early childhood services.
- (7) Identify private sector financial support for early learning projects throughout this Commonwealth and match those funding sources with needs identified within the local community.
- (8) Identify and advocate for sustainable funding sources and early learning projects within a permanent sustainable network of private-sector and public-sector funding streams.
- (9) Consult or engage experts, economists, consultants, advisors or other personnel to assist with the commission's purpose and responsibilities.
- (10) Meet at least twice a year and at the call of the chairperson of the commission. Commission members may attend meetings in-person or virtually, or through a combination thereof, at the discretion of the chairperson. In-person or virtual participation shall be considered attendance for purposes of constituting a quorum.

§ 6.964. Composition.

- (a) *Members*. The commission shall consist of the following members:
- (1) The Secretary of the Budget or designee;

- (2) The Secretary of Policy and Planning or designee;
- (3) The Secretary of Community and Economic Development or designee;
- (4) The Secretary of Corrections or designee;
- (5) The Secretary of Education or designee;
- (6) The Secretary of Labor and Industry or designee;
- (7) The Secretary of Human Services or designee;
- (8) The Secretary of Health or designee;
- (9) The Deputy Secretary of the OCDEL or designee; and
- (10) High-level business executives, who collectively are diverse and represent the Commonwealth's population and the diversity of economic sectors and regions in this Commonwealth. These members shall be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
- (b) Chairperson of the commission. The Governor shall designate a chairperson and a vice-chairperson of the commission, or may designate two persons as co-chairpersons, from among the commission members. The chairperson and vice-chairperson, or co-chairpersons, shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor and shall appoint members from the commission to a nominating committee, which nominating committee shall make recommendations to the Governor of the business executives for commission membership.

§ 6.965. Term.

Commission members appointed by the Governor, and not serving by virtue of their official position with the Commonwealth, shall serve for a term of 3 years and may continue to serve until their successor is appointed.

§ 6.966. Compensation.

Members of the commission shall not receive compensation for their service on the commission. Members may receive reimbursement for reasonable travel costs and related expenses incurred while performing commission business in accordance with Commonwealth policy.

§ 6.967. Relationship with other agencies.

Agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction shall cooperate with and provide assistance to the commission, as requested, to carry out the purpose and responsibilities as set forth in this subchapter.

§ 6.968. Relationship with the Team Pennsylvania Foundation.

The commission shall work jointly with the Team Pennsylvania Foundation in furtherance of their common mission, duties and responsibilities to develop and sustain educational opportunities in the Commonwealth, particularly early learning, development and education of young children.

§ 6.969. Implementation.

This subchapter shall be implemented consistent with applicable law. This subchapter is not intended to, and does not create, any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the Commonwealth, its departments, agencies or entities, its officers, employees or agents, or any other persons.

§ 6.970. Effective date.

This subchapter shall take effect immediately.

§ 6.971. Termination date.

This subchapter shall remain in effect until amended or rescinded by the Governor.

§ 6.972. Rescission.

Effective immediately, Executive Order 2017-05, dated December 20, 2017, is hereby rescinded.

CENTRE COUNTY

Local Civil Rule 205.4; No: 2021-22-CM

Order

And Now, December 19, 2023, Local Civil Rule 205.4, Paragraph E(1) is amended to read that Upon receipt of the legal paper, the Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts shall provide the filing party with an acknowledgement, which includes the date and time the legal paper was received by the Electronic Filing System. The Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts shall also provide the filing party with notice that the legal paper was accepted for filing. All filing must be received by 3:30 pm to be timestamped for that business day.

This change in time shall be effective February 5, 2024. In all other respects the Local Rule is reaffirmed in its entirety.

Rule 205.4. Electronic Filing.

A. Electronic Filing

1. The Centre County Court of Common Pleas hereby permits the electronic filing of legal papers and the electronic service of such papers under the terms described in this Local Rule. In the context of this rule, "legal papers" which may be filed electronically do not include cases involving Domestic Relations, Protection From Abuse, Orphans' Court, and Mental Health/Intellectual Disability.

B. Form of Documents Electronically Filed

- 1. All electronic filings shall be in Portable Document Format (PDF) or any other electronic format, if any, that the Court by local rule designates. A paper presented for filing in a format other that PDF shall be converted to PDF and maintained by the Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts in that format.
- 2. A legal paper fled electronically shall be deemed the original document. The Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts shall maintain a hard copy of the document filed.
- 3. Scanned signatures will be accepted as originals. An electronically filed document shall be deemed to have been signed by the filer if it bears a facsimile or typographical signature of the filer, e.g./s/John Doe. The electronic filing of legal paper constitutes a certification by the filing party that a hard copy of the legal paper was properly signed and, where applicable, verified; and a certification as provided by the signature to a legal paper under Pa.R.C.P. 1023.1(c), the violation of which shall be subject to the sanction provided by Pa.R.C.P. 1023.1(d).
- 4. The filing party shall maintain the signed hard copy of the document filed for two (2) years after the later of: the disposition of the case; the entry of an order resolving the issue raised by the legal paper; or, the disposition by an appellate court of the issue raised by the legal paper.
- 5. Any other party at any time may serve upon the filing party a notice to produce for inspection the signed hard copy within fourteen (14) days of service of the

notice. The Court upon motion may grant appropriate sanctions for failure to produce the signed hard copy pursuant of the notice.

6. As required by Pa.R.C.P. 205.5, the filing party shall include the statewide cover sheet with the initial filing.

C. Access

- 1. The Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts shall provide electronic access at all times.
- 2. All legal papers that are filed electronically shall be filed through the Prothonotary/Clerk of Court's Electric Filing System which shall be accessible at Prothonotary/ClerkofCourts-orders@centrecountypa.gov.
- 3. Prothonotary/ClerkofCourts-orders@centrecountypa. gov. shall only be used for filing documents and not for any other purposes.
- 4. The Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts, Courts or Court Administrator shall not be obligated to print documents that are filed electronically. A fee will be charged for any documents exceeding 25 pages which need to be printed by the Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts, including a hard copy of any pleadings.

D. Filing Fees

1. The Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts will accept for payment of filing fees the following credit and debit cards: American Express, Discover, Master Card and Visa. Any convenience fee charged will be the responsibility of the filer. The prothonotary will not accept advance deposit on account of future filing fees.

E. Time of Filing

- 1. Upon receipt of the legal paper, the Prothonotary/ Clerk of Courts shall provide the fling party with an acknowledgement, which includes the date and time the legal paper was received by the Electronic Filing System. The Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts shall also provide the filing party with notice that the legal paper was accepted for filing. All filings must be received by 3:30 pm to be time stamped for that business day.
- 2. The Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts shall affix "Filed by Email" near the timestamp.
- 3. If a legal paper is not accepted upon presentation for filing or is refused for filing by the Electronic Filing System, the Prothonotary/Clerk of Courts shall immediately, or if the office is closed, immediately upon opening, notify the party presenting the legal paper for filing of the date of presentation, the fact the document was not accepted or refused for filing by the system, and the reason it was not accepted or refused.
- 4. A filing party shall be responsible for any delay, disruption, interruption of the electronic signals and legibility of the document electronically filed, except when caused by the failure of the electronic filing system's website.

F. Service of Legal Papers

1. Once the electronic filing has been accepted, it shall be the responsibility of the filing party to provide the Sheriff with the proper service fee and the documents for Original Service and Writs. This amended rule (changing the time for electronic filing to 3:30 pm to be stamped for that business day in Paragraph E(1)) is effective February 5, 2024.

CENTRE COUNTY

Local Criminal Rule 117; No: CP-14-MD-690-2006

Order

And Now, December 19, 2023, Local Criminal Rule 117, Paragraph (a) is amended to read that After normal business hours, coverage shall be provided by a Magisterial District Judge, assigned on a rotational schedule, who has county-wide jurisdiction and who operates between the hours of 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. Monday through Friday. Holidays and weekend coverage shall be provided by an assigned on-call Magisterial District Judge.

This change in time shall be effective February 5, 2024. In all other respects the Local Rule is reaffirmed in its entirety.

- Local Rule 117. Providing for Judicial Coverage for the Issuance of, and Presiding Over, Necessary Proceedings: Issuing Warrants, Preliminary Arraignments, Summary Trials, and Setting and Accepting Bail.
- a. After normal business hours, coverage shall be provided by a Magisterial District Judge, assigned on a rotational schedule, who has county-wide jurisdiction and who operates between the hours of 4:00 pm to 8:00 am Monday through Friday. Holidays and weekend coverage shall be provided by an assigned on-call Magisterial District Judge.
- 1. In the event a Magisterial District Judge is needed for after-hours coverage for the issuance of a search or arrest warrant, a preliminary arraignment, a summary trial, a protection from abuse petition, or any other

- emergency matter; the "duty" Magisterial District Judge will be contacted through the Centre County 911 Center.
- 2. The "duty" Magisterial District Judge may conduct essential hearings, such as a preliminary arraignment, pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 516 & 519(A)(1), and summary trials, pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 430(A), 431(B)(3), and 441(C), from any approved advanced communication technology site.
 - 3. (Deleted)
- b. Monetary bond may be posed after normal business hours for Magisterial District Judge Court cases at the Centre County Correctional Facility by certified check or money order. Bail bond agents may continue to post bond at the Centre County Correctional Facility.

This Rule, as Amended by Order of Court on December 19, 2023, (changing the times in paragraph "a" and deleting subparagraph 3) shall be effective February 5, 2024.

Promulgation of Local Rules; No. 1793 S 1989

Order

And Now, this 20 day of December, 2023, Dauphin County Local Rule of Civil Procedure 223.2 and Dauphin County Local Rule of Criminal Procedure 609 are rescinded and replaced with Local Rules of Judicial Administration 5102 and 5103 as follows:

Rule 5102. Custody of Exhibits. General Provisions.

- (a) During Court Proceedings before Judge.
- (1) The Court Reporter shall be designated as the custodian of all documentary exhibits and photographs of non-documentary exhibits accepted or rejected during the court proceedings.
- (2) The Court Crier/Clerk shall maintain the Index of Exhibits during the court proceedings. The Court Crier/Clerk shall use the form supplied by Court Administration which shall be in the following format:

Index of Exhibits

No.	$Description \ / \ Title$	Proponent	Admitted	Rejected	Sealed by Court	Confidential Information Sheet (If required)

- (3) The proponent shall include a Confidential Information Form or Confidential Document Form for any exhibit offered into evidence that contains confidential information or confidential documents as defined in the Case Records Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania. These forms shall be given by the proponent to the Court Crier/Clerk at the time the evidence is introduced.
- (b) After Court Proceedings before Judge. The Court Reporter shall be designated as the custodian of all
- documentary exhibits and photographs of non-documentary exhibits after court proceedings have concluded.
 - (1) The Court Reporter shall:
- (i) retain or take custody of all documentary exhibits, photographs, and photographs of non-documentary exhibits accepted or rejected during the court proceedings.
- (ii) file all documentary exhibits, photographs, and photographs of non-documentary exhibits with the re-

cords office within five (5) business days of the conclusion of the court proceedings; and

- (iii) secure and maintain all other non-documentary exhibits as directed by the Court or agreed to by the parties.
- (2) The Court Reporter shall obtain the Index of Exhibits prepared during the court proceedings from the Court Crier/Clerk and compare the exhibits in the possession of the Court Reporter with the Index of Exhibits. The Court Reporter shall file the Index of Exhibits with the exhibits in the records office.
- (c) Proceedings before Divorce Hearing Officer and Juvenile Hearing Officer.
- (1) In proceedings before the Divorce Hearing Officer and Juvenile Hearing Officer the Hearing Officer shall be the custodian of the documentary exhibits.
- (2) The Hearing Officer shall retain all documentary exhibits, photographs, and photographs of non-documentary exhibits accepted or rejected during the court proceedings.
- (3) The Hearing Officer shall prepare the Index of Exhibits and file the Index of Exhibits with the exhibits in the records office.
- (4) The Hearing Officer shall ensure that a Confidential Information Form or Confidential Document Form for any exhibit offered into evidence that contains confidential information or confidential documents as defined in the Case Records Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania was completed and filed with the exhibit.

Rule 5103. Custody of Exhibits. Special Provisions.

- (a) Documentary Exhibits: Generally
- (1) If a document is larger than $8-1/2 \times 11$ inches, the Court Reporter shall be provided with a copy of the same sized $8-1/2 \times 11$ inches. Items larger than $8-1/2 \times 11$ may be used for illustration during the court proceedings.
- (2) Media depositions presented at trial shall remain in the proponent's possession. The proponent shall simultaneously submit a transcript of the deposition as an exhibit.
 - (c) Non-documentary Exhibits: Generally
- (3) If the exhibit is bulky or oversized, either the Court Reporter or the proponent shall maintain custody of the exhibit as directed by the Court.

The previously listed amendments shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will become effective on April 1, 2024.

Rule 576.1. Electronic Filing in Criminal Dockets.

- A. The Snyder County Clerk of Courts Office and the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Court (AOPC) agreed upon an implementation plan for PACFile in Snyder County for certain criminal filings. Legal papers may be filed electronically using the PACFile electronic filing system pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 576.1. Electronic filing is permissive and not mandatory.
- B. As used in this rule, the following words shall have the following meanings:
- i. "electronic filing," the electronic submission of legal papers by means other than facsimile transmission and the acceptance of the document by the clerk of courts;
- ii. "filing party," an attorney, defendant, plaintiff, or other person who files a legal paper by means of electronic filing;
- iii. "legal paper," a pleading or other submission to the court, including motions, answers, notices or other documents, of which filing is required or permitted, including orders, copies of exhibits, and attachments. The following documents are excluded from the definition of "legal paper" and are therefore prohibited from being filed electronically:

- (3) any grand jury materials, except the indicting grand jury indictment or the investigating grand jury presentment,
 - (4) submission filed ex parte as authorized by law,
- (5) submissions filed or authorized to be filed under seal, and
- (6) exhibits offered into evidence, whether or not admitted, in a court proceeding;
- iv. "original document," a legal paper filed electronically shall be deemed the original document, but copies of exhibits electronically filed do not constitute the original of the exhibit for evidentiary purposes; and
- v. "the system" the PACFile electronic filing system, developed and administered by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts, is the exclusive system for electronic filing.
- C. Attorneys or self-represented parties who file legal papers electronically must establish a PACFile account using the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania Web Portal. Pursuant to Pennsylvania Rule of Criminal Procedure 576.1(D)(2), the establishment of the PACFile account constitutes consent to participate in electronic

filing, including acceptance of service electronically of any document filed using PACFile.

- D. Applicable filing fees for the electronically filed legal papers shall be paid electronically to the Clerk of Courts simultaneously with the filing.
- E. A party who was granted In Forma Pauperis status shall not pay filing fees to the Clerk of Courts.
- F. All filings shall comply with the Case Records Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania
 - G. Service of Legal Papers:
- (a) Attorneys or self-represented parties who are unable and unwilling to participate electronic filing of documents are permitted to file and serve the legal papers in a physical paper format.

Specially, the following offices must be served in accordance with Rule 576: Court Administration, Probation, Sheriff and Court Reporter. This applies to the service of court orders and notices. Distribution to those parties not automatically served via PACFile with a court order or notice must be filed with the Clerk of Courts office with a complete distribution ledger listing the names and addresses of all parties required to be served with a paper copy.
- (c) Service upon an attorney or defendant participating in the system shall be done electronically.


Reorganization of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources

AIR QUALITY

PLAN APPROVAL AND OPERATING PERMIT APPLICATIONS

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has developed an integrated plan approval, State Operating Permit and Title V Operating Permit program. This integrated approach is designed to make the permitting process more efficient for DEP, the regulated community and the general public. This approach allows the owner or operator of a facility to submit permitting documents relevant to its application for all sources related to a facility or a proposed project, affords an opportunity for public input, and provides for a decision on the issuance of the necessary permits.

The DEP received applications for Plan Approvals or Operating Permits from the following facilities. Copies of the application, DEP's analysis, all pertinent documents used in the evaluation of the application and subsequently prepared proposed plan approvals/operating permits are available for public review during normal business hours at the appropriate DEP Regional Office. Appointments for scheduling a review must be made by calling the appropriate DEP Regional Office. The address and telephone number of the Regional Office is listed before the application notices.

Individuals wishing to file a written protest or provide comments or additional information, which they believe should be considered prior to the issuance of a permit, may submit the information to the DEP's Regional Office. A 30-day comment period from the date of this publication will exist for the submission of comments, protests and information. Moreover, the project plan approval application specifies that the above are subject to applicable Federal standards include the applicable requirements under the National Performance Standards for Stationary Source (NSPS) codified in 40 CFR Part 60 Subpart OOO (Non-metallic mineral processing), as well as Title V and Compliance Assurance Monitoring (CAM) provisions as specified in 25 Pa. In addition, the total annual emissions of PM and PM₋₁₀ from the Source ID C117 collector exhaust shall not exceed 0.56 lb/hr and 2.5 tons in any twelve consecutive month period and the annual total emissions of $PM_{2.5}$ from the Source ID C117 collector exhaust shall not exceed 1.9 tons in any twelve consecutive month period, upon project startup, replacing existing restrictions under Source ID P117 of TVOP 17-00001 upon project startup. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995 PREAMBLE 3

The Department Has Taken Action on the Following Plans and Reports Under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.907).

Section 250.8 of 25 Pa. Code and administration of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin a notice of its final actions on plans and reports. A final report is submitted to document cleanup of a release of a regulated substance at a site to one of the remediation standards of the act. A final report provides a description of the site investigation to characterize the nature and extent of contaminants in environmental media, the basis of selecting the environmental media of concern, documentation supporting the selection of residential or nonresidential exposure factors, a description of the remediation performed and summaries of sampling methodology and analytical results which demonstrate that the remediation has attained the cleanup standard selected. Plans and reports required by the act for compliance with selection of remediation to a site-specific standard, in addition to a final report, include a remedial investigation report, risk assessment report and cleanup plan. A remedial investigation report includes conclusions from the site investigation; concentration of regulated substances in environmental media; benefits of reuse of the property; and, in some circumstances, a fate and transport analysis. If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by the act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The DEP may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides DEP's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Application Requirements

The following documents are required to complete this grant application. Only the latest version of these forms will be accepted, unless otherwise directed. Do not submit any additional documentation with the application materials unless specifically requested. Documents must be properly completed for an application to be approved.

- 1. The 903 Application Spreadsheet (an Excel spreadsheet with three tabs—an Activities & Expenses Log, Wages & Benefits Log and County Expenses & Reimbursement Log (Department Use Only)).
- 2. Application for Reimbursement for a County Recycling Coordinator (Section A—F Form).
- 3. Expense documentation, such as any receipts/invoices and proof of payments necessary for requested reimbursements. Proof of payment can be in the form of an invoice showing a zero balance, paid receipt, cleared check (both sides) or bank/credit card statement showing that the county paid the fees for the requested reimbursement. Submit all expense documentation as one file. *Note*: Black out any personal/account information, as documentation will be placed in the Department's filing system.
- 4. The Worker Protection & Investment Certification Form. Properly fill out and have signed by the appropriate official.
- 5. If the designated County Recycling Coordinator (CRC) is an outside contractor*, the county must include with the grant application submission an agreement or Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the county and the person designated as the CRC. If there are multiple documents, submit documentation as one file.
- * An outside contractor is any individual who does not work as an employee for the represented county, such as an employee of a private or public organization, an employee of a Solid Waste Authority or a private individual. An organization that contracts with the county must assign one individual to conduct the CRC responsibilities.

The agreement or MOU must also include the following:

- a. Name of the organization or person, or both, who will perform the duties of the CRC.
- b. Details of the duties of the organization or person, or both
- c. Percentage of salary, benefits, expenses, and the like, the organization or person, or both, incurs that the county will reimburse that organization or person, or both.
- d. Detailed expectations (goals) the county has of the organization or person, or both, performing the recycling duties.
- e. Must be signed and dated by all parties of the agreement or MOU and include effective dates.

Eligibility Requirements

Applicants must be in compliance with the provisions of Act 101 to receive grant funding reimbursements. Applicants who are not in compliance with Act 101 and Annual Reporting requirements will not be considered.

It is expected the designated CRC will perform duties in addition to completing grant applications. These duties include, but are not limited to, improving collection methods, increasing the tonnages of recyclables collected, educating county residents about recycling, assisting municipalities with recycling, updating and maintaining required surveys in the County Recycling Report Program and Recycling & Compost Facility Directory in Re-TRAC Connect and other recycling related activities. A more detailed list of these responsibilities is found under the "Pennsylvania County Recycling Coordinator Responsibilities" section within the "Pennsylvania County Recycling Coordinator Grant 903 Program Information Instructions" on the Department's web site.

To have training/out-of-State travel reimbursed that is: 1) greater than 300 miles from workplace or residence; or 2) includes expenses totaling \$300 or greater, at least 1 month prior to the actual training/travel event, a current Bureau of Waste Management Travel Request Form, along with an itinerary, must be submitted for approval to the designated Regional Recycling Coordinator and 903 County Recycling Program Grant Coordinator. These requirements are also required for virtual training with a company whose home address is out-of-State. This form is available on the Department's web site.

Eligible / Ineligible Costs

Counties are eligible for 50% reimbursement grants for the approved salary and expenses of employing a CRC. Applicants must specify only one individual to perform the CRC position for the purpose of reimbursement under section 903 of Act 101. Two individuals (for example, county employee and contractor or contractor's employee) cannot share the same position concurrently.

Eligible CRC costs include:

- 50% of salary/wages while conducting CRC recycling duties. For more information, see the "Activities Eligible for Reimbursement for County Recycling Coordinator Grant Applications" section in the "Pennsylvania County Recycling Coordinator Grant 903 Program Information Instructions" document on the Department's web site.
- 50% of CRC's employer costs for social security, workers' compensation, unemployment compensation and other approved benefits.
 - 50% of expenses directly related to recycling.

Eligible recycling expenses include (Training/travel costs must follow State guidelines for reimbursement.):

- Training/travel costs directly related to recycling programs that occur within this Commonwealth.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Temporary Change to Fishing Regulations; 58 Pa. Code § 61.2. Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and Estuary

The Executive Director of the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission), acting under the authority of 58 Pa. Code § 65.25 (relating to temporary changes to fishing regulations), has taken immediate action to amend 58 Pa. Code § 61.2 (relating to Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary). The Executive Director has amended this section to reduce the maximum legal harvestable length in the striped bass slot limit from less than 35 inches to less than 31 inches from the Commonwealth line upstream to Calhoun Street Bridge (Delaware Estuary) from January 1 through March 31 and June 1 through December 31 and from the Calhoun Street Bridge upstream (Delaware River) yearround. Daily limits, seasons and gear restrictions will remain the same. These actions are being taken to meet the requirements of the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC).

At its May 2023 quarterly meeting, the ASMFC's Atlantic Striped Bass Management Board, which includes the Commonwealth as a member, approved an emergency action to implement a 31-inch maximum size limit for Atlantic striped bass recreational fisheries, effective immediately for no less than 180 days (October 28, 2023). The Executive Director, acting under the authority of 58 Pa. Code § 65.25, took immediate action to amend 58 Pa. Code § 61.2 to comply with this emergency action. These temporary modifications effected under this authority will expire on January 1, 2024. At its August 2023 quarterly meeting, the ASMFC's Atlantic Striped Bass Management Board extended the May emergency action through October 28, 2024, unless sooner replaced by Draft Addendum II to Amendment 7 to the Interstate Fishery Management Plan for Atlantic Striped Bass.

As outlined in the ASMFC's Interstate Fisheries Management Program Charter, a management board can take emergency action to address circumstances under which public health, the conservation of coastal fishery resources or attainment of fishery management objectives has been placed at substantial risk by unanticipated changes in the ecosystem, the stock or the fishery. These actions respond to the unprecedented magnitude of 2022 recreational harvest, which was nearly double that of 2021 and to new stock rebuilding projections which estimate the probability of the rebuilding the spawning

stock to its biomass target by 2029 at less than 15% if the higher 2022 fishing mortality rate continues in subsequent years. Previous projections under the lower 2021 fishing mortality rate estimated the rebuilding probability at 97%. Additionally, the ASMFC implemented the emergency 31-inch maximum size limit through October 28, 2024, to reduce harvest of the strong 2015-year class. Jurisdictions are required to implement the measure so that continuity in regulations are maintained through this time period. The ASMFC may extend the emergency action for one more additional period of up to 1 year at a future meeting. The temporary change to 58 Pa. Code § 61.2 is designed to meet this objective.

To address the coast-wide regulation directed by the ASMFC, the Commission's Executive Director has taken immediate action to make the following modifications to fishing regulation:

§ 61.2. Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary.

Environmental Quality Board Regulation # 7-577 (IRRC # 3383)

Triennial Review of Water Quality Standards December 21, 2023

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the October 7, 2023 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the RRA (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Environmental Quality Board (Board) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Protection of the public health, safety, and welfare; Reasonableness.

In this proposed regulation, the Board is revising water quality standards for the Commonwealth as part of its triennial review of water quality standards. Commenters have concerns about certain criteria proposed by the Board.

- In Table 5, the Board proposes to add a human health criterion of 0.3 micrograms per liter (mg/l) for 1,4-dioxane. The American Chemistry Council (ACC) asserts that this criterion is based on "the default assumption that there is no dose of the substance that does not present an increased cancer risk—no matter how small the increase." ACC notes that both Health Canada and the World Health Organization recommend a drinking water level of 50 mg/l. Similarly, the Pennsylvania Chamber of Business and Industry contends that the Board "has not provided sufficient justification for moving the regulation of 1,4-[d]ioxane from what was formerly a stream segment specific standard in Chapter 16, Appendix A, Table 1A to a statewide [Ambient Water Quality Standard] in Chapter 93, Table 5."
- Three Rivers Waterkeeper, citing multiple articles related to the harmful impacts of certain chemicals, opposes less stringent criteria for metolachlor, formaldehyde, acetone, resorcinol, and chloroform, stating, "Without scientific proof that the less stringent standards will not harm public health and our environment via acute and chronic exposure, standards should not be less stringent."

We ask the Board to explain the reasonableness of revisions to the above criteria in the final regulation and how the criteria protect the public health, safety, and welfare.

Other commenters ask the Board to consider adopting additional criteria.

• The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Region III, recommends the Board adopt nutrient criteria for the protection of lakes and reservoirs derived using the models found in the 2021 document Ambient Water Quality Criteria to Address Nutrient Pollution in Lakes and Reservoirs.

- The EPA encourages the Board to adopt the EPA's 2001 recommended criterion for methylmercury for the protection of human health.
- The EPA asks the Board to consider revising its aquatic life criteria for aluminum, copper, and selenium to be consistent with the EPA's recommendations.
- PennFuture asks the Board to protect aquatic life in Pennsylvania's waters from discharges of chloride, asserting that elevated levels of chloride are toxic to aquatic life in freshwater environments, and that chloride can negatively affect the fish and insect community structure, diversity, and productivity, even at lower levels.

We ask the Board to explain how the final regulation protects public health, safety, and welfare as relates to these criteria.

2. Section 93.7. Specific water quality criteria. Section 93.8c. Human health and aquatic life criteria for toxic substances.

Section 93.8e. Special criteria for the Great Lakes System.—Implementation.

In Sections 93.7(a), 93.8c(c), and 93.8e(b.1), the Board proposes to add language that clarifies the duration periods for the aquatic life criteria in Table 3, Table 5, and Table 6, respectively. In order to evaluate the impact of implementation of the revised criteria, the EPA requests that the Board provide the following additional information:

- Pennsylvania's current method for averaging data points when evaluating monitoring data for assessment purposes:
- A rationale for not also proposing to adopt the frequency component of aquatic life criteria in this triennial review;
- Absent the adoption of the frequency component, what the Department will use for a maximum allowable frequency of exceedance of the criterion maximum concentration (CMC) and criterion continuous concentration (CCC); and
- A rationale for having different durations for the CMC and the CCC for the aquatic life water quality criteria for acrylonitrile, chlordane, 4,4-DDT, alphaendosulfan, and beta-endosulfan.

We will review the Board's response to the EPA relating to the impact of implementation of the revised criteria as part of our determination of whether the final-form regulation is in the public interest.

Flood Insurance Premium Assistance Task Force; Request for Public Comments; Notice 2024-01

On November 1, 2023, Governor Josh Shapiro signed Act 22 (P.L. 154, No. 22) into law. Section 1.1 of Act 22 establishes the Flood Insurance Premium Assistance Task Force (Task Force) to review and analyze existing statutes, procedures, practices, processes and rules relating to the administration of flood insurance in this Commonwealth. The goal of the Task Force is to provide a report containing recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly to increase flood insurance awareness, accessibility and affordability. Specifically, the recommendations in the report are to address each of the following areas:

- Potential programs that provide premium discounts.
- Potential programs that create incentives for local governments to undertake or continue flood mitigation efforts.
- The implementation of necessary changes in statutes or practices relating to the administration of flood insurance.
- How to educate residents about the risk of flooding and ways to mitigate flood occurrences.
- Steps that should be taken to inform residents about options available when purchasing flood insurance.
- How to increase the number of people that purchase flood insurance.

Act 22 allows the Task Force to accept and review written comments from both individuals and organizations that will assist the Task Force in forming recommendations to increase awareness and access to affordable flood insurance coverage in this Commonwealth. As such, as Chairperson of the Task Force, the Insurance Commissioner is initiating a public comment period on behalf of the Task Force.

Tobacco Settlement Agreement Act; Tobacco Product Manufacturer Directory Act—Amendments

The Office of Attorney General has obtained the consent of the participating manufacturers under the Master Settlement Agreement required by Act 9 of 2023 (P.L. 47, No. 9) and Act 11 of 2023 (P.L. 51, No. 11), amending section 3 of the act of June 22, 2000 (P.L. 394, No. 54) and amending sections 102, 301, 303, 304, 305 and 306 and adding sections 312 and 313 to the act of December

30, 2003 (P.L. 441, No. 64). These amendments and additions modify the definition of units sold to apply to all cigarettes and roll-your-own tobacco on which State excise tax is due, not just product on which the tax is paid; make importers jointly and severally liable with nonparticipating manufacturers (NPM) for escrow that is due; require NPMs to post a surety bond upon specified terms, conditions and amount, and set forth the terms and conditions for executing on the bond; further delineate circumstances under which the Commonwealth will exclude an NPM from the tobacco product directory; provide new certification requirements related to identifying importers, posting of surety bonds and an importer declaration and appointment of an agent for service of process; further delineate and extend the scope of permissible disclosure and information sharing; and provide for other definitions and modified terms.

Publication of Guidelines for the Disaster Recovery Assistance Program

This notice of publication of guidelines is for the Disaster Recovery Assistance Program (DRAP) as required by the act of July 11, 2022 (P.L. 540, No. 54), which added section 1735-F.1(3) of The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. § 1735-F.1(3)), and the act of December 13, 2023 , No. 34), which added section 1735-F.3(3) of The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. § 1735-F.3(3)). DRAP is designed to provide disaster relief when other Federal, State, local, nongovernmental or private aid is not available to assist victims of disasters. DRAP is a State grant program that may offer relief to eligible homeowners and renters in this Commonwealth who have suffered certain losses due to a disaster and do not qualify for a Small Business Administration disaster loan or have insurance to cover their losses. DRAP is administered by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (Agency). The guidelines for activation, eligibility and application instructions are published on the Agency's web site at www.pema.pa.gov.

Disaster Recovery Assistance Program 2023 Guidance

PART I: RECOVERING FROM A DISASTER

Prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery are the five phases of Emergency Management. The recovery phase of a disaster consists of those activities that continue beyond the emergency period to return a community to normal or near-normal conditions. Recovery activities include the restoration of basic services and the repair of physical, social, and economic damages. The goal of the recovery phase is to bring the affected area back to some degree of normalcy. After life-safety risks are addressed, some immediate actions you can take to aid the recovery process include:

- Take photos of your damaged home and belongings for your own records
- If you have insurance (such as flood, homeowners, renters, auto or other types of insurance), file a claim with your insurance provider as soon as possible

• Report your property damages to your community's emergency management coordinator

Reporting Damages is Critical to the Recovery Process:

If your home or property is impacted by a disaster, timely reporting of these damages to your community's emergency management coordinator is critical to the disaster recovery process. Reporting your damages as soon as possible enables officials to determine resources that may be available at the local, state, and federal levels to help recover from the disaster. Your action in promptly reporting damages is foundational to your community's recovery from a disaster.

Immediate and Long-Term Disaster Recovery Resources:

Disaster recovery is the cumulative effort of federal, state, county, and local governments in conjunction with non-governmental organizations and private industries pooling financial and personnel resources to assist disaster-impacted communities. Below are examples of potential resources that may be available to assist you with recovering from the impacts of a disaster:

Insurance is the first resource in recovering from a disaster. Contact your insurance agent or company representative to report your losses, review your coverage, and answer any questions. The Pennsylvania Insurance Department provides assistance with insurance related questions or issues and can be reached by calling 1-877-881-6388 or by visiting the Pennsylvania Insurance Department website.

Local programs and services may be available to assist with recovery efforts.

- Voluntary and Nonprofit Organizations are often ready to step in and help take care of immediate needs. These organizations may be able to assist with food and water, clothing, sheltering services, immediate debris clearance, home repair/cleanout, or address other immediate needs. Contact your local municipality or county for additional information. You may also contact relief agencies and local volunteer and faith-based communities directly. Resources can also be found on the Information and Referral line by dialing 2-1-1 or visiting https://www.pa211.org/.
- County Assistance Offices, which are part of the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, may offer assistance and other services to people and families in need.

Federal assistance may be requested if the total amount of damages from the disaster exceeds thresholds established by the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA). Damages that meet those thresholds may result in a federal disaster declaration. The importance of reporting your damages to the local emergency management coordinator as soon as possible cannot be over emphasized. In the absence of federal assistance, residents affected by a disaster may need to rely on personal resources and assistance from local programs and/or voluntary organizations.

- U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) offers low-interest disaster loans to eligible homeowners, renters, businesses of all sizes and certain private nonprofit organizations in areas where a physical disaster is declared by SBA. SBA is most often the primary form of federal assistance that becomes available in Pennsylvania
- Physical Disaster Loans are for permanent rebuilding and replacement of uninsured or underinsured

disaster-damaged privately-owned real and/or personal property. SBA makes physical disaster loans to qualified homeowners, renters, businesses, and certain private nonprofit organizations.

The Disaster Recovery Assistance Program (DRAP) is designed to provide disaster relief when other local, state, federal, non-governmental, or private aid is not available to assist victims of disasters. DRAP is a state grant program that may offer relief to eligible homeowners and renters in Pennsylvania who have suffered certain losses due to a disaster and do not qualify for an SBA disaster loan or have insurance to cover their losses. DRAP is administered by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA).

PART II: 2023 DRAP GUIDELINES

Program Availability:

DRAP is made available when the following three criteria are met:

- 1. Federal Individual Assistance pursuant to the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act has not been authorized.
- 2. The U.S. Small Business Administration issues an administrative agency declaration of a physical disaster authorizing low interest loans to homeowners or renters.
- 3. The governor determines that the program should be activated.

When DRAP is activated, PEMA will define the disaster event and areas where DRAP is available pursuant to an SBA determination of an administrative agency declaration of a disaster. This information will be published by PEMA on its publicly available website and sent to appropriate local officials and to the public through all appropriate means under the circumstances.

Applicant Eligibility:

DRAP is designed to provide disaster relief when other local, state, federal, non-governmental, or private aid is not available to assist victims of disasters and the losses are not covered by insurance. DRAP funds are limited, and individuals are required to utilize insurance, SBA loans, and other disaster recovery assistance programs prior to seeking DRAP funds. Survivors of a declared disaster may receive a one-time grant of up to \$10,000 per household. To be eligible for DRAP:

- 1. Applicants must have suffered losses caused directly by the disaster and in the areas defined by PEMA. The applicant's primary residence must be located:
- In a Pennsylvania county that is identified as a primary or contiguous county in an SBA administrative agency declaration of disaster as requested by the Governor of Pennsylvania; and
- In a municipality that issued a declaration of disaster emergency within two weeks of the disaster event.
- PEMA must have received at least one damage assessment report from the municipality that issued the declaration of disaster emergency.
- In general, each local governmental entity and county has a process for reporting damages caused by a disaster. Individuals who are impacted by a disaster are encouraged to immediately inform their local emergency management coordinator. The local emergency management coordinator submits a report of the damage to the county emergency management agency. The county aggregates the information and submits the collected data to PEMA.
- PEMA will cross-check applications against damage assessments provided by the affected county's emergency management office(s) to ensure the applicant's residence appears on a list of known affected properties. If the applicant's residence is not on a list of known affected properties, PEMA will work with the appropriate county officials or other stakeholders to determine whether the property was affected by the disaster.
- Businesses and secondary properties, such as vacation homes or investment properties, are not eligible for DRAP.
- 2. To be eligible for a DRAP grant, the homeowner or renter must first apply for a disaster loan through SBA and be denied because of inability to repay or inadequate credit.
- The SBA denial notification must be submitted with the DRAP application.
- 3. Eligibility to receive a DRAP grant is also based on annual household income. Households earning below 500% of the most recent National Federal Poverty Guidelines¹ published by the United States Department of Health and Human Services may be eligible to receive DRAP grants:
- Households with annual household income that is higher than the amounts in this table are not eligible to apply for DRAP grants.
- Households with annual household income that is equal to or less than the amounts in this table must first apply for a disaster loan through SBA and be denied in order to be eligible to apply for a DRAP grant.¹

For purposes of DRAP:

- A household is an individual or group living together at one mailing address.
- Annual household income is the combined gross income of all members of the household in the preceding calendar year.
- Gross income is the total amount of money earned in a year before any taxes, healthcare or payroll or deductions are taken out. Gross income is different from net income. Net income is the money taken home after taxes and any deductions are removed.

DRAP Eligible Expenses

DRAP grants may help pay for losses that were a direct result of the disaster. Covered losses fit in to one of three categories.

- 1. Category 1—Home Repairs for the primary residence of eligible homeowners:
- For eligible homeowners, DRAP funds may be used to return the home to a safe, healthy, accessible, and weatherproof condition. DRAP grant funds may be eligible for the following home repairs category necessitated by a disaster:
- Entrance or exit ways from the home to ensure safe access. This does not include improvements to entrance and exit ways.
- O Disaster related debris removal that causes a threat to health, safety, or access to the residence.
 - Structural damage to the home.
 - O Windows, doors, floors, walls, ceilings, or cabinetry.
 - Septic or sewage systems.
 - Well or other water systems.
 - Heating, ventilation, or air conditioning systems.
- \circ Utilities, including electrical, plumbing and gas systems.
- Blocking, leveling, and anchoring of a mobile home, and reconnecting or resetting its sewer, water, electrical, and fuel lines and tanks.
 - Permitting and inspection.
- Other projects required to make the home safe, sanitary, and weatherproof.
- Applicants may receive up to \$10,000 for home repairs.
- Applicants must submit at least two quotes from two different contractors registered with the Office of Attorney General under the Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act (73 P.S. §§ 517.1—517.19) for a particular project and meet all other eligibility requirements to recover costs for home repairs. If an applicant has already had work performed, detailed receipts must be submitted.
 - 2. Category 2—Temporary Housing
- For eligible homeowners and renters, DRAP funds may be used for temporary housing if the home is destroyed, uninhabitable, inaccessible, or unavailable due to a disaster.
- DRAP grants may cover up to 60 days lodging at a licensed establishment, such as a hotel or motel, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- The maximum amount DRAP may award per room will not exceed 150% of the daily lodging rates established by the U.S. Department of General Services Ad-

ministration for destinations in Pennsylvania. See Appendix A for a schedule of DRAP maximum daily lodging rates per room for various areas in Pennsylvania.

- Meals, incidental costs, and other hotel services are not an eligible use of DRAP funds.
- Rooms must be booked with at least two members of the household staying in each room, whenever possible.
- Applicants may receive up to \$5,000 for temporary housing.
 - 3. Category 3—Essential Personal Property
- For eligible homeowners and renters, DRAP funds may be used to cover the loss of essential personal property destroyed due to the disaster and not covered by insurance. Please see Appendix B for a list of personal property eligible under DRAP and the maximum amount that may be awarded for each item.
- Essential personal property not covered by insurance is eligible under DRAP for reimbursement up to \$5,000.

DRAP Grant Awards & Prioritization of Funding:

Each eligible household may receive a maximum grant of up to \$10,000 in DRAP funding. For example, an applicant may receive \$6,000 for home repairs, \$2,000 for temporary housing, and \$2,000 for essential personal property, where those losses are not covered by insurance or reimbursed from another source. The maximum total award applies even if eligible losses exceed \$10,000.

DRAP has limited financial resources. For disasters that occur after 75% of the annual funds for the program have been exhausted, essential personal property losses will no longer be recoverable until additional funding becomes available.

PEMA maintains discretion to prioritize DRAP funds towards certain cost categories as needed during current or future disasters. If it becomes necessary to prioritize the allocation of awards due to limited funds, the priority shall be:

- 1. Home repairs
- 2. Temporary housing
- 3. Essential personal property

DRAP Application Process and Requirements:

Households earning below 500% of the National Federal Poverty Guidelines must first apply for a disaster loan through SBA and be denied because of inability to repay or inadequate credit. PEMA will coordinate with SBA to identify individuals who were denied an SBA loan. PEMA will work to contact these individuals to provide information about DRAP and application process. Individuals that are income eligible, who were denied an SBA loan, do not have to wait to be contacted by PEMA to submit a DRAP application. Applicants must follow the process, and meet the requirements, specified below. DRAP applications without proof of an SBA Loan Request Denial will not be considered.

- 1. Applications must be for a primary residence only.
- 2. One application may be submitted per household.
- 3. DRAP grant application must be submitted within 90 days of the date DRAP activation is announced for the applicable disaster.

- 4. When DRAP is made available, eligible households apply for the grant using the Commonwealth online eGrants system.
- To apply using the eGrants system, the applicant needs to register for a Keystone Login. Keystone Login is a username and password that is used to log into any Commonwealth agency online service that participates in Keystone Login. A Keystone Login can be obtained here: https://keystonelogin.pa.gov/Account/Register.
- A paper application may be submitted to PEMA if an applicant is unable to submit a grant application electronically using the eGrants system.
- 5. Applicants will be required to provide the following information on a DRAP grant application:
 - Contact information.
- Insurance information including the claim denial (if applicable).
- Household information including whether the applicant owns or rents their home and the total number of adults in the household.
 - Income information.
 - · Description of damages.
- 6. Applicants will need to submit the following documents to PEMA for the application to be finalized:
- Proof of residency (ex. utility bill, driver's license, lease agreement, mortgage document, or tax records).
- Proof of income (ex. tax records, Medicaid card, or three months of paystubs from the last calendar year for all members of household).
 - · Photographs of damage claimed.
 - \bullet Receipts for any reimbursements requested.
 - Quotes for remediation or repair work.
 - · Cancelled check for direct deposit bank account.
- Copies of Home and/or Renter's Insurance Declaration Page.
 - Proof of SBA Loan Request Denial.
- 7. In addition to completing DRAP grant application, applicants will be required to:
- Disclose the receipt of benefits from any other source, including insurance, charitable organizations, and other government organizations related to the loss for which they are seeking benefits.
- Acknowledge that willfully making a false statement or misrepresentation in their application or failing to disclose a material fact regarding their eligibility may subject them to criminal penalties under 18 Pa.C.S. § 4904 (relating to unsworn falsification to authorities).
- 8. Applicants must be willing to permit an inspection of their home by PEMA or another entity designated by PEMA to verify damages.
- 9. PEMA may, at its discretion, perform any investigation they deem appropriate to corroborate the values placed on personal property items by an applicant.

DRAP Application Review

PEMA is responsible for receiving and managing applications, as well as making recommendations on the disposition of the applications. After review by PEMA personnel, applications will receive one of three dispositions:

- 1. Approved—The application is complete, and the request is approved in whole.
- 2. Incomplete—The application is incomplete. The application will be returned to the applicant as soon as possible with feedback identifying the application's deficiencies. If an application is returned as incomplete, the applicant will be able to redress the deficiencies within: a) 30 days from the date they are first notified the application was incomplete, or b) through the completion of the initial 90 days after DRAP was activated, whichever is longer
- 3. Denied—The application demonstrates that an applicant is ineligible for the program, the identified losses are not covered by the program, or that other good cause for denial exists.

DRAP Grant Agreement & Payment

DRAP is a state grant program. Individuals awarded DRAP funds will receive an award letter and grant agreement from PEMA. The grant agreement specifies the requirements of the grant program and items that must be completed by the recipient of the funds. The individual applicant should review the grant agreement. If the individual applicant agrees to the terms, the grant agreement must be signed and returned to PEMA utilizing the eGrants portal within 30 calendar days. If the grant agreement is not returned within 30 days, PEMA will make at least three attempts via the applicant's preferred method of communication. PEMA will document each attempt to contact the applicant, with at least one attempt in writing. PEMA may rescind the grant award if the applicant does not make contact within 30 days of their first notification.

Please note that the Commonwealth is unable to process grant payments until the grant agreement is signed by all parties. Once the grant agreement is fully executed, the grant payment will be processed as quickly as possible.

DRAP payments may be made electronically into a grant recipient's bank account. A grant recipient will need to provide banking information to allow for direct deposit. Payments may be made in the form of check if a bank account is not available.

Post Award Requirements & Grant Closeout

- 1. Grant recipients must use DRAP funds for costs provided on the grant application. If funds remain after these needs are addressed, the grant recipient must either use the remaining funds for eligible DRAP costs or return the funds to the Commonwealth.
- Grant recipients shall not use DRAP funds for any loss that is covered by an insurance policy or any other funding source, including any other governmental or non-profit disaster assistance program.
- 2. Grant recipients must obtain and retain documentation of all expenditures of awarded funds.
- 3. Documentation of expenditure of all grant funds must be submitted to PEMA within 60 days after the project is complete or the grant agreement expires, whichever is earlier.
- If a grant recipient does not provide supporting documentation or PEMA determines that DRAP funds were spent on items or activities that are not eligible under the laws, regulations, policies, directives, guidelines, and requirements applicable to DRAP funds, a grant recipient will be required to return those funds to PEMA.

4. Grant recipients must maintain receipts for all purchases made for losses claimed as part of their DRAP application for three years after receiving the award.

DRAP Compliance Reviews

PEMA, through its Bureau of Grants Management, will conduct compliance reviews in accordance with its most recently published "Grant Monitoring Standard Operating Procedure." If a compliance review or audit reveals inappropriate use of state funds, the matter may be referred to the Office of Attorney General, or other appropriate authority.

Tentative Order

By the Commission:

The Commission's regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) state that an Electric Generation Supplier (EGS) license will not be issued or remain in force until the licensee furnishes a bond or other security approved by the Commission. In addition, 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(d) states that the maintenance of an EGS license is contingent on the licensee providing proof to the Commission that a

bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission has been obtained.

Each EGS must file an original bond, letter of credit, continuation certificate, amendment, or other approved financial instrument with Rosemary Chiavetta, Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, 400 North Street, Harrisburg, PA, 17120, prior to the EGS's current security expiration date. Each financial instrument must be an original document that displays a "wet" signature or digital signature, preferably in blue ink, and displays a "raised seal" or original notary stamp. The name of the principal on the original financial instrument must match exactly with the name that appears on the EGS's license issued by the Commission.

Failure to file before the financial security's expiration date may cause Commission staff to initiate a formal proceeding that may lead to the following: cancellation of each company's electric supplier license, removal of each company's information from the Commission's website, and notification to all electric distribution companies, in which each company is licensed to do business, of the cancellation of the license.

As of December 12, 2023, each EGS listed in the Supplier Table below has not provided proof to the Commission that it has a bond or other approved security in the amount or language directed by the Commission, to replace a bond which is expired, or which is noncompliant with Commission regulations.

As part of its EGS license validation procedures, the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services sent a 90-day Security Renewal Notice email to each entity in the Supplier Table above stating that original documentation of a bond, or other approved security in the amount or language directed by the Commission, must be filed within 30-days prior to each entity's security expiration date. None of the companies listed in the Supplier Table provided the required documentation.

Based on the above facts, we tentatively conclude that the EGSs listed in the Supplier Table are not in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) and (d) and therefore it is appropriate to initiate the cancellation process for the EGS license of each company listed in the Supplier Table, without the necessity of a formal complaint, as being in the public interest;

Therefore,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. Cancellation of the Electric Generation Supplier License of each company listed in the Supplier Table is hereby tentatively approved as being in the public interest.
- 2. The Secretary (i) serve a copy of this Tentative Order upon the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Bureau of Investigation & Enforcement, all electric generation distribution companies, and all of the Electric Generation Suppliers listed in the Supplier Table; (ii) publish a copy of this Tentative Order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day comment period; and (iii) file a copy of this Tentative Order at each Electric Generation Supplier's assigned docket number.
- 3. To the extent any of the Electric Generation Suppliers listed in the Supplier Table challenge the cancellation of their license, they must file comments within thirty (30) days after publication of this Tentative Order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Written comments referencing Docket No. M-2023-3037455 must be eFiled to the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Alternatively, Electric Generation Suppliers listed in the Supplier Table may provide the Commission an approved security up to and within thirty (30) days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The Electric Generation Supplier must file an original bond, letter of credit, continuation certificate, amendment, or other approved financial instrument displaying a "wet" signature or digital signature, preferably in blue ink, and displaying a "raised seal" or original notary stamp with Rosemary Chiavetta, Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, 400 North Street, Harrisburg, PA, 17120.
- 5. Absent the timely (i) filing of comments challenging the cancellation of the Electric Generation Supplier's license, or (ii) the filing of an approved security within 30-days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Bureau of Technical Utility Services, shall prepare a Final Order for entry by the Secretary revoking the license of each Electric Generation Supplier that fails to respond.
- 6. Upon entry of the Final Order, Electric Generation Suppliers that remain listed as not in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) and (d) will be stricken from all active utility lists maintained by the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Administration, removed from the Commission's website, and notifications be sent to all electric distribution companies in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do business.
- 7. Upon entry of the Final Order, Electric Generation Suppliers that fail to respond will be prohibited from

providing electric generation supply services to retail electric customers. That upon entry of the Final Order described in Ordering Paragraph No. 5, each electric distribution company in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do business, shall return the customers of the Electric Generation Suppliers to default service.

Order

By the Commission:

Before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) for consideration are three recommended appointments to the Damage Prevention Committee (DPC) provided for in the Underground Utility Line Protection Law, Act of October 30, 2017, P.L. 806, No. 50 (Act 50). We shall approve the candidates recommended by the Commission's Executive Director; these appointees will serve three-year terms to begin on January 1, 2024. For the reasons set forth herein, the remaining vacancy for the Natural Gas or Petroleum Pipeline industry position will be reposted on the Commission's website and in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* seeking qualified candidates.

On April 30, 2018, Act 50, the Underground Utility Line Protection Law (One Call Law) became effective assigning certain duties and responsibilities associated with Pennsylvania's One Call system to the Commission. One of the duties and responsibilities assigned to the Commission is to appoint eligible and qualified persons to the DPC. 73 P.S. § 182.8(a).

Section 182.8(a) of the One Call Law, 73 P.S. § 182.8(a), establishes the membership and the criteria of the representatives to serve on the DPC, which consists of 13 appointees with the authority to review, make recommendations, and resolve among aggrieved parties, viola-

tions of the One Call Law. Subsections 182.8(a)(1)(iv), (v), (vii) and (3) provide as follows:

- (a) A damage prevention committee shall be established as follows:
- (1) The committee shall consist of the following members, appointed by the commission:

* * *

- (iv) One representative from each of the following nonmunicipally owned or affiliated facility own industries: electric, natural gas or petroleum pipelines, telephone, water or wastewater and cable television, nominated by facility owners or affiliated organizations
- (v) Three representatives of excavators, nominated by excavators or affiliated organizations.

* * *

(vii) One representative of municipal authorities, nominated by municipal authorities or affiliated organizations

* * *

(3) A nomination under clause (1)(iv), (v), (vi) and (vii) shall be forwarded to the secretary of the commission. The executive director of the commission shall provide recommended candidates to the commission for approval.

By publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Commission requested qualified candidates to submit their resumes to the Secretary of the Commission by the close of business on October 30, 2023. After review of the nominations submitted to the Commission, the Commission is approving the following individuals to serve as members of the DPC for a three-year term beginning on January 1, 2024: William Kukurin, of Kukurin Contracting, Inc., representing the Excavator industry under Section 182.8(a)(1)(v), 73 P.S. § 182.8(a)(1)(v); Thomas C. Ceraso, of the Municipal Authority of Westmoreland County, representing the Municipal Authority industry under Section 182.8(a)(1)(vii), 73 P.S. § 182.8(a)(1)(vii); and Douglas L. Haupt, of PPL Electric Utilities, representing the Electric industry under Section 182.8(a)(1)(iv), 73 P.S. § 182.8(a)(1)(iv).

In addition to the three posted vacancies that we are filling here, the Commission sought nominees from the Natural Gas or Petroleum Pipeline industry under Section 182.8(a)(1)(iv), 73 P.S. § 182.8(a)(1)(iv). We received a single nomination to fill this position. Section 182.8(a)(2) of the One Call Law states, "[a] person appointed to the committee must have expertise within the operation of this act." After reviewing this nominee's application and resume, we cannot conclude that this nominee has sufficient expertise within the operation of the act so as to represent the Natural Gas or Petroleum Pipeline industry. Statistics from the Commission's Damage Prevention Investigator group show that a majority of the cases that come before the DPC involve the natural gas industry (62% in 2022 and 73% in 2023). Therefore, we conclude that this position should be filled by an industry representative with broad ranging and significant experience in the field. The recommended applicant has only two years working for a natural gas distribution company, and as such, we conclude that this applicant does not meet the qualifications for this position on the DPC.

Accordingly, we will republish the vacancy in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and on the Commission's website, allowing for an additional thirty (30) days to submit recommendations to the Commission to fill the Natural Gas or Petroleum Pipeline industry vacancy on the DPC. *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. William Kukurin, of Kukurin Contracting, Inc., representing the Excavator industry under Section 182.8(a)(1)(v), 73 P.S. § 182.8(a)(1)(v), is hereby appointed as a member to the Damage Prevention Committee to begin serving a three-year term on January 1, 2024.
- 2. Thomas C. Ceraso, of the Municipal Authority of Westmoreland County, representing the Municipal Authority industry under Section 182.8(a)(1)(vii), is hereby appointed as a member to the Damage Prevention Committee to begin serving a three-year term on January 1, 2024.
- 3. Douglas L. Haupt, of PPL Electric Utilities, representing the Electric industry under Section 182.8(a)(1)(iv), 73 P.S. § 182.8(a)(1)(iv), is hereby appointed as a member to the Damage Prevention Committee to begin serving a three-year term on January 1, 2024.
- 4. The remaining DPC vacancy representing the natural gas or petroleum pipeline industry shall be republished in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and on the Commission website, allowing for thirty (30) days for submission of qualified applicants.
