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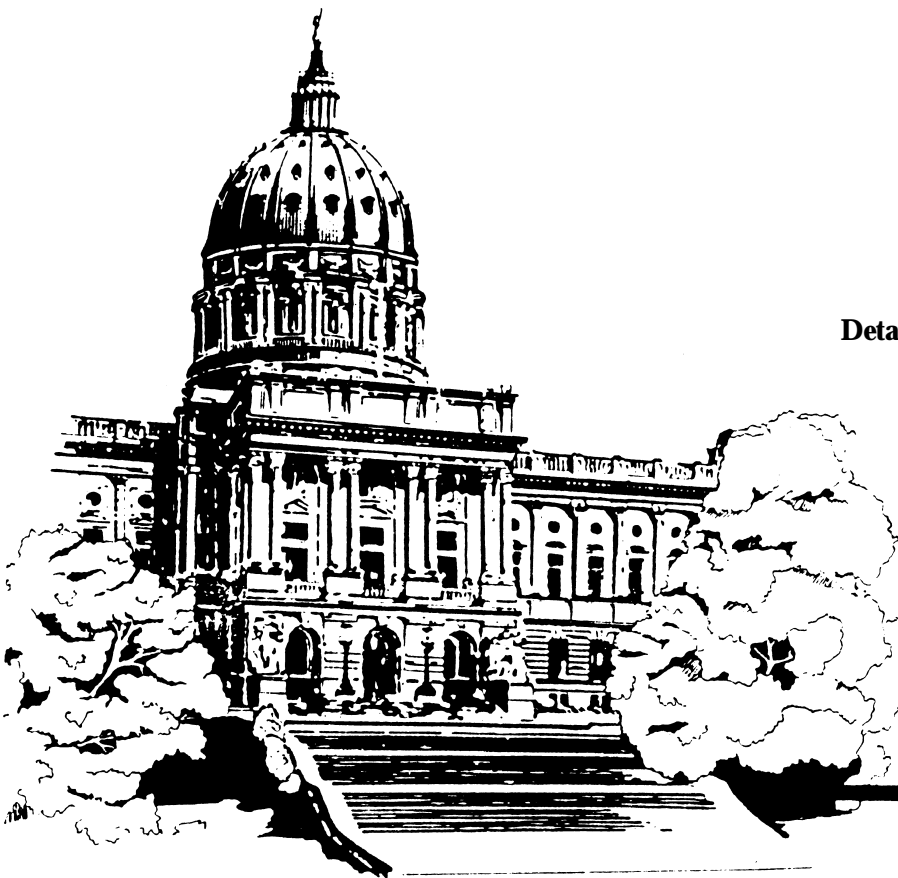

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

GUILTY PLEA COLLOQUY

You are present before this Court because you or your lawyer have stated that you wish to plead guilty to some or all of the criminal offenses with which you have been charged. Please answer fully all the questions on this

document. If you do not understand any explanations given to you on this document, say so by putting the word "no" in the blank provided after the questions. If you do understand the questions, you should write in the word "yes." None of the lines should be left blank.

After you have finished reading this and filling it out, you should sign it on the last page, on the line that says "Defendant." You should also initial each page at the bottom, but only if you have read and have understood that page. If there is anything that you do not understand, you should say so in writing on this form. You should also tell your lawyer and the Judge who hears your case, so that they can explain it to you fully, to make sure you understand all your rights.

Most of these questions are designed to be answered "yes" or "no." Where general information is asked for, however, please answer fully.

2. Are you known by any other name or alias? _____
3. If the answer to Number 2 is "yes" state the other name or aliases. _____
4. What is your date of birth? _____
5. What was the last grade completed in school? _____
6. Can you read, write and understand the English language? _____
7. As you appear before the Court today to enter a guilty plea, are you under the influence of alcohol or any kind of drugs? _____
8. Have you ever been a patient in a mental institution or have you ever been treated for a mental illness? _____
9. If the answer to Number 7 is "yes," please explain the details. _____
10. Are you currently being treated for a mental illness? _____
11. If the answer to Number 9 is "yes," explain the details. _____
12. If you are presently being treated for a mental illness, do you feel that you have sufficient mental capacity to understand what you are doing today, and to understand these questions and answer them correctly? _____
13. Do you understand that you are here today to enter a guilty plea to some or all of the charges against you? _____
14. Do you understand the nature of the offenses to which you are pleading guilty? _____
15. Has your lawyer explained to you the elements of the criminal offenses to which you are pleading? _____
16. Do you admit to committing the offenses to which you are pleading guilty and to the legal elements explained to you making up those offenses? _____
17. Do you understand that you have a right to a trial by jury? _____
18. Do you understand that the right to trial by jury means that you can participate in the selection of a jury with your attorney; that the jury is randomly selected from the voter registration list of Carbon County and a cross-section of the citizens of Carbon County, and that the jury has to agree unanimously on your guilt before you can be convicted of the offenses with which you are charged? _____

19. Do you understand that you are presumed innocent until found guilty? In other words, do you understand that the Commonwealth must prove your guilt beyond a reasonable doubt before you can be convicted of the offenses charged? _____

20. Do you understand that the Commonwealth has the burden of proving you guilty beyond a reasonable doubt, which means you can remain silent and nothing can be held against you for refusing to testify in your own defense? _____

21. Do you understand that you have a right to confront and cross-examine all Commonwealth witnesses in your case who are necessary to prove your guilt? _____

22. Do you understand that by pleading guilty you are waiving that right of confrontation and cross-examination? _____

23. Do you realize that by pleading guilty you are giving up your right to present any pre-trial motions for consideration to this or a higher Court in the event those motions are denied? _____

24. Do you realize that if you were convicted after a trial you could appeal the verdict to a higher Court and raise any errors that were committed in the trial Court, and that this could result in your being awarded a new trial or discharged, and that by pleading guilty you are giving up this right? _____

25. Do you realize that if you were convicted after a trial you could appeal the verdict to a higher Court and you could also challenge whether the Commonwealth had presented enough evidence to prove you guilty beyond a reasonable doubt? _____

26. Are you aware that the Court is not bound by the terms of any plea agreement entered into between you, your counsel and the Attorney for the Commonwealth, until the Court accepts such plea agreement? _____

27. Do you understand that the Court is not a party to any agreement or recommendation made by the parties and that any recommendation and/or stipulation regarding sentence is not binding on the Court and you knowingly waive the right to withdraw this plea if the Court does not concur in the recommended sentence? _____

28. Are you aware of the permissible range of sentence and/or fines that can be imposed for the offenses to which you are pleading guilty? _____

29. Are you aware of the maximum sentence and/or fine which the Court could impose upon you for each of the offenses to which you are pleading guilty? _____

30. Do you understand that any sentence imposed upon you for any of the offenses to which you are pleading guilty can be imposed consecutively to either (a) any sentence imposed upon you for any other offense for which you are pleading guilty in this case; or (b) any sentence imposed upon you in any other case? _____

31. Do you understand that "consecutive" sentences means that one sentence will follow after another and that "consecutive" sentences do not run at the same time? _____

32. Do you understand that the aggregate maximum sentence you could receive if you are pleading guilty to multiple offenses is the total of all maximum sentences for all the offenses added together? _____

33. Do you understand that you have a right to have witnesses present at your guilty plea hearing to testify for

you? Are you willing to give up that right and have the Attorney for the Commonwealth summarize the facts against you? _____

34. After you enter your guilty plea and it is accepted by the Court, you still have a right to appeal your conviction. The appeal from a guilty plea is limited, however, to four grounds. They are:

(a) that your guilty plea was not knowing, intelligent and voluntary;

(b) that the Court did not have jurisdiction to accept your plea (in other words, the offenses for which you are pleading guilty did not occur in Carbon County);

(c) that the Court's sentence is beyond the maximum penalty authorized by law; and

(d) that your attorney was incompetent in representing you and advising you to enter a plea of guilty

Do you understand these four areas of appeal and what they mean? _____

In order to appeal your conviction by a plea of guilty, you must within ten (10) days file a written motion to withdraw your guilty plea and state any of the four above grounds as the basis for your petition to withdraw your guilty plea. This must be done within ten (10) days from the date you are sentenced. If you cannot afford a lawyer to represent you or you are contending that your attorney, who represented you at your guilty plea, was incompetent, you have the right to have other counsel appointed for you to raise those four claims. If your petition to withdraw your guilty plea is denied, you then have thirty (30) days to file an appeal from that denial with the Superior Court of Pennsylvania.

If you do not file your petition within ten (10) days of your sentence or do not file a Notice of Appeal to the Superior Court within thirty (30) days after your petition to withdraw your guilty plea is denied, you give up your right to ever complain again of any of those four areas, including incompetent counsel.

Do you understand the meaning of the various appeal rights that have just been explained to you? _____

35. Has anybody forced you to enter this plea of guilty? _____

36. Are you doing this of your own free will? _____

37. Have any threats been made to you to enter a plea of guilty? _____

42. If you are on probation or parole, do you realize that your plea of guilt will mean a violation of that probation or parole and you can be sentenced to prison as

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 61—REVENUE

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

[61 PA. CODE CHS. 71 AND 85]

Master Settlement Agreement

The Department of Revenue (Department), under the authority contained in section 3 of the Tobacco Settlement Agreement Act (35 P. S. § 5673), in the definition of the term “units sold”; and in section 6 of The Fiscal Code (72 P. S. § 6), by this order amends Chapter 71 (relating to general provisions) and deletes § 85.2 (relating to master settlement agreement) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Purpose of this Final-Form Rulemaking

This final-form rulemaking provides guidance to cigarette stamping agents with regard to the Tobacco Settlement Agreement Act (35 P. S. §§ 5671—5675) (act).

Explanation of Regulatory Requirements

Section 71.31 (relating to definitions) defines several terms for use in the section and in § 71.32 (relating to additional cigarette stamping agent responsibilities). Section 71.32 sets forth cigarette stamping agent report requirements as necessitated by the act.

With the adoption of §§ 71.31 and 71.32, the Department is deleting the pronouncement set forth in § 85.2.

Affected Parties

Cigarette stamping agents will be affected by this final-form rulemaking.

Comment and Response Summary

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 31 Pa.B. 2582 (May 19, 2001). The proposal is being adopted with changes as set forth in Annex A.

No comments were received from the public during the public comment period. No comments were received from the House and Senate Finance Committees. The Department did receive comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC).

Amendments to the proposed rulemaking in response to comments are as follows:

(1) In its comments, IRRC noted that the term “person” is used in the regulations but not defined in § 71.31. For clarity, IRRC’s comment suggests that the term be added with a reference to the act. The Department agrees that the term should be added and has done so in the final-form rulemaking; however, the Department has chosen to set forth the applicable statutory definition instead of simply referencing the act. The rationale for this approach will be discussed under a separate paragraph relating to comments for which no revision was made.

(2) IRRC raises two concerns concerning § 71.32. First, a cross reference in § 71.9 (relating to cigarette stamping agent report requirements) to § 71.32(a) should be made to alert stamping agents of the additional reporting requirement. The Department agrees with the comment and has amended § 71.9(a) accordingly.

IRRC’s second concern relates to the wording in § 71.32(a)(2) requiring a listing of “suppliers, other than nonparticipating tobacco product manufacturers. . . .” Read in conjunction with the proposed definition of

“nonparticipating tobacco product manufacturers,” the stamping agent could interpret § 71.32(a)(2) to require them to report on both participating and nonparticipating tobacco product manufacturers. IRRC suggests the provision be clarified to clearly state who must be included in a report. In response to this concern, the Department reviewed § 71.32(a)(2) and deleted wording that may have caused confusion.

(3) IRRC raised a number of concerns about proposed § 71.33, including the Department’s statutory authority to promulgate a section which outlines functions of the Attorney General and the reiteration of existing statutory language. The inclusion of the section in the proposed rulemaking allowed the Department to provide a comprehensive regulatory package regarding the various elements of the act including the responsibilities of the tobacco product manufacturers. After reviewing the concerns raised by IRRC, the Department deleted the section from this final form rulemaking

In conjunction with the deletion of proposed § 71.33, the Department also deleted the definitions of “qualified escrow fund” and “units sold” from § 71.31 in this final-form rulemaking because the definitions were for use in § 71.33.

An amendment initiated during the Department’s internal review of the rulemaking is as follows:

In § 71.32(c), the proposed rulemaking stated that the books, records, other papers and documents that are required to be kept shall be made available in the English language. This provision would enable an inspector to conduct an on-the-spot inspection without enlisting the aid of an interpreter. However, the provision could be interpreted to require even the agent’s internal records to be kept in English. For the foreign-born license holders, this provision could pose a problem. The Department has therefore deleted the English language requirement from the subsection.

A comment that did not result in an amendment to the regulation is as follows:

As referenced in this preamble, IRRC’s comment with regard to the definitions in § 71.31 noted that because the definitions repeat or modify the statutory definitions set forth in the act, the text of each definition should be deleted and replaced with a reference to the definition in the act. Although the Department recognizes IRRC’s concern regarding the reiteration of statutory definitions in a regulation, the reiteration in this case is appropriate to provide adequate information to the users of the regulation. In addition, the act is codified in Title 35 of *Purdons Statutes*, Health and Safety, not Title 72 of *Purdons Statutes*, Taxation and Fiscal Affairs, which is the title referenced for other matters regarding cigarette stamping agents.

Fiscal Impact

The Department has determined that this final-form rulemaking will have no significant fiscal impact on the Commonwealth. Costs to the Department to implement the requirements of the act will include one or two clerical positions, as well as related equipment and supplies totaling \$70,252 for fiscal year 2001-2002 and adjusted thereafter for normal salary increases or changes, or both, in the cost of benefits.

Paperwork

This final-form rulemaking will not require significant additional paperwork for the public or the Commonwealth. Additional paperwork and recordkeeping requirements are the result of the provisions of the act.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

This final-form rulemaking will become effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The regulations are scheduled for review within 5 years of final-form publication. No sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on May 4, 2001, the Department submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 31 Pa.B. 2582, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Finance and the Senate Committee on Finance for review and comment. In compliance with section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Department also provided IRRC and the Committees with copies of all comments received, as well as other documentation.

In preparing these final-form regulations, the Department has considered the comments received from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

These final-form regulations were deemed approved by the Committees on February 24, 2003. The final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by IRRC under sections 5.1(e) and 6(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. §§ 745.5a(e) and 745.6(a)) effective March 6, 2003.

Findings

The Department finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to amend the regulations has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The amendments are necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The Department, acting under the authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 61 Pa. Code Chapters 71 and 85, are amended by amending § 71.9; by adding §§ 71.31 and 71.32; and by deleting a statement of policy in § 85.2 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Secretary of the Department shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

CHAPTER 71. GENERAL PROVISIONS

GENERAL

§ 71.9. Cigarette stamping agent report requirements.

(a) *Report due date.* Every licensed cigarette stamping agent shall establish a fiscal or calendar monthly reporting period. The cigarette stamping agent shall file with the Department on or before the 20th day following the end of each fiscal or calendar month a cigarette tax report covering the preceding month on a form prescribed by the Department (see also § 71.32(a) (relating to additional cigarette stamping agent responsibilities) regarding additional reporting requirements).

(b) *Penalties.* A cigarette stamping agent who violates this section shall be subject to a \$100 fine for the first offense, a \$200 fine for the second offense and a \$300 fine for the third and any further offense.

MASTER SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

§ 71.31. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this section and § 71.32 (relating to additional cigarette stamping agent responsibilities), have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Affiliate—A person who, directly or indirectly, owns or controls, is owned or controlled by, or is under common ownership or control with, another person. For purposes of this definition, the terms "owns," "is owned" and "ownership" mean ownership of an equity interest, or the equivalent thereof, of 10% or more.

Cigarette—A product that contains nicotine, is intended to be burned or heated under ordinary conditions of use, and consists of or contains any of the following:

(i) A roll of tobacco wrapped in paper or in any substance not containing tobacco.

(ii) Tobacco, in any form, that is functional in the product, which, because of its appearance, the type of tobacco used in the filler, or its packaging and labeling, is likely to be offered to, or purchased by, consumers as a cigarette.

(iii) A roll of tobacco wrapped in any substance containing tobacco which, because of its appearance, the type of tobacco used in the filler, or its packaging and labeling, is

likely to be offered to, or purchased by, consumers as a cigarette described in subparagraph (i).

(iv) A roll-your-own, which means any tobacco which, because of its appearance, type, packaging or labeling is suitable for use and likely to be offered to, or purchased by, consumers as tobacco for making cigarettes. For purposes of this subparagraph, 0.09 ounce of roll-your-own tobacco shall constitute one individual cigarette.

Nonparticipating tobacco product manufacturer—A tobacco product manufacturer who does not participate in the Master Settlement Agreement (published at 30 Pa.B. 5619 (October 28, 2000)) entered into on November 23, 1998, by the Commonwealth and leading United States tobacco product manufacturers in the action entitled *Commonwealth v. Philip Morris Inc., et al.*, Philadelphia County, April term, No. 97-2443, January 13, 1999, 40 Pa.D. & C. 4th 225 (1999).

Person—Any individual, unincorporated association, company, corporation, limited liability corporation, joint stock company, group committee, agency, syndicate, trust or trustee, receiver, fiduciary, partnership or conservator. Whenever used in this section or § 71.32 to establish or impose penalties, the word “person” when applied to a partnership, unincorporated association or other joint venture means the partners or members thereof and when applied to a corporation means all officers and directors thereof.

Tobacco product manufacturer—

(i) A person that after June 22, 2000, directly and not exclusively through any affiliate does one of the following:

(A) Manufactures cigarettes anywhere that the manufacturer intends to be sold in the United States, including cigarettes intended to be sold in the United States through an importer (except where the importer is an original participating manufacturer, as that term is defined in the Master Settlement Agreement, that will be responsible for the payments under the Master Settlement Agreement with respect to the cigarettes as a result of the provisions of subsection II(mm) of the Master Settlement Agreement and that pays the taxes specified in subsection II(z) of the Master Settlement Agreement, and provided that the manufacturer of the cigarettes does not market or advertise the cigarettes in the United States).

(B) Is the first purchaser anywhere for resale in the United States of cigarettes manufactured anywhere that the manufacturer does not intend to be sold in the United States.

(C) Becomes a successor of a person described in clause (A) or (B).

(ii) The term does not include an affiliate of a tobacco product manufacturer unless the affiliate itself falls under subparagraph (i)(A), (B) or (C).

§ 71.32. Additional cigarette stamping agent responsibilities.

(a) The Tobacco Settlement Agreement Act (35 P.S. §§ 5671—5675), requires that the Department collect and maintain data relating to the number of Pennsylvania State Cigarette Excise Tax stamps affixed to packages of cigarettes. As part of the monthly cigarette tax report required by § 71.9(a) (relating to cigarette stamping agent report requirements), every licensed cigarette stamping agent shall complete and attach to the report a schedule, in the form as is prescribed by the Department, to account for and reconcile the number of Pennsylvania

Cigarette Excise Tax stamps affixed to packages of cigarettes by the agent during the monthly period covered by the associated cigarette tax report. The schedule shall contain the following information:

(1) A listing of the name and address of each nonparticipating tobacco product manufacturer from which the cigarette stamping agent made direct purchases of packages of cigarettes that were actually manufactured by the manufacturer, and the number of Pennsylvania Cigarette Excise Tax stamps affixed to the packages of cigarettes purchased from each manufacturer.

(2) A listing of the name and address of all suppliers from which the cigarette stamping agent made purchases of cigarettes, including cigarettes purchased from one tobacco product manufacturer that were actually manufactured by another manufacturer. This listing shall include all purchases of cigarettes made by the cigarette stamping agent during the month, other than directly from the actual manufacturer of the cigarettes.

(3) For each individual supplier listed under paragraphs (1) and (2), a listing of all brands of cigarettes purchased from the supplier and the number of Pennsylvania Cigarette Excise Tax stamps affixed to cigarette packages by the cigarette stamping agent with respect to each brand.

(4) For each brand of cigarettes listed for each supplier under paragraph (3), the following additional information, if known:

(i) The name and address of the tobacco product manufacturer of the cigarettes.

(ii) The name and address of the person or entity first responsible for the cigarettes being designated or identified for sale in the United States.

(b) Every cigarette stamping agent shall keep complete and accurate records of cigarettes sold and shall preserve and keep for 4 years all invoices, bills of lading, sales records, copies of bills of sale, inventory at the close of each period for which a report is required and other pertinent papers and documents relating to the manufacture, purchase, sale or disposition of cigarettes.

(c) The books, records, other papers and documents that are required to be kept shall, at all times during the usual business hours of the day, be subject to inspection by the authorized agents and employees of the Office of Attorney General or the Department of Revenue.

(d) A monthly report that is not accompanied by the schedule prescribed by this section shall be considered incomplete. Extensions of time for filing purposes may be granted at the discretion of the Department.

(e) The failure of a licensed cigarette stamping agent to comply with this section by not furnishing the schedule required by subsection (a), or by not furnishing complete and accurate information as required by the schedule, shall be deemed a violation of section 1276(a) of the TRC (72 P.S. § 8276(a)) and the agent's license shall be subject to suspension or revocation under section 1276(b) of the TRC.

**CHAPTER 85. CIGARETTE TAX

§ 85.2. (Reserved).

The Secretary of Revenue (Secretary), under the authority contained in section 303 of the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. § 3761-303), by this notice of final-omitted rulemaking amends §§ 815.45 and 815.235 (relating to time, place and manner of conducting drawings).

Because of time constraints associated with the establishment, operation and administration of lottery games, the Department of Revenue (Department), under section 204 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (CDL) (45 P.S. § 1204) and the regulation thereunder, 1 Pa. Code § 7.4 (relating to omission of proposed rulemaking), finds that notice of proposed rulemaking is under the circumstances impracticable and, therefore, may be omitted.

The Department's justification for utilizing the final-omitted rulemaking process is based upon the time constraints associated with the establishment, operation and administration of lottery games. The efficient and successful operation of the Lottery requires that the Lottery implement the latest innovations and trends in the lottery industry. The inability to adapt marketing strategies quickly may lead to a reduction in Lottery revenues. The necessity of the Lottery to react quickly to market forces has been recognized in the past as an appropriate justification for utilizing the proposed rulemaking omitted process as evidenced by the approval of these types of regulations in the past.

Purpose of the Final-Omitted Rulemaking

The amendments to §§ 815.45 and 815.235 will allow the Department to employ emerging technologies to enhance a drawing methodology that has not changed since the introduction of the Daily Number game in 1977 and the Big Four game in 1980. At that time, bingo hall ping-pong ball drawing machines were considered the most familiar to players and could produce a reliable result. Since that time, technology and the players have changed dramatically. Lottery players are now routinely utilizing electronics to obtain money, pay for gas, purchase merchandise and pay bills. The Department is interested in exploring new drawing styles that can take advantage of this change in the marketplace.

An example of an "other selection methodology" the Department could use is a random number generator. A random number generator is a secure manner to generate numeric results using a certified computer program loaded on a piece of computer equipment. Currently Delaware and Indiana are utilizing the random generator without negative impact. In addition, the Department successfully employed this technology with the online game Hearts and Diamonds which ran from 1994 to 1996.

Explanation of Regulatory Requirements

Sections 815.45(c) and 815.235(c) are amended by adding language to allow the Department to select the Daily Number and Big Four Number with the aid of mechanical devices or any other selection methodology as authorized by the Secretary.

Fiscal Impact

The Department has determined that the final-omitted rulemaking will have a one-time cost of approximately \$100,000 to the Commonwealth.

Paperwork

The final-omitted rulemaking will not generate additional paperwork for the public or the Commonwealth.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

The final-omitted rulemaking will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The sections are scheduled for review within 5 years of final publication. No sunset date has been assigned.

Under section 204 of the CDL, the Department also finds that the proposed rulemaking procedures in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) are impracticable because of the time constraints associated with the establishment, operation and administration of lottery games.

The Department, acting under the authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 61 Pa. Code Chapter 815, are amended by amending §§ 815.45 and 815.235 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Secretary shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Secretary shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

CHAPTER 815. PLANS, GAMES AND DRAWINGS

Subchapter C. DAILY NUMBER GAME

§ 815.45. Time, place and manner of conducting drawings.

(a) *Time of drawings.* Daily Number game drawings will be held on a daily basis or as determined and publicly announced by the Secretary.

(b) *Place of drawings.* Each drawing shall be conducted in the central office of the Lottery, unless it directs that a drawing or a part thereof be conducted at some other location.

(c) *Manner of conducting drawings.* The objective of The Daily Number Game drawing is to select, at random, one three-digit number with the aid of mechanical devices or any other selection methodology as authorized by the Secretary. This one three-digit number will be used in determining Daily Number Game winners.

(d) *Special drawings.* The Secretary may designate and announce through available media special drawings to be held in addition to those previously scheduled. In that event, a ticket purchased for that day's drawing shall be valid for the special drawing held on the same date. A ticket purchased for that day's drawing shall also be

eligible for the prizes as provided in this subchapter. Money for the prizes to be paid to winners of special drawings, under § 815.46 (relating to determination of prize winners), will be paid from funds authorized for the payment of prizes.

Subchapter K. THE BIG FOUR GAME DRAWING

§ 815.235. Time, place and manner of conducting drawings.

(a) *Time of drawing.* Big Four game drawings will be held on a daily basis or as determined and publicly announced by the Secretary.

(b) *Place of drawings.* A drawing will be conducted in the central office of the Lottery unless it directs that a drawing or a part thereof be conducted at some other location.

(c) *Manner of conducting drawings.* The objective of the Big Four game drawing is to select, at random, one four-digit number with the aid of mechanical devices or any other selection methodology as authorized by the Secretary. This one four-digit number will be used in determining Big Four game winners.

(d) *Special drawings.* The Secretary may designate and announce through available media special drawings to be held in addition to those previously scheduled. In this event, a ticket purchased for that day's drawing is valid for the special drawing held on the same date. A ticket purchased for that day's drawing is also eligible for the prizes as provided in this subchapter. Money for the prizes to be paid to winners of special drawings, under § 815.236 (relating to determination of prize winners), will be paid from funds authorized for the payment of prizes.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

[22 PA. CODE CH. 4]

Academic Standards and Assessment for Career Education and Work

The State Board of Education (Board) proposes to amend Chapter 4 (relating to academic standards and assessment) to add academic standards for Career Education and Work to read as set forth in Annex A. The statutory authority for this proposed rulemaking is the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P.S. §§ 1-101—27-2702).

Purpose

This proposed rulemaking adds academic standards for Career Education and Work. The purpose of adding these requirements is to specify academic standards to be achieved by students enrolled at various grade levels in the public schools (including public charter schools) of this Commonwealth.

Requirements of this Proposed Rulemaking

This proposed rulemaking defines the academic standards for Career Education and Work to be achieved by students enrolled at various grade levels in the public schools (including public charter schools) of this Commonwealth. Academic standards for Career Education and Work are organized into four areas: (1) career awareness and planning; (2) career acquisition (getting a job); (3) career retention (keeping a job) and (4) entrepreneurship. Specific standards describe what students should know and be able to do by the end of third, fifth, eighth and eleventh grade.

Affected Parties

This proposed rulemaking will affect the students and professional employees of the public schools of this Commonwealth (including intermediate units, area vocational-technical schools, public charter and alternative schools).

Cost and Paperwork Estimates

Costs to implement this proposed rulemaking may include curriculum development and the professional development of teachers. These costs may vary by school district. Curriculum development is an ongoing activity for schools and is typically part of their normal budgeting. Costs associated with aligning curricula with these standards at the local level will be minimized by the following efforts: technical assistance in curriculum development provided by the Department of Education's (Department) staff; detailed implementation materials developed by the Department, intermediate units and professional associations and provided to school districts; and the Standards Implementation Project which funds intermediate unit services throughout this Commonwealth supporting the implementation of these and other standards.

Professional development of teachers is an ongoing activity for schools and is addressed in the normal budgeting of school districts. Specific programs designed to support the implementation of these standards will minimize any financial impact on school districts. Professional development is provided through Governor's Institutes for Teachers (currently provided in career education and work) and is included within current year appropriations. In addition, the act of November 23, 1999 (P.L. 529, No. 48) (Act 48) established a requirement for educators to engage in continuing professional education. Act 48 also requires the Department to provide 40 hours of professional development annually at no cost to teachers. Online professional development courses will be developed for Career Education and Work.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Sunset Date

Under § 4.12(i) (relating to academic standards), the effectiveness of these academic standards will be reviewed by the Board every 3 years. Thus, no sunset date is necessary.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on March 31, 2003, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees on Education. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed regulations within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the regulation, by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments, recommendations or objections raised.

Proposed Academic Standards for Career Education and Work

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XXXVIII. INTRODUCTION

The Academic Standards for Career Education and Work reflect the increasing complexity and sophistication that students experience as they progress through school. Career Education and Work Standards describe what students should know and be able to do at four grade levels (3, 5, 8 and 11) in four areas:

- 13.1. Career Awareness and Planning
- 13.2. Career Acquisition (Getting a Job)
- 13.3. Career Retention (Keeping a Job)
- 13.4. Entrepreneurship

Pennsylvania's economic future depends on having a well-educated and skilled workforce. No student should leave secondary education without a solid foundation in Career Education and Work. It is the rapidly changing workplace and the demand for continuous learning and innovation on the part of the workers that drives the need to establish academic standards in Career Education and Work.

Through a comprehensive approach, Career Education and Work Standards complement all disciplines and other academic standards. If Pennsylvania's students are to succeed in the workplace, there are certain skills that they need to obtain prior to graduation from high school. These skills have been identified in the Career Education and Work Standards, but it is up to individual school districts to decide how they are to be taught. Districts can implement integration strategies within existing disciplines or can implement stand-alone courses to specifically address these standards.

A glossary is included to assist the reader in understanding terminology contained in the standards.

XXXIX. GLOSSARY

- CareerLink centers:** A first-in-the-nation "one-stop" system to link Pennsylvania workers with good jobs and to help Pennsylvania employers get the people they need. CareerLink is "one-stop" shopping for employment and training services.
- Child Labor Laws:** Legislation governing the employment of children under the age of 18.
- Competition:** The rivalry among people or business firms for resources and customers.
- Cooperative education:** A structured method of instruction whereby students alternate or coordinate their high school studies with a job in a field related to their academic or occupational objectives.
- Decision making:** Method to specify goals and constraints, generate alternatives, consider risks and evaluate and choose the best alternative.
- Demand:** The different quantities of a resource, goods or service that will be purchased at various possible prices during a specific time period.
- Employment trends:** The direction or movement of job availability or employment needs.
- Entrepreneurs:** Individuals who begin and manage the factors of a business, including risks.
- Hazardous occupations:** Occupations defined in Child Labor Laws where the employment of minors (under age 18 or 16) is prohibited unless they meet exceptions through a training program.
- Internship:** Situation where a student works for an employer for a specified period of time to learn about a particular industry or occupation.
- Intervention plan:** A strategy for an intentional entry into an ongoing system for the purpose of initiating or introducing change.
- Investing:** Using time or capital (money) to increase assets or productivity.
- Manipulate:** To control objects with body parts and implements, causing an object to move from one place to another.

Mediating:	Acting as an agent between parties in order to reconcile them.
MSDS:	Material Safety Data Sheet. These sheets contain required information regarding the health and safety of workers in the use of hazardous materials in the workplace.
Negotiating:	Arranging for or bringing about agreement through conference, discussion and compromise.
Networking:	The exchange of information or services among individuals, groups or institutions.
Nontraditional occupations:	Fields of work, including careers in computer science, technology and other emerging high skill occupations, for which individuals from one gender comprise less than 25% of the individuals employed in each such occupation or field of work.
Opportunity cost:	The highest valued alternative given up when a decision is made.
OSHA:	Occupational Safety and Health Administration. OSHA is a National agency with representatives in each state to monitor safety and health issues in the workplace.
Portfolio:	A collection of work that documents a student's education performance over time.
Profit:	The remainder after all costs of production have been deducted from the revenue derived from the sale of goods and services.
Registered apprenticeship:	A joint initiative designed to link employers in need of an educated workforce with local education agencies, postsecondary institutions, technical schools and other training facilities to provide quality work-based education.
Responsibility:	The exertion of a high level of effort and perseverance toward goal attainment; excellence at performing tasks; outstanding attendance standards and punctuality; enthusiasm, vitality and optimism in approaching and completing tasks.
Resume:	A summary of one's personal history and employment experience.
Right to know:	OSHA mandated safety training for any business or organization that has hazardous chemicals present in the workplace. Employees who are exposed to any kind of hazardous chemicals or work with or near hazardous chemicals must be trained within 30 days of their hire date and, in many states, annually thereafter.
School-based enterprise:	The production of goods or services as part of a school program.
Shadowing:	Following or observing someone to learn from that person.
Summarizing:	Relating information by concise rewording.
Supply:	The different quantities of a resource, good or service that will be offered for sale at various possible prices during a specific time period.
Tech Prep:	The name given to programs that offer at least 4 years of sequential course work at the secondary and postsecondary levels to prepare students for technical careers.
Time management:	The process of directing or controlling activities with regard to use of time.
Unemployment rate:	The percentage of workers without jobs seeking employment.
Work habits:	Conduct at or attitude toward work.
Work permit:	A document, required under Child Labor Laws, filed when persons under the age of 18 are employed. School authorities issue these permits.

Exchange of Lands

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (Department), acting through the Bureau of For-

estry (Bureau), and the SEDA-COG Joint Rail Authority (Authority) are proposing to negotiate an exchange of lands in the Jersey Shore Borough, Lycoming County.

The Bureau is proposing to acquire from the Authority two parcels containing a total of 1.57 acres of land. In return, the Bureau proposes to convey to the Authority a parcel of 0.35 acre.

These properties are situated in the vicinity of the Authority's active rail line along Railroad Street west of Bridge Street. The purpose of this proposed land exchange is to provide a public access area for the Pine Creek Rail to Trail.

As is the policy of the Department, the public is notified of this exchange. A 30-day period for public inquiry and/or comment will be in effect commencing April 14, 2003, and ending May 13, 2003. Under the Federal Clean Water Act and The Clean Streams Law, the following parties have applied for an NPDES permit or to renew their current permit to discharge controlled wastewaters into the waters of this Commonwealth or to conduct other activities required by the NPDES permit. For renewal applications listed in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements. For new permit applications, renewal application with major changes or applications for permits not waived by the EPA, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, also made a tentative determination of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications listed in Section II. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the EPA Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to this proposed permit action under the waiver provision 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on the proposed permit are invited to submit a statement, to the office noted before the application, within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within this 30-day comment period will be considered in the formulation of the final determinations regarding this application. The comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. Following the comment period, the Department's Water Management Program Manager will make a final determination regarding these applications. Notice of this final determination will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at which time this determination may be appealed to the Environmental Hearing Board.

The renewal application, including proposed effluent limitations and special conditions, is available on file. For new permit applications, information submitted with the applications is available on file. The information may be inspected and arrangements made for copying at the office indicated before the application.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the

Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

Based on this finding, the Department intends to approve the application and issue plan approval for the respective modification.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

1. No more than 490,000 tons of coal shall be processed in any 12 consecutive month period.
2. The crusher/screen shall be enclosed except for the feed and discharge openings which shall be equipped with rubber curtains.

3. A water truck equipped with a pressurized spray bar and a pressurized nozzle or hose connection shall be kept onsite at all times and shall be used, as needed, for the control of fugitive dust from plant roadways and stockpile areas.

4. Plant roadways shall have a posted speed limit of 15 miles per hour and the plant entrance road shall be tarred and chipped.

5. Trucks entering or exiting the plant site via a public roadway shall be tarped unless empty.

6. The radial stacker-to-stockpile free fall height shall be kept to a minimum at all times as shall the front-end loader bucket-to-truck free fall height.

7. The diesel generator shall not operate at a speed in excess of 2,400 rpm nor shall it operate for more than 4,900 hours in any 12 consecutive month period.

8. The NO_x and CO emissions from the diesel generator shall not exceed 10.1 and 9.3 grams per horsepower/hour, respectively. The visible air contaminant emissions shall not be equal to, or greater than, 10% for more than 3 minutes in any 1 hour or equal to or greater than 30% at any time.

9. Records shall be maintained of the number of tons of coal processed through the plant each month as well as the number of hours the diesel generator operates each month.

Code § 123.11 and the visible air contaminant emission requirements of 25 Pa. Code § 123.41. Based on this finding, the Department intends to approve the application and issue plan approval for the installation of the proposed fabric collector.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to be issued to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

1. The fabric collector bags shall be made of woven fiberglass with a Teflon finish.

2. The fabric collector shall be insulated.

3. The existing integral boiler flyash reinjection system collector and cyclone collector shall be retained and used as precleaners for the fabric collector.

4. The fabric collector shall be equipped with a spark detection system and fabric collector bypass stack which shall be automatically activated if a spark is detected in

the fabric collector inlet. Activation of the bypass stack shall also sound or signal an alarm.

5. The fabric collector shall be equipped with instrumentation to monitor the pressure differential across the collector on a continuous basis.

Code § 250.8, Administration of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) requires the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a notice of its final actions on plans and reports. A final report is submitted to document cleanup of a release of a regulated substance at a site to one of the remediation standards of the Act. A final report provides a description of the site investigation to characterize the nature and extent of contaminants in environmental media, the basis of selecting the environmental media of concern, documentation supporting the selection of residential or nonresidential exposure factors, a description of the remediation performed and summaries of sampling methodology and analytical results which demonstrate that the remediation has attained the cleanup standard selected. Plans and reports required by provisions of the Act for compliance with selection of remediation to a site-specific standard, in addition to a final report, include a remedial investigation report, risk assessment report and cleanup plan. A remedial investigation report includes conclusions from the site investigation, concentration of regulated substances in environmental media, benefits of refuse of the property and, in some circumstances, a fate and transport analysis. If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by provisions of the Act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. In some cases, the Insurance Commissioner (Commissioner) may order that the company reimburse an insured for the higher cost of replacement insurance coverage obtained while the appeal is pending. Reimbursement is available only when the insured is successful on appeal, and may not be ordered in all instances. If an insured wishes to seek reimbursement for the higher cost of replacement insurance, the insured must produce documentation at the hearing which will allow comparison of coverages and costs between the original policy and the replacement policy.

Petition of Armstrong Telecommunications, Inc. for Reconsideration and Modification of Commission Order entered January 15, 2003

Clarification Order

By the Commission:

The current matter before this Commission consists of two petitions for reconsideration, modification and clarification of the Commission's Order entered January 15, 2003, at this docket (January 15 Order), in which the Commission denied the request for relief brought by two groups of rural incumbent local exchange carriers (Rural ILECs), under section 251(f)(2) of the Telecommunications Act of 1996 (TA-96), 47 U.S.C.A. §§ 101, et seq. The Rural ILECs sought and were denied an additional 36-month suspension of interconnection obligations under section 251(b)(1) and (c) of TA-96, beyond the 5-year total suspension they had initially been granted by the Commission.

We grant reconsideration of our January 15 Order for the limited purpose of clarifying certain issues raised by the Rural ILECs with respect to the burden of proof and the "undue economic burden" test in a proceeding under section 251 of TA-96 challenging the continued rural exemption. We deny reconsideration sought by Armstrong Telecommunications, Inc. (Armstrong) and reaffirm our holding that Citizen's Communication, Inc., is entitled to the continuation of its rural exemption, unless challenged by a bona fide request for interconnection.

Rural ILECs Petition for Clarification

(1) Burden of proof in section 251 proceeding challenging the rural exemption.

The Rural ILECs maintain, and we agree, that nothing in our order should disturb the traditional burden of proof in a proceeding challenging the rural exemption. In a section 251(f)(1)(B) challenge to the rural exemption the ultimate burden of proof rests with the competitor seeking to defeat the exemption. Nothing in our January 15 Order was intended to disturb this. The statements in our January 15 Order of concern to the rural carriers merely recognized that the Rural ILECs will have the opportunity, if necessary, to present evidence to refute any challenge to their continued rural exemption.

(2) Proof sufficient to establish "undue economic burden."

The Rural ILECs maintain, and again we agree, that our January 15 Order should not and does not disturb the evidence properly considered to establish an "undue economic burden" upon a rural carrier by competitive entry. The test in section 251(f)(1)(B) is total economic burden

on ILEC, and is not meant to exclude consideration of the economic burden “typically associated with competitive entry.”

The language in our January 15 Order, to which the Rural ILECs refer, pointed out that we were unpersuaded by the speculative nature of the petitioners’ allegations of economic harm, and was intended only to point out that adverse impact on Rural ILEC so speculative and unsupported is not sufficient to warrant further suspension under section 251(f)(2). We stated that “the Rural ILECs asserted basis for the suspension is speculative and offers no quantifiable proof or firm evidence, other than supposition, that harm would result if the suspensions are lifted.” January 15 Order at p.11. By this order we clarify that “undue economic harm” is to be determined based on consideration of the entire economic burden born by the Rural ILEC.

(3) Use of the phrase “competitive advantage.”

The Rural ILECs also urge that the use of the phrase “competitive advantage” in our January 15 Order so misconstrues the intent of the steps taken by this Commission, to reduce competitive IXC rates and make up revenue losses from monopoly local service rates and USF fund, as to warrant clarification. We disagree. The steps taken clearly do amount to a competitive advantage to ILECs in the interexchange (or toll) services markets. That the competitive advantage was given for the purpose of “leveling the playing field,” does not negate the effect of “competitive advantage” to which our January 15 Order referred. In any event, the reference to “competitive advantage enjoyed by the rural ILECs” was not operative to our decision in the matter. To the contrary, our decision turned on the insufficiency of the evidence offered to support the request for an additional 36-month extension of the suspension from interconnection obligations.

Armstrong Petition for Reconsideration

We next consider the request for reconsideration filed by Armstrong. Once again Armstrong raises a question regarding the continued exemption of Citizens Telephone Company of Kecksburg (Citizens), given this Commission’s decision in *Applications of Armstrong Communications, Inc.; Petitions of Citizens Telephone Company of Kecksburg for Suspension and Streamlined form of Regulation*, Doc. Nos. A-310583F0002, A-310583F0004, P-00971229, Order entered April 28, 1999 (Armstrong/Citizens). As we noted in our January 15 Order at p. 2 fn. 1, this Commission has already considered the issue now raised by Armstrong in its petition for reconsideration when the Commission considered and rejected Armstrong’s comments offered in opposition to the Citizen petition. See, Comments of Armstrong, p. 3.

As we noted, Armstrong commented that Citizens’ request for joinder should be denied because Citizen’s standing rural exemption was terminated by our order in *Armstrong/Citizens*. However, we concluded that TA-96 intends that the exemption stand unless a bona fide request for interconnection is received and a contemporaneous offer of proof supports the termination of the exemption. We also noted that TA-96 grants this Commission authority to modify or suspend the interconnection obligations of a rural ILEC at any time. In exercise of this authority, we concluded that Citizens, like the other

petitioners, shall continue to be entitled to the exemption, unless and until challenged by bona fide request for interconnection. If a bona fide request for interconnection is made to Citizens, we found that our decision in *Armstrong/Citizens* will be relevant to termination of the exemption. However, Citizens will be afforded the opportunity to show a change in circumstances.

Thus, as Armstrong’s request for reconsideration again raises the same arguments offered in opposition to the underlying petition, which we considered and rejected and no new arguments have been raised, Armstrong fails to meet the standard established in *Duick v. Pennsylvania Gas and Water Company*, 56 Pa. P.U.C. 533 (December 17, 1982) for granting reconsideration.¹

Accordingly, we conclude that the request of the Rural ILECs for reconsideration/clarification should be granted in part and denied in part and the Armstrong petition for reconsideration should be denied²; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

1. The request of joint Petitioners: Armstrong Telephone Company—North; Armstrong Telephone Company—Pennsylvania; Bentleyville Communications Corp. d/b/a/ The Bentleyville Telephone Company; Buffalo Valley Telephone Company; Conestoga Telephone & Telegraph Company; Denver and Ephrata Telephone & Telegraph Company d/b/a D&E Telephone Company; Hickory Telephone Company; Ironton Telephone Company; Lackawaxen Telephone Company; Laurel Highlands Telephone Company; Marianna & Scenery Hill Telephone Company; The North-Eastern Pennsylvania Telephone Company; North Penn Telephone Company; North Pittsburgh Telephone Company; Palmerton Telephone Company; Pennsylvania Telephone Company; Pymatuning Independent Telephone Company; South Canaan Telephone Company; Venus Telephone Company; Yukon-Waltz Telephone Company; Citizens Telephone Company of Kecksburg; Frontier Communications of Breezewood, Inc.; Frontier Communications of Canton, Inc.; Frontier Communications of Pennsylvania, Inc.; Frontier Communications of Lakewood, Inc.; Frontier Communications of Oswayo River, Inc.; TDS TELECOM/Mahanoy and Mahantango Telephone Company; and TDS TELECOM/Sugar Valley for reconsideration/clarification of the Order entered January 15, 2003, at Docket No. P-00971177 is granted for the limited purpose of clarification consistent with the discussion in this order.

2. The petition for reconsideration of Armstrong Telecommunications, Inc. is denied.

¹ Further, the PUC is authorized per section 703(g) of the Public Utility Code, to amend or reverse its own prior order after notice and opportunity to be heard is afforded the parties. In this case, Armstrong received notice of Citizens’ petition seeking an extension of the suspension. Armstrong availed itself of the opportunity to be heard in opposition to that petition and did in fact make the same arguments now raised as the basis for reconsideration. Thus, the requirements of 703(g) are satisfied and the Commission was authorized to alter its prior determination.

² Although the parties have petitioned for review before Commonwealth Court, the PUC retains authority to clarify the January 15 Order as long as no substantive changes are made. *Pa. Industrial Coalition v. Pa. PUC*, 653 A.2d 1336 (Pa. Cmwlth. 1995)

Dissent of Commissioner Aaron Wilson, Jr.

Today's majority seeks to bolster their decision of January 15, 2003 regarding the Petitioners' request for relief under 251(f)(2).

The Commission is issuing today's order as a "clarification" because we missed the statutory period for granting reconsideration pending further review of the merits. Reconsideration, as opposed to clarification, would have allowed the Commission to reconsider, reexamine, or modify our January 15, 2003 order.

I dissented from our January 15, 2003 Order, inter alia, because of statements about the Petitioners' failure to meet their burden of proof under Section 251(f) of the Telecommunications Act of 1996. That issue could have been addressed in a reconsideration order. However, our failure to timely preserve our authority to act precludes us from reconsidering the matter further.

Consequently, today's decision is styled as a "clarification" of our January 15, 2003 order even though, in fact, it substantively modifies or bolsters the January 15, 2003 decision. The Commission's January 15, 2003 order stated that "we find that the Petitioners have failed to sustain the burden of proof warranting continued suspension of interconnection obligations." Today's determination states that "nothing should disturb the traditional burden of proof in a proceeding challenging the rural exemption." This change alters our January 15, 2003 conclusion about the Petitioners' putative failure to meet their burden of proof under Section 251(f) in the face of court determinations, cited in my dissent, for the proposition that Petitioners do not have such a burden of proof. The Commission cannot clarify this statement by claiming that nothing disturbs the burden of proof when, in fact, the January 15, 2003 order made pronouncements about the burden of proof.

Second, today's discussion on "undue economic burden" attempts to rectify the earlier dismissal of the Petitioners' claim that costs, such as those associated with entry, may not be quantifiable but that they do constitute a cost that warrants consideration under Section 251(f). The January 15, 2003 order dismissed such cost claims as "speculative" in nature. Today's clarification statement about the intent of the January 15, 2003 order effectively bolsters the Commission's position in the event of an appeal. The purpose of a clarification is not to bolster a prior decision but, in fact, to explain that decision. Bolstering a decision is more properly the province of a reconsideration order and not a clarification order.

Finally, the discussion of "competitive advantage" contains a major substantive analysis of the Commission's universal service fund and interexchange carrier rates that is not appropriate in a clarification. Today's clarification, for the first time, makes the novel conclusion that there is a "competitive advantage" possessed by the incumbent local exchange carriers (ILECs) in the interexchange (toll) services markets. This is more than a clarification. It constitutes a substantive change in our view on the currently competitive toll markets in Pennsylvania.

I disagree.

Order

By the Commission:

On May 23, 2002, Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff filed a Formal Complaint against Corecomm Pennsylvania, Inc. (Corecomm), an IXC reseller certificated at A-310801. In the Complaint, Prosecutory Staff alleged that the Commission sent by certified mail prior written notices to Corecomm that its 2000 Annual Report was due. The complaint charged that Corecomm violated 66 Pa.C.S. § 504 (relating to reports by public utilities) by failing to file its 2000 Annual Report. The Complaint requested that the Commission issue an order canceling Corecomm's certificate of public convenience for failure to file its 2000 Annual Report.

According to the United States Postal Service return receipt, the Complaint was unclaimed because the forwarding order expired. As a result of Corecomm's failure to respond to the Complaint, the Commission entered a Default Order on October 29, 2002, that sustained the Complaint and cancelled Corecomm's certificate of public convenience. The notice of the Default Order was published at 32 Pa.B. 5597 (November 9, 2002).

Subsequent to the issuance of the Default Order and cancellation of Corecomm's certificate effective December 9, 2002, Corecomm filed both its 2000 and 2001 Annual Reports on December 12, 2002. After receiving these annual reports, Commission staff notified Corecomm through a telephone conversation of the option to petition for reinstatement.

On January 13, 2003, Corecomm filed a Letter-Petition to Reinstate its certificate of public convenience. In its Petition, Corecomm states that the delinquent filing of its 2000 Annual Report was due in part to the resignation of its regulatory attorney and a reorganization within its company. Corecomm states that it has taken steps to ensure that it timely complies with future filing deadlines. Corecomm requests reinstatement since it has now filed both its 2000 and 2001 Annual Reports.

It is well-settled that decisions such as whether to grant a petition for reinstatement are left to the Commission's discretion and will be reversed on appeal only if that discretion is abused. *Hoskins Taxi Service v. Pa. P.U.C.*, 486 A.2d 1030 (Pa. Cmwlth. 1985). In ruling upon a reinstatement petition, it is incumbent upon this Commission to examine all relevant factors to reach an equitable result. *Medical Transportation, Inc.*, 57 Pa. P.U.C. 79 (1983).

The Commission has identified five factors that are particularly relevant to the adjudication of a petition to reinstate: 1) the amount of time that elapsed between the cancellation of the certificate of public convenience and the filing of the petition; 2) whether the petitioner has a record of habitually violating the Public Utility Code; 3) the reasonableness of the excuse given for the viola-

tion that caused the certificate to be canceled; 4) whether the petitioner has implemented procedures to prevent a recurrence of the circumstances giving rise to the cancellation; and 5) whether the petitioner is current in the payment of all Commission fines and assessments. *Re: M.S. Carriers, Inc.*, Docket No. A-00110601 (May 4, 1999).

In considering the first factor, we note that only approximately 5 weeks elapsed between the effective date of the cancellation on December 9, 2002, and Corecomm's request for reinstatement on January 13, 2003.

In regard to the second factor, Corecomm does not have a record of habitually violating the Public Utility Code. Corecomm has had no additional complaints issued against it since the issuance of its certificate in 1999.

In considering the third and fourth factors, Corecomm states that its failure to file its 2000 Annual Report was due to reorganizational and personnel changes. Corecomm states that it has taken steps to ensure that its regulatory compliance remains in good standing. Corecomm's excuse for the violation appears reasonable. The fact that Corecomm has now complied with our reporting requirements and has taken steps to ensure future compliance militates toward reinstatement.

The fifth factor requires that all outstanding fines and/or assessments be paid prior to reinstatement. A review of Commission records shows that Corecomm has no unpaid fines or assessments.

Based upon the foregoing, we grant Corecomm's petition for reinstatement. However, we caution Corecomm that in the future annual reports must be timely filed and all Commission correspondence must be answered in a timely manner. Corecomm is hereby put on notice that any future failure to submit an Annual Report may subject Corecomm to penalties under 66 Pa.C.S. § 3301 (relating to civil penalties for violations), or it may otherwise be required to file a new application along with the applicable \$350 fee. *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

1. The Letter-Petition to Reinstatement filed by Corecomm Pennsylvania, Inc. at C-20027758 on January 13, 2003, is hereby granted.

2. The certificate of public convenience held by Corecomm Pennsylvania, Inc. at A-310801 is hereby reinstated.

3. The Secretary cause a copy of this Order to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

On May 23, 2002, Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff filed a Formal Complaint against EZ Talk Communications, LLC (EZ Talk), an IXC reseller certificated at A-310691. In the Complaint, Prosecutory Staff alleged that the Commission sent by certified mail prior written notices to EZ Talk that its 2000 Annual Report was due. The complaint charged that EZ Talk violated 66 Pa.C.S. § 504 by failing to file its 2000 Annual Report. The Complaint requested that the Commission issue an order canceling EZ Talk's certificate of public convenience for failure to file its 2000 Annual Report.

According to the United States Postal Service return receipt, the Complaint was unclaimed. As a result of EZ Talk's failure to respond to the complaint, the Commission entered a Default Order on October 29, 2002, that sustained the complaint and cancelled EZ Talk's certificate of public convenience. The notice of the Default Order was published at 32 Pa.B. 5597 (November 9, 2002).

Subsequent to the issuance of the Default Order and cancellation of EZ Talk's certificate effective December 9, 2002, EZ Talk filed both its 2000 and 2001 Annual Reports, on December 12, 2002. After receiving these annual reports, Commission staff notified EZ Talk through a telephone conversation of the option to petition for reinstatement.

On January 10, 2003, EZ Talk filed a Letter-Petition to Reinstatement its certificate of public convenience. In its Petition, EZ Talk states that its 2000 Annual Report was originally filed on March 22, 2002. Furthermore, EZ Talk avers that it was unaware of the delinquency or of the default action canceling its certificate until late November of last year. EZ Talk states that upon learning of our action, it immediately refiled its 2000 Annual Report by both mailing and e-mailing a copy of its report to the Fixed Utilities Services Bureau, but avers that the report was then misplaced. EZ Talk avers that upon further contact by Commission staff, it then refiled on December 12, 2002, its 2000 Annual Report along with its 2001 Annual Report.

EZ Talk offers no explanation as to why it failed to respond to our prosecution for noncompliance nor as to why the Commission has no record of the alleged March 22, 2002, filing or November refile of its 2000 Annual Report, but argues that because it has filed its outstanding 2000 Annual Report as well as its 2001 Annual Report, its certificate should be reinstated.

It is well settled that decisions such as whether to grant a petition for reinstatement are left to the Commission's discretion and will be reversed on appeal only if that discretion is abused. *Hoskins Taxi Service v. Pa. P.U.C.*, 486 A.2d 1030 (Pa. Comwlth. 1985). In ruling upon a reinstatement petition, it is incumbent upon this Commission to examine all relevant factors to reach an equitable result. *Medical Transportation, Inc.*, 57 Pa. P.U.C. 79 (1983).

The Commission has identified five factors that are particularly relevant to the adjudication of a petition to reinstate: 1) the amount of time that elapsed between the cancellation of the certificate of public convenience and

the filing of the petition, 2) whether the petitioner has a record of habitually violating the Public Utility Code, 3) the reasonableness of the excuse given for the violation that caused the certificate to be canceled, 4) whether the petitioner has implemented procedures to prevent a recurrence of the circumstances giving rise to the cancellation, and 5) whether the petitioner is current in the payment of all Commission fines and assessments. Re: *M.S. Carriers, Inc.*, Docket No. A-00110601 (May 4, 1999).

In considering the first factor, we note that only approximately 5 weeks elapsed between the effective date of the cancellation on December 9, 2002, and EZ Talk's request for reinstatement on January 10, 2003.

In regard to the second factor, EZ Talk does not have a record of habitually violating the Public Utility Code. Since the issuance of its certificate in 1998, EZ Talk has had one additional complaint issued against it for failure to file its initial tariff. That complaint was resolved by EZ Talk's compliance.

In considering the third and fourth factors, a review of Commission records failed to either confirm or refute EZ Talk's averment that it had timely filed and then refiled its 2000 Annual Report. However, as a result of EZ Talk's past record of compliance with Commission rules and regulations, we will at this time, give EZ Talk the benefit of the doubt with regard to its excuse. As noted earlier, EZ Talk has already filed its 2001 Annual Report and reorganized its compliance officers' duties so as to ensure that its regulatory compliance remains in good standing. The fact that EZ Talk has now complied with our reporting requirements and has taken steps to ensure future compliance militates toward reinstatement.

The fifth factor requires that all outstanding fines and/or assessments be paid prior to reinstatement. A review of Commission records shows that EZ Talk currently has no unpaid fines or assessments.

Based upon the foregoing, we grant EZ Talk's petition for reinstatement. However, we caution EZ Talk that in the future annual reports must be timely filed and all Commission correspondence must be answered in a timely manner. EZ Talk is hereby put on notice that any future failure to submit an Annual Report may subject EZ Talk to penalties under section 3301 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 3301, or it may otherwise be required to file a new application along with the applicable \$350 fee. *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. The Letter-Petition to Reinstatement filed by EZ Talk Communications, LLC at C-20027739 on January 10, 2003, is hereby granted.
2. The certificate of public convenience held by EZ Talk Communications, LLC at A-310691 is hereby reinstated.

On January 17, 2003, Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff filed a Formal Complaint against Group Long Distance, Inc. (GLD), an interexchange telecommunications (IXC) reseller with authority at A-310423, and a competitive local exchange (CLEC) provider at A-310423F0002, alleging that that GLD violated 66 Pa.C.S. § 504 (relating to reports by public utilities) by failing to file its 2001 Annual Report for both authorities.
