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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified above for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701–1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the Laws of Pennsylvania are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the Laws of Pennsylvania to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth, and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$20.

STATEMENTS OF POLICY

Title 31—INSURANCE

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

[31 PA. CODE CH. 68]

Insurance Availability and Consumer Protection

The Insurance Department (Department) hereby deletes §§ 68.301—68.304 to read as set forth in Annex A. The Department deletes this statement of policy under sections 206, 506, 1501 and 1502 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 66, 186, 411 and 412), The Insurance Department Act of 1921 (40 P. S. §§ 1—321), The Insurance Company Law of 1921 (40 P. S. §§ 341—991) and the Motor Vehicle Financial Responsibility Law, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1799.7 (MVFRL). This statement of policy provided notice to Department staff, insurers, agents and consumers of the Department's position on implementing the amendments to the MVFRL made by the act of February 7, 1990 (P. L. 11, No. 6) (Act 6).

Purpose

The purpose of this action is to delete §§ 68.301—68.304, to eliminate an outdated statement of policy which does not serve any compelling public purpose. The statement of policy was adopted in 1990 to guide the Department's staff in administering implementation of Act 6, to facilitate insurer and agent compliance with the provisions of the new law and make consumers aware of the ways in which the statute addresses their need to access and maintain mandatory financial responsibility.

A new statutory definition of a "clean risk" was established by 75 Pa.C.S. § 1702 (relating to definitions), and if met by an applicant or insured, guarantees that the person will be written by an insurer at a voluntary market rate. To ensure all clean risk drivers access to a voluntary market rate, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1702 and 1742 were amended to provide a new rate structure within the Assigned Risk Plan. The Assigned Risk Plan provides a clean risk rate to ensure that insureds and applicants who satisfy the law's "clean risk" standard are assigned to an insurer at a voluntary market rate. These provisions took effect for insurance applicants and policyholders on July 1, 1990. The provisions relating to the Pennsylvania Assigned Risk Plan and the Clean Risk Program took effect August 6, 1990, for new business and September 5, 1990, for renewal business.

Following careful review, the Department decided to delete this statement of policy for the following reasons. First, the statutory framework for ensuring that consumers have greater access to the voluntary market and receive protections from inappropriate insurer refusals to write, policy terminations and unreasonable surcharges, remains under the authority of the statute. Therefore, the deletion of this statement of policy in no manner affects the insurance availability and consumer protections afforded by the statute. Second, the Assigned Risk Plan has adopted mechanisms and procedures to ensure that applicants meeting the clean risk definition are issued coverage at the clean risk rate. Therefore, guidance from the Department with regard to the application of the clean risk definition is no longer necessary. Finally, the Department's ongoing market conduct examinations and random

field surveys of producers and insurers have not revealed that the notice and guidance offered by this statement of policy is necessary.

Since this statement of policy does not affect the insurance availability and consumer protections afforded by the statute, in no manner enhances the statute, and has served its purpose, it is outdated and obsolete. Therefore, it is no longer necessary to include this statement of policy within the body of the Department's regulations.

Affected Parties

The deletion of this statement of policy affects insurers, producers and consumers.

Fiscal Impact

There is no fiscal impact as a result of the deletion of this statement of policy.

Paperwork

The deletion of this statement of policy will not impose additional paperwork requirements on the Department or its licensees.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

The deletion of this statement of policy will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Because the Department is deleting an outdated statement of policy, no sunset date has been assigned.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of November 1997

The Department of Banking of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), hereby determines that the maximum lawful

rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of November 1997 is 9%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. 96-399, which

override State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department of Banking is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the

United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 6.54 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 9.04 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 9%.

DISCHARGE OF CONTROLLED INDUSTRIAL WASTE AND SEWERAGE WASTEWATER

(Part I Permits)

The following parties have applied for an NPDES permit to discharge controlled wastewaters into the surface waters of this Commonwealth. Unless otherwise indicated, on the basis of preliminary review and applications of lawful standards and regulations, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) proposes to issue a permit to discharge, subject to certain effluent limitations and special conditions. These proposed determinations are tentative.

Where indicated, the EPA, Region III, Regional Administrator has waived the right to review or object to this proposed permit action under the waiver provision 40 CFR 123.6E.

Persons wishing to comment on the proposed permit are invited to submit a statement to the office noted above the application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within this 30-day period will be considered in the formulation of the final determinations regarding this application. Responses should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant.

Following the 30-day comment period, the Water Management Program Manager will make a final determination regarding the proposed permit. Notice of this determination will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at which time this determination may be appealed to the Environmental Hearing Board.

The application and related documents, proposed effluent limitations and special conditions, comments received and other information are on file and may be inspected and arrangements made for copying at the office indicated above the application.

This proposed action is for renewal of an NPDES permit to discharge treated sewage into Tobyhanna Creek in Tobyhanna Township, **Monroe County**.

The receiving stream is classified for the following uses: high quality, cold water fishery, aquatic life, water supply and recreation.

For the purpose of evaluating effluent requirements for TDS, NO₂-NO₃, fluoride and phenolics, the existing downstream potable water supply (PWS) considered during the evaluation is the Hazleton Water Authority on the Lehigh River near Rockport.

HAZARDOUS SITES CLEAN-UP

Prompt Interim Response Under the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act

Covington Township
Lackawanna County

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1305) (HSCA) initiated a prompt interim response (response) at the Windship Road Drum Site (Site). The Site is located along a private roadway off of Windship Road near Route 307, in Covington Township, Lackawanna County.

On February 26, 1996, the Department personnel inspected the site subsequent to a citizen's report that several drums of unknown material were discovered as a result of some excavation activities performed during the cleanout of a drainage culvert. During the inspection, six drums, exposed or partially exposed, were noted. A subsequent investigation by the Department, using metal detection instrumentation, indicated the probable presence of additional buried drums. The Site is located directly adjacent to a commercial property as well as several residences. A small stream runs along the eastern edge of the site into a wetland approximately 200 feet south of the site.

After determining that the Site constituted a substantial threat to public health and safety and the environment, the Department initiated a response at the Site on February 28, 1996. The prompt action interim response chosen by the Department (Prompt Action Interim Response #1) consisted of excavation of drums, repackaging, chemical analysis, temporary storage and final disposal at an approved facility. A total of 56 drums, as well as one small container, were unearthed and subsequently disposed of. This action by the Department eliminated the substantial threat to public health and the environment posed by the material in the drums. The Department made the public aware of Prompt Action Interim Response #1 by issuing a public notice which appeared in the March 23, 1996 editions of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and the *Scranton Times* newspaper.

On November 20, 1996, metal detector and ground penetrating radar surveys were conducted at the Site. The surveys resulted in the delineation of additional areas of suspected drum burial. On April 27, 1997 the Department completed an investigation which resulted in the unearthing of 19 drums at the Site. The material in the drums was determined to be a hazardous waste and contained the hazardous substance trichloroethylene (TCE) and lead. On July 17, 1997, after determining that the Site constituted a substantial threat to public health

and safety and the environment, the Department undertook a Prompt Action Interim Response (Prompt Action Interim Response #2) at the Site. The Prompt Action Interim Response involved the disposal, at an approved hazardous waste disposal facility, of the drums which were unearthed during the April 27, 1997 investigation. This action by the Department eliminated the substantial threat to public health and the environment posed by the material in the drums. The Department made the public aware of Prompt Action Interim Response #2 by issuing a public notice which appeared in the August 16, 1997 editions of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and the *Scranton Times* newspaper.

Subsequent to the unearthing of drums containing hazardous waste at the Site, 12 home wells were sampled and analyzed for volatile organic compounds. Four of the home wells were contaminated with levels of TCE above the Federal Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL). On August 12, 1997, after determining that the Site constituted a substantial threat to public health and safety and the environment, the Department undertook a Prompt Action Interim Response (Prompt Action Interim Response #3) at the Site. Prompt Action Interim Response #3 involved the installation of point-of-entry carbon filtration systems on those homes whose well water had been contaminated at levels above the MCL for TCE. Point-of-entry carbon filtration systems were placed in a total of four homes. This action by the Department eliminated the substantial threat to public health posed by the TCE in the groundwater. The Department also considered the alternative of supplying bottled water to affected residents. This option was rejected because it would not protect affected individuals from exposure to TCE through inhalation. The Department also considered the alternative of taking no action. This option was rejected due to the substantial threat posed by TCE in the groundwater to the public and the environment.

The administrative record contains information which was used as the basis for the decision to conduct the response at the Site. The administrative record will be available for public inspection from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, at the Department's Northeast Regional Office located at 2 Public Square, Wilkes-Barre, PA 18711.

Written comments concerning the response of information in the administrative record will be accepted in person, if delivered, or by mail, if postmarked, on or before January 23, 1998 to the attention of Leonard Zelinka, Project Officer—Hazardous Sites Cleanup Program, at the Northeast Regional Office address.

Additionally, the public will have an opportunity to present oral comments on Prompt Action Interim Response #3 at a public hearing. The public hearing has been scheduled for December 3, 1997 at 7 p.m. at the Covington Township Municipal Building. Persons wishing to present oral comments must register on or before November 25, 1997 by calling Leonard Zelinka at (717) 826-5441. If no person registers to present oral comments by November 25, 1997, the hearing will not be held. Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302 and 303 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific cleanup standard, in whole or in part, and for sites determined to be located in Special Industrial Areas. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to

Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area by the person conducting remediation. For the sites identified, a municipality may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period a municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of a site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Notice of Intent to Approve Plan Approval Application #PA-30-072B

Under 25 Pa. Code § 127.44, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) intends to issue a Plan Approval to Consol Pennsylvania Coal Co. for the modification of the Bailey Mine Complex Coal Preparation Plant located in Richhill Twp., Greene County as described in its application.

Based on the information provided by the applicant and on the Department's analysis of that information, this operation will emit not more than 1,708 tons per year of sulfur dioxide (SO₂), 718 tons per year of nitrogen oxides (NO_x), 1170.1 tons per year of volatile organic compounds (VOC), 1359 tons per year carbon monoxide (CO), and 313.2 tons per year particulate matter (PM₁₀). These emissions in conjunction with other PSD increment-consuming sources, require allocation of 47.1% of the annual, 86.8% of the 24-hour, and 44.6% of the 3-hour SO₂ increments; and 23.4% of the annual, and 64.7% of 24-hour PM₁₀ increments; and 22.2% of the annual NO_x increment available in the area of the maximum impact of the source.

Copies of the application, the Department's analysis and other documents used in evaluation of the application are available for public inspection during normal business hours at the following address.

In order to assure compliance with all applicable standards, the Department proposes to place the following conditions on the Plan Approval:

General Conditions

1. This Plan Approval is for the installation of additional coal wash equipment and the modification to increase plant capacity to a 27MM ton/year coal preparation facility owned by Consol Pennsylvania Coal Company (CONSOL) located at the Bailey Mining Complex Preparation Plant, Richhill Township, Greene County.

2. This approval to construct/modify shall become invalid if: (1) construction is not commenced (as defined in 40 CFR 52.21(b)(8)) within 18 months after the date of this approval; or (2) if construction is discontinued for a period of 18 months or more; or (3) construction is not completed within a reasonable time. CONSOL shall provide a detailed construction schedule to the Department within 30 days of issuance of this Plan Approval.

3. The facility is permitted to operate 8,760 hours per year.

4. CONSOL shall maintain records of coal fired (tons/month) in each thermal dryer and the monthly average of the sulfur content, ash content and heating value of the coal burned. This information shall be reported to the Department upon request.

5. This construction/modification is subject to 25 Pa. Code § 127.206(d)(1) and (2) and other applicable provisions of Subchapter E of Chapter 127 for New Source Review. The plant may not commence operation of the new coal washing equipment or increase emissions from the dryers until the required emission reductions are certified by the Department.

6. In accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.205(3), each modification to a facility shall offset in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.201 and 127.211, the total of the net increase in potential to emit.

7. In accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.206(d)(1) and (2), ERCs must be properly generated, certified by the

Department and processed through the registry no later than the date approved by the Department for commencement of operation of the proposed modified facility.

8. CONSOL is required to obtain 434.5 tons/yr. of VOC emission reduction credits and 464.4 tons/yr. of NOx emission reduction credits.

9. CONSOL shall install, certify, maintain and operate continuous emission monitors on each of the thermal dryers for the following pollutants: sulfur oxides (as SO₂) and oxides of nitrogen (as NO_x) in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139. Emissions shall be continuously recorded and reported to the Department on a quarterly basis.

10. At least 90 days prior to system start-up, the company shall submit information required by Phase I of the Department's "Continuous Source Monitoring Manual", Revision 4, July 1987 to Joe Nazzaro at 1st Floor Executive House, Harrisburg, PA 17120.

11. Data from the continuous emission monitoring systems shall be recorded in both pounds per million BTU and pounds per hour and shall be reported on a quarterly basis in a format to be specified during the certification process.

12. CONSOL shall continuously monitor and record the following conditions:

A. Outlet gas temperature from each dryer prior to the scrubber.

B. Pressure drop (in w. c.) across the scrubber on each dryer.

C. Pressure of the water supply to the scrubber on each dryer.

These monitoring devices must meet the accuracy specifications, the location and calibration requirements in 40 CFR 60.253.

13. This Plan Approval authorizes temporary operation of the source covered by this Plan Approval provided the following conditions are met.

A. The Department must receive written notice from the Owner/Operator of when the Operator expects to commence operation.

B. Operation is authorized only to facilitate the startup and shakedown of sources and air cleaning devices, to permit operations pending the issuance of an Operating Permit or to permit the evaluation of the sources for compliance with all applicable regulations and requirements.

C. This condition authorizes temporary operation of the source for a period of 180 days from the date of commencement of operation, provided the Department receives notice from the Owner/Operator under Subpart (A), above.

D. The Owner/Operator may request an extension if compliance with all applicable regulation and Plan Approval requirements have not been established. The extension request shall be submitted in writing at least 15 days prior to the end of this period of temporary operation and shall provide a description of the compliance status of the source, a detailed schedule for establishing compliance and the reasons compliance has not been established.

E. The notice submitted by the Owner/Operator under Subpart (A), above, prior to the expiration of this Plan Approval, shall modify the Plan Approval expiration date.

The new Plan Approval expiration date shall be 180 days from the date of the written notice.

14. Thermal Dryer No. 1 and Thermal Dryer No. 2 Conditions:

A. The particulate emissions (TSP/PM10) from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and Thermal Dryer No. 2 shall not exceed 138 and 128 tons/year, respectively.

B. Particulate emissions (TSP/PM10) from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 31 and 32 lb./hr., respectively.

C. Particulate emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 shall not exceed .031 grains/dscf and Thermal Dryer No. 2 shall not exceed .02 grains/dscf.

D. The sulfur oxide emissions (as SO₂) from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 631 and 1077 tons/year, respectively.

E. The sulfur oxide emissions (as SO₂) from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 144 and 246 lb./hr., respectively.

F. The sulfur oxide emissions (as SO₂) from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and Thermal Dryer No. 2 shall not exceed 1.2 lb./MMBTU.

G. The NOx emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 305 and 413 tons/yr., respectively.

H. The NOx emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 96 and 121 lb./hr., respectively.

I. The NOx emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 0.8 lb./MMBTU and .59 lb./MMBTU, respectively.

J. The CO emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 946 and 413 tons/yr., respectively.

K. The CO emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 274 and 107 lb./hr., respectively.

L. The CO emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and Thermal Dryer No. 2 shall not exceed 1.8 lb./MMBTU and .46 lb./MMBTU, respectively.

M. The VOC emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 231 and 368 tons/yr., respectively.

N. The VOC emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed 70 and 109 lb./hr., respectively.

O. Thermal Dryer No. 1 and Thermal Dryer No. 2 venturi scrubber shall operate with a pressure differential of at least 35 and 32 inches of water, respectively.

P. The Department reserves the right to revise the emission limits above, based upon stack test results, continuous monitoring data and other reliable information.

Q. There shall be no malodors emitted from the Thermal Dryers or from the coal washing equipment which are detectable beyond the property line.

R. Visible emissions from Thermal Dryer No. 1 and No. 2 shall not exceed an opacity of 20%.

S. Compliance with the short term emission limits, specified in lb./MMBTU or lb./hr., shall be established on a 1-hour average basis.

T. The Department reserves the right to require additional stack testing at any time.

U. The maximum dryer gas exit temperature, minimum pressure drop across the venturi and minimum scrubber water supply pressure shall be established during the initial compliance stack test. Operation above that

temperature or below these pressures shall be deemed to be a violation of this permit unless compliance is established through stack testing and continuous emission monitoring, while operating at the new conditions.

15. Conditions for the new Wash Module at Plant 1

A. The VOC emission from the new froth flotation cells and vacuum filters in Plant 1 shall not exceed 27.2 tons/yr.

B. The VOC emissions from the antifreeze and flocculent shall not exceed 15 tons/yr.

16. In the event of a malfunction of the air cleaning devices, CONSOL shall promptly shut the sources down. CONSOL shall not restart the sources until the air cleaning device have been repaired and are functioning properly. CONSOL shall maintain a log of any malfunctions to the air cleaning device and provide it upon request.

17. Stack Testing Requirements

A. CONSOL shall conduct stack tests for compliance purposes for TSP/PM₁₀, VOC, and CO and for monitor certification purposes for sulfur oxides (as SO₂) and NO_x (as NO₂) in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139, 40 CFR 60.8 and 40 CFR 60.254.

B. Within 60 days after achieving maximum firing rate, but no later than 180 days after start-up, stack tests shall be conducted on the new equipment and the modified capacity of the Thermal Dryers. Stack testing for compliance purposes (TSP/PM₁₀, VOC, and CO) shall be performed on at least an annual basis thereafter. For VOC emissions, CONSOL shall perform emission checks using portable instruments approved by the Department on at least a quarterly basis.

C. Consol shall submit a pretest protocol to the Department for approval at least 30 days prior to the performance of the stack test.

D. The Department shall be notified at least 2 weeks in advance to the date and time of the stack test so that an observer may be present.

Notice of 1997 Group One Exceptions Requests; MA/LTC Participation Review

The Department of Public Welfare (Department), by statement of policy effective December 19, 1996, adopted an interim policy announcing that, as a general matter, it intended to exercise its discretion to terminate or to refuse to enter into a MA provider agreement with a provider of nursing facility services that sought to increase the number of MA certified nursing facility beds through enrollment or expansion, unless the Department granted an exception on a case-by-case basis to permit that provider to enroll or expand; or, in the case of an enrolled provider, the provider did not expand by more than ten beds or 10%, whichever was less, over a 2-year period. See 26 Pa.B. 5996 (December 14, 1996). The Department revised its interim policy effective August 11, 1997, to prohibit enrolled nursing facility providers from expanding their existing licensed bed capacity, under any circumstances, without first receiving an exception from the Department. See 27 Pa.B. 4005 (August 9, 1997).

When it published its initial interim statement of policy, the Department announced its intention to supersede the interim policy with a permanent MA/Long Term Care (LTC) participation review process. To that end, the Department developed a process and guidelines that it intends to use to grant exceptions on a case-by-case basis to its general policy to deny or terminate MA enrollment. The Department anticipates publishing a final policy in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by November 1, 1997, and concluding its review of all exceptions requests received

between December, 1996 and June 30, 1997 (collectively referred to as "Group One") by the end of December, 1997.

Under the process and guidelines scheduled to be published by November 1, 1997, the Department has

committed to publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* listing all pending Group One exceptions requests. By this notice, the Department announces the 1997 Group One exceptions requests covering the submission period of December 19, 1996 through June 30, 1997.

The purpose of this announcement is to provide advance notice under 42 CFR 447.205 that, during fiscal year (FY) 1998-99, the Department of Public Welfare (Department) intends to make changes in its methods and standards for setting payment rates for county nursing facilities by revising 55 Pa. Code § 1187.95(b) to extend the time period for county nursing facility transition rates through June 30, 1999. This notice also announces the Department's intention to enter into an intergovernmental transfer of funds and make county nursing facility supplementation payments to qualifying providers in accordance with the approved State Plan Amendment and 55 Pa. Code § 1187.116 during FY 1997-98.

The Department is in the process of preparing an agreement with the County Commissioners Association of Pennsylvania which will provide for an intergovernmental transfer of funds for FY 1997-98. As a result of the intergovernmental transfer agreement, the State share of payments for nursing facility Medical Assistance services during FY 1997-98 will be derived, in part, from transfers of funds to the Commonwealth from several counties as authorized under Federal law. (See 42 U.S.C.A. § 1396b(w)(6)(A) and 42 CFR 433.51(b)).

Under Federal law, the Department is permitted to pay for nursing facility services at rates which, in the aggregate, do not exceed the amount that would be paid for these services under Medicare cost principles. The Department has determined that to the extent it can utilize funds that have been transferred to the Commonwealth by local county governments to contribute towards the payment of nursing facility services at rates which are below the Medicare upper limit, yet higher than the rates that the Department might otherwise pay for these services, the Department will do so.

The proposed change concerning the extension of the county nursing facility transition rates during FY 1998-99 is contingent upon: (1) approval by the Federal government of an amendment to Pennsylvania's State Plan authorizing the county nursing facility transition rates through June 30, 1999; (2) the successful implementation of an intergovernmental transfer during FY 1997-98; and (3) the Department's implementation of this regulatory change.

The Department's payment of the county nursing facility supplementation payments for FY 1997-98 is contingent upon: (1) the successful implementation of an intergovernmental transfer during FY 1997-98; and (2) the Department's determination that sufficient state and Federal funds are available to make such payments.

The estimated increase in annual aggregate expenditures during FY 1997-98 is \$148.644 million in total funds (\$22.971 million in intergovernmental transfer funds).

ENVIRONMENTAL HEARING BOARD

Delaware County Regional Water Quality Control Authority v. DEP; EHB Doc. Nos. 96-194-MG, 97-082-MG

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and the Delaware County Regional Water Quality Control Authority (DELCORA) have agreed to a settlement of the above matters. The Commonwealth had issued a Plan Approval on August 27, 1996 for installation of additional burners in its sewage sludge incinerators, and a Plan Approval on August 29, 1996 for installation of an odor scrubber in the belt filter press room. DELCORA filed timely appeals of the Plan Approvals. On March 12, 1997 the Department issued a Reasonably Available Control Technology Operating Permit. DELCORA filed a timely appeal of the Operating Permit.

The parties have agreed to a settlement, the major provisions of which include: the Department has issued revised Plan Approvals and Operating Permit which DELCORA will not appeal, DELCORA will conduct further testing to determine whether the emission standards in the Plan Approvals allow for adequate operating margins, and DELCORA will obtain Department certification for installation of continuous temperature monitors for both incinerators. Both Plan Approvals and the Operating Permit are available for review at the office of the Department.

Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority—Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund; Doc. No. 101-3

Order

On July 13, 1995, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PIIA). This rulemaking would delete Chapter 962 which is a Statement of Policy on value engineering analysis, amend 25 Pa. Code Chapter 963 Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority Assistance and add 25 Pa. Code Chapter 965 Clean Water State Revolving Fund. The authority for this regulation is 35 P. S. §§ 751.5(c)(2) and 6(4). The proposed regulation was published in the July 29, 1995 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on August 22, 1997. The final-form regulation was tolled on September 10, 1997, and resubmitted with amendments on September 18, 1997.

Chapter 963 already exists and establishes general procedures and criteria for awarding financial assistance under the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority Act. Chapter 963 is being amended to add a second opinion project review in place of Chapter 962's Statement of Policy on value engineering analysis. Chapter 965 is a new chapter that creates standards for eligibility and administration of the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF).

The Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PIIA) administers approximately \$364 million in Federal funds as a revolving loan program for building and updating of sewerage systems. The CWSRF is in existence and PIIA is presently loaning money to communities. However, PIIA does not have specific regulations for the CWSRF. The proposed amendments are the result of meetings between the PIIA, the Department of Environmental Protection, and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The proposed amendments are necessary to comply with the Water Quality Act of 1987 and various Capitalization Grant Agreements entered into by EPA and the PIIA for the administration of Federal funds allocated to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. The Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors (Township Supervisors) raised several objections with the final-form regulation. The Township Supervisors main concern was that the "second opinion review," in the body of the regulation, is overly broad compared to the definition of "second opinion review. It is also unnecessarily intrusive because it would

evaluate the complexity of a project and the impact of the project on the community. PIIA defended the provisions with convincing citations to their statutory authority at 35 P. S. §§ 751.10(a) Criteria for obtaining assistance and (b) Financial assistance. Based upon the language of these provisions, we believe the PIIA has adequately addressed the issues raised by the Township Supervisors. The PIIA has also satisfied the concerns raised in the Commission's Comments. Additionally, these regulations will enable the PIIA to improve administration of approximately \$364 million in Federal funds.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 101-3 from the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority, as submitted to the Commission on August 22, 1997, and amended on September 18, 1997, is approved; and

2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.

Department of Agriculture—Peach and Nectarine Research Program; Doc. No. 2-110

On April 18, 1997, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Department of Agriculture (Department). This rulemaking would amend 7 Pa. Code Chapter 104. The authority for this regulation is sections 3 and 11 of the Pennsylvania Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act (act). The proposed regulation was published in the May 3, 1997 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on August 6, 1997, tolled on August 20, 1997, and returned without revisions on September 12, 1997.

The regulation adds a subchapter for the Peach and Nectarine Research Program (Program) which establishes requirements and procedures for payment of producer charges to the Program. Provisions establishing requirements for: a \$5 per acre charge on affected producers; submission of an annual statement; deadlines for submission of forms and payments; and penalties for noncompliance.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. The proposal clarifies the extent of the Department's authority and establishes penalty procedures.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 2-110 from the Department of Agriculture, as submitted to the Commission on September 12, 1997, is approved; and

On December 5, 1995, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Environmental Quality Board (Board). This rulemaking would amend 25 Pa. Code Chapters 86—90. The authority for this regulation is sections 4(d), 4.2(a), 4.5(f) and 18.4 of the Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (52 P. S. §§ 1396.4(d), 1396.4b(a), 1396.4e(f) and 1396.18d); sections 5(b), 315(b) and 605(b) of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.5(b), 691.315(b) and 691.605(b)); section 3.2(a) of the Coal Refuse Disposal Control Act (52 P. S. § 30.53b(a)); section 7(b) of The Bituminous Mine Subsidence and Land Conservation Act (52 P. S. § 1406.7(b)); and under Article 1920A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 510-20). The proposed regulation was published in the December 16, 1995 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 60-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on September 9, 1997.

The proposal addresses statutory changes enacted through Act 173 of 1993 and Act 43 of 1996. The proposal amends existing mining regulations concerning coal mine operator licensing, bonding, postmining pollutional discharges and liability insurance.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. The Commission raised concerns with the reasonableness of the Board's proposed method of calculating the amount of financial assurance required from a mine operator for post-mining discharges. The Mining and Reclamation Advisory Board (MRAB) subsequently requested a broad evaluation of the overall environmental and economic costs associated with postmining pollutional discharges. Further, Department of Environmental Resources (Department) anticipates that there may be changes in Federal oversight on this issue. In light of these developments, the Board has eliminated the financial assurance provisions from this final-form rulemaking and will propose amendments once the MRAB evaluation and Federal issues are sufficiently resolved. Even though this language is removed from the rulemaking, Department and a mine operator can still rely on statutory authority to enter into individual financial assurances for post-mining discharges. Therefore, issues raised in our Comments are resolved concerning this rulemaking.

1. Regulation No. 7-285 from the Environmental Quality Board, as submitted to the Commission on September 9, 1997, is approved; and

Order

On April 1, 1997, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Environmental Quality Board (Board). This rulemaking would amend 25 Pa. Code Chapters 121 and 123. The authority for this regulation is the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P. S. § 4005). The proposed regulation was published in the April 12, 1997 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 60-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on September 17, 1997.

The Board is amending 25 Pa. Code Chapters 121 and 123 to establish a program to limit the emission of nitrogen oxides (NOx) from fossil fired combustion units of 250 MMBtu/hour or more and electric generating units of 15 megawatts or greater. Ninety-five percent of the affected emissions come from electric generating units which include electric utilities and Independent Power Producers. The remainder are large industrial processes.

The 1990 Clean Air Act Amendments (CAAA) recognized that ozone is a regional problem. The Northeast Ozone Transport Commission (OTC) was established under the CAAA to assist in developing recommendations for the control of interstate ozone. The OTC member states, including Pennsylvania, proposed a regional approach to address NOx emissions and through a memorandum of understanding agreed to propose regulations for the control of NOx emissions. These regulations are based on, but not identical to, the model regulations.

The driving force behind this rulemaking is the Federal mandate to reduce ozone in the CAAA. There are 84 electric generating units and large industrial processes in Pennsylvania that will be affected by this regulation. In addition, any new fossil fired source with NOx emissions would be affected.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. The Board has adequately addressed the concerns raised in the Commission's Comments. Furthermore, we anticipate that the Board will adjust the regulations, as necessary, to accommodate the evolution of the new electric generation marketplace.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 7-314 from the Environmental Quality Board, as submitted to the Commission on September 17, 1997, is approved; and
2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.

Environmental Quality Board—Gasoline Volatility; Doc. No. 7-319

Order

On April 21, 1997, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Environmental Quality Board (Board). This rulemaking would amend 25 Pa. Code Chapters 121, 126 and 139. The authority for this regulation is contained in section 5 of the Pennsylvania Air Pollution Control Act (35 P. S. § 4005). The proposed regulation was published in the May 3, 1997 edition of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

with a 60-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on September 17, 1997.

The regulation will require the sale of either low Reid Vapor Pressure (RVP) or Reformulated Gasoline (RFG) during the specified ozone season in the Pittsburgh-Beaver Valley region. For refiners, distributors, resellers, carriers and wholesalers, the time period is May 1 through September 15. For wholesale purchaser consumers and retailers of gasoline, the time period is June 1 through September 15.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. The regulation is necessary to decrease the amount of ground level ozone occurring in the Pittsburgh-Beaver Valley Region. It is a part of the Commonwealth's overall strategy to meet the requirements in the Federal Clean Air Act.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 7-319 from the Environmental Quality Board, as submitted to the Commission on September 17, 1997, is approved; and

2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.
