Swatara Watershed Conservation Plan

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (Department), Bureau of Recreation and Conservation has approved the "Swatara Creek Watershed Conservation Plan" and is placing the Swatara Creek Watershed and all tributaries covered in the Plan in Dauphin, Lebanon and Schuylkill Counties, on the Pennsylvania Rivers Conservation Registry (Registry).

The Swatara Creek Watershed Association, Inc. submitted the Swatara Creek Watershed Conservation Plan and other required information to gain Registry status.

After review of the Plan and other information, the Department has determined that the Keystone Rivers Conservation Program requirements have been satisfied and places the following in the Registry:

1. The watershed area of the Swatara Creek (Dauphin, Lebanon and Schuylkill Counties) from the headwaters to its confluence with the Susquehanna River between the boroughs of Middletown and Royalton in Dauphin County—571 square miles.

2. All tributary streams within the Swatara Creek Watershed.

This action becomes effective today, October 14, 2000. Projects identified in the Swatara Creek Watershed Conservation Plan become eligible for implementation, development or acquisition grant funding through the Department's Rivers Conservation Program. Following the 30-day comment period, the Water Management Program Managers will make a final determination regarding the proposed permit action. Notice of this determination will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at which time this determination may be appealed to the Environmental Hearing Board.

Preamble 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101-6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site, and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(l)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

Merck & Co., Inc., is a major facility for which a Title V Operating Permit application (49-00007) has been submitted but for which no Title V Operating Permit has yet been issued.

Information provided by Merck indicates that the air cleaning devices will potentially emit up to 10.9 tons of carbon monoxide per 12 consecutive month period, 1.0 tons of volatile organic compounds per 12 consecutive month period, some of which will also constitute hazardous air pollutants, 8.8 tons of sulfur oxides per 12 consecutive month period, 17.0 tons of nitrogen oxides per 12 consecutive month period, 6.4 tons of particulate matter per 12 consecutive month period, and 6.4 tons of particulate matter less than or equal to 10 microns (PM₁₀) per 12 consecutive month period. A preliminary review of this information by the Department indicates that the air cleaning devices will allow the existing sources to continue to comply with all applicable air quality requirements including the best available technology requirements of 127.1 and 127.12 of Chapter 127 of Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department. Based on this finding, the Department proposes to approve the application and issue plan approval for the installation of the proposed air cleaning devices. If this plan approval is issued and if the proposed air cleaning devices and existing sources are subsequently found to be in compliance with all conditions of the plan approval as well as all applicable regulatory requirements, the plan approval will be incorporated into an operating permit via administrative amendment in accordance with Section 127.450 of Chapter 127 of Article III.

In order to ensure compliance with all applicable standards, the Department proposes to place the following conditions in the respective plan approval: 1. The air cleaning devices are to be installed in accordance with the plans submitted with the application (as approved herein).

2. This plan approval is issued for the installation of a T-Thermal #LPV-14M thermal oxidizer equipped with a modified (low nitrogen oxides) burner, a Sub-X water-cooled quench, and a Ceilcote #SPT-54-120 packed bed scrubber, or equivalent, for the control of air contaminant emissions from the following:

a. the sources identified in condition 7 of Operating Permit 49-313-032G.

b. the sources identified in condition 6 of Operating Permit 49-313-035K under the heading "Summary of process vessels controlled by the fume incinerator".

3. Under the best available technology provisions of section 127.1 and 127.12 of Chapter 127 of Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection, during any time that the T-Thermal #LPV-14M oxidizer is being used to control air contaminant emissions from any source identified in condition 2 herein the oxidizer shall maintain a minimum outlet temperature of at least 1,600°F. The only exception to this requirement is if the oxidizer (and Ceilcote packed bed scrubber) are being used to control air contaminant emissions from any of the following sources identified in condition 2b herein: TA-812, TA-1548, TA-1238, TA-1250, HE-1284, TA-1297, ST-1245, or TA-1538 (these sources are also identified in condition 7 of Operating Permit 49-313-035K). During such instances the oxidizer and packed bed scrubber shall comply with the following operating criteria:

a. maintain a minimum oxidizer outlet temperature of at least $1,800\,^{\circ}\text{F}.$

b. maintain a minimum combined volatile organic compound destruction/removal efficiency of 99.9%

c. maintain a minimum combined methylene chloride destruction/removal efficiency of 99.99%

d. maintain a total hydrocarbon concentration in the packed bed scrubbed exhaust of not greater than 50 ppmv

e. maintain a particulate matter emission rate in the packed bed scrubber exhaust of not greater than 0.03 grains per dry standard cubic feet

f. maintain a minimum hydrogen chloride removal efficiency of 99%

4. Under the best available technology provisions of sections 127.1 and 127.12 of Chapter 127 of Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection, the T-Thermal #LPV-14M oxidizer shall be equipped with a temperature monitor/recorder that shall accurately monitor and record the oxidizer's outlet temperature. The oxidizer shall be equipped with an alarm that will alert the operator should the monitor ever indicate a temperature below the limits established in condition 3 herein. Additionally, the final exhaust stack (downstream of the packed bed scrubber) shall be equipped with oxygen and carbon monoxide monitors that shall accurately monitor the oxygen and carbon monoxide content of the final stack exhaust whenever the oxidizer is in use.

5. Under the best available technology provisions of sections 127.1 and 127.12 of Chapter 127 of Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection, during any time that the Ceilcote #SPT-54-120 packed bed scrubber, or equivalent, is being used to control air contaminant emissions from any

source identified in condition 2 herein the scrubber shall comply with the following operating criteria:

a. utilize a caustic solution as the scrubbing solution

b. maintain a scrubbing solution pH of at least 7

c. maintain a scrubbing solution flow rate of at least 85 gallons per minute

6. Under the best available technology provisions of sections 127.1 and 127.1 of Chapter 127 of Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection, the Ceilcote #SPT-54-120 packed bed scrubber, or equivalent, shall be equipped with monitors that shall accurately monitor the scrubber's pressure drop and the scrubbing solution's pH and flowrate. The scrubber shall additionally be equipped with an alarm that will alert the operator should the monitors ever indicate a pH or flowrate below the limits established in condition 5 herein.

7. The use of the T-Thermal #LPV-14M oxidizer for the control of air contaminant emissions from the sources identified in condition 2a herein may be temporarily or permanently discontinued at any time at the company's discretion without the necessity of notifying the Department provided the requirements identified in conditions 7 and 10 of Operating Permit 49-313-032G are complied with.

8. The use of the T-Thermal #LPV-14M oxidizer for the control of air contaminant emissions from the sources identified in condition 2b herein may be temporarily or permanently discontinued at any time at the company's discretion without the necessity of notifying the Department provided the requirements identified in conditions 6, 7, 10, and 11 of Operating Permit 49-313-035K are complied with.

9. Within 120 days of startup of the T-Thermal #LPV-14M oxidizer and Ceilcote #SPT-54-120 packed bed scrubber, the company shall perform stack testing upon these units in order to verify the following: volatile organic compound destruction/removal efficiency, methylene chloride destruction/removal efficiency, and hydrogen chloride removal efficiency. The company shall also perform stack testing upon the outlet of the packed bed scrubber for nitrogen oxides and total hydrocarbons. All testing shall be performed using reference method test procedures acceptable to the Department.

10. At least 60 days prior to the performance of any testing required by condition 9 herein a pretest plan shall be submitted to the Department for evaluation. This test plan shall contain the specific testing and analytical procedures to be used in performing the testing.

11. The Department shall be given at least 14 days advance notice of the specific dates and times for the performance of any testing required by condition 9 herein in order that Department personnel can arrange to be present. The Department is under no obligation to accept the results of any testing performed without adequate advance notice having been given to the Department.

12. Within 60 days of completion of any testing required by condition 9 herein, two copies of the test report shall be submitted to the Department. The report shall contain the results of the testing, a description of the testing and analytical procedures actually used, all air cleaning device operating parameters, a copy of all raw test data and a copy of the calculations generated during the data analysis.

13. The air contaminant emissions from the T-Thermal #LPV-14M thermal oxidizer, Sub-X water-cooled quench,

and Ceilcote #SPT-54-120 packed bed scrubber, or equivalent, shall never exceed the following limits:

14. Merck shall maintain comprehensive, accurate records of the following:

a. the outlet temperature of the T-Thermal #LPV-14M thermal oxidizer

b. the dates and times that any of the sources identified in condition 7 of Operating Permit 49-313-035K are operated.

Merck shall maintain these records onsite for at least 5 years and shall make these records available to the Department upon request.

15. Issuance of an operating permit for the aforementioned sources is contingent upon the air cleaning devices being installed and the sources and associated air cleaning devices being maintained and operated, as described in the application and supplemental materials submitted for plan approval, as well as in accordance with all conditions contained herein, and upon satisfactory demonstration that any air contaminants emitted from the sources are in compliance with the requirements specified herein and with the requirements specified in, or established under, any applicable rule or regulation contained in Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection.

16. The company shall immediately notify the Department of any malfunction of the sources or associated air cleaning devices which results in, or may possibly be resulting in, the emission of air contaminants in excess of the limitations specified in, or established under, any applicable rule or regulation contained in Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department or in excess of the limitations specified in any condition contained herein or which otherwise results in, or may possibly be resulting in, noncompliance with the requirements specified in any condition contained herein.

17. This plan approval authorizes temporary operation of the sources covered by this plan approval for a period of up to 180 days from the date of completion of installation of the air cleaning devices for the purpose of equipment shakedown and stack test performance.

In accordance with Section 127.45 of Chapter 127 of Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department, the proposed plan approval conditions do one or more of the following:

1. identify the air contamination sources and location

2. establish allowable emission rates

3. establish, monitoring, recordkeeping, testing and reporting requirements

4. ensure proper operation and adequate maintenance

A copy of the application and the Department's analysis are available for public inspection during normal business hours at the address listed below. Any person wishing to protest the issuance of this plan approval or provide the Department with additional information that he/she believes should be considered prior to the issuance of the plan approval may submit the protest or information to the Department at the address listed. Each written protest or comment should include the following: name, address and telephone number of the person submitting the comments, identification of the proposed Plan Approval 49-313-032H, and a concise statement regarding the relevancy of the information or any objections to the issuance of the plan approval.

A public hearing may be held if the Department, in its discretion, decides that such a hearing is warranted based on the information received. All persons protesting the issuance of plan approval, submitting comments or requesting a hearing will be notified of the decision to hold a hearing by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in Northumberland County, by publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, by letter, or by telephone, where the Department determines such notification by telephone is sufficient. All protests, comments and requests must be received by the Department no later than 30 days after publication of this notice.

S. §§ 6020.101–6020.1305) and the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA) (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 9601–9675), has entered into a settlement relating to the cleanup of the National Precision Casting HSCA Site located at 175 Ravine Road, East Whiteland Township, Chester County, PA (Site). The settlement involves a Consent Order and Agreement between the Department and Ravine Road, L.P. and J. V. D'Ascenzo Construction Company (Settlor), who are potentially responsible parties as current owners of the Site. Settlor did not cause or contribute to the release or threatened release of hazardous substances at the Site.

The Site is a former foundry that was used for casting ferrous and nonferrous molds. Beginning in 1994, the Department conducted an investigation of the Site which revealed contamination of soils at the Site with substances including beryllium, chromium, copper, nickel, lead, zinc, antimony, magnesium, and manganese. In addition, installation and sampling of groundwater monitoring wells at the Site revealed contamination of groundwater with trichloroethylene (TCE). Beginning in November of 1995 through March, 1996, the Department implemented a prompt interim response at the Site. The interim response was carried out at the Site in a manner not inconsistent with the National Contingency Plan (NCP), 40 CFR Part 300, requirements for CERCLA removal actions. As of the date of the Consent Order and Agreement, groundwater contamination remains at the Site at levels above the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for TCE in residential wells. Under the terms of the proposed Consent Order and Agreement, Settlor will make an immediate payment of \$9,000 for response costs incurred or to be incurred by the Department in connection with the Site.

This notice is provided under section 1113 of HSCA (35 P.S. § 6020.1113). The Department will provide for a 60-day public comment period on the proposed Consent Order and Agreement from the date of publication of this Notice. The proposed Consent Order and Agreement may be examined from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Department's office at Lee Park, Suite 6010, 555 North Lane. Mount Milford Site

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1304) (HSCA) has initiated a prompt interim response at the Mount Milford Site in Milford Township, Bucks County, PA. This response has been undertaken under sections 501(a) and 505(b) of HSCA.

The Mount Milford Site is located at 1940 Upper Ridge Road, Milford Township, Bucks County. The Site consists of an abandoned home and a construction-type trailer located behind the home. The trailer was found to contain about 160 five-gallon pails that were labeled "hazardous" and "flammable" during an inspection of a complaint by the Department's Waste Management Program. The site was subsequently referred to the HSCA program. The HSCA Program with the assistance of the Emergency Response Team, conducted an entry in the trailer in order to obtain samples from the pails. UVIR and Flashpoint sampling analyses were performed on the samples collected during this entry.

The results of the Flashpoint analysis by the Department's Bureau of Labs determined that the contents of the buckets are considered to be hazardous wastes (Ignitibility) as defined by 25 PA Code § 261.21. The trailer in which the pails were located became contaminated by waste leakages from the containers. The total volume for the 160 pails is estimated at 800 gallons.

The Department considered two alternatives: 1) No action, which would allow the pails to remain at their present location, and 2) The removal and proper disposal of the pails. The Department determined that the no action alternative would not be protective of public health or safety or the environment. Deterioration of the pails and the trailer which would have resulted in the release of the pails' contents posed an ignition hazard and would have resulted in soil contamination, potential groundwater contamination and a direct contact threat to persons exposed to the drums' contents.

The Department bulked and secured the pails during September 11—21, 2000. This action was taken prior to the development of the Administrative Record to be protective of human health and safety and the environment.

The Department is providing this notice under sections 505(b) and 506(b) of HSCA, and the publication of this notice starts the Administrative Record public comment period under HSCA. The Administrative Record which contains information about this site and which supports the Department's decision to perform this action at the site is available for public review and comment. The Administrative Record can be examined from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Department's Southeastern Regional Office located at Lee Park, 555 North Lane, Suite 6010, Conshohocken, PA 19428, by contacting Robert Zang at (610) 832-6152 for an appointment. S. §§ 745.5(d) and 745.5(g)) provide that the designated standing committees may issue comments within 20 days of the close of the public comment period, and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) may issue comments within 10 days of the close of the committees' comment period. The Commission's Comments are based upon the criteria contained in subsections 5.1(h) and 5.1(i) of the Regulatory Review Act (75 P. S. §§ 745.5a(h) and 745.5a(i)).

Department of Health Regulation No. 10-159 Drug and Alcohol Facilities and Services September 28, 2000

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which has not been met. The Department of Health (Department) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the finalform regulation is not delivered by August 28, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. General.—Economic impact; Protection of the public health, safety and welfare; Reasonableness; Clarity.

Applicable Federal and State laws and regulations

Sections 715.3(e), 715.11, 715.17, 715.23(a) and 715.26(a) contain the phrases "within the provisions of State and Federal confidentiality regulations," "in accordance with applicable Federal and State statutes and regulations" or "required by Federal State statutes and regulations." These vague references do not afford notice as to the specific requirements which must be satisfied. Therefore, the Department should provide citations to the specific sections of the CFR or *Pennsylvania Code* with which compliance is expected.

Staffing ratios

The Department uses ratios to establish minimum requirements for staffing and availability of services. Commentators believe the ratios in sections 715.6(d), 715.6(e), 715.6(f), 715.7(a), 715.8 and 715.19 require more staffing than is necessary, particularly for long-term maintenance patients. These sections contain ratios for physician staffing, dispensing staffing, psychosocial staffing and psychotherapy services. How did the Department develop these ratios? Is each ratio the most reasonable and appropriate to protect public health, safety and welfare? What data supports this determination?

Appeals

Section 715.3, relating to approval of narcotic treatment programs, requires Department approval to operate a program. Section 715.4, relating to patient capacity, requires Department approval to raise the permitted patient capacity of a program. If the Department does not grant approval of either request, what recourse does the applicant have? The Department should clearly establish appeal procedures in the final-form regulation, or crossreference provisions where appeal procedures are delineated.

2. Section 701.1. Definitions.—Consistency with statute and federal regulations; Clarity.

Agent

This term is defined as a "Commonwealth approved opioid pharmacotherapy *agent.*" (Emphasis added.) Definitions should not use the word that is being defined. The Department should replace the word "agent" with an appropriate term such as "controlled substance."

Controlled substance

This term is defined as "a drug, substance, or an immediate precursor included in schedules I through V of The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device, and Cosmetic Act, *or as added, deleted or rescheduled by regulation.*" (Emphasis added.) The phrase "or as added, deleted or rescheduled by regulation" makes the definition inconsistent with the statutory definition. Further, the phrase is not needed and should be deleted from the final-form regulation.

Detoxification of a narcotic dependent person utilizing a Commonwealth approved opioid pharmacotherapy agent

It is not clear why the Department is not using the defined term "agent" in this term and in the definition. The lengthy term and definition would be clearer if the phrase "Commonwealth approved opioid pharmacotherapy agent" was replaced with the defined term "agent."

This comment also applies to the definitions of "maintenance treatment," "medical director," "narcotic treatment program," and "state authority." We suggest that the Department replace the phrase "Commonwealth approved opioid pharmacotherapy agent" with the defined term "agent" in the text of these four definitions.

Maintenance treatment

The definition of this term is not consistent with the definition of the term found in 21 CFR 291.505(a)(2). The proposed definition does not include the other two types of treatment, that is, comprehensive maintenance treatment and interim maintenance treatment. The Department should adopt the CFR definition by reference or explain why the definition of the term in this regulation should not be consistent with the Federal definition.

3. Section 715.2. Relationship of Federal and State regulations.—Clarity.

We have two concerns with Subsection (b). First, the regulation states, "When there is a conflict between this chapter and the Federal regulations, the stricter standard shall apply." No notice is offered indicating the compliance standard. Therefore, this sentence should be deleted. If the Department is or becomes aware of conflicts with Federal requirements, the Department should amend its regulations to address the conflicts.

Second, Subsection (b) states this "chapter is intended to *complement* the Federal regulations...." (Emphasis added.) The term "complement" is not clear. The Department should replace the term "complement" with the term "supplement" or "supercede" to more clearly convey the Department's intent.

4. Section 715.3. Approval of narcotic treatment programs.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) establishes that "an entity shall apply for and receive approval as required from the Department, the DEA and the FDA *or designee*..." (Emphasis added.) It is not clear what the Department intends by the term "designee." The Department should either define "designee" or delete the reference from the final-form regulation.

Subsection (d) states, "The Department *may* inspect the narcotic treatment program without notice. . . ." (Emphasis added.) Senator Vincent Hughes, Minority Chair of the Public Health and Welfare Committee, asked in his comments of September 13, 2000, why the Department has changed the existing notice requirement from "*will* inspect" without notice to "*may* inspect." (Emphasis added.) The Department should advise us of their response to this question.

Subsection (g) does not contain a time limit for narcotic treatment programs to correct deficiencies. Senator Hughes notes in his comments of September 13, 2000, that the existing language in 4 Pa. Code § 263.3(c) provides a conditional approval if cited deficiencies can be

corrected within 60 days. The Department should explain why the proposed regulation does not have a maximum time limit for programs to correct deficiencies.

In Subsection (h)(2), it is not clear when the Department would require the submittal of plans of correction. Would the Department require the plans within 15 working days after the site inspection, or within 15 working days after the program receives the results of the site inspection? Additionally, it is not clear whether "working" days are calendar or business days. The Department should clarify this subsection to address these questions in the final-form regulation.

5. Section 715.5. Patient capacity.—Need; Reasonableness; Clarity.

This section begins with the broad statement, "The Department *may limit* the number of patients a narcotic treatment program may treat at a given time." (Emphasis added.) However, the remainder of this provision relates to criteria the Department will consider when a program requests an increase in the permitted patient capacity. Does the Department intend to use section 715.5 for any other purpose, such as lowering the permitted patient capacity of a program? Can section 715.5 supercede the staffing ratios in section 715.7? The Department should explain the intent of section 715.5 and amend or delete the first sentence accordingly.

This section also requires written approval of the Department to be "based upon *periodic* monitoring and review." (Emphasis added.) It is not clear what time frame is intended by "periodic." This should be clarified in the final-form regulation.

Additionally, it is not clear what criteria are to be used to evaluate the factors listed in Subsections (1) through (5). The Department should list these criteria or reference the applicable citations where appropriate.

6. Section 715.6. Physician staffing.—Need; Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsection (a)(2) allows a program to hire an interim medical director; requires the program to "develop and submit to the Department for approval a training program for the interim medical director;" and requires an interim medical director to meet medical director qualifications within 24 months of being hired. Commentators believe the 24-month limit is unreasonable. They state that certification by the American Society of Addiction Medicine can take up to 3 years. They suggest allowing 36 months for an interim medical director to attain these qualifications. Since the Department must approve the training program, why is the 24-month limit needed?

Subsection (a)(3)(i) requires a medical director to supervise "program physicians." Subsection (b) states that programs may employ "narcotic treatment physicians to assist the medical director." The terms "program physicians" and "narcotic treatment physicians" are not defined. It is not clear if there is a distinction in function between the two positions or if the terms are interchangeable. Whichever term or terms are used in the final-form rulemaking, the Department should use them consistently and define the term or terms in Section 701.1.

7. Section 715.8. Psychosocial staffing.—Clarity.

This section does not specify the ratio in Chapter 704 that psychosocial staffing must meet. Section 704.12 contains ratios that vary, depending on whether the position is considered "counselor" or "primary care staff." As defined in Section 701.1, the terms "counselor" and "primary care staff" both include counseling. As a result,

it is not clear which ratio applies to psychosocial staffing. The Department should reference the specific staffing ratio that applies to psychosocial staffing in Section 704.12.

8. Section 715.9. Intake.—Clarity.

Under Subsection (a)(1), a program is required to "verify that the individual has reached the *age of major-ity*." (Emphasis added.) To avoid confusion, the Department should replace "age of majority" with the more specific "age of 18."

9. Section 715.10. Pregnant patients.—Protection of the public health, safety and welfare.

Under 21 CFR 291.505(d)(1)(iii)(B)(5), the program sponsor must "ensure that each female patient is fully informed of the possible risks to her or her unborn child from continued use of illicit drugs and from the use of, or withdrawal from, a narcotic drug administered or dispensed by the program in comprehensive maintenance or detoxification treatment." Why is this requirement not included in Section 715.10?

10. Section 715.12. Informed patient consent.— Clarity.

This section requires "an informed, voluntary consent" before an agent can be administered to a patient. It is not clear what information must be provided to the patient and whether the consent must be written. The Department should clarify the requirement for "informed, voluntary consent."

11. Section 715.13. Patient identification.—Clarity.

In Subsection (a) the term "develop" should be replaced with the term "use."

12. Section 715.14. Urine testing.—Need; Reasonableness; Economic impact; Clarity.

Failure of a urine test

This section and Section 715.21 (relating to patient termination) do not directly mention the consequence of failing a urine test. The Department should explain what happens if a patient's urine test detects and continues to detect any of the drugs in Subsection (a).

Subsection (a)

This subsection requires a random urinalysis at least monthly. Commentators believe that a patient, in the first 2 years of treatment, needs a urinalysis a minimum of once per week. Why is the Department requiring only monthly testing?

Subsection (b)

This subsection requires the program "to ensure that urine collected from patients is unadulterated." This subsection also requires random observation "to be conducted professionally, ethically and in a manner that protects patient privacy."

We have two questions. First, is the observer required to be a licensed healthcare professional? Second, how can a program both ensure the sample is unadulterated and conduct an observation "in a manner that protects patient privacy"?

Subsection (c)

Commentators believe establishing a "chain of custody" for urine specimens is costly and unnecessary. The Department should explain the need for a chain of custody and how the benefits outweigh the costs. For clarity, the Department should consider replacing the phrase "... traced to the person to whom it belongs" with the phrase "... traced to the donor."

13. Section 715.15. Medication dosage.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) states, "A narcotic treatment program may not administer an agent..." Subsection (c) allows methadone, an agent, to be "administered or dispensed." For clarity, the Department should add the term "dispense" to Subsection (a) in the final-form regulation.

14. Section 715.16. Take-home privileges.-Clarity.

Subsection (a) includes the sentence "The physician shall make this determination after consultations with *appropriate staff within the program.*" (Emphasis added.) The phrase "appropriate staff within the program" is unclear. The Department should amend this section to state with which staff the physician must consult.

15. Section 715.17. Medication control.—Clarity.

This section includes requirements for narcotic treatment programs to store, compound, administer and dispense medication. We have three issues with this section.

First, Subsection (c)(1)(iii) states, "Only patients shall be permitted in the dispensing area." We understand the intent is to restrict persons other than employes of the narcotic treatment program and the patient from entering the dispensing area. For clarity, this subsection should be amended to reflect that authorized employees are also allowed to enter the dispensing area.

Second, Subsection (c)(2) states "A narcotic treatment program shall develop and implement written policies and procedures regarding where and how medications are stored... Agents shall be stored in a locked safe that has been approved by the DEA." Section 715.26, relating to security, requires that "A narcotic treatment program shall meet the security standards for the distribution and storage of controlled substances as required by Federal and State statutes and regulations." The requirements for storage are unclear, specifically in dealing with a narcotic treatment program that stores a small amount of an agent in a secure area.

Specifically, 21 CFR 1301.72 and 1301.74 cover the requirements for the storage and security of controlled substances in general. For greater clarity, the Department should consider incorporating by reference 21 CFR 1301.72 and 1301.74 in both this section and Section 715.26, relating to security.

Finally, the phrase "adequately documented" in Subsection (c)(3)(iv) is unclear. The Department should clarify this phrase in the final-form regulation.

16. Section 715.18. Rehabilitative services.—Consistency with Federal regulations; Clarity.

This section requires a narcotic treatment program to "provide ... a full range of rehabilitative services, which shall include legal services, employment services, HIV education services, public health services, adult educational services and behavioral health services." Federal regulations, specifically 21 CFR 291.505(d)(4) and (d)(4)(i)(C) require each narcotic treatment program to provide "medical and rehabilitative services and programs" and "counseling on HIV disease," respectively. However, 21 CFR 291.505(d)(4)(iv) requires narcotic treatment programs to "provide opportunities" for vocational rehabilitation, education and employment. For consistency with the Federal regulations, the Department should clearly state that, while programs are required to provide HIV services and public health services, a program shall also provide opportunities for patients to access legal services, employment services, adult educational services and behavioral health services.

17. Section 715.20. Patient transfers.—Need and Clarity.

This section requires narcotic treatment programs to develop policies and procedures for transferring patients from one narcotic treatment program to another. There is nothing in Section 715.20 that indicates the patient's records are confidential. The Department should consider cross-referencing Section 715.11, relating to the confidentiality of patient records, in this section to clarify that patient records will continue to be confidential even if transferred to another narcotic treatment program.

Section 715.20 also requires a narcotic treatment program to transfer patients within seven days of their request. We have two concerns. First, the Department should explain how this seven-day timeframe was arrived at, and why it is necessary. Second, is a "request" required to be in writing?

18. Section 715.21. Patient termination.—Clarity.

This section outlines the policies and procedures for a patient's involuntary termination from a program. We have two issues regarding this section. First, commentators have suggested including "nonpayment" as a cause for involuntary termination from a program. The Department should add "nonpayment" to the list or explain why it should not be included.

Second, Paragraph (1)(iii) includes the phrase "excessively absent." This phrase is unclear. For clarity, the Department should include in this paragraph the standards for determining when absences become excessive.

19. Section 715.22. Patient grievance procedures.— Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsection (a) requires a narcotic treatment program to develop and utilize a patient grievance procedure. Subsection (b) states "... if the grievance is filed against the narcotic treatment program director, the review of the case shall be conducted by the governing body."

Commentators have noted that such an arrangement may not be in the best interests of the patient. A multi-representative group of the narcotic treatment program may be better suited to render judgment in such cases. The Department should consider allowing grievances against the program director to be heard by either a multi-representative group or a sub-committee of the governing body instituted for the express purposes of grievance adjudication.

Additionally, the final-form regulations should clarify that grievances can be appealed to the Department.

20. Section 715.23. Patient records.—Clarity.

Subsection (e) requires all patient records, information and documentation be "maintained on standardized forms." Will these forms be developed and provided by the Department? Also, will the Department allow records to be maintained electronically? If so, the Department should include the phrase "provided by the Department" in Subsection (e) of the final-form regulation, and clarify whether files can be maintained electronically.

21. Section 715.25. Prohibition of medical units.— Clarity.

Section 715.25 prohibits medical units from operating within the Commonwealth. We have two concerns with this section. First, commentators have argued that, because the number of narcotic treatment facilities is so few, it is difficult for patients to continue treatment at the program, as well as employment. Given the limited number of treatment facilities, the Department should explain its rationale for prohibiting medical units in Pennsylvania.

Second, the exact meaning of the term "medical unit" is unclear. For clarity, the Department should consider citing the specific federal regulation that defines medical units in this section.

22. Section 715.28 Unusual incidents.—Need and Clarity.

Subsection (c) requires narcotic treatment programs to file "Unusual Incidence Reports." An "unusual incident" under Subsection (c)(1) includes "Complaints of patient abuse (physical, verbal, sexual, emotional, financial)." The phrase "financial abuse" is unclear. The Department should clarify what constitutes financial abuse in the final-form regulation.

Additionally, there are a number of terms and phrases that are unclear in Section 715.28. These include:

• "inappropriate behavior" in Subsection (a)(1);

• "unusual circumstances" in the section title and Subsections (a)(5) and (c)(2);

• "significant disruption" in Subsections (a)(6) and (c)(3);

 \bullet "unusual incident" in Subsections (a)(9) and (b)(1); and

• "timely and appropriate" in Subsection (b)(3).

The Department should provide specific criteria for determining these standards or delete them in the finalform regulation.

Medical Malpractice Insurance Carriers and Self-Insured Health Care Providers

Insurance companies that offer basic limits medical malpractice coverage are required to report medical malpractice claims information to the Medical Professional Liability Catastrophe Loss Fund (Fund) and to the Insurance Department (Department) for insureds who are subject to the provisions of The Health Care Services Malpractice Act (40 P. S. §§ 1301.701—1301.1004) (act). Organizations and physicians that self-insure their medical malpractice exposures are also required to report this claims information. These reports are required under section 809 of the act (40 P. S. § 1301.809), as amended by the act of November 26, 1996 (P. L. 776, No. 135).

The claims information must be reported to the Fund and to the Department. The following Calendar Year 1999 claims information is due to the Fund and to the Department by November 1, 2000:

- the aggregate amount of premium earned;
- the aggregate amount of losses paid;
- the aggregate amount of losses incurred;
- the aggregate amount of loss reserves outstanding;
- the aggregate amount of loss adjustment expenses paid;

 the aggregate amount of loss adjustment expenses incurred;

• the aggregate amount of loss adjustment expense reserves outstanding;

• a table showing separately by accident year and county the number of claims first reported, (or arising), in 1999;

• a table showing separately by accident year and disposition (that is, judgement of arbitration panel, judgment of court, settlement, or other) the number of claims closed, (or disposed), in 1999;

• a separate table for each type of disposition identified above showing for claims closed (or disposed), in 1999 separately by accident year: the number of claims closed, (or disposed), with payment; the total losses incurred for those claims closed with payment; the basic coverage premiums collected.

Reports must be submitted in both printed form and in electronic form as an Excel spreadsheet. The forms for submission and preformatted Excel spreadsheets have been mailed and should arrive by October 1, 2000.

Medical Professional Liability Catastrophe Loss Fund Surcharge Filing

The Medical Professional Liability Catastrophe Loss Fund has filed for a 61% surcharge under the Health Care Services Malpractice Act (40 P. S. §§ 1301.101— 1301.1006), commonly known as Act 111, as amended by Act 135 of 1996.

The filing indicates the following:

"This year's surcharge percentage calculation is premised on the Joint Underwriting Association's Rates approved as of this date [September 29, 2000], and effective January 1, 2001." The surcharge applies to any new policies effective on or after January 1, 2001.

By the Commission:

On June 28, 2000, the Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff instituted a complaint against Northeast Energy Services, Inc. (the Respondent), an Electric Generation Supplier licensed at A-110066. In the complaint, Prosecutory Staff alleged that the Commission sent by certified mail notices to the Respondent that pursuant to 66 Pa.C.S. § 510, its 1999-2000 Annual Assessment in the amount of \$52.00 was due. The complaint charged that the Respondent violated 66 Pa.C.S. § 510(c) by neither paying the assessment nor filing objections.

The complaint sought the following remedies:

(1) that the Commission issue an order canceling the Respondent's license if Respondent failed to answer the complaint within 20 days of receipt of the complaint, and

(2) that the Commission issue an order referring the total outstanding assessment balance to the Attorney General's office for appropriate civil collection action.

It Is Ordered:

1. That the allegations in the Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff's complaint are deemed admitted and the complaint is thereby sustained.

2. That the Secretary serve a copy of this order upon all affected distribution utilities and providers of last resort in the areas served by Northeast Energy Services, Inc., and also cause a copy of this order to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 20-day comment period.

3. That Northeast Energy Services, Inc. immediately cease providing service to any new customers and, within 10 days of the entry date of this order, provide a written notice to each existing customer directing each to select an alternative electric generation supplier within 30 days of the date of the notice. Such notice must include a statement of the Commission's intent to cancel the company's license absent adverse public comment within the 20-day time constraint established pursuant to Ordering Paragraph No. 2, above.

4. That absent the filing of adverse public comment, 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and without further action by the Commission, the license held by Northeast Energy Services, Inc. at Docket No. A-110066 shall be cancelled, and the company's name stricken from all active-utility lists maintained by the Tariff and Annual Report Section of the Commission's

Bureau of Fixed Utility Services and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Audits.

5.
