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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania* *Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

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Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified above for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701–1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes* provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the Laws of Pennsylvania are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the Laws of Pennsylvania to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$20.

Title 58—RECREATION

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 139] Seasons and Bag Limits

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its April 9, 2002, meeting, adopted the following changes:

Amend § 139.4 (relating to seasons and bag limits for the license year) to provide dates for the 2002-2003 hunting license year.

These final-form amendments were adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

1. Introduction

The Commission, at its January 15, 2002, meeting proposed, and at its April 9, 2002, meeting finally adopted, amending § 139.4 to provide for seasons and bag limits for the 2002-2003 license year. See 32 Pa.B. 1401 (March 16, 2001). These seasons and bag limits were adopted under the provisions of sections 322(c)(1) and 2102(b)(1) of code (relating to powers and duties of commission; and regulations). Major changes for the 2002-2003 year include a new ringneck pheasant season for eligible junior hunters only; an antler size restriction on antlered deer; and a separate additional bear season for the Counties of Carbon, Monroe and Pike.

2. Purpose and Authority

The Commission is required to set hunting and furtaking seasons and bag limits on an annual basis. Section 322(c) of the code specifically empowers the Commission to "... fix seasons... and daily season and possession limits for any species of game or wildlife." Section 2102(b) of the code mandates that the Commission promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits.

Major changes that have been finally adopted for the 2002-2003 season are primarily intended to increase the hunting opportunities for eligible junior hunters, decrease the harvest of antlered deer while encouraging the harvest of antlerless deer and decrease the amount of damage caused by bears in the counties of Carbon, Monroe and Pike. Major changes are as follows:

a. A concurrent antlered and antlerless deer season will continue to encourage the harvesting of antlerless deer while a size limitation on the antlers of antlered deer that can be legally harvested should discourage the harvesting of antlered deer, except in the special regulations areas, junior hunters, disabled hunters with a permit to use a vehicle and residents serving on active military duty or in the United Sates Coast Guard who will be able to remain with the current antler restriction with two or more points to one antler or with one antler 3 inches or more in length.

b. There will be an early muzzleloader season, which will allow the use of any muzzleloading long gun.

c. Junior hunters will be given increased opportunities by way of a separate ringneck pheasant hunting season.

d. There will be an additional separate 6 day bear season in Carbon, Monroe and Pike Counties to try to reduce the population and, as a result, the damage caused by bears.

e. A week has been added to the fall turkey season in Turkey Management Area #7-A.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form seasons and bag limits would establish when and where it is lawful to hunt and trap various game species and place limits on the numbers that can be legally taken.

4. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt and trap in this Commonwealth would be affected by the seasons and bag limits.

5. Comment and Response Summary

A total of 405 official comments were received with regard to the concurrent antlered/antlerless season. Those supporting pointed out that concurrent seasons allowed them to make more efficient use of their time afield; felt it would lead to improved management of this Commonwealth's deer herd; and enabled them to put venison on the family table. Those opposing ranked safety concerns as the top reason. Many described being afield in the 2001-2002 concurrent season and witnessing uncontrolled shooting; many deer being left in the field as a result of shots not being followed up and cases of outrageous, unsportsmanlike conduct.

A total of 100 official comments were received with regard to the use of any long gun in the early muzzleloading season. Those supporting pointed out that inlines and percussion long guns are more efficient methods of taking antlerless deer. Those opposing said that this adoption would erode the long-standing tradition of flintlock muzzleloading deer hunting in this Commonwealth.

A total of 262 official comments were received with regard to the junior license holder being able to use his general license to take an antlered or antlerless deer. Those supporting felt this expanded opportunity would help to recruit and retain new, young hunters. Those opposing noted concerns with unregulated antlerless harvest; the view that adults would do the shooting and use youngster's general tag; that this liberal approach would not teach youngsters the important lessons of patience and required hunting skills.

No official comments were received with regard to the remaining final-form amendments.

6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form new seasons and bag limits would not result in any additional cost either to the Commission or to hunters and furtakers.

7. Effective Date

The final-form amendments will be effective from July 1, 2002, to June 30, 2003.

Findings

The Game Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the administrative amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute. Order

The Commission, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

(A) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 139, are amended by amending § 139.4 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(B) The Executive Director of the Commission shall submit this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law. (C) This order shall become effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and apply retroactively to July 1, 2002.

MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS

Except as further restricted by this chapter, the seasons, bag limits, hunting hours and hunting regulations for migratory game birds shall conform to regulations adopted by the United States Secretary of the Interior under authority of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C.A. §§ 703—711) as published in the Federal Register on or about August 27 and September 28 of each year. Exceptions:

(a) Hunting hours in § 141.4 (relating to hunting hours).

(b) Nontoxic shot as approved by the Director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service is required for use Statewide in hunting and taking of migratory waterfowl.

(c) Subject to approval by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, an early and late season for Canada geese will be held as defined in § 141.25.

Code § 13.74

PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN, VOL. 32, NO. 28, JULY 13, 2002

(relating to effectiveness prior to publication) by press release dated July 5, 2002, of the following changes to the Powerball regulations.

These changes will affect ticket sales beginning on Sunday, October 6, 2002, for the Powerball drawing on Wednesday, October 9, 2002. The changes to the regulation will be codified as paragraph (1) in § 871.22 (relating to changes to Powerball):

(1) Changes effective for Powerball tickets sold on or after October 6, 2002:

(i) Section 871.2 (relating to game description and purpose). Powerball is a five out of 53 plus one out of 42 on-line lottery game.

(ii) Section 871.9(e) (relating to Powerball prize payments). All annuitized prizes shall be paid in 30 annual payments with the initial payment being made in cash, to be followed by 29 equal annual payments funded by the annuity. The initial payment of an annuitized prize may be made by the Lottery upon validation of the winning ticket.

(iii) Section 871.15 (relating to unclaimed prize money). Unclaimed grand prize and new bonus prize funds will be distributed among all MUSL Lotteries in proportion to each lottery's sales for the grand prize drawing.

(iv) Section 871.19 (relating to probability of winning). The probability of winning is a follows:

(v) Section 871.20(c) and (j) (relating to power play promotion). A player may purchase the power play option for the chance to multiply set prizes won as a result of the Powerball drawing by a number ranging from 2 to 5. The power play number will be selected from among the following series of numbers: 2, 2, 2, 3, 3, 3, 4, 4, 4, 5, 5, 5, 5, 5 and 5. Except as otherwise provided, all power play set prizes shall be paid in single, lump-sum payments determined by multiplying the Powerball set prize by the number selected in the power play drawing as follows:

(vi) New bonus prize.

(A) When the Powerball jackpot is projected to reach a new high annuitized level, the amount of the jackpot prize will be limited, by rule, to increases for each draw of no more than \$25 million (annuitized). The prize money collected in excess of the advertised jackpot amount, if any, will be placed into a bonus prize pool and will accumulate until there is a grand prize winner. When there is a grand prize winner, the bonus prize pool will be divided equally among all winners of the second prize. This bonus prize will be paid in one cash lump sum. If there are no second prize winners, the prize pool shall be divided equally among the winners in the next lower prize tier with winners.

(B) There may be times when the second prize will be increased from its current set amount of \$100,000 to a higher amount. In those cases, the second prize may be increased to \$1 million or more. The actual amount of the prize will depend upon the cash available in the new bonus prize pool and the number of prize winners as set forth in clause (A). The trigger jackpot level will naturally increase over time as the new high annuitized jackpot amount continues to climb.

(C) The new bonus prize is in addition to any power play prizes that may be won. The new bonus prize is awarded independent of the power play option, and is not multiplied by the power play multiplier. A bonus prize winner who also played the power play option will win the original set prize amounts; the amount paid under the power play multiplier option; and the new bonus prize (if effective).

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

[31 PA. CODE CH. 165]

Workers' Compensation Security Fund

The Insurance Department (Department) proposes to add Chapter 165 (relating to Workers' Compensation Security Fund) to read as set forth in Annex A. The proposal is made under the authority of sections 205, 506, 1501 and 1502 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 66, 186, 411 and 412) and the Workers Compensation Security Fund Act (77 P. S. §§ 1051—1066).

The purpose of this proposed rulemaking is to administer the Workers Compensation Security Fund (Fund) Act and to establish how contributions are to be made to the Fund. This original statute was adopted in 1937 and amended in 2000 to establish standards for the administration of the Fund.

Explanation of Proposed Rulemaking

Section 165.1 (relating to purpose) establishes the purpose of the chapter.

Section 165.2 (relating to scope) establishes the scope of the chapter.

Section 165.3 (relating to applicability) establishes the applicability of the chapter.

Section 165.4 (relating to definitions) defines the terms to be used throughout the chapter unless the context requires otherwise.

Section 165.5 (relating to administration) determines the process utilized to administer the Fund and secure actuarial services.

Section 165.6 (relating to amount of Fund) establishes the formula to be used in calculating the assessment to bring the fund to the minimum amount necessary to ensure a \$500 million fund balance. This formula includes liabilities for the next year, the expenses to administer the fund for the next year and takes into account investment earnings of the fund.

Section 165.7 (relating to assessment) establishes how the contributions shall be made to the Fund and how the Fund shall be administered.

Section 165.8 (relating to failure to comply) establishes the penalties for failing to comply.

Fiscal Impact

State Government

There will be no increase in cost to the Department due to the adoption of the proposed rulemaking.

General Public

The adoption of the proposed rulemaking will not impose additional costs on the general public.

Political Subdivisions

The adoption of the proposed rulemaking will not impose additional costs on political subdivisions.

Private Sector

The proposed rulemaking may result in a savings of \$1 million to the private sector (insurance industry) over a 5-year period.

Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking will not result in additional paperwork requirement on the Department.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

The proposed rulemaking will become effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* as a final-form regulation. No sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on July 2, 2002, the Department submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the Senate Banking and Insurance Committee and the House Insurance Committee. In addition to the submitted proposed rulemaking, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of that material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed rulemaking, it will notify the Department within 10 days after the close of the Committees' review. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria that have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for the Department, the Governor and the General Assembly to review these objections before final publication of the regulations.

§ 165.1. Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to:

(1) Establish how contributions are made to the Fund.

(2) Ensure that a person, entitled to workers' compensation payments from insolvent carriers, will still have a source of funds on which to draw those payments.

§ 165.2. Scope.

This chapter establishes the minimum Fund amount and when contributions are necessary.

§ 165.3. Applicability.

This chapter applies to carriers doing the business of workers' compensation insurance in this Commonwealth.

§ 165.4. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context indicates otherwise:

Act—The Workers Compensation Security Fund Act (77 P. S. §§ 1051—1066).

Carrier—As defined in section 2 of the act (77 P.S. § 1052).

Certificate of authority—As required by section 208 of The Insurance Department Act of 1921 (40 P.S. § 46).

Commissioner—The Insurance Commissioner of the Commonwealth.

Department—The Insurance Department of the Commonwealth.

Fund—As defined in section 2 of the act.

§ 165.5. Administration.

The Fund may secure, using Commonwealth procurement standards:

(1) A third party administrator to perform claim assessment and handling, and administrative duties and responsibilities.

(2) Actuarial services to provide an annual liability report and to do the analysis described in § 165.6 (relating to amount of fund) to determine the assessment.

§ 165.6. Amount of Fund.

(a) A minimum balance of \$500 million shall be maintained in the Fund.

(b) If, due to the payment of liabilities or claims, the balance of the Fund is reduced below \$500 million, the Department, in order to return the Fund to the \$500 million level, will require contributions sufficient to fund:

(1) The current shortage below \$500 million.

(2) Plus the expected payment of liabilities for the next calendar year.

(3) Plus expenses to administer the Fund for the next calendar year.

(4) Less expected investment earnings on the Fund balance during the next calendar year.

§ 165.7. Assessment.

(a) The amount of an assessment will be determined by using the actuarial services described in § 165.5 (relating to administration).

(b) Every carrier, doing the business of workers' compensation insurance in this Commonwealth, will be assessed, based on a prorata share of the total amount of net-written premiums of workers' compensation insurance reported as written in the previous calendar year's annual statement.

(c) The assessment, when necessary, will be billed by December 31 of the year subsequently used in the actuarial study.

(d) Payment of the assessment, when applicable, is be due by March 31 of the year following the assessment.

§ 165.8. Failure to comply.

(a) If a carrier fails to file a return, or make any payment required by the act, or in case the Commissioner has cause to believe that a return or other statement filed is false or inaccurate in any particular, or that a payment made is incorrect, the Commissioner has full authority to examine all the books and records of the carrier for the purpose of ascertaining the facts and determine the correct amount to be paid. The Commissioner may proceed in any court of competent jurisdiction to recover for the benefit of the Fund any sums shown to be due upon the examination and determination.

(b) A carrier that fails to make a statement as required by the act, or to pay any contribution when due, thereby forfeits to the Fund a penalty of 5% of the amount of unpaid contribution determined to be due, as provided by the act, plus 1% of the amount for each month of delay or fraction thereof after the expiration of the first month of the delay.

(c) The Commissioner will revoke the certificate of authority to do business in this Commonwealth of a carrier which fails to comply with the act or to pay a penalty imposed in accordance with the act.


The Executive Board approved a reorganization of the Department of Community and Economic Development effective June 17, 2002.

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION

Commission Meeting and Public Hearing

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold an informal conference followed by a public hearing on Wednesday, July 17, 2002. The hearing will be part of the Commission's regular business meeting. Both the conference session and business meeting are open to the public and will be held at the Commission offices at 25 State Police Drive, West Trenton, NJ.

The conference among the Commissioners and staff will begin at 10 a.m. Topics of discussion will include an update on the Comprehensive Plan (CP); reports on the PCB TMDL development effort; a report on the development of water quality criteria for toxic pollutants; a report on the Flow Management Technical Advisory Committee meeting of June 25, 2002; and an update on Flood Advisory Committee activities.

The subjects of the public hearing to be held during the 1 p.m. business meeting include, in addition to the following dockets: a resolution amending Docket D-77-20 CP (Revision 5); a resolution amending Docket D-77-110 CP by the addition of a "Designated Unit" to Table A (Revised); and a resolution concerning the declaration of drought emergency issued by the Commission on December 18, 2001.

The dockets scheduled for public hearing are as follows:

1. Holdover Project: Mercer County Improvement Authority D-99-28 CP. A project to construct a surface water intake on Assunpink Creek at Mercer Lake to withdraw 2.6 million gallons per day (mgd) of water. The new intake, in addition to an existing intake that can provide 1.3 mgd, will irrigate the applicant's Mercer Oaks II Golf Course located in West Windsor Township, Mercer County, NJ.

2. Conshohocken Borough Authority D-2001-59 CP. A project to rerate a 2.3 mgd sewage treatment plant (STP) to treat 2.35 mgd on an average monthly basis and up to 3 mgd as a maximum monthly flow. The STP will continue to provide high quality secondary treatment and discharge to the Schuylkill River through the existing outfall. The project is located at Elm and Jones Streets in Conshohocken Borough, Montgomery County, PA. The plant will continue to serve Conshohocken Borough, plus portions of Whitemarsh and Plymouth Townships, all within Montgomery County.

3. Newark Country Club D-2002-12. A groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 2.1 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's golf course from new Well No.5 in the Christianstead Gneiss Formation, and to increase the existing withdrawal from all wells to 5.0 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Christina River and White Clay Creek watersheds in the City of Newark, New Castle County, DE.

4. *Bidermann Golf Club D-2002-13.* A groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 0.864 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's golf course from new Well No. 5 in the Wissahickon Formation, and to increase the existing withdrawal from all sources to 15.8 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Brandywine Creek watershed in the City of Wilmington, New Castle County, DE.

5. Town of Roxbury D-2002-14 CP. A project to withdraw up to 12.6 mg/30 days from new Well No. 1 and existing Well No. 2, both in the Catskill Formation and to export 0.3 mgd of water, half in the form of raw sewage from failing onlot systems and half as ground water supply, from the Hamlet of Roxbury in the Delaware River Basin to the Hamlet of Grand Gorge in the Mohawk-Hudson River Basin. Both hamlets are located in the Town of Roxbury, Delaware County, NY. The groundwater withdrawal is proposed for use in both the Town of Roxbury and the Town of Grand Forge The raw sewage will be conveyed by means of force main to the existing NYCDEP Grand Gorge Sewage Treatment Plant located off State Route 23, and following treatment will be discharged to adjacent Bear Creek.

6. *Fifer Orchards, Inc. D-2002-20.* A groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 51.45 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's orchard from new Wells Nos. 6 and 7, in the Columbia/Choptank and Columbia Formations, respectively, and to limit the existing withdrawal from all sources to 543 mg/30 days. The project is located in the St. Jones River watershed in the City of Wyoming, Kent County, DE.

In addition to the public hearing items, the Commission will address the following at its 1 p.m. business meeting: minutes of the May 31, 2002, business meeting; announcements; a report on Basin hydrologic conditions; a report by the Executive Director; and a report by the Commission's General Counsel, including consideration by the Commission of an agreement reached by the Petitioners in the appeal of Docket No. D-98-11 CP of the Pennsylvania Suburban Water Company (the Cornog Quarry project). The meeting will end with an opportunity for public dialogue.

The Program will award bill reimbursement grants of up to \$10,000 per recipient to humane societies or associations for the prevention of cruelty to animals that meet the guidelines and conditions of this Program. The Program will be funded from the Dog Law Restricted Account, from funds which are hereby declared to be "surplus" funds for the limited purposes set forth in the Dog Law (3 P. S. §§ 459-101—459-551).

The proposed guidelines and conditions for the Program are set forth as follows. These proposed guidelines and conditions are substantively identical to the guidelines and conditions for "Year 2002 Dog Control Facility Bill Reimbursement Grant Program," published at 31 Pa.B. 4545 (August 18, 2001), with three exceptions: (1) the total amount of grant funds available has increased to \$200,000 (up from \$175,000 in 2002); (2) the maximum per-recipient grant amount has been raised to \$10,000 (up from \$7,500 in 2002); and (3) the eligibility criteria have been expanded to allow a grant applicant to have a maximum total operating budget of up to \$350,000 (up from \$250,000 in 2002).

In fulfillment in 7 Pa. Code § 23.4 (relating to guidelines and conditions), the Department invites public and legislative review of these proposed guidelines and conditions. Commentators should submit their comments, in writing, so they are received by the Department no later than 30 days from the date the proposed guidelines and conditions are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Comments should be directed to Richard Hess, Director, Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement, Department of Agriculture, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408.

The Department will review and consider all written comments in preparing the final guidelines and conditions for the Program. The final guidelines and conditions for the Program will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* after the close of the comment period referenced. The Department will invite the submission of grant applications at that time.

Proposed Guidelines and Conditions for the Year 2003 Dog Control Facility Bill Reimbursement Grant Program

1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in these guidelines and conditions, have the following meanings:

Department—The Department of Agriculture.

Dog control—The apprehending, holding and disposing of stray or unwanted dogs, or as otherwise defined in the Dog Law.

Eligible Bill—A document seeking payment for materials, services or utilities from a grant recipient, setting forth the following:

i. The date the document is issued.

ii. The name and address of the humane society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals to which the bill is issued.

iii. If for materials, a description of the materials and the date of delivery.

iv. If for services, a description of the nature of the services and the dates upon which the services were rendered.

v. If for utilities (such as electricity, water, sewer, waste disposal and similar purposes), a statement of the period for which the utility, for which payment is sought, was provided. vi. The name, address and telephone number of the entity issuing the document.

Humane society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals—A nonprofit society or association duly incorporated under 15 Pa.C.S. §§ 5301—5311 (relating to incorporation generally) for the purpose of prevention of cruelty to animals, or as otherwise defined in Section 102 of the Dog Law (3 P. S. § 459-102).

Program—The Year 2003 Dog Control Facility Bill Reimbursement Program.

2. Eligibility.

A humane society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals is eligible to apply to receive a grant under the Program if that humane society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals:

a. Has been in operation for at least 1 year immediately preceding the application date.

b. Has performed dog control functions for at least 1 year immediately preceding the application date.

c. Has, in the performance of its dog control functions, accepted at least 100 stray or unwanted dogs into its facility within the year immediately preceding the application date.

d. Is not a party to a contract with the Department under which the Department pays that humane society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals for dog control activities performed in the year 2003.

e. Agrees—as a condition of receiving any grant money under the Program—to continue to perform dog control activities through the year 2003.

f. Has a total operating budget of \$350,000 or less for the 2003 calendar year or, if its budget is on a basis other than calendar year, has a total operating budget of \$350,000 or less for each fiscal year comprising any portion of calendar year 2003.

3. Use of Grant Funds.

The Department will allocate a specific maximum grant amount to a successful grant applicant through a written grant agreement. This maximum grant amount will be specified in the grant agreement and will not exceed \$10,000 with respect to any application. The maximum grant amount will be retained by the Department and used to reimburse the grant recipient for eligible bills the grant recipient has paid with respect to materials, services or utilities provided to the grant recipient from January 1, 2003, through December 31, 2003. The total reimbursement the Department will pay a grant recipient will not exceed the maximum grant amount. Money remaining in a grant allocation beyond the termination date of the grant agreement will lapse into the Dog Law Restricted Account. If a bill covers materials, services or utilities provided, in whole or in part, before January 1, 2003, or after December 31, 2003, that bill is not an eligible bill and will not be reimbursed by the Department under the Program.

4. Application Process.

a. Application required. A humane society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals seeking a grant under the Program must complete a written application form and deliver it to the Department no later than 30 days from the date this notice is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin.* Applications received by the Department beyond that date will not be considered. b. *Obtaining an application form.* The Department will provide grant application forms upon request. Requests for application forms should be directed to Richard Hess, Director, Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement, Department of Agriculture, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408, (717) 787-4833, fax: (717) 772-4352.

c. *Contents of grant application form.* A grant application form shall require the following information:

i. The name and address of the applicant.

ii. Information to verify that the applicant is a humane society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals and otherwise meets the eligibility requirements set forth in paragraph 2.

iii. The maximum grant amount sought by the applicant—not to exceed \$10,000.

iv. A description of the eligible bills for which the grant applicant intends to seek reimbursement, including a description (and copies, if available) of bills received by the applicant in 2002 for the same type of materials, services or utilities for which reimbursement will be sought under the grant agreement.

v. Other information as the Department might reasonably require.

5. Review and approval of grant application.

a. *Review and notification.* The Department will review each timely grant application and provide the applicant written notification of whether the Department awards the grant, denies the grant or awards a grant in some amount less than the applicant sought. This written notification will be mailed no later than 60 days from the date this notice is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, to the address provided by the applicant on the grant application form. If an application is incomplete or the Department requires additional information or documentation in order to evaluate the grant request, it will so advise the applicant.

b. *Review criteria.* The Department will consider the following, among other factors, in determining whether to award a grant application:

i. The number of applications received and the availability of funds for the grants sought.

ii. The relative contribution of the applicant to dog control activities in the area it serves.

iii. The relative contribution of the applicant to dog control as compared to the relative contribution of other applicants.

iv. The relative importance of the grant to the continued operation of the applicant's dog control facility. v. The expense or logistical difficulty the Department would encounter if the applicant's dog control facility was no longer in operation.

6. Grant agreement.

a. *Grant agreement required.* A successful grant applicant must execute a grant agreement with the Department, setting forth the terms and conditions under which the grant money will be used by the Department to reimburse the grant recipient for payment of eligible bills.

b. *Reimbursement requests.* The grant agreement will set forth the exact procedure by which a grant recipient shall seek reimbursement from the Department for payment of eligible bills. The basic reimbursement request procedure will be as follows:

By May 15, 2003, the grant recipient will: (1) deliver copies of the eligible bills it has paid between January 1, 2003, and April 30, 2003; (2) verify that these bills have been paid and are eligible for reimbursement; and (3) provide a detailed report of the dog control activities performed by the successful applicant during the referenced 4-month period.

By September 15, 2003, the grant recipient will: (1) deliver copies of the eligible bills it has paid between May 1, 2003, and August 31, 2003; (2) verify that these bills have been paid and are eligible for reimbursement; and (3) provide a detailed report of the dog control activities performed by the successful applicant during the referenced 4-month period.

By January 15, 2004, the grant recipient will: (1) deliver copies of the eligible bills it has paid between September 1, 2003, and December 31, 2003; (2) verify that these bills have been paid and are eligible for reimbursement; and (3) provide a detailed report of the dog control activities performed by the successful applicant during the referenced 4-month period.

c. *Payment by the Department.* The Department will reimburse a grant recipient for eligible bills within 60 days of receiving a complete and timely reimbursement request.

d. *Termination.* The Department may terminate a grant agreement at any time by providing the grant recipient written notice of termination at the address set forth on the grant application.

Community Conservation Partnerships Program

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (Department) announces an open application period beginning July 15, 2002, for funding of planning, acquisition, development and technical assistance projects for the Community Conservation Partnerships Program (Program).

In response to survey recommendations received from our grant applicants and workshop participants, the Department scheduled preapplication workshops earlier this year. Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101-6026.908)

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

D. The company shall install, operate and maintain the carbon adsorption system in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications as well as good air pollution control practices.

E. The company shall restrict the natural draft openings to 240 square feet, or less, around the rubber mat press.

F. The minimum flow rate into the carbon adsorber shall be 12,000 cfm.

2. Emission Limitations

A. The company shall comply with 25 Pa. Code § 123.31.

3. Monitoring Requirements

A. The company shall monitor the pressure drop across the carbon bed at least once per shift.

B. The company shall monitor, once per operating day, for odors which the Department may determine to be objectionable.

C. The company shall notify the Department at (610) 832-6241 within 1 hour of occurrence of a malfunction of the carbon adsorber system or a bypass of the carbon adsorber system which results in an odor which the Department may determine to be objectionable or an increase in emissions above any allowable emission rate contained in the Department's rules and regulations or any condition of this plan approval. The malfunction shall be corrected as expeditiously as possible. In addition, the Department shall be notified, in writing, no later than 5

days following the malfunction of the nature of the malfunction and the actions taken to correct the malfunction.

D. After 6 months of daily monitoring, the company may apply to the Department to reduce the frequency of the monitoring.

4. Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements

Sufficient data shall be recorded so that compliance with the conditions in the plan approval can be determined. Records shall be kept for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

A. The company shall maintain a copy of the manufacturer's specifications for the carbon adsorption system.

B. The company shall keep a record of the daily monitoring required by Condition 3.B.

C. The company shall keep a record of the pressure drop across the carbon bed to demonstrate compliance with Condition 1.B.

D. The company shall keep a record of any malfunction or bypass of the carbon adsorption system that occurs as well as the actions taken to correct the malfunction or bypass.

The Northumberland Terminal is a major facility for which a Title V Operating Permit (No. 49-00019) has been issued. The installation of the vapor combustion unit will replace two existing vapor recovery units. Up to 49.26, 11.21, 7.94 and 4.46 tons of VOCs, carbon monoxide, hazardous air pollutants and nitrogen oxides, respectively, will be emitted in any 12 consecutive month period as a result of loading gasoline.

The Department's review of the information contained in the application indicates that the proposed construction of additional loading arms and installation of the vapor combustion unit on the two existing loading racks will meet all applicable air quality requirements including the VOC emission limitation of 25 Pa. Code § 129.59 and the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12 (which have applicability because the vapor combustion unit constitutes an "air contamination source" in addition to being an "air cleaning device"). Based on this finding, the Department intends to approve the application and issue a plan approval to construct the additional loading arms and install the proposed vapor combustion unit on the respective loading racks.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to ensure compliance with all applicable air quality regulatory requirements:

1. At no time shall the operation of the loading racks result in the emission of 0.0668 pound (30.3 grams) of gasoline (measured as propane) for every 100 gallons of gasoline loaded.

Under the current mode of operation, water is released from the Project during periods of power generation and when the storage capacity of the reservoir is exceeded. Minimum conservation releases of 100 cfs from May 1 to October 31 and two 4-hour blocks of 500 cfs from November 1 to April 30 are also provided during periods of nongeneration. REMA proposes modifying the current mode of Project operation by operating in a run-of-river (ROR) mode from April 1 to June 20 annually. Under ROR operation, reservoir levels would be held constant and Project releases would approximately equal Project inflow at all times with no peaking or pulsing. Conservation releases would be increased to 158 cfs from June 21 to October 31 and certain additional water releases would be provided to enhance summer drift-boating opportunities. REMA also requests authorization to lower reservoir pool levels by 1 additional foot in the summer to enhance electricity generation capabilities. Project operation would remain essentially unchanged during the rest of the year.

Approval of Request for Variance

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), Bureau of Deep Mine Safety (Bureau) has approved Genesis, Inc.'s request for a variance from the requirements of section 242(c) of the Pennsylvania Bituminous Coal Mine Act (act) at the Genesis No. 17 Mine. This notification contains a summary of this request and the basis for the Department's approval. A complete copy of the variance request may be obtained from Allison Gaida at (724) 439-7469 or from the Bureau's website at http://www.dep.state.pa.us/dep/deputate/minres/dms/ dms.htm. Summary of the Request: Genesis, Inc. requested a variance from section 242(c) of the act to allow for the common ventilation of belt conveyor entry with other entries at the Genesis No. 17 Mine. The proposal accords protections to persons and property substantially equal to or greater than the requirements set forth in the act.

The basis for the Bureau's approval is summarized as follows:

1. The plan provides for an advanced fire detection and control system consisting of CO monitors and a fire suppression system.

2. The plan provides a separate intake escapeway that will be isolated from the belt conveyor entries. The isolated intake escapeway will be maintained at a higher ventilation pressure than the belt and common entries.

3. The plan provides for the belt and common entries to serve as an alternate intake escapeway.

4. There are significant health and safety benefits associated with allowing entries in common with the belt entry. Safer access is provided to workers performing repair and maintenance work in the belt entry. Improved visual safety inspections are facilitated by open crosscuts.

This approval is limited to a variance from the requirements in section 242(c) of the act requiring that the belt entry is isolated from other entries. All other terms and requirements of section 242(c) of the act shall remain in effect. This approval applies to all areas developed after May 20, 1998. Continued authorization for operation under the approval is contingent upon compliance with the measures described in the plan and the following conditions:

1. Operation, maintenance and calibration of the Pyott-Boone's CO Monitor System shall comply with the manufacturer's recommendation and the Department equipment approval number BOTE 1070-89.

2. The mine operator shall comply with the Mine Safety and Health Administration's approved Fire Fighting and Evacuation Plan.

3. The mine foreman shall notify the Department District Mine Inspector when the point CO monitor system has been installed.

4. The designated surface person responsible for responding to alarms from the CO monitor system should be task trained in the procedures utilized for notifying all affected mine personnel should an alarm occur.

5. The investigating committee shall confirm that the intake escapeway is maintained at a higher pressure than the belt conveyor entry and commons entries.

6. A test button should be installed to allow a daily function check of the pole-mounted alarm system.

7. The pole-mounted visual warning device located on the surface should be a revolving strobe that is clearly visible to the loader operator under all conditions.

8. The pole-mounted audio alarm located on the surface should be noticeably different from back up alarms currently in use on the property and clearly noticeable to the loader operator.

9. Verification by the Department District Mine Inspector that the plan is implemented according to the mine operator's submitted plan and this approval.

Public Notice of Proposed Pennsylvania NPDES General Permit for Stormwater Discharges from Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (PAG-13) (MS4s)

The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.101), sections 1905-A, 1917-A and 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 510-5, 510-17 and 510-20), the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) seeks public comments on the Commonwealth's proposed NPDES General Permit for Stormwater Discharges from Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (PAG-13) (MS4s) and related documents (the Notice of Intent (NOI) and the NOI Instructions and other permit compliance materials). The Environmental Protection Agency's Phase II Stormwater Permitting regulation at 40 CFR 122 requires permitting small MS4s. The proposed general permit documents are consistent with Federal and State regulations. The proposed general permit will not be applicable to municipalities that discharge stormwater to waters designated as "special protection" waters under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93 (relating to water quality standards). MS4s will need to apply for and comply with an Individual NPDES Permit.

The Department's proposed general permit documents rely upon the Federal regulation and available guidance and are designed to reduce impact of stormwater discharges to the maximum extent practicable. The general permit requires regulated MS4s to develop a stormwater management plan that meets the six minimum control measures: (1) public education and outreach; (2) public participation and involvement; (3) illicit discharge detection and elimination; (4) construction site storm water runoff control; (5) post-construction stormwater management in new development and redevelopment; and (6) pollution prevention and good housekeeping for municipal operations and maintenance. In developing the documents, the Department's strategy is to streamline the permit process and use a more practical approach that minimizes impacts on the regulated MS4s as well as the Department.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Consideration of Changes to Special Regulation Designations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) has approved guidelines with regard to encouraging public participation on possible changes to the designation of stream sections or lakes for special regulation programs. Under 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations), the Commission designates certain streams, stream sections and lakes as being subject to special fishing regulations. These designations are effective after Commission approval when they are posted at the site and a notice is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Under the Commission's guidelines, a notice concerning the proposed designation or redesignation of a stream section or lake under special regulations ordinarily will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the matter is reviewed by the Commissioners.

At the next Commission meeting on July 26 and 27, 2002, the Commission will consider designating the following stream sections as waters subject to special fishing regulations under 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65, effective January 1, 2003.

58 Pa. Code § 65.2. Delayed Harvest Fly-fishing Only (DHFFO) Areas

The Commission will consider revising the limits of the DHFFO Area on Octoraro Creek, West Branch, Lancaster County, by extending the upstream limit of the existing area approximately 190 yards. If approved, the revised section will be as follows: From a point 30 yards downstream of the SR 0472 Bridge downstream 2.1 miles to near the confluence with the second unnamed tributary below SR 2010, a distance of 2.1 miles.

58 Pa. Code § 65.6. Delayed Harvest Artificial Lures Only (DHALO) Areas

The Commission will consider adding the following stream section to the list of DHALO Areas:

HOUSING FINANCE AGENCY

Housing Coordinator Program; Invitation to Submit Proposals

The Housing Finance Agency (HFA) invites proposals from entities or individuals seeking funding to create a Housing Coordinator Program (Program). The purpose of the Program is to create a bridge between the Medicaid home and community-based programs (Waiver Programs) and the housing sector within this Commonwealth.

The HFA administers an array of housing funding programs for homeownership, rental housing, emergency

mortgage assistance and related supportive housing programs. A complete list of existing HFA programs, application deadlines and contact information is available at www.phfa.org. The HFA is authorized, among other things, to cooperate with and assist other agencies of State government in carrying out the powers and duties vested in it, to accept money from and enter into agreements with these agencies and to provide housing options and opportunities for persons with disabilities or other special needs.

The General Appropriations Act of 2001 provided funding authority to the Department of Public Welfare (DPW), along with matching Federal funds, for the coordination of the availability of local housing opportunities for persons participating in Waiver Programs.

The DPW and the HFA have identified the need to coordinate the Waiver Programs provided by the DPW with the expertise in housing and housing related issues of the HFA to develop a Program to assist persons with disabilities, who are eligible for one or more of the DPW's Waiver Programs, find safe, accessible and affordable housing.

The DPW has agreed to make available to the HFA the sum of up to \$600,000 for this Program over a 3-year period.

Program Objectives

The HFA is inviting submission of proposals from individuals and/or profit or nonprofit groups seeking funding for the Program. The HFA will fund one of the proposals submitted and reserves the right to not select any of the proposals submitted. The proposals submitted will be reviewed by staff of the DPW and the HFA and the review may take into consideration factors such as the HFA and the DPW in their discretion deem appropriate. The entity eventually selected will work directly with the DPW or one or more of its designated service providers to assist eligible individuals find housing.

Program Criteria

Proposals submitted should provide a narrative description, which clearly and concisely:

- Identifies the targeted need and population to be served.
- Offers a detailed explanation of how the needs of the identified population will be served (offices, staff and networks of entities in local communities with whom they will work).
- Sets forth a multiyear budget (3 years) for the Program.
- Outlines specific benchmarks and timeframes for performing and accomplishing the goals of the proposal.
- Specifies the amount of funding requested and explains how the funds will be used to create a viable strategy for fulfilling the identified housing needs on a Statewide basis. (Note: These funds may not be used for bricks and mortar, housing development or directly related expenditures to provide housing, such as land acquisition, housing construction or purchase, provision of mortgages, and the like.)
- Identifies who the participants in the Program will be and describes their expertise in providing the services anticipated by the Initiative.

Proposals should delineate and describe the categories of persons being targeted through the Program and the duration of the funded program. As much detail as possible should be provided regarding the expectations and outcomes of the program and the expected dates for accomplishing the outcomes. A proposal that displays the ability to provide services quickly will be preferred over one that requires a longer "startup" period. The HFA encourages submission of Proposals with participation of entities designated as minority business enterprises, woman business enterprises or disabled business enterprises and which affirmatively further fair housing.

At a minimum, the entity selected must:

- Have a Statewide presence and be capable of providing services, either directly or through affiliated organizations, throughout this Commonwealth.
- Have direct experience in working with local and State housing authorities and other housing providers and programs throughout this Commonwealth.
- Have an understanding of and experience in dealing with local, State and Federal programs that provide assistance for housing, in particular housing programs for persons with disabilities.
- Have an understanding of and experience in dealing with local, State and Federal resources to assist individuals with disabilities to live independently in the community.
- Demonstrate a commitment to individuals with disabilities throughout its organizational structure.
- Have had direct experience and positive results in assisting persons with disabilities find safe, accessible and affordable housing of their choice.
- Have an understanding of all aspects of the DPW Waiver Programs.

The entity selected will be required, among other things, to:

- Designate a full-time person to coordinate the initiative.
- Develop a plan for the coordination of activities throughout this Commonwealth and for the allocation of available funds to local areas.
- Work with the DPW and its service providers in the process of assisting persons with disabilities find housing.
- Meet all reporting requirements established by the DPW and/or the HFA.
- Work with local agencies, private and public organizations and others to develop housing options and opportunities for persons with disabilities.
- Limit the use of funds to assisting individuals find or apply for housing.

All HFA funding is subject to the availability of funding, ongoing program requirements, the housing finance agency law and all other applicable Federal, State and local laws and regulations.

It is expected that one applicant will be selected to provide services and that a contract for services in the form and manner selected by the HFA and the DPW will be entered into to govern the administration of the contract. The selected applicant must comply with all applicable State and Federal laws regarding employment and nondiscrimination and contractor integrity. Evidence of substantial ongoing progress will be required throughout the contract period. The HFA may recapture funds or terminate any commitment or funding reservation in the event of material deviations from the projected timeframes or if benchmarks are not met.

Application Process

Applicants should submit four complete copies of the Housing Coordinator Proposal to Lisa J. Yaffe, Director, Housing Services Division, Housing Finance Agency, 2101 North Front Street, P. O. Box 8029, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8029.

Proposals must be received by the HFA no later than 2 p.m. Friday, August 16, 2002.

The proposal/application material will become the property of the HFA. The HFA reserves the right to change, modify, amend or withdraw this request for proposal at any time, without notice, and to amend or modify this program at any time and may determine to discontinue this program at any time. Costs associated with this proposal/application will be the responsibility of the applicant. Medical Professional Liability Catastrophe Loss Fund; Changes to the C-416 Claim Reporting Form; Bulletin No. 76

The purpose of this Bulletin is to notify primary carriers and self-insured providers of two changes to the C-416 Claim Reporting Form that these entities must submit to the Medical Professional Liability Catastrophe Loss Fund (Fund) for Excess, Section 605, Drop Down claims and any other coverage requests.

The C-416 Claim Reporting Form has been revised to include Block "4b." Section 308(b) of the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error Act of March 20, 2002 requires a medical facility to provide written notification to a patient affected by a serious event or, with the consent of the patient, to an available family member or designee, within 7 days of the occurrence or discovery of a serious event. The date of notification should be entered in Block "4b" of the C-416 Claim Reporting Form.

The C-416 Claim Reporting Form has also been revised to include Block "6a," which will now require the primary carrier or self-insured provider to indicate the "Severity of the Injury" based upon the following codes:

0-Unknown

1-Emotional Injury Only (upset, fright)

2—Insignificant Injury (small cuts, lacerations, contusions, minor scars, rash, and the like)

3—Minor Temporary Injury (infections, fractures, minor burns, missed or delayed diagnosis and/or recovery without complications)

4—Major Temporary Injury (retained foreign object, other burns, side effects from medication or treatment, brain damage that resolves, infection after surgery, and the like)

5—Minor Permanent Injury (loss of fingers, loss or damage to organs, heart damage with recovery, removal of bowel, loss of one testicle or ovary, and the like)

6—Significant Permanent Injury (deafness, complete or partial loss of limb, eye, one kidney or lung, brachial plexus injury, reflex sympathetic dystrophy which is disabling, and the like)

7—Major Permanent Injury (paraplegia, blindness, loss of two limbs, brain damage, severe and visible disfigurement, permanent colostomy or aseptic necrosis of a joint, a central nervous system injury which is not totally disabling, and the like)

8—Grave Permanent Injury (quadriplegia, severe brain damage, lifelong care or fatal prognosis, cerebral palsy, persistent coma, and the like)

9—Death

If more than one severity code applies to the injuries sustained, all applicable codes should be noted in Block "6a." If no severity code is listed in Block "6a" on the C-416 Claim Reporting Form, the form will be returned to the primary carrier for completion.

Because of the many changes occurring as a result of Act 13 of 2002, the C-416 Claim Reporting Form may be further modified. Copies of the current revised C-416 Claim Reporting Form reflecting the changes noted may be obtained at www.pamedcat.state.pa.us or by directly contacting the Fund.

This Bulletin is effective immediately.

Public Meeting held May 9, 2002

Opinion and Order

By the Commission:

Before the Commission for consideration is the Petition for Declaratory Order (Petition) filed on January 14, 2002, by Penny Saver Direct, Inc., t/d/b/a Two Guys & A Truck (Petitioner). The Petitioner requests that we issue an Order finding that its current operations do not constitute a public utility service subject to the Commission's jurisdiction.

By Secretarial Letter dated February 8, 2002, the Petitioner was directed to serve a copy of its Petition on the interested Parties. The Petition was thereafter served on the parties on February 14, 2002, in accordance with 52 Pa. Code § 5.45(b). B.F. Fields Moving & Storage, J.H. Bennett Storage & Carting, Inc., and Piper Moving Systems, Inc., (Protestants) filed a response to the Petition and New Matter on March 5, 2002. On March 20, 2002, the Petitioner filed an Answer to the Protestants' New Matter.

History of Proceeding

On March 20, 2000, the Petitioner filed an Application for a Certificate of Public Convenience requesting authority to transport household goods in use. An evidentiary hearing was held on September 8, 2000, culminating in the issuance of an Initial Decision on March 15, 2001, denying the Application. The Petitioner filed Exceptions to the Initial Decision on April 2, 2001. The Protestants and Ryan Moving & Storage, Inc., filed Reply Exceptions on April 16, 2001. By Opinion and Order entered September 7, 2001, we denied the Petitioner's Exceptions. In that Order, we concluded, inter alia, that the Petitioner had a propensity to operate illegally, as evidenced by the fact that it had engaged in the intrastate transportation of household goods in use without Commission authorization.

The Protestants note that the Petitioner has a prior history of attempting to deceive this Commission. They maintain that the averments contained in the Petition should be considered suspect and that we should deny the Petition. In the alternative, they request that hearings be held to determine the accuracy of the facts set forth in the Petition.

Discussion

The Petitioner avers that the reformation of its business operations, following our denial of its Application, has removed its operations from our jurisdiction. The Petitioner requests that we entertain its Petition to resolve the uncertainty of whether its modifications, in fact, did so. Pursuant to Section 331(f) of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 331(f), the issuance of a declaratory order is a matter within the Commission's discretion.

Section 102 of the Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 102, defines "public utilities" as including "[a]ny person or corporations now or hereafter owning or operating in this Commonwealth equipment or facilities for ... [t]ransporting ... property as a common carrier ..." A "common carrier" is defined as "[a]ny and all persons or corporations holding out, offering, or undertaking, directly or indirectly, service for compensation to the public for the transportation of ... property ... between points within this Commonwealth...." (*Id.*). Additionally, a "common carrier by motor vehicle" is defined as:

Any common carrier who or which holds out or undertakes the transportation of ... property ... between points within this Commonwealth by motor vehicle for compensation, whether or not the owner or operator of such motor vehicle, or who or which provides or furnishes any motor vehicle, with or without driver, for transportation or for use in transportation of ... property as aforesaid ...

(*Id.*).

The Petitioner avers that its intrastate household goods operations consist only of packing, loading, and unloading household goods. Further, the Petitioner contends that since the Commission's Opinion and Order entered September 7, 2001, it has substantially changed its advertisements, its service contract, and its involvement in obtaining transportation for its customers. Therefore, the Petitioner contends that its intrastate household goods operations do not render it a "public utility," as defined in Section 102.

Based solely on the averments contained in the Petition, we cannot conclude that any substantial changes have occurred in these areas. While the Petitioner's activities may no longer require Commission authority, various issues need to be further explored before we can reach such a determination.

First, we note that the Petitioner admits that it continues to advertise its services in local telephone directories under the listing "Movers," without indicating that it only provides labor services in connection with intrastate moves. While the Petitioner indicates that it intends to modify these advertisements in the future, it does not specify what modifications it plans to undertake. Moreover, the Petitioner contends that because it now holds interstate authority to transport household goods in use^1 and intrastate authority to transport property, excluding household goods in $use,^2$ its advertisements are not objectionable, and, therefore, do not need modification.

The fact that Petitioner may hold other forms of authority does not entitle it to advertise in a manner that leads the public to believe that it also holds the intrastate authority to transport household goods in use. Further, specific information regarding the modifications that the Petitioner will implement is required in order for us to determine whether its advertisements are misleading to the public.

Next, we note that, although the Petitioner maintains that it has modified its service contract to include only labor services, the Petitioner admits that the service contract, (Petitioner's Exhibit B), and labor agreement, (Petitioner's Exhibit A), contain provisions relating to transportation services. The Petitioner contends that those provisions apply only to the Petitioner's interstate transportation of household goods and should, therefore, be disregarded by us. Due to the Petitioner's commingling of its interstate transportation services with its intrastate services, we are unable to conclude, based solely on the language contained in the service contract and labor agreement, that the Petitioner has substantially changed its operations.

Finally, we find that the Petitioner's averments regarding its involvement in the intrastate transportation of its customers' household goods are also deficient. According to the Petitioner, it now advises its customers that they are solely responsible for securing a vehicle and arranging for a driver to transport their household goods. Further, the Petitioner states that it no longer involves itself in its customers' selection process and does not arrange to pay for vehicles or drivers on their behalf. However, we are troubled by the Petitioner's failure to include any information regarding where its customers obtain their vehicles and drivers. The Petitioner's averments regarding its non-involvement in its customers' selection process do not foreclose the possibility that the Petitioner, or an entity related to the Petitioner, may, in fact, be supplying vehicles and drivers to the Petitioner's customers.

Based on our review of this matter, we conclude that the Petition contains disputed facts and an issue of law on the Commission's jurisdiction. The jurisdictional issue could also have wider ramifications than this proceeding. Consequently, we will hold the Petition for Declaratory Order in abeyance and refer the matter to the Office of Administrative Law Judge for hearings and the issuance of a Recommended Decision; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered:

1. That the Petition for Declaratory Order of Penny Saver Direct, Inc., t/d/b/a Two Guys & A Truck be held in abeyance.

2. That the matter be referred to the Office of Administrative Law Judge for the purpose of conducting hearings and the issuance of a Recommended Decision.

STATE TAX EQUALIZATION BOARD

Common Level Ratios

The State Tax Equalization Board (Board) has established a Common Level Ratio for each county in this Commonwealth for the calendar year 2001. The ratios were mandated by Act 267-1982.

The law requires the Board to use statistically acceptable techniques, to make the methodology for computing

ratios public and to certify, prior to July 1, the ratio to the Chief Assessor of each county each year.

The statistical technique which the Board used for the 2001 Common Level Ratio is to determine the arithmetic mean of the individual sales ratios for every valid sale received from the county for the calendar year 2001.

The methodology used is to include every valid sale with a ratio from 1% to 100% and compute a mean. Using this mean as a base, the Board has defined high and low limits by multiplying and dividing this computed mean by four. Using these computed limits, the Board has utilized the valid sales, rejecting those sales which exceed the limits. The resulting arithmetic mean ratio is the ratio which the Board is certifying as the Common Level Ratio for each county for 2001.

There is one exception to this procedure. The original mean ratio for those counties which have a predetermined assessment ratio for 2001 of 100% will utilize valid sales from 1% to 200%.

STATE CONTRACTS INFORMATION DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL SERVICES
