# **READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE**

#### Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

#### Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*  *Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

#### Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

#### Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

#### **How to Find Documents**

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

#### **Printing Format**

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [ ] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

#### Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

#### **Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information**

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

#### § 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

# THE COURTS

# Title 207—JUDICIAL CONDUCT

#### PART III. JUDICIAL CONDUCT BOARD

#### [207 PA. CODE CH. 121]

#### Special Procedures for Cases Involving Substance Abuse

The Judicial Conduct Board recognizes that the judiciary, like the general population, includes individuals impaired by substance abuse.<sup>1</sup>

Because judges exercise a unique public trust, the Judicial Conduct Board, in devising its rehabilitative diversion procedure, desires to encourage affected members of the judiciary to seek help at the earliest possible moment so as to ensure maximum protection to the public against misconduct resulting from their impairment. The Board seeks to achieve this objective through a realistic plan to mitigate the harmful consequences of substance abuse to the judiciary and the public. The primary function of this Policy is the rehabilitation of the judge; a secondary modality is the prompt disposition of substance abuse related complaints, obviating costly and time consuming investigations, hearings and related proceedings.

#### Judicial Conduct Board Policy

The Judicial Conduct Board regards substance abuse as an illness and will regard misconduct caused by such an illness as mitigated by that fact, provided that the impaired judge obtains appropriate treatment for his/her problem. The Board encourages President Judges and administrative agencies to accommodate rehabilitation by any impaired judicial officer, provided that the President Judge and appropriate administrative agency have been made aware of the judge's condition and the accommodations sought by the judge do not impose an undue hardship on the court or agency.

This Policy is not intended to provide that substance abuse problems are an excuse for deficiencies in performance or behavior. Judges with substance abuse problems will be held to the same standards as other similarly situated individuals.

The Judicial Conduct Board is committed to preserving the independence and integrity of the judiciary and assisting the recovery of judges suffering from substance abuse. It is the purpose of this Policy to encourage those judges who desire to seek help to do so at an early stage before their functioning or the judiciary itself is compromised.

The impairment of any judge's performance due to substance abuse may have an adverse impact on the

court's functioning. For this reason, it is important for a judge with a substance abuse problem to seek help as early as possible.

#### In the Workplace

Possession or consumption of alcohol or other moodchanging chemicals while on court property or while performing judicial services constitutes misconduct on the part of a judge. Reporting to or remaining at the workplace under the influence of alcohol or other moodaltering drugs, is likewise regarded as misconduct. This prohibition does not apply to limited alcohol consumption at meals off of the court premises.

#### Violations of Criminal Statutes

The sale, manufacture, delivery, distribution, possession, processing, packaging, or otherwise trafficking, of controlled substances is a crime under the Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act of April 14, 1972, P. L. 233 No. 64 (35 Pa.C.S.A. § 780-101 et seq.) and any judicial officer found guilty of such conduct shall be ineligible for the diversionary treatment described in this policy. Any judicial officer convicted of Driving Under the Influence of alcohol or any controlled substance as defined in the Vehicle Code Act of 1976, June 17, P. L. 162 No. 81 § 1, as amended (75 Pa.C.S.A. § 3731) or granted Accelerated Rehabilitation Disposition ("ARD") on a charge, will be subject to discipline for such misconduct but such Judicial Officer may seek mitigation of any otherwise applicable sanctions so long as he/she cooperates in an approved treatment program described in this policy.

#### Qualified Treatment Program

For the purpose of the Board's diversion program, a Qualified Treatment Program shall be one which is approved by both the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts (AOPC) and this Board.

#### Annex A

#### **TITLE 207. JUDICIAL CONDUCT** PART III. JUDICIAL CONDUCT BOARD **CHAPTER 121. SPECIAL PROCEDURES FOR**

### CASES INVOLVING SUBSTANCE ABUSE

#### **Rule 36.** Petition for Rehabilitative Diversion.

(A) When the Board finds probable cause to investigate a Complaint alleging misconduct involving substance abuse, the Board may notify the Judicial Officer of its investigation and provide the Judicial Officer with an opportunity to petition the Board for permission to enter a rehabilitative diversion program acceptable to the Board prior to the filing of formal charges with the Court of Judicial Discipline.

(B) Such petition shall be filed with the Board promptly. Absent Board approval, a petition shall not be considered if filed after the Judicial Officer's response to the Board's Notice of Full Investigation (see Rules of Procedure of the Judicial Conduct Board outlined in Rule 30B)

(C) The petition for rehabilitative diversion shall contain

(1) the Judicial Officer's verified statement that he/she desires to participate in a qualified treatment program;

 <sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The following terms referenced shall be defined as follows:
 *substance abuse*—repeated excessive use of alcohol or other drugs which continues to cause serious adverse consequences in one's life;

alcoholism and other chemical dependency—a pattern of chronic, harmful and compulsive substance abuse characterized by denial and impaired control over the use of the substance

As used in the Policy and Chapter 11 of the Rules of Procedure of the Judicial Conduct Board, the term substance abuse shall include alcoholism and other chemical dependency as well as substance abuse.

(2) a release giving Board Counsel access of all information and records bearing on the rehabilitative program, including information concerning the applicant's past substance abuse and treatment, as well as the proposed rehabilitative program;

(3) a stipulation as to facts which are agreed to by the Judicial Officer and Board Counsel relevant to the formal charges; and agreement of the admissibility of such stipulation in any future proceeding before the Court of Judicial Discipline;

(4) a waiver by the Judicial Officer of the right to file pre-trial motions based on grounds then known to the applicant unless specifically modified as exceptions to the waiver; and

(5) the Judicial Officer's consent to submit to testing for drug or alcohol consumption during any probationary period later imposed.

#### **Rule 37. Evaluations**

(A) When any Judicial Officer under investigation applies for diversion under Rule 36 on the ground of his or her substance abuse, the Board may require the applicant to submit to such medical evaluations as it deems necessary. The Board shall appoint one or more healthcare professionals to examine the applicant and report their findings to the Board. A copy of any such report will be shared with the applicant. Failure to submit to examination will be considered by the Board in its disposition of any pending complaint.

(B) All expenses incurred for such evaluations and reports shall be assessed against the Judicial Officer and shall be his or her sole responsibility.

#### **Rule 38. Diversion Procedure.**

(A) When a Judicial Officer enters a rehabilitation diversion program pursuant to this Chapter, the Board may defer filing formal charges with the Court of Judicial Discipline for a reasonable period of time to permit the completion of the program, provided that the Judicial Officer consents in writing to the release of treatment information and records relating to his or her participation in the program.

(B) When a Judicial Officer satisfactorily completes an approved inpatient rehabilitation program, the Board shall continue the matter for a twelve (12) month probationary period, which may be conditioned on the Officer's continued participation in a recommended recovery program.

(C) If the rehabilitative intervention and the probationary period are deemed by the Board to have been satisfactorily completed, the Board will refrain from filing charges in the Court of Judicial Discipline and will dismiss the Complaint through the letter of counsel procedure outlined in J.C.B.R.P. 31(A)(2).

(D) If the Board determines that the applicant Judicial Officer has abandoned the recovery program, or has violated the terms in any substantial way, the Board may direct the filing of charges before the Court of Judicial Discipline, or take such other action as may be appropriate in the circumstances.

# Title 231—RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

#### PART I. GENERAL

 Amendment of Rules of Civil Procedure Governing Venue; No. 381; Civil Procedure Rules; Doc. No. 5

#### **Amendatory Order**

#### Per Curiam:

And Now, this 5th day of March, 2003, Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure 1006, 2130, 2156 and 2179, amended by the Order of January 27, 2003, No. 381, Civil Procedural Rules Docket No. 5, shall apply to medical professional liability actions filed on or after January 1, 2002 and not to such actions filed prior to that date. The provisions of Rule of Civil Procedure 1032 governing waiver of defenses and objections shall not apply to a challenge to venue made within ninety days of the date of this Amendatory Order.

This Amendatory Order shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b) and shall be effective immediately.

Justices Castille and Saylor would apply the amendments to the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure, as stated, prospectively for all actions filed on or after the effective date of Act No. 127 of 2002.

#### **TITLE 4. ADMINISTRATION**

#### PART I. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

#### CHAPTER 1. AGENCY OPERATION AND ORGANIZATION

#### Subchapter A. DIRECTIVES MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

#### § 1.4. Index of issuances.

(a) Section 1.2 (relating to policy) specifies that "Issuances from the Governor's Office and from agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction, except proclamations and press releases, that are intended for distribution to two or more agencies are to be issued through the Directives Management System in one of four types of publications:

(1) Numbered Executive Orders, signed by the Governor, announcing broad policies, programs and responsibilities that are relatively permanent.

(2) Numbered Management Directives announcing detailed policies, programs, responsibilities and procedures that are relatively permanent. Management Directives are to be signed by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Budget Secretary, Secretary of Administration or the head of a department or independent board, commission or council under the Governor's jurisdiction.

(3) Numbered Administrative Circulars containing either informational material or instructions that are onetime or temporary in nature. Administrative Circulars are to be signed the same as Management Directives.

(4) Numbered procedural issuances containing detailed information and guidelines for relatively restricted, welldefined operations or sets of operations. Procedural issuances may be manuals, handbooks, catalogs, guides or similar publications. Manuals are to be signed the same as Management Directives.

(b) Management Directives and Manuals are numbered in sequence by category such as, Financial Management, and subcategory such as, Payroll. They should be filed by number, not by date.

(c) Changes to Executive Orders, Management Directives and Manuals (catalogs, handbooks, bulletins, and the like) may be issued in the form of amendments or revisions. Amendments are complete documents incorporating all changes since the last complete issuance. Dots are placed in the margins to show the new or changed text. Revisions are usually pen and ink changes or replacement pages and affect only those parts of an issuance being changed.

(d) Every agency should include in its distribution under each symbol a basic amount for managers and centrally located reference files. Additional copies depending on the symbol, should be included for action offices, field offices, extra information copies, and bulletin boards. Distribution symbols have the following meanings:

Distribution

Symbol Definition

- A Of limited interest or requires action by only one or a few segments of an agency.
- B Of general interest or requires action by many segments of an agency.
- F Requires action by the personnel office or the main impact is in the field of human resources.
- Special Designed to fit specific needs. Most manuals are in this category.

(a) Under sections 221 and 709(d) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 81 and 249(d)), the Executive Board has, in a resolution dated September 26, 1985, determined the hours when the central administrative offices of State Government are to be open for the transaction of public business at least 8 hours each day, except Saturdays, Sundays, and selected holidays as determined by the Executive Board.

(b) An agency may authorize employees to work a standard schedule at hours outside the office hours shown

on the schedule of office hours. An agency may assign employees to work staggered work hours to meet program or operational needs, or approve employee requests to accommodate transportation, family care, education, or other compelling reasons. An agency also may establish, with Office of Administration approval, alternate work schedules andflex-time arrangements for operational units that measurably will improve efficiency and/or client service. Such scheduling variations outside of an agency's standard operating hours cannot impair the operational efficiency or client service provided by the agency.

#### **Fishing Guide Operations**

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapter 63 (relating to general fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing the final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

#### A. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will go into effect upon final-form publication of this order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

#### B. Contact Person

#### C. Statutory Authority

The amendments to § 63.41 (relating to recognition of fishing guide operations) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

#### D. Purpose and Background

The final-form rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to recognized fishing guide operations. The specific purpose of the final-form rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

#### E. Summary of Final-Form Rulemaking

The Commission administers a program that provides for the voluntary Official Recognition of Charter Boats and Fishing Guides operating within this Commonwealth. Under existing regulations, operators pay a \$50 annual fee for which they receive an official recognition certificate and two decals. In return, they may proclaim themselves as being officially recognized by the Commission and may field dress fish caught for their customers. They also must report to the Commission the number and species of fish caught and their disposition.

The Commission proposed several significant revisions to § 63.41. The major changes include:

• Changing the title of the section to "Recognition of fishing guide operations." This program enables those so recognized to provide value added services for customers, such as field dressing fish, and imposes a reporting requirement on fish caught. The use of a boat when delivering these services is incidental and not germane to the primary privileges and requirements of participation.

• Including a definition of "concurrent jurisdiction waters" for the purpose of this section.

• Imposing additional requirements when boats are used in fishing guide operations, such as: (1) a Boating Safety Education Certificate; and (2) registration carrying a use classification of "commercial passenger" when the boat is registered in this Commonwealth.

• Requiring additional documentation be included with applications when boats are used, depending on the number of passengers.

• Correcting a reference to Chapter 101 (relating to boating accidents) to refer to Chapter 115 (relating to boats carrying passengers for hire).

On final-form rulemaking, the Commission eliminated the Boating Safety Education Certificate requirement for operators and crew members of charter boats operating on concurrent jurisdiction waters. The Commission determined that a Boating Safety Education Certificate should not be required because the proposed rulemaking already mandated that these operators provide proof that they are licensed by the United States Coast Guard. This change necessitated a reorganization of subsection (c) for clarity's sake. The Commission otherwise adopted the amendments to § 63.41 as proposed.

#### F. Paperwork

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

#### G. Fiscal Impact

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions and will impose no new costs on the general public. The final-form rulemaking will impose new costs on the private sector in that it will require that when charter boats are used, applicants for official recognition submit a copy of a valid boat registration certificate, showing the boat use classification as "commercial passenger." The statutory biannual fee for a commercial passenger boat registration is \$50, as opposed to the biannual fee of \$30 and \$40 to register motorboats 16 feet to less than 20 feet and motorboats 20 feet or longer, respectively. Each year, the Commission receives approximately 100 applications for official recognition, nearly half of which involve charter boats. Thus, the impact on the private sector will be nominal.

#### H. Public Involvement

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 32 Pa.B. 6130 (December 14, 2002). Commission staff also provided a copy of the proposed rulemaking to all current participants in the Official Recognition Program. The Commission received two public comments from one individual generally supporting the proposed rulemaking. The commentator, a fishing guide from New Jersey who has not applied for recognition in this Commonwealth, believes that the requirements for recognition should be more stringent than those proposed. Copies of all public comments were provided to the Commissioners.

#### Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. \$ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code \$ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided, and all comments received were considered.

(3) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 63, are amended by amending § 63.41 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Executive Director will submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality as required by law.

(c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

#### **CHAPTER 63. GENERAL FISHING REGULATIONS**

#### § 63.41. Recognition of fishing guide operations.

(a) *Definitions.* The following words and terms, when used in this section, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

*Charter boat*—A boat operated as part of a fishing guide operation on the waters of this Commonwealth.

*Concurrent jurisdiction waters*—Those waters of this Commonwealth over which the Commonwealth and the United States Coast Guard exercise concurrent jurisdiction, including Lake Erie and the Ohio, Monongahela, Allegheny, Delaware and North Branch, Susquehanna and West Branch, Susquehanna (below Williamsport) Rivers.

*Fishing guide operation*—A commercial enterprise operated for the purpose of guiding or leading persons fishing on the waters of this Commonwealth by boat or otherwise.

(b) *Voluntary official recognition.* The Executive Director may upon application grant official recognition of fishing guide operations. Applications for recognition shall be made on forms provided by the Commission and contain information the Executive Director may require. Denial of official recognition may be appealed in accordance with Chapter 51, Subchapter E (relating to permit procedures).

(c) *Charter boats.* When charter boats are used, applicants for official recognition shall submit the following evidence along with their applications:

(1) For charter boats carrying six or fewer passengers for hire on concurrent jurisdiction waters:

(i) A copy of a valid boat registration certificate, showing the boat use classification as "commercial passenger."

(ii) A copy of the Federal documentation certificate if the boat is required to be documented for commercial service by the United States Coast Guard.

(iii) A copy of the operator's license issued by the United States Coast Guard appropriate for the waters on which the boat will operate.

(2) For charter boats carrying seven or more passengers for hire on concurrent jurisdiction waters:

(i) A copy of a valid boat registration certificate, showing the boat use classification as "commercial passenger."

(ii) A copy of the Federal documentation certificate if the boat is required to be documented for commercial service by the United States Coast Guard.

(iii) A copy of the operator's license issued by the United States Coast Guard appropriate for the waters on which the boat will operate.

(iv) A copy of the most recent inspection report for the vessel.

(3) For charter boats carrying six or fewer passengers for hire on waters other than concurrent jurisdiction waters:

(i) A copy of a valid boat registration certificate, showing the boat use classification as "commercial passenger."

(ii) A copy of a boating safety education certificate for all operators.

(4) For charter boats carrying seven or more passengers for hire on waters other than concurrent jurisdiction waters:

(i) A copy of a valid boat registration certificate, showing the boat use classification as "commercial passenger."

(ii) A copy of a boating safety education certificate for all operators.

(iii) A certificate of inspection issued under Chapter 115 (relating to boats carrying passengers for hire).

(d) *Duration and fee.* Official recognition of fishing guide operations shall be valid for a calendar year and shall expire on December 31 of the year of issuance. The annual fee for official recognition is \$50.

(e) *Use of official recognition.* Fishing guide operations recognized under this section may indicate that they have been "Officially Recognized by the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission" in advertisements and by other means.

(f) Compliance with regulations. Persons who receive official recognition for fishing guide operations are responsible for ensuring that their employees, passengers and customers comply with fishing and boating regulations. The individual who submits and signs the application shall be the fishing guide or the owner/lessee/captain of the charter boat, and the individual shall be considered the individual party responsible for compliance with regulations. An application for official recognition shall include a provision whereby applicants agree that they will be responsible and are subject to prosecution for any violation of this part that occurs in connection with their operations.

(g) *Reports.* Officially-recognized fishing guide operations shall provide periodic reports to the Commission on the number of passengers or customers, number and species of fish caught and their disposition and other matters the Executive Director may require. Reports shall be submitted on forms approved by the Commission in numbers and at intervals determined by the Executive Director. Not more than four nor less than one report will be required per calendar year.

(h) Field dressing of fish.

(1) Notwithstanding § 63.15 (relating to field dressing of fish), fish caught pursuant to officially-recognized fishing guide operations may be filleted and have the head and tail removed before arrival at the place of consumption. The skin shall remain attached to the fillet for species subject to a minimum size limit. The minimum fillet size shall be 75% of the minimum size limit of the fish being filleted.

(2) The fishing guide operation shall give the person who receives the field dressed fish a signed, dated receipt indicating the species and number of fish on a form acceptable to the Commission. A person in possession of the field dressed fish shall carry the receipt with him and display it upon request to an officer authorized to enforce this title until the fish have arrived at the place of consumption. It is the responsibility of the officiallyrecognized fishing guide operation to ensure that a fish field dressed pursuant to the authority of this subsection complies with applicable season, size and creel limits.

(i) *Holder of official recognition.* Official recognition for a fishing guide operation that does not involve operation of a charter boat will be issued to an individual fishing guide. Each individual fishing guide shall apply for and receive official recognition. Official recognition for charter boats will be issued to the owner/lessee/captain of the boat. Individuals employed as crew members for a charter boat may, but need not necessarily, apply for and receive individual recognition as fishing guides. The operators of charter boats and the crew members shall comply with the licensing and training requirements in subsection (c). (j) Suspension or revocation of official recognition. The Commission may suspend or revoke the official recognition of a fishing guide operation for noncompliance with the terms and conditions of this section or when the guide operation, the individual fishing guide, charter boat owner/lessee/captain or employee or crew member of the guide operation is convicted or acknowledges guilt of a violation of the code or this part related to the fishing guide operation. Suspension or revocation procedures shall comply with Chapter 51, Subchapter C (relating to suspension, denial or revocation of licenses, permits, registration or privileges).

#### GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 137] Feeding of Certain Wildlife Prohibited

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 7, 2003, meeting, adopted the following change:

Add § 137.33 (relating to feeding of certain wildlife prohibited) to prohibit the feeding of bears.

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The final rulemaking was adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 32 Pa.B. 6134 (December 14, 2002).

1. Introduction

The Commission added § 137.33.

2. Purpose and Authority

In recent years, bear populations have increased in parts of this Commonwealth, which has resulted in increased instances of bear/human conflicts. The feeding of bears has aggravated this situation by attracting bears to developed areas. In an effort to limit bear/human conflicts, § 137.33 has been added to make it unlawful to feed bears.

Section 103(a) of the code (relating to ownership, jurisdiction and control of game and wildlife) states that "The ownership, jurisdiction over and control of game or wildlife is vested in the Commission..." Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) states that "The Commission shall promulgate such regulations as itdeems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife...including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife...." These two provisions provide the statutory authority for the addition of § 137.33.

#### 3. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking will forbid the intentional feeding of bears or the causing of bears to congregate or habituate an area.

#### 4. Persons Affected

Persons living within areas where black bears are located will be affected.

#### 5. Comment and Response Summary

One official comment was received, regarding the addition of § 137.33, in favor of the ban on feeding bears.

#### 6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

#### 7. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until October 2004, unless a regulation is promulgated reauthorizing it.

#### GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 137] Importation of Wildlife

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 7, 2003, meeting, adopted the following change: Amend § 137.1 (relating to importation, sale and release of certain wildlife) to permit the importation of cervids under limited circumstances and conditions.

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The final-form rulemaking was adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 32 Pa.B. 6368 (December 28, 2002).

#### 1. Introduction

The Commission amended § 137.1 to allow the importation of cervids under very limited circumstances.

#### 2. Purpose and Authority

Section 2163(a) of the code (relating to unlawful importation of game or wildlife) states that "It is unlawful for any person to bring...into this Commonwealth...any living game or wildlife...the importation of which is prohibited by the Commission...." Formerly, § 137.1(a) prohibited the importation of all game and wildlife, including that of cervids. After amending § 137.1(a), the regulation now permits the importation of cervids, but only under very limited circumstances.

Section 2102(c) of the code (relating to regulations) directs that: "The Commission shall promulgate regulations concerning the transportation, introduction into the wild, importation, exportation, sale, offering for sale or purchase of game or wildlife or the disturbing of game or wildlife in their natural habitat." This section provides the authority for the final-form rulemaking.

#### 3. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking will relax current restrictions and allow cervids to be imported under certain circumstances and conditions.

#### 4. Persons Affected

Persons who wish to import cervids will be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

5. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

The final-form rulemaking should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

#### PART III. GAME COMMISSION

#### CHAPTER 137. WILDLIFE

# § 137.1. Importation, sale and release of certain wildlife.

(a) Unless otherwise provided in this section or the act, it is unlawful for a person to import, possess, sell, offer for sale or release within this Commonwealth the following animals or birds or the eggs of the birds or a crossbreed or hybrid of the animals or birds, which are similar in appearance:

(1) In the family Felidae. Species and subspecies, except species which are commonly called house cats which may be possessed but not released into the wild. Lawfully acquired bobcats—Lynx rufus—may be imported by licensed propagators specifically for propagation for fur farming purposes. Importation permits and transfer permits as mentioned in subsections (d) and (e) are not required for bobcats imported for propagation for fur farming purposes. Bobcats imported under this exception and their progeny may not be sold or transferred for wildlife pet purposes or released into the wild.

(2) In the family Canidae. Species and subspecies of the coyote, the red and gray fox and a full-blooded wolf or crossbreed thereof not licensed by the Department of Agriculture. Lawfully acquired coyotes and red or gray foxes may be imported by licensed propagators specifically for propagation for fur farming purposes. Coyotes and red and gray foxes imported under this exception and their progeny may not be sold or transferred for wildlife pet purposes or released into the wild. This subsection does not permit the sale for release or the release of the mammals into the wild.

(3) In the family Ursidae. All species of the bears.

(4) In the family Procyonidae. All species of raccoons.

(5) In the family Capromyidae. The nutria.

(6) In the family Mustelidae. All species of the skunks.

(7) *Threatened, endangered or injurious.* An animal, bird or egg of a bird listed by the Commonwealth or the United States Department of the Interior as threatened, endangered or injurious.

(8) *The Monk Parakeet.* Myiopsitts Monachus, sometimes referred to as the Quaker Parakeet or Gray-headed Parakeet.

(9) *Game or wildlife from the wild.* Game or wildlife taken alive from the wild, except the Commission may import wildlife taken from the wild for enhancement of the Commonwealth's wild fauna.

(10) *Game or wildlife held captive.* Game or wildlife held in captivity or captive bred in another state or nation.

(b) Nothing in this section prevents a Nationally recognized circus from temporarily bringing wildlife into this Commonwealth in connection with presenting circus performances.

(c) Nothing in this section prevents zoological gardens, exotic wildlife dealers or exotic wildlife possession permit holders from importing wildlife.

(d) A person wishing to import lawfully acquired wildlife, or parts thereof, for menagerie, educational or scientific purposes shall first obtain an importation permit from the Commission subject to the following:

(1) Importation permits will be issued for a fee of \$50 for each transaction.

(2) A person wishing to import wildlife for menagerie purposes shall be in possession of a menagerie permit prior to submitting the application for an import permit. See Chapter 147 (relating to special permits).

(3) An application for an importation permit shall state the name and address of the applicant, name and address of the person supplying the wildlife, the common and scientific name and the number of wildlife to be covered by the permit, the purpose for which the wildlife is being imported, the qualifications of the applicant to use the wildlife for the stated purpose and the location where the wildlife will be housed or retained.

(e) Transfer of wildlife imported under subsection (d), or its progeny, or parts thereof, to a second party by sale, trade, barter or gift may only be done subject to the following:

(1) A permit issued by the Commission is required to transfer by sale, trade, barter or gift, wildlife or its progeny, or a part thereof.

(2) The fee for a transfer permit is \$50.

(3) Transfer is limited to persons authorized to lawfully import wildlife.

(f) Live wildlife imported for any reason shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection signed by an accredited veterinarian. (g) Except as provided in subsection (h), a person wishing to import any members of the family cervidae shall first obtain an importation permit from the Commission subject to the following:

(1) An application for an importation permit shall state the name and address of the applicant, name and address of the person supplying the cervid, the common and scientific name and the number of cervids to be covered by the permit, the purpose for which the cervids are being imported, the qualifications of the applicant to use the cervids for the stated purpose and the location where the cervids will be housed or retained. The application shall be received by the Commission at least 10 days prior to the proposed import date and be accompanied by an owner's statement that to his knowledge the cervids to be imported have never resided on a premise or come in contact with equipment used on a premise where Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) was ever diagnosed. If the cervids are to be purchased at auction the name and address of the person supplying the cervids and number of cervids purchased shall be reported to the Commission by telephone or fax on the date of purchase. An applicant must receive a confirmation number before the animals are imported. A copy of the completed permit will be forwarded to the applicant.

(2) The shipment shall be accompanied at all times by a certificate of veterinary inspection completed by an accredited veterinarian in compliance with the Department of Agriculture health requirements. The certificate shall remain with the permittee's records for 5 years. The applicant shall identify the herd of origin and the herd of destination on both the permit application and the certificate of veterinary inspection. The cervids to be imported shall be identified to the herd they are being transferred or sold from by at least one permanent unique identifier to include, legible tattoo, United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) approved eartag, breed registration or other state approved permanent identification methods and one temporary identifier. If a microchip is used for identification, the owner shall provide the necessary reader.

(3) In states or provinces where CWD has been detected, herds of origin shall be able to demonstrate a minimum of 5 years in a CWD monitoring program. In states or provinces where CWD has not been detected, herds of origin shall be able to demonstrate a minimum of 3 years in a CWD monitoring program. CWD monitoring programs shall meet the following minimum standards or adopted National standards acceptable to the Commission.

(i) In states where CWD has been found in freeranging wildlife, the state program shall have perimeter fencing requirements adequate to prevent ingress, egress or contact with cervids.

(ii) Surveillance based on testing of all cervid deaths over 16 months of age.

(iii) Physical herd inventory with annual verification reconciling animals with records by an accredited veterinarian or state or Federal personnel is required. Inventory is to include a cross-check of all available animal identifications with the herd inventory and specific information on the disposition of all animals not present.

(iv) Herd additions are allowed from herds with equal or greater time in an approved state CWD monitoring program with no negative impact on the certification status of the receiving herd. If herd additions are acquired from a herd with a later date of enrollment, the receiving herd reverts to the enrollment date of the sending herd. If a herd participating in the monitoring program acquires animals from a nonparticipating herd, the receiving herd shall start over with a new enrollment date based upon the date of acquisition of the animals. If a new herd begins with animals of a given status, that status will be retained by the new herd, based upon the lowest status of animals received. Animals of different status which are commingled during marketing or transport will revert to the lowest status.

(v) The state or province of origin shall list CWD as a reportable disease and impose an immediate quarantine on a herd or premise, or both, when a CWD animal is found.

(vi) Animal health officials in the state or province of origin shall have access to herd records from the time the herd is enrolled in the CWD monitoring program or for 5 years, whichever is less, including records of deaths and causes of death.

(h) A person wishing to import any members of the family cervidae for slaughter within 72 hours at a USDA inspected facility and in accordance with the Department of Agriculture requirements shall first obtain an importation permit from the Commission subject to the following:

(1) An application for importation permit shall state the name and address of the applicant, name and address of the person supplying the cervid, the common and scientific name and the number of cervids to be covered by the permit, that the cervids are being imported for immediate slaughter, and the location where the cervids will be slaughtered. The application must be received by the Commission at least 10 days prior to the proposed import date and be accompanied by an owner's statement that to his knowledge the cervids to be imported have never resided on a premise or come in contact with equipment used on a premise where CWD was ever diagnosed.

(2) Cervids from herds that are known to have been infected with CWD within the last 5 years may not be imported.

(3) If cervids are from states or provinces where CWD has been detected herds of origin shall be able to demonstrate a minimum of 5 years in a CWD monitoring program as described in subsection (g)(3).

(4) Cervids shall be individually identified as to the herd of origin by legible tattoo, ear tag or other method approved by the Commission.

(5) Cervids may not have contact with any other animals not for immediate slaughter.

(i) A person violating this section is subject to the penalties provided in the act.

### GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 141]

#### **Big Game**

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 7, 2003, meeting, adopted the following change:

Amend § 141.41 (relating to general) to be consistent with the flintlock muzzleloading and muzzleloading seasons, to require hunters using muzzleloading rifles during other firearms deer seasons to use calibers .44 or larger as is currently required during the muzzleloading and flintlock muzzleloading seasons.

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The final-form rulemaking was adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 32 Pa.B. 5759 (November 23, 2002).

#### 1. Introduction

The Commission amended § 141.41 to provide consistency between § 141.41 and § 141.43 (relating to deer).

#### 2. Purpose and Authority

Section 141.43 requires individuals hunting during the muzzleloading and flintlock muzzleloading seasons to use muzzleloading firearms and ammunition .44 caliber or larger. The amendment to § 141.41 will make this requirement uniform among the regulations by imposing the restriction during all firearms deer seasons.

Section 2102(b)(1) of the code (relating to regulations) authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits for hunting or furtaking, the possession of certain species or parts thereof, the number and types of devices and equipment allowed, the identification of devices and the use and possession of devices." Section 2102(d) of the code authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations stipulating the size and type of traps, the type of firearms and ammunition and other devices which may be used, the manner in which and the location where the devices may be used, the season when the devices may be used." The amendment to § 141.41 was proposed under these provisions.

#### 3. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking will require hunters carrying muzzleloaders to hunt deer outside of the muzzleloading season to use only muzzleloaders .44 caliber or larger. This final-form rulemaking is consistent with the existing .44 caliber restriction in muzzleloading and flintlock muzzleloading seasons.

#### 4. Persons Affected

Hunters using muzzleloading rifles during bear and other firearms deer seasons will be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

#### 5. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

#### 6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

Hunters who have hunted during past bear and regular firearms deer seasons using muzzleloading firearms taking ammunition smaller than .44 caliber may need to acquire different firearms to comply with the final-form rulemaking.

#### 7. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

#### TITLE 58. RECREATION

#### PART III. GAME COMMISSION

#### **CHAPTER 141. HUNTING AND TRAPPING**

#### Subchapter C. BIG GAME

#### § 141.41. General.

(a) *Permitted acts.* It is lawful to take:

(1) Bear or elk with a crossbow with a draw weight of not less than 125 pounds nor more than 200 pounds.

(2) Deer during the regular firearms deer season with a crossbow with a draw weight of not less than 125 pounds nor more than 200 pounds.

#### (b) It is unlawful to:

(1) Hunt for big game birds or animals with arrows or crossbow bolts other than those tipped with broadheads of a cutting-edge design.

(2) Hunt for or assist to hunt for deer, bear or elk during the regular firearms season or special firearms season without wearing a minimum of 250 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored material. The material shall be worn on the head, chest and back combined so it is visible in a 360° arc.

(3) Hunt for deer or bear through the use of any one or more of the following:

(i) A muzzleloading handgun.

(ii) A muzzleloading firearm that is not .44 caliber or larger.

(4) Kill big game by mistake or accident and immediately after killing and before removing any big game from the location of the killing, fail to fully complete the proper game fill tag in compliance with the instructions printed on the tag and attach only the game kill tag to the big game.

(5) Kill big game by mistake or accident and fail to report the killing to the appropriate Commission regional office as soon as possible but no later than 12 hours after the time of kill.

#### GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 143] Antlerless Deer Licenses

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 7, 2003, meeting, adopted the following changes:

Amend Chapter 143, Subchapter C (relating to antlerless deer licenses) to provide for the processing and issuance of antlerless deer licenses in new, noncounty based wildlife management units.

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The final-form rulemaking was adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 32 Pa.B. 6370 (December 28, 2002).

#### 1. Introduction

The Commission amended Chapter 143, Subchapter C to provide for issuance of antlerless deer licenses on the basis of new wildlife management units.

#### 2. Purpose and Authority

Antlerless deer licenses are currently issued on a county basis. This system does not take into account variations in topography, habitat and other factors affecting deer. To improve deer management, the Commission is proposing to issue antlerless deer licenses on the basis of improved management units.

Section 2722(g) of the code (relating to authorized license-issuing agents) provides that: "The Commission shall adopt regulations for: ... (2) The administration, control and performance of activities conducted pursuant to the provisions of this chapter." The amendments were proposed under this authority.

#### 3. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking will provide for the processing and issuance of antlerless deer licenses on a new, noncounty based wildlife management unit basis.

#### 4. Persons Affected

Persons applying for antlerless deer licenses will be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

#### 5. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

#### 6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking will result in some additional cost to the Commission in the form of expenses to sort and forward antlerless deer license applications to county treasurers.

#### 7. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

#### CHAPTER 143. HUNTING AND FURTAKER LICENSES

#### Subchapter C. ANTLERLESS DEER LICENSES

#### § 143.41. Purpose and scope.

(a) The intent of this section is to ensure a fair and equitable distribution of licenses.

(b) The Commission, after reviewing reproductive data, will establish the number of antlerless deer licenses allocated to each wildlife management unit. Licenses will be distributed among county treasurers for issuance on the basis of percentage of land each county represents in the unit.

(c) An application shall be accepted without restriction or regard to the applicant's county of residence. The following procedure shall be adhered to when determining successful applicants for licenses: (1) Accept applications on a first-come-first-served basis.

(2) The Commission in Harrisburg will serve as the central receiver for all mail-in applications in all wildlife management units.

(3) Envelopes received by first class mail delivered through and by the United States Postal Service will be examined as soon as practicable, unopened, to determine the number of applications received as well as to verify delivery to the intended wildlife management unit.

(4) This process of application distribution will continue until the available supply of licenses for that wildlife management unit is exhausted.

(d) The Commission may act in the capacity of a county treasurer for issuing antlerless licenses in a wildlife management unit if authority to issue licenses has been removed from any or all county treasurers in the wildlife management unit.

(e) Notwithstanding the provisions of this chapter limiting the number of licenses available, the Commission will authorize antlerless deer licenses to be issued regardless of an established quota to:

(1) A resident of this Commonwealth within 60 days of discharge from active duty under honorable conditions from the United States Armed Forces or United States Coast Guard. The issuing county treasurer will designate the license for a specific wildlife management unit by writing the unit's alphanumeric designation on the face of the license.

(2) A disabled veteran as defined in 34 Pa.C.S. § 2706 (b)(1) (relating to resident license and fee exemptions). The issuing county treasurer will designate the license for a specific wildlife management unit by writing the unit's alphanumeric designation on the face of the license.

(3) An applicant whom the Executive Director has determined to have been erroneously denied a license.

#### § 143.42. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

*Application*—The form issued with a regular hunting license used in applying for an antlerless license.

*County allocation*—The number of licenses allocated by the Commission to an individual county.

*County treasurer*—A county treasurer in this Commonwealth or a person carrying out the duties and responsibilities of a county treasurer in counties functioning under a home rule charter.

*Date issued*—The date placed on the license by a county treasurer or the Commission indicating when the license was mailed or given to the person named on the license.

*Envelope*—The official envelope issued with a regular hunting license which shall be used by the applicant to mail completed applications to the Commission.

*Home address*—The location where a person is legally domiciled; a true, fixed and permanent home and principal residence; and the place to which, whenever the applicant is temporarily absent, he intends to return.

*License*—The numbered back tag which is issued by the county treasurer or the Commission authorizing the holder thereof to hunt antlerless deer in a specific wildlife management unit.

*Management unit allocation*—The number of licenses allocated by the Commission to an individual wildlife management unit.

Unsold tag—An antlerless deer license permitting properly licensed persons to take an antlerless deer during any firearms antlerless deer season, archery or flintlock muzzleloader and muzzleloader deer seasons in the wildlife management unit of issue.

*Unsold tag application*—The form contained in the "Hunting and Trapping Digest" used in applying for an unsold tag.

Void—A voided license which remains nonissuable.

#### § 143.43. Preamble.

(a) An application shall be submitted to the Commission wildlife management unit address in Harrisburg and a license shall be issued only in accordance with the act and this subchapter.

(b) A nonresident of this Commonwealth may only apply under § 143.50 (relating to procedure for nonresidents of this Commonwealth).

#### § 143.45. Completing and submitting applications.

(a) Except as otherwise provided in § 143.52 (relating to procedure for unlimited antlerless licenses) and for those applications submitted by qualified landowners, it is unlawful for a county treasurer to accept an application other than from the Commission. County treasurers with unsold antlerless deer licenses shall accept applications over the counter and may immediately issue licenses beginning on the first Monday in November.

(b) The Commission will not accept antlerless deer license applications other than by first class mail delivered through and by the United States Postal Service.

(c) Applications will not be accepted by the Commission prior to the start of the normal business day on the first Monday in August.

(d) The application shall be legibly completed, in its entirety, in accordance with instructions on the application.

(e) The application shall be mailed only in the envelope provided.

(f) Applications are limited to not more than three per envelope.

(g) The appropriate preprinted number on the outside of the envelope shall be circled indicating the number of applications enclosed.

(h) The envelope shall contain return first class postage and be self-addressed. If requirements of this subsection are not met, applications shall be placed in a dead letter file and may be reclaimed by the applicant upon contacting the Commission's Hunting License Division in Harrisburg. Postage, both forward and return, is the responsibility of the applicant.

(i) Unless otherwise ordered by the Director, remittance shall be in the form of a negotiable check or money order payable to "County Treasurer" for applications enclosed, and in the total amount specified in the act for each license. Cash may be accepted by county treasurers for over the counter sales.

#### § 143.46. (Reserved).

#### § 143.47. (Reserved).

#### § 143.48. First-come-first-served license issuance.

(a) Envelopes containing applications will be accepted on a first-come-first-served basis. Envelopes will be inspected by the Commission in Harrisburg, unopened, to determine if they comply with § 143.45(b), (c), (e) and (g) (relating to completing and submitting applications).

(b) If the conditions in § 143.45(b), (c), (e) and (g) are met, it constitutes initial acceptance, and the applications will be forwarded to a county treasurer within the wildlife management unit for issuance of the appropriate number of licenses. If the conditions are not met, the enclosed applications will be rejected and returned to the sender as soon as possible.

(c) The first-come-first-served procedure will continue until the management unit's allocation is exhausted.

(d) Applications received over the management unit's allocation will be returned to the applicants as soon as practicable.

(e) Envelopes containing applications initially accepted for the issuance of a license shall be opened and inspected by the county treasurer at his earliest convenience. If an application in an accepted envelope fails to comply with § 143.45 (relating to completing and submitting applications), applications enclosed in the accepted envelope shall be rejected and returned by the county treasurer to the sender as soon as practicable. The back tags initially assigned to the envelope shall be marked VOID across the face in ink.

#### § 143.49. Issuing licenses.

(a) Licenses may be issued by county treasurers immediately following receipt of applications from the Commission.

(b) Licenses shall be validated by the addition of the county treasurer's or the Director's signature or signature stamp, date of issue and the applicant's regular hunting license back tag number. The county treasurer shall write in ink the applicant's regular hunting license back tag number on the antlerless deer ear tag. The county treasurer shall write in ink the assigned antlerless license number on the face of the check or money order.

(c) Except as otherwise provided in § 143.52 (relating to procedure for unlimited antlerless licenses) and for qualified landowners, licenses issued shall be delivered to successful applicants in the envelope by first class mail through and by the United States Postal Service. Licenses shall be placed with the United States Postal Service no later than the third Monday in September, except for licenses issued under § 143.51(f) (relating to application and issuance of unsold tags) which shall be placed with the United States Postal Service no later than October 1. If more than one application is mailed to the county treasurer in the same envelope, the licenses shall be mailed to the person whose name appears on the return section of the envelope. The person receiving the additional licenses is responsible for delivering them to the appropriate people.

#### § 143.50. Procedure for nonresidents of this Commonwealth.

The Commission having unsold licenses on the third Monday in August and thereafter will accept applications for those units in compliance with § 143.45 (relating to completing and submitting applications) from nonresidents of this Commonwealth.

#### § 143.51. Application and issuance of unsold tags.

(a) Except as provided in § 143.52 (relating to procedures for unlimited antlerless licenses), beginning on the fourth Monday in August, residents and nonresidents of this Commonwealth are eligible to receive an unsold tag.

(b) An applicant for this tag may not use the regular antlerless deer license application. An applicant shall only use the unsold application contained in the "Hunting and Trapping Digest" or a reasonable facsimile thereof.

(c) The applicant shall use the official antlerless deer license application envelope.

(d) Unless otherwise ordered by the Director, remittance in the form of a negotiable check or money order for the total amount due as specified in the act, payable to "County Treasurer," shall accompany the application.

(e) Unsold tags shall be validated by the addition of the county treasurer's or Director's signature or signature stamp, date of issue and the applicant's regular hunting license back tag number. The county treasurer shall write in ink the applicant's regular hunting license back tag number on the antlerless deer ear tag.

(f) Beginning on the second Monday in September, residents and nonresidents of this Commonwealth are eligible to apply for one additional unsold tag by mailing to the appropriate Commission wildlife management unit address in Harrisburg.

#### § 143.52. Procedure for unlimited antlerless licenses.

(a) The Executive Director will designate by April 30 of each year those wildlife management units where hunters will be allowed to apply for an unlimited number of antlerless deer licenses.

(b) Beginning on the fourth Monday in August, residents and nonresidents of this Commonwealth shall be eligible to apply to designated wildlife management units for an unlimited number of antlerless deer licenses by mailing the application to the appropriate Commission wildlife management unit address in Harrisburg.

(c) Beginning on the date specified in subsection (b), county treasurers within the designated wildlife management units shall accept antlerless applications over the counter from residents and nonresidents of this Commonwealth and may immediately issue licenses to applicants.

#### § 143.53. Reapplication.

(a) A person whose application has been rejected and returned may secure a new official envelope from a hunting license issuing agent and reapply for a license by:

(1) If applicable, correcting the errors which caused the original application to be rejected and returning it to the Commission wildlife management unit address in Harrisburg.

(2) Changing on the application the designated wildlife management unit in which the applicant desires to hunt and forwarding it to another Commission wildlife management unit address in Harrisburg.

(b) A person who was issued a license that was subsequently lost in the United States mail and never received by the licensee may, upon submitting an affidavit stating this fact, receive a replacement license from a county treasurer within the wildlife management unit for which the license was intended. There will be no additional cost for this license. Prior to issuing a replacement license, county treasurers shall first verify through their records or through communication with another county treasurer that the applicant was issued the original license.

#### § 143.54. Validity of license.

An antierless deer license is valid for taking antierless deer only in the wildlife management unit designated on the antierless deer license.

# **PROPOSED RULEMAKING**

## FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

### [58 PA. CODE CHS. 65, 69, 75, 77 AND 111]

#### Fishing; Boating

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapters 65, 69, 75, 77 and 111. The Commission is publishing the proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

#### A. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

#### B. Contact Person

#### C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments to § 65.24 (relating to miscellaneous special regulations) are published under the statutory authority of section 2307 of the code (relating to waters limited to specific purposes). The proposed amendments to §§ 69.21 and 69.24 (relating to limitations on numbers and types of licenses; and limitations on gear) are published under the statutory authority of section 2903 of the code (relating to boat and net licenses for boundary lakes). The proposed amendment to § 75.1 (relating to endangered species) is published under the statutory authority of section 2305 of the code (relating to threatened and endangered species). The proposed amendments to § 77.2 (relating to reptile and amphibian hunt permits) are published under the authority of section 2904 of the code (relating to permits for protection and management of particular fish). The proposed amendments to  $\S$  77.6 (relating to season and daily possession limits) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102(b) of the code (relating to rules and regulations). The proposed amendments to §§ 111.6, 111.21 and 111.54 (relating to Berks County; Cumberland County; and Schuylkill County) are published under the statutory authority of section 5124 of the code (relating to particular areas of water).

#### D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to fishing and boating. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

The Commission's Boating Advisory Board considered the proposed amendments to Chapter 111 (relating to special regulations counties) and recommended that the Commission publish a notice of proposed rulemaking containing the proposed amendments.

#### E. Summary of Proposal

(1) Sections 65.24, 77.2 and 77.9. A recent review of the Commission's regulations has revealed that certain

housekeeping changes should be made. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend these sections to read as set forth in Annex A.

(2) Sections 69.21 and 69.24. Beginning on January 1, 1996, the use of gill nets for fishing on boundary lakes became illegal. Since that time, there have been only three commercial fishermen who annually apply for trap net licenses to legally fish in this Commonwealth waters of Lake Erie.

Section 69.21 currently provides that up to 10 individuals may be licensed to fish with up to 20 trap nets each and that each net requires a separate license. Two of the three licensees have not recorded any fishing activity or landings for several years, a requirement for renewing and maintaining a commercial trap net license under § 69.23(c)(1) and (2) (relating to responsibility of licens-ees). Based upon the performance of the trap net fishery since 1996 and the lack of additional interest in its expansion, there is no reasonable expectation that a vigorous trap net fishery will prosper in the near future. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend §§ 69.21 and 69.24 to reduce the number of trap net licenses so that up to three individuals may be licensed to fish up to six trap nets each. The Commission intends to revisit this issue in the future and further reduce the number of trap net licenses if activity continues to be limited and interest is waning.

(3) Section 75.1. In 1990, the United States Department of Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, designated Alasmidonta heterodon (dwarf wedgemussel) as Federally endangered in the entire range. This species of freshwater mussel is known to occur in Connecticut, Massachusetts, Maryland, North Carolina, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Vermont and New Brunswick, Canada. Until recently, the dwarf wedgemussel was considered extirpated from its former range in the Delaware River drainage.

During mussel surveys of the Upper Delaware Scenic and Recreation River by William Lellis of the United States Geological Survey, from July to August 2000, the dwarf wedgemussel was discovered at six locations in the upper Delaware River, Wayne County. Thirteen live specimens and four shells were located from north of Equinunk, PA to south of Callicoon, NY. Subsequent surveys in 2001 and 2002 by William Lellis have documented additional occurrences in the Upper Delaware River basin.

Section 102 of the code (relating to definitions) defines endangered species as "all species and subspecies of fish which (1) have been declared by the Secretary of the United States Department of Interior to be threatened with extinction and appear on the Endangered Species List or the Native Endangered Species List published in the *Federal Register*, or (2) have been declared by the executive director to be threatened with extinction and appear on the Pennsylvania Endangered Species List published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*." Because this Federally endangered species recently has been rediscovered in this Commonwealth, the Commission proposes adding it to the Pennsylvania list of endangered species.

(4) Section 111.6. The Commission adopted special regulations in 1971 to allow and control the use of the Felix Dam pool of the Schuylkill River for waterskiing and other uses inconsistent with the 100-foot rule and other special boating requirements. The dam is a very old

wooden crib structure and was breached several years ago during a flood event. It does not appear that the dam will be reconstructed, and the regulations have become superfluous because the type of boating that the regulations were intended to permit can no longer take place. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to delete the regulation as set forth in Annex A.

(5) Section 111.21. The Commission adopted special regulations in 1979 to control the use of boats on the pool behind the Good Hope Mill Dam on the Conodoguinet Creek. The dam was removed in 2001, and the circumstances that required these special regulations no longer exist. The general boating regulations adequately regulate boating in this area. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to delete the regulation as set forth in Annex A.

(6) Section 111.54. A recent staff review of the Commission's regulations has revealed that they do not include Tuscarora Lake in Schuylkill County as being electric motors only. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to add this lake to its list of electric motors only restrictions as set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed rulemaking will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

### **CHAPTER 77. REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS**

## § 77.2. Reptile and amphibian hunt permits.

(b) The Commission finds, under section 2904 of the code (relating to permits for protection and management of particular fish), that it is necessary for the proper protection and management of the timber rattlesnake (*Crotalus horridus*) that persons who hunt, take, catch or kill timber rattlesnakes have an individual permit for the activity. It is unlawful to take, catch, kill or possess a timber rattlesnake no matter how obtained without procuring the required permit from the Commission. Application for a permit shall be made on a form prescribed by the Commission. Permits may be obtained by applying to: Herpetology and Endangered Species Coordinator, **[Bureau of Fisheries]** Division of Environmental Services, 450 Robinson Lane, Bellefonte, Pennsylvania 16823-9616. It is unlawful for a permittee to hunt for

timber rattlesnakes without having in his possession the required permit at all times while engaged in the activities. Permittees under this section shall comply with the terms and conditions of the permit, including the requirement for catch reports. The fee for the permit is \$5 per year.

(c) The Commission finds, under section 2904 of the code, that it is necessary for the proper protection and management of reptiles and amphibians in this Commonwealth that organized reptile and amphibian hunts be conducted under permits issued under this section. The sponsor of one or more organized reptile and amphibian hunts shall apply for a permit by no earlier than January 1 and no later than March 1 of the year for which the hunt is proposed on a form prescribed by the Commission. Permits may be obtained by applying to: Herpetology and Endangered Species Coordinator, Bureau of Fisheries ] Division of Environmental Services, 450 Robinson Lane, Bellefonte, Pennsylvania 16823-9616. It is unlawful to engage in organized reptile and amphibian hunts unless the sponsors of the hunts have first procured the required permit for each hunt. The required permits shall be held in possession of the sponsor at all times during each hunt. Permittees shall comply with the terms and conditions of each permit and furnish reports required thereby. The fee for each permit is \$25.

## [58 PA. CODE CHS. 91, 109 AND 117] Boating

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapters 91, 109 and 117 (relating to general provisions; specialty boats and waterskiing activities; and boat rental businesses). The Commission is publishing the proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

#### A. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin.*

#### C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments to \$\$ 91.4, 91.6, 91.7, 109.3 and 117.4 are published under the statutory authority of section 5123 of the code (relating to general boating regulations).

#### D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to boating. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal. The Commission's Boating Advisory Board considered the proposed rulemaking and recommended that the Commission publish a notice of proposed rulemaking containing the proposed amendments.

#### E. Summary of Proposal

(1) Section 91.4. The act of December 9, 2002 (P. L. 1542, No. 199) (Act 199), which went into effect on February 7, 2003, requires persons born on or after January 1, 1982, to have a Boating Safety Education Certificate to operate a boat propelled by a motor greater than 25 horsepower. As a result of Act 199, certain parts of § 91.6 (relating to Boating Safety Education Certificates) regarding personal watercraft use have become redundant. The proposed amendments eliminate operational requirements for persons 12 to 15 years of age that are redundant with § 109.3(h) (relating to personal watercraft) and Act 199.

Additionally, the current regulations place restrictions on the operation of boats propelled by a motor greater than 10 horsepower. Because Act 199 regulates the use of powerboats based on a horsepower limitation of greater than 25 horsepower, the Commission will retain the current regulations regulating the age-based use of boats powered by motors of 25 horsepower or less.

Accordingly, the Commission proposes to remove the redundant sections and reword the regulation for clarity. The proposed rulemaking does not change the original intent of the regulations, and the current prohibitions remain in effect.

(2) Section 91.6. The current definition of a Boating Safety Education Certificate in this section does not adequately define what information a Boating Safety Education Certificate must contain. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to include this information.

In addition, Act 199 establishes that persons who violate the new law commit a summary offense of the second degree, which carries a penalty of \$100 or imprisonment not exceeding 20 days. Currently, persons who violate § 91.6 commit a summary offense of the third degree, which carries a penalty of \$50. Accordingly, the Commission has designated § 91.6 as being for the protection of the health and safety of persons on boats, towed by boats or on, in or along the waters of this Commonwealth and has promulgated this section in accordance with section 5123(a)(1) of the code. Persons who violate a rule or regulation promulgated under this subsection and paragraph commit a summary offense of the second degree.

(3) Section 91.7. Act 199 requires that the Commission adopt criteria for courses and certificates that are acceptable for the purposes of Act 199. The Commission proposes to add § 91.7 (relating to criteria for courses of instruction in boating safety education) to address this requirement. Under § 91.7, the Commission will accept courses that meet the requirements of the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA). These standards for education courses were developed through a United States Coast Guard grant and meet Nationally accepted education standards for course content. States that incorporate these Nationally accepted standards by adopting NASBLA approval as a minimum requirement assure a degree of uniformity among the states that helps boaters who travel between the states meet the education certification requirements of the states they travel through.

(4) *Sections 109.3 and 117.4.* Section 109.3(f) and (h)(1) refers to the rental of personal watercraft. Therefore, the Commission proposes that these subsections be moved to § 117.4 (relating to personal watercraft liveries).

Section 109.3(h)(2) and (3) provides for the issuance of temporary Boating Safety Education Certificates for purchasers of new personal watercraft. These provisions were initially intended to help boat buyers who could not readily attend a boating class after they had purchased a boat. Since the Commission promulgated this regulation, the Commission has instituted an Internet and a video course that is acceptable for obtaining a certificate. The provision is no longer needed because boaters are able to obtain their permanent certificates in a reasonable amount of time. Dealers should encourage prospective buyers to review the video or go online while they are making purchase decisions or the boat is being prepared for delivery. Accordingly, the Commission proposes that the provisions for dealer-issued temporary certificates for boat buyers be eliminated.

In addition, the Commission has designated § 109.3 as being for the protection of the health and safety of persons on boats, towed by boats or on, in or along the waters of this Commonwealth and has promulgated this section in accordance with section 5123(a)(1) of the code.

#### TITLE 58. RECREATION

## PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

#### Subpart C. BOATING

#### **CHAPTER 91. GENERAL PROVISIONS**

#### § 91.4. Age of operator.

(a) [The following age restrictions apply to the operation of a motorboat propelled by a motor greater than 10 horsepower (other than personal watercraft):

(1) A person 11 years of age or younger may not operate [such a watercraft] a personal watercraft or a boat propelled by a motor greater than 10 horsepower.

[ (2) A person 12 through 15 years of age may not operate such a watercraft unless the person has obtained and has in his possession a Boating Safety Education Certificate or at least one person 16 years of age or older is present onboard. ]

(b) [The following age restrictions apply to the operation of personal watercraft:

(1) A person 11 years of age or younger may not operate a personal watercraft.

(2) A person 12 through 15 years of age may not operate a personal watercraft unless he has obtained and has in his possession a Boating Safety Education Certificate.

(3) ] A person 12 through 15 years of age may not operate a boat propelled by a motor greater than 10 horsepower unless the person has obtained and has in his possession a Boating Safety Education Certificate or at least one person 16 years of age or older is present onboard.

(c) A person 12 through 15 years of age may not operate a personal watercraft if there are any passengers onboard 15 years of age or younger.

#### § 91.6. Boating Safety Education Certificates.

#### (a) *Definition*.

[ (1) For residents of this Commonwealth, a Boating Safety Education Certificate is one issued to an individual by the Commission, another state or Canadian province. Upon proper application, the Commission may issue a Boating Safety Education Certificate to a resident of this Commonwealth who successfully completes a course offered by an organization designated by the Executive Director.

(2) For nonresidents, a Boating Safety Education Certificate is one issued to an individual who successfully completes a course offered by the Commission, another state, a Canadian province or an organization designated by the Executive Director.]

A Boating Safety Education Certificate is a certificate issued by a state to an individual upon the successful completion of a boating safety education course approved by the Commission and the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA). It shall contain the following information:

- (1) Name of the individual
- (2) Type of course
- (3) Certificate number
- (4) Date of issue
- (5) Date of birth
- (6) Eye color
- (7) Hair color
- (8) Sex
- (9) State of issuance
- (10) Whether course is NASBLA-approved

\* \* \*

§ 91.7. Criteria for courses of instruction in boating safety education.

A course of instruction in boating safety education shall meet the National Boating Safety Education Standards of the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) and shall have received the approval of NASBLA. These standards and procedures for approval may be obtained from NASBLA at 1500 Leestown Road, Suite 330, Lexington, KY 40511 or on the World Wide Web at http://www.nasbla.org/education\_standards.htm.

#### CHAPTER 109. SPECIALTY BOATS AND WATERSKIING ACTIVITIES

§ 109.3. Personal watercraft.

\* \* \* \*

(f) [A rental business may not lease, hire or rent a personal watercraft to or for use by a person who is 15 years of age or younger.

(g) ] The operator of a personal watercraft with a capacity of two or less persons as determined by the manufacturer, may not tow [water skiers] water-skiers or engage in [water skiing] waterskiing or similar activities while operating a personal watercraft. Other personal watercraft may tow no more than one skier.

**[ (h) ] (g)** Except as otherwise provided in this subpart, **[ on or after January 1, 2000, ]** a person may not operate a personal watercraft on the waters of this Commonwealth unless the person has obtained a Boating Safety Education Certificate as defined in § 91.6 (relating to Boating Safety Education Certificates).

[ (1) The Executive Director may authorize boat rental businesses to issue temporary boating safety education certificates, effective for the period of rental only, to operators of rental personal watercraft if the boat rental business and the operator comply with the requirements governing the rental of personal watercraft and the operation of personal watercraft rental businesses as defined in Chapter 117 (relating to boat rental business).

(2) The Executive Director may authorize issuance of temporary boating safety education certificates to operators of newly purchased personal watercraft upon completion of training and examination the Executive Director may require.

(3) New purchasers of personal watercraft and members of their immediate families may be eligible for issuance of temporary certificates, which shall be valid for 60 days from the date of purchase.

#### **CHAPTER 117. BOAT RENTAL BUSINESSES**

#### § 117.4. Personal watercraft liveries.

(a) A livery operator that rents personal watercraft shall verify that operators of rented personal watercraft comply with § 109.3 (relating to personal watercraft) and the guidelines on providing education and training issued by the Executive Director. A livery operator that rents personal watercraft also shall verify that operators of rented personal watercraft either possess a permanent Boating Safety Education Certificate or have obtained a temporary Boating Safety Education Certificate from the personal watercraft livery. The Executive Director may authorize boat liveries to issue temporary **Boating Safety Education Certificates, effective for** the period of rental only, to operators of rental personal watercraft if the boat livery and the operator comply with the requirements governing the rental of personal watercraft and the operation of boat liveries as defined in this chapter. The Executive Director will establish rules and guidelines for the issuance of temporary certificates.

(c) A personal watercraft livery may not lease, hire or rent a personal watercraft to or for use by a person who is 15 years of age or younger.

## GAME COMMISSION

## [58 PA. CODE CH. 143]

#### **Deer Management Assistance Program**

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 7, 2003, meeting, proposed the following amendments:

Add Subchapter L (relating to deer management assistance program licenses) to provide hunters the opportunity to purchase and use area specific deer management assistance program (DMAP) licenses that have been allotted to qualifying applicant landowners.

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed regulations is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the January 7, 2003, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until April 4, 2003, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

#### 1. Introduction

The Commission is proposing to add Subchapter L to Chapter 143 (relating to hunting and furtaker licenses) to implement the DMAP, which is designated to specially assist landowners experiencing particularly severe problems related to excessive deer herd populations.

#### 2. Purpose and Authority

Under proposed Subchapter L, the regulations will provide qualified landowners with a determined allotment of coupons, which may then be distributed by the landowners to hunters. Hunters receiving the coupons will then be permitted to submit the coupons to purchase and use DMAP antlerless licenses in the qualified specific area related to that coupon. The number of coupons that will be allotted to any qualifying applicant landowner will be determined based on the specific program the landowner qualifies for as well as any approved deer management plans submitted by the landowner. The county treasurer will issue the DMAP licenses without regard to the regular, annual, antlerless license allocation for each wildlife management unit. The intention behind DMAP is to provide both public and private landowners with an additional tool for the future management of local whitetailed deer herds on lands where excessive deer numbers have compromised the landowners' land uses and other interests. Subchapter L will establish application procedures, coupon distribution limits and eligibility guidelines for landowners.

Section 2722(g) of the code (relating to authorized license-issuing agents) directs the Commission to adopt regulations for the administration, control and performance of license issuing activities. Section 2102(a) of the

code (relating to regulations) provides "The Commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and managementof game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." These two provisions provide the statutory authority for the proposed rulemaking.

#### 3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will establish a DMAP whereby landowners may qualify to have additional antlerless licenses issued to hunters to harvest antlerless deer on their lands.

#### 4. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt for antlerless deer and persons wishing to have more deer harvested from their land will be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

#### 5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will result in some additional cost to the Commission in the form of printing additional antlerless deer licenses and printing and distributing coupons to landowners for this program.

#### 6. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective on final-form publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

#### 7. Contact Person

#### § 143.301. Purpose and scope.

This subchapter establishes rules for application and issuance of antlerless deer licenses for use on lands enrolled in a DMAP and will be reviewed by the Commission in January 2004.

#### § 143.302. Definitions.

The following words or terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Coupon-The coupon issued by the Commission to approved DMAP areas entitling the holder to one DMAP license for the DMAP area indicated on the coupon.

DMAP-The Deer Management Assistance Program.

DMAP license-The numbered back tag which is issued by the county treasurer authorizing the holder thereof to hunt antlerless deer in a specific DMAP area. Each license has its own antlerless deer ear tag and antlerless deer harvest report card attached to be used only for tagging and reporting an antlerless deer harvested.

Private land-Land not defined as public land and owned or leased by 3 or fewer natural persons which are not incorporated.

Public land-Any land owned or controlled by a Federal or State agency, or municipal political subdivision.

#### § 143.303. Eligibility and application for DMAP.

(a) In the 2003-2004 license year, DMAP applications will only be accepted for public land, and private land enrolled in one of the Commission's public access programs (Farm Game, Forest Game or Safety Zone-P.10203). Owners or lessees of private land or authorized officers or employees of political subdivisions or government agencies shall apply for the DMAP in a manner and on a form required by the Director for one of the following programs:

(1) Small landowner program. Less than 1,000 contiguous acres of land. One DMAP license will be allocated for every 50 acres enrolled in the DMAP. Additional DMAP licenses may be allocated dependent on current conditions relative to goals and objectives outlined in a Commission approved management plan.

(2) Agriculture program. Land where material destruction of cultivated crops, fruit trees or vegetables by deer has been or can be documented by the Commission. One DMAP license will be allocated for every 5 acres enrolled in the DMAP. Additional DMAP licenses may be allocated dependent on current conditions relative to goals and objectives outlined in a Commission approved management plan.

(3) Urban program. Land owned or controlled by municipalities or community associations. The number of DMAP licenses allocated will depend on current conditions relative to goals and objectives outlined in the management plan.

(4) Conservation program. Land where deer damage to threatened or endangered plant or animal species, or both, or communities in which they live has been documented or can be documented by the applicant. The number of DMAP licenses allocated will depend on current conditions relative to goals and objectives outlined in a Commission approved management plan.

(5) Large landowner program. One thousand or more contiguous acres of land. The number of DMAP licenses allocated will depend on current conditions relative to goals and objectives outlined in a Commission approved management plan. Applicants engaged in forestry practices shall provide information about forestry practices for the property in the management plan.

(b) Applications shall be submitted to the appropriate regional office by July 1 immediately preceding the first fall deer hunting season.

(c) When a management plan is required with the application, the procedure is as follows:

(1) An application for approval of a management plan that will allow the use of DMAP licenses on a designated land area shall contain the following information:

(i) The name of the owner, lessee, political subdivision or government agency that is requesting approval of a deer management plan.

(ii) If the application is for the urban program, Conservation program or public land, the name and address of the authorized officer or employee of the political subdivision or government agency who will be the contact person for the plan.

(iii) A map showing the location and boundaries of the area and the county, township and Commission wildlife management unit the site is located in.

(iv) A description of the management area delineated on the map in subparagraph (iii) including the size in acres, cover types (forested, nonforested), principal land uses, huntable areas and safety zones and hunter access points.

(v) A brief description of the area including access points that the person in control of the land wants to have posted on the Commission web site, as well as the name and address of a contact person for more information.

(vi) An explanation of deer management goals and objectives for the area. Goals include deer density, deer impacts, habitat condition, forest regeneration, other wildlife and recreational opportunities.

(vii) An explanation to substantiate why the person in control of the land wants to increase the harvest of antlerless deer by allowing use of DMAP on the area. Area specific information shall be provided that supports the deer management goals and objectives, such as deer density estimates, indices of deer abundance, buck/doe ratios, fawn/doe ratios, deer condition, habitat conditions, plant species abundance or diversity, forest regeneration and hunter success rates.

(d) Upon approval of the application, the person in control of the land will conspicuously post the site boundary and all public roadways traversing the property with signs approved by the Commission. Posting shall be completed by the opening date of the first fall antlerless deer season.

(e) Approved applicants shall receive one coupon for each DMAP license the DMAP area is entitled to. Unused coupons shall be returned to the Commission by January 31 of each license year.

#### § 143.304. Issuance of DMAP licenses.

(a) DMAP licenses shall be made available without regard to quota limitations and shall be issued by the county treasurer in the county where the majority of the land enrolled in the DMAP is situated.

(b) One coupon for the DMAP area may be issued to persons who possess a valid Pennsylvania hunting license.

(c) Coupon holders shall present the coupon along with an application for an antlerless license to the county treasurer in the county where the majority of the land enrolled in the DMAP is situated and be issued a DMAP license after paying the prescribed antlerless license fee.

#### § 143.305. Validity of license.

(a) DMAP licenses are valid only during open seasons for hunting antlerless deer.

(b) DMAP licenses are valid only on the DMAP area indicated on the license.

#### § 143.306. Unlawful acts.

It is unlawful to:

(1) Use, possess or attempt to use or possess more than one DMAP license for a specific DMAP area in any license year.

(2) Issue more than one coupon to any person for a specific DMAP area in any license year.

(3) Fail to tag any deer taken in accordance with provisions of this part and the act relating to tagging big game.

(4) Fail to complete harvest report and survey information in accordance with instructions provided on the report card and/or the survey.

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes a statement of policy in Chapter 57 (relating to statements of policy). The proposed statement of policy relates to the classification of wild trout streams. Although not required to publish a notice of a proposal to adopt a statement of policy, the Commission is publishing the proposed statement of policy in this manner and is seeking public comments because of the heightened public interest in this issue. The Commission is publishing this notice of a proposed statement of policy under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

#### A. Effective Date

The proposed statement of policy, if approved on finalform rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

#### B. Contact Person

#### C. Statutory Authority

The proposed statement of policy is published under the statutory authority of section 321 of the code (relating to administration and enforcement) that provides that the Commission administer and enforce the code and other laws of the Commonwealth relating to the protection, propagation and distribution of fish.

#### D. Purpose and Background

Section 105.1 of 25 Pa. Code (relating to definitions) defines the term "wild trout stream" as "a stream classified as supporting naturally reproducing trout populations by the Fish Commission." The definition goes on to provide that the list of wild trout streams is available from the Commission's Fisheries Management Division.

In litigation before the Environmental Hearing Board and the Commonwealth Court, the meaning and effect of this regulatory definition was clarified. Under these precedents, it is clear that the Department of Environmental Protection is to make an independent determination of how to use the Commission's classification of a water as a wild trout stream, as well the factual and expert information on which the classification is based, in making regulatory and permitting decisions. The precedents also indicate that the so-called "wild trout criteria" and the "wild trout list" have regulatory significance and should be published under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202). Although the identification of streams as wild trout streams essentially involves the exercise of professional judgment by fisheries managers and fisheries biologists, it is recognized that the public input may be a useful element in this process.

The Commission proposes a statement of policy that sets forth the basis for classification of streams supporting natural reproduction of trout. This wild trout list is not the same as the listing of Class A Wild Trout Waters or Wilderness Trout Streams. The wild trout stream list currently identifies about 1,500 stream sections that support naturally reproducing trout populations.

#### E. Paperwork

The proposed statement of policy will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

#### F. Fiscal Impact

The proposed statement of policy will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed statement of policy will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

#### G. Public Comments

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, objections or suggestions about the proposed statement of policy to the Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000, within 30 days after publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

## CHAPTER 57. STATEMENTS OF POLICY

## Subchapter A. FISHERIES POLICIES

#### § 57.11. Listing of wild trout streams.

(a) *Maintenance of list.* It is the policy of the Commission to accurately identify and classify streams supporting naturally reproducing populations of trout as wild trout streams. The Fisheries Management Division will maintain the list of wild trout streams. The Executive Director, with the approval of the Commission, will from time-to-time publish the list of wild trout streams in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and on the Internet. Persons with comments, objections or suggestions about the classification of streams listed may submit them to the Commission for review.

(b) *Criteria for classifying wild trout streams.* The classification of a stream as a wild trout stream means that the trout found there have resulted from natural reproduction and that the habitat supports wild trout. Identification of streams for the presence of wild trout typically involves:

(1) Location and habitat. Classifications of wild trout streams will involve examination of one or more sites, which may vary in size, within the stream. The exercise of judgment by the investigator is essential in describing the extent of the stream continuum to which the examination applies. The investigator should find that the habitat is such as would support natural reproduction of trout.

(2) Exclusion of stocked trout. In classifying a wild trout stream, the investigator should find trout resulting from natural reproduction in the stream section or upstream and downstream areas and their tributaries. In making this finding, the investigator will specifically exclude trout stocked as fingerlings or adults and trout that escape from a hatchery. The exercise of judgment is required in examining the trout for physical appearance such as coloration, fin condition, and body configuration as indicators of the source of the trout. Direct evidence of natural reproduction of trout is a factor in making this classification, but it is not required if the other elements are present.

(3) *Biological criteria.* In identifying a wild trout stream, the investigator should find one or more of the following:

(i) Young of the year trout less than 150 mm occur at some time in the stream section.

(ii) Two or more ages of wild trout occur at some time within the stream section.

(4) *Tributary linkages.* All tributaries to wild trout streams are classified as wild trout streams for their function as habitat for segments of wild trout populations, including nurseries and refuges, and in sustaining water quality necessary for wild trout.

(c) *Existing list.* All streams identified as wild trout streams on or before January 1, 2002, and listed as such by the Fisheries Management Division will continue to be considered as wild streams by the Commission.

(d) *Requests for evaluation or reevaluation of streams.* The Commission staff will evaluate or reevaluate the classification of streams as wild trout streams at the request of the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) in connection with permitting decisions.

(1) Requests for evaluation or reevaluation from persons or parties other than DEP will be considered for review consistent with available staff and resources and prioritized based on the status of DEP permitting decisions related to the sites.

(2) Requests that the Commission staff evaluate or reevaluate stream sections for inclusion on or removal from the list of streams supporting naturally reproducing populations of trout may be addressed to the Bureau of Fisheries, Fish and Boat Commission, 450 Robinson Lane, Bellefonte, Pennsylvania 16823-9616.

(3) In evaluating requests to remove streams from the list of wild trout streams, the Commission will take into account circumstances where human intervention or manmade changes have diminished the capacity of a stream to meet the criteria set forth in this section.

(4) Streams will not be removed from the list of wild trout streams in circumstances where the investigator finds evidence that their characteristics and trout populations have been changed solely or principally as a result of human intervention.

(e) *Appeals.* A person aggrieved by the classification of a stream section as a wild trout stream section may appeal the agency action by filing a notice of appeal with the Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17106-7000, within 15 days after publication of the notice that the stream section had been so classified in the *Pennsylvania Bulle-tin.* Nothing in this subsection enlarges or diminishes the appeal rights of persons or parties in connection with permitting decisions and other actions of DEP.

Following the comment period, the Department's Water Management Program Manager will make a final determination regarding these applications. Notice of this final determination will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at which time this determination may be appealed to the Environmental Hearing Board.

## LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

### **UNDER ACT 2, 1995**

#### PREAMBLE 1

#### Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101-6026.908)

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Section 702 of the Bituminous Coal Mine Act (act) provides a mechanism for operators to obtain variances from specific requirements of the act to accommodate the adoption of new machinery, equipment, tools, supplies, methods or processes.

Section 221(d) of the act requires that after an extended ventilation interruption, the electric power must be disconnected from the affected portions of the mine and personnel be evacuated from the mine. It also requires that, after the ventilation is restored, the mine must be examined before workers return to their work.

Summary of the Request: Senate Coal Mines, Inc. requests a variance during the fan stoppage of the main

mine fans when the ventilation quantity is not maintained by the backup fan system. This variance is to maintain electric power on circuits necessary to withdraw persons if located in areas or haulageways where methane is not likely to migrate or to accumulate. These electrical circuits will be de-energized as persons are withdrawn. In addition, mechanized equipment necessary to withdraw persons from the mine need not be shut off if located in areas where methane is not likely to migrate or accumulate. If ventilation is restored, the miners may stop the evacuation in a safe location and return to work areas only after a certified person has made a thorough examination of the areas and the areas are determined to be safe. After ventilation has been restored and the fan has operated for at least 15 minutes, the examiner may use nonpermissible transportation in intake airways to facilitate the making of the examination at the Ondo Mine.

#### Temporary Changes to Fishing Regulations; Upper Hereford Manor Lake, Beaver County

The Executive Director of the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission), acting under the authority of 58 Pa. Code § 65.25 (relating to temporary changes to fishing regulations), has taken immediate action to modify temporarily fishing regulations at Upper Hereford Manor Lake, Beaver County, in anticipation of a possible draw down of the lake. #### State Board of Barber Examiners Regulation No. 16A-425

#### **Deletion of Examination Fees**

#### March 6, 2003

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The State Board of Barber Examiners (Board) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

#### Section 3.103. Fees.—Clarity

This proposed rulemaking deletes eight examination fees. They are being deleted because a professional testing organization administers the examinations and sets the fees.

Section 3.41 (a) requires applications for examinations to be filed with the Board. However, the Board's website instructs applicants to submit applications directly to the testing organization.

Section 3.45 (b) states that applicants may request a personal interview with the Board for review of examination papers. However, the Board does not administer the examination and no longer provides opportunities for personal interviews.

The Board has acknowledged that these sections are outdated. We recommend that the Board incorporate any changes to these sections in the final-form regulation. This would provide the regulated community a clearer understanding of how the examination process works.

#### State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons Regulation No. 16A-603

#### **Vehicle Auction License**

#### March 6, 2003

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons (Board) must respond to these Comments when it submits the finalform regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

#### 1. Section 19.19. Standards of licensure for retail or public auction. Section 19.20. Standards of licensure for wholesale auction.—Consistency with existing statutes; Reasonableness; Clarity.

Sections 19.19 and 19.20 both contain subsections that are virtually identical in structure and language. The following paragraphs outline questions and concerns with subsections that are in both sections.

## Subsection (a)(2). Auction activities from an established place of business

This provision prohibits a business from conducting auction related activities other than from its established place of business. A commentator stated that it accepts bids on vehicle auctions from remote bidders via the Internet and requests that the regulation specifically allow for this type of bidding. The Board should clearly indicate in the final-form regulation whether vehicle auctions with established places of business in this Commonwealth can conduct business via the Internet and other electronic or telephonic methods.

#### Subsection (b)(1). Permanent enclosed building

This provision requires an established place of business for a public or retail auction to include a permanent enclosed building "for use as an auction facility." A commentator has questioned the feasibility of this provision since salvage vehicles typically are not operable and cannot be driven into an enclosed building. Is it the Board's intent to require the sale to take place within the enclosed building?

#### Subsection (b)(5). Certificate of occupancy

The proposed regulation directs auctions to possess a certificate of occupancy issued pursuant to the Fire and Panic Act. Because pertinent provisions of the Fire and Panic Act were repealed by enactment of the Pennsylvania Construction Code (35 P. S. §§ 7210.101—7210.1103), the regulation should be updated to reference current law.

## 2. Section 19.19. Standards of licensure or public auction.—Public safety; Reasonableness; Need; Clarity.

#### Subsection (b)(8)

This subsection describes the requirements for a public or retail auction vehicle display area. In comments dated February 25, 2003, the House Professional Licensure Committee questioned whether a display area open to the public for auctions should be required to abide by the same safety requirements mandated for dealer display areas.

In the Preamble of this proposed regulation, the Board indicates that Act 27 was not intended to apply the same facility requirements to auctions that apply to dealers. However, the Board adds in the Preamble that "public safety considerations demand that the Board provide minimum requirements for auction facilities." The Board should review and justify the minimum requirements that it intends to place on public or retail auctions including the grading and surfacing requirements for dealers in 49 Pa. Code § 19.18(3).

#### State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons Regulation No. 16A-604

#### **Established Place of Business for Dealers**

#### March 6, 2003

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The State Board of Vehicle Manufactures, Dealers and Salespersons (Board) must respond to these Comments when it submits the finalform regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

### Section 19.18. Established place of business for dealers.—Protection of public safety; Clarity.

Paragraph (3)(ii) states that a dealership may display up to five vehicles without regard for grading or surfacing requirements "so long as customers are not permitted to be present in the nonconforming area." The House Professional Licensure Committee questioned how the public will be kept out of the nonconforming display area when dealership personnel are not present or during nonbusiness hours. We agree and question how public safety will be protected. In addition, will dealerships be held responsible for keeping the public out of "nonconforming areas"? The Board should add requirements to make areas inaccessible to the public or provide additional justification for this amendment when it submits the final-form regulation.

#### State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons Regulation No. 16A-607

#### **Consignment Sales**

#### March 6, 2003

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons (Board) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

#### Section 19.18a. Consignment sales.—Clarity.

The House Professional Licensure Committee recommends that the Board adopt minimum size and clarity specifications for the written disclosure required by subsection (d) to ensure proper notice to potential buyers. We agree. The Board should consider requiring use of standard language and specifying a minimum font size for this notice.

#### **Treasury Department Regulation No. 64-3**

#### Estimation Calculations for Determining Unclaimed Property Liability

#### March 10, 2003

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Treasury Department (Department) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the finalform regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

#### Section 951.8. Estimation calculations.—Clarity.

The second paragraph of this section begins with the phrase "Where no holder's records exist...." This language expresses the negative in the actor. However, the negative in this instance belongs with the action, not the actor. Therefore, the Department should change the language in this section to read "Where a holder's records do not exist...."

#### **Department of General Services Regulation No. 8-3**

#### **General Conditions of Contract**

#### March 10, 2003

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Department of General Services (Department) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If

the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

#### General.—Consistency with existing regulations.

This proposed rulemaking repeals existing Chapter 63. The Department should review the other chapters of Title 4 to delete outdated references to Chapter 63. For example, 68.61 references a document contained in Exhibit A of Chapter 63. Upon final promulgation of the proposed rulemaking, this reference will be obsolete.

#### Department of Community and Economic Development Regulation No. 4-72

#### **Industrial Housing**

#### March 10, 2003

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Department of Community and Economic Development (Department) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

# 1. Section 145.36. Applicability of locally-enacted codes and ordinances.—Statutory authority, Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsection (e) provides that these regulations will not apply to local codes, ordinances or regulations except where "local codes, ordinances or regulations preclude the siting of industrialized housing in a manner that does not show a reasonable relationship to legitimate public health, safety or welfare considerations." We understand that this language is consistent with the decision of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court in *Geiger v. Zoning Hearing Board of the Township of North Whitehall*, 507 A.2d 361 (1986). However, we question how these regulations will apply in those situations. Nothing in either the Court's opinion or in the Industrialized Housing Act authorizes the Department to oversee local ordinances, codes or regulations. The Department should justify its authority to do so, or delete this provision.

If the Department demonstrates that it has this authority, it should explain how it would enforce this provision. It should also explain how it would determine whether local ordinances, codes or regulations are needed to protect the public health, safety or welfare. The final-form regulation should include the criteria upon which this determination will be based.

#### 2. Section 145.53. Variations.—Clarity.

The Modular Building Systems Association commented that it is unclear if third party review and approval of plans is required for every building. This section appears to require preconstruction approval of plans and specifications for every building that varies to any degree from previously approved building system documentation. Is this the Department's intent? If not, the final-form regulation should clearly set forth the circumstances under which preconstruction approval is required for variations from a previously approved building system design.

#### 3. Section 145.72a. Frequency of inspections.— Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsection (d) requires dwelling units to be selected for inspection "in a manner and frequency necessary to confirm that the manufacturer's approved compliance control program is effective in assuring installation consistent with the manufacturer's approved building system documentation." What criteria will be used to judge "in a manner and frequency necessary. . ."?

Also under subsection (d), the final-form regulation should specify the time frame within which a manufacturing facility must produce the documentation of an onsite inspection when the Department requests it.

#### 4. Section 145.94. Fees.—Need; Clarity.

#### Subsection (e)

This subsection lists fees which the manufacturer "may be required to pay" when the Department is authorized to monitor or inspect or provide evaluation services. As written, this provision could be interpreted to mean that the fees for the services rendered by the Department in paragraphs (1)—(3) are optional. Subsection (e) should be revised to clearly state that if the Department renders any of the services in paragraphs (1)—(3), the corresponding fees for these services will be assessed.

#### Subsection (f)

Existing subsection (f) authorizes the Department to establish "reasonable handling and other administrative fees as indicated elsewhere in this chapter...." Is this subsection necessary given that the Department is updating all the fees in this proposed regulation? What other "handling" and "administrative" fees would apply?

#### 5. Miscellaneous clarity issue.

The first sentence of the Preamble, as published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, contains a typographical error in the citation to the Department's statutory authority. The Preamble to the final-form regulation should list the Department's statutory authority as 35 P.S. § 1651.5.

#### **Tentative Order**

#### By the Commission:

Enron Energy Services, Inc. (Enron) has failed to pay its \$8,738 general assessment for 2002-2003 under section 510(c) of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 510(c). Enron is an electric generation supplier licensed at A-110059. Commission staff has been advised by Enron's former legal counsel that the company filed a Chapter 11 bankruptcy petition in 2002, is in the process of liquidating the company, and is no longer in business. This information was further confirmed when Commission staff spoke with Enron's Estate Business Center set up by the trustee administering Enron's bankruptcy proceeding.

The Commission puts the industry on notice that we will not hesitate to invoke our authority under the Public Utility Code to ensure timely compliance with our regulations and orders including the ordering of other remedy as the Commission may deem appropriate. See 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 504, 505, 506 and 3301. Based on the previous information and because of Enron's failure to pay its general assessment for 2002-2003, we believe it is appropriate to revoke Enron's electric generation supplier license without the necessity of a formal complaint, and we tentatively conclude that revocation of Enron's license under 66 Pa.C.S. § 1102(a)(2) is in the public interest. Furthermore, the Commission may take other appropriate action, including the imposition of penalties under 66 Pa.C.S. § 3301, in lieu of cancellation, if Enron seeks relief from this Tentative Order; *Therefore*,

#### It Is Ordered That:

1. Revocation of Enron Energy Services, Inc. electric generation supplier license is hereby tentatively approved as being in the public interest.

2. The Secretary serve a copy of this Tentative Order upon the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate and the Office of Trial Staff and also cause a copy of this Tentative Order to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day comment period. 3. Absent the filing of adverse public comment within 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, this Tentative Order shall become final without further action by the Commission.

4. Upon this order becoming final and without further action by the Commission, the electric generation supplier license held by Enron Energy Services, Inc. at A-110059 shall be canceled, and Enron Energy Service's name stricken from all active utility lists maintained by the Commission's Bureau of Fixed Utility Services and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Audits.
