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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

[EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 2005-07, AS AMENDED] Fuel Conservation Program

December 30, 2005

Whereas, Hurricanes Katrina and Rita have caused devastation to the people and resources of the states of Alabama, Mississippi, Texas, and Louisiana including disruption in the production and refinement of petroleum in the Gulf of Mexico; and

Whereas, gasoline prices have reached an all time high across the country and there is a concern that shortages in liquid fuels might occur; and

Whereas, the Commonwealth is a significant consumer of liquid fuel products for transportation, heating, cooling, and other needs; and

Whereas, reducing Commonwealth consumption will reduce the overall demand for liquid fuels, which will help to reduce the risk of fuel shortages and alleviate price increases due to excess demand for limited supply.

Now, Therefore, I, Edward G. Rendell, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by the virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby instruct all Commonwealth agencies, boards, and commissions under the jurisdiction of the Governor to establish and follow a Fuel Conservation Program.

- 1. **Fuel Conservation Program**. The lead member of each agency, board, and commission shall refine existing or establish a new fuel conservation program to take effect immediately and continue until March 31, 2006, at which time the situation will be reviewed. It is possible that the fuel conservation program will be in effect for an extended amount of time.
 - 2. **Goals**. The goals of each Fuel Conservation Program will be to:
- a. substantially reduce the amount of fuel consumed by Commonwealth agencies to help alleviate the threat of a fuel shortage;
- b. set forth necessary plans and actions to ensure the preservation of liquid fuels; and
- c. establish communication with external stakeholders, organizations, and all levels of government regarding the issue.
- 3. **Components of a Fuel Conservation Program**. A fuel conservation program shall consist of the following components:
- a. The use of video and tele-conferencing should be explored for all Commonwealth meetings where travel would normally be used.
- b. All discretionary travel should be eliminated for the duration of this Executive Order. If travel is required to a meeting, car pools or public transportation should be utilized.
- c. The use of Sports Utility Vehicles (SUVs), vans, and large trucks should be done with discretion.
- d. Each agency should carefully monitor their vehicle usage plans or guidelines particularly to vehicle idling, maintenance, tire pressure, driving suggestions, and other fuel conservation measures. In addition, each agency fleet manager should ensure that the agency is following the maintenance procedures for its vehicles to optimize fuel consumption. Whenever possible, fleet vehicles should be fueled at Commonwealth-owned garages.
- 4. **Agency Responsibilities**. The following agencies shall have the following specific responsibilities:
- a. Department of General Services (DGS) shall review the heating, cooling, and other energy conservation measures for each Commonwealth

building and ensure efficient energy use. DGS shall provide instructions per fleet usage and shall work with all agencies regarding the creation of fuel conservation programs for their fleet. DGS shall also limit the use of pool vehicles, especially SUVs, trucks, and vans. Finally, DGS shall review all grounds maintenance activities such as lawn care, leaf blowing, etc. to ensure maximum fuel efficiency and delay, where possible, routine grounds activities that involve the expending of liquid fuels.

- b. Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) shall develop outreach programs for the public and local governments regarding their own fuel conservation programs. Additionally, DEP shall closely monitor the fuel situation across the country and provide a daily status briefing for the Governor.
- 5. **Duration**. This Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect until March 31, 2006, unless revised or rescinded.

PART I. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE [4 PA. CODE CH. 6]

[EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 2006-1]

Commonwealth Continuity of Government Steering Committee

January 10, 2006

Whereas, the functions and services of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania are essential to the well being of all of Pennsylvania's citizens; and

Whereas, the safety and well being of both the customers and employees of Commonwealth operations are of the highest priority; and

Whereas, the investment the Commonwealth has made in physical assets, resources, systems, and equipment is extensive and is the valued property of all Pennsylvanians; and

Whereas, there is a need to prepare for, prevent, rapidly respond to, and recover from emergency situations, including those stemming from natural causes and those resulting from individuals and/or groups whose intent is to cause harm; and

Whereas, there is a need to have an integrated approach for emergencies, including preparation, prevention, response, and recovery among all Commonwealth agencies; and

Whereas, all Commonwealth agencies must operate in a well coordinated and prepared approach to ensure the effective continuation of government operations and the safety of individuals.

Now, Therefore, I, Edward G. Rendell, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby direct all agencies under my jurisdiction to update and exercise on an annual basis, and be prepared to implement, continuity of government plans for their operations. These plans are to include actions that each agency will take to ensure continuity of their essential operations in the

event of a short or long term emergency. The continuity of government plans must be consistent with agency responsibilities outlined in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Emergency Operations Plan maintained by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency and with guidance and policy provided by the Governor's Office of Administration.

To provide leadership and guidance with continuity of government, I do hereby establish the Commonwealth Continuity of Government Steering Committee, whose primary objective is to oversee the development, coordination, and maintenance of agency internal emergency plans.

TITLE 4. ADMINISTRATION PART I. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

CHAPTER 6. ADDITIONAL COUNCILS AND COMMITTEES

Subchapter F. COMMONWEALTH CONTINUITY OF GOVERNMENT STEERING COMMITTEE

§ 6.51. Mission.

The mission of the Commonwealth Continuity of Government Steering Committee is to:

- (1) Provide guidelines, oversight and policy direction to agency heads on internal agency emergency plans.
- (2) Provide feedback to the Governor and to agency heads on needs for internal emergency prevention, preparation, response and recovery measures.
- (3) Assess the level of continuity of government preparedness among Commonwealth agencies and report to the Governor.

§ 6.52. Composition.

- (a) The Secretary of Administration serves as Chairperson and other members of the Commonwealth Continuity of Government Steering Committee (Steering Committee) consist of the:
 - (1) Secretary of General Services.
 - (2) Director of the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency.
 - (3) Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police.
 - (4) Secretary of Health.
 - (5) Director of Homeland Security.
 - (6) Other members as directed by the Governor.
- (b) The Steering Committee will draw on the expertise and cooperation of all State agencies and primarily will work through existing resources in State agencies as much as possible.

§ 6.53. Responsibilities.

(a) The Secretary of Administration is responsible for ensuring that comprehensive emergency preparedness/business continuity plans exist in all agencies to minimize any disruption of services and to support the continued mission of all Commonwealth agencies. The Secretary of Administration is responsible for reporting to the Governor and communicating to agencies on Commonwealth Continuity of Government Steering Committee policy direction and guidelines and serving as Secretary to the Executive

Board for exceptional actions during emergencies. The Secretary of Administration shall provide direction and guidelines for human resource and information technology as part of an overall emergency preparedness, response and recovery plan.

- (b) The Secretary of General Services is responsible for:
- (1) Capitol Police preparation for and prevention of emergencies and coordination of emergency response in buildings under their jurisdiction.
- (2) Central law enforcement reporting and monitoring during emergencies at Commonwealth facilities.
- (3) Acquisition and maintenance of protective features in facilities owned or leased by the Department of General Services.
- (4) Guidelines for protective features in facilities housing State operations not owned or leased by the Department of General Services.
 - (5) Guidelines for responding to bomb threats or other terroristic acts.
 - (6) Design specifications for new Commonwealth buildings and facilities.
- (c) The Director of the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency is responsible for:
- (1) Providing consultation and assistance to all Commonwealth agencies on the development of agency specific annexes to the State Emergency Operations Plan.
- (2) Assisting the Secretaries of Health and General Services with providing guidance and direction on agency emergency medical, evacuation or other types of emergency response plans.
- (3) Coordinating emergency response for government and nongovernment entities for local, regional or Statewide emergencies.
- (4) Developing, maintaining and promulgating the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Emergency Operations Plan and coordinating with the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
- (5) Directing the Commonwealth Emergency Operations Center for State agency use.
 - (6) Assisting State agencies on recovery efforts after an emergency.
 - (7) Other articles pursuant to 35 Pa.C.S. (relating to health and safety).
 - (d) The Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police is responsible for:
 - (1) Statewide coordination of police activities.
- (2) Response to emergencies at State facilities not under the jurisdiction of other police authorities.
 - (3) Statewide investigations and surveillance regarding emergencies.
- (4) Coordination with Federal law enforcement officials and law enforcement officials from other states.
- (5) Criminal background checks, and related activities associated with emergencies.
 - (6) Forensic laboratory services associated with emergencies.
 - (e) The Secretary of Health is responsible for:
 - (1) Public health leadership and direction during emergencies.
- (2) Assisting State agencies with assessing vulnerability for public health threats and developing prevention strategies.
- (3) Responding to inquiries and needs for assistance during potential public health emergencies.
- (4) Assisting with response, investigation and recovery when a public health emergency has occurred that affects Commonwealth operations.
- (f) The Director of Homeland Security is responsible for providing consultation and assistance to the Commonwealth on the development of internal agency emergency preparedness and response plans, consistent with the

preparedness activities external to State government. Specific attention to the geographic considerations of emergency readiness and response to chemical, biological, radiological/nuclear and cyber attacks will be made available to ensure a comprehensive enterprise-wide plan. Guidance will also be provided on the level of preparedness and recovery in this Commonwealth's infrastructure including public utilities, transportation, communication, medical and other essential community services.

§ 6.54. Reporting and communication.

The Commonwealth Continuity of Government Steering Committee shall prepare regular reports to the Governor on the status of continuity of government preparedness of agencies and communicate to the Office of General Counsel and agency heads on the progress and performance in emergency preparedness. Responsible agency heads are to report the status of emergency plan updates, exercises and implementations to the Secretary of Administration. Additionally, responsible agency heads are to communicate Commonwealth-wide policy and procedures on emergency preparedness within State government through the Directives Management System.

§ 6.55. Relationship with other agencies.

All Commonwealth agencies, boards and commissions under the Governor's jurisdiction shall cooperate fully with the Secretary of Administration and the Commonwealth Continuity of Government Steering Committee on the implementation of this subchapter.

§ 6.56. Effective date.

This order shall take effect immediately and rescinds Executive Order 2002-1, dated March 22, 2002.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

And Now, this 23rd day of August, 2005, it is hereby Ordered, that the Local Rules of the Orphans' Court Cambria County are hereby amended to remove the requirements that pleadings an accounts be filed in duplicate. The Rules are specifically amended as follows:

Rule 3.7CC (C) is amended to state:

One (1) copy of any such document shall be filed with the Register of Wills or Clerk of the Orphans' Court. When the Order has been signed by the Orphans' Court Judge, the Court Administrator will return the Order to the Office of the Register of Wills or Clerk of the Orphans' Court for filing and for mailing to the appropriate persons. The original pleadings shall be signed.

Rule 6.1CC(G) is amended to state:

One original executed account and statement of proposed distribution shall be filed.

The Clerk of the Cambria County Orphans' Court is hereby authorized to amend and restate the Local Cambria County Orphans' Court Rules consistent with the amendments ordered. This Order shall be effective immediately.

PENNSYLVANIA PUBLIC **UTILITY COMMISSION**

[52 PA. CODE CH. 63] Petition for Rulemaking

Petition of the Office of Consumer Advocate for a Rulemaking to Amend 52 Pa. Code Chapter 63 (relating to Telephone Service); Doc. No. P-00021985

Order

By the Commission:

On October 2, 2002, the Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA) filed with the Commission a petition for rule- $\frac{1}{2}$ making to revise Subchapters A, B, and E of Chapter 63 of the Commission's regulations. These regulations relate to telephone service and contain requirements regarding, inter alia, service and facilities, accounts and records, telephone service standards and confidentiality of customer information.

Because of the passage of time and most importantly, the enactment of the new Chapter 30, 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 3010-3019, we are seeking updated comments to OCA's proposed revisions to these regulations. Comments are requested on any aspect of the OCA's proposed revisions and the regulations in Subchapter A, B, and E. Note that earlier filed comments remain of record in this proceeding and parties are requested not to repeat prior comments. Additional comments, however, are specifically requested on the possible continuation of service surveillance exception data and reports at 52 Pa. Code §§ 63.53 and 63.55.

Based on our review of these further comments and replies thereto, as well as the previously filed comments, we will determine whether these Commission regulations should be amended, supplemented, or deleted pursuant to a rulemaking.

Discussion

I. Background

The OCA Petition was initially published November 2, 2002 at 32 Pa.B. 5416 with a comment period ending December 2, 2002. Reply comments were not specifically permitted.

Comments were filed by nine parties, including the OCA. Local Service Providers (LSPs) filed the majority of the comments and strongly opposed the petition. The opposition was based primarily on the costs of compliance with the proposed service requirements.

On December 19, 2002, the Pennsylvania Telephone Association (PTA)² filed a letter protesting that OCA filed comments to its own petition. PTA claimed that OCA's comments added arguments in support of its petition and also added an affidavit from a consultant. PTA proposed that the Commission allow reply comments to provide others with the opportunity to address OCA's new arguments.

In accordance with PTA's request, on February 14, 2003, the Commission issued a Secretarial Letter establishing a reply comment period ending February 28, 2003. A notice inviting all interested parties to file reply comments was posted at the Commission's website. Reply comments were filed by four parties.³

Subsequently, two significant events occurred that affected the Commission's authority in regard to the regulation of LSPs specifically in regard to reporting requirements required. These prompted the Commission to postpone any immediate action on OCA's petition.

In June 2004, the Pennsylvania House of Representatives passed House Resolution 786 that directed the joint Legislative Budget and Finance Committee (LB & FČ) to study LSP filing and reporting requirements and to report its findings. In its November 17, 2004 report, the PUC Filing and Reporting Requirements on Local Exchange Carriers (LB & FC Report), the LB & FC identified and analyzed 30 reports, filings and other documents, and made its overall recommendation—that the Commission begin the process of reducing the regulatory requirements for local exchange carriers (LECs herein LSPs) in Pennsylvania by eliminating regulations requiring reports. The LB & FC recommended several avenues for accomplishing this goal, including updating the Commission's current computer capability, consolidating similar information in various reports, and eliminating regulations requiring reports that have been temporarily waived, suspended or otherwise no longer required. LB & FC Report at S-3-4.

Shortly thereafter, in December 2004, the General Assembly enacted Act 1835 that substantially amended the Public Utility Code relating to alternative forms of regulation for Local Exchange Telecommunications Companies (LETCs).6 In particular, Act 183 contained specific provisions that reduce the level of annual, quarterly and other periodic reporting requirements for LETCs to a required nine reports to be "submitted in the form determined by the Commission." 66 Pa.C.S. § 3015(e).

⁶ One of the challenges in this Order and in any subsequent rulemaking is the reconciliation of the different terms that have been used to refer to incumbent and competitive telecommunications companies over the past 20 years. The Commission most recently adopted the term "local service provider" or "LSP." This term applies to a local exchange carrier (LEC), a competitive exchange carrier (CLEC), an alternative service provider (ASP), a local exchange telecommunications company (LETC), and a public utility. LETC and ASP are terms defined in the newly enacted in the Chapter 30. A LETC is:

[aln] incumbent carrier authorized by the commission to provide local exchange.

[[]a]n incumbent carrier authorized by the commission to provide local exchange telecommunications services. The term includes a rural telecommunications carrier

and nonrural telecommunications carrier. An ASP is defined as an entity that provides communications services in competition with a LETC. 66 Pa.C.S. § 3012 (relating to definitions). II. OCA Petition

In its petition, the OCA proposed revisions to Chapter 63 regulations, specifically 52 Pa. Code Subchapters A (relating to general provisions), Subchapter B (relating to service and facilities) and Subchapter E (relating to telephone quality standards). For example, the proposed revisions would, inter alia, amend section 63.14(a)(2) (relating to emergency equipment and personnel) to require LSPs to increase minimal battery reserves at local offices; amend section 63.18 (relating to multiparty line subscribers) to eliminate multiple party line service; amend section 63.56 (relating to measurements) to require LSPs to engage in programs to install network interface devices (NIDs) for all customer service lines; and amend section 63.57 (relating to customer trouble reports) to require payment to customers in the form of a service credit a penalty for late or missed appointments for service installation or repair. Also, OCA proposed at section 63.63 (relating to transmission requirements and standards) additional requirements relating to transmission standards including the reduction of transmission loss, the reduction of metallic noise and impulse noise level, and the maintenance of a minimum speed of 28,800 bits of data per second for data transfer. OCA further suggested revising section 63.23 (relating to construction and maintenance safety standards for facilities) to update to the reference to the National Electrical Safety Code from the 1981 edition to the current edition. Section D of the OCA Petition lists these and other proposed revisions to the regulations and is reproduced as an attachment⁷ to this Order.

III. Summary of Comments and Replies

Two commenters support the OCA's petition—the Public Utility Law Project (PULP) and Citizens for Consumer Justice (CCJ).8

PULP comments single out certain provisions that it felt deserved specific mention. These included, among others, the following: a requirement for carriers to provide dial-up at a minimum 28.8 Kbps in section 63.63 (relating to transmission requirements and standards); the installation of NIDs for every customer in section 63.56 (relating to measurement); and the requirement that service quality information be reported publicly on an exchange-by-exchange basis in section 63.55 (relating to surveillance levels). CJC's comments do not address any specific OCA provision but provide three reasons for the Commission to initiate a quality-of-service rulemaking: (1) the urgent need for service improvement; (2) the great need to create standards for internet service; and (3) the need for the Commission to require telecommunications companies to supply increased financial documentation.

On the other hand, the majority of the commenters, which were telecommunications companies and trade associations, oppose OCA's petition for a rulemaking in general and a number of its proposals for revision of specific regulations in particular. For the most part, these commenters are in agreement with PTA's position that a demonstration of need for further standards, surveillance and reporting was minimally required, given the "streamlined" form of regulation under which its members operate, and that the OCA's petition did not demonstrate this need with supporting evidence. PTA Comments, p. 2. PTA argues that these new requirements would create costs that would need to be passed on to consumers. PTA Comments, p. 2. PTA also argues that it was not appropriate to impose regulations written for wire line companies on other service providers using different technologies. PTA Comments, p. 3.

As to specific OCA proposals, PTA states that service reports should not be filed as "public documents," and that any reports required by the Commission should be submitted on a proprietary basis. PTA states that OCA should follow current practice whereby OCA contacts the company and requests a limited exception to the propriety designation of such reports. As for revising section 63.55 to require service surveillance reporting on an exchangeby-exchange basis, PTA argues that doing so would be burdensome and states that service surveillance should be done on a company-wide basis. PTA Comments, pp.

PTA also opposes OCA's addition in section 63.56 (relating to measurements) of a mandatory installation program for NIDs as unnecessary and inflexible. PTA believes that the FCC may have preempted state action in regard to such matters. PTA Comments, pp. 7-8.

On establishing a minimum transmission speed of 28.8 Kbps at section 63.63, PTA strenuously objects and questions the authority of the Commission to impose such a requirement. PTA does not have an estimate as to the cost of upgrading all networks at all points to a minimum 28.8 Kbps standard but claims that the costs would be significant. PTA Comments, pp. 13-18.

In regard to the proposed deletion of section 63.18 (relating to multiparty line subscribers) PTA responds that there are still customers who are multiparty line service subscribers so that the regulation is still needed. PTA Comments, p. 5.

In its comments, the PCTA echoes another often repeated concern—that OCA's proposed amendments could impose a burden on the competitive market entrant, thereby undercutting the competitive marketplace. PCTA Comments, pp 1-2. PCTA reserves comment on most of the proposals, but does raise the competitive disadvantage issue in expressing its opposition to OCA's proposed revision to section 63.63 (relating to transmission requirements and standards) that requires carriers to be capable of supporting dial-up Internet access at a minimum speed of 28.8 Kbps. PCTA Comments, p. 2.

In its comments dated December 2, 2002, the OCA supports it request for the implementation of a minimum modem speed requirement for dial-up Internet service. OCA Comments, pp. 5-7. The OCA states that a rule-making should be initiated to update Chapter 63 regulations regarding service quality since the existing regulations are out-of-date and incomplete. OCA Comments, pp. 7-11. Attached to its comments OCA submitted a discussion paper by consultant Rowland Curry, on network functionality and modem speeds.

In its reply comments dated February 28, 2003, OCA argues that some minimum dial-up modem speed is a necessary element of local exchange service, and answers arguments from Verizon, PTA and PCTA regarding the need for, the utility of, and the impact on competition of the Commission's establishing minimum modem speeds, and the authority of the Commission to establish minimum. OCA Reply Comments, p. 7-12. OCA replies to PTA's comments that it would be impractical for smaller

telecommunications companies to report on service quality on an exchange-by-exchange basis by proposing eliminating the requirement for companies with fewer than a certain number of exchanges. *OCA Reply Comments*, p. 13. OCA states in response to Verizon that because the utility already monitors service quality on an exchange basis, it would take little additional work to monitor service on an exchange-by-exchange basis. *OCA Reply Comments*, pp. 13-14. To PTA's comment that reports on service quality should be submitted on a proprietary basis, OCA states that the proposal is disturbing because the PTA is seeking Commission assistance in keeping this information from the public and competitors to the detriment of competition in the marketplace. *OCA Reply Comments*, p. 15.

In its reply comments, PTA states that the Commission should let Network Modernization Programs that are in place work. *PTA Comments*, p. 2. PTA also states that OCA failed to take into account the significant costs of needed network changes to guarantee a minimum modem speed of 28.8 Kbps and would need to be passed onto consumers. *PTA Comments*, pp. 2, 5-7.

PTA denies that Chapter 63 regulations are out of date. PTA states that companies do comply with the current edition, not the 1981 edition of the National Electrical Safety Code. *PTA Reply Comments*, p. 7. Also PTA points out that there are multiparty line service subscribers so that section 63.18 need not be eliminated. *PTA Reply Comments*, p. 8.

In its Reply Comments, the PCTA objects to the requirement of minimum modem speed for Internet dial-up arguing that it would hinder the development of the competitive market place; that any regulation regarding Internet access and assertion of corresponding jurisdiction would be premature and the issue is more appropriately addressed by the General Assembly in its Chapter 30 review. *PCTA Reply Comments*, p. 2.

Verizon's Reply Comments echo those of PTA on subject matter in regard to the need and costs of a minimum modem speed for Internet dial-up. *Verizon Reply Comments*, p. 2-3. Also Verizon disputes the necessity of initiating a rulemaking to update these regulations based on correcting section 63.23 to refer to the current version of the National Electrical Safety Code and the need to eliminate section 63.18 when customers still subscribe to multiparty service. *Verizon Reply Comments*, pp. 3-4.

No commenter objected to the proposal that the reference to the "National Electrical Safety Code, 1981 edition" in section 63.23 (relating to construction and maintenance safety standards for facilities) be updated to the current version, except that PTA stated that making this change in one regulation did not justify opening a rulemaking on Chapter 63 regulations. *PTA Reply Comments*, p. 8.

IV. Resolution

Based on the petition and comments, OCA's proposals to improve and clarify telephone service quality standards warrant further and updated comments.

OCA's suggestion to update the reference to the 1981 National Electrical Safety Code to the current version of the National Electrical Safety Code in section 63.23 (relating to construction and maintenance safety standards for facilities) certainly has merit. Other proposals, such as the addition to section 63.56(h) (relating to measurements) of a requirement for the installation of a NID for each customer, while providing a benefit to customers may not be practical in terms of today's costs, or possible in light of the enactment of Act 183 or federal law that

might preempt state action. Other proposals may create unintended consequences, such as the proposal to delete section 63.18 (relating to multiparty line subscribers) when according to PTA comments, there still are customers that subscribe to multiparty line service.

Accordingly, due to the passage of time since the initial comments and replies were filed, as well as the enactment of Act 183, it is incumbent upon us to seek updated comments from interested parties⁹ before we propose any specific regulations on this subject matter in the context of a formal rulemaking proceeding. Therefore, we shall request updated comments on OCA's Chapter 63 proposals.

The Final Implementation Order in PUC Filing and Reporting Requirements on Local Exchange Carriers, Order entered October 5, 2005 at Docket No. M-00041857 (Final Implementation Order) at pp. 52 and 65, referred to this proceeding the issue of whether the service surveillance exception data and reports currently required to be filed with this Commission by 52 Pa. Code § 63.53(b) and § 63.55(b) should be continued.

Section 63.53(b) and section 63.55 (b) and (c) of the Commission's regulations require LSPs to file service surveillance data, and service exception reports, within five working days of its initial notice of substandard service, and an update one month later. The obligation for a utility to file an exception report with the Commission attaches when a company's performance fails to meet minimal performance standards set forth in subchapter E (relating to telephone quality service standards). See generally 52 Pa. Code §§ 63.51—63.65 (relating to telephone quality service standards) and 52 Pa. Code § 63.55 (relating to surveillance levels).

Therefore, we hereby seek specific comment on whether these reports should be continued, amended or abolished, whether these reports fall within the scope of 66 Pa.C.S. \S 3015(e)(4) (annual service report), and if not, whether these reports meet the exception standard in section 3015(f).

Conclusion

By this order, the Commission is seeking updated comments regarding OCA's Chapter 63 proposals, and comments on whether the service surveillance exception reports and data required by 52 Pa. Code § 63.53(b) and § 63.55(b) should be continued, amended or abolished. After review of these further comments, if the Commission determines that Chapter 63 regulations should be amended, we will initiate a separate rulemaking docket that will propose specific regulations for Chapter 63, subchapters A, B, and E; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. The Petition of the Office of Consumer Advocate for a Rulemaking to Amend 52 Pa. Code Chapter 63 (relating to Telephone Service) is granted consistent with the discussion contained in the body of this Order.
- 2. Interested persons, including the Office of Consumer Advocate, may file updated comments and reply comments to OCA's Chapter 63 proposals, and comments on whether the service surveillance exception reports required by 52 Pa. Code §§ 63.53(b) and 63.55(b) should be continued, amended or abolished.
- 3. A copy of this Order and Attachment A shall be posted on the Commission's website at http://www.puc.state.pa.us.

- 4. The Secretary shall serve a copy of this Order and attachments upon the Pennsylvania Telephone Association, the Broadband Cable Association of Pennsylvania (BCAP), the Public Utility Law Project, Competitive Telecommunications Association (COMPTEL), the Office of Trial Staff, the Office of Consumer Advocate, and the Office of the Small Business Advocate and any other parties who filed comments at this docket.
- 5. The Secretary shall certify a copy of this Order and Attachment A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 6. Updated comments shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Commission no later than 45 days from the date of the publication of this Order and Attachment A in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Reply comments shall be filed no later than 45 days thereafter.
- 7. An original and 15 copies of comments or reply comments referencing this docket number shall be filed with Commission's Secretary at P. O. Box 3265, Harrisburg, PA 17105-3265. In addition, a copy of comments and reply comments in electronic format (Microsoft Word®) 2002 or readable equivalent) shall be sent by electronic mail to Patricia Krise Burket, Assistant Counsel at, epburket@state.pa.us>, Holly Frymoyer, Bureau of Consumer Services, at <mfrymoyer@state.pa.us>, Joseph Spandra, Bureau of Fixed Utility Services, <jospandra@state.pa.us>.

D. Amendments Requested

- 18. To comply with the requirements of 52 Pa. Code § 5.43, an amended Title 52 Pa. Code § 63 et seq. is attached and incorporated by reference. That amended section is marked "Attachment B." Below, the OCA enumerates the specific sections it seeks to amend.
- 19. Chapter 63.12 Minimizing interference and inductive effects—the OCA seeks to amend this section to conform to modern standards and practices.
- 20. Chapter 63.14 Emergency equipment and personnel—the OCA seeks to amend this section to conform to modern standards and practices.

Chapter 63.56 Measurements—the OCA seeks to amend this section such that telecommunications providers shall retain records for a certain period and telecommunications providers shall engage in programs to install a network interface device on all residential and single-line business locations served.
- 26. Chapter 63.57 Customer trouble reports—the OCA seeks to amend this section to:
- (a) remove certain exceptions relating to the reporting of outages;
- (b) update the requirements for the clearing of out-ofservice trouble reports;
- (c) establish standards for commitments to complete repairs, and to establish exceptions thereto;
- (d) establish customer credit amounts and procedures in the event of a carrier's failure to meet its appointment and repair commitments to its customer;

Public Charter Schools Planning Grant Availability

Under the leadership of Governor Edward Rendell and the Secretary of Education, the Department of Education (Department) is committed to supporting strategies and innovation that help meet the goal of providing strong results for all students. In particular, the Department is focusing on three key areas:

- 1. **Increased Achievement**: All students will achieve at the proficient or advanced levels in core subject areas.
- 2. **Equitable Outcomes**: There will not be an achievement gap between student subgroups.
- 3. **Student Preparedness**: All high school students will graduate prepared for postsecondary education or high-skill employment.

Through the Charter School Competitive Planning Grant (planning grant) process, the Department seeks to expand the number of high-quality, innovative and unique charter schools.

Planning grants provide support for eligible applicants interested in planning a charter school. Planning grant funding will be contracted for 12 months.

The Department will grant Federal charter school funding to eligible applicants that plan to develop unique and innovative charter schools that will incorporate the following best practices:

- 1. Rigorous and engaging curriculum.
- 2. Innovative, unique and effective instruction.
- 3. Artful use of infrastructure.
- 4. Deep partnerships with community organizations, universities, businesses and/or regional and National organizations.
 - 5. Intensive teacher and leadership training.
- 6. Meaningful continuous assessment that is aligned with standards.

Eligible Applicants

To apply for a planning grant, an applicant may be any individual or group of individuals (including a public or private nonprofit organization), which may include teachers, administrators and other school staff; parents/caretakers of students who will be attending the school; other members of the local community; any nonsectarian college, university or museum located in this Commonwealth; and any nonsectarian, not-for-profit corporation. The eligible applicant may propose to create a new school or to convert an existing traditional public school or a portion of an existing traditional public school.

No charter school shall be established or funded by and no charter shall be granted to any sectarian school, institution or other entity. No funds allocated or disbursed under sections 1701-A—1732-A of the Charter School Law (24 P. S. §§ 17-1701-A—17-1732-A) shall be used to directly support instruction under section 1327.1 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. § 13-1327.1).

Grant Terms and Conditions

Planning grants are awarded to charter school developers who do not have an approved charter but have an interest in opening a charter school. The grant covers a 12-month period and should be used to explore the steps necessary in starting a public charter school. The grant is designed to offer assistance and resources to charter school developers and help them to refine and complete their plans with the result of opening a unique, high-quality and innovative charter school. Funds may be used to develop a charter school application or refine existing plans, promote interest in the charter school and/or provide training for developers and staff.

Grants of up to \$50,000 are available for the planning of a public charter school that will open in 2007. These planning grants are an investment in the Commonwealth's educational future. Successful applicants will have explicitly described how they will incorporate the best practices and habits of practice outlined previously.

Planning grant funds will be awarded through a competitive review process.

The Department will ensure that reviewers are highly qualified individuals of diverse expertise, geographic location, gender and racial and ethnic representation. The review process will take place following the application due date deadline.

There is no guarantee that the submission of an application will result in funding or that funding will be

allocated at the level requested. The Department reserves the right to negotiate all budgets. Written notification of grant award decisions will be sent to the contact person indicated on the e-grant application after final approval by the Secretary of Education.

The planning grant application must be submitted to the Department by means of the e-grant system by the close of business on March 29, 2006. Access to the grant application will be closed within 24 hours of the due date.

THE CLEAN STREAMS LAW AND THE FEDERAL CLEAN WATER ACT APPLICATIONS FOR NATIONAL POLLUTION DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (NPDES) PERMITS AND WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT (WQM) PERMITS

This notice provides information about persons who have applied for a new, amended or renewed NPDES or WQM permit, a permit waiver for certain stormwater discharges or submitted a Notice of Intent (NOI) for coverage under a general permit. The applications concern, but are not limited to, discharges related to industrial, animal or sewage waste, discharges to groundwater, discharges associated with municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4), stormwater associated with construction activities or concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs). This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92 and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act.

For NPDES renewal applications in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements.

For applications for new NPDES permits and renewal applications with major changes in Section II, as well as applications for MS4 individual permits and individual stormwater construction permits in Sections IV and VI, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, has made a tentative determination of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the EPA Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before an application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial

area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. Calculation for VOC composite partial vapor pressure which combines analytical VOC vapor pressure data for the concentrated materials used to prepare the press ready cleaning solution and records of the proportions in which they are mixed. The analysis and vapor pressure determinations of the concentrated materials may be performed by the suppliers of the materials.

Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30 days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements.

The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Department of Public Welfare—Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program; Regulation No. 14-503

On January 10, 2006, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this regulation from the Department of Public Welfare. This rule-making amends 55 Pa. Code Chapter 601. Notice of proposed rulemaking was omitted for this final regulation. Governor Edward G. Rendell certified the regulation as necessary to meet an emergency on January 9, 2006. The regulation became effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on January 21, 2006.

This regulation temporarily expands the eligibility requirements for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program from 135% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines (FPIG) to 150% of the FPIG. The regulation will sunset on June 30, 2006.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Department of Public Welfare (Act 81 of 2005) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

Department of Transportation Regulation #18-404 (IRRC #2510)

Flashing or Revolving Lights on Emergency and Authorized Vehicles

February 16, 2006

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the December 17, 2005 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Department of Transportation (Department) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

Section 173.2. Definitions.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

Intersection light

This definition is amended to allow greater flexibility by deleting the existing requirement that intersection lights be mounted on both front fenders. The Pennsylvania Emergency Health Services Council (PEHSC) questioned the need for and practicality of this amendment. According to the proposed regulation, an "intersection light" could be a flashing red, blue, white or clear light placed anywhere on a vehicle. Similar characteristics for lights are already included in the definitions of "flashing light," "light-bar assembly," "revolving light" and "single light." Given that any of these lights would enhance the visibility of a vehicle, what is the need for a separate category for intersection lights? The amended definition is so broad that it loses its uniqueness and utility. The term is used only twice in Chapter 173, once in describing the mounting of a light on a fender and once as an exception. The Department should explain the need for this separate category or delete the term and its definition from the chapter.

2. Section 173.3. Display requirements.—Public safety; Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

Subsection (a)(3) Blue lights.

This subsection refers to Section 4572(a) of the Vehicle Code to identify which vehicles may display blue lights. To be eligible to display blue lights on their vehicles, the statute requires that "the names of the ambulance personnel, volunteer firefighters and certified volunteer search and rescue scuba divers shall be submitted to the nearest station of the Pennsylvania State Police on a list signed by the chief of the ambulance or fire department or company...." (75 Pa.C.S.A § 4572(a)(1)). We have several questions.

First, are ambulance personnel of private or "for-profit" ambulance companies eligible to use blue lights on their vehicles? Does the word "company" in Section 4572(a)(1) include private or for-profit companies? The Department should clarify the types of organizations that may allow their personnel to use blue lights on their own vehicles. In addition, who is the chief of a private company?

Second, may quick responder services (QRS) personnel use blue lights on their personal vehicles? Some claim that QRS vehicles are covered by the statutory definition of "ambulance" in Section 102 of the Vehicle Code. The Department needs to clarify whether QRS personnel are eligible to use blue lights on their vehicles under Section 4572(a) of the Vehicle Code.

Subsection (a)(5) Yellow or amber lights.

In Subparagraph (iii), new language is being added which states: "Yellow or amber lights shall be mounted on the rear of the vehicle or shall face rearward." The intent of this language is that the lights be directed or shine rearward from the vehicle. To improve clarity, the new language should be simplified to state that yellow or amber lights shall be mounted to only flash or shine rearward.

Subsection (a)(6) White or clear lights.

Three commentators have expressed concern and confusion with this subsection. This subsection begins with one long sentence that appears to address two or more different combinations of white or clear lights. The provision begins with limiting emergency vehicles to one white

or clear light in combination with lights of different colors. However, it also contains an exception for three white or clear lights on a light-bar assembly. We have four concerns and recommendations.

First, we recommend that the first sentence of this subsection be re-formatted as a list that outlines the two options: 1) single white or clear light; or 2) three white or clear lights on a light-bar assembly. We agree with the Director of the Philadelphia Regional Emergency Medical Services that clarification is needed as to whether a vehicle could have a total of four white or clear lights by combining a single light with a light-bar assembly.

Second, the Department should clarify the need for and intent of this subsection and whether a light created via reflection by mirrors will be counted as a separate and unique light. Explanation and clarification are necessary given the questions raised by two commentators. PEHSC questioned the need to increase the number of white or clear lights from two to three. Michael K. DalPezzo submitted comments contending that mirrors in light-bar assemblies may intensify the effect of lights and are not counted as separate lights for the purposes of enforcement.

Third, the new Subparagraphs (i) and (ii) may conflict with existing systems and procedures. The two new provisions read as follows:

- (i) When the light-bar assembly contains three flashing, revolving or oscillating white or clear lights, the center light must be mounted to flash white or clear light only to the front.
- (ii) When the vehicle is stationary, the light-bar assembly may not display white or clear light to the rear.

According to DalPezzo, Subparagraph (i) is the opposite of most existing systems. DalPezzo also claims that Subparagraph (ii) is inconsistent with the standards of the National Fire Protection Association and federal standards for ambulances. The PEHSC is concerned that Subparagraph (ii) would be unsafe because it may force drivers to turn off all lights.

It is our understanding that the intent of the Department is for the two outside lights on the light-bar assembly to oscillate in 90° arcs. However, this requirement is not discussed in the proposed regulation. The Department needs to clarify its intent for the light-bar assembly and insure that the regulation is consistent with current standards for different types of emergency vehicles.

Fourth, the phrase "preemptive traffic control devices" is not defined. In addition, this specific phrase is not used in similar provisions in existing regulations or statutes. The Vehicle Code at 75 Pa.S.C.A § 3105(g) uses the phrase "emergency vehicle preemption devices." Existing regulations refer to "traffic control signal preemption equipment controlled from emergency or authorized vehicles" at 67 Pa. Code § 211.11(b)(16) and "preemption and priority control equipment" at 67 Pa. Code § 212(b)(viii) (published as a final regulation in the Pennsylvania Bulletin on February 4, 2006 [36 Pa.B. 537]). The Department should use the phrase found in the statute consistently and should include a reference to the statute in this proposed regulation.

Subsection (a)(8) Utility lights.

The first sentence of this subparagraph states that utility lights may not be used for "emergency warning purposes." It describes utility lights as "take down, alley, spotlight." However, the second sentence reads:

These lights may be used while the vehicle is *in motion or stationary for the purpose of an emergency*, for the safety of the public or in the enforcement of the law. (Emphasis added.)

The use of the phrases "emergency warning purposes" and "for the purpose of an emergency" is confusing. What is the difference between these two phrases? The phrase "in motion or stationary" adds to the confusion. Additionally, DalPezzo notes that there are "take down" and "alley" lights that flash in light-bar assemblies. The explanation of this new subparagraph in the Preamble only mentions the blade of a snow plow.

It is our understanding that the intent of this subsection is to prohibit the use of a steady burning light to alert others and warn traffic of an emergency. The subsection should clearly state this prohibition. Standard headlights and flashing or revolving lights are all that may be used to alert other drivers and pedestrians. The regulation should also state that a steady burning light may be used to illuminate work areas and equipment, scenes involving fires, accidents, other emergencies or crime, or for search and rescue operations.

Subsection (b) 360° visibility.

The first sentence of this subsection begins with the phrase: "Except for unmarked police vehicles..." which seems to indicate that all of Subsection (b) does not apply to unmarked police vehicles. However, Subparagraph (4) is being amended to set forth a specific requirement for an "unmarked police vehicle." This is confusing. Subparagraph (4), which is different from the "360° visibility" rule, should be formatted as a separate subsection.

Subsection (d)(1) Emergency vehicles except police vehicles. Subsection (d)(1)(v)(A) reads:

This subsection does not include private vehicles used for answering emergency calls as defined by 75 Pa.C.S. § 102.

None of the terms in this provision, such as "private vehicles" or "emergency calls," are defined as separate terms in Section 102 of the Vehicle Code. This provision should be rewritten using the words "privately owned vehicle" and a specific reference to the definition of "emergency vehicle" in 75 Pa.C.S. § 102.

Subsection (d)(4) Traffic control emergency directional light assemblies.

This subsection is new and sets requirements for the use of directional light assemblies. However, the intent of the limitations in Subparagraphs (i)—(vi) is unclear. For example, Subparagraphs (v) and (vi) are limited respectively to vehicles owned by a fire company and "an authorized vehicle which is used in the construction, repair or maintenance of a bridge or highway." The subsection already states that the directional assemblies may not interfere with permanently installed lights. If the directional lights do not interfere with installed lights, then what is the need for Subparagraphs (i)—(vi)? The Department should justify these limitations or delete them

3. Miscellaneous Clarity.

Section 173.2. Definitions.—Flashing light and Oscillation

The definition of "flashing light" includes the word "oscillation" as a part of its definition. The terms "oscillation" and "revolving light" are also defined in Section 173.2. In certain provisions in Chapter 173, the proposed regulation adds the word "oscillating" to depict "flashing

[or], revolving **or oscillating**" lights. If "oscillation" is a part of the definition of a flashing light, why is it necessary to include the word "oscillating" next to "flashing" in the regulation?

Additionally, what does it mean in certain provisions when only the words "flashing or revolving are used to describe lights? Given the inclusive definition of "flashing light," what is the intent of this distinction? Will these flashing lights also be allowed to oscillate?

Subsection 173.3(d)(3) Authorized vehicles.

Under Subsection 173.3(d)(3)(i)(E), the reference to Subparagraphs (i)—(iv) is incorrect and needs to be changed to be consistent with the re-lettering and reformatting of the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin*. It should be changed to capital letters (A)—(D).

Department of Revenue Regulation #15-430 (IRRC #2508)

Revision of Construction Contractors; Sales Tax Requirements

February 16, 2006

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the December 17, 2005 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Department of Revenue (Department) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Economic or Fiscal Impact.

The Department has described this proposed rule-making as an "administrative 'clean up" that will eliminate duplicative sales tax regulations that govern construction contractors. They have noted that "No parties should be adversely affected by this administrative regulation"

Members of Pennsylvania's banking community disagree with the Department's description and assessment of this rulemaking. They believe that the deletion of certain language pertaining to financial institution security equipment will result in the taxation of certain equipment used for its "protection and convenience." As a result, this rulemaking will have a negative fiscal impact on this industry.

We agree with the banking community that this rule-making is more than just an "administrative 'clean-up" and it could have a negative fiscal impact on that community. However, we do not agree that it will impose sales tax on certain equipment that banks currently purchase. It is our understanding that banks pay sales tax when this equipment is purchased. Relief is provided to banks in the form of a partial sales tax refund, granted as part the appeals process by the Attorney General, not the Department of Revenue.

We believe that the Department has the statutory authority to amend its own administrative regulations. However, the lack of information contained in this regulatory package pertaining to the Department's true intent and potential fiscal impact make it difficult for this Commission to determine if this rulemaking is in the public interest. As suggested by Senator Earll, Chairwoman of the Senate Finance Committee, we ask the Department to "more thoroughly explain the purpose and potential impact of its proposed administrative cleanups."

Department of Community and Economic Development Regulation #4-82 (IRRC #2507) Manufactured Housing Improvement Program February 22, 2006

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the December 24, 2005 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Department of Community and Economic Development (Department) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Section 149.1. Definitions.—Clarity.

We have two concerns with this section.

First, statutory citations to the definitions in the Act are found in some definitions in this proposed regulation, while missing in others. The Department should add the appropriate statutory citations to the definitions of "Installation," "Installer," "Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standards," "Manufactured housing or manufactured home," and "Manufacturer's approved design."

Second, the information in Subsection (ii) in the definition of "Manufacturer's approved design" is substantive in nature. Substantive provisions in a definition cannot be enforced. This information should be removed from the definition and placed in an appropriate section later in the regulation, such as Section 149.3(b) (relating to Installation standard).

2. Section 149.3. Installation standard.—Clarity.

Subsection (d) contains the phrase, "...the building code official should contact the Department..." (Emphasis added). "Should" is not a regulatory term. Therefore, it should be replaced with "may."

3. Section 149.4. Installer training and certification.—Clarity.

Subsection (a)(2)

The Department indicated that the "other information" mentioned in this subsection is information that might be requested as it reviews an application. The language in this subsection should be amended to clearly state that the Department may request additional information.

Subsection (a)(3)

Why must the training provider consult with the Department before scheduling courses or setting its tuition? Unless the Department is planning to review and approve these things, this provision should be deleted.

Also, the Department should cross-reference the appropriate fee in Section 149.7.

Subsection (b)(1)

Will the application forms for certification be provided by the Department?

Also, the Department should cross-reference the appropriate fee in Section 149.7.

4. Section 149.5. Building code official training.— Reasonableness; Clarity.

We understand that the training for building code officials under this section is intended to be separate and distinct from the training for installers under the previous section. However, this section is missing the specific

details concerning the application and approval process that the previous section contains. The Department should clearly set forth the requirements for building code official training in the final-form regulation.

5. Section 149.6. Certificate of Compliance.—Consistency with statute; Clarity.

Subsection (a)

The phrase "An installer is not required to complete a certificate of compliance for installation of items such as . . . " is vague. The Department indicated that this is meant to include anything that falls under the Uniform Construction Code as opposed to anything that is covered by the Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standards. The Department should amend this subsection to clearly state its intent.

Subsection (c)

This subsection does not state who is required to submit the completed copy of the Certificate of Compliance to the building code official. The Department indicated that this responsibility falls on whoever initially applies for the building permit.

However, the Manufactured Housing Improvement Act (Act) at 35 P. S. § 1658.6(e) states, "The *installer* shall certify to the department and the building code official that the new manufactured home has been installed in accordance with . . ." (Emphasis added). To be consistent with the Act, the Department should amend this section to state that it is the installer's duty to submit a copy of the Certificate of Compliance to the building code official.

6. Section 149.7. Fees.—Clarity.

The Department is required by the Act to establish fees for "educational programs, testing and certification of those persons certified to install and inspect...." However, the Act does not specifically require these fees to be established via regulation.

The only way to change a promulgated regulation is through a subsequent regulation. If the Department chooses to establish these fees through regulation, Subsection (c) should be deleted. If the Department wishes to be able to change the fees through a publication of notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, all of the fees in this proposed regulation should be deleted.

7. Section 149.8. Penalties.—Clarity.

Subsection (a)(1)

This subsection deals with suspension or revocation of certification for those who violate the Act or this chapter. However, the Act at 35 P. S. § 1685.5(b)(3) also mentions the issuance of warnings. The Department indicated that it currently has a warning system in place. The procedures of this system should be set forth in the final-form regulation.

Subsections (a)(1)(i) and (ii)

These subsections refer to complaints. What format does the Department deem to be an acceptable method of receiving complaints? Do they need to be in writing? Will a telephone call or an email be sufficient? The final-form regulation should clearly set forth the appropriate procedure for filing a complaint with the Department.

Subsection (b)

This subsection states in part, "...the Department may impose a civil penalty of up to \$1,000 on any person..." The final-form regulation should clarify if the

cumulative maximum that one can be fined is \$1,000 or if this penalty can be assessed per offense.

Order

By the Commission:

By this order, the Commission is establishing a pilot program for the purpose of implementing electronic filing of motor carrier insurance information. The Commission seeks to provide motor carriers with the option of having their insurance companies file the noted insurance forms electronically, while retaining the option of filing these insurance forms in hard copy, paper format as is currently required in 52 Pa. Code § 32.2(c). To implement the electronic filing pilot program, the Commission will grant a temporary waiver of our motor carrier insurance regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 32.2(c) for a period of one year. After the entry of this order and the Commission's evaluation of the pilot program described herein, we may initiate a proposed rulemaking at a separate docket to revise our regulations in a manner that permits electronic filing.

Background

The purpose for the pilot program and the temporary waiver of the motor carrier insurance regulations is to allow the Commission to begin formulating and implementing a new process that will allow for electronic filing of motor carrier insurance information. Electronic filing will provide insurance companies filing information on behalf of motor carriers with a more effective means of timely submitting insurance information to the Commission. Electronic filing will additionally provide the Commission with a reasonable and efficient method of receiving and monitoring insurance information, beyond the method currently approved by our regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 32.2(c).

In order to implement electronic filing, the Commission will enter into an agreement with a third party vendor, National Online Registries (NOR), that will act as a conduit between the insurance companies and the Commission by creating and managing a central electronic repository of motor carrier insurance information. Specifically, NOR will enter into Insurance Company Participation Agreements with insurance companies that wish to participate in electronic filing. Pursuant to these agreements, the companies will make motor carrier insurance filings with the Commission by using NOR's central electronic repository of motor carrier insurance information. NOR will make the repository accessible to the Commission via the Internet, at no charge, for searching, viewing, submitting, and retrieving data and interacting with information in the repository. NOR will notify the Commission by electronic mail when an insurance filing has been made. Although the Commission will have access to NOR's database, NOR will not have access to any of the Commission's electronic databases or any confidential information.

Discussion

Based on the motor carrier insurance provisions in Section 32.2(c), motor carriers are currently required to file a hard copy of insurance information directly with the Commission. Pursuant to the regulations, certificates of insurance, surety bonds, and notices of cancellation are to be filed with the Commission in triplicate, and an approved copy will be returned to the motor carrier if a self-addressed, stamped envelope is enclosed with the filing.

The Commission has expended considerable resources to enforce these regulations as many insurance companies fail to file timely notifications indicating that insurance has been obtained by a transportation utility. This results in numerous enforcement actions against utilities that

have, in fact, obtained insurance, but because the Commission is not timely notified by the insurance company, the transportation utilities are in violation of our regulations. Granting insurance companies the right to file public liability and property damage and cargo forms in electronic format will enable the Commission to receive filings almost instantaneously and, thus, will likely reduce the number of insurance suspensions.

The Commission finds that the most expedient means of implementing electronic filing in the near future for the purpose of the pilot program is to grant motor carriers a temporary waiver of the insurance regulations requirement at 52 Pa. Code § 32.2(c), which mandates the filing of a hard copy of insurance information. When the PUC receives a notification from NOR stating that an insurance filing has been made by an insurance company on behalf of a motor carrier, the PUC will treat this notification as a petition from the motor carrier requesting a temporary waiver of the insurance filing regulations. The request for a waiver will be deemed approved by the PUC, and the filing will be accepted.²

Accordingly, the temporary waiver of the Commission's regulations as granted herein shall become effective and remain effective for a period of one year from the entry date of this order. Subsequent to the entry of this order and the Commission's internal evaluation of the electronic filing pilot program, the Commission may adopt a proposed rulemaking order at a separate docket, in accordance with the Regulatory Review Act, 71 P. S. §§ 745.1, et seq., to revise our motor carrier insurance regulations in a manner that permits electronic filing. While this temporary waiver and the proposed future rulemaking will grant insurance companies filing information on behalf of motor carriers the right to file insurance information electronically, the current option set forth in 52 Pa. Code § 32.2(c) for filing insurance information in hard copy, paper format will also be retained; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. The Commission's regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 32.2(c), which require motor carriers to file a hard copy of insurance information, shall be temporarily waived as provided for herein to allow for the electronic filing of motor carrier insurance information.
- 2. Notice of this order shall be published in the *Penn-sylvania Bulletin* and on the Commission's website.
- 3. Subsequent to the entry of this order and the Commission's evaluation of the electronic filing pilot program, the Commission may adopt a proposed rule-making order at a separate docket in order to revise our motor carrier insurance regulations to allow for electronic filing.

Electronic Filing of Motor Carrier Insurance Forms

Today the Commission acts to implement an electronic filing pilot program to provide insurance companies with the ability to file public liability and property damage and cargo forms in electronic format on behalf of motor carriers. The Commission grants a temporary waiver of

the motor carrier insurance regulations (52 Pa. Code § 32.2(c)) which mandate the filing of a hard copy of certain forms.

I commend staff for its efforts in establishing this pilot program. The option to file electronically will provide insurance companies with a more effective and efficient means of timely submitting insurance information to the Commission. This will also assist motor carriers in ensuring that valid insurance forms are on file and, at the same time, provides the Commission with the ability to instantaneously receive filings and reduce the number of unnecessary insurance suspensions. I wholeheartedly agree with the premise of this Order and support the Commission's continued path toward technology integration in serving the public and its regulated utilities.

Constantly striving to provide better customer service is a goal the Commission takes very seriously.
