

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva-nia Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Title 210—APPELLATE PROCEDURE

Per Curiam

And Now, this 10th day of May, 2007, upon the recommendation of the Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee, the proposal having been published before adoption at 36 Pa.B. 5967 on September 30, 2006:

It Is Ordered, pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, that Pennsylvania Rule of Appellate Procedure 1925 is amended in the following form.

This *Order* shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b) and shall be effective 60 days after adoption.

Mr. Justice Fitzgerald did not participate in the consideration or decision of this matter.

TITLE 210. APPELLATE PROCEDURE

ARTICLE II. APPELLATE PROCEDURE

CHAPTER 19. PREPARATION AND TRANSMISSION OF RECORD AND RELATED MATTERS

RECORD ON APPEAL FROM LOWER COURT Rule 1925. Opinion in Support of Order.

(a) General rule.—Upon receipt of the notice of appeal, the judge who entered the order [appealed from] giving rise to the notice of appeal, if the reasons for the order do not already appear of record, shall forthwith file of record at least a brief [statement, in the form of an] opinion[,] of the reasons for the order, or for the rulings or other [matters] errors complained of, or shall specify in writing the place in the record where such reasons may be found.

If the case appealed involves a ruling issued by a judge who was not the judge entering the order giving rise to the notice of appeal, the judge entering the order giving rise to the notice of appeal may request that the judge who made the earlier ruling provide an opinion to be filed in accordance with the standards above to explain the reasons for that ruling.

- (b) Direction to file statement of [matters] errors complained of on appeal; instructions to the appellant and the trial court.
- [—The lower court forthwith] If the judge entering the order giving rise to the notice of appeal ("judge") desires clarification of the errors complained of on appeal, the judge may enter an order

directing the appellant to file of record in the [lower] trial court and serve on the [trial] judge a concise statement of the [matters] errors complained of on [the] appeal [no later than 14 days after entry of such order] ("Statement"). [A failure to comply with such direction may be considered by the appellate court as a waiver of all objections to the order, ruling or other matter complained of.]

- (1) Filing and service.—Appellant shall file of record the Statement and concurrently shall serve the judge. Filing of record and service on the judge shall be in person or by mail as provided in Pa.R.A.P. 121(a) and shall be complete on mailing if appellant obtains a United States Postal Service form in compliance with the requirements set forth in Pa.R.A.P. 1112(c). Service on parties shall be concurrent with filing and shall be by any means of service specified under Pa.R.A.P. 121(c).
- (2) Time for filing and service.—The judge shall allow the appellant at least 21 days from the date of the order's entry on the docket for the filing and service of the Statement. Upon application of the appellant and for good cause shown, the judge may enlarge the time period initially specified or permit an amended or supplemental Statement to be filed. In extraordinary circumstances, the judge may allow for the filing of a Statement or amended or supplemental Statement nunc pro tunc.
- (3) Contents of order.—The judge's order directing the filing and service of a Statement shall specify:
- (i) the number of days after the date of entry of the judge's order within which the appellant must file and serve the Statement;
 - (ii) that the Statement shall be filed of record;
- (iii) that the Statement shall be served on the judge pursuant to paragraph (b)(1);
- (iv) that any issue not properly included in the Statement timely filed and served pursuant to subdivision (b) shall be deemed waived.
 - (4) Requirements; waiver.
- (i) The Statement shall set forth only those rulings or errors that the appellant intends to challenge.
- (ii) The Statement shall concisely identify each ruling or error that the appellant intends to challenge with sufficient detail to identify all pertinent issues for the judge. The judge shall not require the citation to authorities; however, appellant may choose to include pertinent authorities in the Statement.
- (iii) The judge shall not require appellant or appellee to file a brief, memorandum of law, or response as part of or in conjunction with the Statement.
- (iv) The Statement should not be redundant or provide lengthy explanations as to any error. Where non-redundant, non-frivolous issues are set forth in an appropriately concise manner, the number of errors raised will not alone be grounds for finding waiver.

- (v) Each error identified in the Statement will be deemed to include every subsidiary issue contained therein which was raised in the trial court; this provision does not in any way limit the obligation of a criminal appellant to delineate clearly the scope of claimed constitutional errors on appeal.
- (vi) If the appellant in a civil case cannot readily discern the basis for the judge's decision, the appellant shall preface the Statement with an explanation as to why the Statement has identified the errors in only general terms. In such a case, the generality of the Statement will not be grounds for finding waiver.
- (vii) Issues not included in the Statement and/or not raised in accordance with the provisions of this paragraph (b)(4) are waived.

(c) Remand.

- (1) An appellate court may remand in either a civil or criminal case for a determination as to whether a Statement had been filed and/or served or timely filed and/or served.
- (2) Upon application of the appellant and for good cause shown, an appellate court may remand in a civil case for the filing nunc pro tunc of a Statement or for amendment or supplementation of a timely filed and served Statement and for a concurrent supplemental opinion.
- (3) If an appellant in a criminal case was ordered to file a Statement and failed to do so, such that the appellate court is convinced that counsel has been per se ineffective, the appellate court shall remand for the filing of a Statement nunc pro tunc and for the preparation and filing of an opinion by the judge.
- (4) In a criminal case, counsel may file of record and serve on the judge a statement of intent to file an Anders/McClendon brief in lieu of filing a Statement. If, upon review of the Anders/McClendon brief, the appellate court believes that there are arguably meritorious issues for review, those issues will not be waived; instead, the appellate court may remand for the filing of a Statement, a supplemental opinion pursuant to 1925(a), or both. Upon remand, the trial court may, but is not required to, replace appellant's counsel.
- [(c)] (d) Opinions in matters on petition for allowance of appeal.—Upon receipt of notice of the filing of a petition for allowance of appeal under Rule 1112[(b)](c) (appeals by allowance), the appellate court below which entered the order sought to be reviewed, if the reasons for the order do not already appear of record, shall forthwith file of record at least a brief statement, in the form of an opinion, of the reasons for the order.

Official Note: [Subdivisions (a) and (b) of this rule are based on former Supreme Court Rule 56 and eliminate the blanket requirement of the prior practice for a service of a statement of matters complained of. See also former Superior Court Rule 46 and former Commonwealth Court Rule 25. Subdivision (c) of this rule is intended to provide the Supreme Court and the parties with at least a brief informal memorandum of the reasons for the decision of the appellate court below. See In re Harrison Square Inc., 470 Pa. 246, 368 A.2d 285 (1977).]

Subdivision (a) The 2007 amendments clarify that a judge whose order gave rise to the notice of appeal may ask a prior judge who made a ruling in question for the reasons for that judge's decision. In such cases, more than one judge may issue separate 1925(a) opinions for a single case. It may be particularly important for a judge to author a separate opinion if credibility was at issue in the pretrial ruling in question. See, e.g., Commonwealth v. Yogel, 307 Pa. Super. 241, 243-44, 453 A.2d 15, 16 (1982). At the same time, the basis for some pre-trial rulings will be clear from the order and/or opinion issued by the judge at the time the ruling was made, and there will then be no reason to seek a separate opinion from that judge under this rule. See, e.g., Pa.R.Crim.P. 581(I). Likewise, there will be times when the prior judge may explain the ruling to the judge whose order has given rise to the notice of appeal in sufficient detail that there will be only one opinion under 1925(a), even though there are multiple rulings at issue. The time period for transmission of the record is specified in Pa.R.A.P. 1931, and that rule was concurrently amended to expand the time period for the preparation of the opinion and transmission of the

Subdivision (b) This subdivision permits the judge whose order gave rise to the notice of appeal ("judge") to ask for a statement of errors complained of on appeal ("Statement") if the record is inadequate and the judge needs to clarify the errors complained of. The term "errors" is meant to encourage appellants to use the Statement as an opportunity to winnow the issues, recognizing that they will ultimately need to be refined to a statement that will comply with the requirements of Pa.R.A.P. 2116. Nonetheless, the term "errors" is intended in this context to be expansive, and it encompasses all of the reasons the trial court should not have reached its decision or judgment, including, for example, those that may not have been decisions of the judge, such as challenges to jurisdiction.

Paragraph (b)(1) This paragraph maintains the requirement that the Statement be both filed of record in the trial court and served on the judge. Service on the judge may be accomplished by mail or by personal service. The date of mailing will be considered the date of filing and of service upon the judge only if counsel obtains a United States Postal Service form from which the date of mailing can be verified, as specified in Pa.R.A.P. 1112(c). Counsel is advised to retain date-stamped copies of the postal forms (or pleadings if served by hand), in case questions arise later as to whether the Statement was timely filed or served on the judge.

Paragraph (b)(2) This paragraph extends the time period for drafting the Statement from 14 days to at least 21 days, with the trial court permitted to enlarge the time period or to allow the filing of an amended or supplemental Statement upon good cause shown. In *Commonwealth v. Mitchell*, 588 Pa. 19, 41, 902 A.2d 430, 444 (2006), the Court expressly observed that a Statement filed "after several extensions of time" was timely. An enlargement of time upon timely application might be warranted if, for example, there was a serious delay in the transcription of the notes of testimony or in the delivery of the order to appellate counsel. A trial

court should enlarge the time or allow for an amended or supplemental Statement when new counsel is retained or appointed. A supplemental Statement may also be appropriate when the ruling challenged was so non-specific—e.g., "Motion Denied"—that counsel could not be sufficiently definite in the initial Statement.

In general, nunc pro tunc relief is allowed only when there has been a breakdown in the process constituting extraordinary circumstances. See, e.g., In re Canvass of Absentee Ballots of Nov. 4, 2003 Gen. Election, 577 Pa. 231, 248-49, 843 A.2d 1223, 1234 (2004) ("We have held that fraud or the wrongful or negligent act of a court official may be a proper reason for holding that a statutory appeal period does not run and that the wrong may be corrected by means of a petition filed nunc pro tunc.") Courts have also allowed nunc pro tunc relief when "non-negligent circumstances, either as they relate to appellant or his counsel" occasion delay. McKeown v. Bailey, 731 A.2d 628, 630 (Pa. Super. 1999). However, even when there is a breakdown in the process, the appellant must attempt to remedy it within a "very short duration" of time. Id.; Amicone v. Rok, 839 A.2d 1109, 1113 (Pa. Super. 2003) (recognizing a breakdown in process, but finding the delay too long to justify nunc pro tunc

Paragraph (b)(3) This paragraph specifies what the judge must advise appellants when ordering a Statement.

Paragraph (b)(4) This paragraph sets forth the parameters for the Statement and explains what constitutes waiver. It should help counsel to comply with the concise-yet-sufficiently-detailed requirement and avoid waiver under either Lineberger v. Wyeth, 894 A.2d 141, 148-49 (Pa. Super. 2006) or Kanter v. Epstein, 866 A.2d 394, 400-03 (Pa. Super. 2004), allowance of appeal denied, 584 Pa. 678, 880 A.2d 1239 (2005), cert. denied sub nom. Spector Gadon & Rosen, P.C. v. Kanter, 546 U.S. 1092 (2006). The paragraph explains that the Statement should be sufficiently specific to allow the judge to draft the opinion required under 1925(a), and it provides that the number of issues alone will not constitute waiver-so long as the issues set forth are nonredundant and non-frivolous. It allows appellants to rely on the fact that subsidiary issues will be deemed included if the overarching issue is identified and if all of the issues have been properly preserved in the trial court. This provision has been taken from the United States Supreme Court rules. See Sup. Ct. R. 14(1). This paragraph does not in any way excuse the responsibility of an appellant who is raising claims of constitutional error to raise those claims with the requisite degree of specificity. This paragraph also allows-but does not require—an appellant to state the authority upon which the appellant challenges the ruling in question, but it expressly recognizes that a Statement is not a brief and that an appellant shall not file a brief with the Statement. This paragraph also recognizes that there may be times that a civil appellant cannot be specific in the Statement because of the non-specificity of the ruling complained of on appeal. In such instances, civil appellants may seek leave to file a supplemental Statement to clarify their position in response to the judge's more specific Rule 1925(a) opinion.

Subdivision (c) The appellate courts have the right under the Judicial Code to "affirm, modify, vacate, set aside or reverse any order brought before it for review, and may remand the matter and direct the entry of such appropriate order, or require such further proceedings to be had as may be just under the circumstances." 42 Pa.C.S. § 706. The following additions to the rule are based upon this statutory authorization.

Paragraph (c)(1) This paragraph applies to both civil and criminal cases and allows an appellate court to seek additional information—whether by supplementation of the record or additional briefing—if it is not apparent whether an initial or supplemental Statement was filed and/or served or timely filed and/or served.

Paragraph (c)(2) This paragraph allows an appellate court to remand a civil case to allow an initial, amended, or supplemental Statement and/or a supplemental opinion. See also 42 Pa.C.S. § 706.

Paragraph (c)(3) This paragraph allows an appellate court to remand in criminal cases only when the appellant has completely failed to respond to an order to file a Statement. It is thus narrower than (c)(2), above. Prior to these amendments of this rule, the appeal was quashed if no timely Statement was filed or served; however, because the failure to file and serve a timely Statement is a failure to perfect the appeal, it is presumptively prejudicial and "clear" ineffectiveness. See, e.g., *Commonwealth v. Halley*, 582 Pa. 164, 172, 870 A.2d 795, 801 (2005); Commonwealth v. West, 883 A.2d 654, 657 (Pa. Super. 2005). Direct appeal rights have typically been restored through a post-conviction relief process, but when the ineffectiveness is apparent and per se, the court in West recognized that the more effective way to resolve such per se ineffectiveness is to remand for the filing of a Statement and opinion. See West, 883 A.2d at 657. The procedure set forth in West is codified in paragraph (c)(3). As the West court recognized, this rationale does not apply when waiver occurs due to the improper filing of a Statement. In such circumstances, relief may occur only through the post-conviction relief process and only upon demonstration by the appellant that, but for the deficiency of counsel, it was reasonably probable that the appeal would have been successful. An appellant must be able to identify per se ineffectiveness to secure a remand under this section, and any appellant who is able to demonstrate per se ineffectiveness is entitled to a remand. Accordingly, this paragraph does not raise the concerns addressed in Johnson v. Mississippi, 486 U.S. 578, 588-89 (1988) (observing that where a rule has not been consistently or regularly applied, it is not-under federal law-an adequate and independent state ground for affirming petitioner's con-

Paragraph (c)(4) This paragraph clarifies the special expectations and duties of a criminal lawyer. Even lawyers seeking to withdraw pursuant to the procedures set forth in *Anders v. California*, 386 U.S. 738 (1967) and *Commonwealth v. McClendon*, 495 Pa. 467, 434 A.2d 1185 (1981) are obligated to comply with all rules, including the filing of a Statement. See *Commonwealth v. Myers*, 897 A.2d

493, 494-96 (Pa. Super. 2006); Commonwealth v. Ladamus, 896 A.2d 592, 594 (Pa. Super. 2006). However, because a lawyer will not file an Anders/McClendon brief without concluding that there are no non-frivolous issues to raise on appeal, this amendment allows a lawyer to file, in lieu of a Statement, a representation that no errors have been raised because the lawyer is (or intends to be) seeking to withdraw under Anders/McClendon. At that point, the appellate court will reverse or remand for a supplemental Statement and/or opinion if it finds potentially non-frivolous issues during its constitutionally required review of the record.

Subdivision (d) was formerly (c). The text has not been revised, except to update the reference to Pa.R.A.P. 1112(c).

The 2007 amendments attempt to address the concerns of the bar raised by cases in which courts found waiver: (a) because the Statement was too vague; or (b) because the Statement was so repetitive and voluminous that it did not enable the judge to focus on the issues likely to be raised on appeal. See, e.g., Lineberger v. Wyeth, 894 A.2d 141, 148-49 (Pa. Super. 2006); Kanter v. Epstein, 866 A.2d 394, 400-03 (Pa. Super. 2004), allowance of appeal denied, 584 Pa. 678, 880 A.2d 1239 (2005), cert. denied sub nom. Spector Gadon & Rosen, P.C. v. Kanter, 546 U.S. 1092 (2006). Courts have also cautioned, however, "against being too quick to find waiver, claiming that Rule 1925(b) statements are either too vague or not specific enough." Astorino v. New Jersey Transit Corp., 912 A.2d 308, 309 (Pa. Super. 2006).

While conciseness and vagueness are very casespecific inquiries, certain observations may be helpful. First, the Statement is only the first step in framing the issues to be raised on appeal, and the requirements of Pa.R.A.P. 2116 are even more stringent. Thus, the Statement should be viewed as an initial winnowing. Second, when appellate courts have been critical of sparse or vague Statements, they have not criticized the number of issues raised but the paucity of useful information contained in the Statement. Neither the number of issues raised nor the length of the Statement alone is enough to find that a Statement is vague or non-concise enough to constitute waiver. See Astorino v. New Jersey Transit Corp., 912 A.2d 308, 309 (Pa. Super. 2006). The more carefully the appellant frames the Statement, the more likely it will be that the judge will be able to articulate the rationale underlying the decision and provide a basis for counsel to determine the advisability of appealing that issue. Thus, counsel should begin the winnowing process when preparing the Statement and should articulate specific rulings with which the appellant takes issue and why. Nothing in the rule requires an appellant to articulate the arguments within a Statement. It is enough for an appellant—except where constitutional error must be raised with greater specificity-to have identified the rulings and issues that comprise the putative trial court

Proposed amendments to Pa.Rs.Crim.P. 106 and 542 Continuances

The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee is proposing amendments to Pa.Rs.Crim.P. 106 (Continuances in Summary and Court Cases) and 542 (Preliminary Hearing; Continuances) that would clarify that (1) Rule 106 applies to all criminal proceedings, not just trials, and (2) the notice of the continuance must include the date, time, and location of the rescheduled proceeding.

The Committee, as part of its ongoing review of case law, considered the Superior Court Judge Popovich's suggestion in *Commonwealth v. Panto*, 913 A.2d 292 (Pa. Super. 2006), that Rule 106 should include a requirement that the notice of the continuance set forth the date, time, and place of the continued proceeding. Judge Popovich remarks in footnote 5 of *Commonwealth v. Panto* at 297:

The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee may want to examine the disparity between the notice required for a preliminary hearing (listing the place, date and time a defendant is to appear before the issuing authority, see Pa.R.Crim.P. 510(A), 512), the notice granting a continuance of a preliminary hearing (listing the new date and time, with notice provided to the defendant, see Pa.R.Crim.P. 542(D)(2)(a), (b)), and the notice of the grant of a continuance in the case at bar, which "Application for Continuance" form merely made provision for listing the new date without any mention of the concomitant time and/or place for the trial de novo. Provision for inclusion of these temporal and physical elements could be in the form of amendments to Pa.R.Crim.P. 106 ("Continuances in Summary and Court Cases"). This would provide the party's attorney or, if unrepresented, the party with sufficient notice of the date, time and place of the continuance with a cross-reference to Pa.R.Crim.P. 114 regarding the methodology by which notice is to be served upon the parties.

The Committee agreed a uniform requirement for all continuance notices concerning the information about the rescheduled proceeding makes sense. Accordingly, we are proposing that Rule 106 be amended by the addition of a sentence at the end of paragraph (B) that requires, when a continuance is granted, the notice of the continuance include the new date, time, and location of the proceeding. In addition, the Committee is proposing a conforming amendment to Rule 542(E)(2) that adds "place" to the information contained in the notice of continuance of the preliminary hearing.

The Committee also agreed that the manner of service of continuance notices should be addressed in Rule 106 to avoid the type of issues that arose in the Panto case. To accomplish this, we are proposing Rule 106(B) include the requirement that the notice of the continuance is to be served on the parties as provided in the rules. A cross-reference to Rule 114 (Orders and Court Notices: Filing; Service; and Docket Entries) would be added in the Rule 106 Comment to emphasize that the provisions of Rule 114 govern the method of service of the continuance notices. Because Rule 542(E)(2)(b) and (c) provide the method of service of the continuance of the preliminary hearing that are different from the provisions in Rule 114, we also are proposing the Rule 106 Comment include a cross-reference to the service provisions in Rule 542(E).

Finally, the Committee considered the scope of the application of Rule 106. We agreed that Rule 106 applies to continuances in all criminal proceedings, but noted this is not clear in Rule 106 because of the use of the word "trial" in paragraph (C). Accordingly, the Committee is proposing the word "trial" be changed to "proceeding" in paragraph (C).

S. § 7101, et seq.), the issuing authority, when permitted by the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure, may make it a condition of bail that the defendant be examined by the Behavior Clinic within seventy-two (72) hours of preliminary hearing.

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF FUNERAL DIRECTORS
[49 PA. CODE CH. 13]
Unprofessional Conduct

The State Board of Funeral Directors (Board) amends §§ 13.1 and 13.202 (relating to definitions; and unprofessional conduct) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Description and Need for the Rulemaking

Section 11(a)(5) of the Funeral Director Law (act) (63 P. S. § 479.11(a)(5)) authorizes the Board to discipline licensees for "misconduct in the carrying on of the profession" of funeral director. Although the act does not define "misconduct," the Board, in its disciplinary actions, applied prior court interpretation of the term. See, for example, *Toms v. State Board of Funeral Directors*, 800 A.2d 342, 349 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2002) (misconduct is a breach of the generally accepted canons of ethics and propriety governing the reverential and respectful burial of the dead). Acting under its statutory authority, the Board has listed in § 13.202 various acts that the Board considers to be misconduct. Recent disciplinary cases before the Board concerning professional misconduct inspired the Board to expand that list. Including acts of misconduct in the regulation serves to put licensees on notice of what the Board considers to be misconduct.

Summary of Comments and Responses to Proposed Rulemaking

The Board published notice of proposed rulemaking at 35 Pa.B. 1208 (February 12, 2005) with a 30-day public comment period. The Board received written comments from the following members of the public: Kevin M. Bean, FD; Patrick J. Connell, FD; Robert M. Fells of the International Cemetery and Funeral Association; John R. Flynn, FD; Drew Gauntley of Alderwoods Group; Ernie Heffner, FD; David A. Heisterkamp of Pre-Need; Paul L. Henney, Jr., FD; James J. Kutz, Esquire, on behalf of the Pennsylvania Cemetery and Funeral Association; Harry C. Neel, FD; Michele Pirro; Kathleen K. Ryan, Esquire, on behalf of the Pennsylvania Funeral Directors Association (PFDA); State Representative Stephen H. Stetler; Ronald W. Virag of AmeriServe Trust and Financial Services Company; and Sam Cummings, Jr., FD, of PFDA.

The Board also received comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) as part of their review of proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. §§ 745.1—745.12). The Board did not receive comments from the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC) as part of its review of proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act.

In response to questions from various commentators, the Board has provided a definition of "funeral entity" used in § 13.202(13) and (14). This term is intended to encompass any of the various organizational forms that, under sections 8(a), (b) and (d) and 9(a) of the act (63)

P. S. §§ 479.8(a), (b) and (d) and 9(a)), may be licensed by the Board to operate a funeral establishment. The term is defined to include a restricted business corporation, professional corporation, pre-1935 corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, widow, widower or estate authorized by the Board to practice the profession of funeral directing.

The Board proposed amending § 13.202(11), which states that unprofessional conduct includes providing embalming or other services or merchandise without receiving written permission from the family, to provide an exception when a person authorized to give that permission is not available and there is a need to provide that service or merchandise in a timely manner. Various commentators pointed out that the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) Amended Funeral Rule addresses these situations. Accordingly, the Board deleted this proposed amendment. In its place, the Board added § 13.202(16) to provide that unprofessional conduct includes failing to comply with the regulations of the FTC in 16 CFR Part 453 (relating to funeral industry practices).

As proposed, new § 13.202(13) would have prohibited a funeral director from retaining funds for goods or services that the funeral director has not provided, or that exceeded the value of funeral goods and services that the funeral director has provided. Various commentators, including the HPLC and IRRC, were concerned about how this proposed amendment would impact preneed funeral arrangements. When the funeral director has received those funds under a preneed agreement, the Board concludes that issues concerning entitlement to payment should be addressed through comprehensive rulemaking specific to preneed funeral arrangements. Accordingly, in this final-form rulemaking the Board has specifically excluded preneed funeral arrangements. Also as proposed, paragraph (13) would have permitted a funeral director to preserve the funds for a reasonable time to permit a person to demonstrate his right to receive the funds. In response to comments expressing confusion as to this provision, the Board deleted this additional provision.

Because section 8 of the act sets forth various forms of organization that may engage in the practice of funeral directing, including a sole proprietor or partnership and certain corporations, and imposes certain restrictions on these entities, the Board proposed adding § 13.202(14) to prohibit a funeral director from performing funeral director services on behalf of an entity that the funeral director knew or should have known was not in compliance with section 8 of the act. The HPLC commented that, because the statutory grounds for disciplinary action includes no required mental state, the Board should not inject this requirement by regulation. Proposed § 13.202(14) extends beyond existing § 13.202(1) to address the specific requirements for these funeral entities in section 8 of the act, such as employing a supervisor and having appropriately qualified shareholders and officers. Because the Board concludes that the licensee's knowledge of those facts beyond the mere fact of licensure is critical to determining the propriety of the licensee's conduct, the Board will retain the required mental state standard.

The Board proposed adding § 13.202(16) to prohibit a funeral director from refusing a reasonable request of a member of the decedent's immediate family to pay final respects. In response to various comments, the Board decided not to adopt this provision.

The Board proposed adding § 13.202(17) to prohibit a funeral director from aiding a person or entity that the funeral director has reason to believe is attempting through unlicensed persons or entities to engage in preneed sales. Subsequent to the publication of the proposed rulemaking, the Federal District Court for the Middle District of Pennsylvania noted in *Walker v. Flitton*, 364 F. Supp. 2d 503 (M.D. Pa. 2005), that the Board has not set forth by regulation what unlicensed employees and agents may lawfully do in the realm of preneed sales. Accordingly, the Board decided not to adopt this paragraph as part of its misconduct regulation and instead will address this issue through separate rulemaking.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions and will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

The final-form rulemaking is authorized under sections 11(a)(5) and 16(a) of the act.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on February 12, 2005, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 35 Pa.B. 1208 (February 12, 2005), to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the HPLC and the SCP/PLC for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Department has considered all comments from IRRC, the HPLC, the SCP/PLC and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on March 21, 2007, the final-form rulemaking was approved by the HPLC. On April 4, 2007, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on April 5, 2007, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered.

- (3) The amendments to this final-form rulemaking do not enlarge the scope of proposed rulemaking published at 35 Pa.B. 1208.
- (4) The final-form rulemaking adopted by this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the act.

Order

The Board, acting under its authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 13, are amended by amending §§ 13.1 and 13.202 to read as set forth in Annex A with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

- (b) The Board shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) The final-form rulemaking shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Annex A

TITLE 49. PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 13. STATE BOARD OF FUNERAL DIRECTORS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 13.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Funeral entity—A restricted business corporation, professional corporation, pre-1935 corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, widow, widower or estate authorized by the Board to practice the profession of funeral director.

STANDARDS OF PRACTICE AND CONDUCT § 13.202. Unprofessional conduct.

Unprofessional conduct includes the following:

- (1) Aiding or assisting a funeral director whose license has been suspended or revoked or an unlicensed person to engage in an act or practice for which a license is required.
- (2) Demonstrating disrespect toward or mutilating the remains of the deceased person.

- (3) Making a comment or public announcement in defamation of another funeral director. This does not prohibit one licensee from testifying against another licensee or from filing a bona fide complaint with the Board.
- (4) Participating in the establishment of a business or professional relationship with or in the operation of a burial association, mutual assessment association, burial certificate plan, insurance company, lodge company, society or religious or other organization whose plan or scheme of organization or operation limits or interferes with the rights of a person entitled by law to dispose of the body of a deceased member, policyholder or certificateholder.
- (5) Paying or extending an offer to pay or give to a person, agency or group a commission or a valuable consideration for the solicitation or procurement of clientele.
- (6) Offering, directly or indirectly, or giving money or an item of value to an employee of the Commonwealth to directly or indirectly influence the administration or enforcement of the act or this chapter, except for the payment of fees required by the act and this chapter.
- (7) Failing to notify the Bureau, in writing, of a demand, solicitation or attempted extortion of money or an item of value, by or on behalf of an employee assigned to the administrative jurisdiction of the Commissioner, and failing to furnish additional information reasonably requested.
- (8) Attempting to influence the judgment of the family in the selection of a funeral director, funeral arrangements or funeral merchandise when a family group is divided on these issues.
- (9) Aiding or abetting another licensed funeral director to violate the act or this chapter.
- (10) Failure to fulfill the professional responsibilities of a funeral director as described in the act or this chapter.

- (11) Furnishing embalming, other services or merchandise without having obtained written permission from a family member or other person authorized by law to make funeral arrangements for the deceased. Oral permission to embalm, followed by a confirmatory e-mail, fax, telex, telegram, mailgram or other written confirmation will be acceptable.
- (12) Renting or exchanging funeral establishments by one or more funeral directors for the purpose of creating a secondary location for funeral services. Renting of an establishment for funeral services by a funeral director over 10 times a year shall be evidence of attempting to create a secondary location.
- (13) Retaining funds intended to pay for funeral goods and services when the funeral director and funeral entity have not provided any funeral goods and services or when the amount of funds retained is in excess of the value of funeral goods and services actually provided by the funeral director or funeral entity, as set forth on the general price list in effect at the time the funeral goods and services are actually provided. This paragraph does not apply to funds received under an agreement entered into by the funeral director, or the funeral entity employing that funeral director, while the decedent was still living to provide funeral goods or services on behalf of the decedent when needed.
- (14) Performing funeral services on behalf of a funeral entity that the funeral director knew, or should have known, was not in compliance with section 8 of the act (63 P. S. § 479.8), regarding conduct of business.
- (15) Refusing to release remains until consideration, whether earned or not, has been paid.
- (16) Failing to comply with the regulations of the Federal Trade Commission in 16 CFR Part 453 (relating to funeral industry practices).

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of June 2007

The Department of Banking (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. \S 301), hereby determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of June 2007 is 7 1/4%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which such individual owns and which such individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 4.82 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 7.32 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 7 1/4%.

For NPDES renewal applications in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements.

For applications for new NPDES permits and renewal applications with major changes in Section II, as well as applications for MS4 individual permits and individual stormwater construction permits in Sections IV and VI, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, has made a tentative determination of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the EPA Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before an application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

Plan Approval No. PA-15-0123 is for the removal of a vapor degreaser No. 1291 and also for a determination of a Reasonably Available Control Technology (RACT) for Flush Booths No. 1603 and 1960. Further details on the conditions and the reasons for their inclusion are available upon request.

The Department has made a preliminary determination to approve RACT plans as amendments to the State Implementation Plan (SIP) for Superior Tube Company, Inc. The proposed SIP revisions do not adopt any new regulations. They incorporate the provisions and requirements contained in RACT approvals for this facility to comply with current regulations. These preliminary determinations, if finally approved, will be incorporated into Plan Approvals and/or Operating Permits for the facility and will be submitted to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as revisions to Pennsylvania's SIP.

The preliminary RACT determinations for Superior Tube Company, Inc. for the Flush and Blow Booth Nos. 1603 and 1960 are the immediate implementation of good operating practices for minimization of solvent usage.

47-309-001A: United States Gypsum Co. (125 South Franklin Street, Chicago, IL 60606) for construction of synthetic gypsum railcar and truck unloading operations in Derry Township, **Montour County**.

The proposed railcar and truck unloading operations will be associated with the gypsum wallboard manufacturing facility which is currently under construction at the respective site. Plan approval (47-309-001) for construction of the wallboard manufacturing facility was issued by the Department of Environmental Protection on November 17, 2006. Synthetic gypsum is flue gas desulfurization scrubber sludge.

The PM and PM10 emissions associated with the railcar and truck unloading operations are not expected to exceed a maximum of 30.4 tons and 5.95 tons, respectively, per year, most of which will come from increased use of facility roadways. These values assume that 100% of the facility's synthetic gypsum needs will be supplied by truck, a highly unlikely occurrence. As a significant portion of the facility's synthetic gypsum needs are expected to be satisfied by synthetic gypsum delivered to the facility by conveyor from the adjacent PPL Montour, LLCs Montour Steam Electric Station and at least a portion of the remainder will be delivered by rail, the PM and PM10 emissions which will actually occur as a result of synthetic gypsum railcar and truck unloading will most probably be significantly less than these maximum values.

The facility in which the railcar and truck unloading operations will be located will be a major (Title V) facility for CO and PM10 and will be required to obtain a Title V operating permit.

The Department of Environmental Protection's (Department) review of the information submitted by the United States Gypsum Co. indicates that the proposed synthetic gypsum railcar and truck unloading operations should comply with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants, including the fugitive air contaminant emission requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 123.1 and 123.2, the BAT requirement of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12 and the requirements of Subpart OOO of the Federal Standards of Performance for New Stationary Sources, 40 CFR 60.670—60.676, (Standards of Performance for Nonmetallic Mineral Processing Plants). Based on this finding, the Department proposes to issue plan approval for the construction of the proposed synthetic gypsum railcar and truck unloading operations.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to be issued to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

1. All conditions of Plan Approval 47-309-001 remain unchanged and in effect unless superseded or amended by a condition contained herein. If there is a conflict between a condition contained in Plan Approval 47-309-001 and a condition contained herein, the permittee shall comply with the condition contained herein rather than with the conflicting condition contained in Plan Approval 47-309-001

- 2. The permittee shall comply with the requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 123.1 and 123.12 as well as all applicable requirements of Subpart OOO of the Federal Standards of Performance for New Stationary Sources, 40 CFR 60.670 through 60.676.
- 3. No more than 1,100,000 tons of synthetic gypsum shall be delivered to the facility by railcar or truck in any 12-consecutive month period. Any portion of this 1,100,000 tons may be delivered by railcar and any portion may be delivered by truck.
- 4. All railcars delivering synthetic gypsum to the facility shall be unloaded inside a railcar unloading building which shall be an enclosed structure except for the railcar entrance and exit and any access doors which may exist. All access doors shall be closed when railcar unloading is occurring.
- 5. All trucks delivering synthetic gypsum to the facility shall be unloaded inside the facility's three sided, roofed rock shed.
- 6. Synthetic gypsum shall only be stockpiled in the facility's rock shed.
- 7. The conveyor incorporated in the railcar unloading operation shall be fully enclosed or equipped with a three sided cover (top and two sides) except for those portions of the conveyor which are located underground or inside of an enclosed building, in which case an enclosure or cover is not required.
- 8. All facility roadways shall be paved and properly maintained.
- 9. The permittee shall establish, and enforce, a vehicle speed limit of 15 mph on all facility roadways. This speed limit shall be posted in highly visible locations along the respective roadways.
- 10. The permittee shall establish, and enforce, a requirement that all trucks entering or exiting the facility loaded with synthetic gypsum shall be tarped or otherwise covered. This requirement shall be posted in highly visible locations.
- 11. An operable vacuum type road sweeper shall be maintained onsite at all times and shall be used, as needed, to remove dust from roadways. The use of nonvacuum type road sweepers is prohibited.

Proposed General Plan Approval and/or General Operating Permit for Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators (BAQ-GPA/GP-23)

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) proposes to issue the Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators General Plan approval and/or operating permit (General Permit or BAQ-GPA/GP-23) establishing Best Available Technology and other permit conditions.

This General Permit, authorized under section 6.1(f) of the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P. S. § 4006.1(f)) and 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter H (relating to general plan approvals and operating permits), will apply to the construction, operation and modification of Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators.

The proposed general plan approval and/or operating permit, BAQ-GPA/GP-23, contains conditions that prescribe applicable emission limits, compliance demonstration, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements.

Prior to operating under this General Permit, the owner or operator of the facility must notify the Department and receive prior written approval from the Department before commencing to operate the affected Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators. Notification of the fleet owner or operator's intent to use the general permit and/or plan approval must be submitted on a form provided by the Department. Permittees operating under this general permit shall comply with the terms and conditions of the general plan approval and/or general operating permit.

The Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators General Permit has been established in accordance with the provisions described in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter H. If the Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators cannot be regulated by the requirements of this general permit, a plan approval and/or an operating permit issued in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter B (relating to plan approval requirements) and/or 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter F (relating to operating permit requirements) will be re-

quired, or if the facility is a Title V facility, a Title V operating permit issued in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter F and Subchapter G (relating to Title V operating permits) will be required.

The General Permit includes emission standards for PM, NOx, CO and NMOCs.

The Department also reserves the right to require an additional verification of emission rates which may include source testing in accordance with applicable provisions of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139 (relating to sampling and testing) or portable exhaust gas analyzers approved by the Department.

The permittee must maintain comprehensive accurate records of hours of operation, fuel used and electrical energy produced. These records must be retained for a minimum of 5 years and made available to the Department upon request. The owner/operator of the fleets shall also submit this information to the Department, on an electronic spreadsheet, each time Rental Portable Electric Generators are made operational or cease fleet operation at lessee locations in this Commonwealth.

The Department proposes to establish the following application, permit renewal and annual administrative fees for this General Permit:

a. General plan approval application and renewal fees payable every 5 years: \$1,000.

A new application with fees as indicated above is required each time the permittee installs or modifies Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators. The installation or modification of Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators must be conducted according to the terms and conditions of this General Permit. Two or more Rental Portable Electric Generators may be added to or removed from a fleet under a single plan approval fee.

- b. General operating permit fees to be submitted along with plan approval application to allow the continued operation of Fleets of Rental Portable Electric Generators: \$375
- c. Annual administrative fees, payable on an annual basis: \$375.

Authorization to operate the sources under this General Permit will be issued for a term of 5 years. Within 30 days of the expiration date of the authorization to operate under the general plan approval and/or general operating permit, the permittee must renew the authorization if the owner/operator intends to continue to operate under this General Permit.

Inspection and Maintenance Standards for the Electric Distribution Companies

May 16, 2007

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the October 7, 2006 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. General—Fiscal impact; Need; Reasonableness; Consistency with other regulations and statutes; Implementation procedure; Feasibility; Clarity.

The proposed regulation would set prescriptive requirements for the inspection and maintenance (I/M) programs of electric distribution companies (EDCs) under the jurisdiction of the PUC. It generated a significant level of interest. The PUC is to be commended for extending the public comment period and for meeting with stakeholders to gather more information. The paragraphs in the first part of our comments will discuss issues in general. The discussion in the following two parts will focus on the specific provisions of the proposed regulation.

Fiscal impact v. benefit

In the Preamble, the PUC did not address the costs that this rulemaking could potentially impose on the regulated community. However, commentators raised several concerns with its fiscal impact. According to the EDCs, this proposed regulation, especially the minimum I/M timeframes mandated by section 57.198(e), would significantly increase their operating costs. The EDCs

claim that the proposed regulation would cost more than \$75.3 million per year for Pennsylvania ratepayers. At the same time, they claim that no one has identified any quantifiable benefit that can be attributed to the proposed regulation.

Under item #17 on page three of the Regulatory Analysis Form, the PUC stated the following concerning costs or savings:

It is expected that an EDC that follows prudent inspection, maintenance, repair and replacement practices, ultimately (sic) financially benefits from such practice. Although there may be more intermittent costs involved in minor repairs, an EDC should save money on larger repairs which can be prevented by proper maintenance of the system. Further, a properly maintained system should prevent foreseeable outages to customers. The EDC loses money when its customers have an outage.

Since the passage of the Electricity Generation Customer Choice and Competition Act (Act) in 1996, EDCs worked to adapt to the demands of restructuring the electric transmission and distribution sector. They are using different approaches for their I/M programs in response to their respective regions and changes in technology. The prescriptive I/M intervals proposed in section 57.198(e) do not match the contemporary I/M practices of the EDCs. This difference is the source of the cost impact for EDCs.

Section 5(a)(3) of the Regulatory Review Act requires that when an agency submits a proposed regulation for publication, it should also submit information concerning costs imposed on the public and private sectors. The PUC did not submit this information. Before it moves forward with the final-form regulation, the PUC should carefully examine the costs of this proposed regulation. In addition, it needs to identify the benefits that would be achieved by adoption of the regulation. This analysis needs to be completed before the PUC submits the final-form regulation.

Need for change; Duplication of existing regulations

There are two aspects to consider when looking at the need for this proposed regulation. The first is whether the proposed regulation duplicates or conflicts with existing regulations. The second is whether there are serious problems with I/M programs that need to be addressed by means of new regulation.

Section 2802(20) of the Act (66 Pa.C.S.A. § 2802(20)) declares that the PUC "shall set through regulations, inspection, maintenance, repair and replacement standards." Proponents of the proposed regulation point to this statutory language to support the need for regulation. Other commentators point to existing regulations that already provide standards for EDCs to achieve through I/M programs. EDCs are already required to file quarterly and annual reports on reliability of electric service. These existing provisions at 52 Pa. Code § 57.195 direct EDCs to submit various types of data concerning their I/M programs to the PUC.

The existing language in section 57.195(b)(4) requires that an EDC provide "a breakdown and analysis of outage causes during the year" including "outage cause such as equipment failure, animal contact, tree related, and so forth." This same subsection includes this statement: "Proposed solutions to identified service problems shall be reported." Among other requirements, section 57.195(b)(6) mandates that EDCs provide:

A comparison of established transmission and distribution inspection and maintenance goals/objectives versus actual results achieved during the year being reported on. Explanations of any variances shall be included.

Sections 57.195(b)(7)—(12) direct EDCs to submit a significant amount of detail concerning the maintenance of distribution and transmission systems and I/M programs to the PUC annually. This list includes:

- A comparison of budgeted versus actual transmission and distribution operation and maintenance expenses for the year.
- A comparison of budgeted versus actual transmission and distribution capital expenditures.
- Quantified transmission and distribution I/M goals/ objectives.
- Significant changes, if any, to the transmission and distribution I/M programs previously submitted to the PUC.

In addition, the EDCs must provide information on outages in the form of "reliability indices." Two examples of these indices include "CAIDI-Customer Average Interruption Duration Index" and "SAIFI-System Average Interruption Frequency Index." These indices are "service performance indicators which measure the frequency, duration and magnitude of customer interruptions," and allow the PUC to monitor the performance of EDCs in providing electricity and in maintaining the reliability of their transmission and distribution systems. Hence, they are also indicators of whether EDCs have effective I/M programs for their systems.

Second, the Preamble notes the findings of the *Final Report on the August 14, 2003 Blackout in the U.S. and Canada: Causes and Recommendations (Report)* that one of the causes of this large blackout was failure to adequately manage tree growth along transmission lines. However, the transmission line failures noted by the *Report* took place near Cleveland, OH.

Beyond the incident in Ohio, the PUC has not identified any serious problems that would be addressed by this proposed regulation. PUC staff did inform us of some concerns with certain EDCs. In fact, PUC counsel informed this Commission that some EDCs were recently ordered, under an investigation, to maintain a 4 year tree trimming cycle for distribution lines, and a 5 year cycle for transmission lines in order to improve their service reliability. This example demonstrates that the PUC is already using the information that it gathers by means of the reliability reports to address I/M concerns on a case-by-case basis.

The PUC is already receiving a significant amount of data concerning EDCs' I/M programs. What is the need for another regulation concerning I/M plans? Why are the EDCs being asked to submit additional filings to the PUC? The PUC needs to provide a strong justification for this proposed rulemaking.

Feasibility; Implementation procedure

The EDCs expressed significant concern over how quickly they will be able to implement the required I/M intervals in section 57.198(e). They described the proposed regulation as requiring a "labor intensive" approach to I/M programs. In contrast, they have developed other technologies that reduce labor costs and still provide effective I/M of their distribution and transmission systems. They cite evidence that the current size of the

trained labor force may be insufficient to perform all the I/M tasks required by this regulation. The evidence includes a report from the North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC) indicating that loss of skilled and experienced technical talent is much more acute in the electric utility industry.

A representative for the EDCs stated that it may take a few years for the EDCs to recruit, hire and train an adequate workforce that would bring them into compliance with the proposed regulation. If the PUC continues to move forward with promulgation of this proposed regulation, it must address this concern and provide an adequate time period for the EDCs to come into compliance.

Conflict with other regulations

On March 16, 2007, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) issued an order entitled "Mandatory Reliability Standards for the Bulk-Power System" for a final rule. One example of the standards adopted by FERC is vegetation management. FERC is using the vegetation management program developed by NERC. This program does not set forth specific inspection trim cycles but requires that utilities maintain minimum clearances. Unlike the proposed regulation, it provides flexibility for utilities, EDCs or transmission owners to develop their own inspections schedules that are of "sufficient frequency to insure compliance with clearance requirements." In this case, the approach of the proposed regulation to transmission facilities or systems appears to be more stringent than the FERC rule for bulk power system of 100 kV or more.

2. Section 57.192. Definitions.—Reasonableness; Consistency with other regulations and laws; Implementation procedure; Need; Clarity.

Rural and urban areas

The proposed regulation adds two new definitions for the terms "rural area" and "urban area" to Subchapter N (52 Pa. Code §§ 57.191—57.197) relating to electric reliability standards. Commentators questioned the need for these two definitions.

Both definitions use similar terminology. They refer to an area as a "place designated by the United States. Bureau of Census... and whose boundaries have been approved by the Secretary of the United States Department of Transportation."

The problem with references to two different federal agencies is that each agency may not use a term in the same way. The following statements are from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA).

The term Urban Area has been ascribed two slightly different definitions by two different federal agencies. The Department of Commerce's Census Bureau uses the term Urban Area (UA) to refer collectively to the Urbanized Areas (UZA) and Urban Clusters (UC) designated by the Census Bureau for the 2000 decennial Census.

On the other hand, Federal transportation legislation (23 U.S.C. 101(a)(36)—(37) and 49 U.S.C. 5302(a) (16)—(17)) allows responsible state and local officials in cooperation with each other, and subject to approval by the Secretary of Transportation, to adjust the Census boundaries outward, as long as they encompass, at a minimum, the entire Census designated area.

The FHWA uses the term Federal-Aid Urban Area (FAUA) to distinguish the adjusted urban area

boundaries allowed for transportation purposes from those designated by the Census Bureau.

If state or local officials and the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) change the boundaries for these areas from those designated by the U.S. Census Bureau, then which definition or designation should an EDC use? Why are areas approved by the USDOT Secretary any more appropriate for I/M programs than what EDCs develop and use in designing and implementing I/M in their unique regions?

EDCs also noted problems with making distinctions between rural and urban areas. They noted that many distribution circuits cross both urban and rural areas. Some lines may cross back and forth over different areas many times. Hence, making an artificial distinction between such areas serves no purpose. If the PUC is concerned that I/M plans address changes in population density, highway or transportation routes, or topography in their regions, then this requirement can be added to the substantive provisions for required I/M plan contents. There is no need to use the words "rural" and "urban," and these two definitions should be deleted from the final-form regulation.

3. Section 57.198. Inspection and maintenance standards.—Fiscal impact; Reasonableness; Consistency with other regulations; Implementation procedure; Need; Clarity.

This new section sets forth procedures for filing I/M plans with the PUC, content requirements for the plans, and specific timeframes for certain I/M activities. It is divided into five subsections. The following paragraphs describe issues related to these subsections.

Subsection (a)—I/M plan contents

The first sentence in Subsection 57.198 (a) is long and confusing. It contains a list of ten specific items to be included in the I/M plan and the words "other facilities critical to maintaining an acceptable level of reliability." To improve clarity, it should be enumerated. The PUC should refer to Chapter 7, entitled "Enumerations" in the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual* for guidance. The enumerated list should also be moved to the other content requirements for these plans set forth in Paragraphs (1)—(4) of this subsection. In addition, what type of equipment or facilities would be included in "other facilities critical to maintaining an acceptable level of reliability"? Please provide examples.

The end of the first sentence in Subsection (a) states that an EDC shall have a plan "in a format that the Commission [PUC] prescribes." When and how will the 11 EDCs be notified of the prescribed format? Format requirements should be included in the final-form regulation.

The second sentence of Subsection (a) reads: "The Commission [PUC] will review each plan and may issue orders to ensure compliance with this section." The intent of this sentence is unclear. The procedures for PUC review of plans are detailed in section 57.198(b) of this proposed regulation. As noted, a different sentence in this subsection states the PUC may require an EDC to correct problems by submitting an updated plan. Hence, the second sentence in Subsection (a) is redundant, and should be deleted.

The final sentence of Subsection (a) states that the PUC "may require an EDC to submit an updated plan at any time containing information the Commission [PUC] may prescribe." It is unclear how and when the PUC would notify an EDC to update its plan. Under what circumstances, would it be necessary to update a plan? How would the PUC notify the EDC of the "information" that the PUC is prescribing be contained in the plan? After the EDC submits its updated plan, when would the PUC notify the EDC that the update was approved?

Subsection 57.198(b) and (c) set forth detailed procedures and time periods for PUC review and approval of plans and revised plans. If the PUC intends to retain the ability to request that EDCs update previously-approved plans, then a new and separate subsection clarifying this process should be added to the final-form regulation. It should set forth the process, procedures and criteria that the PUC will use in determining the need for information and plan updates, and for notifying the affected EDC. It should also include provisions similar to those in Subsections (b) and (c) for PUC review and approval of plan updates.

Subsection (a)(1)—Industry codes; Rural and urban areas; I/M intervals

Subsection (a)(1) begins with the statement that the I/M "plan must be based on industry codes, National electric industry practices, manufacturers' recommendations, sound engineering judgment and past experience." What are "industry codes" and "National electric industry practices"? If this is a broad reference to codes such as the National Electricity Safety Code or to the code and practices of organizations such as the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers and NERC, then the appropriate codes or organizations should be referenced in the final-form regulation.

The phrase "sound engineering judgment" is vague since engineers may respectfully disagree on what is sound. It is our understanding that the PUC will determine whether a plan is based on reasonable or sound engineering judgment. Hence, it will be a part of the PUC review of plans under Subsection 57.198(b) and if the PUC identifies problems in a plan, it will notify the EDC of the plan's deficiencies pursuant to Subsection 57.198(b)(3). Therefore, it is not necessary to include the words "sound engineering judgment" in the proposed regulation, and we recommend that this phrase be deleted.

The final sentence in Subsection (a)(1) states: "The plan must take into account the **broad** minimum inspection and maintenance intervals provided for in subsection (e)" (emphasis added). Why is the word "broad" used in this sentence? Since the provisions in Subsection (e) set very specific minimum intervals, the use of the word "broad" is confusing. It should be deleted from the final-form regulation

Subsection (a)(2)—Adequate resources

This subsection reads:

An EDC shall reduce the risk of future service interruptions by accounting for the age, condition, design and performance of system components and by providing adequate resources to maintain, repair, replace and upgrade the system.

How will the PUC determine if an EDC has provided "adequate resources to maintain, repair, replace and upgrade the system"?

Subsection (a)(3)-Vegetation clearance program

This subsection requires that the EDC I/M plan "include a program for the maintenance of minimum clearances of vegetation from the EDC's overhead transmission and distribution facilities sufficient to avoid contact under design-based conditions." EDCs questioned the need for this provision and called it unreasonable. Incidental contact with vegetation or tree branches does not necessarily cause outages. Given the growth of some trees, this requirement could actually force some EDCs to perform trimming annually and would greatly increase costs with no quantifiable benefit. The PUC needs to explain the basis and intent for this requirement.

Subsection (a)(4)—Plans to be consistent with I/M goals and objectives

Subsection 57.198(a)(4) refers to quarterly and annual reliability reports from an EDC. If these are the reports required by the existing provisions at sections 57.193(c) and 57.195, then the proposed regulation should include cross-references to these existing provisions.

Subsection (b)—Plan review process

This subsection requires EDCs to submit their I/M plans by October 1, 2007. As discussed previously, the EDCs believe that there are not sufficient numbers of trained and experienced people available to meet the I/M schedules set forth in Subsection (e). They claim it will take years to recruit and train an adequate workforce to implement this proposed regulation. If the prescriptive requirements in Subsection (e) are retained in the final-form regulation, the PUC should carefully examine whether the October 2007 deadline is achievable.

There appears to be a drafting error in the first sentence of Subsection (b). It states that "on or before October 1, 2007, and every 2 years thereafter, an EDC shall submit its whole plan for the following calendar year" to the PUC. As written, this provision would have the PUC receive a 1-year plan every 2 years. It is our understanding that the PUC also wants the EDCs to submit updates on their plans for the second year. The PUC's intent for when and how EDCs will submit plans and updates should be clarified in the final-form regulation.

Subsections (b) and (c)—Designee

Subsections (b) and (c) set forth the process for EDCs to submit plans and revised plans for PUC review and approval. Both subsections would allow the PUC or "its designee" to accept or reject the plan or revised plan. Representatives for EDCs suggested that the words "or its designee" be deleted from the proposed regulation. There is concern that the proposed regulation does not describe or define the "designee." Another concern is that EDCs are not given the ability to appeal or challenge decisions made by the "designee." The regulation should be amended to define the "designee" and specify how EDCs may appeal the designee's decision, or the term should be deleted from the final-form regulation.

Subsection (c)—Revised plans from EDCs

This subsection allows an EDC to revise its plan and submit it to the PUC for review. Like Subsection (b), this subsection states that the PUC will have 90 days to review and "accept or reject the revisions to the plan." Unlike Subsection (b), however, Subsection (c) contains no provision stating that the PUC will notify the EDC as to why it rejected the plan nor a provision stating that the revised plan is "deemed accepted" absent any action by the PUC within 90 days. These provisions should also appear in Subsection (c) in the final-form regulation.

Subsection (d)—Recordkeeping

This subsection requires that an EDC "maintain records of its inspection and maintenance activities sufficient to demonstrate compliance with" the timeframes for I/M programs set forth in Subsection (e). The PUC needs to provide examples of the types of records that would be "sufficient." Would this include date-stamped records signed by EDC staff who performed the tasks?

Subsection (e)—Minimum timeframes for I/M activities

This subsection sets specific statewide minimum schedules for several different types of I/M activities including vegetation management, and inspections of poles, overhead lines and substations. The EDCs contend there is no basis for setting specific minimum requirements and that they are not cost-effective.

I/M inspection schedules or timeframes for different EDCs may depend on the regions where their systems are located, the different types of plants and geography in those regions, fluctuating weather patterns, variations in equipment or infrastructure, and other factors. The need for frequent visual inspections of lines or other equipment was challenged by the EDCs given that many problems are caused by internal factors which may not be detected during visual inspections. In many situations, EDCs contend that new technologies provide better results than visual inspections.

In addition, a provision in this subsection mandated annual "foot patrol" inspections of distribution lines. The need for foot patrols was questioned in situations when the lines run parallel to roadways and EDC staff could inspect the lines from vehicles.

The PUC needs to respond to these concerns and explain in detail the need for each requirement. What is the basis for setting statewide minimum timeframes that apply to all EDCs? As an alternative, the PUC should consider allowing EDCs to develop their own I/M programs and schedules that match the conditions and demands of the regions in which they operate.
