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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Amendments to Rules of Organization and Procedure of The Disciplinary Board of The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania

Order No. 70

In this Order, the Disciplinary Board (Board) of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania is amending its Rules of Organization and Procedure to update the addresses of Chief Disciplinary Counsel, the Board's District III Office, and the Office of the Secretary. The Board is also taking this opportunity to update the other District Office addresses with the addition of the zip + 4 extensions for those locations.

The Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania finds that:

- (1) To the extent that 42 Pa.C.S. § 1702 (relating to rule making procedures) and Article II of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law, would otherwise require notice of proposed rulemaking with respect to the amendments adopted hereby, those proposed rulemaking procedures are inapplicable because the amendments adopted hereby relate to agency procedure and are perfunctory in nature.
- (2) The amendments to the Rules of Organization and Procedure of the Board adopted hereby are not inconsistent with the Pennsylvania Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement and are necessary and appropriate for the administration of the affairs of the Board.

The Board, acting pursuant to Pa.R.D.E. 205(c)(10), orders:

- (1) Title 204 of the *Pennsylvania Code* is hereby amended as set forth in Annex A hereto.
- (2) The Secretary of the Board shall duly certify this Order, and deposit the same with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts as required by Pa.R.J.A. 103(c).
- (3) The amendments adopted hereby shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
 - (4) This Order shall take effect immediately.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

MONTGOMERY COUNTY
Offender Supervision Fee; No. AD 302-09

Administrative Order

And Now, this 23rd day of October, 2009, pursuant to 18 P.S. § 11.1102, the Court hereby increases the Offender Supervision Fee from thirty-five (\$35) dollars per month to forty (\$40) dollars per month, assessed against all offenders placed on probation, parole, accelerated rehabilitative disposition, probation without verdict or intermediate punishment. Said increase is to be effective January 1, 2010, for those offenders sentenced on or after January 1, 2010. Offenders sentenced prior to the effective date of this increase and after January 1, 2009 will continue to be assessed a thirty-five (\$35) dollar per month Offender Supervision Fee. Offenders sentenced prior to January 1, 2009 will continue to be assessed a thirty (\$30) dollar per month Offender Supervision Fee.

The above fee is being charged in accordance with the Guidelines attached hereto.

Guidelines for the Collection of Offender Supervision Fees

- 1. All offenders placed on probation, parole, intermediate punishment, ARD or Section 17 Probation without verdict shall be assessed \$40 for every month on probation, parole or intermediate punishment (I.P.) as a condition to be paid on a monthly basis, unless otherwise ordered. The \$35 fee will be assessed against the offenders sentenced on or after January 1, 2010. Offenders sentenced between January 1, 2009, and January 1, 2010, will continue to be assessed a \$35 per month offender supervision fee, pursuant to the Court's prior directive. Those offenders sentenced prior to January 1, 2009, will continue to be assessed at \$30 per month.
- 2. At time of sentencing, current legal residence shall be established and made part of the sentence sheet and/or record.
- 3. The Clerk of Courts shall establish a supervision fee collection account for all Montgomery County residents pursuant to 18 P. S. § 11.1102.
- 4. Out-of-county/state residents will be required to submit fines, costs and/or restitution payments to the Clerk of Courts on a monthly basis. Supervision fees shall be collected by the county/state of supervision.

5. When an offender is transferred into Montgomery County from another jurisdiction for supervision purposes, or has been an out-of-county case and moves into the county, supervision fees shall be established from the date the case is accepted for supervision.

- 6. Any cases placed under the supervision of the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole shall pay the supervision fee to the Board in accordance with the Act. Any fines, costs or restitution ordered shall be paid through the Clerk of Courts.
- 7. Where an offender has multiple cases, supervision fees shall be assessed on each offender only once. The fee shall be assessed on the case with the longest period of supervision or the case which extends furthest into the future.
- 8. Any offender who enters inpatient drug, alcohol, medical or psychiatric treatment shall have their fees deferred until their release.
- 9. Any offenders committed to prison for probation, parole or I.P. violation shall have their supervision fees accrue until such time as the Court revokes said probation or parole. Upon reparole, supervision fees shall be re-computed and collected by the appropriate department.
- 10. Petitions of Hardship (inability to pay) shall be considered by the Chief Adult Probation Officer or his designee upon the offender's submission of supporting documentation and compliance with 18 P.S. § 11.1102(e)(2). Any recommendation of fee reduction or waiver shall be submitted to the Court for approval.
- 11. Failure to pay supervision fees as a condition of probation and/or parole, intermediate punishment, ARD or Section 17 probation without verdict shall be considered a technical violation of the conditions of sentence/order and may result in the revocation of said sentence/order.

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

STATE BOARD OF ACCOUNTANCY
[49 PA. CODE CH. 11]
Biennial Renewal Fees

The State Board of Accountancy (Board) amends § 11.4 (relating to fees) to read as set forth at 39 Pa.B. 2208 (May 2, 2009).

Description of Rulemaking

Effective with the biennial renewal period that begins January 1, 2010, the final-form rulemaking raises the biennial renewal fee for certified public accountants, public accountants and public accounting firms from \$45 to \$100 and the biennial renewal fee for continuing education program sponsors from \$120 to \$150. The final-form rulemaking also makes an editorial change by deleting a now-unnecessary reference to the date that the current biennial renewal fee for program sponsors took effect.

Background and Need for Rulemaking

Section 6 of the CPA Law (63 P. S. § 9.6) provides that the Board's biennial revenues from fees, fines and civil penalties shall meet or exceed the Board's biennial expenditures. Because fines and civil penalties have historically accounted for a small percentage of the Board's total revenues, the Board must generate most of its revenues from fees.

The Board's principal sources of fee revenues are the fees charged to certified public accountants, public accountants and public accounting firms for biennial renewal of their licenses and to continuing education program sponsors for biennial renewal of their approvals. The Board's biennial renewal fees currently account for approximately 84% of the Board's fee revenues during each biennial renewal period.

The biennial renewal fee for the approximately 23,128 active certified public accountants, public accountants and public accounting firms was last raised in June 1990, going from \$30 to \$45. The biennial renewal fee for the approximately 746 active continuing education program sponsors was established in January 2001 and was first assessed for the biennial renewal period that began January 1, 2004.

According to an analysis prepared by the Department of State's Bureau of Finance and Operations (BFO), the Board's current biennial renewal fee structure is inadequate to meet the Board's revenue needs. Based on projections made by BFO in January 2008, unless the biennial renewal fees are increased, the Board will face a growing, cumulative deficit that will measure \$579,063 as of June 30, 2010, \$1,577,063 as of June 30, 2011, and \$1,635,063 as of June 30, 2012.

Using fiscal information provided by BFO, the Board determined in 2008 that it would need to increase its biennial renewal fee for certified public accountants, public accountants and public accounting firms by approximately 125% to have sufficient biennial revenues to

offset its biennial expenditures over the next 9 years. The Board opted to raise the biennial renewal fee by 122%—from \$45 to \$100—effective with the biennial renewal period that begins January 1, 2010. The revenues from the higher biennial renewal fee should defer the need for a further fee increase until the biennial renewal period that begins January 1, 2018.

The Board also opted to raise the biennial renewal fee for continuing education program sponsors by 25%—from \$120 to \$150—effective with the biennial renewal period that begins January 1, 2010. When establishing program sponsor fees in 2001 as part of a restructuring of its regulatory scheme for approving program sponsors, the Board estimated that there would be approximately 1,150 active Board-approved program sponsors as of the start of the first biennial renewal period on January 1, 2004. The Board's estimate proved too optimistic; at present there are 35% fewer active Board-approved program sponsors than originally estimated. The 25% increase in the biennial renewal fee for program sponsors will recapture a portion of the revenues that had been projected when the fee was initially established.

According to BFO, the higher biennial renewal fees will raise biennial renewal revenues from the current \$1,130,280 to \$2,424,700. BFO estimates that these additional biennial revenues will enable the Board to maintain positive biennial revenue balances through the end of Fiscal Year 2015-2016, when the revenue balance is projected to be \$512,937.

Summary of Comments and Responses to Proposed Rulemaking

The Board published a notice of proposed rulemaking at 39 Pa.B. 2208, with a 30-day public comment period. The Board received comments from the Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants (PICPA).

The Board received comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (House Committee) and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) as part of their review of the proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. §§ 745.1—745.12). IRRC's comments asked the Board to consider the comments from the House Committee and the PICPA but did not identify any additional issues for the Board to consider. The Board did not receive comments from the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (Senate Committee) as part of its review of the proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act.

Noting the large percentage increases in the biennial renewal fees being promulgated by the Board, the House Committee asked the Board to explain why more than 18 years have elapsed since the Board last sought a biennial renewal fee increase for individual practitioners and firms.

Under section 6 of the CPA Law, the Board is required to increase fees if its expenses exceed its revenues on a biennial basis. Over the past 18 years, the Board's expenses have not exceeded its revenues over each fiscal biennium. During this period, the Board did not consider it necessary to increase biennial renewal fees solely for the purpose of creating a larger revenue cushion. In January 2007, BFO advised the Board that its biennial expenses would soon exceed its biennial revenues and recommended that the Board increase its biennial

renewal fees effective with the biennial renewal period beginning January 1, 2008. The Board attempted to promulgate the renewal fee increases for that renewal period but later discontinued the effort after it became apparent that proposed and final rulemaking could not be completed before January 1, 2008.

It is the Board's understanding that the Commissioner of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) and BFO are committed to a new fiscal approach, endorsed by the House Committee, of encouraging BPOA licensing boards to avoid potential biennial revenue deficits by adopting smaller biennial renewal fee increases at more frequent intervals rather than adopting larger biennial renewal fee increases at less frequent intervals. The Board anticipates that, as part of this approach, BFO will begin providing it with fiscal options that include a graduated schedule of biennial renewal fee increases.

The House Committee asked the Board to explain why it did not propose increases in other fee categories instead of relying solely on large increases in its biennial renewal fees. In addition to biennial renewal fees, the Board's schedule of fees in § 11.4 includes fees for initial certification and licensure of a certified public accountant (\$65); initial licensure of a public accounting firm (\$45); initial approval of a continuing education program sponsor (\$145); issuance of a temporary practice permit (\$25); reinstatement of an inactive or expired license (\$35); certification of examination scores (\$25); and verification of certification, registration or licensure status (\$15). All of these nonbiennial renewal fees were either revised or initially established in December 2000 and January 2001.

Nonbiennial renewal fees serve a different fiscal purpose than biennial renewal fees. Nonbiennial renewal fees are intended to cover the actual cost of providing particular services (that is, average number of minutes to perform service multiplied by pay rate of staff member performing service) plus a small share of administrative overhead. In contrast, biennial renewal fees are intended to defray, in addition to the minimal actual cost of processing biennial renewal applications, those general operating expenses of the Board that are not susceptible to being apportioned to individual users. BFO has not advised the Board that any of its nonbiennial renewal fees is currently inadequate to defray the cost of the service provided.

The PICPA asked the Board to provide more detail about the nature of the expenditures that justify the imposition of substantially higher biennial renewal fees and to identify the programs and Board functions to which the additional fee revenues will be applied. The PICPA also commented that the Board should have realized significant cost savings as a result of its recent transition to electronic biennial renewals and electronic newsletters. The House Committee asked the Board to provide information about the Board's "major cost centers" where significant increases in expenditures have occurred.

The biennial renewal fees defray the Board's generalized costs, which comprise the following categories: Board Administration (that is, time sheet-based staff expenses relating to the Board's administrative staff and direct Board expenses such as printing and mailing costs); BPOA Commissioner's Office (that is, time sheet-based staff expenses relating to staff in the Commissioner's Office and Revenue Office); Departmental Services (that is, time sheet-based charges for support of offices within the Department of State, including Offices of the Secretary of the Commonwealth and the Deputy Secretaries,

Office of Policy, Office of Chief Counsel, Office of Legislative Affairs, Office of Communications and Press, Office of Human Resources, Bureau of Management Information Services, and BFO; Legal Office (that is, time sheetbased staff expenses relating to Board counsel, Board prosecutors and legal support staff); Hearing Expense (that is, time sheet-based staff expenses relating to hearing examiners and support staff and direct charges for court reporting services); Legislative and Regulatory Analysis (that is, time sheet-based staff expenses relating to legal review of policy and regulatory matters); Enforcement and Investigation (that is, time sheet-based staff expenses for investigative, paralegal and support staff in the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation and the Professional Compliance Office); and Board Member Expenses (that is, Board member per diem, travel expenses, conference fees and membership dues in National professional organizations). During the 1987-1989 fiscal biennium, the Board's generalized costs totaled \$689,871; during the 2005-2007 fiscal biennium, the Board's generalized costs had risen to \$1,712,367.

The cost centers for Board Administration, Enforcement and Investigation, and Legal Office account for over 80% of the Board's generalized costs. During the 1987-1989 fiscal biennium, which presaged the last increase in the biennial renewal fee for individual practitioners and firms, the Board's costs related to Board Administration, Enforcement and Investigation, and Legal Office were \$219,822, \$56,540 and \$100,149, respectively, during the 2005-2007 fiscal biennium, those costs were \$518,226, \$474,170 and \$439,342, respectively.

The greatly expanded scope of the Board's operations over the past 2 decades is reflected in areas such as the numbers of complaints processed and disciplinary sanctions imposed. During the 1987-1989 fiscal biennium, 145 complaint files were opened and 28 disciplinary sanctions were imposed. During the 2005-2007 fiscal biennium, 509 complaint files were opened and 141 disciplinary sanctions were imposed. Over an 8-year period ending June 30, 2008, a total of 2,719 complaint files were opened, 2,823 complaint files were closed, and 1,278 disciplinary sanctions were imposed.

The Board's recent transition to electronic biennial renewals and electronic newsletters is more of a benefit to licensees than a significant cost savings to the Board. The cost savings realized from no longer having to manually process most biennial renewal applications is offset in part by the charges the Department of State pays to credit card companies that allow biennial renewal fees to be paid online. As for the electronic newsletter, the annual savings in printing and mailing costs over a paper newsletter is expected to be approximately \$13,100, which currently represents only slightly more than 1% of the Board's annual expenditures.

The House Committee asked the Board to explain how it expects to maintain its projected revenue stream from the higher biennial renewal fees over the next several biennial renewal periods given the declining population of active public accountants.

The number of active public accountants has declined since 1985, when the Board's authority to credential new public accountants under the CPA Law (63 P. S. §§ 9.1—9.16b) was eliminated. The current number of active public accountants is approximately 264. As reflected in the chart as follows, owing to their small population, public accountants are expected to contribute only \$14,520, or 1.12%, of the \$1,294,420 in additional revenues that will be realized biennially from the higher

biennial renewal fees. Any lost fee revenues caused by the retirement of the remaining active public accountants in the coming biennial renewal periods will be offset by expected modest net increases in the ranks of active certified public accountants and public accounting firms.

$Fiscal\ Impact$

The final-form rulemaking will generate approximately \$1,294,420 in additional biennial renewal revenues, broken down as follows:

Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking will require the Board to change its biennial renewal forms to reflect the new fees. The final-form rulemaking will not create additional paperwork for the regulated community.

Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The new biennial renewal fees will apply to those that renew their licenses or approvals for the biennial renewal period that begins January 1, 2010.

Statutory Authority

Section 6 of the CPA Law requires the Board to establish fees by regulation and to ensure that revenues derived from fees, fines and civil penalties are adequate to cover the Board's expenditures over a biennial period.

The Board considers the final-form rulemaking to be both required by law and the least restrictive means of covering the cost of activities that the Board is required to perform.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on April 22, 2009, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 39 Pa.B. 2208, to IRRC and the House and Senate Committees for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board provided IRRC and the House and Senate Committees with copies of comments received during the public comment period. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Board has considered all comments received from IRRC, the House and Senate Committees, and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(j.2)), the final-form rulemaking was approved by the House Committee on October 7, 2009, and deemed approved by the Senate Committee on October 21, 2009. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on October 22, 2009, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

- (a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 11, are amended by amending § 11.4 to read as set forth at 39 Pa.B. 2208.
- (b) The Board shall submit this order and 39 Pa.B. 2208 to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall certify this order and 39 Pa.B. 2208 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) The final-form rulemaking shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

[58 PA. CODE CH. 141] Hunting and Trapping

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed the following rulemaking at its October 6, 2009, meeting:

Amend § 141.22 (relating to small game) to restructure the regulatory provisions relating to small game hunting to promote consistency and clarity in the regulations and also permit the full inclusion of crossbows during the various small game seasons to expand opportunity and increase participation in small game hunting within this Commonwealth.

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the October 6, 2009, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until January 15, 2010.

1. Purpose and Authority

In recent years, the Commission has been moving towards a comprehensive restructuring of the regulations attending the code. The goals of this restructuring effort are primarily focused on simplifying and making the language more understandable to its users. In January 2009, the Commission completed its efforts to rewrite the regulatory structures relating to the big game seasons. The Commission intends to carry the theme set forth in these changes to other chapters of the regulations to establish clear correlations between related seasonal information. To this end, the Commission is proposing to amend § 141.22 to restructure the regulatory provisions relating to small game hunting to promote consistency and clarity in the regulations and also permit the full inclusion of crossbows during the various small game seasons to expand opportunity and increase participation in small game hunting within this Commonwealth.

Section 2102(d) of the code (relating to regulations) authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations stipulating the size and type of traps, the type of firearms and ammunition and other devices which may be used, the manner in which and the location where the devices may be used, the species the devices may be used for and the season when the devices may be used." Section 2102(a) of the code provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The amendments to § 141.22 were proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend § 141.22 to restructure the regulatory provisions relating to small game hunting to promote consistency and clarity in the regulations and also permit the full inclusion of crossbows during the various small game seasons to expand opportunity and increase participation in small game hunting within this Commonwealth.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt small game within this Commonwealth may be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

5. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Annex A

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART III. GAME COMMISSION CHAPTER 141. HUNTING AND TRAPPING Subchapter B. SMALL GAME

§ 141.22. Small game.

- (a) [Unlawful acts. It is unlawful to:
- (1) Take small game, protected mammals or protected birds using shot larger than #4 lead, #4 Bismuth/tin or #2 steel.
 - (2) Possess a firearm while hunting with a raptor.
- (3) Use or possess single projectile ammunition or use or possess single projectile ammunition designed for use in a firearm while hunting small game during the muzzleloading firearms deer or bear season, except for a rimfire rifle or handgun .22 caliber or less. This exception does not apply to the Southeast Special Regulations Area. See § 141.1(b)(2) (relating to special regulations areas).
- (4) Hunt in a party of more than six persons. This does not apply to waterfowl or dove hunters when hunting from a blind or other stationary positions.
- (5) Unless otherwise provided in the act or this title, hunt or take small game with anything other than a shotgun with fine shot, muzzleloading rifle or handgun .40 caliber or less, rifle or handgun less than .23 caliber, or bow and arrow with or without broadheads. The caliber restrictions do not apply to rifles or handguns while hunting woodchuck.

- (6) Discharge a firearm within 150 yards of a Commission vehicle releasing pheasants.
- (b) *Definition*. For the purpose of enforcing section 2308(a)(4) of the act (relating to unlawful devices and methods), the term "plugged" means a magazine shotgun which is plugged with a one-piece filler, incapable of removal without disassembling the shotgun or magazine.
- (c) Permitted acts. Woodchucks may be trapped by properly licensed furtakers with permission of the person in charge of the land from February 1 through September 30 and during the general furbearer trapping season. For the purposes of this subsection, a person means a person as defined in section 2121(c) of the act (relating to definition). Traps and methods shall comply with section 2361 of the act (relating to unlawful acts concerning taking of furbearers) except that traps shall be set within 5 feet of any woodchuck hole or den.

Permitted devices. It is lawful to hunt small game, except woodchucks with the following devices:

- (1) A manually operated rimfire rifle or handgun. The firearm must be .23 caliber or less, that projects single-projectile ammunition.
- (2) A manually operated or semiautomatic centerfire or muzzleloading shotgun. The firearm must be 10 gauge or less, that projects multiple-projectile shotgun ammunition #4 lead, #4 Bismuth/tin or #2 steel or less.
- (3) A muzzleloading rifle or handgun. The firearm must be .40 caliber or less, that projects single-projectile ammunition.
 - (4) A bow and arrow.
 - (5) A crossbow and bolt.
- (6) A raptor. The raptor must be lawfully possessed under a falconry permit. See §§ 147.101—147.112a (relating to falconry).
 - (b) Prohibitions. It is unlawful to:
- (1) Use or possess single-projectile centerfire ammunition, single-projectile rimfire ammunition larger than .23 caliber or multiple-projectile shotgun ammunition larger than #4 lead, #4 Bismuth/tin or #2 steel, except as authorized under section 2525 of the act (relating to possession of firearm for protection of self or others).
- (2) Possess a firearm while hunting with a raptor, except as authorized under section 2525 of the act.
- (3) Discharge a firearm within 150 yards of a Commission vehicle releasing pheasants.
- (4) Use or possess a device not provided for in the act or in this section.
- (5) Hunt in a party of more than six persons. This does not apply to waterfowl or dove hunters when hunting from a blind or other stationary position.
 - (c) Woodchucks (Groundhogs).
- (1) Permitted devices. It is lawful to hunt woodchucks with the following devices:
- (i) A manually operated centerfire or rimfire rifle or handgun.
- (ii) A manually operated, centerfire or muzzle-loading shotgun.

- (iii) A muzzleloading rifle or handgun.
- (iv) A bow and arrow.
- (v) A crossbow and bolt.
- (2) *Prohibitions*. While hunting woodchucks, it is unlawful to use or possess a device or ammunition not provided for in this section.

[58 PA. CODE CH. 147] Special Permits

Amend §§ 147.902 and 147.904 (relating to definitions; and permit) to specifically authorize properly permitted individuals to engage in commercial coyote guiding activities on State game lands (SGLs).

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the October 6, 2009, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until January 15, 2010.

1. Purpose and Authority

In July 2009, the Commission added Subchapter Y to Chapter 147 to relocate, consolidate and more clearly define the permitting process for persons interested in guiding other hunters or trappers for certain designated species. The Commission has recently been approached by a number of houndsmen who have formally requested the expansion of this newly created subchapter to authorize commercial coyote guiding activities on SGLs. To this end, the Commission is proposing to amend §§ 147.902 and 147.904 to specifically authorize properly permitted individuals to engage in commercial coyote guiding activities on SGLs.

Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides "the commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." The amendments to §§ 147.902 and 147.904 were proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend §§ 147.902 and 147.904 to specifically authorize properly permitted individuals to engage in commercial coyote guiding activities on SGLs.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to engage in commercial coyote guiding activities on SGLs will be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

5. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART III. GAME COMMISSION CHAPTER 147. SPECIAL PERMITS Subchapter Y. GUIDING PERMIT

§ 147.902. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Commercial guiding activity—Any guiding activity provided by any person to another person for any fee, remuneration or other economic gain, including bartered goods or services.

* * * * *

Guiding activity—

- (i) The act of assisting or conspiring to assist another person in any manner to hunt, trap or otherwise take certain designated species of wildlife by locating, calling or directing another person to the quarry.
- (ii) The term is not intended to include or authorize the assistance taking the form of any overt act directly connected with harvesting wildlife by discharging a firearm, bow or crossbow or setting or resetting a trap or cable restraints.

§ 147.904. Permit.

(a) General rule. A guiding permit issued under this subchapter is required for any person to engage in any commercial or noncommercial guiding [activities] activity for the following designated species of wildlife: elk and bobcat. A guiding permit is required for any person to engage in any commercial guiding activity for coyotes on State game lands.

[58 PA. CODE CH. 137] Wildlife

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the October 6, 2009, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until January 15, 2010.

1. Purpose and Authority

Currently, § 137.1 prohibits the importation of certain species of exotic and native wildlife determined to be dangerous or injurious to the public, native wildlife or native wildlife habitat, such as nutria, bears and primates. This prohibition applies to all persons including those currently possessing exotic wildlife dealer, exotic wildlife possession and menagerie permits. The Commission has recently been approached by a number of menagerie permit holders who have alleged that these importation restrictions unnecessarily restrict their ability to import and possess certain "popular" wildlife and thus limit their ability to gain a livelihood. These menagerie permit holders have formally requested relief from these importation and possession restrictions. To this end, the Commission is proposing to amend § 137.1 to exempt menagerie permit holders who possess a USDA Class C Exhibitor permit and who operate their menagerie facilities as their primary means of gaining a livelihood from possession and importation prohibitions of this section.

Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides "the commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." The amendments to § 137.1 were proposed pursuant to this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will amend § 137.1 to exempt menagerie permit holders who possess a USDA Class C Exhibitor permit and who operate their menagerie facilities as their primary means of gaining a livelihood from possession and importation prohibitions of this section.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to import or possess otherwise prohibited wildlife into this Commonwealth may be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of December 2009

The Department of Banking (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of December, 2009, is 6 1/4%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 3.78 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 6.28 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 6 1/4%.

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area,

the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

Nutrient and Sediment Reduction Credit Trading Program

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) provides notice of the following actions regarding the Nutrient and Sediment Reduction Credit Trading Program (Trading Program). These actions were taken in relation to the Final Trading of Nutrient and Sediment Reduction Credits—Policy and Guidelines (Policy) (DEP ID No. 392-0900-001) (see 36 Pa.B. 7999 (December 30, 2006)). The Policy called for a transparent system of credit reviews and approvals.

Trading is a market-based program that provides incentives for entities to create nutrient reduction credits by going beyond statutory, regulatory or voluntary obligations and goals by removing nutrients from a watershed. The credits can be traded to help others more cost-effectively meet their obligations or goals. The primary purpose of the Trading Program is to provide for more efficient ways for NPDES permittees to meet their effluent limits for nutrients and sediment. Currently, the focus of the program is on the Chesapeake Bay Watershed.

The actions described in this notice relate to: (1) submitted proposals; (2) approved proposals; and (3) registered credits through November 3, 2009.

Background

Before a credit can be used by an NPDES permittee, a three-step process is followed: (1) the credit or offset proposal must be approved; (2) it must be verified; and (3) it must be registered.

Approval is also known as certification, which is a written approval by the Department for the use of proposed or implemented activities to generate credits (in some cases the person generating the credits is not permitted to transfer them to another person, in which case they are called "offsets"). Certifications are based on at least: (1) a credit or offset proposal to be submitted

describing the qualifying activities that will reduce the nutrient loadings delivered to the applicable watershed; (2) the calculation to quantify the pounds of reductions expected; and (3) a verification plan that, when implemented, ensures that the qualifying nutrient reduction activities have taken place. All of the proposals, certifications and registrations described in this Notice apply to the Chesapeake Bay Watershed.

Once the credits or offsets are certified, they must be verified. Verification means implementation of the verification plan contained in a certified credit or offset proposal as required by the Department. Verification plans require annual submittal of documentation to the Department that demonstrates that the qualifying nutrient reduction activities have taken place for the applicable compliance year.

The credits or offsets also need to be registered by the Department before they can be used in an NPDES permit. Registration occurs only after credits or offsets have been certified and verified, and a trading contract for credits has been submitted to the Department. For the Chesapeake Bay Watershed, the Department will register credits on an annual basis for use during the compliance year in which the qualifying nutrient reduction activities have taken place and will provide such credits with an annual registry number for reporting and tracking purposes.

The Department has received 78 proposals that have been submitted for review to generate nutrient reduction credits in the Chesapeake Bay Watershed. Of those, 55 have been approved, one has been withdrawn and the remaining need additional clarification prior to certification.

The Department of Public Welfare (Department) maintains an ongoing list of qualified behavioral health managed care organizations (BH-MCOs) as potential contractors for the HealthChoices Behavioral Health Program (HCBHP), a mandatory managed care program for Medicaid recipients in this Commonwealth. New submissions are currently being requested from managed care organizations (MCOs) which are not currently on the list. The development of this list was introduced at 31 Pa.B. 888 (February 10, 2001) as the first step in a two-step process for obtaining a behavioral health contractor, should the need arise.

The list of qualified BH-MCOs would be utilized in the following circumstances:

- A potential contractor selected through the RFP process fails the Readiness Review.
- An existing contractor terminates the contract or is terminated by the Department.

As stated at 31 Pa.B. 888, the qualified BH-MCO list will be opened periodically to new submissions. MCOs selected for the list of qualified bidders will remain active on the list for at least 5 years. Qualified MCOs will be periodically required to resubmit information for consideration to remain on the list.

- Experience with a State Behavioral Health Medicaid Program.
- Not currently under suspension or debarment by the Commonwealth or any other state or Federal Government.

- 5. Provide a copy of current licenses from both the Departments of Health and Insurance of this Commonwealth.

Bureau of Aviation; Availability of Local Real Estate Tax Reimbursement Grants for Taxes paid in 2009

The Department of Transportation (Department), Bureau of Aviation, is accepting applications for Tax Reimbursement Grants from qualifying owners of public airports who have paid local real estate taxes for the calendar year ending December 31, 2009.

Each year, under Subchapter B of the Aviation Code (74 Pa.C.S. §§ 6121, 6122, 6123 and 6124) and 67 Pa. Code Chapter 477, the owner of a public airport shall be eligible for a grant from the local real estate tax reimbursement portion of the Aviation Restricted Account. These grants are available to reimburse airport owners for local real estate taxes paid on those portions of an airport which are aviation related areas, as defined in Section 5102 of the Aviation Code (74 Pa.C.S. § 5102). Prior to applying for a grant, each public airport owner shall enter into an agreement with the Department. This agreement shall specify that the owner shall continue, for a period of not less than 10 years, to maintain the property, for which the grant will be sought, as an airport at least equal in size and capacity as indicated in the owner's initial grant application. This agreement shall be a covenant, which runs with the land and shall apply to any subsequent purchases of land. Upon acceptance of any grant, the covenant shall be deemed extended for one additional year. Any violation of the agreement shall make the owner liable for the repayment of the total appropriation for the year plus a penalty of two times the grant. In any action wherein the owner is found to have violated the agreement, the Department shall receive all costs of prosecution.

The final date for submission of applications for reimbursement of local real estate taxes paid in the calendar year ending December 31, 2009, is the close of business on February 2, 2010. Applications shall be filed with the Department of Transportation, Bureau of Aviation using dotGrants, the Department's new web based grants administration program. > State Board of Funeral Directors— Preneed Funeral Arrangements; Regulation No. 16A-4815 (#2627)

On August 15, 2007, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the State Board of Funeral Directors (Board). This rulemaking amends 49 Pa. Code by amending §§ 13.1 and 13.224—13.226, and adding §§ 13.227—13.229. The proposed regulation was published in the August 25, 2007 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on September 21, 2009.

This regulation represents a significant revision of existing provisions governing "preneed" arrangements. It creates new recordkeeping and notice requirements for funeral entities involved in preneed arrangements. Major components of this regulation are the Board's response to the Commonwealth Court decision in Bean v. Department of State, State Board of Funeral Directors, 855 A.2d 148 (2004) (Bean). In this case, the court held that the Board had improperly determined that the Funeral Director Law (Law) and the Board's existing regulations allowed customers to rescind irrevocable preneed contracts and transfer the preneed funds to a different funeral business. Through this regulation, the Board seeks to codify its policy that preneed contracts should always allow the customer to transfer the preneed funds or account from one funeral business to a different one.

In determining whether a regulation is in the public interest, the Commission is directed by the Regulatory Review Act (Act) to consider criteria set forth in eight separate categories. See 71 P. S. § 745.5b. Based on these criteria, there are several concerns and objections to this regulation that are the reasons for our unanimous vote to disapprove this regulation.

Consistency or possible conflict with the statute (71 P. S. \$745.5b(b)(3)(ii))

In our comments on the proposed version of this regulation dated October 24, 2007, we questioned the consistency of this regulation with Section 13(c) of the Law (63 P. S. § 479.13(c)) which states:

... If any such licensed funeral entity shall accept any money for such contracts, he shall, forthwith, either deposit the same in an escrow account in, or transfer the same in trust to, a banking institution in this Commonwealth, conditioned upon its withdrawal or disbursement only for the purposes for which such money was accepted... (Emphasis added.)

The Board responded with the following statements on page six of the Preamble:

...IRRC also questioned whether this provision is consistent with section 13(c) of the act that requires a funeral director to condition acceptance of preneed funds upon "withdrawal or disbursement only for the purpose for which such money was accepted." Because the regulation authorizes only the transfer of the funds to another funeral director, those funds will be withdrawn or disbursed only for the provision of funeral services and incidental goods, i.e., the purposes for which the money was initially accepted.

We find that these statements are inconsistent with the language in the regulation. These purposes were set forth in the original preneed contract but nothing in the regulation places any restraints on subsequent contracts. Therefore, it remains unclear how the final-form regulation is consistent with the Law since none of its provisions guarantee that the money will be used for the purposes for which it was accepted.

The Court in the *Bean* case noted that the Board's position that a customer may revoke a contract with a funeral business at any time and have preneed funds transferred to another funeral business was based on the Board's interpretation of Section 13(c) of the Law. The Court further observed: "The only section in the Funeral Director Law pertaining to pre-need agreements is *Section 13(c)* which does not address whether irrevocable pre-need agreements may be rescinded." See 855 A.2d at 154. Therefore, the origin of the Board's position remains unclear.

The Board needs to provide a detailed explanation of its interpretation of the statute and how the Law calls for revocability or transferability in contracts but simultaneously maintains and preserves the funds as irrevocable.

Need for the regulation (71 P. S. § 745.5b(b)(3)(iii))

Our comments on the proposed rulemaking noted that the Board has the statutory authority under Section 16(a) of the Law (63 P.S. § 479.16(a)) to "formulate necessary rules and regulations" that are "deemed necessary . . . to safeguard the interests of the public and the standards of the profession." We stated that "the Board should explain the need for this regulation, and how it will protect consumers."

The Board did not respond to this comment in the Preamble submitted with the final-form regulation. At our public meeting on October 22, 2009, the Board's counsels stated that they are aware of only a handful of consumers per year who express interest in transferring or revoking their preneed contracts. The Board has not provided any documentation or evidence of any significant harm that would be addressed by this final-form regulation. Since the Board is unable to document the need for this regulation or how it protects consumers by addressing a significant harm or problem, we determine that this regulation is not in the public interest under Section 5.2(b)(3)(iii) of the Act.

Compliance with the provisions of the Act or the regulations of the Commission (71 P. S. § 745.5b(b)(6))

Section 5.1(a) of the Act (71 P.S § 745.5a(a)) requires agencies to respond to the comments received on their proposed regulations. We raised numerous concerns regarding the proposed version of this regulation in our comments dated October 24, 2007. We identified critical questions and problems regarding the transfer clause in Section 13.228 as well as other provisions. Our comments

were based on criteria relating to fiscal impact, reasonableness, feasibility, need, implementation procedure, clarity and consistency with the statute. See 71 P. S. \S 745.5b(b)(1) and (3). The documents submitted by the Board with this final-form regulation on September 21, 2009, did not contain responses to many of the comments submitted by commentators including this Commission. The lack of substantive responses to comments filed on the proposed version of this regulation represents a failure to comply with the requirements of the Act and is a basis for disapproving the regulation pursuant to Section 5.2(b)(6) of the Act. We find that the Preamble to the final-form regulation did not address all the comments issued by commentators including this Commission.

Fiscal impact, protection of the public health, safety and welfare, reasonableness, feasibility (71 P. S. §§ 745.5b (b)(1), (2) and (3))

Our comments on the regulation questioned how preneed funds would be protected from classification as an asset for the purposes of eligibility for Social Security or Medical Assistance programs. This issue was raised both in written comments and at our public meeting by the Disability Rights Network (DRN) and the Pennsylvania Association of Resources for Autism and Intellectual Disabilities (PAR). Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) Commissioner Basil L. Merenda submitted a letter, dated on October 19, 2009, to the Commission responding to these concerns.

The BPOA letter quoted the Office of Chief Counsel of the Department of Public Welfare (DPW) as indicating that "there is no requirement that an individual be contractually bound to one funeral establishment" and noting that individuals could "establish an irrevocable burial reserve with a bank or other financial institution." The Board's counsel at our public meeting reiterated this response by stating that a customer could go with an attorney to a local bank and set up an irrevocable burial trust.

At our public meeting, representatives of DRN and PAR reported that persons with disabilities, who depend upon public assistance, often are not able to hire attorneys and negotiate with financial institutions to set up their own irrevocable reserves, accounts or trusts. Currently, they rely on preneed contracts with funeral directors to provide "irrevocable" funding sources. If they enter into a preneed contract under this regulation, it could negatively affect their eligibility for public assistance. Therefore, this regulation may pose a threat to both access and continuity of care that maintains public health, safety and welfare, and it could cause financial hardships for this population.

Furthermore, this regulation and Law (63 P. S. § 479.13(c)) only address situations where a funeral director or entity accepts money from a customer. It is the seller who deposits or transfers the money not the customer. Nothing in this regulation or the Law discusses consumers establishing their own "irrevocable" burial reserves or trusts. In fact, the term "irrevocable" is never used in the regulation. Therefore, we find that the regulation is not clear or reasonable in that it neither addresses nor ensures that the funds can be classified as irrevocable for purposes of Social Security or Medical Assistance programs.

Transfer of funds and new contracts—Clarity and lack of ambiguity, implementation procedure (71 P. S. §§ 745.5b(b)(3)(ii) and (iv))

Our comments identified the following issues relating to transfer of funds:

The provisions of this section [§ 13.228] are very clear that the current funeral entity must transfer all the preneed funds, interest and earnings to the new funeral entity as requested by the customer. However, there is nothing that directs the actions of the new entity or what it may do with the funds. Nothing in the proposed regulation requires that the new funeral entity honor the terms and conditions of the original contract or that it use all the preneed funds, interest and earnings for funeral services. For example, what would prevent the new funeral entity from giving a portion of the funds to the customer and reducing the list of services? The Board should clarify how the new funeral entity must treat the original contract and the funds.

Section 13.228 remains unchanged from the proposed version. Nothing in the regulation would prevent a new funeral director from agreeing via a new contract to provide a lower price with a partial refund to the customer. There may be a contention that will not happen since another provision in this regulation (Section 13.224(a)) requires funeral directors to deposit in escrow or transfer in trust to a banking institution all preneed funds including accumulated interest or earnings. However, it is unclear how this provision would prevent a refund at a later date. If the intent was to require that all the transferred money be used strictly for goods and services, it is not reflected in the language of the regulation and there is no indication of how it would be enforced.

The fact that this regulation limits consumers to revocable contracts can cause other problems. If a customer with a preneed contract becomes incapacitated before death and power of attorney (POA) is given to a relative or other person. Nothing in this regulation would prevent the person with POA from negotiating a new preneed contract with a new funeral business for the incapacitated customer regardless of the customer's preferences and original intent.

Another problem found relates to the fact that the Court in *Bean* documented that a preneed contract form, approved by the Board, contained a clause that allowed the customer to cancel the contract within three business days of signing. Such a clause in subsequent contracts would allow the customer to gain access to the preneed funds and this undermines the irrevocable status of the funds or any assurance that the preneed funds will be used only for the purposes for which the money was initially accepted.

The Board responded to our comments with the following statements in the Preamble:

... Because § 13.228 requires that the contract expressly allow the customer to transfer the **contract** and funds to another funeral entity, but does not require that the customer be permitted to rescind or cancel or revoke the agreement and have the funds returned to the customer, the funds will remain irrevocably placed with a funeral director for purposes of those programs.

... In this rulemaking, the Board does not intend to provide that any customer may **revoke**, **rescind or cancel a preneed agreement at will**. The Board intends only that a customer who has entered into a preneed contract must be able to transfer that preneed account to another funeral entity to perform the services and provide the funeral merchandise. (Emphasis added.)

We find there is no consistency between these statements and the regulation. Nothing in the regulation addresses the transfer of contracts. It would not stop a customer from revoking, rescinding or canceling the original contract, and negotiating a new one with the new funeral business receiving the transferred preneed funds. The Board needs to respond to these questions and concerns with revisions to the Preamble. In addition, the Board must clearly and consistently establish its intent in both the Preamble and regulation.

Contract options—Feasibility, reasonableness (71 P. S. \S 745.5b(b)(3))

On page five of our comments, we noted that "the *Bean* decision reported that Board-approved contract forms allowed customers to select an irrevocable or revocable contract." This system allowed customers to select either option. We concluded that "the Board should investigate a variety of options to allow for portability when needed while also guaranteeing irrevocability of the funds and terms in the contract." The Board did not respond to this comment in the preamble to the final-form regulation. At our public meeting, the Board's counsels suggested that providing different options would be confusing for customers. We disagree.

Revising the regulation to include both irrevocable and revocable contracts could address many of the objections to the final-form regulation. We note that if the Board amends the regulation to provide several contract options, it will need to ensure that other portions of the rule-making are consistent with the amended contract options.

Fiscal impact, adverse effects on prices of goods and services (71 P. S. § 745.5b(b)(1)(ii))

We share commentators' concerns that this final-form regulation, as currently written, will increase the costs of preneed contracts for both funeral directors and consumers. Both consumers and licensees have indicated that the costs are lower when the preneed contract is irrevocable because the funeral entity may place the funds in accounts for longer terms with the potential for greater return and increased earnings rather than being required to have the funds continually and readily available for transfer to another licensee as requested by the customer. In addition, representatives for DRN and PAR are concerned that funeral directors may discontinue offering preneed arrangements to people on public assistance since this regulation will increase the costs of engaging in the preneed business. The Board should fully examine and explain the fiscal impacts of all the provisions in this regulation on both funeral directors (or entities) and customers and explain why the imposed costs are necessary.

 $\label{lem:merchandise} \textit{Merchandise from other vendors-Clarity, reasonableness} \\ \textit{(71 P. S. \$ 745.5b(b)(3))}$

Section 13.227(c) provides: "A preneed funeral contract may not incorporate a contract for funeral merchandise entered into by a person or entity other than a funeral director." We understand that the Board believes this language is necessary to prevent its licensees from utilizing the different trusting provisions in the Future Interment Act. However, we are concerned that some licensees may use this subsection to tell customers that they cannot make provisions for the use of merchandise from other suppliers in their contracts. The regulation should include a clarification that nothing in the regulation prevents the funeral entity or director from including provisions for the use of merchandise from other vendors and suppliers that may not be necessarily tied to the funeral director or entity.

Policy decision requiring legislative review (71 P. S. § 745.5b(b)(4))

Given the extensive concerns and questions generated by this rulemaking and the interests expressed by four legislators, this regulation may represent a policy decision of such a substantial nature that it requires a legislative review. The Board should give strong consideration to withdrawing this regulation and proceeding to develop new legislation. We recommend the Board work with all licensees, affected parties and legislators on new legislation to provide competent regulation of preneed activities, keep costs reasonable, and safeguard the public.

There is another final-form regulation related to preneed activities (Regulation #16A-4816 (#2639)) that is currently scheduled for consideration by this Commission in the next few weeks. It may be advisable for the Board to consider the possibility of also withdrawing Regulation #16A-4816 (#2639) and/or consolidating it with this regulation, to address the First Amendment concerns raised in the case of *Walker v. Flitton*, 364 F.Supp.2d 503 (M.D. Pa. 2005), as well as the need for new legislation.

Therefore, based upon the information presented to us and after considering the criteria of the Regulatory Review Act discussed above, we find that promulgation of this regulation is not in the public interest.

By Order of the Commission:

The regulation #16A-4815 (IRRC #2627) from the State Board of Funeral Directors was disapproved on October 22, 2009.
