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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised. A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Cost-of-Living Factor under the Public Official Compensation Law

Under Section 4(d) of the Public Official Compensation Law (Act 72 of 2005), for the 12-month period beginning December 1, 2014 through November 30, 2015, the salary of the members of the General Assembly shall be increased by a cost-of-living factor which is determined by increasing the amount of the salary by the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland area, officially reported by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics for the period of November 1, 2013 through October 31, 2014.

The percentage increase and the new salary amount have been determined jointly by the Chief Clerk of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives as follows:

The CPI-U for the period November 1, 2013 through October 31, 2014 increased by 1.578%. Therefore, the salary for legislators for the period beginning December 1, 2014 through November 30, 2015 will be \$85,338.65.

Under section 4(d.1) of the Public Official Compensation Law (Act 72 of 2005), for the 12-month period beginning December 1, 2014 through November 30, 2015, the additional compensation of the officers and leaders of the General Assembly shall be increased by a cost-of-living factor which is determined by increasing the amount of the salary by the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland area, officially reported by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics for the period from November 1, 2013, through October 31, 2014.

The percentage change and the new compensation amounts have been determined jointly by the Chief Clerk of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives as follows:

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

HUNTINGDON COUNTY

Adoption of Local Rule Hunt.Co.R.C.P. 205; No. CP-31-MD-214-2014; AO No. 6-2014

Administrative Order of Court

And Now, this 7th day of November, 2014, Local Civil Rule of Court 205 is hereby Adopted and shall be referenced as Hunt.Co.R.C.P. 205. It is Ordered that in compliance with Pa.R.C.P. 239:

1. The Huntingdon County District Court Administrator shall file one certified copy of the Rule with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts;

2. The Huntingdon County District Court Administrator shall distribute two certified copies and a computer diskette containing the text of the Rule to the Legislative Reference for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

3. The Huntingdon County District Court Administrator shall file one certified copy of the Rule with the Civil Procedural Rules Committee.

4. The Huntingdon County Prothonotary shall ensure that the Rule is continuously available for public inspection in the office of Prothonotary.

5. This rule shall become effective not less than 30 days after the date of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Hunt.Co.R.C.P. 205. Civil Case Management.

1. The Huntingdon County Civil Case Management Plan.

(a) Cases Subject to the Plan.

The plan outlined in this rule will govern the progress of all civil cases from the initiation of the case until the termination of said case. Family Court cases are not covered by this plan.

(b) Case Tracks.

Utilizing the criteria set forth below, all civil cases shall be assigned to one of the following case tracks: Expedited, Standard or Complex. The case management rules that govern each track are as follows:

(i) Expedited Case Track.

A case will be assigned to the Expedited track, unless otherwise requested by counsel, if, by its nature, it appears it is a case that can be promptly tried. The following case types are examples: mortgage foreclosures; writ of replevin cases; and arbitration appeals. Except in extraordinary circumstances, the Court will schedule a trial of all Expedited cases within six (6) months after the initial Date of Service. The trial date shall be set by the Court at the first status conference. (ii) Standard Case Track.

All cases not designated Expedited or Complex will be assigned to the Standard case track. Except in extraordinary circumstances, the Court will schedule a trial of all Standard cases within twelve (12) months after the initial Date of Service. The trial date shall be set at the first status conference.

(iii) Complex Case Track.

A case will be assigned to the Complex track, unless otherwise requested by counsel, if it appears likely to require a disproportionate expenditure of court and litigant resources before and during trial by reason of the number of parties involved, the number of claims and defenses raised, the legal difficulty of the issue(s) presented, the factual difficulty of the subject matter or a combination of these or other factors. Except in extraordinary circumstances, the Court shall schedule a trial date for all Complex cases within twenty-four (24) months after the initial Date of Service. The trial date shall be set at the initial status conference.

(c) Initial Scheduling Order.

(i) The Plaintiff/Plaintiff's attorney shall complete and file an Initial Case Monitoring Notice and Order, attached hereto as Exhibit Hunt.Co.R.C.P. 205, within five (5) days after service of the complaint. A copy shall be served on the DCA.

 (ii) The case will be scheduled by the DCA for a status conference.

(d) Status and Pre-Trial Conferences.

(i) Status Conferences.

A Status Conference shall be scheduled in every case. The date on which the conference is scheduled will be dependent on the track the case is assigned. At a Status Conference, the Court will issue any Order that it deems necessary to address the following issues: status of the case; discovery; pre-trial motions; possible alternative dispute resolution; possible trial dates; any other relevant matters, and the date for a pre-trial Conference.

(ii) Pre-trial Conferences.

A pre-trial Conference shall be scheduled in every case. The purpose of the conference shall be to address the matters set forth in Pa.R.C.P. 212.3. The parties shall file not later than ten days before the conference a pre-trial statement in accord with Pa.R.C.P. 212.2. The order scheduling the conference shall indicate the parties who are to attend including an insurance or similar representative who has authority to negotiate and settle the case. At the conclusion of the conference the Court may enter an order that recites the action taken at conference, schedules a date for trial, or schedules a settlement conference in accord with Pa.R.C.P. 212.5.

- (e) Arbitration.
- (i) Referral of Cases.

If, after an initial review of the case, the case is identified as appropriate for compulsory arbitration, a panel of arbitrators shall be appointed.

THE COURTS

(ii) Arbitration Appeals.

The Court Administrator shall monitor all Arbitration appeals, and shall report to the President Judge all cases pending for more than six(6) months.

(f) Incarcerated Plaintiffs.

Complaints initiated by pro se Plaintiffs who are incarcerated in a state correctional institution shall be exempt from Hunt.Co.R.C.P. 205.

2. Inactive Cases.

Cases that are eligible for dismissal under Rule of Judicial Administration No. 1901 as well as cases that have come to the termination date of their case track, shall be reviewed by the President Judge. (a) The Prothonotary shall endorse all documents filed with the date of such filing, and shall enter into them into an appropriate document docket.

(b) The Prothonotary shall be responsible for the safe keeping of all records and papers belonging to the office. No paper may be taken from the files of the Prothonotary without the consent of the Prothonotary or one authorized by the Prothonotary to give such consent. A record shall be made of any paper removed from the Prothonotary's

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office and the person who receipts for such paper shall be responsible for return of the same and for any financial loss occasioned by failure to return the paper.

(c) Only the Prothonotary, her clerks, attorneys registered in Huntingdon County and such other persons as the Prothonotary shall specially authorize shall be permitted direct access to the Prothonotary's files.

(d) No entries shall be made in any Prothonotary's docket except at the direction of the Prothonotary or by order of the Court.

(e) All papers filed with the Prothonotary shall be designated numerically starting with the number one for each calendar year and with the appropriate alphabetical symbols to differentiate between the various proceedings filed.

(f) The Prothonotary shall not provide legal assistance or give legal advice.

(g) The Prothonotary shall only provide copies of documents to litigants and or attorneys for litigants as required by the respective Pennsylvania Rules of Court. Requested documents in addition to those required by rule will not be provided without a search and copying fee of \$25.00 to be paid prior to the reproduction of said documents. The Prothonotary shall have the discretion to require additional payment if the reproduction costs are extensive.

(h) The Prothonotary shall not forward any matter to the Sheriff for service of original process unless service copies are received for each named Defendant.

It Is Further Ordered that one (1) certified copy of this Order shall be filed by the Court Administrator of Lehigh County with the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts; that two (2) certified copies and a CD-ROM copy that complies with the requirement of Pa. L-717. Substance Abuse Education and Demand Reduction Fund.

(A) A substance abuse fee as set forth in Act 198 of 2002, as amended by Act 24 of 2003 and Act 36 of 2006, shall be assessed on any individual in Washington County convicted, adjudicated delinquent, or granted Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition (ARD), or any individual who pleads guilty or nolo contendere for a violation of the Act of April 14, 1972 (P. L. 233, No. 64), known as The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, or a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under the influence of alcohol or controlled substance).

(B) The Washington County Clerk of Courts shall assess and collect the fee, and the Washington County Treasurer shall establish and administer a County Substance Abuse Education and Demand Reduction Fund (County SAEDRF) consisting of the county portion of fees collected.

(C) Disbursements from the County SAEDRF shall be made only at the direction of the President Judge. Requests for funds from the County SAEDRF shall be made to the Criminal Justice Advisory Board Subcommittee established to review such requests. The subcommittee shall review requests for funds and make recommendations to the President Judge for disbursement.

Title 55—PUBLIC WELFARE

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES [55 PA. CODE] Redesignation of Department

The act of September 24, 2014 (P. L. 2458, No. 132) (Act 132) designated the Department of Public Welfare as the Department of Human Services. Act 132 became effective November 24, 2014.

Act 132 deems a reference to the Department of Public Welfare in a regulation as a reference to the Department of Human Services. Accordingly, throughout the regulations in 55 Pa. Code (relating to public welfare) and additional titles of the *Pennsylvania Code*, references to the Department of Public Welfare will be updated, as appropriate, to the Department of Human Services.

Title 67—TRANSPORTATION

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

[67 PA. CODE CH. 175]

Corrective Amendment to 67 Pa. Code § 175.51

The Department of Transportation has discovered a discrepancy between the agency text of 67 Pa. Code § 175.51 (relating to cause for suspension) as deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau and the official text published in the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter* (Master Transmittal Sheet No. 470, January 2014). When amendments to 67 Pa. Code § 175.51(a)(4) published at 43 Pa.B. 6349 (October 26, 2013) were codified, the durations of suspension in 67 Pa. Code § 175.51(a)(3)(iii) were inadvertently deleted.

Therefore, under 45 Pa.C.S. § 901 (relating to official text of published documents), the Department of Transportation has deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau a corrective amendment to 67 Pa. Code § 175.51. The corrective amendment to 67 Pa. Code § 175.51 is effective as of January 4, 2014, the date the defective official text was announced in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The correct version of 67 Pa. Code § 175.51 appears in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulation.

§ 175.51. Cause for suspension.

(a) *Schedule*. The complete operation of an official inspection station is the responsibility of the owner. Failure to comply with the appropriate provisions of 75 Pa.C.S. (relating to Vehicle Code) will be considered sufficient cause for suspension of inspection privileges. A violator is also subject to criminal prosecution.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Standards for Automotive Fuel

Section 4187.4(a) of 3 Pa.C.S. (relating to standards for automotive fuel) requires that the Department of Agriculture (Department): (1) adopt the latest automotive fuel standards for automotive spark ignition engines based on the latest standards of the American Society for Testing and Materials International as determined by the Federal Trade Commission; and (2) publish notice of these standards in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The standards for automotive fuel adopted by the Department are the most current standards published at 16 CFR Part 306 (relating to automotive fuel ratings, certification and posting).

Country View Family Farms, LLC. has submitted an application for an Individual NPDES permit for a new CAFO known as Smiling Porker Farm, located in Pine Township, **Lycoming County**.

The CAFO is situated near Unnamed Tributary to Hughes Run in Watershed 9-A, which is classified for High Quality Waters—Cold Water Fishes and. The CAFO will be designed to maintain an animal population of approximately 2,978.55 animal equivalent units (AEUs) consisting of 5,387 sows, 2,363 gilts, 470 sows with litter, and 15 boars. Manure will be collected within proposed barns that are comprised of a 160'.8" by 767' gestation barn with a 9' deep under barn manure storage pit (7,282,626 gallon capacity), a 71' by 338' gilt grower barn with a 6' under barn manure storage pit (934,619 gallon capacity), and a 120' by 506' farrowing barn with a 2' deep reception pit that drains into the gestation barn. The total storage capacity will be approximately 8,172,321 million gallons. Prior to operation of the manure storage facilities, the design engineer will be required to submit certification that the facilities were constructed in accordance with appropriate PA Technical Guide Standards. A release or discharge to waters of the Commonwealth under normal operating conditions is not expected. Normal operating conditions are defined as conditions below a 100-year, 24-hour storm event.

The Department has conducted administrative and technical reviews of the application. LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101-6026.907)

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) (35 P. S. §§ 6026.302—6026.305) require the Department to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. A person intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard or intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area shall file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one or a combination of cleanup standards or receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

For further information concerning the content of a Notice of Intent to Remediate, contact the environmental cleanup program manager in the Department regional office listed before the notice. If information concerning this acknowledgment is required in an alternative form, contact the community relations coordinator at the appropriate regional office. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. In addition, the Department imposes a technology-based aluminum limit of 2.0 mg/l (30 day average) to protect stream uses.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 362-0600-001, NPDES Program Implementation—Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Concerning Water Quality Management, NPDES Program Implementation, and Related Matters. Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests or petitions for a public hearing on NPDES permit applications, as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92a.82(d). The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30 days of this public notice and contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request, and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. A public hearing may be held if the Department considers the public interest significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing on the NPDES permit application will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. Scope of Practice for Emergency Medical Service Providers

Under 28 Pa. Code §§ 1023.24(d)(1), 1023.25(d)(1), 1023.26(d)(1), 1023.27(d)(1), 1023.28(d), 1023.29(d) and 1023.30(e), the Department of Health (Department) is publishing the scope of practice for emergency medical responders (EMR), emergency medical technicians (EMT), advanced emergency medical technicians (AEMT), paramedics (P), prehospital registered nurses (PHRN), prehospital physician extenders (PHPE) and prehospital physicians (PHP) under 35 Pa.C.S. §§ 8101—8157 (relating to Emergency Medical Services System Act).

Skills identified may be performed by an emergency medical service (EMS) provider at the provider's level of certification or registration only if the provider has successfully completed the approved education (cognitive, affective and psychomotor) on the specified skill, which includes training to perform the skill on adults, children and infants, as appropriate. EMRs, EMTs, AEMTs and Ps may only perform the skills identified, through either Statewide or other Department-approved protocols, or skills that may be ordered online by a medical command physician. As the following chart indicates, a PHRN, PHPE and PHP may perform all skills identified as within a paramedic's scope of practice. Each of these EMS providers may perform additional skills as outlined as follows.

A PHRN who is appropriately credentialed by the EMS agency medical director may perform other services authorized by The Professional Nursing Law (63 P.S. §§ 211—225.5), when authorized by a medical command physician through either online medical command or through the applicable Statewide or Department-approved EMS protocols.

A PHPE who is appropriately credentialed by the EMS agency medical director may perform services within the scope of practice of a physician assistant under the Medical Practice Act of 1985 (63 P. S. §§ 422.1—422.51a) or the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act (63 P. S. §§ 271.1—271.18), when authorized by a medical command physician through either online medical command or through applicable Statewide or Department-approved EMS protocols. When a PHPE functions as an EMS provider, the physician supervision requirements applicable to a physician assistant under the Medical Practice Act of 1985 and the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act do not apply.

A PHP who is appropriately credentialed by the EMS agency medical director may perform skills within a paramedic's scope of practice and other skills within the practice of medicine or osteopathic medicine. A PHP may not perform a skill that the PHP has not been educated and trained to perform.

Under 28 Pa. Code § 1023.1(a)(1)(vi) and (vii) (relating to EMS agency medical director), the EMS agency medical director must make an initial assessment of each EMS provider at or above the AEMT level, and then within 12 months of each prior assessment, to determine whether the EMS provider has the knowledge and skills to competently perform the skills within the EMS provider's scope of practice, and a commitment to adequately perform other functions relevant to the EMS provider providing EMS at that level. EMS providers at or above the AEMT level may only perform skills that the EMS agency medical director has credentialed them to perform.

The Department wishes to highlight the following change to the scope of practice for all EMS providers: Effective November 29, 2014, administration of Naloxone in intranasal or auto-injector form is approved for all levels of EMS providers and is listed under the "Medications" category of this notice. This change is made under the act of September 30, 2014 (P. L. 2487, No. 139) (35 P. S. §§ 780-113.7 and 780-113.8), which requires the Department, by December 31, 2014, to amend the scope of practice for EMS providers to include the administration of Naloxone. Prior to this change, Naloxone was listed on the approved drug list only for advanced life support ambulance services and for advanced-level EMS providers published at 42 Pa.B. 4229 (July 7, 2012).

Availability of Amendments to the Office of Long-Term Living's Aging, Attendant Care and Independence Waivers; Renewal of the Waiver for Persons with AIDS or Symptomatic HIV Disease (AIDS Waiver); and Accompanying Home and Community-Based Settings Transition Plans

The Department of Human Services (Department) is making available for public review and comment the Office of Long-Term Living's proposed Aging, Attendant Care and Independence waiver amendments, the proposed AIDS waiver renewal and accompanying transition plans.

Aging, Attendant Care and Independence Waivers

To receive Federal matching funds for home and community-based services (HCBS) Aging, Attendant Care and Independence waiver services, the Department must receive approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for the unduplicated number of participants to be served during each year of the approved waiver. The number of unduplicated recipients is estimated for each year of the waivers and, with Federal approval, can be adjusted as actual experience within the waivers is monitored. The Aging, Attendant Care and Independence waiver amendments propose to increase the number of unduplicated recipients served in each waiver during the 2013-2014 State Fiscal Year (SFY), as well as to add transition plans for home and community-based settings that are specific to each waiver.

Based on experience in SFY 2013-2014, the Department has determined the need to increase the maximum number of unduplicated recipients it intends to serve in the waivers. The Department intends to submit amendments to CMS to increase the maximum number of unduplicated recipients as follows:

• Aging Waiver—increase the number of unduplicated recipients from 28,500 to 29,000.

• Attendant Care Waiver—increase the number of unduplicated recipients from 10,250 to 10,700.

• Independence Waiver—increase the number of unduplicated recipients from 8,600 to 10,500.

AIDS Waiver

Under 42 CFR 430.25(h)(2)(i) (relating to waivers of State plan requiements) to continue receiving Federal

matching funds for HCBS AIDS waiver services, CMS requires that existing HCBS waivers be renewed every 5 years. The AIDS Waiver was last renewed by CMS effective January 1, 2010.

Transition Plans

The CMS published a final rule for HCBS at 79 FR 2948 (January 16, 2014), with an effective date of March 17, 2014. This final rule amends the Medicaid regulation for HCBS waivers under section 1915(c) of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.A. § 1396n(c)) to provide requirements regarding characteristics of settings that are home and community-based as well as settings that may not be home and community-based. See 42 CFR Parts 430, 431, 435, 436, 440, 441 and 447. These requirements reflect CMS' intent that individuals receiving services and supports through Medicaid waivers receive services in settings that are integrated in and support full access to the greater community. For more details about the HCBS Final Rule, refer to the CMS HCBS webpage at http:// www.medicaid.gov/Medicaid-CHIP-Program-Information/ By-Topics/Long-Term-Services-and-Supports/Home-and-Community-Based-Services/Home-and-Community-Based-Services.html.

The final rule requires that a waiver-specific transition plan be submitted with each waiver amendment or waiver renewal. The proposed transition plans for the Aging, Attendant Care, Independence and AIDS waivers include the steps that the Department anticipates taking to achieve compliance in the following areas: Assessment, Remediation Strategies and Outreach and Engagement of Stakeholders.

Fiscal Impact

For Fiscal Year 2014-2015, the fiscal impact of the Aging, Attendant Care and Independence waiver amendments is \$59.527 million (\$28.603 million in State funds). The renewal of the AIDS waiver is anticipated to be budget neutral; therefore, there is no anticipated fiscal impact.

Availability of Local Real Estate Tax Reimbursement Grants for Taxes Paid in 2014

The Department of Transportation (Department), Bureau of Aviation, is accepting applications for Local Real Estate Tax Reimbursement Grants from qualifying owners of public airports who have paid local real estate taxes for the calendar year ending December 31, 2014.

Each year, under 74 Pa.C.S. Chapter 61, Subchapter B (relating to reimbursement of local real estate taxes for public airports) and 67 Pa. Code Chapter 477 (relating to local real estate tax reimbursement grants), the owner of a public airport shall be eligible for a grant from the local real estate tax reimbursement portion of the Aviation Restricted Account. These grants are available to reimburse airport owners for local real estate taxes paid on

those portions of an airport which are aviation-related areas as defined in 74 Pa.C.S. § 5102 (relating to definitions). Prior to receiving a grant, each public airport owner shall enter into an agreement with the Department. This agreement shall specify that the owner shall continue, for not less than 10 years, to maintain the property, for which the grant will be sought, as an airport at least equal in size and capacity as indicated in the owner's initial grant application. This agreement shall be a covenant which runs with the land and shall apply to any subsequent purchases of land. Upon acceptance of any grant, the covenant shall be deemed extended for 1 additional year. Any violation of the agreement shall make the owner liable for the repayment of the total appropriation for the year plus a penalty of two times the grant. In any action wherein the owner is found to have violated the agreement, the Department shall receive all costs of prosecution.

The final date for submission of applications for reimbursement of local real estate taxes paid in the calendar year ending December 31, 2014, is the close of business on February 1, 2015. Applications shall be filed with the Bureau of Aviation using dotGrants, the Department's web based grants administration program. Findings

Under section 2002 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 512) establishing the Department of Transportation (Department), the Director of the Bureau of Project Delivery, as delegated by the Secretary of Transportation, makes the following written findings:

The Department is planning the following projects. Environmental and Section 4(f) documentation have been developed for these projects to evaluate the potential environmental impacts caused by these projects. The Section 4(f) documents also serve as the Section 2002 Evaluation. The approved documents are available in the CE/EA Expert System http://www.dotdom2.state.pa.us/ ceea/ceeamain.nsf. The environmental, economic social and other effects of the proposed projects have been considered. Based upon studies, there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use of the Section 2002 resources for the following proposed projects and all reasonable steps have been taken to minimize the effects.

• SR 0000, Section L00—City of Meadville, Crawford County.

Project Description: The project consists of replacing the Mead Avenue Bridge, which carries Mead Avenue over (SR) French Creek, and performing minor approach reconstruction to accommodate the grade adjustments along Mead Avenue and through the intersection of Mead Avenue with State Route (SR) 0102 (Cussewago Road).

Environmental Documents: Level 2 CEE, approved on May 1, 2014, and a Nationwide/Programmatic Section 4(f) Evaluation for Projects that Necessitate the Use of Historic Bridges approved on October 15, 2010, and a Determination of Section 4(f) Applicability Involving Temporary Use (Occupancy) approved on March 26, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The replacement of the Mead Avenue Bridge required the dismantling and removal of the current structure, which is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places resulting in an adverse impact on the resource. Bicentennial Park is a 3-acre public park owned by the City of Meadville and located adjacent to the south side of Mead Avenue. A temporary construction easement (TCE) of 0.3 acre is required from the park during construction. A temporary pad will be constructed along the bank of French Creek to provide access and staging for equipment. This area will be fully restored resulting in no adverse impact. French Creek is an approved water trail. No boat launch or other access point exists in the project area. The project will have no adverse effect on the French Creek water trail.

• SR 0000, Section LOC—Allegheny County.

Project Description: The project consists of the procurement and installation of bicycles, bicycle racks, hardware, pay stations and related appurtenances in 50 select locations throughout the City of Pittsburgh.

Environmental Documents: Level 1a CEE, approved on May 29, 2014, and a Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use document and a Section 4(f) Non-Applicability/No Use, all approved on July 22, 2013.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: There are five proposed bike share stations that will be within four recreational Section 4(f) properties but will not result in permanent acquisition of property: Mellon Park; Morrow Park; Schenley Park; and North Shore Park. Fifteen proposed bike share stations will be within eight historic 4(f) properties: Pittsburgh Renaissance Historic District; Pittsburgh Central Downtown Historic District; Schenley Park Historic District, East Carson Street Historic District; Strip Historic District; Lawrenceville Historic District; Schenley Farm Historic District; and East Liberty Historic District. The construction of these bike share stations will not require right-of-way (ROW) takes or impacts to these historic properties, and the project does not constitute a "use" within the meaning of 4(f) in respect to historic resources. None of the 4(f) properties will have adverse effects as a result of the project.

• SR 0006, Section 620—Coudersport Borough, Potter County.

Project Description: The project consists of full depth reconstruction in specific areas, base replacements, drainage improvements, bituminous overlay, bridge rehabilitation, traffic signal upgrades and possible water, sewer and gas line relocations along SR 0006 in Coudersport Borough, Potter County. Minor reconstruction of curb and sidewalk sections may be required where drainage upgrades are constructed.

Environmental Documents: BRPA CEE, approved on May 16, 2014, and a Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use document, approved on May 6, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: As part of the proposed betterment project, the Department will be upgrading the existing drainage within the project area. Included with these upgrades will be the replacement of an existing outfall pipe extending from SR 0006 to the Allegheny River. This outfall pipe currently extends across the Mary C. Freysinger property. This is a contributing property to the Coudersport Historic District, listed on the National Register of Historic Places. For the proposed pipe replacement, a permanent drainage easement is required at the southwest corner of the Mary C. Freysinger property consisting of approximately 0.02 acre. This easement and the work associated with the project will result in no adverse effect to the property or the historic district.

• SR 0030, Section 085—Jackson Township, York County.

Project Description: The project consists of the replacement of the SR 0030 bridge over Little Conewago Creek in Jackson Township.

Environmental Documents: Level 1b CEE, approved on June 26, 2014, and a Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use document, approved on July 25, 2013.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The replacement of the SR 0030 bridge over Little Conewago Creek requires permanent ROW acquisition and temporary impacts to the John Spangler Farm. The John Spangler Farm is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. Approximately 0.431 acre of permanent ROW is necessary for the widening of the bridge. Approximately 0.477 acre of temporary impacts will occur during construction. The permanent acquisitions and temporary impacts will result in no adverse effect to the John Spangler Farm.

• SR 0066, Section A01—Highland Township, Elk County.

Project Description: The project consists of the removal of the existing structure that carries SR 0066 over an unnamed tributary to Wolf Run and the installation of a single cell box culvert. Minor roadway paving and guiderail updates are also included with this project.

Environmental Documents: BRPA CEE, approved on March 31, 2014, and a Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use document, approved on March 31, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: This project will require minor sliver takes of the Allegheny National Forest. The work itself will not result in any adverse effects to the resource.

• SR 0092, Section 04D—Various Municipalities, Susquehanna and Wyoming County.

Project Description: The project consists of the resurfacing of 15 miles of bituminous roadways on SRs in various municipalities. Also included in the project are milling, base repair, design-build curb ramps, guiderail updates and pavement markings.

Environmental Documents: BRPA CEE, approved on May 12, 2014, and a Determination of Nationwide/ Programmatic Section 4(f) Evaluation for Minor Involvements with Historic Sites, approved on April 24, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The project goes through the Susquehanna Depot Historic District, eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The project will have no effect to the qualities that make the Susquehanna Historic District eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

• SR 0268, Section 251—Parker Township, Butler County.

Project Description: The project consists of structural improvements to the existing arch culvert carrying SR 0268 over North Branch Bear Creek.

Environmental Documents: Level 1b CEE, approved on June 19, 2014, and a Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use document, approved on June 9, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The rehabilitation of the arch culvert will require approximately 0.031 acre of permanent ROW and 0.526 acre of TCE. The project is located in State Game Lands 95, a Section 4(f) resource. The TCE area will be restored to the greatest extent possible following construction. The project will not affect the activities, features or attributes that qualify the resource for protection as a 4(f) resource and will have no adverse effect to the resource.

• SR 0309, Section 02D—Various Municipalities, Luzerne County.

Project Description: The project consists of surface treatment along SR 0309 from Mountain Top to Hazleton City. Work includes milling, bituminous wearing and scratch course, base repair, ADA ramps, drainage upgrades and restoring of pavement markings.

Environmental Documents: BRPA CEE, approved on April 30, 2014, and a Determination of Nationwide/ Programmatic Section 4(f) Evaluation for Minor Involvements with Historic Sites, approved on April 24, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The limits of the work are within the Church Street Historic District and Hazleton City Hall. This project will have no effect to the qualities that make these locations eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places resulting in no adverse effect.

• SR 0403, Section 10B—City of Johnstown, Cambria County.

Project Description: The project consists of the replacement of the existing Moxham Bridge in Johnstown, Cambria County. The structure carries four lanes of SR 0403 and two pedestrian sidewalks over the Stonycreek River. The proposed work consists of replacing the existing structure with a two-span, steel multigirder bridge on the existing horizontal and vertical alignments.

Environmental Documents: BRPA CEE, approved on August 4, 2014, and a (1) Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use/Section 2002 for Public Parks, Recreation Area, Wildlife and/or Waterfowl Refuges, State Forest land, and State Game Land was approved on July 30, 2014, and a (2) Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use/Section 2002 for Historic Properties was approved on July 30, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The proposed project would include:

(1) Approximately 548 square feet of property from the two parcels on the east and west of SR 0403 south of the bridge will be obtained as required ROW for the project. The roadway reconstruction to the south of the bridge is

needed to tie the profile grade of the proposed structure back to the existing profile, as well as to maintain vehicular and pedestrian traffic throughout the corridor during the phased bridge replacement.

(2) A 2,100 square foot portion of the National Register of Historic Places eligible Johnstown Local Flood Protection Project flood wall, adjacent to the causeway, will need to be temporarily removed and reconstructed to access the causeway. The causeway is required for demolition and bridge erection activities. Additionally, impacts to the National Register of Historic Places-eligible Cochran Junior High School (currently the Johnstown High School) will be limited to ground disturbance in an area measuring approximately 2,000 square feet and 4,000 square feet of TCE.

• SR 0412, Section CRD—City of Bethlehem, Northampton County.

Project Description: The project consists of the construction of a new one-lane roadway (Union Station Plaza) to connect West Second Street and West Third Street in the City of Bethlehem. The new roadwork includes construction of a new one-lane curbed roadway, drainage and 8-foot sidewalk, three on-street parking spaces and miscellaneous construction.

Environmental Documents: Level 2 CEE, approved on May 23, 2014, and a Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use document, approved on February 10, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The project is located adjacent to the northwest boundary of the South Bethlehem Downtown Historic District. The historic district was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2006. There will be 2 square feet of direct impact for the required sidewalk easement and one parking space will be lost within the historic district boundary. The project will also require 0.013 acre from within the historic district for TCE and 0.026 acre for a required sight distance easement. There will be no adverse effects as a result of this project. This project's information is not available electronically in the CEE System.

• SR 0436, Section 552—Punxsutawney Borough, Jefferson County.

Project Description: The project consists of a replacement and realignment of the SR 0436 bridge over Mahoning Creek (Margiotti Bridge). The proposed bridge will be constructed adjacent to and downstream of the existing structure.

Environmental Document: Level 1b CEE, approved on May 16, 2014, and a Determination of Section 4(f) DeMinimis Use document, approved on March 25, 2014.

Proposed Use of Section 4(f)/2002 Resource: The Mahoning Shadow Trail, Punxsutawney Area Rails to Trails Association, Inc. is located along the south bank of Mahoning Creek. The new bridge will require a permanent aerial easement where the bridge crosses over the trail. Access will be maintained during most of construction and, upon completion, the trail and the surrounding property will be landscaped and the trail restored to preconstruction condition. Short-term (less than 24 hours) closures are anticipated during several major construction events. The aerial easement and new pier will not impede the future use of the Mahoning Shadow Trail resulting in no adverse effects.

Project Description: The project consists of the bridge preservation of SR 3014 over Juniata River in Bratton Township, Mifflin County.
