

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

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Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44:

Per Curiam

And Now, this 23rd day of May, 2019, It Is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that Rule 701 of the Rules of Judicial Administration is amended in the following form.

To the extent that notice of proposed rulemaking would otherwise be required by Pa.R.J.A. No. 103, the immediate promulgation of the amendment is found to be in the interest of efficient administration.

This Order shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(b), and the amendment shall be effective January 6, 2020.

Annex A

TITLE 201. RULES OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

CHAPTER 7. ASSIGNMENT OF JUDGES

ASSIGNMENT AND TRANSFER OF JUDGES

Rule 701. Assignment of judges to courts.

- (A) Conditions Applicable for the Certification of Senior Magisterial District Judges, Judges or Justices.
- (1) To be eligible for senior certification, a magisterial district judge, judge or justice:
- (a) shall have served as a magisterial district judge, judge or justice, whether or not continuously or on the same court, by election or appointment for an aggregate period equaling ten years;
- (b) shall not have been defeated for reelection or retention; and
- (c) shall be at least sixty-five years of age on the date on which he or she begins senior service, or have a combination of years of judicial service plus age that totals at least seventy for magisterial district judges or at least eighty for judges and justices. However, this subsection (c) shall not apply to those serving in senior status as of the effective date of this rule.
- (2) In addition to paragraph (1), any duly elected magisterial district judge, judge or justice, having an aggregate of five years of judicial service, who is required to retire due to mandatory retirement age, shall be eligible for certification.
- (3) Judges seeking senior status must apply for such status immediately upon retirement. Thereafter, requests for senior status shall be granted only upon application to and approval by the Supreme

Court, which approval will be granted only upon a showing of compelling and exceptional circumstances.

Official Note: As a matter of state law passed to conform with federal law, judges who otherwise qualify for senior service but retire before age 62 cannot serve as senior judges and simultaneously receive their state pension until they have reached age 62 or have been an annuitant (retiree) for one year, whichever is earlier. See 71 Pa.C.S. § 5706(a)(1), (2) & (a.4). Such judges must choose between (1) receiving their pension but delaying senior service (accepting judicial assignments) until they reach one of those thresholds, or (2) delaying receipt of their pension (and associated retiree medical benefits) while serving as a senior judge (accepting assignments) during that period. Judges who retire before age 62 and who seek senior status must apply immediately upon retirement but may request to delay service. Delaying service will not affect the applicability of the relevant code of judicial conduct, including but not limited to those provisions regulating personal and extrajudicial activity, see Pa. Code of Jud. Conduct (Canon 3); Pa. Rules Governing Standards of Conduct of Magisterial District Judges (Canon 3), and political activity, see Pa. Code of Jud. Conduct (Canon 4); Pa. Rules Governing Standards of Conduct of Magisterial District Judges (Canon 4).

- [(3)] (4) Senior status shall end on the last day of the calendar year in which a magisterial district judge, judge or justice attains age seventy-eight; however, those serving in senior status as of the effective date of this rule who were previously excepted from the age seventy-five limitation pursuant to the amendment of January 1, 1999 may continue to serve until the last day of the calendar year in which they attain age eighty.
- [(4)] (5) For certification of senior status, a magisterial district judge, judge or justice shall verify such additional information as required by the application for certification forms authorized under paragraph (B) below.
- [(5)] (6) A magisterial district judge, judge or justice may only be certified for senior status for a maximum of ten years, absent extraordinary circumstances, as determined by the Chief Justice. However, those serving in senior status as of the effective date of this rule may continue to serve until subject to the age limit of paragraph [(3)] (4) above.
- [(6)] (7) Certification of a magisterial district judge, judge or justice for senior status shall be subject to the pleasure of the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court at any time, in the exercise of its sole discretion, may rescind or revoke a senior certification.

Official Note: Paragraph [(6)] (7) was added in 2016 to clarify that certification of senior status is (and always has been) a matter that is subject to the pleasure of the Supreme Court.

BERKS COUNTY

Amendments to Local Rules; No. 19-1 Prothonotary

Order

And Now, this 15th day of May, 2019, the following amendments to Berks County Rules of Civil Procedure 1302(c) shall become effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(d)(5)(iii).

(New language is bold and underscored, and deleted language is shown bracketed and bold.)

The District Court Administrator is Ordered and Directed to:

- 1. Submit one (1) copy of this Order, including the amended rule, to the appropriate Rules Committee of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania for review.
- 2. Distribute two (2) copies of this Order, including the amended rule, and one (1) disk copy to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 3. File one (1) copy of this Order, including the amended rules, with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts contemporaneously with publishing the local rules in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 4. Compile the local rules within the complete set of local rules available on the Berks County Court website no later than 30 days following publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 5. Distribute one (1) copy of this Order, including the amended rule to the Berks County Prothonotary's Office so they can keep them continuously available for public inspection and copying.

Rule 1302. Administration.

. . .

(c) Every attorney admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania [with a primary office located] who primarily practices in Berks County shall file with Court Administration appropriate information on a form designated by Court Administration for this purpose, indicating whether or not said attorney is practicing alone, is a member of a firm, or is associated in some way with one or more other lawyers (either in private practice or as an employee of some public office such as the district attorney's office, public defender's office, legal aid, etc.). Said attorney shall also notify Court Administration on said form whether said attorney is willing to serve as an arbitrator, [the location of his/her primary office] whether he-she primarily practices in Berks County, whether he-she is admitted to practice law in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and any qualifications for chairperson as required in B.R.C.P. 1302.2. Any change in status in this regard shall immediately be reported to Court Administration.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

BUCKS COUNTY

Order Promulgating Rules of Civil Procedure 212.7 Case Management Orders, 212.8 Case Intervention Program and 241 Attorney and Party Contact Information; Administrative Order No. 94

Order

And Now, this 15th day of May 2019, pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. No. 239, Bucks County Rules of Civil Procedure 212.7 Case Management Orders, 212.8 Case Intervention Program and 241 Attorney and Party Contact Information, are promulgated as follows:

Rule 212.7. Case Management Orders.

- (a) Case Management Orders may be submitted for Court approval by agreement of all parties to a matter by filing with the Office of the Prothonotary. Such agreed Case Management Orders shall be substantially in the form approved by the Court and available at http://buckscounty.org/Courts/DocketForms. At a minimum, every agreed Case Management Order shall contain the following, subject to rejection from filing by the Office of the Prothonotary or the Office of the Court Administrator:
- (1) current contact information for all parties and counsel, including mailing address, telephone number, and email address:
- (2) the type of proceeding necessary, i.e., arbitration or trial;
- (3) the estimated amount of time, in days, necessary for such proceeding; and
- (4) the date on which the Office of the Court Administrator shall consider the matter ready for listing for arbitration or trial.

Note: This rule does not apply to cases requiring a date certain trial listing. A case management order in such cases will be entered only after a conference with the Office of the Court Administrator, Calendar, or other designated Court staff. See http://buckscounty.org/Courts/CourtAdministration/Calendar for more information regarding date certain listing.

A specific date, i.e., month, date and year, on which the case will be considered ready for listing is required to be included in an agreed Case Management Order. A general, indefinite or contingent time frame, e.g., "30 days from the disposition of any motion for summary judgment," is not acceptable and will subject the order to rejection by the Prothonotary or the Office of the Court Administrator.

- (b) Amendments to Case Management Orders are discouraged, but may be submitted by agreement of all parties and shall meet the minimum requirements of subsection (a) above.
- (c) In the case that the parties are unable to reach agreement as to the terms of a Case Management Order or an amendment thereof, any party may file a motion for a case management conference. Upon review of the motion and in the Court's discretion, a conference may be scheduled at which the sole issue before the Court shall be determination and entry of a Case Management Order.

Rule 212.8. Case Intervention Program.

(a) The Court will enter a Case Intervention Order on or about the date one year from the date of initial filing in all civil cases, excluding Family Court matters, which have not been:

- listed for trial or arbitration;
- made subject to a Case Management Order; or
- otherwise resolved of record.

Note: This rule does not apply to any action filed in the Criminal and Orphans' Court divisions. For the purpose of this rule, "Family Court matters" are actions before the Domestic Relations Section, including actions pursuant to the Protection from Abuse Act (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1901 et seq.), actions for Support (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1910.1 et seq.), actions for Custody (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.1 et seq.), and actions for Divorce (Pa.R.C.P. No. 1920.1 et seq).

- (b) The Case Intervention Order will direct the parties, within seven months of entry of the order, to:
- (1) list the matter for trial or arbitration pursuant to B.C.R.C.P. No. *261;
- (2) submit to the Court an agreed Case Management Order in a required form promulgated by the Court; or
- (3) where the parties believe the case will require a date certain trial listing, take the appropriate steps for entry of a date certain Case Management Order.

Note: See http://buckscounty.org/Courts/CourtAdminis tration/Calendar for information regarding date certain listing.

- (c) Should the parties fail to take one of the three actions enumerated by the Case Intervention Order within the given seven month time frame, the Court will enter a Case Management Order, sua sponte, which will authorize the Court Administrator to list the matter for trial or arbitration at any time after 22 months have passed from the date of initial filing.
- (d) Amendment of any Case Management Order entered sua sponte will not be ordered by the Court absent agreement of all parties or extraordinary circumstances.

Explanatory Comment: The purpose of this rule is to create a procedure whereby all civil cases will be either subject to a Case Management Order or eligible to be listed for arbitration or trial prior to the passage of two years from the date of initial filing.

An agreed Case Management Order form has been promulgated by the Court, and any agreed Case Management Order must comply in substance with that form. See B.C.R.C.P. No. 212.7, Case Management Orders, for further information.

Where the parties fail to list the matter for trial or arbitration, or to agree to the terms of a Case Management Order within seven months of entry of the Case Intervention Order, it is the Court's intent that the sua sponte Case Management Order will be final and binding. As such, except by agreement among all parties, any sua sponte Case Management Order will not be amended absent truly extraordinary circumstances. Discovery disputes, outstanding motions and attorney/witness availability will not be considered "extraordinary circumstances" for the purposes of this rule.

Rule 241. Attorney and Party Contact Information.

- (a) It is the sole responsibility of attorneys and unrepresented parties in matters before the Court to maintain current and accurate contact information with the Court. The term "contact information" shall include a valid mailing address and telephone number for the attorney or unrepresented party, and if the attorney or unrepresented party is a registered e-filer, it shall further include a valid email address for the party or attorney.
- (b) The failure of any attorney or unrepresented party to maintain current and accurate contact information with the Court may result in the attorney or unrepresented party failing to receive timely notice of Court orders, scheduled case events and other proceedings. Such failure will not be considered by the Court as an excuse for the attorney's or unrepresented party's failure to timely file responsive documents, appear for scheduled proceedings, or comply with Court orders.

Note: A form Praecipe for Change of Address/Contact Information has been approved by the Court and is available at http://buckscounty.org/government/RowOfficers/Prothonotary/Forms. A valid email address must be provided when registering to use to Prothonotary's e-filing system, and may be updated as necessary using that system.

This Rule shall take effect thirty (30) days from the date of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements

Recitals

A. African Swine Fever is a highly contagious hemorrhagic viral disease affecting domestic and wild swine.

- B. There is no vaccine to protect swine against African Swine Fever, nor is there a known cure or treatment for this dangerous transmissible disease.
- C. African Swine Fever has a high environmental resistance and can be spread by domestic or wild swine, whether alive or dead, and pork products.
- D. African Swine Fever is known to be transmissible from infected to uninfected swine through contact and via contaminated feed and fomites (non-living objects) such as shoes, clothes, vehicles, equipment and any other goods, products, facilities, containers and other objects with which infected swine—alive or dead—may come into contact.
- E. Section 2321 of the Domestic Animal Law (Law) establishes a list of "dangerous transmissible disease" and provides for the designation of additional dangerous transmissible diseases through regulation or temporary order (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321).
- F. African swine fever (ASF) is specifically designated as a dangerous transmissible disease at section 2321(a)(3) of the Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321(a)(3)).
- G. The Domestic Animal Law (Law) (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2301—2389) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), provides the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) broad authority to regulate the keeping and handling of domestic animals to exclude, contain or eliminate dangerous transmissible diseases, such as ASF.
- H. This includes authority, set forth at section 2329 of the Law, to establish and enforce quarantine orders "Whenever a dangerous transmissible disease...exists anywhere within or outside of this Commonwealth..." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(a)).
- I. Section 2329(d) of the Law provides specific authority to establish and enforce a general quarantine order against "...any area or locality within this Commonwealth for any of the reasons set forth in subsection (a) to prevent a dangerous transmissible disease...from being carried into, within, from or out of the area or locality that is subject to the quarantine. A general quarantine order may include any domestic animals, conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials that may carry dangerous transmissible disease...and may include any area or locality, including all buildings, structures, premises and equipment located therein." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(d))
- J. ASF is found in countries around the world, particularly in sub-Saharan Africa. More recently, it has spread through China, Mongolia and Vietnam. Since August 2018, China has confirmed more than 50 cases of ASF. The disease is also spreading within the European Union (EU), and the virus has reached 10 member states of the EU.
- K. ASF presents serious threats to animal health and the economic vitality of the Commonwealth's swine production industry. Introduction of ASF into the commercial swine herds of this Commonwealth would result in severe economic losses to the infected herd owners as well as loss of valuable National and International trade opportunities for all Pennsylvania's pork producers.
- L. The PDA through this Quarantine Order establishes reasonable requirements to allow for movement of swine and products within this Commonwealth for exhibition

purposes, while protecting against the introduction of ASF into this Commonwealth's commercial production swine population.

Order of Quarantine:

With the foregoing recitals incorporated into this Order of Quarantine by reference, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) under authority of the Domestic Animal Law, at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(d) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), hereby establishes a General Order of Quarantine related to the dangerous transmissible disease African Swine Fever (ASF) and the shipment and holding of swine, alive or dead, and any conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials capable of harboring ASF, within and through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The following requirements and restrictions are hereby established with respect to the exhibition of swine within this Commonwealth:

- 1. Quarantine Area. The area covered by this General Quarantine Order is the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and shall be in effect until further order of the Department.
- 2. *Definitions*. The following terms when used in this Order have the following meanings:

Accredited veterinarian. A licensed veterinarian jointly accredited by APHIS-USDA and the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to perform official duties on behalf of APHIS-USDA or the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to practice veterinary medicine. See accreditation standards established by 9 CFR Parts 160 and 161 (relating to definition of terms; and requirements and standards for accredited veterinarians and suspension or revocation of such accreditation).

Breeding swine—A sexually intact swine over 6 months of age or older or a sexually intact swine 5 months of age or younger selected for producing offspring.

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI). An official document issued by a federal, state, tribal, or accredited veterinarian certifying that the animals identified on the document have been inspected and were found to satisfy the regulations pertaining to their intended movement—within the same state, between states, or internationally.

Direct movement to slaughter. Transported to a facility for slaughter, without stops or unloading except for feeding and watering during which the animals are not commingled with any other animals.

Exhibition. A show or display of animals.

Market swine. A barrow or gilt swine that weighs between 220 and 280 pounds, is approximately 6 months old, and was raised for slaughter.

Recognized slaughter establishment. A slaughter establishment operated under the Federal Meat Inspection Act (21 U.S.C.A. §§ 601—623, 641—645, 661, 671—680 and 691) or a State inspected slaughter establishment.

Slaughter market. An animal market approved by the Department for the sale of slaughter animals in accordance with Chapter 5 (relating to animal markets) and the act of June 22, 1931 (P.L. 650, No. 225) (3 P.S. §§ 431—439), known as the Farm Animal Dealer or Broker License Law.

3. Beginning June 1, 2019, no swine species shall be exhibited in this Commonwealth unless each animal meets all of the following criteria:

a. Is accompanied by a CVI that was issued not more than 30 days before the date of the show.

- b. Shall be permanently identified by an official ear tag and the ear tag number recorded on the CVI. Forms of official ear tag identification include:
 - i. USDA-issued metal ear tag with a US shield
 - ii. ISO-compliant 15-digit ear tag starting with "840"
- iii. plastic show-issued stamped ear tag (Pennsylvania origin market hogs only)
- c. Has been visually inspected for signs of disease prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian
- 4. All breeding swine exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine. Breeding swine must be removed from the exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving and the exhibition premises shall be cleaned and decontaminated prior to the arrival of any other swine in accordance with the following requirements:
- a. A building or pen used to house swine on a fair or exhibition premises shall be kept in a sanitary condition and shall be cleaned and disinfected after removal of each group of swine by fair/show personnel.
- 5. All market swine exhibited shall move direct to slaughter following the exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market.
- 6. All conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials in contact with swine being shipped within or through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for exhibition shall be cleaned and decontaminated in accordance with the following:
- a. A conveyance used for the transportation of swine to fairs and shows shall be cleaned and disinfected by an exhibitor prior to each use and shall be free of visible accumulations of manure.
- 7. Violations/Penalties. Any person violating the requirements of this Order shall be subject to enforcement and penalties as are allowed under the provisions of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2301 et seq.), which include, revocation of license, criminal prosecution and/or civil penalties of up to \$10,000 per violation and injunctive relief.
- 8. No Restriction on Further Action by PDA. This Order shall not be construed as limiting PDA's authority to establish additional quarantine or testing requirements or take any actions otherwise permitted under applicable statute or regulation.

Interstate and International Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements

Recitals

- A. African swine fever is a highly contagious hemorrhagic viral disease affecting domestic and wild swine. There is no treatment for or approved vaccine against ASF. African swine fever virus (ASFV) can be spread by live or dead pigs, domestic or wild, and pork products. Transmission can also occur via contaminated feed and fomites (non-living objects) such as shoes, clothes, vehicles, equipment etc., due to the high environmental resistance of ASFV.
- B. Section 2321 of the Domestic Animal Law (Law) establishes a list of "dangerous transmissible disease" and provides for the designation of additional dangerous transmissible diseases through regulation or temporary order (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321).
- C. African swine fever (ASF) is specifically designated as a dangerous transmissible disease at section 2321(a)(3) of the Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321(a)(3)).
- D. The Domestic Animal Law (Law) (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2301—2389) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), provides the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) broad authority to regulate the keeping and handling of domestic animals to exclude, contain or eliminate dangerous transmissible diseases, such as ASF.
- E. This includes authority, set forth at section 2329 of the Law, to establish and enforce quarantine orders "Whenever a dangerous transmissible disease...exists anywhere within or outside of this Commonwealth..." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(a)).
- F. Section 2329(c) of the Law provides specific authority to establish and enforce an interstate and international quarantine order against "...any place or places outside this Commonwealth for any of the reasons set forth in subsection (a) or where dangerous transmissible diseases...are reported to exist and such order may "...prohibit the bringing of any domestic animals, conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials into this Commonwealth except in accordance with the requirements set forth in the quarantine order..." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(c)).
- G. ASF is found in countries around the world, particularly in sub-Saharan Africa. More recently, it has spread through China, Mongolia and Vietnam. Since August 2018, China has confirmed more than 50 cases of ASF. The disease is also spreading within the European Union (EU), and the virus has reached 10 member states of the EU.
- H. ASF presents serious threats to animal health and the economic vitality of the Commonwealth's swine production industry. Introduction of ASF into the commercial swine herds of this Commonwealth would result in severe economic losses to the infected herd owners as well as loss of valuable National and International trade opportunities for all Pennsylvania's pork producers.
- I. The PDA through this Quarantine Order establishes reasonable requirements to allow for movement of swine and products into and within this Commonwealth for exhibition purposes, while protecting against the introduction of ASF into this Commonwealth's commercial production swine population.

Order of Quarantine:

With the foregoing recitals incorporated into this Order of Quarantine by reference, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) under authority of the Domestic Animal Law, at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(c) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), hereby establishes an Interstate and International Order of Quarantine related to the dangerous transmissible disease African Swine Fever (ASF) and the importation or shipment of swine, alive or dead, and any conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials capable of harboring ASF, into and through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The following terms, requirements and restrictions are hereby established with respect to the exhibition of swine within this Commonwealth:

- 1. Quarantine Area. This Interstate and International Quarantine Order is applicable to all states and territories of the United States and foreign countries and the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and shall be in effect until this Order is specifically rescinded or revised in writing by the PDA.
- 2. *Definitions*. The following terms when used in this Order have the following meanings:

Accredited veterinarian. A licensed veterinarian jointly accredited by APHIS-USDA and the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to perform official duties on behalf of APHIS-USDA or the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to practice veterinary medicine. See accreditation standards established by 9 CFR Parts 160 and 161 (relating to definition of terms; and requirements and standards for accredited veterinarians and suspension or revocation of such accreditation).

- 7. All swine imported into the Commonwealth for exhibition shall meet interstate health requirements established at section 3.131 of PDA's regulations (7 Pa. Code § 3.131).
- 8. Violations and Penalties. Any person violating the requirements of this Quarantine Order shall be subject to enforcement and penalties as are allowed under the provisions of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2301 et seq.), which include, revocation of license, criminal prosecution and/or civil penalties of up to \$10,000 per violation and injunctive relief.
- 9. No Restriction on Further Action by PDA. This Order shall not be construed as limiting the PDA's authority to establish additional quarantine or testing requirements or take any actions otherwise permitted under applicable statute or regulation.

Retention of Engineering Firms for Dam and Hydraulic Structure Design and Analysis; Project Reference No. FDC-500-815

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (Department) is seeking proposals from interested and qualified engineering firms, under open-end contracts, for the engineering design, inspection and related environmental and geotechnical services for dam and hydraulic structure design and analysis projects located on State Parks and State Forests land in this Commonwealth. The contracts will be for a 12-month period with four 12-month extensions possible. Projects will be assigned on an as-needed basis to ensure proper and safe operation of Department infrastructure and facilities.

Letters of Interest for this project will only be accepted from individuals, firms or corporations duly authorized to engage in the practice of engineering. If an individual, firm or corporation not authorized to engage in the practice of engineering desires to submit a Letter of Interest, the individual, firm or corporation may do so as part of a joint venture with an individual, firm or corporation which is permitted under State law to engage in the practice of engineering.

The services may encompass a wide range of civil and structural design efforts with the possibility of several different types of projects being designed under short completion schedules. The anticipated types of projects may include, but are not limited to, dam and control structure modification, rehabilitation and upgrades, slope and stability analysis of concrete and earthen dams, structural analysis of spillways and retaining walls, hydraulic and hydrologic evaluation for existing spillways, proposed dam structure modifications, inspection of dams, and preparation of emergency action plans.

Typically, the engineering firm shall be required to furnish a complete set of contract documents (plans and specifications), suitable for public bid and in accordance with a prescribed Department format, and in accordance with applicable State and Federal codes and requirements. A quality assurance program shall be in place by the engineering firm assuring that all documents are acceptable and of the highest quality prior to submission of said documents to the Department.

Background

Established on July 1, 1995, the Department is charged with maintaining and preserving the 121 State Parks; managing the 2.2 million acres of State Forest land; providing information on the Commonwealth's ecological and geologic resources; and establishing community conservation partnerships with grants and technical assistance to benefit rivers, trails, greenways, local parks and recreation, regional heritage parks, open space and natural areas.

The Bureau of Facility Design and Construction (Bureau) provides multidisciplined facility and infrastructure technical support to the other bureaus in the Department in the areas of project design, project inspections, construction management, contract administration, surveying and other technical advice and consultation. This Bureau is comprised of three Divisions: Dams, Bridges and Roadways Engineering; Environmental Engineering and Architecture; and Field Engineering and Contracts Management.

The Bureau's Central Office (located in Harrisburg) is responsible for the development of architectural, land-scape architectural, water and sanitary, bridge and road-way and civil and environmental projects required to support the Department's facility construction and maintenance program. The Central Office is comprised of five sections: Architectural Design, Landscape Design, Sanitary and Water Management, Bridges and Road Management and Civil Design. In addition to project design, staff also provides technical architectural and engineering support and advice to assist field operation in State Parks and State Forests.

The Bureau also has four field offices: Northcentral Office in Emporium; Western Office in Moraine State Park; Southcentral Office in Shawnee State Park; and Eastern Office in Nockamixon State Park. Each office is responsible for providing direct engineering and technical support to the State Parks and State Forests field operation staff in their area. Staff is responsible for project inspection and construction management to ensure contractor compliance with the construction contract documents as well as some project design.

PART I GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

I-1. Specific Requirements.

The engineering firm may be required to perform any or all of the following duties: attend site visits; prepare minutes; perform necessary field surveys; plot topography and cross sections; develop erosion and sediment control plans; prepare permit applications, prepare type, size and location reports; prepare construction drawings, specifications and estimates; complete field geotechnical investigations; procure core borings; provide soil, foundation and geotechnical investigation engineering reports; investigate utility involvement; evaluate alternatives, using benefit/cost analysis; develop other details and narratives; inspect major and unusual structures; develop rehabilitation strategies; and also, review shop drawings, catalog cuts, submittals and occasional attendance at construction job conferences may be required.

The services anticipated under the contract may include project planning, scoping and programming; budget estimating; site visits; existing facility review, assessment and documenting; perform necessary field surveys; plot topography and cross sections; procure core borings; provide soil, infiltration and foundation engineering reports; investigate utility involvement; evaluate alternatives using benefit/cost analysis; inspect simple, major and un-

usual structures; develop rehabilitation strategies; conceptual design; design development; construction documentation including preparation of drawings and specifications; cost estimating; permit preparation and submission; and construction administration including construction submission review and construction inspection. Permitting services may include 25 Pa. Code Chapters 102 and 105 (relating to erosion and sediment control; and dam safety and waterway management), sanitary permits, National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permits, erosion and sediment control plans, water encroachment plans and storm water management plans.

Areas of related environmental studies associated with these design projects may include, but are not limited to, wetlands, soil, geology 25 Pa. Code Chapters 102 and 105, Army Corps of Engineers 404 permits, Act 537 planning and Department of Environmental Protection water quality management requirements. The environmental studies shall be conducted in accordance with accepted analysis techniques and methodologies and may include any or all of the following in order to ensure a complete environmental investigation has been performed: provide all necessary environmental services, material and equipment necessary to collect, analyze and organize data, assess impacts, prepare reports and design mitigation plans. The reports and other graphic material to be prepared may include, but are not limited to, plans of study, meeting minutes, preparation of permit application documents, mitigation plans and reports, and wetland and floodplain findings.

Projects will be located throughout this Commonwealth. Travel to the project sites will be required. Project assignment will be through individual project Work Orders. The scope of the Work Order may range from full responsibility for all aspects of the design to a collaborative design effort with Department in-house staff where only one or more specific design disciplines are required. Work Orders may be for a single phase or portion of a project such as conceptual design, or for all phases of the entire project. The work shall be identified in the Work Order by a series of tasks that encompass the full scope of the project. The number and description of the tasks will vary based on a project's scope and complexity. A typical Work Order will require formal submissions at the end of the Sketch (10%), Preliminary (50%), Pre-Final (95%) and Final (100%) design stages. Complexity may require more or less submissions for certain projects. The Consultant will be required to develop and maintain a detailed project schedule showing all related project tasks including design phases, submissions, review periods and timelines for required permits. The project schedule shall identify the critical path for completion for the project. A Bureau Project Coordinator will be assigned to each Work Order. The Project Coordinator may change from project to project. A Performance Review may be performed by the Project Coordinator at the completion of the Work Order and used in assigning additional projects to the Consultant.

The Department's standard contract method is multiple prime, design-bid-build, although other nonbid construction methods, including construction by Department staff and volunteer organizations, may be used. The Consultant will be required to prepare construction documents appropriate to the construction method selected by the Department.

The Consultant will be required to submit project data and documents in both written and electronic form. Drawings will be required to comply with the Department's computer aided drafting (CAD) standard. Threedimensional drawings will be expected throughout the design process; and presentation renderings may be required at the completion of design.

I-2. Qualifications. The Consultant shall have staff available to provide rapid services associated with assigned projects. The Consultant may be called upon to provide services on multiple projects at the same time. The Consultant shall have demonstrated knowledge of the building design and construction methods.

The following minimum qualifications will be expected of all Consultants:

- Possess current professional registrations required to perform required services.
- Be licensed to conduct business in this Commonwealth.
- Have sufficient staff or subconsultants experienced in the various required services.
- Have an established quality control (QC) and quality assurance (QA) program for checking documents for accuracy, consistency, coordination, quality and compliance with all necessary codes and regulations.
 - Have design capabilities in digital format (AutoCAD).
- Have the ability to produce 3-dimensional drawings in to further illustrate design intent.
- I-3. Addenda to the Request for Proposals (RFP). If the Department deems it necessary to revise any part of this RFP before the proposal response date, the Issuing Office will post an addendum to the Department web site at https://www.denr.pa.gov/Business/ConstructionBids/Pages/default.aspx. maintenance design and materials. Include a description of how sustainable design is made an integral part of the Consultant's design process.

- A detailed description of the Consultant's QC and QA program, including how subconsultants are included in this program. Describe what steps are taken to assure accurate, fully coordinated construction documents. Provide the name of the person responsible for QC and describe their qualifications to perform this task.
- A description of the Consultant's qualifications to complete the required services. Include firm history and experience on similar projects. Describe the resources of the firm, including number/discipline of personnel, ability to respond to schedule acceleration, and the like. Describe roles and experience of proposed subconsultants.
- Resumes of personnel who will be involved in providing the services described herein to the Department. Describe their relevant experience, years of experience, what roles they will fill in providing the required services and percent of time they will be committing to Department-assigned projects. The resumes must include their professional education and professional registrations and licenses. Provide resumes of subconsultant's personnel.

AGREEMENT

Now, therefore, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, and intending to be legally bound, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Subcontractor Representations</u>. Subcontractor represents and warrants to Contractor as follows:
- (a) Subcontractor is self-certified as a Small Business in accordance with the requirements and procedures established by the Bureau of Diversity, Inclusion and Small Business Opportunities; [Subcontractor is also verified as a Small Diverse Business by the Bureau of Diversity, Inclusion and Small Business Opportunities in accordance with the requirements and procedures established by the Bureau;]
- (b) Subcontractor possesses the necessary knowledge, experience, expertise, capital, resources and personnel required to perform the Services it will provide under this Subcontract;
- (c) Subcontractor (i) is duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of its state of incorporation or organization, (ii) has the power and authority to own its properties and to carry on business as now being conducted, and (iii) has the power to execute and deliver this Subcontract;
- (d) The execution and performance by Subcontractor of the terms and provisions of this Subcontract have been duly authorized by all requisite action, and neither the execution nor the performance of this Subcontract by Subcontractor will violate any provision of law, any order of any court or other agency of government, the organizational documents of Subcontractor or any indenture, agreement or other instrument to which Subcontractor is a party, or by which Subcontractor is bound, or be in conflict with, result in a breach of, or constitute (with due notice or lapse of time or both) a default under, or except as may be provided by this Subcontract, result in the creation or imposition of any lien, charge or encumbrance of any nature whatsoever upon any of the property or assets of Subcontractor pursuant to, any such indenture agreement or instrument;
- (e) Subcontractor has obtained all licenses, permits and approvals required to perform the Services it will provide under this Subcontract; and
- (f) Subcontractor is not under suspension or debarment by the Commonwealth or any other governmental entity, instrumentality or authority.

- 2. <u>Contractor Representations</u>. Contractor represents and warrants to Subcontractor as follows:
- (a) Contractor (i) is duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of its state of incorporation or organization, (ii) has the power and authority to own its properties and to carry on business as now being conducted, and (iii) has the power to execute and deliver this Subcontract;
- (b) The execution and performance by Contractor of the terms and provisions of this Subcontract by Contractor have been duly authorized by all requisite action, and neither the execution nor the performance of this Subcontract will violate any provision of law, any order of any court or other agency of government, the organizational documents of Contractor or any indenture, agreement or other instrument to which Contractor is a party, or by which Contractor is bound, or be in conflict with, result in a breach of, or constitute (with due notice or lapse of time or both) a default under, or except as may be provided by this Subcontract, result in the creation or imposition of any lien, charge or encumbrance of any nature whatsoever upon any of the property or assets of Contractor pursuant to, any such indenture agreement or instrument;
- (c) Contractor has obtained all licenses, permits and approvals required to perform the Services to be provided by Contractor under the Prime Contract; and
- (d) Contractor is not under suspension or debarment by the Commonwealth or any other governmental entity, instrumentality or authority.
- 3. Relationship of the Parties. The provisions of this Subcontract are not intended to create, nor shall be deemed or construed to create, any joint venture, partnership or other relationship between Contractor and Subcontractor, other than that of independent entities contracting with each other solely for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Subcontract. Neither of the Parties to this Subcontract, nor any of their respective employees, agents, or other representatives, shall be construed to be the agent, employee or representative of the other party. Neither party shall have the authority to bind the other party, nor shall a party be responsible for the acts or omissions of the other party, unless otherwise stated in this Subcontract. Similarly, the Parties expressly acknowledge that neither the Contractor nor the Subcontractor is an agent, employee or representative of the Commonwealth and each party covenants not to represent itself accordingly.

4. Prime Contract Flow-Down.

- (a) General. This agreement is a subcontract under the Prime Contract and all provisions of the Prime Contract and any amendments thereto applicable to the Services being performed by the Subcontractor shall extend to and be binding upon the Parties as part of this Subcontract.
- (b) Specific. The Parties agree to comply with the following provisions of the Prime Contract, which are incorporated herein by reference:

- (1) The Americans with Disabilities Act Provisions.
- (2) Nondiscrimination/Sexual Harassment Clause.
- (3) Contractor Integrity Provisions.
- (4) Contractor Responsibility Provisions.
- (c) Termination. Should the Prime Contract be terminated pursuant to the terms and conditions provided in the Procurement, such termination shall have the same effect on this Subcontract. Payment for Services provided as of the date of termination must be made in accordance with the Section 13 of this Subcontract.
- (d) Audit Provisions. The Commonwealth shall have the right, at reasonable times and at a site designated by the Commonwealth, to audit the books, documents, and records of the Parties to the extent that the books, documents, and records relate to the Parties' compliance with the provisions set forth in subsection (b) above or to the Small Diverse Business or Small Business Commitment effectuated through this Subcontract. The Parties shall preserve such books, documents, and records for a period of three years from the date of final payment hereunder. The Parties shall give full and free access to all such records to the Commonwealth and/or its authorized representatives.
- 5. <u>Order of Precedence</u>. The Letter of Intent, Procurement and Prime Contract are incorporated herein by reference into this Subcontract. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency among the individual components of this Subcontract, such conflict or inconsistency shall be resolved by observing the following order of precedence:
 - (a) This Subcontract;
 - (b) The Letter of Intent;
 - (c) The Prime Contract; and
 - (d) The Procurement.
- 6. <u>Further Action</u>. Neither party will incur any liability to the other if its performance of any obligation under this Subcontract is prevented or delayed by causes beyond its control and without the fault or negligence of either party. Causes beyond a party's control may include, but are not limited to, acts of God or war, changes in controlling law, regulations, orders or the requirements of any governmental entity, severe weather conditions, civil disorders, natural disasters, fire, epidemic and quarantines, general strikes throughout the trade, and freight embargoes. The existence of such causes beyond a party's control shall extend the period for performance to such extent as may be necessary to enable complete performance in the exercise of reasonable diligence after the causes have been removed.

17. <u>Dispute Resolution</u>.

Retention of Firms for Design Review Services; Project Reference No. FDC-500-816

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (Department) is seeking proposals from interested and qualified professional firms for open-end contracts for design submission and document review of various environmental, civil, architectural and site development projects located on State Park and State Forest land in this Commonwealth. Each contract will be for a 12-month period with four 12-month extensions possible. Projects will be assigned on an as-needed basis to ensure proper and safe operation of Department infrastructure and facilities.

The number of open-end contracts and the dollar amount of each contract shall be at the discretion of the Department for the first year. The extent of the work for the subsequent 4 years of the contract will be dependent on the availability of additional funds and additional projects for those years, also at the discretion of the Department.

Letters of Interest for this project will be accepted from individuals or firms or corporations duly authorized to engage in the practice of engineering or architecture, or both. If an individual, firm or corporation not authorized to engage in the practice of engineering or architecture, or both, desires to submit a Letter of Interest, the individual, firm or corporation may do so as part of a joint venture with an individual, firm or corporation which is permitted under State law to engage in the practice of engineering or architecture, or both, in this Commonwealth, or must specifically employ professionals licensed in this Commonwealth to perform and oversee the required services.

Background

Established on July 1, 1995, the Department is charged with maintaining and preserving the 121 State Parks; managing the 2.2 million acres of State Forest land; providing information on the Commonwealth's ecological and geologic resources; and establishing community conservation partnerships with grants and technical assistance to benefit rivers, trails, greenways, local parks and recreation, regional heritage parks, open space and natural areas.

The Bureau of Facility Design and Construction (Bureau) provides multidisciplined facility and infrastructure technical support to the other bureaus in the Department in the areas of project design, project inspections, construction management, contract administration, surveying and other technical advice and consultation. This Bureau is comprised of three Divisions: Dams, Bridges and Roadways Engineering; Environmental Engineering and Architecture; and Field Engineering and Contracts Management.

The Bureau's Central Office (located in Harrisburg) is responsible for the development of architectural, land-scape architectural, water and sanitary, bridge and road-way and civil and environmental projects required to support the Department's facility construction and maintenance program. The Central Office is comprised of five sections: Architectural Design, Landscape Design, Sanitary and Water Management, Bridges and Road Management and Civil Design. In addition to project design, staff also provides technical architectural and engineering support and advice to assist field operation in State Parks and State Forests.

The Bureau also has four field offices: Northcentral Office in Emporium; Western Office in Moraine State Park; Southcentral Office in Shawnee State Park; and Eastern Office in Nockamixon State Park. Each office is responsible for providing direct engineering and technical support to the State Parks and Forests field operation staff in their area. Staff is responsible for project inspection and construction management to ensure contractor compliance with the construction contract documents as well as some project design.

PART I GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

I-1. Specific Requirements. The open-ended design review services work will include design submission and document review for projects involving the replacement, rehabilitation/repair or new construction of a wide range of facilities located in State Parks and State Forests throughout this Commonwealth, including, but not limited to: roads; bridges; dams; water and sewer systems and treatment facilities; site/land development; buildings of various types including associated architectural, site, civil, landscape, structural, mechanical, plumbing and electrical disciplines. And may occasionally include review of other related engineering work such as environmental and wetland assessments, environmental studies, environmental permitting, and other civil/environmental engineering related work as assigned by the Department. Estimated size of projects will generally range from \$300,000 to \$6 million in total construction cost.

The services anticipated under the contract may include review of design and construction documents at various stages of the project, review of documents for quality control (QC) purposes, review of documents for constructability, value engineering reviews, review of construction cost estimates, review of project schedules, review of construction submittals and review of change order proposals.

Project assignment will be through individual project Work Orders. A Bureau Coordinator will be assigned to each Work Order. The Bureau Coordinator may change from project to project. The Bureau Coordinator will be the primary coordinator of the project and will perform reviews related to design aesthetic, scope compliance, operational controls and maintainability. A Performance Review may be performed by the Project Coordinator at the completion of the Work Order and used in assigning additional projects to the Consultant.

The Department's standard contract method is multiple prime, design-bid-build, although other nonbid construction methods, including construction by Department staff and volunteer organizations, may be used.

I-2. Qualifications. The Consultant shall have staff available to provide rapid services associated with assigned projects. The Consultant may be called upon to provide services on multiple projects at the same time. The Consultant shall have demonstrated knowledge of the building design and construction methods, construction document preparation, construction estimating and Quality Assurance (QA)/QC review.

The following minimum qualification will be expected of all Consultants:

 - o Building Design Services: \$7 million
 - o Information Technology Goods and Services: \$25 million

- 2. All SDB and SB subcontractors credited by BDISBO must perform at least 50% of the work subcontracted to them.
- **3.** The individual percentage commitments made to SDBs and SBs cannot be altered without written approval from BDISBO.
- **4.** SDB and SB commitments must be maintained in the event the contract is assigned to another prime contractor.
- 5. The selected Offeror and each SDB and SB for which a commitment was credited by BDISBO must submit a final, definitive subcontract agreement signed by the selected Offeror and the SDB and/or SB to BDISBO within 30 days of the final execution date of the Commonwealth contract. - **b)** The fixed percentage commitment and associated estimated dollar value that each SDB and/or SB will receive based on the final negotiated cost for the initial term of the prime contract.
- c) Payment terms indicating that the SDB and/or SB will be paid for work satisfactorily completed within 14 days of the selected Offeror's receipt of payment from the Commonwealth for such work.
- **d)** Commercially reasonable terms for the applicable business/industry that are no less favorable than the terms of the selected Offeror's contract with the Commonwealth and that do not place disproportionate risk on the SDB and/or SB relative to the nature and level of the SDB's and/or SB's participation in the project.
- **6.** If the selected Offeror and a SDB or SB credited by BDISBO cannot agree upon a definitive subcontract within 30 days of the final execution date of the Commonwealth contract, the selected Offeror must notify BDISBO.
- 7. The Selected Offeror shall complete the Prime Contractor's Quarterly Utilization Report and submit it to the contracting officer of the Issuing Office and BDISBO within ten (10) business days at the end of each quarter of the contract term and any subsequent options or renewals. This information will be used to track and confirm the actual dollar amount paid to SDB and SB subcontractors and suppliers and will serve as a record of fulfillment of the the contractual commitment. If there was no activity during the quarter, the form must be completed by stating "No activity in this quarter." A late fee of \$100.00 per day may be assessed against the Selected Offeror if the Utilization Report is not submitted in accordance with the schedule above.
- **8.** The Selected Offeror shall notify the Contracting Officer of the Issuing Office and BDISBO when circumstances arise that may negatively impact the selected Offeror's ability to comply with SDB and/or SB commitments and to provide a corrective action plan. Disputes will be decided by the Issuing Office and DGS.
- 9. If the Selected Offeror fails to satisfy its SDB and/or SB commitment(s), it may be subject to a range of sanctions BDISBO deems appropriate. Such sanctions include, but are not limited to, one or more of the following: a determination that the selected Offeror is not responsible under the Contractor Responsibility Program; withholding of payments; suspension or termination of the contract together with consequential damages; revocation of the selected Offeror's SDB and/or SB status; and/or suspension or debarment from future contracting opportunities with the Commonwealth.

AGREEMENT

Now, therefore, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, and intending to be legally bound, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Subcontractor Representations</u>. Subcontractor represents and warrants to Contractor as follows:
- (a) Subcontractor is self-certified as a Small Business in accordance with the requirements and procedures established by the Bureau of Diversity, Inclusion and Small Business Opportunities; [Subcontractor is also verified as a Small Diverse Business by the Bureau of Diversity, Inclusion and Small Business Opportunities in accordance with the requirements and procedures established by the Bureau;]
- (b) Subcontractor possesses the necessary knowledge, experience, expertise, capital, resources and personnel required to perform the Services it will provide under this Subcontract;
- (c) Subcontractor (i) is duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of its state of incorporation or organization, (ii) has the power and authority to own its properties and to carry on business as now being conducted, and (iii) has the power to execute and deliver this Subcontract;
- (d) The execution and performance by Subcontractor of the terms and provisions of this Subcontract have been duly authorized by all requisite action, and neither the execution nor the performance of this Subcontract by Subcontractor will violate any provision of law, any order of any court or other agency of government, the organizational documents of Subcontractor or any indenture, agreement or other instrument to which Subcontractor is a party, or by which Subcontractor is bound, or be in conflict with, result in a breach of, or constitute (with due notice or lapse of time or both) a default under, or except as may be provided by this Subcontract, result in the creation or imposition of any lien, charge or encumbrance of any nature whatsoever upon any of the property or assets of Subcontractor pursuant to, any such indenture agreement or instrument;
- (e) Subcontractor has obtained all licenses, permits and approvals required to perform the Services it will provide under this Subcontract; and
- (f) Subcontractor is not under suspension or debarment by the Commonwealth or any other governmental entity, instrumentality or authority.

- 2. <u>Contractor Representations</u>. Contractor represents and warrants to Subcontractor as follows:
- (a) Contractor (i) is duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of its state of incorporation or organization, (ii) has the power and authority to own its properties and to carry on business as now being conducted, and (iii) has the power to execute and deliver this Subcontract;
- (b) The execution and performance by Contractor of the terms and provisions of this Subcontract by Contractor have been duly authorized by all requisite action, and neither the execution nor the performance of this Subcontract will violate any provision of law, any order of any court or other agency of government, the organizational documents of Contractor or any indenture, agreement or other instrument to which Contractor is a party, or by which Contractor is bound, or be in conflict with, result in a breach of, or constitute (with due notice or lapse of time or both) a default under, or except as may be provided by this Subcontract, result in the creation or imposition of any lien, charge or encumbrance of any nature whatsoever upon any of the property or assets of Contractor pursuant to, any such indenture agreement or instrument;
- (c) Contractor has obtained all licenses, permits and approvals required to perform the Services to be provided by Contractor under the Prime Contract; and
- (d) Contractor is not under suspension or debarment by the Commonwealth or any other governmental entity, instrumentality or authority.
- 3. Relationship of the Parties. The provisions of this Subcontract are not intended to create, nor shall be deemed or construed to create, any joint venture, partnership or other relationship between Contractor and Subcontractor, other than that of independent entities contracting with each other solely for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Subcontract. Neither of the Parties to this Subcontract, nor any of their respective employees, agents, or other representatives, shall be construed to be the agent, employee or representative of the other party. Neither party shall have the authority to bind the other party, nor shall a party be responsible for the acts or omissions of the other party, unless otherwise stated in this Subcontract. Similarly, the Parties expressly acknowledge that neither the Contractor nor the Subcontractor is an agent, employee or representative of the Commonwealth and each party covenants not to represent itself accordingly.

4. Prime Contract Flow-Down.

- (a) General. This agreement is a subcontract under the Prime Contract and all provisions of the Prime Contract and any amendments thereto applicable to the Services being performed by the Subcontractor shall extend to and be binding upon the Parties as part of this Subcontract.
- (b) Specific. The Parties agree to comply with the following provisions of the Prime Contract, which are incorporated herein by reference:

- (1) The Americans with Disabilities Act Provisions.
- (2) Nondiscrimination/Sexual Harassment Clause.
- (3) Contractor Integrity Provisions.
- (4) Contractor Responsibility Provisions.
- (c) Termination. Should the Prime Contract be terminated pursuant to the terms and conditions provided in the Procurement, such termination shall have the same effect on this Subcontract. Payment for Services provided as of the date of termination must be made in accordance with the Section 13 of this Subcontract.
- (d) Audit Provisions. The Commonwealth shall have the right, at reasonable times and at a site designated by the Commonwealth, to audit the books, documents, and records of the Parties to the extent that the books, documents, and records relate to the Parties' compliance with the provisions set forth in subsection (b) above or to the Small Diverse Business or Small Business Commitment effectuated through this Subcontract. The Parties shall preserve such books, documents, and records for a period of three years from the date of final payment hereunder. The Parties shall give full and free access to all such records to the Commonwealth and/or its authorized representatives.
- 5. <u>Order of Precedence</u>. The Letter of Intent, Procurement and Prime Contract are incorporated herein by reference into this Subcontract. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency among the individual components of this Subcontract, such conflict or inconsistency shall be resolved by observing the following order of precedence:
 - (a) This Subcontract;
 - (b) The Letter of Intent;
 - (c) The Prime Contract; and
 - (d) The Procurement.
- 6. <u>Further Action</u>. The Parties shall take such actions and complete, execute and deliver any and all documents or instruments necessary to carry out the terms and provisions of this Subcontract, to effectuate the purpose of this Subcontract, and to fulfill the obligations of each party hereunder.
- 7. <u>Description of Services</u>. Subcontractor will perform the following Services for the Contractor which Contractor is obligated to provide to the Commonwealth under the Prime Contract:

This information will be used to determine the actual dollar amount paid to Subcontractor and will also serve as a record of fulfillment of Contractor's Small Diverse Business and Small Business Commitments. If there was no activity during the quarter, then the form must be completed by stating "No activity in this quarter." A late fee of \$100.00 per day may be assessed against the Contractor if its Utilization Report is not submitted in accordance with the schedule above.

- 15. <u>Change Orders.</u> If the Commonwealth issues any change order or other formal contract instrument either expanding or limiting the work to be performed under the Prime Contract, the Parties shall accept such Change Orders. Contractor agrees to provide Subcontractor with written notice of any such change orders that affect the Services to be provided by the Subcontractor hereunder as soon as practical after Contractor receives such notice. Any resulting increase or decrease in the Services, Small Diverse Business or Small Business Commitment provided for in Paragraphs 7 or 8 above must be in writing, mutually agreed to, and signed by both Parties and communicated to the Bureau. If the Parties are unable to reach an agreement regarding any adjustment to the Services, Small Diverse Business or Small Business Commitment necessitated by a Commonwealth Change Order, the Parties must submit the matter in writing to the Bureau which will make a recommendation to the Contracting Officer regarding a course of action.
- 16. Force Majeure. Neither party will incur any liability to the other if its performance of any obligation under this Subcontract is prevented or delayed by causes beyond its control and without the fault or negligence of either party. Causes beyond a party's control may include, but are not limited to, acts of God or war, changes in controlling law, regulations, orders or the requirements of any governmental entity, severe weather conditions, civil disorders, natural disasters, fire, epidemic and quarantines, general strikes throughout the trade, and freight embargoes. The existence of such causes beyond a party's control shall extend the period for performance to such extent as may be necessary to enable complete performance in the exercise of reasonable diligence after the causes have been removed.

17. <u>Dispute Resolution</u>.

- (a) The Parties will attempt to resolve any dispute arising out of or relating to this Subcontract through friendly negotiations.

LAND RECYCLING AND **ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION**

> **UNDER ACT 2, 1995** PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.907).

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) (35 P.S. §§ 6026.302—6026.305) require the Department to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. A person intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard or intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area shall file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one or a combination of cleanup standards or receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

Code §§ 129.96—129.100, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (the Department) has made a preliminary determination to approve an alternate Reasonably Available Control Technology (RACT II) plan and seeks approval of an amendment to the State Implementation Plan (SIP) for the plastics manufacturing facility owned and operated by Haysite Reinforced Plastics, LLC, in Millcreek Township, Erie County. And in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.521, the Department of Environmental Protection intends to re-issue a Title V Operating Permit for the facility. The facility is located at 5599 Perry Highway, Erie, PA 16509. The facility's repre-

sentative to contact concerning this application is Heather Ravenscroft, Environmental Compliance Manager.

The proposed SIP revision does not adopt any new regulations. It incorporates the provisions and requirements contained in the amended RACT II approval for the facility, which are intended to satisfy the requirements for the 1997 National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) and the 2008 NAAQS for ozone.

The proposed amendments to the RACT II determination, if finally approved, will be incorporated into the revised operating permit for the facility. The relevant RACT II requirements will be submitted to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as a revision to Pennsylvania's SIP and will remain in effect until replaced pursuant to 40 CFR 51 and approval by the EPA. Requirements that are not part of the RACT II determination will be excluded from the SIP submittal; this includes the provisions of the Department's presumptive RACT II requirements in accordance with 25 Pa. Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES)

Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests or petitions for a public hearing on NPDES permit applications, as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92a.82(d). The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30 days of this public notice and contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request, and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. A public hearing may be held if the Department considers the public interest significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing on the NPDES permit application will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. When a public hearing is held, the Department will consider comments from the public hearing in the final determination on the NPDES permit application.

Availability of Amendments to the Office of Developmental Programs' Consolidated, Community Living and Person/Family Directed Support Waivers

The Department of Human Services (Department) is making available for public review and comment the Office of Developmental Programs' proposed amendments to the Consolidated, Community Living and Person/Family Directed Support (P/FDS) waivers.

Background

Whenever substantive changes are made to an approved waiver, the Department must submit an amendment to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services for approval. The Department proposes to amend the Consolidated, Community Living and P/FDS waivers effective October 1, 2019, as follows:

- Increase the number of individuals served in the Consolidated and Community Living waivers as provided for in the Governor's proposed budget to support more people in the community.
- Adds planning requirements for Administrative Entities to address access to needed waiver services upon graduation to individuals who will graduate from special education and who are not eligible to continue their education through the next year.
- Provide for support of children with medical needs who transition from a facility that does not meet waiver home and community-based settings requirements to live with their families or, if living with their family is not possible, in the home of another nurturing caregiver.
- Increase community participation of waiver participants through changes in service definitions, such as the addition of an on-call and remote support component to the Community Participation Support service and clarification as to where newly enrolled licensed facilities can be located.
- Increase competitive integrated employment of waiver participants by allowing Supported Employment services to be provided when a waiver participant has received an offer of competitive integrated employment and the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation has not made an eligibility determination at that time and by clarifying where Advanced Supported Employment services can be provided.
- Develop and support qualified staff by extending the timeframe by which requirements for employment credentials or certificates must be obtained to July 1, 2019, for Supported Employment, Small Group Employment and the prevocational component of the Community Participation Support service.
- Promote health, wellness and safety by clarifying that Supports Coordinators should review information in health risk screening tools when applicable and determine whether there have been any changes in orders, plans or medical interventions prescribed or recommended by medical or behavioral professionals when Supports Coordinators monitor a waiver participant's health and safety and develop Individual Support Plans.
- Clarify the role direct service professionals perform through Communication Specialist services.

Fiscal Impact

It is anticipated that there will be an additional cost of \$30.412 million (\$15.003 million in State Funds) to the Commonwealth in Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-2020 and an annualized cost of \$60.823 million (\$29.429 million in State Funds) in FY 2020-2021 and subsequent years to serve additional participants in the waivers. The amount of funding available for this program is dependent upon the funds appropriated by the General Assembly for the

forthcoming fiscal year; therefore, until a budget bill is passed and enacted, the fiscal impact is estimated.

Project Description: This is a sanitary sewer project within Adams Township, Cambria County. The Forest Hills Municipal Authority (FHMA) South of Salix Sanitary Sewer Extension Project is anticipated to install approximately 23,000 linear feet of gravity fed sanitary collection line, 200 linear feet of low-pressure sanitary line, approximately 1,900 linear feet of force main, 93 manholes, 8 cleanouts, 3 grinder pumps, and corresponding appurtenances along portions of Peaceful Valley Road, Krayn Road, Old Luther Street, Beech Street, Hemlock Street and Oak Street. In addition, the proposed project includes the construction of a pump station and an associated electrical upgrade necessary to pump sewage from the new collection system to the existing gravity system in Salix. Flows from the project are then anticipated to be transported and treated by the FHMA South Fork Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant which has a design capacity of approximately 1.2 million gallons per day (mgd). Based on historic average daily flows received at the plant, there is more than enough reserve capacity available to accommodate additional flows upon project completion.

Problem Description: Adams Township residents in the Luther/Salix Airport development area and along a portion of Peaceful Valley Road currently do not have access to public sewer service and rely on onlot systems for sewer treatment. A number of these onlot systems have started to show signs of failure and are increasingly becoming an environmental and public health concern. In order to address this issue, the FHMA has planned to extend the municipal sanitary sewer collection system from Salix to the Salix Airport development and a portion of Peaceful Valley Road. The proposed project is anticipated to provide 145 residential homes access to public sanitary sewer service, thus eliminating the requisite use of onlot systems within the project area.

Eliminating the non-compliant wastewater treatment facility will provide environmental benefits by reducing nitrogen loading to the Susquehanna River.

Problem Description: The existing water treatment building is uninhabitable due to structural issues, roof collapse and mold. The new building will provide a secure location for the relocation of the liquid chlorination system, instrumentation, an office for personnel and garage space for equipment maintenance. The existing water storage reservoir is over 90 years old and experiences leakage, has corroded steel roof supports which allow air borne debris to enter and the existing valves are inoperable. Also, the existing reservoir is at the end of the runway at the Corry Regional Airport, directly in the flight path; therefore, the Federal Aviation Administration has requested the reservoir be relocated outside of the airport runway flight path. The new tanks, one 2.9 mg or two 1.45 mg, bid dependent, will address all existing deficiencies. The existing storage reservoir will be demolished following tanks construction. The existing booster

stations, consisting of manholes, are equipped with only one pump per station and do not have standby power, are unsafe and unreliable. Each new booster station will be housed in a building equipped with two pumps for redundancy plus a jockey pump and standby electric generator.

Problem Description: The Marion Center area has no public water and minimal fire protection. The Marion Center High School operates its own treatment system that is antiquated and has lead, copper and bacteria issues. The Spirit Life Area, which includes a drug rehabilitation facility, experiences poor/low water quality. The current Plumville water treatment plant consists of a well that is chlorinated by sodium hypochlorite and provides no treatment for secondary contaminants. Recent raw water quality testing shows an upward trend in iron and manganese levels in the well. This project proposes the addition of a greensand filtration system for iron and manganese removal.

Code § 54.40(a) state that an Electric Generation Supplier (EGS) license will not be issued or remain in force until the licensee furnishes a bond or other security approved by the Commission. In addition, 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(d) states that the maintenance of an EGS license is contingent on the licensee providing proof to the Commission that a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission has been obtained.

Each EGS must file an original bond, letter of credit, continuation certificate, amendment, or other approved financial instrument with Rosemary Chiavetta, Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, 400 North Street, Harrisburg, PA 17120 prior to the EGS's current security expiration date. Each financial instrument must be an original document that displays a "wet" signature or digital signature, preferable in blue ink, and displays a "raised seal" or original notary stamp. The name of the principal on the original financial instrument must match exactly with the name that appears on the EGS's license issued by the Commission.

Failure to file before the financial security's expiration date may cause Commission staff to initiate a formal proceeding that may lead to the following: cancellation of each company's electric supplier license, removal of each company's information from the Commission's website and notification to all electric distribution companies, in which each company is licensed to do business, of the cancellation of the license.

As of May 14, 2019, each EGS listed in the Supplier Table below has not provided proof to the Commission that it has a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission, to replace its expired bond.

None of the companies listed in the Supplier Table provided the required documentation.

Based on the above facts, we tentatively conclude that the EGSs listed in the Supplier Table are not in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) and (d) and therefore it is appropriate to initiate the cancellation process for the EGS license of each company listed in the Supplier Table, without the necessity of a formal complaint, as being in the public interest; *Therefore*,

- 3. Absent the filing of adverse public comment or the filing of an approved security within 30 days after publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin, the Bureau of Technical Utility Services shall prepare a Final Order for entry by the Secretary.
- 4. Upon entry of the Final Order described in Ordering Paragraph No. 3 above, each company listed in the Supplier Table will be stricken from all active utility lists maintained by the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Administration, removed from the Commission's website, and notifications be sent to all electric distribution companies in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do business.

Order

By the Commission:

On November 2, 2018, YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom (TerraCom) filed a Petition to Amend its Eligible Telecommunications Carrier (ETC) designation to expand its existing wireless Lifeline-only ETC service throughout the Commonwealth for purposes of low income support from the federal universal service fund (USF) mechanism. In its Petition, TerraCom contends that the extension of its ETC designation will provide additional Pennsylvanians with a valuable, low-cost alternative to traditional landline service. The Petition was published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin on April 20, 2019 at 49 Pa.B. 1973. No Comments were filed in response to this Petition.

We have reviewed TerraCom's Petition as supplemented and determined that it continues to meet the statutory and applicable minimum standards necessary under state and federal law to expand its service territory to provide wireless Lifeline-only ETC service throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Specifically, TerraCom has previously satisfied and continues to satisfy all requirements for limited ETC designation as required by Section 214 of the Act, the Federal Communication Commission's (FCC) regulations, Section 3019(f) of the Public Utility Code³ and the Commission's orders on ETC designation. We hereby conclude that it is in the public interest to designate TerraCom as a statewide ETC thereby permitting TerraCom to receive federal USF support for providing Lifeline service to eligible low-income customers or households throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Background

A. FCC and State ETC Orders

In 2005, the Federal Communication Commission, in the Matter of Federal-State Joint Board on Universal Service, First Report and Order, CC Docket No. 96-45, 20 FCC Rcd 6371 (First Universal Service Report and Order or 2005 ETC Order) addressed the minimum requirements4 for a telecommunications carrier to be designated as an ETC, and thus eligible to receive federal USF support. Specifically, consistent with the recommendations of the Federal-State Joint Board on Universal Service (Joint Board), the FCC adopted additional mandatory requirements for ETC designation proceedings in accordance with Section 214(e)(6) of the federal Communications Act of 1934, as amended (Act). Additionally, as recommended by the Joint Board, the FCC encouraged states that exercise jurisdiction over ETC designations to adopt these same requirements when deciding whether a common carrier should be designated as an ETC.

Accordingly, on August 2, 2010, the Commission entered its order adopting the Final Policy Statement on Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Guidelines for Designation and Annual Recertification as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier (ETC) for Purposes of Federal Universal Service Support at Docket No. M-2010-2164741 (ETC Guidelines Order), which codifies the guidelines at 52 Pa. Code § 69.2501 (ETC Guidelines). By Secretarial Letter dated September 10, 2010, the Commission notified all carriers and interested parties on pending ETC petitions of the newly adopted ETC guidelines and invited carriers to supplement their petitions, consistent with the guidelines.

Subsequently, the FCC has issued several orders affecting pending petitions for ETC designation in Pennsylvania.⁵ Significantly, the FCC's recent order, Lifeline and Link Up Reform and Modernization, et al., Report and Order and Further Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, WC Dkt. Nos. 11-42 et al., FCC 12-11 (rel. Feb. 6, 2012) (Lifeline Reform Order), directly affects all pending ETC petitions before this Commission. Thus, our review of TerraCom's Petition will be performed consistent with the FCC's recent Lifeline Reform Order and amended federal regulations governing ETC status, which we have adopted and implemented in the Commonwealth as the minimum standards applicable to ETC designation. All minimum federal requirements of the FCC's Lifeline Reform Order not expressly discussed herein are nonetheless applicable to ETC designation in Pennsylvania. This Commission continues to reserve its right to impose separate statespecific requirements where necessary for the protection of the Commonwealth's consumers.

Concomitantly, in order to continue the mission of assisting qualifying low-income Americans to get and stay connected in today's technological climate, while at the same time relieving some of the burden on the entities providing this service, the FCC also had begun restructuring the federal USF Lifeline program.⁶ In its 2012 Lifeline Reform Order, the FCC eliminated the previous system of tiered support and set an interim funding rate

of \$9.25 per month and per eligible subscriber or household effective May 1, $2012.^7$ The FCC has issued three later Lifeline reform orders establishing a number of additional enhancements to the federal Lifeline Program, further connecting low-income Americans to voice services and, now, broadband.8

By Commission Order entered October 14, 2011, YourTel America, Inc. (YourTel), a wireless carrier, was granted approval to provide Lifeline-only ETC service in the service territories of Verizon Pennsylvania, LLC (Verizon PA) and Verizon North, LLC (Verizon North).9 By letter dated October 15, 2015, YourTel notified the Commission that effective November 30, 2015, it would complete an internal corporate reorganization whereby it would become a wholly-owned subsidiary of TerraCom, Inc. YourTel filed this notice in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 69.601, which requires Pennsylvania ETCs to petition the Commission for renewal of ETC designation in the event of a change in corporate control. 10 The letter stated that the reorganization would not result in any substantial change to the corporate management of YourTel and would not have an adverse impact on any of its Lifeline service offerings.

On September 19, 2016, YourTel filed a Petition for Waiver¹¹ of the obligation to petition for renewal of its ETC designation, reiterating that the stock purchase agreement involved a change in ownership at the parent company level only and did not directly affect YourTel as YourTel will continue to be an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of TerraCom and would continue to be the operating company and the ETC. The only change noticeable to customers would be the name change, as YourTel would do business under the name TerraCom.

By Order entered December 8, 2016, the Commission granted YourTel's Petition for Waiver. The Commission determined that the circumstances of YourTel's case did not warrant requiring YourTel to file a petition seeking a new ETC designation. The Commission reasoned that the transaction resulting in the change of ownership at the corporate parent of YourTel: (1) did not substantially impact the ETC's corporate management; (2) did not adversely impact the ETC's provision of Lifeline service to its Pennsylvania customers. 12

B. TerraCom's Petition and Supplements

In the instant Petition, TerraCom asserts that it has operated as a wireless Lifeline-only ETC providing wireless service in its current service territories in accordance with all state and federal regulations since 2011.¹³ A

review of Commission records revealed that TerraCom was not the subject of any consumer or Commissioninitiated complaints.

Finally, in its Petition, TerraCom asserts that expansion of its ETC designation will make Lifeline available to many more eligible Pennsylvania residents or households. TerraCom explains that since its 2011 ETC designation, it has expanded its service offering by presenting new and unique plans as it expands and invests in Pennsylvania. Pursuant to its Designation Order, TerraCom has notified the Commission regarding these additions, changes and/or new offerings that are in addition to its Lifeline offerings and will continue to do so. 14 TerraCom states that it is committed to investing in Pennsylvania and the infrastructure necessary to serve Pennsylvania customers. 15

The Commission notes that this is the first Petition filed by an existing ETC to expand its limited ETC designation service area to provide wireless Lifeline service on a statewide basis. We take note that in 2010, this Commission granted Virgin Mobile USA, L.P.'s ETC Petition to provide statewide wireless Lifeline services in Pennsylvania. 16 The Commission also notes that the legal standard for an ETC designation is the same whether an ETC Petitioner is seeking statewide designation or territory-specific designation. That standard is whether an ETC Petitioner meets the statutory criteria and applicable minimum standards necessary under federal and state law to obtain ETC designation. The request for statewide or limited ETC designation is simply based upon the Petitioner's business plan and in what ILEC territories it seeks to obtain an ETC designation.

Discussion

In reviewing ETC Petitions, the Commission's usual course of business is to address whether the Petitioner satisfies the applicable federal and state criteria including the financial and technical ability to provide the services and functionalities supported by the universal service programs. We emphasize that TerraCom is an existing Lifeline-only ETC and is currently providing Lifeline service to customers in Pennsylvania. We further emphasize that this Commission previously found TerraCom to be financially and technically fit to provide Lifeline service in the Commonwealth. Also, there is no evidence that the Petitioner has substantial quality of service concerns or issues with waste, fraud, and abuse surrounding its participation in the Lifeline program. With that in mind, we now review TerraCom's petition to expand its Lifeline service offerings throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

I. TerraCom Satisfies Federal Requirements for **Statewide ETC Designation**

A. TerraCom Satisfies the Requirements of 47 U.S.C. § 214(e)

Section 214(e)(1) of the Act provides that applicants for ETC designation must be common carriers that will offer all of the services supported by the federal USF either using their own facilities or a combination of their own facilities and the resale of another carrier's services. Applicants must also commit to advertise the availability and rates of service.

Section 153(10) of the Act defines a common carrier as "any person engaged as a common carrier for hire, in interstate or foreign communications by wire or radio..."17 The FCC has determined on numerous occasions that providers of mobile wireless services shall be treated as common carriers for regulatory purposes. As a provider of wireless telecommunications services, TerraCom is a common carrier. Additionally, TerraCom has been providing Lifeline services as a designated ETC since 2011. TerraCom is also in compliance with the advertising requirements. TerraCom continues to advertise the availability of its Lifeline services using media of general circulation. And TerraCom continues to provide BCS with copies of its advertising, promotional and general Lifeline program-related customer notices and communications. 18

B. TerraCom Satisfies the Requirements of FCC Rules and Orders Governing ETC Designations

1. 47 CFR § 54.101

TerraCom attests that it currently provides all of the services and functionalities supported by the federal universal service program as set forth in Section 54.101(a) of the FCC's regulations throughout its designated service territory in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Commission concludes that, as an existing Lifeline provider in good standing, TerraCom satisfies this requirement. Petition at p. 3.

a. Voice Grade Access to the Public Switched Telephone Network

TerraCom provides voice grade access to the public switched telephone network (PSTN) and offers its customers services for connection to the PSTN at band width rates that comply with FCC's regulations. 19 Petition at p. 3. The Commission concludes that, as an existing Lifeline provider in good standing, TerraCom satisfies this requirement.

b. Minutes of Use for Local Service

As part of the voice grade access to the PSTN, an ETC must provide local calling services to its customers at no additional charge. The FCC has determined that a carrier satisfies the local usage requirements when it offers customers rate plans containing varying amounts of local usage.²⁰ Pursuant to 54.408, effective December 1, 2018, the minimum service standard for mobile voice is 1,000 minutes.21

TerraCom is an existing ETC that continues to comply with the requirement of offering local calling plans as well as providing its Lifeline customers with access to a variety of other features including voice mail, caller I.D., call waiting services, and enhanced 911 (E911) capabilities and directory assistance. Petition at p. 3. Since TerraCom's Lifeline local calling plans offer customers a bucket of minutes, this meets the local calling requirement of 47 CFR § 54.101.

c. Access to Emergency Services

As an existing ETC, TerraCom provides access to 911 and E911 emergency services for all of its wireless customers and will offer these same services to its Lifeline customers throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.²²

d. Toll Limitation Services

Under the new language of 47 CFR § 54.400, the FCC has defined three terms addressing the service provided by an ETC by which a subscriber may prevent toll charges from accumulation beyond a set point. Specifically, Subsection 54.400(b) of the FCC's regulations define "toll blocking" as the service a subscriber may elect to not allow outgoing toll calls. Subsection (c) defines "toll control service" as the service a subscriber may elect to specify a set amount of toll usage allowed per month or per billing cycle. Subsection (d) defines "toll limitation service" as a generic term covering either toll blocking or toll control service for ETCs that are incapable of providing both, or covering both where an ETC is capable of providing both.

TerraCom provides its wireless services on a prepaid or pay-in-advance basis. TerraCom's service is not offered on a distance-sensitive basis and minutes are not charged separately for local or domestic long-distance services. Customers must specifically authorize access for international services, for which additional charges may apply. Therefore, the nature of TerraCom's service eliminates concern that low-income customers will incur significant charges of long-distance charges.²³

Accordingly, TerraCom satisfies 47 CFR § 54.101(a)(1) of the FCC's regulations.

e. Eligible Broadband Internet Access Services

An ETC must offer Broadband Internet Access Service (BIAS) that provides the capability to transmit data to and receive data by wire or radio from all or substantially all Internet endpoints, including any capabilities that are incidental to and enable the operation of the communications service, but excluding dial-up service.24 TerraCom's website states that it provides 2GB of data at no charge each month to all of its Lifeline customers. This is consistent with TerraCom's most recent Lifeline service offering update provided in writing to the Commission in November 2018.²⁶ In addition, TerraCom attests that it operates in compliance with all federal ETC requirements, which would include BIAS-related requirements. Petition at p. 2-3. Accordingly, TerraCom satisfies 47 CFR § 54.101(a)(2) of the FCC's regulations.

2. 47 CFR § 54.201

Definition of ETC

Pursuant to Section 153(10) of the Act, "common carrier" is defined as "any person engaged as a common carrier for hire, in interstate or foreign communications by wire or radio[.]" 47 U.S.C. § 153(10). A carrier is eligible under 47 CFR § 54.201 so long as it offers the services set forth in Section 54.101, either through its own facilities or a combination of its own facilities and the resale of another carrier's services, and advertises the availability of the federal universal support services using media of general distribution. Common carriers that provide services consistent with the requirements of Section 214(e) may be designated ETCs. TerraCom previously demonstrated that it can provide the supported services over its own existing network infrastructure in combination with services obtained by other carriers in Pennsylvania. Petition at p. 2. Accordingly, TerraCom has met this requirement.

3. 47 CFR § 54.202

Additional Requirements

TerraCom also meets the additional requirements for ETC designation set forth in 47 CFR § 54.202, as discussed below.

a. 47 CFR § 54.202(a)(1)

Compliance with Service Requirements

In order to satisfy these criteria, an ETC applicant must demonstrate its commitment and ability to provide the supported services throughout the designated service area: (1) by providing services to all customers making a reasonable request for services within the ETC's designated service area; and (2) by submitting a "five year plan that describes with specificity proposed improvements or upgrades to the applicant's network throughout its proposed service area.'

As part of its Lifeline-only ETC designation received in 2011, TerraCom committed to providing services throughout its proposed service area—the Verizon PA and Verizon North service territories—to all customers making a reasonable request for service. Based on TerraCom's representations in its Petition that it meets all of the federal ETC requirements, which would include the above "reasonable request for services" requirement, we believe TerraCom has demonstrated its commitment to providing Lifeline service throughout Pennsylvania to all customers making a reasonable request for service. Therefore, we find that TerraCom meets the requirements of Section 54.202(a)(1).

The "five-year plan" requirement set forth in 47 CFR § 54.202(a)(1)(ii) is not applicable to TerraCom's Petition for ETC expansion. TerraCom is a Lifeline-only ETC and seeks to expand its ETC designation in Pennsylvania only for purposes of participation in the USF's Low-Income program. TerraCom does not seek ETC designation to offer services supported by the federal high-cost program. Because TerraCom will not offer services supported by the federal high-cost program, the "five-year plan" requirements do not apply to the instant request.

b. 47 CFR § 54.202(a)(2)

Functionality in Emergency Situations

An ETC applicant is required to demonstrate its ability to remain functional in emergency situations. In order to satisfy this criterion, an applicant must demonstrate it has a reasonable amount of back-up power to ensure functionality without an external power source, is able to reroute traffic around damaged facilities, and can manage traffic spikes resulting from emergency situations.

TerraCom currently provides 911 and E911 services to its wireless Lifeline subscribers. Petition at p. 3. Moreover, pursuant to 47 CFR § 54.422(b)(4), TerraCom must provide to the FCC annual certification that it is "able to function in emergency situations as set forth in § 54.202(a)(2)." TerraCom has provided such certification and therefore, is complying with this rule. TerraCom in its Petition represents that it meets all of the federal ETC requirements, which would include the above emergency functionality requirements. Accordingly, we find that TerraCom meets the requirements of Section 54.202(a)(2).

c. 47 CFR § 54.202(a)(3)

Customer Service and Service Quality Standards

A carrier seeking an ETC designation must demonstrate its commitment to meeting consumer protection and service quality standards in its application. TerraCom

asserts that as an ETC since 2011, it has demonstrated a history of complying with various consumer protection and service standards. TerraCom certifies that it will continue its commitment to meeting consumer protection and service quality standards with the provisioning of Lifeline service to its customers.

TerraCom certifies that it has satisfied applicable consumer protection and service quality standards, as required by 47 CFR § 54.202(a)(3). Additionally, TerraCom will continue to cooperate with BCS in resolving any Lifeline-related consumer complaints. We find that TerraCom continues to meet the requirements of Section 54.202(a)(3).

d. 47 CFR § 54.202(a)(4)

Financial and Technical Ability

Generally, carriers seeking only low-income support under Subpart E, 47 CFR §§ 54.400—54.422, must demonstrate they possess the financial and technical ability to provide Lifeline service. TerraCom is seeking statewide expansion of its Lifeline-only ETC designation and must demonstrate financial and technical ability to provide Lifeline Service and all other services.

TerraCom has been providing Lifeline services to Pennsylvania consumers since 2011, and this Commission previously found TerraCom to be financially and technically fit to provide Lifeline service in the Verizon PA and Verizon North service territories. There is a rebuttable presumption that TerraCom continues to satisfy the requirement for financial and technical fitness. Rural Tel. Co. Coalition v. Pa. PUC, 941 A.2d 751 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2008) (CLEC applicant that is currently providing services in Pennsylvania has a rebuttable presumption of fitness to provide services in other portions of Pennsylvania). Accordingly, TerraCom meets the requirements of 47 CFR § 54.202(a)(4) and, at this time, is deemed financially and technically capable of continuing to provide Lifeline service in accordance with the FCC's rules. However, if additional information becomes available that casts doubt on TerraCom's financial integrity, we reserve the right to re-visit our determination in this area.

e. 47 CFR §§ 54.202(a)(5) and 54.202(a)(6)

Terms and Conditions of Lifeline Plans

Carriers seeking only low-income support under Subpart E, 47 CFR § 54.400—54.422, must submit the terms and conditions of the plans offered to Lifeline subscribers. TerraCom's service offerings for Lifeline customers were approved in its 2011 Designation Order. Additionally, in compliance with its Designation Order, TerraCom has notified the Commission regarding these additions, changes and/or new offerings that are in addition to its Lifeline offerings and will continue to do so.²⁷ We find that TerraCom meets the requirements of Sections 54.202(a)(5) and 54.202(a)(6).

f. 47 CFR § 54.202(b)

Public Interest Standard

This rule requires that the ETC designation be in the "public interest." In determining whether granting TerraCom's Petition for ETC expansion is in the public interest, the Commission takes into account the benefits of increased consumer choice when conducting its public

interest analysis.²⁸ In particular, granting an ETC designation may serve the public interest by providing a choice of service offerings in rural and high-cost areas.²⁹ However, the value of increased competition, by itself, may not satisfy the public interest test. 30

Additionally, in doing its public interest analysis, the Commission will also consider the particular advantages and disadvantages of an ETC's service offering. Thus, TerraCom's request for ETC expansion must be examined in light of the Act's goals of providing low-income consumers with access to telecommunications services.

TerraCom's Petition for ETC expansion is in the public interest, as required by 47 CFR § 54.202(b). The primary purpose of universal service is to ensure that Consumers—especially low-income consumers—receive affordable and comparable telecommunications services. Expanding TerraCom's ETC designation to provide statewide wireless Lifeline service in Pennsylvania will further the public interest by making Lifeline service available to more Pennsylvania residents or households. Expanding TerraCom's ETC designation will provide an additional valuable alternative to the existing Lifeline services currently available outside the Verizon PA and Verizon North service territories, thereby providing Commonwealth consumers, especially low-income consumers, with lower prices and higher quality services, which is a vital economic resource for low-income consumers that leads to improved wage levels and personal safety. Many lowerincome customers in Pennsylvania have yet to reap the full benefits of the intensely competitive wireless market. Therefore, as in the Virgin Mobil case, granting TerraCom's Petition to expand its Lifeline service territory as an ETC in Pennsylvania will enable it to expand the availability of affordable telecommunications services to qualifying Pennsylvania consumers.

g. 47 CFR § 54.202(c)

Tribal Lands

ETC designation to serve any tribal lands is inapplicable in Pennsylvania, making 47 CFR § 54.202(d) inapplicable to TerraCom's Petition.

4. 47 CFR § 54.203

ETCs for Unserved Areas

Because TerraCom's Petition does not involve service to an unserved area, 47 CFR § 54.203 is not applicable.

5. 47 CFR § 54.205

Relinguishment of Universal Service

If at some point in the future TerraCom seeks to relinquish its ETC designation, TerraCom agrees to comply with the requirements of 47 CFR \S 54.205.

6. 47 CFR § 54.207

Service Areas

Because TerraCom does not request redefinition of any rural local exchange carrier (RLEC) study area or grant of forbearance from the FCC in connection with its proposed ETC service area, Section 54.207 is not applicable.

We note that TerraCom's ETC expansion request encompasses providing Lifeline service to both rural and non-rural areas. This expansion would permit TerraCom

to provide Lifeline service in RLEC territories and might seemingly appear to trigger a review of whether 47 U.S.C. § 214(e)(5) of the Act and 47 CFR § 54.207 are applicable in this situation. Section 214(e)(5) provides:

The term "service area" means a geographic area established by a State commission (or the Commission under paragraph 6) for the purpose of determining universal service obligations and support mechanisms. In the case of an area served by a rural telephone company, "service area" means such company's "study area" unless and until the FCC and the States, after taking into account recommendations of a Federal-State Joint Board instituted under section 410(c) of this title, establish a different definition of service for such company.

However, pursuant to Section 10 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, the FCC granted limited forbearance for Lifeline-only ETCs from the requirement of Section 214(e)(5) of the Act and Section 54.207(b) of the FCC rules that the service area of an ETC conform to the service area of a rural telephone company serving the same area.³¹ Accordingly, even if TerraCom's expansion request to obtain ETC designation on a statewide basis encompasses designated service areas that are smaller than the rural telephone company's service area, Section 214(e)(5) of the Act and Section 54.207(b) of the FCC's rules do not apply, and the Commission does not need to redefine or seek to amend the RLEC's service area.

Admittedly, this limited forbearance is inapplicable to a high-cost ETC seeking to expand its limited designated service areas that is not a Connect America Fund Phase II Auction 903 winning bidder. In such a circumstance, the carrier must satisfy all of the statutory requirements applicable to ETCs under Section 214(e)(5) and 54.207(b) for other reasons.³² Since TerraCom is a Lifeline-only ETC, however, it is not necessary to apply these sections to TerraCom's request. Moreover, absent any pending complaints or lack of compliance with applicable reporting requirements, TerraCom has a rebuttable presumption that it can provide Lifeline service in the service areas of the rural ILEC(s) for which it now seeks to expand its provision of Lifeline service. Rural Tel. Co. Coalition. For these reasons, Section 54.207 is not applicable to TerraCom's Petition.

C. Certification of Eligibility for Benefits under the Anti-Drug Abuse Act

Petitioners must certify that neither the petitioner nor any party to the petition is subject to a denial of federal benefits pursuant to Section 5301 of the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988, as implemented in Section 1.2002 of the FCC's rules.³³ TerraCom has submitted a certification that satisfies the requirements of the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988, as codified in Sections 1.2001—1.2003 of the FCC's rules.

II. Federal Requirements of Eligible Telecommunications Carriers for Universal Service Support for Low-Income Consumers

The major goal of the FCC's Lifeline Reform Order was to implement procedures designed to preserve the federal USF resources and prevent waste, fraud and abuse. To that end, the FCC codified rules governing the entire

process of Lifeline reimbursement from the federal USF. These changes establish defined terms governing the provision of low-income support and establish parameters governing a carrier's duties and eligibility for USF low income support. Specifically, revised 47 CFR § 54.400 establishes relevant terms and definition for provision of Lifeline; 47 CFR § 54.401 defines Lifeline as a non-transferrable retail service; 47 CFR § 54.403 establishes the Lifeline support amounts for which ETCs may seek from the USF; and 47 CFR § 54.404 requires the creation of a National Lifeline Accountability Database, which intends to provide a national database for ETCs to cross-check subscriber eligibility as a means to eliminate the USF support for duplicative or otherwise ineligible subscribers.

Further, the Lifeline Reform Order instituted substantial changes which impact consumer qualification for Lifeline, including: 47 CFR \S 54.409 (Subscriber Eligibility Determination); 47 CFR § 54.410 (Annual Certifications by ETCs); 47 CFR § 54.416 (Record Keeping Requirements); and 47 CFR § 54.417 (Annual Reporting for ETCs that Receive Low-income Support). These regulations govern the prerequisite duties of an ETC seeking low income support from the USF.

All current and future ETCs must meet the minimum standards set forth in the FCC's Lifeline Reform Orders. All minimum federal requirements of the FCC's Lifeline Reform Order not expressly discussed herein, are nonetheless applicable to ETC designation requests in Pennsylvania, this includes any subsequent developments in those federal requirements. TerraCom does offer and meet minimum standards for mobile voice and mobile broadband.35

A. The FCC's Rules Governing Lifeline

1. 47 CFR § 54.410

Subscriber Eligibility Determination and Certification

The requirements for subscriber eligibility determination and certification requirements in Section 54.410 are the major requirements established to prevent waste, fraud, and abuse. These requirements pertain to consumer eligibility factors for Lifeline and the corresponding obligation for verification of that eligibility. The FCC's further requirements for specific formats and process for accomplishing verification are additional requirements for ETC designation. This section further requires that every consumer's eligibility be recertified annually.

In its 2016 Lifeline Order, the FCC established the National Verifier as the entity designated to make eligibility determinations and perform a variety of other functions necessary to enroll eligible subscribers or households into the Lifeline Program. As outlined in the 2016 Lifeline Order, "[t]he Commission's key objectives for the National Verifier are to protect against and reduce waste, fraud, and abuse; to lower costs to the Fund and Lifeline providers through administrative efficiencies; and to better serve eligible beneficiaries by facilitating choice and improving the enrollment experience."36 The National Verifier is a centralized system that determines whether subscribers are eligible for Lifeline. The Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) manages the National Verifier and its customer service department, the Lifeline Support Center. Service providers can help Lifeline consumers obtain an eligibility decision from the National Verifier through the service provider portal, or consumers

can apply on their own by mail or online. USAC will determine if the applicant is eligible for Lifeline.

The National Verifier was fully launched in Pennsylvania in March of 2019. Because the National Verifier has launched in Pennsylvania, it is the only means used for eligibility determination now and into the future. New and potential Lifeline consumers will receive their initial income-based eligibility determination by signing into CheckLifeline.org from any computer or mobile device to create an account, receive an eligibility decision, and use the list of service providers in their area to contact one to enroll. TerraCom must use the National Verifier to determine eligibility for its potential Lifeline customers given USAC's implementation of the National Verifier in Pennsylvania.

The FCC modified Sections 54.410(b)(2)(ii), (c)(2)(ii), and (e) of its rules to clarify that, where use of the National Verifier determines the consumer's initial eligibility determination or recertification, the National Verifier is not required to deliver copies of those certifications to the ETC. The FCC determined that this amendment to the rules was consistent with its goals that the National Verifier ease burdens on Lifeline service providers while improving privacy and security for consumers applying to participate in the program.

Further, this amendment brings Section 54.410 of the rules in line with the FCC's stated intent in the 2016 Lifeline Order that Lifeline providers would not be required to retain eligibility documentation for eligibility determinations made by the National Verifier as it presents unnecessary risk to the privacy and security of subscriber information. Thus, TerraCom is not required to retain documentation of eligibility criteria and provide subscribers with form eligibility certifications which provide notice to the subscribers of the Lifeline plan eligibility rules and requires that subscribers provide detailed personal and billing information.³⁷

For low-income consumers residing in group facilities or at an address shared by multiple households, the FCC's "One Per-Household rule" establishes that a "household" is defined as "any individual or group of individuals who are living at the same address as one economic unit." An adult is any person eighteen years or older. 47 CFR § 54.400(h). Lifeline applicants may demonstrate at the time of enrollment that another Lifeline recipient resides at their address as part of a separate household.

Finally, Section 54.410(f) of the federal rules provides for an annual recertification process by which each subscriber's eligibility for Lifeline service must be recertified. 47 CFR § 54.410(f). In Pennsylvania, service providers must use the National Verifier, which has assumed the responsibility for annual recertification where it has been launched in a state. Lifeline subscribers will be recertified either automatically through the National Verifier's state/federal data sources or receive a recertification request from USAC.

TerraCom has been compliant with the FCC's rules regarding verification of consumer eligibility to participate in the Lifeline program in accordance with the applicable FCC rules. This includes the FCC's Lifeline Reform Orders' amendment to the minimum eligibility criteria for consumers to receive Lifeline support, the revision to the eligibility determination process using the National Verifier, and the modification of the annual

recertification process as the National Verifier will also recertify subscribers each year. TerraCom certifies that it will continue to do so. 38

2. 47 CFR §§ 54.416, 54.417 and 54.422

Annual Certifications Recordkeeping and Reporting

As previously noted, the FCC's rules contain certain annual certification, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements for ETCs participating in the Lifeline program. For one, a service provider must annually certify to USAC that it complies with all applicable federal Lifeline certification procedures to recertify the continued eligibility of all of its Lifeline subscribers. Consistent with our prior discussion related to Section 54.410(f), TerraCom's Lifeline subscribers will be recertified either automatically through the National Verifier's state/federal data sources, or receive a recertification request from USAC. In any event, TerraCom in its Petition represents that it will continue to comply with all FCC rules and regulations. Petition at p. 3.

B. TerraCom Satisfies all the Federal Requirements Regarding Lifeline

TerraCom is obligated to offer Lifeline-supported services throughout its designated service area and is obligated to comply with the rules and requirements of the federal Lifeline program. This obligation includes, inter alia, compliance with the FCC's rules for determining subscriber eligibility and annual recertification. Based upon our review of TerraCom's Petition, as supplemented, we determine that TerraCom satisfies all the applicable and relevant FCC rules and federal requirements regarding Lifeline.

III. Pennsylvania-Specific Requirements for ETC Designation

In addition to the minimum federal standards above, through our ETC Guidelines, TerraCom must comply with Pennsylvania statutory law and Commission orders which govern Pennsylvania's Lifeline program.⁴⁰ 52 Pa. Code § 69.2501(b).

A. Section 3019(f) Requirements

Section 3019(f) of the Pennsylvania Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 3019(f), and the Commission's PA Lifeline Order set forth the minimum Pennsylvania requirements for ETCs seeking low income support from the federal Lifeline Program. Section 3019(f) includes the following requirements for ETCs:

- (1) All eligible telecommunications carriers certificated to provide local exchange telecommunications service shall provide Lifeline service to all eligible telecommunications customers who subscribe to such service.
- (2) All eligible telecommunications customers who subscribe to Lifeline service shall be permitted to subscribe to any number of other eligible telecommunications carrier telecommunications services at the tariffed rates for such services.
- (3) Whenever a prospective customer seeks to subscribe to local exchange telecommunications service from an eligible telecommunications carrier, the carrier shall explicitly advise the customer of the availability of Lifeline service and shall make reasonable efforts where appropriate to determine whether the

customer qualifies for such service and, if so, whether the customer wishes to subscribe to the service.

- (4) Eligible telecommunications carriers shall inform existing customers of the availability of Lifeline services twice annually by bill insert or message. The notice shall be conspicuous and shall provide appropriate eligibility, benefits and contact information for customers who wish to learn of the Lifeline service subscription requirements.
- (5) Eligible telecommunications carriers shall provide the Department of Public Welfare⁴¹ with Lifeline service descriptions and subscription forms, contact telephone numbers, and a listing of the geographic area or areas they serve, for use by the Department of Public Welfare in providing the notifications required by this paragraph.
- (6) No eligible telecommunications carrier shall be required to provide after the effective date of this section any new Lifeline service discount that is not fully subsidized by the Federal Universal Service

As an existing ETC, TerraCom certifies that it has and will continue to comply with each of the Section 3019(f) requirements. TerraCom will provide its prepaid Lifeline service to all eligible telecommunications customers who wish to subscribe to such service and who reside within TerraCom's service area. The Company will also agree to permit eligible customers to subscribe to any number of its other telecommunications services at the standard rates for such services. TerraCom has established protocols so that whenever a prospective customer in Pennsylvania seeks to subscribe to TerraCom's service, TerraCom will explicitly advise the customer of the availability of Lifeline service and shall meet federal requirements to determine whether the customer qualifies for such service and, if so, whether the customer wishes to subscribe to the service. Petition at p. 3.

Furthermore, as an existing ETC, TerraCom has and will continue to: (1) inform existing customers of the availability of Lifeline service twice annually by bill insert, in compliance with Section 3019(f)(4); and (2) provide the Commonwealth's DHS with its Lifeline service descriptions and subscription forms, contact telephone numbers and a listing of the geographic area or areas it serves for use by DHS in providing the notification under Section 3019(f)(5). Petition at p. 3.

B. Other Pennsylvania Requirements and Relevant Reporting Requirements⁴²

In addition to the Pennsylvania statutory requirements, the Commission has established Lifeline eligibility criteria, as well as procedures for certification and verification of a consumer's initial and continuing eligibility. 43 Additionally, ETCs are further ordered to report to the Commission annual changes in Pennsylvania Lifeline enrollment.44 The Commission continues to reserve our right to impose separate state-specific requirements where necessary for the protection of the Commonwealth's consumers.

1. Compliance with Eligibility Certification and Verifi-

As a condition of its ETC designation, TerraCom must independently certify a Lifeline applicant's eligibility for service. Compliance with the Lifeline eligibility verification requirements are essential for prevention of waste, fraud and abuse. In particular, all ETCs designated by this Commission are required to take the necessary steps to ensure that Lifeline support paid by the federal USF to the carrier is remitted only for eligible low-income consumers or households.

As stated above, with launch of NLAD in Pennsylvania, TerraCom must use the National Verifier when helping consumers apply to the Lifeline Program. In addition, TerraCom must include a public education component as part of its Lifeline outreach program to ensure that consumers are aware of and can participate in, the eligibility determination from the National Verifier.

By our PA Lifeline Order we also required eligibility be confirmed annually and required:45

That LECs offering Lifeline. . .services are directed to recertify their Lifeline...customers at least annually in accordance with FCC procedures established at 47 C.F.R. § 54.410 (relating to certification and verification of consumer qualifications for Lifeline)[.]

Id. at 27.

TerraCom is directed, as a condition of continuing its ETC designation, to ensure all of its Lifeline subscribers are recertified. As previously discussed, the National Verifier assumed the responsibility for annual recertification in Pennsylvania as of March 5, 2019, and TerraCom's Lifeline subscribers must be recertified either automatically through the National Verifier's state/federal data sources or receive a recertification request from USAC.

Prior to recertification, however, we note that the FCC has adopted a reverification process that must occur to determine the continued eligibility of existing Lifeline subscribers. Reverification is the one-time process by the National Verifier to confirm that all existing Lifeline subscribers meet the eligibility standards. Reverification will be performed in groups based on subscribers' enrollment dates. Reverification will reset a subscriber's anniversary date. Subscribers will then be recertified one year after the date that they are successfully reverified.46 Thereafter, Lifeline subscribers will be recertified either automatically through the National Verifier's state/federal data sources or receive a recertification request from USAC.

2. Compliance with the Tracking Report Order

As a condition of ETC designation, ETCs are required under Pennsylvania law to report to the Commission annual changes in Lifeline enrollment, per our Tracking Report Order. TerraCom has and will continue to fully comply with the Commission's annual Lifeline Tracking Report requirement.

Further, in order to ensure the Pennsylvania Lifeline program advances the Commonwealth's universal service policy, TerraCom is required to continue to provide to BCS a copy of its annual Lifeline Eligible Telecommunications Carrier Certification Form, FCC Form 555, that it

files with USAC.⁴⁷ The FCC Form 555 reports the results of the annual recertification process and includes data accuracy certifications.

3. Consumer Lifeline-Related Complaints Processed by the Bureau of Consumer Services

As a final condition of expanded designation, TerraCom agrees to continue to work with BCS to resolve informal complaints and to submit to Commission jurisdiction on formal complaints filed by TerraCom Lifeline customers on Lifeline-related issues. 48 Specifically, BCS will address Lifeline-related issues which pertain to the consumers' rights under its Wireless Terms and Conditions of Service including: (1) eligibility disputes; (2) program offering issues; and (3) limited equipment-related issues.

TerraCom has and will continue to provide notice to consumers in its Pennsylvania promotional materials as well as Pennsylvania-specific information on its web page of their right to contact BCS and of the Commission's contact information, if Lifeline service-related complaints brought to TerraCom's customer service division are not resolved. In addition, we expect TerraCom to continue to consult with BCS in preparation of Pennsylvania promotional materials to ensure that they further the delivery of voice and broadband services in a comprehensible fashion in Pennsylvania.

Adherence to these Pennsylvania-specific requirements applicable to ETCs designated by the Commission will assure uniformity among Lifeline services offered by different ETCs, will provide consumer protection for low-income consumers, and will enable BCS to monitor Lifeline Program effectiveness in Pennsylvania.

4. Change in Corporate Control and Renewed ETC Designation

In the event of a change of or transfer in corporate control, as defined in the Commission's regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 63.322, TerraCom will have to petition this Commission for a renewal of its ETC status. Corporate changes of control may also be accompanied with changes in ETC status of a particular telecommunications entity with reference to the various and evolving support mechanisms of the federal USF. In this respect, this Commission is lawfully entitled to timely re-examine any such changes and ascertain whether a particular telecommunications entity should continue with an ETC designation. For this reason, we shall require TerraCom to file for renewal of its ETC designation at the same time it files any application for a change or transfer of control under our regulations.

5. Provision of ETC Application, Annual Certification and Promotional Materials to the Bureau of Consumer Services

All ETCs are required to supply the Commission's BCS with copies of subscriber Lifeline applications, annual certifications, promotional/advertising materials, and Lifeline-related customer notices for review for consistency with eligibility determination criteria and annual certification requirements as well as plain language requirements. Accordingly, as a condition of receiving expanded ETC designation, TerraCom is directed to continue to provide the Commission with copies of any and all reports submitted to USAC, and, upon request, provide BCS with copies of subscriber Lifeline applications,

Lifeline-related issues.

promotional/advertising materials, annual certifications reports, and Lifeline-related customer notices. Any failure of TerraCom to comply with these requirements will be a basis for revocation of its ETC designation or other enforcement action.

C. TerraCom Wireless Satisfies All Pennsylvania-Specific Requirements for Lifeline

In addition to the minimum federal standards mentioned above, all ETCs are required to comply with Pennsylvania law and Commission orders which govern Pennsylvania's Lifeline programs. 52 Pa. Code § 69.2501(b). As already determined above, and as an existing ETC, TerraCom commits to: (1) abide by the applicable eligibility certification and verification requirements set forth in the Commission's PA Lifeline Order; (2) abide by the applicable requirements set forth in the Commission's Tracking Report Order; and (3) have consumer Lifeline-related complaints which are unresolved by TerraCom's customer service, handled by BCS as appropriate and, if not, be resolved through formal or informal Commission processes. Petition at p. 3.

Conclusion

In consideration of TerraCom's Petition as supplemented, we conclude TerraCom satisfies all federal and Pennsylvania-specific requirements for expansion of its ETC designation. As an ETC, TerraCom must meet the minimum standards set forth in the FCC's Lifeline Reform Orders, reporting and performance metrics set forth in the USF/ICC Transformation Order, and all related regulations. Further, in Pennsylvania, TerraCom must satisfy the Commission's requirements in the Public Utility Code, our ETC Guidelines, and all related orders. Granting TerraCom's ETC expansion request is in accord with Section 214 of the Act, the FCC's regulations and orders related to ETC designation, Section 3019(f) of the Public Utility Code, and the Commissions orders on ETC designation. 47 U.S.C. § 214; 47 CFR §§ 54.201, et seq.; and 66 Pa.C.S. § 3019(f); *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. The Petition of YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom, for Expansion of its Eligible Telecommunications Carrier Designation in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is granted, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this order.
- 2. The Commission hereby approves YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom's Petition for Expansion of its Eligible Telecommunications Carrier Designation to provide Lifeline-only ETC service throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- 3. The FCC rules regarding the redefinition process as it relates to YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom are inapplicable as set forth in this Order.
- 4. YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom, shall provide the Bureau of Consumer Services with copies of subscriber Lifeline applications and annual certification and promotional materials for review for consistency with eligibility determination criteria and annual certification requirements.
- 5. YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom, shall comply with the FCC's reverification procedures by using the National Verifier.
- 6. YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom, shall continue to provide notice to consumers in its Pennsylvania promotional materials as well as Pennsylvania-specific information on its web page of their right to contact BCs

and of the Commission's contact information if Lifeline service-related complaints brought to TerraCom are not resolved. We also expect TerraCom to continue to consult with BCS in preparation of Pennsylvania promotional materials.

- 7. The failure of YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom, to comply with any of the provisions of this Order may result in revocation of its ETC designation(s) for purposes of receiving federal Universal Service Fund support and the federal Lifeline support or be subject to further Commission process.
- 8. YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom, shall petition this Commission for any future change to the wireless Lifeline service offerings provided through this ETC designation as described herein which represents a limitation or reduction of Lifeline services/equipment provided free of charge, and shall provide notice to this Commission of any addition, change or new offering which is in addition to the wireless Lifeline offering.
- 9. YourTel America, Inc., d/b/a TerraCom, shall petition this Commission for renewal of its Eligible Telecommunications Carrier status at the same time it files any application for a change or transfer of control as defined at 52 Pa. Code § 63.322.
- 10. The Secretary shall serve a copy of this Order on YourTel America, Inc. d/b/a TerraCom, on the Office of Consumer Advocate, and the Office of Small Business
- 11. A copy of this Order be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

In accordance with our May 29, 1990 Order at Docket No. M-00900239 establishing the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS or Relay)¹ and surcharge funding mechanism (TRS surcharge) and subsequent

Commission orders and legislation,2 we have completed the annual recalculation of the TRS surcharge as it will apply only to residential and business wireline access lines for July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020. The TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines shall be set at \$0.08 per month.

Background

The annual TRS surcharge recalculation is dependent on data from several sources. Local Exchange Carriers (LECs³) submit annual wireline access line counts pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 63.37. The traditional relay provider, Hamilton Relay, Inc.,⁴ submitted the estimated minutes of use and charges for July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020. Hamilton Telephone Company d/b/a Hamilton Telecommunications submitted the estimated minutes-of-use report for the Captioned Telephone Relay Service⁵ (CTRS). The Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR), Department of Labor and Industry, submitted the 2019-2020 TDDP budget and the 2019-2020 PMASP budget. The surcharge also funds TRS Advisory Board activities and Fund administration costs. U.S. Bank,6 the Fund Administrator, provided a statement of the financial status of the Fund.

Calculation for 2019-2020

Combined residential and business wireline access lines reported by LECs for 2018 and adjusted for Centrex lines are estimated to be 4,240,000. Based upon the number of access lines, projected program costs (Relay, CTRS, TDDP, and PMASP), anticipated Pennsylvania TRS Advisory Board⁸ expenses, TRS Fund administration costs, and the financial status of the TRS Fund, the 2019-2020 TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines will remain at the current rate of \$0.08 per month.

This rate is the same as the current rate and will not require the LECs to file tariff supplements. Despite a net positive position in the TRS fund, the Commission has retained this rate over the past several years to provide for a cautious approach to uncertainty related to potential federal funding changes.9 That rate also ensures that the program has adequate resources to support the Wireless

Operations for 2019-2020

We shall continue our active oversight of the operations of the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service. Further, in accordance with 35 P.S. §§ 6701.3a & 4, we shall continue to collaborate with OVR and its TDDP administrator¹² to ensure adequate funding for distribution of TDDP equipment to qualified Pennsylvanians. Further, we shall continue to assist OVR in its mission to ensure adequate funding for PMASP.

The Bureau of Audits (Audits) released its most recent TRS Audit Report on June 14, 2017 at Docket No. D-2016-2556222 for the twelve-month periods ended February 29, 2016, February 28, 2015, February 28, 2014, and February 28, 2013. Audits has finished an audit of the TDDP and the PMASP for the twelve-month periods ended June 30, 2016, June 30, 2015, and June 30, 2014, at Docket No. D-2018-3001207 and expects to release the audit report in May 2019.

Service of Paper Copies

In the past, our practice has been to serve the annual TRS surcharge recalculation order on every LEC in the Commonwealth in addition to each Relay service provider, the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Pennsylvania Telephone Association, and the Fund Administrator. Consistent with the TRS surcharge recalculation order entered May 23, 2013, at Docket No. M-2013-2341301, we now serve paper copies of the annual TRS surcharge recalculation order only when there is a change in the TRS surcharge rate or other provision in the order requiring that the LECs file a tariff supplement or take other action. As this order does not change the TRS surcharge rate, paper copies of the order will not be served. Additionally, we will continue to publish the order in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and on the Commission's website.

Conclusion

The Commission has completed the annual recalculation of the TRS surcharge rate. Consistent with our prior determinations regarding the fund, the TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines to be applied beginning July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020, will remain at \$0.08 per month. We also note that paper copies of this order will not be served on the LECs as there is no change in the set surcharge rate or to impose new requirements on the LECs requiring tariff changes in response to this Order; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. For the period of July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020, the TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines shall be set at \$0.08 per month, unless the Commission takes further action to revise the TRS surcharge rate prior to June 30, 2020.
- 2. All local exchange carriers are directed to use the attached blank remittance form to remit the monthly TRS surcharge collections to the Fund Administrator. The blank remittance form shall be posted to the Commission's web site. All local exchange carriers are required to collect and remit the TRS surcharge revenue with the completed remittance form monthly by the 20th of each
- 3. A copy of this Order be published in the *Pennsylva*nia Bulletin.
- 4. A copy of this Order be posted to the Commission's website.

Statement of Commissioner Norman J. Kennard

Before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) is the establishment of the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS) surcharge funding mechanism (TRS surcharge) for the period July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020.

The current TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines is \$0.08 per month. At this rate, the TRS fund continues to be massively over-collected. As of April 30, 2019, there is a total consolidated cash balance of over \$12 million in the TRS fund. This balance is over 13 times greater than the \$900,000 operating reserve that

we have deemed prudent to ensure operation of these programs and services.

Although the per-customer impact of reducing the monthly TRS surcharge is minimal on a per customer basis, the aggregate amount collected is not. Last year, the amount collected was about \$4.2 million. The same \$0.08 cents surcharge, going forward, is anticipated to recover \$4,070,400 annually. On the other hand, the fund spent \$2,606,880 last year, and the budget for next year is \$2,727,192. At the \$0.08 cents per month surcharge rate, the fund is projected to grow by another \$1,343,208 this year.

Based on the current regulatory landscape, I do not support growing the already excessive TRS fund. First, I note that since our approval of the TRS surcharge for 2018-2019, the Commission has approved the Wireless Expansion Initiative and its corresponding budget (which is included in the 2020 TRS fund projections), thereby removing the cost uncertainty associated with deploying a permanent wireless device distribution program. Second, the Commission's ability to respond to any changes in TRS funding which may occur at the federal level would not be compromised by reducing the surcharge. Additionally, because the TRS surcharge is set on an annual basis, any need for additional funding in the future can be adequately addressed in future surcharge years.

For these reasons, I do not support the \$0.08 TRS surcharge. To gradually reduce the war chest that has been accumulated over time, I would reduce the surcharge to \$0.04 per line per month.

Statement of Commissioner John F. Coleman, Jr.

Before the Commission is the establishment the Pennsylvania Telecommunications Relay Service surcharge funding mechanism (TRS surcharge) for the period July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020. The past two years, our annual TRS surcharge recalculation has been the source of some considerable debate among the Commissioners.

The current recommendation is to keep the TRS surcharge rate for residential and business access lines at \$.08 per line per month, despite a TRS fund balance that keeps growing and will continue to grow. The bottom line is that the \$.08 rate is producing a year-after-year surplus that is resulting in a large over collection of the TRS fund. As of April 30, 2019, the \$.08 surcharge rate has produced a total consolidated cash balance of over \$12 million, an increase of approximately \$1.8 million from last year's fund balance. And, based on the projected revenues and expenses for this surcharge year, the TRS fund balance is projected to grow by over \$1.3 million by this time next year.

As I have advocated the last two surcharge years, I would lower the TRS surcharge rate to \$.04 per line per month to gradually reduce the fund balance over time.

I note that a reduction in the TRS surcharge rate to \$.04 would not result in an immediate reduction of the fund surplus to zero. Rather, the surplus would be reduced gradually over time by approximately \$700,000 annually. This gradual reduction would leave plenty of flexibility to address any future changes in the TRS landscape, including any changes that may occur at the federal level. If in addition, the TRS surcharge is set on an annual basis, which means that the surcharge rate can be adjusted in future surcharge years to address the need for any additional TRS funding that may arise.
