

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# READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

#### Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

## Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

#### Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

#### Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

#### **How to Find Rules and Regulations**

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde\_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [ ] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

#### **Fiscal Notes**

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

#### Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44:

#### § 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the [Legislative Reference] Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

And Now, this 15th day of April, 2020, upon the recommendation of the Minor Judiciary Education Board ("the Board"),

It Is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, and Rule 1952(A) of the Rules of Judicial Administration, that Rules 602(a), 603(a) and 604(a) of the Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration are clarified as follows:

In-person continuing education for members of the Minor Judiciary is suspended for the remainder of the 2019-2020 scholastic year. The Board is authorized to provide, via remote video instruction approved by the Board, the required number of hours of continuing education set forth in Rules 602(a), 603(a) and 604(a) to any member of the Minor Judiciary who has not yet completed the required annual course of continuing education for 2019-2020. A member of the Minor Judiciary who completes remote video instruction shall return to the Board a signed and dated verification, in a form to be provided by the Board, verifying that the course of instruction has been completed.

This *Order* shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b) and shall be effective immediately.

Pennsylvania Rule of Continuing Legal Education 108(e), which states that no more than six (6) credits earned by distance learning education may be applied to the annual compliance requirement, is hereby modified with respect to CLE compliance deadlines for the year 2020 only. All CLE credits to satisfy 2020 compliance deadlines may be obtained through completion of distance learning programs consistent with the Rules and Regulations for Continuing Legal Education in Pennsylvania.

# Pennsylvania Housing Advisory Committee Virtual Meeting

The Pennsylvania Housing Advisory Committee (Committee) is responsible for reviewing Statewide housing, community development and support services, needs and priorities, as well as advising the Department of Community and Economic Development (Department) in the preparation of the Commonwealth Consolidated Plan, annual action plans and the coordination of Federal, State and local resources to manage the implementation of these plans.

As part of the planning process for the 2020 Action Plan, the Committee will be meeting in a virtual forum to discuss the Action Plan and how this year's allocation of Community Block Grant (CDBG), the HOME Investment Partnerships, the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), CDBG Disaster Recovery, Neighborhood Stabilization Program, Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS

(HOPWA) and National Trust Fund funding will be distributed once received from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. There will also be discussion on the Commonwealth's allocation of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (Pub.L. No. 116-136) funding for CDBG, ESG and HOPWA.

Substantial Amendment to the 2019—2023 Consolidated Plan and 2019 Action Plan; Changes to the Citizen Participation Plan; Public Hearing

#### **CARES Act Method of Distribution for** CDBG, ESG, and HOPWA

On March 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) (Pub.L. No. 116-136) was signed into law to respond to the growing effects of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) public health crisis. The CARES Act provides special allocations to the Commonwealth under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) and Housing Opportunities for People with Aids Grant (HOPWA) programs to be used to prevent, prepare for and respond to COVID-19.

Annually the Department of Community and Economic Development (Department) prepares the Action Plan which outlines the methods of distribution for Federal funding received by the Commonwealth through the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Notice is hereby given that the 2019-2023 Consolidated Plan will now include the CARES Act funding for the previously-mentioned programs and will be known as CDBG-CV, ESG-CV and HOPWA-CV. In addition, the 2019 Action Plan will be amended to add the new programs' Methods of Distribution to the Commonwealth's resources, which according to the Pennsylvania Citizen Participation Plan for the Consolidated Plan, constitute a significant change in the distribution of funds under the plan and thus necessitate a substantial amendment to the original Consolidated Plan and Action Plan. In accordance with a waiver of regulatory authority, approved by HUD on April 7, 2020, to the normal citizen comment period, the Commonwealth will hold a 5-day citizen comment period starting on Monday, April 27, 2020, until Friday May 1, 2020.

The proposed amendments for the 2019 Annual Action Plan are as follows:

#### CDBG-CV-\$24,691,407

• Under Community Development Block Grant Program for Nonurban and Certain Other Municipalities in this Commonwealth, the CDBG-CV allocation is distributed to eligible counties, cities, boroughs and townships:

Discretionary/Competitive: \$2,863,010 Entitlement: \$20,987,655

Administration/Technical Assistance: \$840,742

- Entitlement communities must submit applications for activities that prevent, prepare for and respond to the impacts of COVID-19 in their community.
- If any community opts not to accept the allocation, per P.L. 906 No. 179, 1984 (Act 179), those funds will be added to the competitive distribution.
- The Department will accept competitive (discretionary) proposals from eligible units of general local government to address activities that prevent, prepare for and respond to the impacts of COVID-19 in communities.

For both the entitlement and competitive proposals:

- HUD has lifted the public service cap on the use of these funds and therefore the Department will allow applicants to request funding for public service activities that will prevent, prepare for and respond to COVID-19.
- The Department is also working to establish minimum requirements for economic development grant and loan programs administered locally to assist to retain or create jobs.

ESG-CV—\$19,920,655

- The Department proposes accepting simplified requests for proposals from municipalities Statewide and continue to allow nonprofit organizations to apply directly only if the proposed project addresses a regional need.
- While ESG funds can support HUD entitlement and nonentitlement communities, the Department will propose priority in the distribution of funds to nonentitled communities over entitled communities.
- All applicants must demonstrate their participation in and that their proposal is consistent with the strategies to address homelessness as outlined by their local Continuum of Care.
- · While the Department will accept proposals in all priority areas, with the strain on homeless shelters and the impact of loss of wages on the ability to make timely rent payments, the Department anticipates the greatest need for funding in emergency shelter and homelessness prevention activities.

Non-entitlement communities will be able to request funds in any eligible component: emergency shelterincluding operations, essential services and street outreach, homelessness prevention, rapid rehousing, HMIS/data collection and administration.

Entitlement communities will be limited to homelessness prevention, rapid rehousing and administration.

- For all applicants, no match is required, and administration will be limited to 6% of the total request and subsequent award. Four percent is proposed to remain with the Department to cover administrative expenses of grant oversight.
- No program expenditure caps (such as, no maximum emergency shelter request or minimum rapid rehousing threshold) will be added and the Department will request the use of all ESG waivers identified by HUD.

HOPWA-CV-\$448,022 (Includes Harrisburg and Allentown EMSA)

 The Department of Health, Bureau of Communicable Diseases, Division of HIV Disease will allocate the HOPWA-CV funding on a formula basis to the six regional HIV Grantees. Additionally, the cities of Allentown and Harrisburg receive separate allocations directly from HUD; however, for the HOPWA-CV, they have requested the Commonwealth to serve as the grantee and administer the funds for housing support and related services for the needs of the HIV clients caused by COVID-19.

• There will be no Tenant Based Rental Assistance, only Short-Term Rent, Mortgage and Utility Assistance; Permanent Housing Placement; and Supportive Services.

#### LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995 PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted Under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under Sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the NOI to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site.

For the following identified site(s), proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30-days of the following specified date. During this comment period the municipality may request that the following identified person, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The Department has developed an "integrated" plan approval, State Operating Permit and Title V Operating Permit program. This integrated approach is designed to make the permitting process more efficient for the Department, the regulated community and the general public. This approach allows the owner or operator of a facility to submit permitting documents relevant to its application for all sources related to a facility or a proposed project, affords an opportunity for public input, and provides for a decision on the issuance of the necessary permits.

Potential annual emissions of the sum of all HAPs combined are 5.6 tons, including 4.4 tons of formaldehyde. Potential annual emissions of greenhouse gases are 25,106 tons of  $\mathrm{CO_2e}$ . Sources at the Beaver Valley Power Station are subject to 40 CFR Part 63, Subpart A—General Provisions, 40 CFR Part 63, Subpart ZZZZ—National Emissions Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants for Stationary Reciprocating Internal Combustion Engines, and 40 CFR Part 63, Subpart JJJJJ—National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants for Industrial, Commercial, and Institutional Boilers Area Sources. Sources are also subject to 25 Pa. Code Chapters 121—145. The permit includes emission limitations and operational, monitoring, reporting, and recordkeeping requirements for the plant.

For individuals who wish to challenge an action, the appeal must reach the Board within 30-days. A lawyer is not needed to file an appeal with the Board.

The Department of Environmental Protection will accept comments on the proposed TMDLs developed for the **Pleasant Valley Run Watershed** in **Bedford County**. The TMDLs were established in accordance with the requirements of Section 303(d) of the Clean Water Act. The Pennsylvania Integrated Water Quality Monitoring and Assessment Report included impaired stream segments in the watershed. The listings of these segments were due to aquatic life use impairments caused by excessive siltation and nutrients from agriculture and/or crop-related agriculture.

There currently are no State or Federal in-stream numerical water quality criteria for sediment or nutrients. Therefore, the Department utilized a reference watershed approach to implement the applicable narrative criteria. The proposed TMDL document sets allowable loading of sediment and nutrients in the Pleasant Valley Run Watershed. The TMDLs included allocations for nonpoint sources, reserves for future point sources, as well as margin of safety factors. Nonpoint source load allocations were made for cropland, hay/pasture land, streambank and farm animal source sectors present in the watershed. Data used in establishing the TMDL were generated using a water quality analysis model (Model My Watershed) made available through the Stroud Water Research Center.

The Executive Director has found that this action is a necessary and appropriate response to the outbreak of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) and calls from the Center for Disease Control and Office of the Governor for citizens to take precautions and to provide for the health and safety of persons who fish Commonwealth waters. The temporary modifications will go into effect immediately and will remain in effect until the Commission, by appropriate action, amends 58 Pa. Code §§ 61.1, 63.3 and 69.12. In the absence of the action, the temporary modification will automatically expire on December 31, 2020.

Applicability of Notice Regarding Coronavirus (COVID-19) Insurance Coverage (Notice 2020-03) to Issuers and Producers of Limited Benefit Policies; Notice 2020-09

The Insurance Department (Department), in collaboration with the Department of Health, issued a notice (Notice 2020-03), published at 50 Pa.B. 1788 (March 21, 2020), to assist individuals and entities regulated by the Department addressing health insurance related services that may arise in the context of the ongoing novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Notice 2020-03 was directed to "[a]ll health insurers, other insurance industry representatives and other interested parties."

The question has been raised as to what insurers are considered "health insurers" for purposes of Notice 2020-03. Notice 2020-03 was intended to include all insurers with accident and health authority that may issue policies in the Commonwealth providing coverage of health care services. This includes insurers that may offer comprehensive major medical policies, but also includes insurers that may offer limited or excepted benefit policies, including but not limited to short-term limited duration or specified disease policies.

Thus, if an insurer issues or may issue any policy in this Commonwealth under which a health care service may be covered, that insurer is expected to be responsive to the content of Notice 2020-03, and is asked, as stated in paragraph # 9 of Notice 2020-03, to provide information on the steps it is taking in response to that notice.

Additionally, in the context of the public's heightened stress and potential vulnerability during the ongoing public health crisis, the Department reminds insurers and producers that may sell, solicit, or negotiate limited or excepted benefit policies, including but not limited to short-term limited duration or specified disease policies, of their obligations to adhere to the requirements of the Unfair Insurance Practices Act (UIPA) (40 P.S. § 1171.1— 1171.15). Specifically, the Department expects that insurers and producers will clearly and explicitly present the coverages—and the limitations of the coverages—of the policies they are selling, soliciting or negotiating, to avoid misrepresentations or misleading statements to consumers. These obligations will be manifest most obviously in communications to consumers prior to and at the point of sale by insurers, producers or affiliates, where those communications may address, for example:

- a. That the policy is not being made available under a Special Enrollment Period or other special enrollment opportunity.
  - b. The scope of coverage of the policy, such as:
- i. That it is not comprehensive major medical coverage under the Affordable Care Act (Pub.L. No. 111-148), and is not eligible for premium tax credits or cost-sharing reductions.
- ii. What coverage it provides, if any, for COVID-19 testing and treatment and what exclusions or limitations may be imposed on that coverage.
- iii. If applicable, what cost-sharing or medical management criteria for COVID-19 testing and treatment may be required of the consumer.
- c. That the policy is not Medical Assistance or Children's Health Insurance Program coverage.
- d. The impact of COVID-19 testing or treatment on the renewability of the coverage.

Insurers should also consider what guidance they provide to producers marketing and offering the policy form in this Commonwealth to assure that the UIPA standards are satisfied when their products are sold, solicited or negotiated.

In sum, to protect the public health and to assure full and complete information is available regarding whatever

commercial health care coverage an individual may have, the Department asks for the cooperation of all insurers and producers that may sell, solicit, or negotiate limited or excepted benefit policies, including but not limited to short-term limited duration or specified disease policies, to identify and remove barriers to testing and treatment for COVID-19, and to assure that consumers with these policies are accurately informed of the limits of their policies both prior to and after purchase. The Department extends its appreciation to health insurers and producers who have already been working with the Commonwealth to address this public health challenge. Since the COVID-19 situation continues to evolve, health insurers should continually assess their readiness and be prepared to make any necessary adjustments.

COVID-19 Guidance Regarding all Insurers Writing Automobile Insurance, Personal and Commercial, within the Commonwealth; Notice 2020-07

In response to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the Department of Transportation (PennDOT) has issued several pieces of guidance in relation to driver's license expirations. The Insurance Department (Department) is issuing this notice to all insurers writing automobile insurance in this Commonwealth to alert insurers to this guidance as well as to take the opportunity to communicate the Department's expectations of automobile insurers during the COVID-19 pandemic. This notice applies to all insurers writing automobile insurance in this Commonwealth, whether personal or commercial.

In response to concerns from individuals whose driver license may expire during PennDOT license and photo centers closure, PennDOT has issued general guidance in regard to license expirations during this time. As noted by PennDOT:

Driver licenses, photo ID cards and learner's permits scheduled to expire from March 16, 2020, through March 31, 2020, the expiration date is now extended until May 31, 2020.

PennDOT has noted that this extension applies to driver licenses and commercial driver licenses. PennDOT's guidance, which includes general guidance on many other matters, can be found at https://www.penndot.gov/Pages/Coronavirus.aspx.

The Department is aware that insurers may have products in the market which include exclusions, rates or underwriting rules which apply when a policyholder's license expires. The Department expects that insurers will apply these product features in a manner consistent with PennDOT's guidance as to the expiration of driver licenses. Specifically, the Department notes that policyholder licenses which are set to expire from March 16, 2020, to March 31, 2020, are now extended to May 31, 2020. The Department expects that insurers will apply

exclusions, rates or underwriting rules as if the policy-holder's license expires May 31, 2020. The extension provided by PennDOT may be subject to revisions and the Department encourages insurers to monitor PennDOT's web site for any guidance on this and other issues.

Beyond PennDOT's guidance, the Department is taking the opportunity to communicate its expectations of insurers during the COVID-19 disruption. As noted in the Department's Notice 2020-04, published at 50 Pa.B. 2242 (April 25, 2020), the Department recognizes that the COVID-19 disruption has posed unique challenges for the insureds and insurers of this Commonwealth. Responses to these challenges require flexibility on the part of the insurance industry. The Department has, and continues to, strongly encourage insurers to work with their policyholders to find unique solutions to problems which may arise during this time. In response to inquiries from insurers and insureds alike, the Department is providing the following guidance to insurers writing automobile insurance in this Commonwealth.

- Beyond the application of exclusions, rates and rules in regard to the license expirations from March 16, 2020, to March 31, 2020, the Department encourages that insurers review all eligibility criteria for discounts such as good driver discounts. Additionally, with the closures of schools and universities in this Commonwealth for an extended period, events which are outside the control of policyholders, insurers should consider these circumstances when applying other discounts such as good student discounts
- On March 26, 2020, the United States Department of Labor released its seasonally adjusted initial jobless claims indicating jobless claims rose to 3,283,000. The Department understands that worker displacement during the COVID-19 disruption may negatively impact insureds' credit scores. Insurers should review the application of credit score in the rates charged to consumers and provide flexibility, where appropriate, to policyholders who may experience a negative credit event during this time. A declining credit score may not be used to increase a premium at renewal.
- The COVID-19 disruption has created practical changes in many consumers lives including a decrease in driving. The Department encourages insurers to review the impact that these changes may have with regard to claims, renewals and other items. The Department anticipates that claims frequency may be impacted by the reduction in insureds' driving. The Department encourages all insurers to review the impact this may have on the rates which are currently charged to insureds, and apply low-mileage discounts, where appropriate.
- Under Governor Tom Wolf's order closing all nonlife sustaining businesses, as of 8 p.m. March 19, 2020, some businesses which would customarily be available during the claims process are currently closed. Businesses such as car dealerships or repair facilities may be closed and the Department encourages flexibility by insurers with limits on rental car coverage and other items which are impacted by the closure of businesses during this time.

The Department understands that many insurers and insureds in this Commonwealth are experiencing disruptions to daily life in many and varying ways and degrees. Insurers should work with policyholders where possible and provide the necessary flexibility needed at this unique time. Insurers are also encouraged to contact the Department to explain the implications of the disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and to discuss their

unique and innovative approaches to these disruptions and discuss what impediments stand in the way.

COVID-19 Guidance Regarding all Volunteer Physicians, Podiatrists and Certified Nurse Midwives Practicing under a Reactivated License; Notice 2020-8

In light of recent events and questions that have been presented to the Insurance Department (Department), the Department is issuing this notice to all volunteer physicians, podiatrists and certified nurse midwives and to the hospitals and long-term care facilities where they may be practicing. The Department takes this opportunity to communicate the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Fund's (Fund) guidance on its expectations on the limits of professional medical malpractice insurance during the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

To increase the number of health care practitioners available to respond to the COVID-19 emergency and to ensure continuity of patient care and services, Governor Tom Wolf has granted the Department of State's request to suspend some licensing and regulatory requirements. The suspension of these requirements allows individuals in the health care field with Pennsylvania licenses that are inactive or expired to apply for reactivation and immediately resume work within their scope of practice upon issuance of the reactivated license. More information regarding reactivation of licenses can be found on the Department of State's web site at https://www.dos.pa.gov/Pages/COVID-19-Waivers.aspx.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act (Pub.L. No. 116-136) was signed into law on March 27, 2020. Section 3215, entitled "Limitation on Liability for Volunteers Provision," provides for additional liability protection for licensed health care professionals who are providing health care services in response to this public health emergency as a volunteer. These protections are in addition to those already afforded by the Volunteer Protection Act of 1997 (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 14501—14505) and the Pennsylvania Volunteer Health Services Act of 1996 (35 P.S. §§ 449.41—449.43).

Under normal circumstances, unless a health care practitioner is practicing under a volunteer license issued by the Department of State at an approved clinic, the MCARE Act (40 P.S. §§ 1303.101—1303.910) requires that physicians, podiatrists and certified nurse midwives conducting 50% or more of their practice in this Commonwealth maintain medical malpractice insurance with separate limits and contribute to the MCARE Fund.

However, in consideration of section 3215 of the CARES Act, physicians, podiatrists and certified nurse midwives that are providing health care services in hospital and long-term care facilities under reactivated licenses volun-

tarily and without compensation are not required to have individual limits or to individually participate in the MCARE Fund through the payment of an assessment. They may be covered by the medical malpractice insurance coverage of the hospital or long-term care facility for which they are volunteering and share those limits and payment of assessment. The name, medical license number and beginning and ending dates of practice for practitioners volunteering in a hospital or long-term care facility must be reported to the MCARE Fund, however, no additional MCARE assessment is due on their behalf.

Those physicians, podiatrists and certified nurse midwives that provide health care services under reactivated licenses either outside a hospital or long-term care facility or for compensation are still required to have separate limits as prescribed MCARE Act and pay into the MCARE Fund.

### COVID-19 Guidance Regarding Premium Finance Agreements; Notice 2020-11

The Insurance Department (Department) is issuing this notice to all premium finance companies licensed by the Department under the Insurance Premium Finance Company Act (act) (40 P.S. §§ 3301—3314), as well as all insurance carriers engaging with such companies within the Commonwealth. The purpose of this notice is to communicate the Department's expectations of premium finance companies during the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. As noted in the Department's Notice 2020-04, the Department recognizes that the COVID-19 disruption has posed unique challenges for the insureds and insurers of this Commonwealth. Responses to these challenges require flexibility in all aspects of the insurance industry, including premium finance companies.

The Department recognizes that premium finance companies provide an important lending function to individuals and businesses with respect to financing the payment of insurance premiums under premium finance agreements. Further, the Department understands that disruptions to normal operations resulting from the efforts to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 may result in insureds being unable to timely meet payment obligations under these agreements. Considering these unprecedented challenges to individuals and businesses, the Department is encouraging premium finance companies, to the greatest extent possible, to accommodate insureds by extending or providing grace periods for loan payments or to be otherwise flexible with respect to determinations of default under premium finance agreements, especially with regard to cancellations for default governed by section 10 of the act (40 P.S. § 3310). In addition, the Department is encouraging premium finance companies to waive or temporarily eliminate any delinquency or other charges that would ordinarily be permitted under section 9 of the act (40 P.S. § 3309).

To facilitate this accommodation, the Department is encouraging insurance carriers to work with premium finance companies to facilitate any grace period modifications. Furthermore, insurance carriers should recall that their ultimate responsibility is to the policyholder. As such, when a policy is being cancelled because of a premium finance default, the Department advises that insurance carriers should work directly with the policyholder to provide any reasonable flexibility and accommodations to the policyholder to allow the policy to remain in effect.

The severe and ongoing economic impact resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic calls on everyone to work together to support individuals and members of the business community who, through no fault of their own, are incurring economic hardship, and the Department is requesting the insurance industry's cooperation in providing this support. The purpose of this notice is to advise all domestic insurance companies in this Commonwealth regarding continued compliance with regulatory requirements during the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) public health emergency.

Extensions for Regulatory Filing Deadlines

At this time, companies are still required to make all required electronic filings (for example, quarterly financial statements, audited financial statements) with the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC). Filings should also continue to be filed electronically with the company's assigned analyst. If the company believes that it will not be able to meet a deadline required by law or regulation, contact the assigned analyst by e-mail to request an extension in writing. The Insurance Department (Department) will consider providing insurers an additional 30 or 60 days, as provided as follows, to complete certain filings. The Department reserves the right to reject an extension request based upon the financial condition of the company or any other unique circumstances applicable to the company.

Filings subject to a potential 30-day extension:

- May 1, 2020, Combined Annual Statement Filing (Property)
- May 1, 2020, Combined Insurance Expense Exhibit (Property)
- June 1, 2020, Accountant's Letter of Qualifications (Property, Life/Fraternal, Health, Title)
- August 15, 2020, PBR Exemption filing due to State July 1, 2020, and to NAIC August 15, 2020, (Life/Fraternal)

Filings subject to a potential 60-day extension:

• June 1, 2020, Audited Financial Report (Property, Life/Fraternal, Health, Title)

• August 1, 2020, Communication of Internal Control Related Matters Noted in Audit (Property, Life/Fraternal, Health, Title)

 $\bullet$  June 1, 2020, Corporate Governance Annual Disclosure

Electronic Filings and Electronic Signatures

Prior to the COVID-19 crisis, the Department generally instructed companies to file documents in hard copy form with original (wet) signature, with notary requirements. Until further notice, the hard copy, original signature, notarization and other in-person related filing requirements are currently waived. Companies shall submit all documents electronically to their assigned analyst. However, companies are expected to keep a list of all filings that were submitted electronically. Hard copies should be

filed within 60 days after the Commonwealth lifts its social distancing restrictions and employees are permitted to return to work.

Onsite Examinations

Some insurers have inquired regarding whether the Department will continue to conduct onsite examinations during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Department will fully comply with any government directives or orders regarding public gatherings and essential operations. At this time, the Department will not conduct any onsite examination work that is contrary to the spirit of any public health directive. However, the Department will continue to engage in all examination functions that do not require employees onsite. Companies should be aware that the Department may need to request additional information in electronic form. The Department expects independent auditors will also take a similar position. The Department acknowledges that company response times may be slower as more employees work from home. However, the Department will continue to engage in all examination functions that do not require employees onsite.

Notice to Insurance Companies Regarding Policyholders Affected by the COVID-19 Virus; Notice 2020-04

Given the spread of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19), schools, businesses and the general public have been encouraged to take mitigating efforts to limit further spread of COVID-19. Some of these measures have unfortunately led to the displacement of workers which may have adverse effects, including the failure to be paid their regular salary and receive reimbursement when normally due. This, in turn, may adversely affect the ability of these individuals or entities to make timely payment for monetary obligations, including payments for insurance premiums.

The Insurance Department (Department) specifically encourages the entities and individuals it regulates to assist those affected by the current situation. Insurers should consider the following actions: consistent with prudent insurance practices; relaxing due dates for premiums payments; extending grace periods; waiving late fees and penalties; and allowing payment plans for premiums payments to otherwise avoid a lapse in coverage. Insurers should consider cancellation or nonrenewal of policies only after exhausting other efforts to work with policyholders to continue coverage.

This bulletin shall apply to commercial and personal, property, casualty, accident and health and life policies.

Affected policyholders should notify their insurance carriers and agents and explain their individual situation and difficulties complying with payment schedules.

The Department believes that the considerations outlined in this notice are crucial at this time to help ease the hardships that are being felt by the citizens of this Commonwealth. The Department will continue to monitor developments and will evaluate the situation as necessary.

Notice to Licensees Regarding Education Courses and License Renewals; Notice 2020-06

In light of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) spread in this Commonwealth, the Insurance Department (Department) issues this notice to all licensees of this Department. Beginning Monday, March 16, 2020, all in-person classroom education approved by the Department is temporarily suspended due to the circumstances related to COVID-19. Instead, classroom courses may be offered by means of Internet based webinar format. Providers previously approved for classroom training do not need to contact the Department to offer courses by means of webinar. To the extent that education providers have currently approved online Continuing Education (CE) courses, the Department encourages individuals to utilize these programs to continue to provide producers with CE. Providers and licensees are encouraged to monitor www. insurance.pa.gov for periodic licensure updates.

While the Department strongly encourages licensees to take advantage of online CE courses, the Department understands that at this time, the circumstances related to COVID-19 may prevent some licensees from being able to complete CE requirements in time for their licensing renewal. Therefore, until further notice, the Commissioner of the Commonwealth, under section 608-A(e) of The Insurance Department Act of 1921 (act) (40 P.S. § 310.8(e)), will temporarily waive CE requirements for licensees who cannot meet requirements due to extenuating circumstances related to COVID-19.

The Department understands that this will necessarily impact licensees who are either renewing their licenses or preparing to renew their licenses. In anticipation of these concerns, beginning Monday, March 16, 2020, the Department, under section 608-A of the act, will temporarily extend the licensing renewal deadline for licensees impacted by extenuating circumstances related to COVID-19.

Additionally, until further notice, the Commissioner of the Commonwealth, under section 608-A of the act, will temporarily waive CE requirements for licensees who cannot meet requirements due to extenuating circumstances related to COVID-19.

While the Department strongly encourages licensees to renew their licenses by the due date by electronic means such as Sircon and NIPR, as well as take advantage of online CE courses, the Department understands that at this time, the circumstances related to COVID-19 may prevent some licensees from being able to renew their licenses or complete CE requirements in time. Licensees are encouraged to monitor www.insurance.pa.gov for periodic licensure updates. Any and all renewal requirements,

including CE, are still applicable and the Department will work with licensees once COVID-19 has been contained to meet these requirements.
