

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Rules, Regulations and Statements of Policy in Titles 1—107 of the Pennsylvania Code

Text proposed to be added is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Text proposed to be deleted is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency

August 18, 2020

Whereas, on January 10, 2018, I declared a disaster emergency due to the opioid crisis that is ravaging the country, including the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and its citizens;

Whereas, my Proclamation of Disaster Emergency dated January 10, 2018, was renewed by Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (1st Amendment) on April 4, 2018, for an additional ninety days. The April 4, 2018, 1st Amendment would have automatically expired by operation of law on July 3, 2018, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on June 28, 2018. The June 28, 2018, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (2nd Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on September 26, 2018, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on September 24, 2018. The September 24, 2018, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (3rd Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on December 23, 2018, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on December 21, 2018. The December 21, 2018, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (4th Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on March 21, 2019, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on March 20, 2019. The March 20, 2019, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (5th Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on June 18, 2019, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on June 14, 2019. The June 14, 2019, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (6th Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on September 12, 2019, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on September 5, 2019. The September 5, 2019, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (7th Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on December 4, 2019, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on December 3, 2019. The December 3, 2019, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (8th Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on March 2, 2020, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on February 25, 2020. The February 25, 2020, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (9th Amendment) was set to expire by operation of law on May 25, 2020, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, I renewed the Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for an additional ninety days by official action on May 22, 2020. The May 22, 2020, Amendment to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (10th Amendment) is set to expire by operation of law on August 20, 2020, unless further extended by my official renewal;

Whereas, the opioid crisis continues to be of such magnitude or severity that emergency action is necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of affected citizens in Pennsylvania;

Whereas, the opioid crisis continues to be a public health emergency in Pennsylvania contributing to addiction, overdose emergencies and deaths; and

Whereas, investigations by the Opioid Unified Coordination Group indicate that additional resources of the Commonwealth may be needed to mitigate and contend with the magnitude and severity of this continuing and expanding disaster emergency.

Now Therefore, pursuant to the provisions of section 7301(c) of the Emergency Management Services Code, 35 Pa.C.S. § 7301(c), I do hereby order and direct as follows:

- 1. The Proclamation of Disaster Emergency of January 10, 2018, renewed by Amendments to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency dated April 4, 2018, June 28, 2018, September 24, 2018, December 21, 2018, March 20, 2019, June 14, 2019, September 5, 2019, December 3, 2019, February 25, 2020, and May 22, 2020, is renewed for an additional period of ninety days, and shall continue to apply to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- 2. All directives, authorized actions and provisions of the January 10, 2018, Proclamation of Disaster Emergency, and the April 4, 2018, June 28, 2018, September 24, 2018, December 21, 2018, March 20, 2019, June 14, 2019, September 5, 2019, December 3, 2019, February 25, 2020, and May 22, 2020, Amendments to Proclamation of Disaster Emergency shall remain in full force and effect until either rescinded by me or terminated by operation of law ninety days following the effective date of this Proclamation Amendment.
- 3. This Proclamation Amendment (11th Amendment) shall take effect immediately.

Title 210—APPELLATE PROCEDURE

PART I. RULES OF APPELLATE PROCEDURE [210 PA. CODE CH. 11]

Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.A.P. 1116

The Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee is considering proposing to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania the amendment of Pa.R.A.P. 1116 governing the answer to the petition for allowance of appeal for the reasons set forth in the accompanying explanatory report. Pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(a)(1), the proposal is being published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* for comments, suggestions, or objections prior to submission to the Supreme Court.

Any reports, notes, or comments in the proposal have been inserted by the Committee for the convenience of those using the rules. They will neither constitute a part of the rules nor will be officially adopted by the Supreme Court

CHAPTER 11. APPEALS FROM COMMONWEALTH COURT AND SUPERIOR COURT

PETITION FOR ALLOWANCE OF APPEAL

Rule 1116. Answer to the Petition for Allowance of Appeal.

(a) General rule.—Except as otherwise prescribed by this rule, within 14 days after service of a petition for

allowance of appeal an adverse party may file an answer. The answer shall be deemed filed on the date of mailing if first class, express, or priority United States Postal Service mail is utilized. The answer need not be set forth in numbered paragraphs in the manner of a pleading, shall set forth any procedural, substantive or other argument or ground why the order involved should not be reviewed by the Supreme Court, and shall comply with Pa.R.A.P. [1115(a).7] 1115(a)(7). No separate motion to dismiss a petition for allowance of appeal will be received. A party entitled to file an answer under this rule who does not intend to do so shall, within the time fixed by these rules for filing an answer, file a letter stating that an answer to the petition for allowance of appeal will not be filed. The failure to file an answer will not be construed as concurrence in the request for allowance of appeal.

- (b) Children's fast track appeals.—In a children's fast track appeal, within 10 days after service of a petition for allowance of appeal, an adverse party may file an answer.
- (c) Length.—An answer to a petition for allowance of appeal shall not exceed 9,000 words. An answer that does not exceed 20 pages when produced by a word processor or typewriter shall be deemed to meet the 9,000 word limit. In all other cases, the attorney or the unrepresented filing party shall include a certification that the answer complies with the word count limit. The certificate may be based on the word count of the word processing system used to prepare the answer.
- (d) Supplementary matter.—The cover of the answer, pages containing the table of contents, table of citations, proof of service, signature block, and anything appended to the answer shall not count against the word count limitations of this rule.
- (e) Certificate of compliance with Case Records Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania.—An answer to a petition for allowance of appeal shall contain the certificate of compliance required by Pa.R.A.P. 127.

Official Note: This rule and Pa.R.A.P. 1115 contemplate that the petition and answer will address themselves to the heart of the issue, such as whether the Supreme Court ought to exercise its discretion to allow an appeal, without the need to comply with the formalistic pattern of numbered averments in the petition and correspondingly numbered admissions and denials in the response. While such a formalistic format is appropriate when factual issues are being framed in a trial court [(as in the petition for review under Chapter 15)], as in the petition for review under Chapter 15, such a format interferes with the clear narrative exposition necessary to outline succinctly the case for the Supreme Court in the allocatur context.

Parties are strongly encouraged to raise any waiver-based or procedural objection to a petition for allowance of appeal in an answer to the petition. In addition, parties are reminded that they may raise waiver-based, procedural, and jurisdictional objections after the grant of a petition for allowance of appeal, but before merits briefing, through a dispositive motion filed under Pa.R.A.P. 1972.

PUBLICATION REPORT

Proposed Amendment of the Official Note to Pa.R.A.P. 1116

The Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee is considering proposing the amendment of the Official Note to Pennsylvania Rule of Appellate Procedure 1116 to encourage the early identification of waiver in discretionary appeals before the Supreme Court. The Committee undertook review of this issue based, in part, upon a suggestion that:

Any appellee that intends to assert a waiver defense with respect to any issue presented for review in a petition for allowance of appeal, see Rule 1115(3), should be required to file an answer to said petition notifying this Court of its intention to assert such a defense. An appellee failing to comply with this requirement would then be precluded from asserting the defense in any subsequent filings with this Court in the case then at bar. Where an appellee provides the notice as required, it would remain within this Court's discretion to grant allocatur and decide the issue on its substantive merits.

Commonwealth v. Bishop, 217 A.3d 833, 844 (Pa. 2019) (J. Donohue concurring).

Preliminarily, waiver may occur at multiple stages in a proceeding. Often, waiver results at the trial court level through a lack of preservation. See, e.g., Pa.R.E. 103 (Rulings on Evidence); Pa.R.C.P. No. 227.1 (Post-Trial Relief); Pa.R.Crim.P. 607 (Challenges to the Weight of Evidence). Waiver may also result after an appeal has been taken. See, e.g., Pa.R.A.P. 1925(b)(4)(vii); Pa.R.A.P. 2116(a).

To assist the appellate courts in detecting waiver, the Rules of Appellate Procedure require the appellant to identify where and how issues raised on appeal were preserved before the trial court. See, e.g., Pa.R.A.P. 2117, 2119. When the lack of preservation is patent, the Rules are intended to identify the presence of waiver to winnow those issues from review. However, waiver may also result from imperfect issue preservation or inadequate advocacy. Latent waiver, as opposed to patent waiver, is more difficult to discern and may be subject to reasonable dispute. See, e.g., Commonwealth v. Gonzalez, 608 A.2d 528, 531 (Pa. Super. 1992) (claim on appeal is waived where appellant neither cites supportive precedent nor gives any reference to record evidence which substantiates argument); Pa.R.A.P. 2119(a).

Regarding petitions for allowance of appeal, a respondent could raise the issue of waiver in an answer to a petition for allowance of appeal. See Pa.R.A.P. 1116(a). The Committee considered a requirement that waiver be identified by answer in every matter. To lend perspective, in 2018, there were 1,973 petitions for allowance of appeal filed with the Supreme Court, but appeals were allowed in only 96 cases. This represents a 95.1% attrition rate based entirely on the merits. The additional workload of raising waiver by answer in every matter did not appear to be warranted given this rate of denial on the merits. Instead, it seemed more efficient that efforts be focused on identifying waiver in the appeals granted review

Additionally, the Committee believed that the decision whether to file an answer pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 1116(a) should be left to the discretion of the respondent. When latent waiver might exist, an answer, together with attendant word limitations, may not be an adequate vehicle to present and analyze an assertion of waiver.

Similarly, the Rules of Appellate Procedure do not provide a mechanism for a petitioner to file a reply to an answer that suggests waiver. Moreover, the merits of a petition for allowance of appeal may only concern waiver found by the intermediate appellate court, which would obviate the need for an answer to raise waiver.

The Committee next considered a requirement that an answer identifying waiver be filed only after the Court has identified a petition for allowance containing a potentially meritorious issue. Such a practice would be similar to that in the United States Supreme Court, which, as a practical matter, grants petitions for writ of certiorari only after ordering a response from the party opposing the petition. See Stephen M. Shapiro et al., Supreme Court Practice Ch. 6.37(k) (11th ed. 2019) ("[I]f the respondent has not filed a response, or has affirmatively waived the right to file, and if the Court believes that the petition may have some merit, the respondent will typically be asked to file a response."). The Committee did not favor this approach because it 1) places a burden on the Court to order the party or parties to file an answer; 2) lengthens the review process; 3) potentially identifies meritorious issues that may nonetheless be denied review; and 4) implicates the preceding concern that an answer may not be an adequate vehicle to analyze a possible waiver claim.

The Committee further considered a requirement that a respondent raise waiver after a petition for allowance of appeal has been granted, but before argument. This approach would allow the Court to address waiver before the merits of the appeal. Additionally, the timing may be more appropriate where waiver is not patent because the record would have been transmitted to the Court. See Pa.R.A.P. 1122 (requiring transmission of record after an appeal is allowed).

The Rules of Appellate Procedure already provide a mechanism to raise the issue of waiver via application and seek dismissal of an appeal. See Pa.R.A.P. 1972(a)(5). Further, this procedure would provide the Court with the flexibility to set a separate briefing schedule to decide the application prior to consideration of the merits or to defer consideration. Moreover, the appellant is permitted to file an answer to the application. See Pa.R.A.P. 123(b).

The Committee believed that filing such an application pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 1972(a)(5) should remain discretionary for respondent rather than be mandated. Requiring an application may have the unintended consequence of foreclosing earlier identification of patent waiver in an answer to a petition for allowance of appeal. Further, a party may wish to defer raising waiver until merits briefing if a finding of waiver would result in only one of several issues being dismissed on appeal, *i.e.*, incomplete relief.

Concerning the possible consequence for belatedly raising waiver, *i.e.*, "waiving waiver," such an approach seemed counter-intuitive to long established issue preservation practice. See, e.g., Dilliplaine v. Lehigh Valley Trust, 322 A.2d 114, 116-17 (Pa. 1974); Pa.R.A.P. 302. Relatedly, the operation of "waiving waiver" may also arguably impede the Court's authority to find waiver sua sponte. See Wirth v. Commonwealth, 95 A.3d 822, 836-37 (Pa. 2014); Commonwealth v. Hill, 16 A.3d 484, 494 (Pa. 2011)

Undoubtedly, delaying the issue of waiver until consideration of the merits can cause the unnecessary expenditure of time and resources if waiver would operate to dismiss an entire appeal. To encourage parties to identify

waiver earlier in the appellate process, the Committee proposes to amend the Official Note to Pa.R.A.P. 1116 to suggest raising waiver in opposition to a petition for allowance of appeal and through an application pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 1972. Through this amendment, the Committee seeks to alleviate the inefficiencies discussed in the concurring opinion in *Bishop* without altering longstanding principles of petition for allowance of appeal practice.

All comments, concerns, and suggestions concerning this proposal are welcome.

CHAPTER 1920. ACTIONS OF DIVORCE OR FOR ANNULMENT OF MARRIAGE

- Rule 1920.17. [Discontinuance. Withdrawal of Complaint] Withdrawing Complaint and Discontinuing Divorce Action. Withdrawing Ancillary Claims Raised in Pleadings. Notice. Death of a Party.
- [(a) The plaintiff may withdraw the divorce complaint and discontinue the divorce action by praecipe that includes a certification that:
- (1) no ancillary claims or counterclaims have been asserted by either party; and
- (2) grounds for divorce have not been established.
- (b) A party may withdraw a claim of equitable distribution only:
- (1) by written consent of both parties filed with the court, or
- (2) after filing and serving on the other party a written notice that the party intends to withdraw the claim of equitable distribution 20 days after service of the notice.]
- (a) Withdrawing Complaint and Discontinuing Divorce Action. A plaintiff may withdraw a divorce complaint and discontinue the divorce action by:
- (1) a motion, except as provided in subdivision (a)(2), which has been served on the defendant; or
- (2) a praecipe, which includes the plaintiff's certification that:
- (i) neither equitable division of marital property nor custody claims are pending;
- (ii) the defendant has filed neither a counterclaim nor a separate petition raising claims; and

- (iii) the parties have not established grounds for divorce.
- (b) Withdrawing Ancillary Claims Raised in Pleadings. Without discontinuing the divorce action, the party who raised an ancillary claim may withdraw the claim by a praecipe filed with the prothonotary, except:
- (1) a party who raised an equitable division of marital property claim may withdraw the claim only:
- (i) with the parties' written and filed agreement, including as required by Pa.R.C.P. No. 1920.42(a)(4), (b)(4), or (c)(4);
 - (ii) with the opposing party's written consent; or
- (iii) after filing and serving on the opposing party a notice that the party intends to withdraw the equitable division claim 20 days after service of the notice.
 - Official Note: See subdivision (c) for the notice.
- (2) a party who raised a custody claim in a divorce action may withdraw the claim only as provided in Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.3-1(b).
- (c) The notice required in subdivision [(b) above] (b)(1)(iii) shall be substantially in the following form: (Caption)

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO WITHDRAW CLAIM FOR EQUITABLE [DISTRIBUTION] DIVISION OF MARITAL PROPERTY

TO: _____(PLAINTIFF) (DEFENDANT)

(Plaintiff) (Defendant) intends to withdraw [(his) (her)] his or her pending claim for equitable [distribution of property twenty] division of marital property 20 days after the service of this notice. Unless you have already filed [with the court a written claim for equitable distribution] ancillary claims, which are permitted under the Divorce Code, including equitable division of marital property, you should do so within [twenty] 20 days of the service of this notice, or you may lose the right to assert [a claim for equitable distribution. If] those ancillary claims, if the court enters a decree in divorce [is entered and you have not filed a claim for equitable distribution, you will forever lose the right to equitable distribution of property].

- (d) In the event one party dies during the course of the divorce proceeding, no decree of divorce has been entered and grounds for divorce have been established, neither the complaint nor economic claims can be withdrawn except by the consent of the surviving spouse and the personal representative of the decedent. If there is no agreement, the economic claims shall be determined pursuant to the Divorce Code. Death of a Party.
- (1) If a party dies after the parties have established grounds for divorce but before the court has entered the divorce decree:
- (i) the surviving spouse or the decedent's personal representative may only withdraw the complaint or an ancillary claim with the parties' written consent;
- (ii) the Divorce Code shall determine the disposition of an ancillary claim raised in a pleading, unless:
- (A) the parties have an agreement that resolves the ancillary claim; or
- (B) the parties have withdrawn the complaint or ancillary claim as provided in subdivision (d)(1)(i); and

Official Note: See 23 Pa.C.S. § 3323(g) for establishing grounds for divorce when a party dies during the pendency of the divorce action.

[If no] (iii) if a personal representative has <u>not</u> been appointed within one year of the decedent's death, [then,] upon motion of the surviving party, the court may allow the withdrawal or dismissal of the complaint [and/or any] or a pending [economic claims] ancillary claim.

(2) If a party dies before the parties have established grounds for divorce, the divorce action abates, and the Probate, Estates, and Fiduciaries Code, 20 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 et seq., controls the decedent's property disposition.

Official Note: See In re Estate of Bullotta, 838 A.2d 594, 596 (Pa. 2003) ("Generally, a divorce action abates with the death of one of the spouses.").

To the extent that *Tosi v. Kizis*, 85 A.3d 585 (Pa. Super. 2014), holds that 23 Pa.C.S. § 3323(d.1) does not prevent the plaintiff in a divorce action from discontinuing the divorce action following the death of the defendant after grounds for divorce have been established, it is superseded.

Comment—2020

As the Divorce Code permits a party to raise a child custody claim in a divorce complaint, subdivision (b)(2) addresses withdrawing a custody count. Pa.R.C.P. No. 1920.32 requires a custody claim raised in a divorce action to follow the custody practices and procedures, and Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.3-1(b) provides specific limitations on withdrawing a custody action. As such, subdivision

(b)(2) has been added to clarify that a party desiring to withdraw a custody claim raised in a divorce pleading shall do so consistent with Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.3-1(b).

Rule 2.4. Petition for Adjudication/Statement of Proposed Distribution; Virtual Representation.

* * * * *

Note: Although substantially modified, Rule 2.4 is derived from former Rule 6.9. One modification is to require averments for virtual representation under 20 Pa.C.S. § 751(6) generally and representation in "trust matters" pursuant to 20 Pa.C.S. §§ 7721 et seq. Another substantial modification is the addition of subparagraph (e) that requires counsel to sign the petition for adjudication/statement of distribution attesting that the submitted petition for adjudication/statement of distribution accurately replicates the Model Form and subjects counsel to rules and sanctions as provided in Pa.R.C.P. Nos. 1023.1 through 1023.4. (See Rule 3.12.)

See Rule 5.50 for procedures governing petitions for the settlement of small estates filed pursuant to 20 Pa.C.S. § 3102.

CHAPTER V. RULES OF GOVERNING SPECIFIC TYPES OF PETITIONS

(*Editor's Note*: The following rule is added and printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

Rule 5.50. Settlement of Small Estates by Petition.

- (a) Applicability. This Rule applies to all petitions filed pursuant to 20 Pa.C.S. § 3102, pertaining to settlement of small estates by petition.
- (b) *Contents*. In addition to the requirements provided by the Rules in Chapter III, a petition shall set forth the following:
 - (1) Estate.
- (i) the name and address of each petitioner and the petitioner's relationship to the decedent;
- (ii) the decedent's name, date of death, and domicile at the time of death;
- (iii) a statement whether the decedent died testate or intestate and, if testate, that the original will is attached, or that the original will cannot be produced, the reason it cannot be produced, and that a photocopy of the original will is attached;
- (iv) the name and address of each testate or intestate beneficiary, and if any such beneficiary is a minor or otherwise incapacitated, the name and address of such beneficiary's legal representative, as applicable; and
- (v) whether a claim for family exemption is included, and if the claimant is not the surviving spouse, the relationship of the claimant to the decedent, and a statement that the claimant resided with the decedent at the date of death and if the claimant is the surviving spouse, that he or she has not forfeited the right to claim the family exemption.
- (2) Assets. All assets of decedent's estate, other than real estate and property distributable under 20 Pa.C.S. § 3101, and the value of each asset.
 - (3) Liabilities.
- (i) the names and addresses of all known creditors, total amounts claimed by each, whether the debts have been satisfied, and an itemized list of all debts, including whether or not admitted, a description of the property claimed and the gross value thereof, and whether there is any objection to the debt, and if so, by whom;
- (ii) an itemized list of unpaid administrative expenses, unpaid taxes, all other unpaid debts, and, if insolvent, as prioritized under 20 Pa.C.S. § 3392; and
- (iii) if the decedent was 55 years of age or older at the time of death, whether a request for a statement of claim was sent to the Department of Human Services in accordance with 62 P.S. § 1412, the date the request was made, and the response received from the Department.
 - (4) Distribution.
- (i) the name of any distributee paid prior to the filing of the petition, including the nature and amount of each payment;
- (ii) the name of each proposed distributee and respective proposed distribution;
- (iii) the name of each interested person who has consented to or joined in the petition; and
- (iv) the names of each testate or intestate beneficiary, as applicable, who has not consented to or joined in the petition.

- (5) Taxes. A statement that a Pennsylvania inheritance tax return has been filed, that all taxes due on the assets listed on the petition have been paid in full, and that proof of such payment is attached to the petition, or the reason why payment has not occurred.
- (c) *Exhibits*. The following items shall be attached as exhibits to the petition in the following order:
 - (1) an original death certificate;
 - (2) the decedent's will, if any;
- (3) Pennsylvania Department of Revenue Notice of Appraisement and Assessment of Tax;
- (4) original consents, joinders, and statements of no objection signed by interested parties; and
- (5) a copy of any correspondence received from the Department of Human Services in response to the statement of claim referenced in subparagraph (b)(3)(iii).
- (d) *Notice*. The petitioner shall serve written notice on interested parties in compliance with Chapter III.

Explanatory Comment: 20 Pa.C.S. § 3101, referenced in paragraph (b)(2), sets forth certain allowable payments to the decedent's family members, and to a licensed funeral director for the decedent's burial expenses. Property payable under 20 Pa.C.S. § 3101 shall not be included when determining whether the decedent's personal property exceeds a gross value \$50,000.

In paragraph (b)(3), the term "creditors" includes creditors of the decedent on the date of death, providers of funeral services, and providers of goods and services to the petitioner arising from settlement of the estate.

The Medical Assistance Estate Recovery Program, established by federal law, requires the Commonwealth to recover the Medical Assistance costs from decedents' estates. See 42 U.S.C. § 1396p; 62 P.S. § 1412.

The filings required by this rule are subject to the Case Records Public Access Policy of the Unified Judicial System of Pennsylvania. See Rule 1.99.

Orphans' Court Procedural Rules Committee Report

Amendment of the Note to Pa. O.C. Rule 2.4 and Adoption of Pa. O.C. Rule 5.50

The Orphans' Court Procedural Rules Committee ("Committee") recommended to the Supreme Court the amendment of the Note to Rule 2.4 of the Pennsylvania Orphans' Court Rules ("Rules") and the adoption of Rule 5.50 governing petitions filed pursuant to 20 Pa.C.S. § 3102 pertaining to the settlement of small estates. A small estate is one with a gross value not exceeding \$50,000 "exclusive of real estate and property payable under 20 Pa.C.S. § 3101 (relating to payments to family and funeral directors) but including property claimed as the family exemption." See 20 Pa.C.S. § 3102.

The Committee became aware of numerous counties with local rules governing petitions for the settlement of small estates. When a decedent is of modest means or insolvent, proceeding via a small estate petition may be a cost-effective alternative to the conventional administration and settlement process. The Committee recommended a statewide rule addressing this type of petition and identified certain information and exhibits that should be included in petitions for the settlement of small estates. The petition for the settlement of a small estate will require information about the petitioner and decedent, beneficiaries of the decedent, the decedent's assets, liabilities, distributions, and taxes, and will require the attachment of supporting exhibits. The petition is also subject to the general requirements for petitions set forth in Chapter III of these Rules. The amendment of the Note to Rule 2.4 adds a cross-reference to new Rule 5.50.

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF SOCIAL WORKERS, MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPISTS AND PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 47]

Licensed Bachelor Social Worker; Fees

The State Board of Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors (Board) amends §§ 47.1, 47.4, 47.11, 47.15, 47.32—47.36a, 47.41, 47.61—47.65 and 47.71, deletes § 47.12b and adds § 47.12e (relating to licensed bachelor social worker) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

The amendments will be effective upon publication of this final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Statutory Authority

Section 6 of the Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors Act (act) (63 P.S. § 1906) authorizes the Board to: pass upon the qualifications and fitness of applicants for licenses; to adopt and revise rules and regulations requiring applicants to pass examinations relating to their qualifications as a prerequisite to the issuance of a license; and adopt and revise rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of the act. Section 18(c) of the act (63 P.S. § 1918(c)) provides that all fees required under the act shall be fixed by the Board by regulation. Section 9 of the act of October 22, 2014 (P.L. 2884, No. 179) (Act 179) directs the Board to promulgate regulations to carry out Act 179, which provided for the licensure of bachelor social workers.

Background and Need for Amendment

Act 179 requires the Board to promulgate regulations for the licensure of bachelor social workers, including the establishment of applicable fees. In determining the appropriate fees for bachelor social workers, the Board undertook a comprehensive review of its overall fee structure because existing fees for licensed social workers, licensed clinical social workers, licensed marriage and family therapists and licensed professional counselors had not been adjusted since 2002, and the fees associated with approval of continuing education providers, programs and activities had not been updated since 2006. This final-form rulemaking effectuates Act 179 with regard to licensure of bachelor social workers, establishes applicable fees for licensed bachelor social workers, adjusts existing fees for the Board's other licensure categories to cover the Board's costs of operations, and eliminates provisions pertaining to provisional licenses, which were eliminated by Act 179.

Summary and Responses to Comments and Description of Amendments to the Final-Form Rulemaking

Notice of the proposed rulemaking was published at 48 Pa.B. 872 (February 10, 2018). Publication was followed by a 30-day public comment period during which the Board received favorable comments from the Association of Social Work Boards (ASWB). The Board also received comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) as part of its review under the

Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. §§ 745.1—745.15). The Board received no comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) or the Senate Consumer Protections and Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC).

Comments from the ASWB

The ASWB's comments were generally favorable, expressing support for the changes proposed by the Board. First, the ASWB noted that the regulations are consistent with their Model Social Work Practice Act (Model Law), in that the Model Law provides for a bachelor's level license, as well as being consistent with 33 other states that regulate social work practice at the bachelors, masters and clinical levels. The ASWB also noted that the proposed continuing education requirements of the Model Law, which suggests that social work licensees complete at least 15 hours of approved programs of continuing education annually, are consistent with the Board's proposal of 30 hours to be completed biennially. The ASWB also noted that Pennsylvania's efforts to add bachelors' level licensure are in concert with the ASWB Mobility Initiative.

The one area of concern raised by the ASWB pertains to § 47.36 (relating to preapproved providers of continuing education courses and programs for social workers and clinical social workers). The ASWB points out that it is unclear how preapproved providers will demonstrate that their courses routinely meet the standards established by the Board once the entity is approved to offer an unlimited number of courses. The Board acknowledges that there is no formal requirement for preapproved providers to submit every course they intend to offer to the Board for review and approval. The Board believes that requiring Board review of every course offered by preapproved providers would be overly burdensome to both the course providers and the Board and cause pre-approved providers unnecessary delays in presenting additional courses. Therefore, the Board relies on the preapproved providers to adhere to the standards set forth in § 47.35 (relating to standards for courses and programs). This is not to say that there is no mechanism to ensure that preapproved providers are following these standards. As the Board does random audits of licensees' compliance with the continuing education requirements, Board staff evaluates all courses that are submitted to assure that they meet the standards of § 47.35. If the Board determines, after notice and an opportunity to be heard, that a particular preapproved provider is not complying with the established standards, the Board may revoke the provider's pre-approved status. Historically, the Board has been able to resolve any identified issues before revocation of pre-approved status has become necessary. Therefore, the Board does not deem this to be an issue that requires changes to the regulations.

Additionally, the ASWB suggests that their Approved Continuing Education (ACE) program was created to help licensing boards to evaluate a continuing education provider's ability to present social workers with effective, relevant continuing education. The Board notes that continuing education providers, courses and programs approved by ACE are already accepted as preapproved by the Board. However, the Board has not considered mandating ACE approval, believing that because ASWB is also an approved provider of continuing education, it may be considered a conflict if the Board would use their ACE program to evaluate other competing continuing education providers.

Comments from IRRC

IRRC pointed out that § 47.15(a)(5) (relating to biennial renewal; inactive status; failure to renew) references "a late fee required by § 47.4...." but that no corresponding late fee is set forth in § 47.4 (relating to licensure fees). IRRC suggested that the Board clarify this reference by amending § 47.4 to include the late fees as authorized by section 225 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) Fee Act (63 P.S. § 1401-225), noting that it is beneficial to the regulated community to have all fees associated with licensure, renewal and reactivation located in one place. The Board agrees with IRRC's comment and has amended § 47.4 by adding the late fee of \$5 per month, or part of a month, for late renewal, as authorized under the BPOA Fee Act.

Fiscal Impact

This final-form rulemaking will have a fiscal impact on the regulated community of licensed bachelor social workers in that they would be required to pay a \$75 application fee, and a \$95 biennial renewal fee. They would also incur costs associated with completion of 30 hours of continuing education each biennium. Because there are many free and low-cost options for meeting the continuing education requirements, the Board estimates an average cost of \$300 per biennium to comply with the continuing education requirements. It would also have an impact on applicants for licensure as licensed social workers, licensed clinical social workers, licensed marriage and family therapists and licensed professional counselors due to the increased application fees. Applicants for licensure as a licensed social worker would incur a \$50 increase (from \$25 to \$75); applicants for licensure as a licensed clinical social worker would incur a \$45 increase (from \$45 to \$90); and applicants for licensure as a licensed marriage and family therapist or licensed professional counselor would incur a \$55 increase (from \$45 to \$100). Providers of continuing education courses and programs and, to a lesser extent, licensees would incur a \$20 increase in the application fee for approval of providers/courses/activities from \$45 to \$65. This finalform rulemaking should have no other fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions of the Commonwealth.

Paperwork Requirements

This final-form rulemaking will require bachelor level social workers to file an application for licensure and keep documentation on file to demonstrate completion of continuing education credit hours. The Board has developed an application for licensure as a bachelor social worker and will need to revise some of its other applications to provide for the increased fees. There should be no other paperwork requirements for the Commonwealth or the regulated community.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the effectiveness of its regulations on a fiscal year and biennial basis. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on January 31, 2018, the Board submitted a copy of the proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the SCP/PLC and the HPLC. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC were provided with copies of

the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form regulation, the Board has considered all comments.

Under section 5(g)(3) and (j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S.§ 745.5a(g)(3) and (j.2)), on February 19, 2020, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, the IRRC met on February 20, 2020 and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 2540), (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered in drafting this final-form rulemaking.
- (3) This final-form rulemaking does not include any amendments that would enlarge the scope of the proposed rulemaking published at 48 Pa.B. 872.
- (4) These amendments to the regulations of the State Board of Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors are necessary and appropriate for enforcing the act.

Order

The Board, acting under its authorizing statute, orders

- (a) The regulations of the Board at 49 Pa. Code Chapter 47, are amended by amending §§ 47.1, 47.4, 47.11, 47.15, 47.32—47.36a, 47.41, 47.61—47.65 and 47.71, deleting § 47.12b and adding § 47.12e to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for approval as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC for approval as required by law.
- (d) The Board shall certify this final-form rulemaking and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (e) This final-form rule making shall take effect immediately upon publication in the $Pennsylvania\ Bulletin.$

TITLE 49. PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 47. STATE BOARD OF SOCIAL WORKERS, MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPISTS AND PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 47.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Client/patient—An individual, group or family for whom a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker provides social work services or clinical social work services. In the case of an individual with a legal guardian, such as a minor or legally incapacitated adulty, the individual is the client/patient.

Immediate family member—A parent/guardian, child, sibling, spouse or other family member with whom the client/patient resides.

Licensed bachelor social worker—A person who is currently licensed as a licensed bachelor social worker under section 7 of the act (63 P.S. § 1907).

Licensed clinical social worker—A person who is currently licensed as a licensed clinical social worker under section 7 of the act.

Licensed social worker—A person who is currently licensed as a licensed social worker under section 7 of the act

Professional relationship—A relationship which is deemed to exist for the period of time beginning with the first professional contact or consultation between a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker and a client/patient and continuing thereafter until the last date of a professional service. If a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker sees a client/patient on an intermittent basis, the professional relationship is deemed to start anew on each date that the licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker provides a professional service to the client/patient.

Related field—Includes the fields of psychiatry, psychology, marriage and family therapy, counseling, art therapy, dance/movement therapy, drama therapy, music therapy, human services and counseling education.

* * * * *

§ 47.4. Licensure fees.

The fee schedule for licensure as a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker, licensed clinical social worker, licensed marriage and family therapist or licensed professional counselor shall be as follows:

- - (3) Verification of licensure......\$15
 - (4) Certification of license, scores or hours \$25
- (5) Application fee for licensure and original license issuance as a licensed clinical social worker \$90
- - (7) Late renewal fee (per month or part of month).. \$5

LICENSURE

§ 47.11. Licensure examination.

- (a) The examination required as a prerequisite to original licensure as a licensed social worker is the Association of Social Work Boards' (ASWB) master's level examination.
- (b) The examination required as a prerequisite to being granted a license to hold oneself out as a licensed bachelor social worker is the ASWB bachelor's level examination.
- (c) The examination required as a prerequisite to being granted a license to hold oneself out as a licensed clinical social worker is the ASWB clinical level examination.

* * * *

§ 47.12b. (Reserved).

§ 47.12e. Licensed bachelor social worker.

To be issued a license to hold oneself out as a licensed bachelor social worker, an applicant shall provide proof satisfactory to the Board, that the applicant has met all of the following conditions:

- (1) Satisfied the general requirements for licensure of § 47.12 (relating to qualifications for licensure).
- (2) Received a bachelor's degree from a program of social work or social welfare accredited by the Council on Social Work Education.
- (3) Passed the bachelor's license examination requirement set forth in § 47.11 (relating to licensure examination).

\$ 47.15. Biennial renewal; inactive status; failure to renew.

- (a) Biennial renewal.
- (1) A license granted under the act expires on the last day of the renewal month of every biennial period unless renewed for the next biennium.
- (2) A licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker who fails to renew his license shall cease using the title licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker.
- (3) Biennial renewal forms, other forms and literature to be distributed by the Board will be forwarded to the last mailing address given to the Board by the licensee. Whenever the licensee changes his mailing address of record, the licensee shall notify the Board, in writing, within 10 days after making the address change.

- (4) To retain the right to use the title licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker when engaging in practice, the licensee shall renew his license in the manner prescribed by the Board and pay the biennial renewal fee required by \\$ 47.4 (relating to licensure fees), prior to the expiration of the current biennium.
- (5) When a license is renewed after the expiration of the biennial period, a late fee required by § 47.4, as authorized by sections 224—227 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Fee Act (63 P.S. §§ 1401-224—1401-227), shall be applied for each month or part of a month that the licensee failed to renew the license or failed to notify the Board of the licensee's desire to be placed on inactive status. This late fee will be charged in addition to the biennial renewal fee.
- (6) The licensee who fails to pay the biennial renewal fee or who notifies the Board that the licensee does not desire to renew his license, will not be sent biennial renewal forms for the following biennial renewal periods, unless the licensee notifies the Board in writing of the licensee's desire to reactivate the license.
- (7) A licensee who practiced bachelor social work, social work or clinical social work and used or implied the licensee was a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker during a period in which the licensee was not licensed is subject to prosecution under section 16 of the act (63 P.S. § 1916).

(b) Inactive status.

- (1) A licensee who does not intend to use the title licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker in this Commonwealth and who does not desire to renew his license shall inform the Board in writing. Written confirmation of the Board's receipt of the licensee's letter and notice that the license has been classified as inactive will be forwarded to the licensee
- (2) A licensee applying for licensure renewal will not be assessed a late fee for preceding biennial periods in which the licensee was not engaging as a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker in this Commonwealth, if the licensee properly notified the Board of the licensee's desire to be placed on inactive status.
- (3) If the other conditions of the act and this chapter have been met, active status will be restored upon payment of fees as required under § 47.4.
- (c) Reactivation. A licensee who is applying to return to active status after expiration of a license as a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker shall:
- (1) Pay fees which are due as required under the act, § 47.4 and sections 224—227 of the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Fee Act.
- (2) Submit a sworn statement stating the period during which the licensee was not using the title or engaging as a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker in this Commonwealth.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

§ 47.32. Requirement for biennial renewal.

The Board requires, as a condition of biennial renewal of a bachelor social worker's license, a social worker's license or a clinical social worker's license, the completion during the preceding biennium of 30 clock hours of continuing education in acceptable courses and programs

in social work offered by approved providers. Excess clock hours may not be carried over to the next biennium. At least 3 of the required 30 clock hours must be related to ethical issues.

§ 47.33. Acceptable continuing education courses and programs.

- (a) Only courses or programs offered by Board approved providers will be accepted for continuing education credit, except as provided in § 47.36a (relating to other sources of continuing education).
- (b) For renewal of a social worker's license or a clinical social worker's license, continuing education courses and programs must be appropriate for the master's level practitioner and pertain to the practice of social work or clinical social work as defined in section 3 of the act (63 P.S. § 1903).
- (c) For renewal of a bachelor social worker's license, continuing education courses and programs must pertain to the practice of bachelor social work as defined in section 3 of the act or contribute to the professional development of the licensed bachelor social worker. Nothing in this subsection should be construed as expanding the scope of practice of a licensed bachelor social worker.
- (d) The Board will not approve courses or programs in office management or in practice building.
- (e) A licensee may accrue up to 20 of the required clock hours in home study courses offered by approved providers if the home study course has specific learning objectives which the provider evaluates to assure that learning has taken place. Home study courses must be indicated as such on the certificates of attendance.

§ 47.34. Registration of continuing education providers who offer one course or program.

- (a) An agency, organization, institution, association, center or individual seeking to offer one organized course or program may apply to the Board as a provider.
- (b) An applicant for Board approval as a provider of a course or program shall submit an application, along with a fee of \$65, at least 90 days before the date the course or program commences.

§ 47.35. Standards for courses and programs.

- (a) A provider or licensee seeking Board approval of a course or program shall present evidence that the course or program has all of the following:
- (1) Subject matter pertaining to the enhancement of the licensed bachelor social worker's, licensed social worker's or licensed clinical social worker's knowledge and practice skills related to helping people achieve adequate and productive personal, interpersonal and social adjustments in their individual lives, in their families and in their community.
- (2) For courses targeted to licensed social workers and licensed clinical social workers, evidence that the course or program is geared toward the master's level practitioner.
- (3) An established mechanism measuring the quality of the course or program being offered.
- (4) Established criteria for selecting and evaluating faculty or source material.
- (5) Established criteria for the evaluation of each course or program upon completion.

- (6) A minimum total duration of at least 1 clock hour. The Board will not approve partial credit for a course or program.
- (b) Providers shall comply with relevant Federal, State and local laws related to serving people with disabilities and shall provide adequate facilities and appropriate instructional materials to carry out the continuing education course or program.
- (c) Providers shall insure that instructors have suitable qualifications and are of good reputation and character.
- 47.36. Preapproved providers of continuing education courses and programs for licensed social workers, licensed clinical social workers and licensed bachelor social workers.

(b) The Board will consider for approval, as preapproved providers, other organizations who offer multiple courses and programs for licensed bachelor social workers, licensed social workers and licensed clinical social workers. The request for approval shall be submitted to the Board in writing and accompanied by a \$65 fee, along with a rationale as to why the organization should be included as a preapproved provider with specific reference to the standards in § 47.35.

§ 47.36a. Other sources of continuing education.

- (a) Clock hours may be granted on a case-by-case basis for the following:
- (1) Participation in clinical conferences, clinical rounds or training under a preceptor provided through hospitals, medical centers, schools and universities.
 - (2) First-time experience as a teacher.
- (3) Publications of articles, books and research relating to the practice of bachelor social work, social work or clinical social work.
 - (4) Services as a preceptor, lecturer or speaker.
- (b) A licensee who wishes to obtain clock hours for credit under subsection (a)(1), (2) or (4) shall submit, prior to participating in the event, an application for approval along with a \$65 fee as provided by § 47.34(b) (relating to registration of continuing education providers who offer one course or program). A licensee seeking to obtain clock hours for a publication under subsection (a)(3), shall submit, after the publication of the article, book or research, an application for approval along with a fee as provided by § 47.34(b).

§ 47.41. Disciplinary action authorized.

- (a) A licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker who submits fraudulent clock hour reports will be subject to disciplinary action under section 11(a)(5) of the act (63 P.S. § 1911(a)(5)).
- (b) The falsification of a clock hour report by a program provider will result in revocation of approval by the Board for further program offerings of that provider.

SEXUAL MISCONDUCT

§ 47.61. Prohibited conduct.

Sexual intimacies between a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker and a current client/patient, or an immediate family member of a current client/patient, are prohibited.

§ 47.62. Former sexual partners as clients/patients.

Licensed bachelor social workers, licensed social workers and licensed clinical social workers may not accept as client/patients individuals with whom they have engaged in sexual intimacies.

§ 47.63. Sexual intimacies with a former client/ patient or an immediate family member of a former client/patient.

- (a) Sexual intimacies between a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker and a former client/patient, or an immediate family member of a former client/patient are prohibited for 7 years following the termination of the professional relationship.
- (b) Following the passage of the 7-year period, licensed bachelor social workers, licensed social workers and licensed clinical social workers may engage in sexual conduct with a former client/patient, or an immediate family member of a former client/patient which is not exploitive. In determining whether the conduct is exploitive, the licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker shall consider all of the following:
- (1) The amount of time that has passed since the professional relationship terminated.
- (2) The nature and duration of the professional relationship.
 - (3) The circumstances of termination.
- (4) The client/patient's personal history—for example, unique vulnerabilities.
 - (5) The client/patient's current mental status.
- (6) Statements or actions made by the licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker during the course of professional relationship suggesting or inviting the possibility of a post-termination sexual or romantic relationship with the client/patient.
- (7) The likelihood of adverse impact on the client/ patient and immediate family members of the client/ patient.

§ 47.64. Disciplinary proceedings.

- (a) A violation of §§ 47.61—47.63 (relating to prohibited conduct; former sexual partners as clients/patients; sexual intimacies with a former client/patient or an immediate family member of a former client/patient) will be deemed unprofessional conduct and will subject the licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker to discipline under section 11(a)(2) of the act (63 P.S. § 1911(a)(2)).
- (b) The consent of a former client/patient or immediate family member of a former client/patient to engage in sexual intimacies with the licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker is not a defense in any disciplinary action brought under §§ 47.61—47.63.

§ 47.65. Impaired professional program.

When the Board takes disciplinary or corrective action against a licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker under section 11(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 1911(a)), for conduct prohibited by §§ 47.61—47.63 (relating to prohibited conduct; former sexual partners as clients/patients; and sexual intimacies with a former client/patient, or an immediate family member of a former client/patient), the licensed bachelor social worker, licensed social worker or licensed clinical social worker will not be eligible for placement into an impaired professional program in lieu of disciplinary or corrective action.

CODE OF ETHICAL PRACTICE AND STANDARDS OF PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

§ 47.71. Codes of ethical practice and professional conduct.

The Board subscribes to the codes of ethics and practice standards promulgated by the National Association of Social Workers (NASW), the Pennsylvania Society for Clinical Social Work and the Model Social Work Practice Act of the Association of State Social Work Boards. Licensed bachelor social workers, licensed social workers and licensed clinical social workers (licensees) shall adhere to these codes and standards, except when they conflict with this chapter. The Board will use these codes and standards in resolving ambiguities which may arise in the interpretation of this chapter, except that whenever any conflict exists between this chapter and the professional associations' codes and standards, this chapter shall prevail.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

General Quarantine Order; Cervid Movement Restrictions Within Core Captive Management Zone

I. Recitals.

The following recitals set forth and describe the dangerous transmissible disease for which this "General Quarantine Order; Cervid Movement Restrictions Within Core Captive Management Zone" (hereinafter "CCMZ General Quarantine Order") is instituted, specifies the species of domestic animals affected by and subject to this CCMZ General Quarantine Order and provides the authority under which this CCMZ General Quarantine Order is established.

- (a) Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is considered an infectious, progressive and fatal disease of susceptible species of the genera *Alces, Cervus, Odocoileus* and *Rangifer* including elk, white-tailed deer, moose, mule deer, black-tailed deer, sika deer, red deer, reindeer and hybrids thereof.
- (b) There is no known treatment for CWD infection; no successful vaccine against this disease and no reliable live individual animal test for this disease. Research regarding live animal testing and genetic resistance to CWD in individual animals is ongoing. As this is understood, it will be evaluated as an option in the future.
- (c) CWD is believed to be transmissible from infected to uninfected cervids by ingestion of infected or contaminated materials occurring through shared environment or close contact.
- (d) CWD has been designated a "dangerous transmissible disease" of animals by order of the Secretary of Agriculture under the provisions of the Domestic Animal Law (Law) (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2301—2389), at 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d).
- (e) The Department of Agriculture (Department) has broad authority under the Law to regulate the keeping, transport and handling of domestic animals to exclude, contain or eliminate dangerous transmissible diseases, such as CWD.
- (f) The Department also has broad authority under the Law to prohibit the importation of domestic animals, conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials to keep dangerous transmissible diseases, such as CWD, from entering this Commonwealth.
- (g) CWD may negatively impact this Commonwealth's free-ranging and domestic (farmed or captive) cervid populations. CWD is of concern to the captive/farmed cervid industry, in that presence of CWD infection in a herd has resulted in the destruction of the entire herd and severely limited the market for product within and outside this Commonwealth.
- (h) In 2012, two captive white-tailed deer in the Commonwealth were confirmed to be infected with CWD. Farmed white-tailed deer have been confirmed in Adams, Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Clearfield, Franklin, Fulton, Jefferson, Lancaster, and Perry counties on a total of 24 premises. Also, the 2012 Pennsylvania Game Commission's hunter harvest program testing detected CWD in

free-ranging deer. Since then, free ranging white-tailed deer have been identified in Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Clearfield, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon, Indiana, Jefferson, Juniata, Perry, Snyder, Somerset, and Westmoreland counties. CWD has also been detected in cervids in the nearby states of Maryland, New York, Ohio, Virginia, and West Virginia. To date, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has reported CWD in free-ranging deer, elk and moose in 24 states in the continental United States.

II. General Provisions.

With the foregoing recitals incorporated into this CCMZ General Quarantine Order by reference, the Department hereby establishes a General Quarantine under authority of the Domestic Animal Law, at 3 Pa.C.S. § 2329(d). The terms of this CCMZ General Quarantine Order are as follows:

- (a) Repeal, effect and continuance of previous Quarantine Orders. This CCMZ General Quarantine Order does not repeal or replace any previous Quarantine Order. The provisions of the General Quarantine Order; Chronic Wasting Disease Program Requirements for Herd Certification Program and Herd Monitoring Program, published at 44 PaB, 2249, No. 15, April 12, 2014 (hereinafter "2014 General Quarantine Order"), remain in full force and effect and continue to be applicable in the counties covered by this CCMZ General Quarantine Order. To the extent any provisions of this CCMZ General Quarantine Order are more stringent than or conflict with the 2014 General Quarantine Order, the provisions of this CCMZ General Quarantine Order shall take precedence and apply within the Core Captive Management Zone (CCMZ).
- (b) Core Captive Management Zone (CCMZ). This CCMZ General Quarantine Order is applicable to the CCMZ established by the following counties in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; Bedford, Blair, and Fulton.
- (c) Persons subject to this Order. Any person with a CWD susceptible species of the genera Alces, Cervus, Odocoileus and Rangifer including elk, white-tailed deer, moose, mule deer, black-tailed deer, sika deer, red deer, reindeer and hybrids thereof are subject to this CCMZ General Quarantine Order and shall follow all of the requirements established in this CCMZ General Quarantine Order, including movement of live and dead animals as set forth in this CCMZ General Quarantine Order.
- (d) Movement restrictions and conditions. Premises located within the CCMZ and having CWD susceptible species of Cervidae shall be subject to the following movement restrictions and requirements.
- 1. Movement restriction. No CWD susceptible species of Cervidae may be moved from premises located within the counties subject to this CCMZ General Quarantine Order to an area or premises within Pennsylvania that is outside of the CCMZ.
- 2. Live CWD susceptible animal movement conditions. Premises located within the CCMZ may move and receive CWD susceptible species of Cervidae, under the following rules and conditions:

- i. Between premises located within the CCMZ established by this CCMZ General Quarantine Order.
- ii. From premises located outside of the CCMZ to inside the CCMZ.
- iii. From premises located outside the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania into the CCMZ so long as they meet all of the following requirements:
- A. Are fully certified herds meeting all standards and requirements of the 2014 General Quarantine Order and the Interstate/International Quarantine Order; Chronic Wasting Disease Importation Requirements for Farmed or Captive Chronic Wasting Disease-Susceptible Cervids published at 44 PaB, 2267, No. 15, April 12, 2014 or any subsequent CWD import Quarantine Order replacing or amending the document.
- B. The source premises is greater than 15 miles away from any Chronic Wasting Disease detected or positive animal in either the free ranging or captive animal populations.
- C. Are fully certified herds meeting all standards and requirements of 9 Code of Federal Regulations 55 "Control of Chronic Wasting Disease" and 81 "Chronic Wasting Disease in Deer, Elk, and Moose."
- iv. From premises located within the CCMZ to another state, so long as they comply with all standards, rules and requirements of the destination state and 9 Code of Federal Regulation 81 "Chronic Wasting Disease in Deer, Elk, and Moose."
- v. From premises located within the CCMZ to the following designated premises located within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania but, outside the CCMZ under the conditions hereunder established:
- A. Premises that are Fully Certified under the Department's 2014 General Quarantine Order, or any subsequent CWD Program General Quarantine Order replacing or amending the 2014 General Quarantine Order may ship Cervidae under the following conditions:
- aa. Under a written permit issued by the Department of Agriculture.
- bb. The Fully Certified Premises is in good standing and is in compliance with all of the requirements of the 2014 General Quarantine Order or any subsequent Order replacing or amending it.
- cc. The premises to which the Cervidae will be shipped is in good standing and is in compliance with all of the requirements of the 2014 General Quarantine Order or any subsequent Order replacing or amending it.
- dd. The Fully Certified Premises requesting a written permit to ship outside of the CCMZ perform rectal anal mucosal associated lymphoid tissue (RAMALT) testing within three years prior to proposed live CWD susceptible animals' movement. The RAMALT testing must meet the following conditions:
- dd1. The RAMALT collection must be performed by trained Category II USDA accredited veterinarians.
- dd2. At least 90% of the herd over 9 months of age be tested and have negative or not detected results from National Veterinary Services Laboratory. If 90% herd testing is not achieved, additional RAMALT testing of the untested animals must occur until the 90% is achieved.

- dd3. RAMALT testing is only approved for whitetail deer herds. Participants with any other CWD susceptible species in the herd will not be able to participate.
- dd4. All costs associated with collection, testing and potential loss of animals is at the participant's expense.
- dd5. Positive RAMALT tests will result in a herd quarantine and be designated a CWD positive herd.
- B. A veterinary facility for the purposes of medical care under a licensed veterinarian. The Department shall be notified, within 72 hours of such movement, and ownership of the animal(s) shipped shall be maintained by the herd owner.
- C. An animal diagnostic laboratory. The Department shall be notified, within 72 hours of such movement, and ownership of the animal(s) shipped shall be maintained by the herd owner.
- D. Directly to a slaughter establishment, under a Department issued written permit. Ownership of the animal(s) shipped shall be maintained by the herd owner until released under the terms of the permit issued.
- 3. Movement between participants in the CCMZ. Movement between all cervid farms within the CCMZ shall comply with and meet testing, recordkeeping, identification and all other requirements of the 2014 General Quarantine Order or any subsequent CWD Program General Quarantine Order replacing or amending the 2014 General Quarantine Order.
- 4. Dead CWD susceptible animal parts, semen and embryos. Premises located within the CCMZ may move dead CWD susceptible animal parts, semen and embryos under the following rules and conditions:
- i. Only the following parts of dead CWD susceptible species may leave the CCMZ; antlers, clean skull caps, capes and deboned meat. All other parts of CWD susceptible species shall remain within the CCMZ and shall be disposed of in the CCMZ in accordance with all regulations.
- ii. No semen or embryos from CWD susceptible species may leave the CCMZ unless they meet the following standards:
- A. Originate from CWD not detected animals, as determined by immunohistochemistry or another Department approved test, or
- B. Are from CWD animals in compliance with the requirements of Section II(d)2.v.A.dd. of this CCMZ General Quarantine Order, or
- C. Originate from an animal that is shown through definitive evidence provided by the owner to the Department, including but not limited to, up to date and complete movement and inventory records with no gaps or periods of non-compliance and proper and complete official identification, to have been located outside of the CCMZ, for the past 60 consecutive months prior to semen collection.
- 5. For premises that are located within the CCMZ and under an Order of Special Quarantine related to CWD; the following movement restrictions shall apply.

- i. Cervidae operations with a CWD Positive Herd Rate less than 5% shall comply with the following restrictions and requirements:
- A. Male CWD susceptible animals may be added only under written permit issued by the Department. The Department may determine, and set forth in the permit, if there are any restrictions on the number of Cervidae that may be added. Source herds may be from out of state if the requirements are met, within Pennsylvania but outside of the CCMZ, within Pennsylvania and within the CCMZ, or from any premises that is under an Order of Special Quarantine.
- B. Female CWD susceptible animals may be added only under written permit issued by the Department and only up to and including the number of female animals over 9 months of age that died or were harvested in the previous anniversary period. Source herds may be from out of state if the requirements are met, within Pennsylvania but outside of the CCMZ, within Pennsylvania and within the CCMZ, or from any premises that is under an Order of Special Quarantine.
- C. Live cervids or cervid parts that are not high risk may be moved off of the premises via written permit issued by the Department.
- ii. Cervidae premises determined to have had a CWD Positive Herd Rate equal to or more than 5% at any time shall comply with one of the following sets of restrictions or requirements until expiration or revocation of the Order of Special Quarantine, regardless of CWD Positive Herd Rate:
- A. A herd that contains only male animals. Male CWD susceptible animals may be added only under a written permit issued by the Department. The Department may determine, and set forth in the permit, if there are any restrictions on the number or species of Cervidae that may be added. Source herds may be from out of state if the requirements are met, within Pennsylvania but outside of the CCMZ, within Pennsylvania and within the CCMZ, or from any premises that is under an Order of Special Quarantine. Low risk deer parts may be removed only under written permit from the Department.
- B. A herd of known numbers of male and female animals. The participant may choose one of the following two options:
- aa. Within 12 months of exceeding the CWD Positive Herd Rate equal to or more than 5%, all female CWD susceptible animals in the premises shall be harvested, depopulated or removed so only male animals remain and may add males only under a written permit issued by the Department. The Department may determine, and set forth in the permit, if there are any additional restrictions on the number of Cervidae that may be added. Source herds may be from out of state if the requirements are met, within Pennsylvania but outside of the CCMZ, within Pennsylvania and within the CCMZ, or from any premises that is under an Order of Special Quarantine. Low risk deer parts may be removed only under written permit from the Department.
- bb. Within 12 months of exceeding the CWD Positive Herd Rate equal to or more than 5%, all males shall be segregated by at least 30 feet from females. Strictly no breeding, naturally or artificially, shall occur without written permit from the Department. Male CWD susceptible animals may not be added to the premises until all females have been fenced separately at least 30 feet from

the males. For herds opting to retain females, the total number of male and female animals on the affected premises may not exceed the total number of animals listed on herd inventory at the time of the CWD Positive Herd Rate was determined to be equal to or more than 5%. The segregated pens shall be listed on a single inventory that encompasses all quarantined animals on the premises. The segregated pens are not allowed to be enrolled separately in the CWD program and shall not be designated as a separate premises on the same establishment. The Department may determine, and set forth in the written permit, if there are any additional restrictions on the number of Cervidae that may be added. Source herds may be from out of state if the requirements are met, within Pennsylvania but outside of the CCMZ, within Pennsylvania and within the CCMZ, or from any premises that is under an Order of Special Quarantine. Low risk deer parts may be removed only under written permit from the Department.

- C. A herd of unknown gender composition. Within 12 months of exceeding the CWD Positive Herd Rate equal to or more than 5%, if the gender composition cannot be determined, all CWD susceptible animals, or at a minimum all female animals, in the herd shall be harvested, depopulated or otherwise removed from the herd on the premises. Only after harvesting, depopulation or removal of all cervids, or at a minimum all female animals, existing on the premises may male CWD susceptible animals be added to the premises. Such additions may be done only under a written permit issued by the Department after initial removal of animals has been verified and approved by the Department. Once the segregation of all female from male animals has been completed, the premises shall be subject and adhere to the standards and requirements set forth in subsection B.bb. above. The Department may determine, and set forth in the written permit, if there are any restrictions on the number or species of Cervidae that may be added. Source herds may be from out of state if the requirements are met, within Pennsylvania but outside of the CCMZ, within Pennsylvania and within the CCMZ, or from any premises that is under an Order of Special Quarantine. Low risk deer parts may be removed only under written permit from the Department.
- iii. All premises shall have their anniversary date changed to March 1 per the requirements of the Department's 2014 General Quarantine Order or any subsequent CWD Program General Quarantine Order replacing or amending that Quarantine Order.
- (e) Continued Compliance. All cervid operations and program participants within the CCMZ and therefore subject to this CCMZ General Quarantine Order shall continue to comply with and be subject to the standards and rules established in the Department's 2014 General Quarantine Order or any subsequent CWD Program General Quarantine Order replacing or amending that Quarantine Order.
- (f) Moratorium. No new premises or businesses with CWD susceptible species may be established within the CCMZ established by this CCMZ General Quarantine Order or any addendum hereto. Pre-existing establishments with CWD susceptible species will be grandfathered at the time of publication of this CCMZ General Quarantine Order, as long as such establishments continuously maintain an active business inven-

tory. Grandfathered establishments may, only by written permit, add additional premises containing CWD-susceptible species on the pre-existing establishment.

(g) Definitions.

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD). A dangerous transmissible disease identified as transmissible spongiform encephalopathy of cervids. Clinical signs include but are not limited to the following: loss of body condition, behavioral changes, excessive salivation, increased drinking or urination, depression and eventual death.

CWD Positive Herd Rate. The rate that CWD is identified in a herd. For the purposes of this document, the calculation is a percentage of the number of animals CWD detected in the last anniversary period divided by the total number of CWD susceptible animals over 9 months of age as of the end of the anniversary period. If the inventory has no animals at the end of the anniversary period, the number of CWD susceptible animals over 9 months of age over the anniversary period is utilized. This calculation is performed each anniversary period.

CWD Positive Herd Rate = Number of CWD detected animals times 100

Number of CWD susceptible animals over 9 months of age as of the end of the anniversary period.

OR, if no CWD susceptible animals at the end of the anniversary period;

CWD Positive Herd Rate = Number of CWD detected animals times 100

Number of CWD susceptible animals over 9 months of age over the anniversary period.

CWD susceptible species. Species of the genera Alces, Cervus, Odocoileus and Rangifer including elk, white-tailed deer, moose, mule deer, black-tailed deer, sika deer, red deer, reindeer and hybrids thereof.

Establishment. All of the land on which the cervids are kept, bred, harbored, housed, fenced, sheltered, transferred, sold, exchanged or maintained, including all premises identification numbers associated with that establishment. The term shall encompass the place of business or operation and all of the land, property, housing facilities or any combination thereof.

III. Violations and Penalties.

Violations/Penalties. Any person violating the requirements of this CCMZ General Quarantine Order may be subject to imposition of such criminal and civil penalties and remedies as allowed under the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2380.8, 2383, 2385 and 2386).

IV. Actions of the Department.

No Restriction on Further Action by the Department. This CCMZ General Quarantine Order shall not be construed as limiting the Department's authority to establish additional quarantine or testing requirements on imported cervids or to limit the Department's authority under the Domestic Animal Law or any other statutes or regulations administered by the Department.

In accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 92a.32(d), the proposed discharge of stormwater associated with construction activities will be managed in accordance with the requirements of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 102. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on NPDES applications are invited to submit statements to the contact office noted before the application within 30-days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on WQM permit applications are invited to submit statements to the office noted before the application within 15-days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. A comment submittal should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for public hearings on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

- (g) MEMO MULTIPLIER Area: The area within each "CHECK" that contains a 1X, 2X, 3X, 4X or 5X multiplier symbol that is applied to any winning combination. Any prize won in a "CHECK" with a 1X multiplier symbol appearing in the "MEMO MULTIPLER" area is not multiplied.
- (h) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (i) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.
- (j) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (k) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (l) *PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE*: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.
- (m) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the numbers within any "CHECK," determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (n) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a Blank Check ticket is \$20.
- 4. Description of the Blank Check Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Blank Check lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE," prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Blank Check tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Blank Check is played by matching any of the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area to any play symbol located in any "CHECK." A player matching one or more play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown beneath the matching number within that

"CHECK." A bet slip is not used to play this game. Each "CHECK" is played separately.

- (c) Blank Check tickets contain one "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within each of the five "CHECK" areas, by which a player may multiply any prize won in that "CHECK" area by the multiplier amount shown in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area. The Progressive Top Prize symbol will only appear in a "CHECK" with the 1X symbol. Any prize won within a "CHECK" where a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area is not multiplied.
- (d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (e) A Blank Check game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Blank Check game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Blank Check game ticket and select the Blank Check option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
 - 5. Blank Check ticket characteristics:
- (a) A Blank Check ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each Blank Check ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, five "CHECK" areas and five "MEMO MULTIPLIER" areas. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and each of the five "CHECK" areas, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRT), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 36 (THYSIX), 37 (THYSVN), 38 (THYEGT), 39 (THYNIN) and 40 (FRTY). The play symbols located in the each of the five "MEMO MULTIPLIER" areas are: 1X, 2X, 3X, 4X and 5X.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in each of the five "CHECK" areas, are: $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$30^{.00}$ (THIRTY), $\$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), $\$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO), \$10,000 (TEN THO) and PROG (TOP PRIZE).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$20, \$30, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000, \$10,000 and the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." The "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" amount starts at \$200,000 and increases by \$3.50 every time a Blank Check ticket is purchased. When a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" winning ticket is sold, the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE" resets to \$200,000. Blank Check contains a feature that can multiply the prize won in any "CHECK" as detailed in section 4 (relating to description of the Blank Check Fast Play lottery game). For a complete list of prizes that

- can be won in this game, including multiplied prizes, see section 7 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to five times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 2,400,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Blank Check lottery game.
- 6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Blank Check prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in any "CHECK," and a prize symbol of PROG (TOP PRIZE) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area on the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE." The amount won under this paragraph is the amount of the "PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE," determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$200,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$10,000 (TEN THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10,000.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 5X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 4X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$400.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WIN-NING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 3X symbol ap-

pears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$300.

- (i) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 5X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$250.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$40^{.00} (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 5X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (1) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, and a 4X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$30-00 (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under two matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, and a 3X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$180.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$40^{.00} (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under two matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, and a 2X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$160.
- (o) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$40.00 (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 4X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$160.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$50⁻⁰⁰ (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 3X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WIN-NING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play sym-

bol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$40^{.00} (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 3X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$120.

- (r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under each of the two matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, and a 3X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$120.
- (s) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 4X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$120.
- (t) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (u) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 2X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (v) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 5X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (w) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$40.00 (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 2X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$80.
- (x) Holders of tickets upon which of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 4X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$80.

- (z) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of $$20^{.00}$

(TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 3X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$60.

- (aa) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (bb) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$40.00 (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (cc) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of 20^{00} (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the match-

- ing "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 2X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (dd) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.
- (ee) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols matches any play symbol in a "CHECK," and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and a 1X symbol appears in the "MEMO MULTIPLIER" area within the same "CHECK," on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.

*PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE: The minimum value of the PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE is \$200,000. The PROGRES-SIVE TOP PRIZE increases by \$3.50 every time a ticket is purchased, and resets to \$200,000 whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.

Prizes, including top prizes, are subject to availability at the time of purchase.

- 8. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
 - 9. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
 - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
 - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Mattress Money (hereinafter "Mattress Money"). The game number is PA-5095.
 - 2. Definitions:
- (a) *Authorized retailer* or *retailer*: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.
- (f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (g) Play Area: The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (k) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (l) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, determine whether a player wins a prize.
 - 3. Price: The price of a Mattress Money ticket is \$2.
- 4. Description of the Mattress Money Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Mattress Money lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Mattress Money tickets

- may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Mattress Money is played by matching any of the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Players can win the prizes identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) A Mattress Money game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Mattress Money game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" and "YOUR NUMBERS" areas, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN) and 20 (TWENT).
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), $\$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN) and \$10,000 (TEN THO).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500 and \$10,000. A player can win up to ten times on a ticket.
