

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

Proposed Amendments of Pa.R.J.A. Nos. 1950—1952 and 1954

The Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts (AOPC) is considering proposing to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania amendments to Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration 1950-52 and 1954 that require a judicial district to establish an emergency action plan for each court facility, restructure local court security committees so that the president judge, or designee, is the chair, and direct that a judicial district's local court security committee meet at least twice per year. The proposed amendments include other minor, nonsubstantive revisions.

The proposed amendments were originally recommended by the Magisterial District Court Security Task Group in its August 2020 report, posted on the UJS website at www.pacourts.us. The Task Group was charged with reviewing the current security posture of magisterial district courts and providing recommendations on improving court safety for the public, court staff and judges.

Proposed new material is bolded and underlined, and deleted material is in brackets and bolded.

TITLE 201. RULES OF JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION

CHAPTER 19. MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

CONTINUITY OF OPERATIONS, EMERGENCY ACTIONS, EMERGENCY UNITS AND JUDICIAL SECURITY

Rule 1950. Definitions.

[Emergency—An emergency is an event or events that causes or threatens the destruction or partial destruction of court facilities, significantly interrupts the performance of court operations, or poses a threat to the health or safety of court personnel, court users or the public.]

Continuity of Operations—Continuity of operations is the process, during and following an emergency, by which a court maintains at least minimum levels of service. Court Facility—Court facility includes the courtrooms, judicial chambers, witness rooms, jury deliberation rooms, attorney conference rooms, court administrative offices and any other office or space under the control of or supervised by the judiciary.

Emergency—An emergency is an event or events that causes or threatens the destruction or partial destruction of court facilities, significantly interrupts the performance of court operations, or poses a threat to the health or safety of court personnel, court users or the public.

President Judge—For the purposes of these Rules, "president judge" refers to the president judge of the judicial district.

Security Incident—A security incident is an event that has the potential to cause, or has in fact caused, personal injury or property damage or has caused significant interruption of the performance of court operations.

Official Note: See also definitions in Pa.R.J.A. No. 102.

Rule 1951. Continuity of operations **and emergency planning**.

- (a) Responsibility for Continuity of Operations and Emergency Planning.
- (1) The Court Administrator shall establish minimum standards and procedures for continuity of operations and other emergency plans. The standards shall include procedures for periodic review, including the procedures for conducting exercises to ensure the efficacy of the plan.
- (2) The president judge has primary responsibility for planning for the continuity of operations in the event of an emergency, and for implementing such plans in his or her judicial district.

Official Note: See also Pa.R.J.A. No. 1954.

- (b) Continuity of Operations Plans.
- (1) Pursuant to the standards and procedures established by the Court Administrator in Rule 1951(A)(1), the president judge, in conjunction with the district court administrator, the local court security committee, and any other relevant individuals designated by the president judge shall, in consultation with county emergency service agencies and other governmental entities, develop a plan to provide for the continuity of court operations during and following the occurrence of an emergency.
- (2) The continuity of operations plan shall provide for the continuation or immediate resumption of court business by the most expeditious and practical means possible, consistent with continuity of operations standards as established by the Court Administrator.
- (3) The president judge shall be responsible for ensuring that the continuity of operations plan is accurate and updated as needed.

(4) On an annual basis, the president judge shall review the continuity of operations plan **in consultation with the local court security committee** and shall certify on a form prescribed by the Court Administrator that the review has taken place and that the plan is accurate and meets the requirements established by the Court Administrator.

(c) Emergency Action Plans.

- (1) Pursuant to the standards and procedures established by the Court Administrator in Rule 1951(A)(1), in conjunction with the district court administrator, the local court security committee, county emergency service agencies and any other relevant parties, the president judge shall develop an emergency action plan for each court facility located in the judicial district to use in response to, during, and immediately following the occurrence of an emergency.
- (2) On an annual basis, the president judge shall review the judicial district's emergency action plans and shall certify in a form prescribed by the Court Administrator that the review has taken place, the plans are accurate, the plans meet the requirements established by the Court Administrator, and the relevant plans have been disseminated to all district court employees under the purview of the president judge.

Comment

Fires. Floods. Hurricanes, earthquakes and tornados. Terrorist attacks. Pandemics. Nuclear and biohazardous accidents (and attacks). The experiences from other states and countries around the world have shown that if any of these events should occur in Pennsylvania, the results could be catastrophic.

State and local governments, and in particular chief judges and court administrators, have learned from the experiences of governments in places where natural and human-made disasters have occurred, for example: the state and city of New York in the aftermath of the 2001 terrorist attacks; the city of Toronto in Canada's Ontario Province after the 2003 SARS outbreak; the Gulf Coast states, such as Louisiana and Florida in the wake of Hurricane Katrina and other devastating storms; and California, among other states, coping with calamitous wildfires and earthquakes. One lesson learned is that many of the difficulties citizens face during and after an emergency or disaster can be ameliorated if the court system is operational and providing at least its essential functions.

In an attempt to plan and prepare for a wide variety of emergencies that could [strike] occur in Pennsylvania, the Supreme Court has adopted new Rules of Judicial Administration Nos. 1950—1954. Rules 1951—1953[,] are designed to become operational only in the event of a significant emergency that causes or threatens the disruption of court operations[, were derived in part from "judicial emergency" rules and statutes developed in other states such as Florida, California and Louisiana]. The Rules specify that the primary authority and responsibility for continuing court operations rests

with the Supreme Court and with the president judges of Pennsylvania's 60 judicial districts. Rule 1954 consolidates judicial security practices and directives developed over the past several years.

Rule 1951 formalizes the requirement that each judicial district in Pennsylvania develop and practice emergency and continuity of operations plans. Under this Rule, the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania is responsible for establishing standards and procedures for emergency and continuity of operations plans, and the president judges of Pennsylvania's judicial districts, with the assistance of the district court administrators, are responsible for developing plans for their respective judicial districts. Continuity of operations plans must provide for the continuation or immediate resumption of court business—or at least essential functions during and immediately following an emergency. The Rule calls for these plans to be reviewed and updated annually.

Courts have expectations of the people who serve the court to respond appropriately in the event of an emergency, natural or man-made. These emergencies come in several forms, such as fire, weather-related events such as tornado or flash flood, toxic chemical discharges that affect air quality, and active shooter events, to name a few. These emergency action plans should contain escape routes, secure locations of assembly for staff, and notification and communication protocols that mirror those already included in the continuity of operations plan. These plans should contain a series of expectations courts have to best ensure the safety and security of staff and customers of the court in the event of an emergency. In order for courts to quickly reconstitute business and operations, staff must be readily available through comprehensive alert and notification protocols, as well as evacuation from any and all danger zones to safely assemble in a secure location.

Rule 1952. Emergency actions, duties and authorities.

- (a) Role of Supreme Court
- (1) In the event of an emergency that affects court operations in the Commonwealth or in one or more judicial districts, the Supreme Court shall have the authority to declare a judicial emergency generally or in any judicial district affected by the emergency.
- (2) By the declaration of a judicial emergency, the Supreme Court may:
- (A) suspend or modify statewide or local procedural or administrative court rules;
- (B) suspend time calculations for the purposes of time computation relevant to court cases or other judicial business;
- (C) direct a court to sit in a location other than its normal place of operations, including outside of its judicial district;
- (D) assign judges or court personnel from outside the affected judicial district;

- (E) authorize additional uses of advanced communication technology to conduct court proceedings;
- (F) take any action listed in Rule 1952(B)(2)(a)—(r) for an individual or multiple judicial districts; and
- (G) take any other necessary administrative action regarding judicial staff, court facilities and operations.

Official Note: See also Pa.R.J.A. No. 1952(B)(2) for actions a president judge may take once a judicial emergency has been declared.

See Pa.R.Crim.P. 103 for the definition of advanced communication technology.

See Pa.R.Crim.P. 118 and 119 for general rules governing the use of two-way simultaneous audio-visual communications in criminal proceedings.

- (b) Role of the President Judge
- (1) In the event of an emergency, the president judge may request authorization from the Supreme Court to declare a judicial emergency in the judicial district. Such declaration shall remain in effect until such time as it is amended, rescinded, modified or superseded by order of the Supreme Court.
- (2) If the Supreme Court authorizes the president judge to declare a judicial emergency in the judicial district, and unless limited by the Supreme Court, the president judge shall have the authority to:
- (A) order the closure of court facilities until safe operations of the court and its offices can be restored;
 - (B) order the evacuation of court facilities;
- Official Note: Ordering the evacuation of court facilities, when practical under the circumstances, should occur after consultation with members of the local [standing] court security committee, established under Rule of Judicial Administration No. 1954(A), and relevant law enforcement agencies.
- (C) direct the relocation of court operations to safe locations;
- (D) take necessary action to provide for (i) the safety of court personnel, court users and the public, and (ii) the security of court facilities, financial and cash operations, equipment and records;
- (E) establish a telephone hotline or web site to provide the bench, bar and the public with court and emergency information;
- (F) reassign judges or court personnel within the judicial district as needed to ensure the continuation of operations;
- *Official Note:* See also Rule of Judicial Administration No. 1953 for requests for additional judges from within the Emergency Regional Administrative Unit.
- (G) expand the duties and work hours of staff to handle emergency matters;
- (H) cancel or modify court calendars, subpoenas or other court orders;
 - (I) cancel or suspend jury and non-jury trials;
 - (J) cancel or suspend jury duty;
- (K) suspend or modify local rules of court and administrative rules or procedures, including personnel policies;

- (L) suspend or modify the time requirements and limitations established by local rule;
- (M) make application to the Supreme Court to temporarily suspend or modify statewide court rules as applied to any case or cases in the judicial district;
- (N) provide for alternative signing, delivery and service of court documents and orders;
- (O) extend the duration of any emergency or temporary order (for example, protection from abuse order) issued by a judge or magisterial district judge in the judicial district:
 - (P) assign custodial responsibility for court funds;
- (Q) ensure compliance with any Federal, State or local emergency declarations;
- (R) order the full or partial implementation of the continuity of operations plan established pursuant to Rule of Judicial Administration No. 1951; and
- (S) request additional emergency judicial orders from the Supreme Court as the needs of justice require.

Rule 1954. Judicial security.

- (a) The president judge of each judicial district shall establish a local [standing] court security committee that shall meet at least twice per year. The president judge or designee shall chair the local court security committee. The duties of the local [standing] court security committee shall be to:
- (1) **develop, review and** make recommendations to the president judge on protocols, policies and procedures necessary to protect the public, court personnel and court facilities in the event of an emergency, including the continuity of operations plan and emergency action plans;
- (2) communicate the approved protocols, policies and procedures identified in [Rule of Judicial Administration No. 1954(A)(1)] paragraph (1) to all court employees;
- (3) review and assess [all] the judicial district's security incident reports specified in [Rule of Judicial Administration No. 1954(B)] subdivision (B) and recommend to the president judge appropriate actions; and
- (4) develop and recommend to the president judge training programs for court employees on safety and security awareness.
- Official Note: When forming local [standing] court security committees, president judges should consider a variety of court and county employees as well as public officials whose positions, experience and authority would benefit court security decisions. At a minimum, the president judge shall include a member of the county executive branch, the district court administrator and a magisterial district judge. While not an exhaustive list, the president judge also may consider [a member of the county executive branch, the district court administrator, a magisterial district

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judge, including: an individual responsible for county and court records, an individual responsible for court-house security, a courthouse facility or risk manager, representatives of the other county offices housed in the court facility, a representative from the county information technology office, and a member of county or local law enforcement.

- (b) The president judge shall ensure that all reporting requirements of the Pennsylvania Judicial Incident Reporting System ("PAJIRS") are completed by the district court administrator or his or her designee no later than the close of business on the day that any reportable action occurs.
- (c) The president judge shall ensure the completion of court facility security assessments as identified in the Unified Judicial System Court Safety and Security Manual and as prescribed by the Court Administrator.
- (d) The president judge shall establish court security protocols, policies and procedures to be implemented in the event of an emergency, including, but not limited to: fire, natural disaster, "white powder" or other human-made emergency or disaster, and escaped prisoner and hostage situations. The president judge shall ensure that all employees receive training on how and when to implement such protocols, policies and procedures. All policies and procedures identified in this Rule shall be reviewed and updated annually.

Comment

Rule 1954 addresses court security and formalizes the creation of local **standing** court security committees. These committees, which have existed in every judicial district since at least 2005, are appointed by the president judges. They make recommendations to the president judge on protocols, policies and procedures which should be implemented to protect the public, court personnel and court facilities in the event of an emergency, and the president judge must establish such security protocols, policies and procedures for the judicial district. In addition, each local [standing] court security committee is charged with reviewing court security incident reports collected through PAJIRS, which was implemented in 2005 for magisterial district courts and 2007 for common pleas courts, and making appropriate recommendations to the president judge based on those reports. Finally, Rule 1954 directs the president judges of Pennsylvania's judicial districts to complete and annually update court facility security assessments.

It is hoped that [a significant natural or man-made emergency never impacts Pennsylvania. However,] through the framework provided in Rules 1950—1954[, should an emergency occur,] the Pennsylvania [Courts] courts will be prepared to provide at least minimum services, including all essential court functions,

both during and after the emergency, to better protect and serve Pennsylvania's citizens, should an emergency occur.

§ 29.401a. Consumer Price Index—costs and fines.

Pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, and 42 Pa.C.S. § 1721, the Supreme Court has authorized the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania to obtain and publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on or before November 30 the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index for calendar year 2019 as required by Act 96 of 2010, 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 1725.1(f) and 3571(c)(4) (as amended). See, No. 540 Judicial Administration Docket.

The Court Administrator of Pennsylvania reports that the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index, All Urban Consumers, U.S. City Average, for calendar year 2019 was 2.3% percent. (See, U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Series CUUROOOOSAO, January 26, 2020.)

TITLE 204. JUDICIAL SYSTEM GENERAL PROVISIONS PART II. GENERAL ADMINISTRATION CHAPTER 29. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS Subchapter K. COSTS, FINES AND FEES

§ 29.401. Scope.

The Pennsylvania Supreme Court, pursuant to Art. V, § 10 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, and 42 Pa.C.S. § 1721, has authorized by Administrative Order, the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania to promulgate regulations relating to the accounting methods to be utilized in connection with the collection of fees and costs charged and collected by prothonotaries, and clerks of courts of all courts of common pleas, or by any officials designated to perform the functions thereof, as well as by the minor judiciary, including magisterial district judges, and judges and staff of all divisions of the Philadelphia Municipal Court.

Under authority of said Administrative Order and pursuant to the authority vested in the governing authority under 42 Pa.C.S. § 3502(a) of the Judicial Code, the following regulations are adopted to implement Act 96 of 2010, 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 1725.1(f) and 3571(c)(4) (as amended).

§ 29.402. 42 Pa.C.S. § 1725.1. Costs.

(a) Civil cases.—In calendar year 2021, the costs to be charged by magisterial district judges in every civil case, except as otherwise provided in this section, shall be as follows:

IN GENERAL

Rule 302. Requisites for Reviewable Issue.

(a) General rule.—Issues not raised in the [lower] trial court are waived and cannot be raised for the first time on appeal.

(b) Charge to jury.—A general exception to the charge to the jury will not preserve an issue for appeal. Specific exception shall be taken to the language or omission complained of.

Official Note: [This rule sets forth a frequently overlooked requirement. See, e.g. Commonwealth v. Piper, 458 Pa. 307, 328 A.2d 845 (1974), as to Subdivision (a). See, e.g. Dilliplaine v. Lehigh Valley Trust Co., 457 Pa. 255, 322 A.2d 114 (1974); Commonwealth v. Light, 458 Pa. 328, 326 A.2d 288 (1974) as to Subdivision (b). Rule 2117(c) (statement of place of raising or preservation of issues) and Rule 2119(e) (statement of place of raising or preservation of issues) require that the brief expressly set forth in both the statement of the case and in the argument reference to the place in the record where the issue presented for decision on appeal has been raised or preserved below.

See Rule 1551 (Scope of Review) as to requisites for reviewable issue on petition for review.

Paragraph (a)—See Commonwealth v. Piper, 328 A.2d 845, 847 (Pa. 1974) ("[I] ssues not raised in the court below are waived and cannot be raised for the first time on appeal...").

Paragraph (b)—In the civil context, the Supreme Court held in Jones v. Ott, 191 A.3d 782, 791 n.13 (Pa. 2018), that "in order to preserve a jury-charge challenge under Pa.R.C.P. 227.1 by filing proposed points for charge with the prothonotary, a party must make requested points for charge part of the record pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 226(a), obtain an explicit trial court ruling upon the challenged instruction, and raise the issue in a post-trial motion. See Pa.R.A.P. 302(a); Pa.R.C.P. 226(a), 227, 227.1." See Dilliplaine v. Lehigh Valley Trust Co., 322 A.2d 114 (Pa. 1974) (specific exception to trial court's jury instruction must be made in order to preserve a point for appellate review).

In the criminal context, the procedure for raising and preserving objections to a jury charge is found in Pa.R.Crim.P. 647(B) and (C). See also Commonwealth v. Pressley, 887 A.2d 220, 225 (Pa. 2005) ("[M] ere submission and subsequent denial of proposed points for charge that are inconsistent with or omitted from the instructions actually given will not suffice to preserve an issue, absent a specific objection or exception to the charge or the trial court's ruling respecting the points."); Commonwealth v. Light, 326 A.2d 288 (Pa. 1974) (plurality opinion) (failure to take a specific exception to the language complained of in a jury charge forecloses review by the appellate court).

Failure to follow the appropriate procedure may result in waiver of this issue.

Rule 1128. Presence at Proceedings.

- A) General Rule. All parties, including the child, shall be present at any proceeding unless the exceptions of paragraph (B) apply.
 - B) Exceptions.
- 1) Absence from [proceedings] Proceedings. The court may proceed in the absence of a party upon good cause shown except that in no case shall a hearing occur in the absence of a child's attorney. If a child has a guardian ad litem and legal counsel, both attorneys shall be present.
- 2) Exclusion from [proceedings] Proceedings. A party may be excluded from a proceeding only for good cause shown. If a party is so excluded, counsel for the party shall be permitted to be present.
- C) Advanced [communication technology] Communication Technology. A child or guardian may appear by utilizing advanced communication technology pursuant to Rule 1129.
- D) [Order appearance] Court-Ordered Appearance. The court may order any person having the physical custody or control of a child to bring the child to any proceeding.

Comment

In no case is a proceeding to occur in the absence of the child's attorney. The court has discretion whether to proceed if the court finds that a party received proper notice of the hearing and has willfully failed to appear.

Requiring the child's attorney to be present pursuant to paragraph (B)(2) protects the child's interest if the proceeding is conducted in the child's absence. However, unless good cause is shown **by individual circum**-

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stances, a child should [appear] be present in court. See also Pa.R.J.C.P. 1129(A)(2) (child shall appear in person at least every six months unless presence is excused). It is important that all children, including infants, appear in court so the court can observe the interaction between the caregiver and child and observe the child's development and health. Because a child may feel uncomfortable while attending proceedings, the court should take measures to ensure that the child understands the courtroom to be a place of safety and security.

Ensuring a child appears in court on a regular basis is critical because the court oversees the child and is to ensure his or her care, protection, safety, and wholesome mental and physical development. However, the court may ask that the child be removed from the courtroom during sensitive testimony.

See In re Adoption of S.B.B. and E.P.R., [372 Pa. Super. 456,] 539 A.2d 883 (Pa. Super. 1988).

Nothing in these rules creates a right of a child to have his or her guardian present. See 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 6310, 6335(b), 6336.1.

FINAL REPORT¹

Amendment of Pa.R.J.C.P. 1128

On October 14, 2020, the Supreme Court amended Rule of Juvenile Court Procedure 1128 to clarify requirements for the presence of children at dependency proceedings.

Upon request, the Committee reviewed Pa.R.J.C.P. 1128 (Presence at Proceedings) to consider whether the rule invited a practice whereby children of a certain age were categorically excused from being present in court. While the rule did not encourage excusing children, the Committee recommended the rule be refined to emphasize the importance of a child's appearance and the need to consider a child's individual circumstances when deciding whether to excuse the child from a proceeding.

Pa.R.J.C.P. 1128(A) generally requires all parties to be present at dependency proceedings. This paragraph is amended to specifically include children under the general requirement. Pa.R.J.C.P. 1120 (Definitions) defines a "party" as "a person or the county agency who has standing to participate in the proceedings but nothing in these Rules confers standing upon a person." Under this definition, a child is a party because the child has standing to participate. See, e.g., Pa.R.J.C.P. 1151 (providing for appointment of guardian ad litem or counsel to represent a child). Specifically including the child in

paragraph (A) reinforces the importance of the child's presence and eliminates the need for readers to rely upon a definition to understand the scope of the requirement.

The Comment is also revised to emphasize that exceptions to a child's presence at dependency proceedings are to be based on individual circumstances. Moreover, the Comment references the requirement of Pa.R.J.C.P. 1129(A)(2) that the child be physically present in court at least every six months. Finally, the Comment indicates that a child's unease while attending should be mitigated by the court.

This Order and the following local rule shall be filed with the Office of Judicial Records (formerly the Prothonotary, Clerk of Courts and Clerk of Quarter Sessions) in a docket maintained for Administrative Orders issued by the First Judicial District of Pennsylvania. As required by Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(5)(ii), two certified copies of this Administrative Order and the following local rule, as well as one copy of the Administrative Order and local rule shall be distributed to the Legislative Reference Bureau on a computer diskette for publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. As required by Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(6) one certified copy of this Administrative Order and local rule shall be filed with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts, shall be published on the website of the First Judicial District at http://www.courts.phila.gov, and shall be incorporated in the compiled set of local rules no later than 30 days following publication in the Pennsylvania-

Philadelphia Criminal Rule *700.

- (A) The judge who presided at the trial or who received the plea of guilty or nolo contendere shall impose sentence unless there are extraordinary circumstances which preclude the judge's presence. In such event, another judge shall be assigned to impose sentence.
- (B) The supervision of a defendant serving a sentence may be transferred to a judge other than the original sentencing judge in any of the following situations:
- (1) The original sentencing judge has been transferred out of the Criminal Division and consents in writing to the transfer of the supervision;
- (2) The case has been accepted into a First Judicial District reentry program and, after a hearing or in writing, the defendant and the original sentencing judge consent to supervision being transferred to a judge presiding over the reentry program;
- (3) The defendant is facing a new sentencing in front of a different judge on a separate case and, after a hearing or in writing, the defendant and the original sentencing judge consent to supervision being transferred to the other judge; or
- (4) There exist extraordinary circumstances, including death, incapacitation or retirement, which preclude the presence of the original sentencing judge.

Comment:

Local Rule 700(A) tracks Pa.R.Crim.P. 700(A).

Pa.R.Crim.P. 700 also governs sentencings that result from a violation of probation or parole. See Comm. v. McNeal, 120 A.3d 313 (Pa. Super. 2015). Accordingly, Local Rule 700(B) flows from Pa.R.Crim.P. 700(B), which invites promulgation of local rules to expand the circumstances under which transfers from one judge to another may be made. Local Rule 700(B) reflects the recognition that transfers are appropriate under a variety of circumstances, including where a defendant has the opportunity to enter one of the First Judicial District's reentry programs or in order to consolidate a violation hearing in front of the "back judge" with the sentencing for a new case in front of a different judge.

No two (2) members from the same firm or office, or related by blood or marriage, shall serve on the same board, unless this requirement is waived in writing by all parties in interest or their counsel.
- (B) The Prothonotary shall maintain, in alphabetical order, a list of all members of the Clinton County Bar who have not requested in writing to be removed from the list of the Board of Arbitrators. Upon the filing of a praecipe for arbitration or pursuant to an Order of Court, the Prothonotary shall submit a list of five (5) names to the plaintiff or the attorney for plaintiff. In the event there are additional parties to the proceeding, the Prothonotary shall add an additional name for each additional party. This list shall be in the order in which the names are on the list of the Prothonotary, passing those members who are disqualified to the next qualified member. The plaintiff may strike one (1) member from the list and shall return the list to the Prothonotary within thirty (30) days of the Prothonotary forwarding the list the plaintiff. The Prothonotary shall then forward the list to the defendant. The defendant may likewise strike one (1) member from the list and shall return the list to Prothonotary within thirty (30) days of the Prothonotary forwarding the list to the defendant. In the event of an additional party or parties, the Prothonotary shall forward the list to the additional party or parties after the defendant has returned the list to the Prothonotary or waived the right to strike. Each additional party shall return the list to the Prothonotary within thirty (30) days of the Prothonotary forwarding the list to the additional party.
- (C) In the event a party does not exercise the right to strike within thirty (30) days of the list being served upon that party's attorney or if proceeding pro se, the party, then the party shall have been deemed to have waived the right to strike and the Prothonotary shall forward the list to next party having the right to strike a member from the list with the Prothonotary noting on the list that

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the said party has waived the right to strike pursuant to this local rule due to said party's failure to return the list to the Prothonotary exercising that party's right to strike.

(D) The first three (3) remaining members shall constitute the Board and the first shall be the chairperson. Any stricken member, as well as any disqualified member, shall, in alphabetical order, be at the head of the list for the next and/or subsequent cases.

Through a random process conducted in accordance with the statute, the Court Administrator has chosen a Panel composed of one judge of the Superior Court of Pennsylvania and two judges of the Courts of Common Pleas. The judges selected include: the Honorable Mary Jane Bowes, Judge of the Superior Court; the Honorable Margaret A. Bisignani Moyle, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Lackawanna County; and the Honorable Jonathan Mark, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Monroe County.

As provided by 18 Pa.C.S. § 9511(b), the members of the Panel serve terms of three years. The terms of each member of the Panel commenced with the final selection of the Panel on October 8, 2020.

The Prothonotary of the Superior Court of Pennsylvania serves as the clerk of the Panel. See 18 Pa.C.S. \S 9511(e).

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY

[49 PA. CODE CH. 27]

Administration of Injectable Medications, Biologicals and Immunizations

The State Board of Pharmacy (Board) proposes to amend \S 27.12, 27.401—27.407 and add \S 27.408 (relating to professional liability insurance) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

This proposed rulemaking is authorized under sections 4(j), 6(k)(1) and (9) and 9.2 of the Pharmacy Act (act) (63 P.S. §§ 390-4(j), 390-6(k)(1) and (9) and 390-9.2).

Background and Need for the Amendment

Section 9.2 of the act permits the Board to regulate a pharmacist's ability to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. This proposed rulemaking would amend Chapter 27 (relating to State Board of Pharmacy) to conform to amendments made by the act of June 26, 2015 (P.L. 29, No. 8) (Act 8 of 2015). Act 8 of 2015 amended section 9.2 of the act to allow a pharmacist to administer influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to children 9 years of age or older but under 19 years of age. Additionally, section 9.2 now allows a qualified and authorized pharmacy intern to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons who are more than 18 years of age and administer influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to children 9 years of age or older but under 19 years of age. Section 9.2 also requires pharmacists authorized to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to maintain professional liability insurance a minimum of \$1 million per occurrence or claims made.

Description of the Proposed Amendments

Section 27.12 (relating to practice of pharmacy and delegation of duties) is proposed to be amended to add subsection (c)(4) allowing a pharmacy intern under the direct, immediate and personal supervision of a pharmacist to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations provided the pharmacy intern and the pharmacist each hold an active authorization to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations issued by the Board.

Section 27.401 (relating to qualifications for authority) is proposed to be amended to add language allowing a pharmacy intern to apply for the authority administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations.

Section 27.402 (relating to application and renewal procedures) is proposed to be amended to rename the heading of the section to "Application, renewal and reactivation procedures" to fully reflect the amendments made in this section. In § 27.402(a), the Board proposes amendments that include pharmacy interns in the application process for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. In § 27.402(b), the proposed amendments make clear that only pharma-

cists are required to renew the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. Under § 27.402(b)(2), pharmacy intern authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations is valid so long as their intern certificate is valid under § 27.26 (relating to pharmacy internship). Under § 27.26, pharmacy intern certificates are valid for 6 years and may not be renewed. In addition, the Board proposes to add subsection (c) pertaining to lapse and subsection (d) pertaining to reactivation. Subsection (d)(1) would allow a pharmacist to renew the authority to administer injectables after a brief lapse (less than 2 years) without having to retake the required education and training in § 27.407 (relating to education requirements). However, if a pharmacist's authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals or immunizations is lapsed for 2 or more years, subsection (d)(2) would require the pharmacist to retake and successfully complete the required education. Subsection (c) and (d) serve to codify the Board's current procedures.

Section 27.403 (relating to conditions for administration) is proposed to be amended to add language to allow a pharmacist or pharmacy intern to provide influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery to persons 9 years of age or older and to allow a pharmacy intern to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons who are more than 18 years of age. Section 27.403(d) requires a pharmacist's direct, immediate and personal supervision of a pharmacy intern who administers injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations.

Further, the Board proposes to amend § 27.404(a) (relating to authority and requirements) to add language allowing a pharmacy intern to administer injections under an order or written protocol.

To conform with the amendments to section 9.2 of the act regarding parental consent, § 27.405 (relating to recordkeeping) is proposed to be amended to add language requiring documentation of written parental consent for minors who receive injections and to add a requirement to record the name or initials of a pharmacy intern and the supervising pharmacist if the pharmacy intern administered the injectable medication, biological or immunization.

The Board proposes to amend § 27.406 (relating to notification requirements) to reduce the notification timeline from 72 hours to 48 hours in conformity with amendments to section 9.2 of the act, and to apply notification requirements to the administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations by pharmacy interns. In addition, this section is proposed to be amended to clarify which physician is to be notified when the administration has occurred under an order or a written protocol and who to notify if there is an adverse reaction, because there has been some confusion among the licensee population.

Section 27.407 (relating to education requirements) is proposed to be amended to apply the education requirements to pharmacy interns. Subsection (a)(1) would amend the education requirements by changing the evidence-based course time frame from 2 years to 3 years prior to application to accommodate the influx of students applying for the authorization, without disrupting the pharmacy schools' education curriculum. The Board pro-

poses to delete subsection (a)(2)(xii) as a required course topic as it is not necessary for the performance of administering injectable medications.

The Board proposes to add § 27.408 (relating to professional liability insurance) to implement the amendments to section 9.2 of the act that require maintenance of professional liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1 million dollars per occurrence or claims made. Subsection (a) requires a pharmacist applying for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to certify the maintenance of professional liability insurance coverage in the amount of \$1 million dollars per occurrence or claims made. Subsection (b) provides that only pharmacists who maintain the required professional liability insurance may engage in the practice of administering injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations and may supervise the administration by a pharmacy intern. Finally, subsection (c) provides that the pharmacist shall, upon request, make available to the Board all records relating to the pharmacist's maintenance of professional liability insurance.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This proposed rulemaking will have minimal fiscal impact on the Commonwealth and no fiscal impact on its political subdivisions. This proposed rulemaking will impose additional paperwork requirements upon the Board in the form of creating and processing applications for pharmacy interns; however, costs for processing applications would not adversely impact the Board because costs associated with processing applications are borne by the licensees through application fees. To implement Act 8 of 2015 and the proposed regulations, the Board created new forms and revised some existing forms which had minimal fiscal impact to the Board.

This proposed rulemaking will have some financial impact in the form of fees and education for pharmacy interns who elect to apply for the authorization to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. The Board has no way of knowing how many pharmacy interns will apply for authorization to administer injectables, but using the same percentage of pharmacists that applied for the authorization to administer injectables (44%), the total costs incurred for applications in fiscal year 2020-2021 would be approximately \$65,160. Since most pharmacy schools have incorporated the required education into the curriculum, most pharmacy interns should not incur additional costs in education. Even assuming all applying pharmacy interns would either be required to take the initial education or would be required to repeat the training, the cost of education for the 44% of pharmacy interns would be \$868,800. For subsequent years, the Board estimates an average annual cost to new pharmacy interns of \$36,000 (the cost associated with the fee).

For pharmacists, because Act 8 of 2015 expanded the ability of pharmacists to perform immunizations to minors, pharmacists engaging in this activity already have the required training and equipment and no additional costs will be incurred by pharmacists. The Board estimates the total cost per pharmacist to be as follows: \$400 for the approved Pharmacy-Based Immunization Delivery course, an application fee of \$30 and the cost to obtain professional liability insurance in the amount of \$1 million (\$415). The only new cost associated with Act 8 of 2015 and this proposed rulemaking is the cost of professional liability insurance. Assuming the Board continues to receive 1,100 new applications from pharmacists

seeking the authority to administer injectables each year, the fiscal impact to pharmacists would be \$456,000 annually.

This proposed rulemaking will impose additional paperwork requirements for licensees, including submission of forms to the Board (applications for authority to administer injectables and reactivation forms), recordkeeping (documentation of the pharmacy intern and supervising pharmacist for each administration), parental consent documentation, notification requirements to primary care providers and professional liability insurance coverage record disclosure requirements.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on October 8, 2020, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee and the House Professional Licensure Committee. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments, recommendations or objections raised.

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 27. STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY
STANDARDS

§ 27.12. Practice of pharmacy and delegation of duties.

* * * * *

- (c) Pharmacy interns.
- (1) A pharmacy intern may work only under the direct, immediate, personal supervision of a pharmacist in accordance with subsection (b)(2).
- (2) A pharmacy intern may neither enter nor be in a pharmacy if a pharmacist is not on duty.
- (3) A pharmacy intern working under the direct, immediate, personal supervision of a pharmacist may perform procedures which require professional skill and training. Examples of these procedures include: verifying ingredients, weighing ingredients, compounding ingredients and other similar processing of ingredients.
- (4) A pharmacy intern working under the direct, immediate and personal supervision of a pharmacist may administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations if the pharmacist and the pharmacy intern each hold an active authorization to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations issued by the Board, in accordance with §§ 27.401—27.408.
 - (d) Pharmacy technicians.

ADMINISTRATION OF INJECTABLE MEDICATIONS, BIOLOGICALS AND IMMUNIZATIONS

§ 27.401. Qualifications for authority.

- A pharmacist or pharmacy intern may apply to the Board for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations. A candidate for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall meet the following requirements:
- (1) The pharmacist holds an active license to practice pharmacy or the pharmacy intern holds an active intern registration in this Commonwealth.
- (2) The pharmacist or pharmacy intern has completed a course of education and training which meets the requirements of § 27.407 (relating to education requirements).
- (3) The pharmacist or pharmacy intern holds a current basic cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) certificate issued by the American Heart Association, American Red Cross or a similar health authority or professional body approved by the Board.
- § 27.402. Application [and], renewal and reactivation procedures.
- (a) *Application*. An applicant for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall submit the following to the Board:
- (1) An application obtained from the Board along with the fee required by § 27.91 (relating to schedule of fees).
- (2) Certification that the **[pharmacist]** applicant has completed the required education and training in § 27.407 (relating to education requirements).
- (3) Certification that the **[pharmacist]** applicant holds an acceptable, current CPR certificate.

- (b) Renewal.
- (1) A **pharmacist who is the** holder of the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall renew the authority every 2 years along with the **pharmacist's** license to practice pharmacy. Renewal requires completion of a form provided to the pharmacist by the Board in advance of the renewal period, payment of the fee specified by § 27.91, certification of completion of 2 hours of continuing education required by section 9.2 of the act (63 P.S. § 390-9.2) and § 27.32 (relating to continuing education), and proof of a current CPR certificate.
- (2) A pharmacy intern's authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations is valid so long as the intern remains registered under § 27.26 (relating to pharmacy internship) and may not be renewed.
- (c) Lapse. A pharmacist who intends to allow the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to lapse shall notify the Board on the pharmacist's biennial license renewal form.
 - (d) Reactivation.
- (1) A pharmacist who has had a lapsed authority for less than 2 years and seeks reactivation of the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall complete a form provided to the pharmacist by the Board, pay the renewal fee specified by § 27.91, complete 2 hours of continuing education required by section 9.2 of the act and § 27.32, and provide proof of a current CPR certificate.
- (2) A pharmacist who has had a lapsed authority for 2 years or more and seeks reactivation of the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations shall complete a form provided to the pharmacist by the Board, retake and successfully complete the required education set forth in § 27.407, pay the renewal fee specified by § 27.91 and provide proof of a current CPR certificate.
- § 27.403. Conditions for administration.
- (a) A pharmacist **or pharmacy intern** who is granted authority may administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons who are more than 18 years of age. A person is more than 18 years of age on the day following the person's 18th birthday.
- (b) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern who is granted authority may administer influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to persons 9 years of age or older.
- [(b)] (c) A pharmacist may not delegate the administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to another person.
- (d) A pharmacy intern who has been authorized by the Board to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations to persons who are more than 18 years of age and influenza immunizations by injectable or needle-free delivery methods to persons 9 years of age or older under § 27.401 (relating to qualifications for authority) may do so only under the direct, immediate and personal supervision of a pharmacist who holds an active authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations.

[(c)] (e) A pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall administer injectable immunizations in accordance with treatment guidelines established by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and which have been approved by the Board.

§ 27.404. Authority and requirements.

(a) A pharmacist **or pharmacy intern** authorized by the Board to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations may only do so under either an order or written protocol.

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§ 27.405. Recordkeeping.

- (a) A pharmacist who administers an injectable medication, biological or immunization or who supervises the administration by a pharmacy intern shall maintain the following records regarding each administration for a minimum of 2 years:
 - (1) The name, address and date of birth of the patient.
- (2) The date of the administration and site of the injection.
- (3) The name, dose, manufacturer, lot number and expiration date of the medication, biological or immunization
- (4) The name and address of the patient's primary health care provider, as identified by the patient.
- (5) The name or identifiable initials of the administering pharmacist. If the administration was performed by a pharmacy intern, the name or identifiable initials of the pharmacy intern and the supervising pharmacist.
- (6) Documentation of informed consent for administration of injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, and in the case of influenza immunizations administered to patients under the age of 18, documentation of written parental consent.
- (7) The nature of an adverse reaction and who was notified.
- (b) A pharmacist who administers an immunization <u>or</u> <u>supervises the administration by a pharmacy intern</u> shall also maintain the following records regarding <u>each</u> administration for a minimum of 2 years:
- (1) An identification of the Vaccine Information Statement (VIS) that was provided.
 - (2) The date of publication of the VIS.
 - (3) The date and to whom the VIS was provided.
- (c) In an institution, the information required to be maintained in subsections (a) and (b) may be maintained in the patients' medical records.

§ 27.406. Notification requirements.

- A pharmacist **or pharmacy intern** administering injectable medications, biologicals or immunizations shall meet the following notification requirements:
- (1) When administration has occurred under an order, the pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall notify the ordering prescriber and the patient's primary care provider, if known, as soon as practicable, but no longer than [72] 48 hours after administration of the following:
 - (i) The identity of the patient.
- (ii) The identity of the medication, biological or immunization administered.

- (iii) The route of administration.
- (iv) The site of the administration.
- (v) The dose administered.
- (vi) The date of administration.
- (2) When the administration has occurred under a written protocol, the pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall notify the [participating physician] patient's primary care provider, if known, and the participating/protocol physician, as soon as practicable, but no longer than [72] 48 hours after administration of the following:
 - (i) The identity of the patient.
- (ii) The identity of the medication, biological or immunization administered.
 - (iii) The site of the administration.
 - (iv) The dose administered.
 - (v) The date of administration.
- (3) In the event of any adverse event or reaction experienced by the patient either under an order or a written protocol, the pharmacist or pharmacy intern shall notify the patient's [physician] primary care provider and the participating/protocol physician, if applicable, as soon as practicable, [and in no event later] but no longer than 24 hours after learning of the adverse event or reaction.

§ 27.407. Education requirements.

- (a) To apply for the authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, a pharmacist **or pharmacy intern** shall meet the following education requirements:
- (1) Complete within the [2-year] 3-year period prior to application an evidence-based course that meets the following criteria:
 - (i) Includes study material.
- (ii) Includes hands-on training and techniques for administration.
 - (iii) Requires testing with a passing score.
- (iv) Provides a minimum of 10 hours of instruction and experiential training.
- (v) Complies with current guidelines and recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, ACPE or a similar health authority or professional body.
- (2) The course must provide instruction on the following topics:
- (i) Basic immunology and the human immune response.
- (ii) Mechanics of immunity, adverse effects, dose and administration schedule of available vaccines.
- (iii) Response to an emergency situation as a result of the administration of an injectable medication, biological or immunization.
- (iv) Administration of subcutaneous, intradermal and intramuscular injections.
 - (v) Disease epidemiology.
 - (vi) Standards for immunization practices.
 - (vii) Vaccine-preventable diseases.
 - (viii) Recommended immunization schedules.

- (ix) Vaccine storage and management.
- (x) Biohazard waste disposal and sterile techniques.
- (xi) Informed consent.

[(xii) Authority and recordkeeping requirements as provided in this chapter.]

(b) The Board approves courses offered by ACPE-accredited providers and educational institutions that meet the criteria and provide instruction on the topics listed in subsection (a).

(Editor's Note: The following text is proposed to be added and printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

§ 27.408. Professional liability insurance.

- (a) To qualify for authority to administer injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations, a pharmacist must certify the maintenance of professional liability insurance coverage in the minimum amount of \$1 million per occurrence or claims made.
- (b) A pharmacist who does not maintain the required professional liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1 million may not engage in the practice of administering injectable medications, biologicals and immunizations and may not supervise the administration by a pharmacy intern.
- (c) A pharmacist shall, upon request, make available to the Board or its agents all records relating to the pharmacist's maintenance of professional liability insurance, including policies, cancelled checks, receipts or other proofs of premium payment.

STATE BOARD OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY EDUCATION AND LICENSURE

[49 PA. CODE CH. 42] Educational Programs

The State Board of Occupational Therapy Education and Licensure (Board) proposes to amend §§ 42.1 and 42.13 (relating to definitions; and application for licensure) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon finalform publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 5(b) of the Occupational Therapy Practice Act (act) (63 P.S. § 1505(b)) authorizes the Board to "adopt rules and regulations not inconsistent with law as it deems necessary for the performance of its duties and the proper administration of this law." Section 8(2) of the act (63 P.S. § 1508(2)) sets forth the requirements for licensure, which include completion of "the academic requirements of an approved educational program in occupational therapy recognized by the board with the advice and consultation of recognized national accrediting agencies and professional organizations including the American Occupational Therapy Association..."

Background and Need for the Amendments

Under the Board's existing regulations at § 42.13(a)(2), an applicant must meet "the academic requirements of an educational program in occupational therapy approved by the Board, or an equivalent program as defined in § 42.1." Regarding educational programs, the Board's existing regulations do not specify which programs are "approved by the Board." In the United States, the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) is the only accreditation agency that accredits occupational therapy programs, and thus, ACOTE approved educational programs are the only programs approved by the Board. Significantly, the Board's proposed regulations serve to codify the Board's current practices and procedures and do not change the Board's current educational program standards. In drafting this proposed rulemaking, as required by section 8(2) of the act, the Board consulted with the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) through the Pennsylvania Occupational Therapy Association (POTA) as well as the only national accrediting agency that currently accredits occupational therapy programs, ACOTE.

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1 (4 Pa. Code §§ 1.371—1.382) (amended February 6, 1996), the Board sent an exposure draft of this proposed rulemaking to interested parties, including AOTA, POTA, ACOTE and the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT). AOTA, POTA, ACOTE and NBCOT all support the proposed regulations. Specifically, AOTA, which is the national professional association representing the interests of more than 213,000 occupational therapists, occupational therapy assistants and students of occupational therapy, including approximately 3,900 members in this Commonwealth stated that "AOTA supports the Board's proposed amendments which would repeal the definition of 'Equivalent Program' in § 42.1 and insert in § 42.13 a requirement that an applicant for licensure as an OT or OTA successfully complete an education programs for OTs or OTAs that is accredited by ... ACOTE, recognized by the Board, or accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education. We fully support this revision to the Board's regulations as it will not require the Board to change its regulations if the entry level degree for OTs or OTAs changes in the future and it makes the licensing requirements clear for individuals seeking licensure in the state." POTA commented, "[t]hat this is forward thinking and allows the licensure board some options to determine which programs that they want to recognize, within the parameters of a nationally accredited program."

The Board spent significant time discussing this proposed rulemaking during six public board meetings, with representatives from NBCOT, POTA and occupational therapy programs from two educational institutions in this Commonwealth attending one or more meetings.

Description of the Proposed Amendments

The Board proposes to amend § 42.1 by deleting the definition of "equivalent programs." As more fully discussed as follows, the Board's proposed amendments are more specific than the existing regulations because the amendments set forth the educational programs recognized by the Board. Because the Board proposes to delete the reference to "equivalent programs" in § 42.13(a)(2), and this term is not used anywhere else in the regulations, there is no reason to provide a definition for this term

The Board proposes to amend § 42.13(a)(2) by requiring applicants to successfully complete an educational program that is either accredited by ACOTE or another national programmatic accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education and approved by the Board. Currently, and historically, there has been only one accreditation agency for educational programs in occupational therapy—ACOTE. Thus, the Board has historically approved educational programs that are ACOTE accredited. Although the Board is not aware of any other national accrediting agencies that accredit occupational therapy programs, the Board proposes a provision that would allow the Board to review and consider other national accrediting agencies in the event other agencies begin accrediting occupational therapy programs. The Board also proposes amendments to § 42.13(a)(3) to clarify the existing fieldwork experience requirements to reflect the proposed amendments made in paragraph (2).

The proposed amendments are consistent with the Board's current practice and procedures and do not change the Board's existing educational program requirements, but rather, serve to clarify and codify those requirements.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The Board does not anticipate any fiscal impact or paperwork requirements relating to these amendments because applicants are already required to meet these requirements.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of the Board's regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

CHAPTER 42. STATE BOARD OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY EDUCATION AND LICENSURE

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 42.1. Definitions.

Commissioner—The Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs.

[Equivalent program—A masters or certificate program in occupational therapy approved by the Board.]

Licensee—An individual who has been licensed under the act as an occupational therapist or an occupational therapy assistant.

LICENSURE

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§ 42.13. Application for licensure.

- (a) To apply for licensure, an applicant shall pay the required fee and submit evidence satisfactory to the Board, on forms provided by the Board, that the applicant meets the following criteria:
 - (1) Is of good moral character.
- (2) [Has met the academic requirements of an educational program in occupational therapy approved by the Board, or an equivalent program as defined in § 42.1 (relating to definitions).] Has successfully completed an educational program for occupational therapists or occupational therapy assistants that is either:
- (i) Accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) or predecessor organizations.
- (ii) Approved by the Board and accredited by a national programmatic accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education.
- (3) Has successfully completed a period of supervised fieldwork experience [at a recognized educational institute or a training program approved by the educational institution where the academic requirements were met] as a part of an accredited educational program as required by paragraph (2) as follows:
- (i) For an occupational therapist, a minimum of 6 months of supervised fieldwork.
- (ii) For an occupational therapy assistant, a minimum of 2 months of supervised fieldwork.
- (4) Has passed the licensure examination or has qualified for a waiver of the licensure examination under § 42.12 (relating to waiver of licensure examination).

Schedule of Civil Penalties—Crane Operators

The Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Commissioner) proposes to add § 43b.28 (relating to schedule of civil penalties—crane operators) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 3108(a)(1) of 63 Pa.C.S. (relating to civil penalties), authorizes the Commissioner, after consultation with licensing boards within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau), to promulgate a schedule of civil penalties for violations of the respective acts or regulations of the licensing boards.

Background and Need for the Rulemaking

Section 3108(a)(1) authorizes agents of the Bureau to issue citations and impose civil penalties under schedules adopted by the Commissioner in consultation with the Bureau's boards and commissions. Section 3108(a)(1) citations streamline the disciplinary process by eliminating the need for formal orders to show cause, answers, adjudication and orders, and consent agreements. At the same time, licensees who receive a citation under section 3108(a)(1) retain their due process right to a hearing prior to the imposition of judgment. The use of section 3108(a)(1) citations has increased steadily since 1996, when the program was first implemented, and has become an important part of the Bureau's enforcement efforts. Section 3108(a)(1), authorizes the Board, as a licensing board within the Bureau, to levy a civil penalty of not more than \$10,000 on any licensee or unlicensed person who violates any provision of the act or Board regulations. However, section 3108(a)(1)(iii) limits the civil penalty levied by citation to no more than \$1,000 per violation.

Section 702(b) of the Crane Operator Licensure Act (act) (63 P.S. § 2400.702(b)) authorizes the State Board of Crane Operators (Board) to levy a civil penalty of up to \$1,000 on a crane operator who violates a provision of the act, on an individual who operates a crane in violation of the act, or on an individual who holds himself out as a crane operator without being properly licensed. Section 703(a)(3) of the act (63 P.S. § 2400.703(a)(3)) further authorizes the Board to suspend or revoke the license of a crane operator who has willfully or repeatedly violated any of the provisions of the act or the Board's regulations.

This is the first time that the Board will participate in the citation program under section 3108(a)(1). The Commissioner and the Board believe that it is necessary to implement the civil penalties contained in this proposed rulemaking to act as a deterrent for violations of the statutory and regulatory requirements listed in the schedule of civil penalties and to streamline the disciplinary process to be more efficient and cost effective.

Description of Proposed Amendments

The Commissioner, in consultation with the Board, proposes to add § 43b.28 to establish a schedule of civil

penalties for five enumerated offenses, including: operating a crane without a license, employing an unlicensed individual to operate a crane, holding oneself out as a crane operator or using the title "licensed crane operator" when not licensed to do so, practicing on a lapsed or expired license and failing to notify the Board in writing within 10 days of criminal proceedings in a court case against a licensed crane operator.

Operating a crane without a license is a serious infraction of both section 501(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 2400.501(a)) and the Board's regulation at § 6.41(a) (relating to unlicensed crane operation). An unlicensed individual who has not been properly trained to operate a crane could cause extensive damage to property as well as cause bodily harm to individuals at a construction site. Therefore, the Commissioner, in consultation with the Board, would propose a civil penalty of \$750 for a first offense of operating a crane without a license. The Board determined that the penalty for a second offense should be higher than the \$1,000 maximum which may be imposed by citation. Therefore, subsequent offenses would require formal disciplinary action.

Just as operating a crane without a license is a serious matter, so is employing, allowing, directing, retaining or hiring an unlicensed individual or independent contractor to operate a crane, which is a violation of section 501(b) of the act and the Board's regulation at § 6.43(a) (relating to aiding and abetting unlicensed crane operation). Therefore, the proposed civil penalty for a first offense would be \$1,000, the maximum civil penalty that may be imposed by citation. Subsequent offenses would result in formal disciplinary action.

Additionally, persons who are not licensed by the Board may not hold themselves out as being able to operate a crane or use the title "licensed crane operator," as provided in section 501(e) of the act and the Board's regulation at § 6.41(a). To do so would trigger a civil penalty of \$500 for the first offense, \$750 for the second offense and formal action for subsequent offenses.

Operating a crane on a lapsed or expired (unregistered) license is a violation of the Board's regulation at § 6.31(a) (relating to duration of license), which requires all licensed crane operators to register biennially to retain the right to operate a crane. This proposal would progressively increase the civil penalty for continuing violations based on the length of time that the licensee continues to operate cranes while the license has lapsed. For a first offense, the Commissioner would propose a civil penalty of \$50 per month, not to exceed \$1,000, the maximum that may be imposed by citation. Lapses of over 24 months (more than one biennial period) would be met with formal action. For a second offense of up to 12 months, the proposed civil penalty would be \$100 a month, not to exceed \$1,000. Second offenses for a license lapsed over 12 months would result in formal action. Likewise, third or subsequent offenses would require formal action.

Finally, the Commissioner, in consultation with the Board, proposes a civil penalty of \$750 for a first offense of failing to notify the Board in writing within 10 days of criminal proceedings in a court case against the crane operator, which is a violation of the Board's regulation at \$ 6.42(f) (relating to impaired operation of a crane and reportable conditions, incidents or events). Second and subsequent offenses would require formal action.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This proposed rulemaking would have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions,

and would reduce the paperwork requirements of both the Commonwealth and the regulated community by eliminating the need for orders to show cause, answers, consent agreements and adjudication and orders for those violations subject to the citation process under section 3108(a)(1). The only fiscal impact would be borne by those persons who violate the act or regulations of the Board and are subject to the civil penalties proposed by the new schedule. However, this impact could be avoided by simply complying with the act and regulations of the Board. Additionally, the impact would be incurred whether the Commissioner adopts this schedule of civil penalties or not, as currently all violations require formal disciplinary action.

Sunset Date

The Commissioner and the Board continuously monitor the effectiveness of their regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on October 8, 2020, the Commissioner submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the Senate Consumer Protection and Profes-

sional Licensure Committee and the House Professional Licensure Committee. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the Commissioner, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments, recommendations or objections raised.



Designation of School Districts to Receive Duquesne City School District's Junior and Senior High School Students

The Duquesne City School District (Duquesne) eliminated its senior high school program in 2007. Section

14 of the act of July 20, 2007 (P.L. 278, No. 45) (Act 45) governed the reassignment of Duquesne's senior high school students until Act 45 was declared unconstitutional by the Commonwealth Court in 2010. In part, Act 45 authorized the Secretary of Education to designate two or more school districts to accept Duquesne's high school students. Under Act 45, then-Secretary of Education Gerald Zahorchak designated the East Allegheny School District (East Allegheny) and the West Mifflin Area School District (West Mifflin) to accept Duquesne's senior high school students on a tuition basis.

Shortly after Act 45 was struck down, the act of November 23, 2010 (P.L. 1350, No. 123) (Act 123) was enacted. The enactment of Act 123 resulted in significant amendments to section 1607 of the Public School Code of 1949 (School Code) (24 P.S. § 16-1607). Section 1607 of the School Code authorizes the Secretary of Education to designate two or more school districts to accept Duquesne's high school students. When Act 123 was enacted, East Allegheny and West Mifflin were designated to continue to accept Duquesne's senior high school students.

In 2012, Duquesne sought and received the approval of the Department of Education (Department) to alter/curtail its junior high school program (grades 7 and 8). Accordingly, on July 9, 2012, East Allegheny and West Mifflin were designated to also accept Duquesne's junior high school students under section 1607 of the School Code. The designation of East Allegheny and West Mifflin to accept Duquesne's junior and senior high school students remained unchanged.

As required under section 1607(d) of the School Code, the Department provides the following information regarding the assignment of Duquesne's 7—12 grade students to East Allegheny and West Mifflin.

Assignment of Students

- Students entering grades 8, 9, 10, 11 or 12 shall be assigned to the same district to which they were assigned during the previous school year.
- Students entering grade 7 have the opportunity to select the district—East Allegheny or West Mifflin—they wish to attend. Students entering grade 7 shall be assigned to the district that they select.
- Private, religious or charter school students who are residents of Duquesne and who wish to enroll in Duquesne and attend East Allegheny or West Mifflin must register as Duquesne students at the Duquesne Education Center to be assigned to either East Allegheny or West Mifflin.
- Students transferring into Duquesne will be given a choice between East Allegheny and West Mifflin and will be assigned to the district they choose.

Per Pupil Tuition Rate

The per pupil tuition rate that the designated districts shall receive for the 2019-2020 school year is \$14,278.70.

Unless indicated otherwise, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on NPDES applications are invited to submit statements to the contact office noted before the application within 30-days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on WQM permit applications are invited to submit statements to the office noted before the application within 15-days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. A comment submittal should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for public hearings on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

person or any officer or head of any Federal, State or local government agency or authority to the Department at the address of the District Mining Office indicated above each application within 30-days of this publication, or within 30-days after the last publication of the applicant's newspaper advertisement, as provided by 25 Pa. Code §§ 77.121—77.123 and 86.31—86.34 (relating to public notices of filing of permit applications, opportunity for comment, and informal conferences).

Written comments or objections related to a mining permit application should contain the name, address and telephone number of persons submitting comments or objections; application number; and a statement of sufficient detail to inform the Department on the basis of comment or objection and relevant facts upon which it is based.

Requests for an informal conference, or a public hearing, as applicable, on a mining permit application, as

provided by 25 Pa. Code § 77.123 (relating to public hearing-informal conferences) or § 86.34 (relating to informal conferences), must contain the name, address and telephone number of the requestor; the application number; a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference; and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

Where a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) number is listed, the mining activity permit application was accompanied by an application for an individual NPDES permit. A separate notice will be provided after the draft NPDES permit is prepared.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30-days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests or petitions for a public hearing on NPDES permit applications, as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92a.82(d). The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30-days of this public notice and contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. A public hearing may be held if the Department considers the public interest significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing on the NPDES permit application will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. When a public hearing is held, the Department will consider comments from the public hearing in the final determination on the NPDES permit application.

DEP ID: 012-0501-002. Title: Environmental Justice Public Participation Policy. Description: The Department conducted a process of revising the Environmental Justice (EJ) Public Participation Policy (Policy) that was released for public comment in 2018. The Policy focused on enhancing public participation during permit reviews for specific trigger permits that warranted additional public input and engagement in specific geographic areas, that is, EJ areas. The draft Policy included several revisions and updates but continued to focus solely on public engagement in the permitting process.

Comments received during the public comment period suggested that the Policy extend beyond enhancing outreach during the permit review process. After reviewing all comments received, the Department has decided to withdraw the Policy to develop a Policy that will focus on integrating EJ into other Department practices and policies to provide tangible benefits to communities. The Department is focused on incorporating a community engagement process to ensure inclusive community voice around its creation. The Policy is proposed to include: revised EJ areas/population definition; interagency collaboration and EJ planning; EJ mapping, resource and data development; grantmaking practices around EJ; translation processes; and EJ training for Department staff and external partners.

A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 13. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "COAL HARD CASH" area, are: Jingle Bell (NOBONUS) symbol, Cupcake (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Gingerbread (NOBONUS) symbol, Scarf (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Snow Globe (NOBONUS) symbol, Ornament (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Music Note (NOBONUS) symbol and a Cash (WIN10) symbol.

- (1) The Drawing will consist of two drawings and an animated virtual image that will reveal the number of entries the entrant receives by entering a Qualifying Ticket.
 - (2) Drawings:
- (i) The Lottery will conduct a total of two drawings. The drawings will consist of a "Nice List Drawing" and a "Naughty List Drawing." A Qualifying Ticket may only be entered into one of the drawings. The entrant must choose which drawing to enter. Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed. All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.
- (ii) All entries received after 11:59:59 p.m. October 25, 2020, through 11:59:59 p.m. January 7, 2021, will be entered into the Drawing to be held between January 8, 2021 and January 19, 2021.
- (3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Pennsylvania Lottery's publicly accessible web site.

- (4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-1485 \$1,000,000 Merry Money (\$20) = 20 entries; PA-1486 Tree-Mendous Winnings (\$10) = ten entries; PA-1487 Holiday Gifts (\$5) = five entries; PA-1488 Santa's Workshop (\$3) = three entries; PA-1489 Cash Kringle (\$2) = two entries and PA-1490 Oh, Snap (\$1) = one entry.
- (5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.
- (d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners, and odds of winning:
- (1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 10(e), or those mentioned anywhere else in these rules.
- (2) The Lottery will conduct two Drawings from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 10(c)(2).
 - (3) Nice List Drawing:
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$100,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (ii) The second and the third entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$25,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The fourth through the sixth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iv) The seventh through the tenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.
- (v) The eleventh through the sixtieth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
 - (4) Naughty List Drawing:
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$100,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (ii) The second entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The third through the seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iv) The eighth through the fifty-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
- (5) All prizes will be paid as a lump-sum cash payment or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.

- (6) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will have the iLottery Bonus Money credited to their lottery account and will receive an email notifying them that they won a prize.
- (7) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Pennsylvania Lottery's publicly accessible web site.
- (8) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.
- (9) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.
 - (e) Drawing restrictions:
- (1) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.
- (2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If a Drawing entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.
- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.
- (4) Employees of the Pennsylvania Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principle place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs, or any other cause beyond the control of the Pennsylvania Lottery that, in the Pennsylvania Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity, or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Pennsylvania Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.

- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.
- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).
- (12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.
- (13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the same Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.
- (14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 10(d)(6). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's account.
 - (15) Prizes are not transferrable.
 - (16) Other restrictions may apply.
- 11. Retailer incentive awards: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Cash Kringle instant lottery game tickets.
- 12. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania instant lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 13. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Cash Kringle, prize money from winning Cash Kringle instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Cash Kringle instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

- 14. Governing law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.
- 15. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Cash Kringle or through normal communications methods.

- 2. *Price*: The price of a Holiday Gifts instant lottery game ticket is \$5.

The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The play symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRT), Stocking (STOCKING) symbol, 2X (DOUBLE) symbol and a Sleigh (WINALL) symbol.
- 4. Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: \$5.00 (FIV DOL), \$10.00 (TEN DOL), \$20.00 (TWENTY), \$40.00 (FORTY), \$50.00 (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO), \$10,000 (TEN THO) and \$250,000 (TWHNFYTH).
- 5. *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: \$5, \$10, \$20, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000, \$10,000 and \$250,000. Holiday Gifts contains a feature that can multiply the prize won. For a complete list of prizes, including multiplied prizes, see section 9 (relating to

Number and description of prizes and approximate odds). A player can win up to 12 times on a ticket.

- 6. Approximate number of tickets printed for the game: Approximately 13,200,000 tickets will be printed for the Holiday Gifts instant lottery game.
- 7. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a \$100,000 Wish List Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Holiday Gifts instant lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 10.

- (c) Holders of tickets upon which a Sleigh (WINALL) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in eight of the "prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in four of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10,000.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which a Stocking (STOCK-ING) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "prize" area under that Stocking (STOCKING) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which a 2X (DOUBLE) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "prize" area under that 2X (DOUBLE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which a Sleigh (WINALL) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in two of the "prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in two of the "prize" areas, and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in eight of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

- (y) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of $$40^{.00}$ (FORTY) appears in the "prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (z) Holders of tickets upon which a 2X (DOUBLE) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in the "prize" area under that 2X (DOUBLE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (aa) Holders of tickets upon which a Stocking (STOCK-ING) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of $$40^{.00}$ (FORTY) appears in the "prize" area under that Stocking (STOCKING) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (bb) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "prize" area under the

- (cc) Holders of tickets upon which a Stocking (STOCK-ING) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "prize" area under that Stocking (STOCKING) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (dd) Holders of tickets upon which a 2X (DOUBLE) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL) appears in the "prize" area under that 2X (DOUBLE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.

- (gg) Holders of tickets upon which a 2X (DOUBLE) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "prize" area under that 2X (DOUBLE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (hh) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (ii) Holders of tickets upon which a Stocking (STOCK-ING) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "prize" area under that Stocking (STOCKING) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- 9. Number and description of prizes and approximate odds: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes, and approximate odds of winning:

- (4) Employees of the Pennsylvania Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principle place of residence of any such

- person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs, or any other cause beyond the control of the Pennsylvania Lottery that, in the Pennsylvania Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity, or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Pennsylvania Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.

- a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 13. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Holiday Gifts, prize money from winning Holiday Gifts instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. - 1. Name: The name of the game is Pennsylvania Oh, Snap (hereafter "Oh, Snap"). The game number is PA-1490
- 2. Price: The price of a Oh, Snap instant lottery game ticket is \$1.
- 3. *Play symbols*: Each Oh, Snap instant lottery game ticket will contain one play area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the play area, are: Reindeer (DEER) symbol, Present (PRESENT) symbol, Holly (HOLLY) symbol, Candy Cane (CANDY CANE) symbol,

Stocking (STOCKING) symbol, Tree (TREE) symbol, Santa Hat (HAT) symbol, Candle (CANDLE) symbol, Mitten (MITTEN) symbol, Jingle Bell (BELL) symbol, Snowflake (SNWFLK) symbol, Sleigh (SLEIGH) symbol, Wreath (WREATH) symbol, Milk (MILK) symbol and a Gingerbread (WINALL) symbol.

- 4. Prize symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the play area, are: FREE (TICKET), $\$1^{.00}$ (ONE DOL), $\$2^{.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$4^{.00}$ (FOR DOL), $\$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN), $\$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$400 (FOR HUN) and \$5,000 (FIV THO).

- (h) Holders of tickets upon which a Gingerbread (WINALL) symbol appears in the play area, and a prize symbol of $\$15^{.00}$ (FIFTEEN) appears in two of the "prize"

areas and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in two of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

- (i) Holders of tickets upon which a Gingerbread (WINALL) symbol appears in the play area, and a prize symbol of $\$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL) appears in all four of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

- (ii) The second and the third entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$25,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The fourth through the sixth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iv) The seventh through the tenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.
- (v) The eleventh through the sixtieth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
 - (4) Naughty List Drawing:
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$100,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (ii) The second entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The third through the seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iv) The eighth through the fifty-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
- (5) All prizes will be paid as a lump-sum cash payment or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.

- (2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If a Drawing entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.
- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.
- (4) Employees of the Pennsylvania Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principle place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs, or any other cause beyond the control of the Pennsylvania Lottery that, in the Pennsylvania Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity, or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Pennsylvania Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.
- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).
- (12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.
- (13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the same Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.
- (14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 9(d)(6). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash.  - (15) Prizes are not transferrable.
 - (16) Other restrictions may apply.
- 10. Retailer incentive awards: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Santa's Workshop instant lottery game tickets.
- 11. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania instant lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 12. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Santa's Workshop, prize money from winning Santa's Workshop instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Santa's Workshop instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.
- 13. Governing law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State

Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

14. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Santa's Workshop or through normal communications methods.

Order

By the Commission:

PPL Electric Utilities Corporation (PPL or Petitioner) recently filed a Petition with the Commission pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 5.41 requesting that the Commission approve a waiver of the use of its standardized interconnection agreement form for proposed interconnection projects. The Petition was filed on September 14, 2020, seeking a waiver from using the Commission-adopted standardized interconnection agreement form to accommodate a request by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) to modify two sections of the existing standardized terms and conditions in the interconnection agreement.

The Commission will grant the Petition as set forth in this Order. Furthermore, to avoid the need for the filing and review of similar petitions in the future, the Commission will approve modifications to the language of the

standard interconnection agreement form as set forth in this Order for state agencies governed by and subject to the same laws as those at issue in this Order.

PPL's Petition

PPL states that it received a Level 2 interconnection application from DCNR to interconnect a 32.4 kW solar photovoltaic system at Weiser State Forest in Columbia County, Pennsylvania. PPL asserts that it uses the standard application and agreement forms adopted by the Commission for interconnection projects. See Implementation of the Alternative Energy Portfolio Standards Act of 2004: Standard Interconnection Application Forms, Docket No. M-00051865 (Order entered February 27, 2009) (AEPS Act Implementation Order). PPL states that the DCNR requested modifications to the sections of the interconnection agreement addressing Indemnification (Section 9) and Limitation of Liability (Section 10). The specific modifications requested by PPL through its Petition are as follows:

9) RESERVED. Indemnification. The Parties shall at all times indemnify, defend, and save the other Party harmless from, any and all damages, losses, claims, including claims and actions relating to injury to or death of any person or damage to property, demand, suits, recoveries, costs and expenses, court costs, attorney fees, and all other obligations by or to third parties, arising out of or resulting from the other Party's action or inactions of its obligations under these terms and conditions on behalf of the indemnifying Party, except in cases of gross negligence or intentional wrongdoing by the indemnified Party.

10) Limitation of Liability. Each party's liability to the other party for any loss, cost, claim, injury, liability, or expense, excluding payment of any including reasonable attorney's fees, relating to or arising from any act or omission in its performance of these terms and conditions, shall be limited to the amount of direct damage actually incurred. In no event shall either party be liable to the other party for any indirect, incidental, special, consequential, or punitive damages of any kind whatsoever:

DCNR has represented that these modifications are necessary to ensure adherence to 1 Pa.C.S. § 2310, which states that the Commonwealth, its officers, and its employees are subject to sovereign immunity, unless such immunity is specifically waived by the General Assembly. As an agency of the Commonwealth, this provision is applicable to DCNR.

PPL asserts that identical issues were previously considered by the Commission at Docket No. P-2011-2238314, Petition of Metropolitan Edison Company for Waiver of Standard Interconnection Application and Agreement Forms (Order dated October 28, 2011), and Docket No. P-2019-3011599, Petition of West Penn Power Company for Waiver of Standard Interconnection Application and Agreement Forms (Order dated August 8, 2019).

Discussion

To begin with, as this Petition involves the Commission approved Standard Interconnection Agreement that was

 1 PPL Petition at 2-3 (¶8). 2 In these proceedings, Metropolitan Edison Company (Met-Ed) and West Penn Power Company (West Penn) requested that the Commission authorize Met-Ed and West Penn to remove and modify the same language identified herein within a DCNR interconnection agreement. The Commission approved the proposed modifications to the indemnification and limitation of liability provisions in both proceedings.

adopted by the Commission through the AEPS Act Implementation Order at Docket No. M-00051865 and the same or similar law and issues relating to State agency liability, we find that it is reasonable and prudent to consolidate this Order with our Order at Docket No. M-00051865 that adopted the Standard Interconnection Agreement pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 5.81(a).

Regarding the Petitioner's request to revise the Standard Interconnection Agreement, the Commission notes that it has exclusive regulatory jurisdiction over the implementation of public utilities and, where possible, seeks to establish statewide standardization of all facets of public utility operations. Through its AEPS Act Implementation Order, the Commission established standardized interconnection application and agreement forms in accordance with the Alternative Energy Portfolio Standards Act of 2004, 73 P.S. §§ 1648.1—1648.8, and the Commission's corresponding regulations at 52 Pa. Code §§ 75.1—75.51. The standard application and agreement forms are intended to be used for all levels of review for proposed interconnection projects. The Commission directed that the standard interconnection application and agreement forms be used by jurisdictional electric distribution companies (EDCs) for processing interconnection requests brought under the Commission's regulations at 52 Pa. Code §§ 75.1—75.51.³

The interconnection agreements for Levels 1—4 contain specific limitations on indemnification and liability. In addition, the agreements for Levels 2—4 contain specific terms regarding the laws and regulations applicable to the agreement. Since the Commission approved the provisions set within these standardized forms and directed their use by EDCs for all levels of interconnection projects, the Commission is the appropriate forum for Petitioners to seek permission to deviate from use of the standardized interconnection agreement forms.

DCNR made it known to PPL that it requested the above modifications in an effort to comply with 1 Pa.C.S. § 2310, which states that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, its officials, and its agencies are entitled to statutory sovereign immunity. DCNR is a state agency of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania tasked with maintaining and preserving the 116 state parks; managing the 2.1 million acres of state forest land; providing information on the state's ecological and geologic resources; and establishing community conservation partnerships with grants and technical assistance to benefit rivers, trails, greenways, local parks and recreation, regional heritage parks, open space, and natural areas under the Conservation and Natural Resources Act, 71 P.S. §§ 1340.101, et. seq. Thus, DCNR is a Commonwealth agency for purposes of the Sovereign Immunity Act. 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 8521— 8528. As a result, DCNR is insulated from liability, except in certain specified circumstances where the General Assembly has waived sovereign immunity protection. See 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 8521(a), 8522(a)-(b).

Based upon a review of this Commission's prior approval of the above-cited similar waiver requests as well as relevant case law regarding sovereign immunity, we agree that it is appropriate to remove the Indemnification provision and modify the Limitation of Liability provision of the standardized interconnection agreement as requested by DCNR. Retaining the indemnification clause in the standardized interconnection agreement with DCNR would have the effect of placing the Commonwealth, its assets, and the Pennsylvania General Fund at risk, because it would expose the Commonwealth to

liability for tort actions beyond what is statutorily allowed. The purpose of sovereign immunity is to provide special protection against the loss of assets held in common for many people, specifically Pennsylvania citizens, now and in the future, for the performance of vital government functions.

We note that, under the Sovereign Immunity Act, there are certain specified circumstances in which the General Assembly has waived sovereign immunity protection. 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 8521(a), 8522(a)-(b). The exceptions to sovereign immunity under the Sovereign Immunity Act are to be strictly construed and are the only instances where immunization from liability for Commonwealth agencies is waived. See 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 8521(a), 8522(a)-(b). No exception enumerated in the Sovereign Immunity Act applies to instances where a state agency enters into an interconnection project with a public utility and, therefore, no exception applies to PPL's interconnection project agreements with DCNR. Moreover, nothing in the Procurement Code generally addresses tort liability and we decline to read such an exception therein. Accordingly, we find that requiring DCNR to execute the standardized interconnection agreement form that retains the Indemnification and Limitation of Liability provisions as is would constitute an impermissible waiver of sovereign immunity. For these reasons, the Commission will approve the modifications requested by Petitioner.

As noted by Petitioner, the Commission has approved these same changes to the Standard Interconnection Agreements to accommodate prior requests by DCNR. The Commission also notes that no party has filed an objection to the changes proposed for the standard Interconnection Agreement in each of the prior proceedings, and no party filed an objection in the present proceedings. Accordingly, the Commission finds it reasonable and appropriate to amend the Commission's February 27, 2009, Order at Docket No. M-00051865 relating to the Implementation of the Alternative Energy Portfolio Standards Act of 2004: Standard Interconnection Application Forms, pursuant to our authority under Section 703(g) of the Pennsylvania Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 703(g).

Specifically, the Commission approves the modifications to the language of Sections 9 and 10 of the standard interconnection agreement as set forth in this Order as an approved amendment to the Standard Interconnection Application Forms for state agencies governed by and subject to the same state laws as those at issue herein (the Sovereign Immunity Act. 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 8521—8528).

Conclusion

For the foregoing reasons, the Commission finds that the Petitioner's reasons for seeking waiver of the standard interconnection agreement are valid. Accordingly, we find it is in the public interest to grant this Petition. We also find that it is reasonable and appropriate to amend the Commission's February 27, 2009, Order at Docket No. M-00051865 relating to the Implementation of the Alternative Energy Portfolio Standards Act of 2004: Standard Interconnection Application Forms, by approving modifications to the Standard Interconnection Agreement Forms as set forth in this Order as approved amendments to said forms;

Therefore,

It Is Ordered That:

1. The proceedings docketed at P-2020-3021913 and M-00051865 shall be consolidated, pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 5.81(a).

2 The Petition of PPL at Docket No. P-2020-3021913 for Waiver of the Standardized Interconnection Agreement Form established by the Commission in the proceeding at Docket No. M-00051865 is granted in accordance with this Order.

- 3. The Commission approves the modifications to the language of Sections 9 and 10 of the standard interconnection agreement as set forth in this Order as an approved amendment to the Standard Interconnection Application Forms for state agencies governed by and subject to the same state laws as those at issue herein (the Sovereign Immunity Act. 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 8521—8528).
- 4. A copy of this Order be served on the Commission's Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement, the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, all jurisdictional electric distribution companies, and the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.
- 5. The Secretary cause a copy of this Order to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 6. The matters at Dockets No. P-2020-3021913 and M-00051865 be marked closed.

Public Utility Service Termination Moratorium—Modification of March 13th Emergency Order; M-2020-3019244

Order

By the Commission:

On March 6, 2020, Governor Tom Wolf issued a Proclamation of Disaster Emergency (Proclamation) that identified the COVID-19 pandemic as a disaster emergency affecting the entire Commonwealth. On March 13, 2020, relying on both the Proclamation and the Commission's authority under the provisions of Section 1501 of the Public Utility Code, Chairman Gladys Brown Dutrieuille issued an Emergency Order (March 13 Emergency Order) establishing a prohibition on the termination of public utility service and directing the reconnection of service to customers previously terminated, to the extent it could be done safely, for the duration of the Proclamation, or until a time otherwise established by the Commission. That Order was ratified by the Commission at its March 26, 2020 Public Meeting.

Currently, Pennsylvania's COVID-19 daily diagnosis statistics remain high, and many businesses are not operating at full capacity which means that our economy is still exhibiting a downturn. However, the situation has improved since earlier this year in that the Governor, under the advisement of Secretary of Health Rachel Levine, has lifted the "shelter-in-place" directive and permitted the reopening of businesses in each of our 67 counties. Of significance, the Commonwealth's unemployment numbers have improved from 16.1% in April 2020 to the $10.3\%^2$ in August $2020.^3$ As the pandemic and economic situation has evolved, it is appropriate for the Commission to revisit the March 13 Emergency Order. The moratorium on utility service terminations was the right decision to make in March, but the moratorium cannot be the sole solution for assisting vulnerable utility customers. Many other states have moved or are moving from moratoriums by designing plans to assist payment troubled customers keep utility service.4

Moving from an absolute moratorium to a less restrictive phase, while still acknowledging that the pandemic and its economic effects have not disappeared, requires us to put in place a mix of holistic, short-term and long-term solutions to offer customers protections and ensure the payment of bills from customers that are able to pay. Our goal is to put customer protections in place that can work for the short term. It is unknown, however, how long we are going to have to live with this pandemic or its economic consequences. For these reasons, we must also convene a stakeholder process to consider whether longer term options may be needed, and whether the actions herein are serving the public interest.

It is vital that utilities inform customers they are behind in payment and at-risk of termination so that those customers can be evaluated for participation in various assistance programs, including, but not limited to, the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP),⁵ Customer Assistance Programs (CAP), Lifeline, and Hardship Funds (Assistance Programs). We recognize that it is vital that utilities work with customers before their accounts get to a point that is impossible

for the customers to overcome. Customers with arrears need to contact their utilities to seek available assistance.

Phase 2 of the Termination Moratorium

The absolute utility service termination moratorium is lifted and disconnections may commence effective November 9, 2020. Ten-day termination notices pursuant to Section 1406(b) of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 1406(b), may issue after the issuance of the ten-day communication provided for in Paragraph 1 below to begin the process for collecting debt owed by customers. The following modifications to existing termination policies shall apply to all electric, natural gas, water, wastewater, telecommunications, and steam utilities subject to the Commission's jurisdiction:

- 1. Upon entry of this Order, utilities shall issue at least one communication to customers whose unpaid balances will put them at risk of termination after the lifting of the moratorium. The communication shall: (1) inform the customer that they are at-risk of service termination after the moratorium is lifted (November 9, 2020); (2) indicate a general time range when the customer will likely be terminated unless the customer takes appropriate steps; (3) inform the customer of available options including the customer's right to file an informal complaint with the Commission if the customer is not satisfied with the arrangement offered by the utility; and, (4) be sent to the customer at least ten days prior to the issuance of the standard ten-day termination notice contained in 66 Pa.C.S. § 1406(b). The additional ten-day communication provided for in this paragraph is a one-time require-
- 2. Unless otherwise authorized by the Commission, a utility shall not terminate service to residential customers at 300% and below of federal poverty income guidelines $(FPIG)^6$ (hereinafter "protected customers"). To receive protection from termination, a protected customer must apply for all Assistance Programs for which the customer is eligible and must request a payment arrangement from the utility, if appropriate. A protected customer denied a stay by the utility may file a complaint with the Commission for review of the utility's decision.
- 3. Unless otherwise authorized by the Commission, a utility shall offer a payment arrangement for a period of no less than eighteen (18) months to small business customers, as defined by a utility's tariff, with past due amounts. A small business customer which remains current on its payment arrangement and current bill shall not be terminated. A small business customer which is denied a payment arrangement by a utility may file a complaint with the Commission.
- 4. Utilities shall waive all connection, reconnection, and deposit fees otherwise required for service for protected customers.
- 5. Utilities shall waive late payment charges for protected customers.
- 6. Utilities shall accept at least two additional medical certificates for eligible customers who may have otherwise exhausted the three available in 52 Pa. Code §§ 56.111— 56.118, 56.351—56.358. Because medical professionals

may be dealing with increased patient loads, an additional 7 days are allotted for medical professionals to return medical certificates to the utility. Medical certificates on the doctor's/medical facility's letterhead will be accepted.

- 7. Utilities and the Commission's Bureau of Consumer Services shall accept income verification and business status information obtained through flexible means, for example, over-the-phone or via electronic mail, for the purpose of qualifying customers for protected status, payment arrangements, or universal service programs.
- 8. The Commission recognizes that compliance with the March 13 Emergency Order and this Order may increase expenses for utilities. Consistent with our May 13, Secretarial letter, utilities shall continue tracking extraordinary, nonrecurring incremental COVID-19 related expenses and shall maintain detailed accounting records of such expenses. Additionally, the Commission authorizes electric, natural gas, water, wastewater, steam and all rate base/rate of return telecommunications utilities to create a regulatory asset for any incremental expenses incurred above those embedded in rates resulting from the directives contained in this Order. To be eligible for inclusion in a utility's COVID-19 designated regulatory asset, the utility must maintain detailed records of the incremental extraordinary, nonrecurring expenses incurred as a result of compliance with the Commission's March 13 Emergency Order, and this Order.
- 9. Utilities shall report the following information to the Commission. The first report shall be filed with the Secretary of the Commission by December 15, 2020, for the preceding month. Thereafter, the report shall be filed by the 15th of each month, until this requirement is revised or lifted by the Commission. The information shall be separated by residential and commercial accounts.
- a. Total number of residential and non-residential accounts at risk of termination at the end of the month and for the same month of the year prior.
- b. Total aggregate dollars of arrears, broken down by the same account categories, at the end of the month and for the same month of the year prior.
- c. The number of residential and non-residential accounts disconnected for non-payment with dollar amounts owed.

Commission Approved COVID-19 Protection Plans

Commission approved utility COVID-19 customer protection plans will remain in effect according to their individual terms.

Ongoing Evaluation/Public Comment

Because of the dynamic nature of the pandemic, the Commission will revisit these protections during the first quarter of 2021. We invite comments and proposals from interested parties regarding any revisions to the protections outlined herein. Responsive comments shall be due by February 16, 2021. We believe that this stakeholder process will refresh input from interested parties based upon the trajectory of the pandemic and the status of the economy at that time, so that both customer and utility interests continue to be considered;

Therefore,

It Is Ordered:

1. The Commission's March 13, 2020 Emergency Order is modified consistent with this Order.

2. Paragraphs 2—9 herein of this Order shall remain in effect until the earlier of: (1) March 31, 2021; (2) the date on which the Governor's Proclamation of Disaster Emergency is rescinded; or, (3) a time otherwise established by the Commission.

- 3. Comments and proposals regarding any revisions to the protections outlined herein must be efiled at this docket number by opening and using an efiling account through the Commission's website. If comments or proposals contain confidential or proprietary information, they should NOT be efiled but should be emailed directly to the Secretary of the Commission at rchiavetta@pa.gov. All comments and proposals must be filed by the close of business (4:30 p.m. EST) on Tuesday, February 16, 2021. Comments received after this deadline will not be considered.
- 4. The Commission's Law Bureau, with assistance from the Bureau of Consumer Services, and Bureau of Technical Utility Services shall review any comments or proposals received from interested parties and provide a recommendation to the Commission.
- 5. That the Law Bureau shall publish a copy of this Order in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Dissent of Vice Chairperson David W. Sweet

While I respect Chairman Brown Dutrieuille and the efforts she has made to develop her Motion today, I cannot support her Motion. My position throughout this pandemic has been consistent regarding how and when to end the moratorium on utility terminations that has been in place since March, and the action that the Commission takes today falls short of the requirements that I have articulated. Some of those requirements have been met, and I am happy to see that the moratorium will remain in place for those customers whose income is 300% or less of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. But the motion sets March 31, 2021 for the end of those protections, regardless of the state of the economy or the health of the populace at that time, and that I cannot support.

I firmly believe that the moratorium should remain in place for those vulnerable customers until an evaluation of the circumstances that exist at the end of winter, including but not limited to the state of the Commonwealth's health, the economy, particularly the unemployment rate, whether schools are open or classes are being held largely online, the availability of public resources to assist customers who cannot pay their bills, and whether citizens are free to move about without worrying about contracting the virus. This evaluation is crucial to protecting those customers who need it most. By choosing a date in the future without any sound economic or heath information to guide us, we run a very real risk of ending that protection at a time when circumstances may be even worse than we have experienced up to this point. Without the evaluation, we simply do not know what we are facing, and the ramifications may be dire.

After March 31, 2021, there is no plan in place to protect the low-income customers under this Motion. Without continued protections for the most vulnerable customers in place until a thorough evaluation of circum-

stances persuades me that lifting the moratorium for that class is justified, I cannot support the motion. Accordingly, I will be voting no.
