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

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, have caused this Proclamation to issue and, in compliance with the provisions of Section 15 of Article IV of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, do hereby give notice that I have filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, with my objections thereto, the following bill passed by both houses of the General Assembly at the Regular Session of 2021-2022:

House Bill No. 1300, Printer's No. 1869, entitled "An Act [a]mending the act of June 3, 1937 (P.L. 1333, No.320), entitled 'An act concerning elections, including general, municipal, special and primary elections, the nomination of candidates, primary and election expenses and election contests; creating and defining membership of county boards of elections; imposing duties upon the Secretary of the Commonwealth, courts, county boards of elections, county commissioners; imposing penalties for violation of the act, and codifying, revising and consolidating the laws relating thereto; and repealing certain acts and parts of acts relating to elections,' as follows: in preliminary provisions, further providing for definitions, providing for legislative authority over elections, establishing the Bureau of Election Audits and providing for special standing in challenges to the Election Code; in the Secretary of the Commonwealth, further providing for powers and duties of the Secretary of the Commonwealth and providing for reports on implementation of elections; in county boards of elections, further providing for powers and duties of county boards and providing for county boards of elections and satellite offices; in district election officers, further providing for qualifications of election officers, for compensation of district election officers and for appointment of watchers; providing for registration of electors; in ballots, further providing for form of official election ballot and for number of ballots to be printed and specimen ballots; in voting machines, further providing for examination and approval of voting machines by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, for requirements of voting machines, for preparation of voting machines by county election boards and for delivery of voting machines and supplies by county election boards to election officers; in electronic voting systems, further providing for experimental use of electronic voting systems and for statistical sample and providing for requirements of accessible voting machines; in voting apparatus bonds, providing for voting system defects, disclosure, investigations and penalties; in preparation for and conduct of primaries and elections, providing for voter's bill of rights, for senior voter's bill of rights, for disabled voter's bill of rights and further providing for time for opening and closing polls, for manner of applying to vote, persons entitled to vote, voter's certificates, entries to be made in district register, numbered lists of voters and challenges and for deadline for receipt of valid voter registration application; in voting by qualified absentee electors, further providing for applications for official absentee ballots, for date of application for absentee ballot, for delivering or mailing ballots, for voting by absentee electors, providing for supervised voting by qualified absentee electors in certain facilities and further providing for canvassing of official absentee ballots and mail-in ballots; in voting by qualified mail-in electors, further providing for applications for official mail-in ballots, for date of application for mail-in ballot, for delivering or mailing ballots and for voting by mail-in electors; in Pennsylvania Election Law Advisory Board, further providing for Pennsylvania Election Law Advisory Board; providing for early voting by qualified electors; in returns of primaries and elections, further providing for returns to be open to public inspection and exceptions and for computation of returns by county board, certification and issuance of certificates of election;

Notice of Veto; House Bill 1300, Printer's Number 1869

June 30, 2021

To the Honorable House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 1300, Printer's Number 1869.

Pennsylvania had a free, fair, and secure election in November 2020 with record turnout, in which people embraced mail-in voting, and the results have been confirmed by two statewide audits. These results are a testament to the robustness of our existing election system, but also the many hard working local officials who conduct our elections in an earnest and transparent way. While the bill includes some potential areas of improvement—such as giving counties more time to pre-canvass, increasing poll worker pay, and expanding the use of electronic poll books—the legislation is incurably riddled with unacceptable barriers to voting, including:

- Imposing additional voter identification restrictions similar to those already found unconstitutional by Pennsylvania courts;
- Limiting mail-in voting by creating excessive and burdensome requirements;
- Requiring an arbitrary signature match for mail-in ballots without a thorough system to cure; and
- Eliminating the use of ballot drop boxes by creating onerous requirements on ballot delivery locations with which counties will be unable to comply.

The legislation also rolls back significant bipartisan improvements made in Act 77 of 2019, the landmark election reform enacted last session, by:

- Reducing the number of days to register to vote by moving the deadline back to 30 days before an election, which would be among the most restrictive deadlines in the nation;
- Eliminating the convenient annual option to be sent a mail-in ballot for each election; and
- Eliminating the option to go to a county election office and apply for and receive a mail-in ballot in the same visit.

This bill is ultimately not about improving access to voting or election security, but about restricting the freedom to vote. If adopted, it would threaten to disrupt election administration, undermine faith in government, and invite costly, time-consuming, and destabilizing litigation. Instead of trying to silence the voices of some Pennsylvanians, we should build on the bipartisan achievements of Act 77 of 2019. To that end, I am willing to engage in good faith to refine our shared priorities, and work to find common ground in areas where we do not currently have agreement. I am committed to working sincerely towards legislation that supports voter access and can be passed on a bipartisan basis in the fall.

Until that time, for the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 1300, Printer's Number 1869.

Notice of Veto; Senate Bill No. 255, Printer's No. 971

June 30, 2021

To The Honorable Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 16 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning this appropriation bill, Senate Bill 255, Printer's Number 971, to your chamber.

In a separate action today, I informed the House of Representatives that I am withholding my signature from House Bill 1300, Printers Number 1869. Accordingly, I am also compelled to withhold my approval from a corresponding allocation of funding to the Office of the Auditor General intended to facilitate the establishment and operation of a Bureau of Election Audits.

For these reasons, I return the bill to your chamber partially approved and signed. The bill is approved with the exception of the item listed below:

SECTION 205. Auditor General.

For the Department of the Auditor General for postauditing annually, periodically or specially, the affairs of any department, board, or commission which is supported out of the General Fund, district justices, other fining offices, volunteer firemen's relief association funds and the offices of statewide elected officials and for the proper auditing of appropriations for or relating to public assistance, including any federal sums supplementing such appropriations.

This item is approved in the sum of \$38,341,000.

Notice of Veto; Senate Bill No. 516, Printer's No. 802

July 1, 2021

To the Honorable Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill 516, Printer's Number 802.

This legislation seeks to solve the real issue of collecting court costs from those who have the ability to pay, but unfortunately could result in disproportionately harming indigent defendants. This bill allows a court to turn over debt owed from court costs, fines, and restitution to a private collection agency, who may add up to a 25% surcharge, when the defendant does not appear at a financial determination hearing. The purpose of a

financial determination hearing is for the court to review a defendant's financial situation and determine whether the payments should be made in installments. The court will account for the defendant's ability to make restitution and reparations and weigh the burden the payment will impose on the defendant. This bill would remove that safeguard if the defendant fails to appear at the financial determination hearing, regardless of whether that failure to appear is willful or non-willful. In many instances, the financial determination hearings will occur long after a person has completed probation or parole, moved, relocated, or otherwise fulfilled their obligations to the court, and the notice to appear is often sent to out-of-date addresses.

This bill attempts to solve the problem of financially able defendants willfully skipping the determination hearing to evade collection of their debt. However, without a financial determination hearing, defendants who do not have the ability to pay will be treated the same as those who do. This would result in indigent defendants being disproportionately affected in other aspects of their lives. While I strongly recognize that victims should have every effort made to collect restitution on their behalf, this bill does not delineate between those defendants with an ability to pay versus those that do not. Court-ordered debt can linger for years and impact credit scores, limit access to housing, employment, and other benefits, including the ability to secure a pardon.

A more holistic approach is needed to both increase a court's ability to collect fees from those who have the ability to pay while also protecting indigent defendants. Pennsylvania is one of two states that require local government to fund and administer indigent services. The creation of an Office of Indigent Defense is one proposal that I have put forth that would protect these vulnerable defendants. Unfortunately, this proposal did not receive funding in this year's budget. I appreciate that this bill is attempting to solve a legitimate problem faced by the counties; however, I believe it warrants more thorough consideration to protect indigent defendants.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from Senate Bill 516, Printer's Number 802.

Notice of Veto; Senate Bill 618, Printer's Number 945

July 1, 2021

To the Honorable Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill 618, Printer's Number 945.

This legislation is contradictory, misguided and irresponsible. This bill prohibits basic public health measures, which are necessary to curb infectious disease transmission and save lives. Specifically, the bill elimi-

nates the Department of Health's ability to take disease control measures for any future contagious disease, resulting in the inability to contain the spread of infectious diseases in the Commonwealth or long after the current pandemic is over.

While the provisions of this legislation put all commonwealth residents at risk, individuals who are vulnerable to infectious diseases, such as residents of long-term care facilities, are at an even greater risk if the authority to mitigate transmission of infectious diseases is eliminated. In addition, persons of all ages with medical conditions and immunosuppressed systems are put at greater risk under this bill. As we have seen with COVID-19 and other disease outbreaks, public health response measures are critical in saving lives of vulnerable residents. Health orders are needed to provide direction to health care providers, medical facilities, patients, and those likely exposed to a disease during a pandemic.

Alongside Pennsylvania's nation-leading vaccine rollout, universal masking, distancing, and worker safety orders have been instrumental in fighting COVID-19 in Pennsylvania. Short-sighted legislation to tie the hands of people dedicated to public health will only make infectious diseases more difficult to fight.

Finally, this bill limits the Department of Health's ability to collect vaccine and immunization information for the Commonwealth's Statewide Immunization Information System. This would prevent medical providers and the public from having access to vital information on vaccination rates and vaccine efficacy.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from Senate Bill 618, Printer's Number 945.

Collection of Restitution, Reparation, Fees, Costs, Fines, and Penalties; No. 2021-1

Administrative Order

And Now, this 1st day of July, 2021, the Court having issued Administrative Orders at the previously-numbered docket on May 7, 2021, and June 10, 2021, and an Administrative Order regulating filing procedures for the Clerk of Courts dated January 15, 2021, it is hereby Ordered, Adjudged, and Decreed that the Clerk of Courts shall follow the procedures set forth as follows:

- 1. The Clerk of Courts shall complete and process Pennsylvania Department of Transportation DL-21CF Forms, including submission of the report to the appropriate agency of the Commonwealth, upon receipt of an order of court issued pursuant to 75 Pa.C.S.A. § 1541 (commonly referred to as "Act 122s").
- 2. The Clerk of Courts shall complete and process Pennsylvania Department of Transportation DL-21CF Forms, including submission of the report to the appropriate agency of the Commonwealth, upon receipt of verification from the Adult Probation Office of the completion of a term of house arrest with electronic surveillance, partial confinement program, or incarceration (commonly referred to as "Act 151s"). The verification shall be provided in a format as prescribed by the Adult Probation Office.
- 3. The Clerk of Courts shall complete and process Pennsylvania Department of Transportation DL-38 forms for notification to the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, upon request of the Chief Adult Probation Officer, or his designee, until further order of court.
- 4. The Clerk of Courts shall enter sentences and assess restitution, reparation, fees, costs, fines, and/or penalties on adult criminal or juvenile delinquency cases, including assessments for summary appeals, miscellaneous dockets, and underlying filing types, such as inter-county transfer cases, whether offense or non-offense related, until such time that the Chief Adult Probation Officer informs the Clerk of Courts that the this function will be assumed by the Collections Unit of the Adult Probation Office. In completing these required entries, the Clerk of Courts must comply with this Court's Administrative Order of May 7, 2021, which established a status quo for the entry of assessments of fines, costs, fees, and restitution, in anticipation of the transfer of collection functions. Assessments for Alcohol Highway Safety School tuition, Court Reporting Network evaluations, and Community Service Administration fees are to be completed in the same manner as prior to May 7, 2021, Administrative Order until further order of court.
- 5. The Court reiterates from its Administrative Order of May 28, 2021, that the Chief Adult Probation Officer, or his designee, shall direct the master accounting process in CPCMS, to include the coordination of monthly master account disbursements, including running all necessary reports and notifying and working with the Clerk of Courts regarding the printing of each offices' respective

checks. The Clerk of Courts shall not perform monthly master account disbursements absent consultation with and consent of the Chief Adult Probation Officer. The completion of master account disbursements jointly by the Clerk of Courts and Adult Probation Office is essential to orderly and appropriate disbursements.

- 6. The Court is aware of payments made by credit card (e.g., twelve credit card payments from June 1—10 totaling approximately \$2,825.00), and acceptance of prepaid restitution (see, e.g., Commonwealth v. Thomas, No. 2271-2020), that were accepted or deposited into the account(s) of the Clerk of Courts that have been affected by the transition of collection functions. The Clerk of Courts shall undertake all necessary actions immediately to facilitate the transfer and/or disbursement of funds as requested by the Chief Adult Probation Officer, or his designee.
- 7. The Clerk of Courts shall make personnel available to review bookkeeping and financial functions related to collections and disbursement functions that were previously handled by her office to ensure a productive transition of collections to the Adult Probation Office.

In the Administrative Order dated May 28, 2021, the Court stated that it expected the Clerk of Court to cooperate fully and in good faith to ensure a successful transition of collection functions. The Clerk of Courts shall cooperate fully and in good faith with the Court, and its designees, including the Chief Adult Probation Officer, to facilitate the administration of justice and the collection of fines, fees, costs, and restitution. The Clerk of Courts is not an independent agency, rather, it exists to

maintain files for the Court of Common Pleas, and to serve the judiciary and the public. The Court may initiate contempt proceedings upon a failure to adhere to the requirements set forth in this Administrative Order.

It is further *Ordered* that the provisions of this Order are incorporated into, and shall be read in conjunction with the Administrative Orders dated January 15, 2021, May 7, 2021, and May 28, 2021.

This Order shall be processed in conformity with Pa.R.J.A. 103. The District Court Administrator is directed to do the following:

- 1. File one (1) certified copy of this Order with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts;
- 2. Distribute two (2) certified copies to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*;
- 3. Serve a copy of this Order on the judges of the Court of Common Pleas and the magisterial district courts, and the Clerk of Courts; and
- 4. Cause a copy hereof to be published in the *Washington County Bar Journal* once a week for two successive weeks at the expense of the County of Washington.







DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

General Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements

Recitals

- A. African Swine Fever is a highly contagious hemorrhagic viral disease affecting domestic and wild swine.
- B. There is no vaccine to protect swine against African Swine Fever, nor is there a known cure or treatment for this dangerous transmissible disease.
- C. African Swine Fever has a high environmental resistance and can be spread by domestic or wild swine, whether alive or dead, and through raw and processed pork products. African Swine Fever does not cause disease in humans and is not a public health threat.
- D. African Swine Fever is known to be transmissible from infected to uninfected swine through contact and via contaminated feed and fomites (non-living objects) such as shoes, clothes, vehicles, equipment and any other goods, products, facilities, specific insect vectors (soft ticks), containers and other objects with which infected swine—alive or dead—may come into contact.
- E. Section 2321 of the Domestic Animal Law (Law) establishes a list of "dangerous transmissible diseases" and provides for the designation of additional dangerous transmissible diseases through regulation or temporary order (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321).
- F. African Swine Fever (ASF) is specifically designated as a dangerous transmissible disease at section 2321(a)(3) of the Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321(a)(3)).
- G. The Domestic Animal Law (Law) (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2301—2389) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), provides the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) broad authority to regulate the keeping and handling of domestic animals to exclude, contain or eliminate dangerous transmissible diseases, such as ASF.
- H. This includes authority, set forth at section 2329 of the Law, to establish and enforce quarantine orders "Whenever a dangerous transmissible disease...exists anywhere within or outside of this Commonwealth...the department shall have the power to establish and enforce quarantines of any such infected, exposed, contaminated, suspected or susceptible domestic animal. In addition, a quarantine may apply to any goods, products, facilities, containers, vehicles or materials that may carry dangerous transmissible disease...and may be applied on or in or against any premises, area or locality..." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(a)).
- I. Section 2329(d) of the Law provides specific authority to establish and enforce a general quarantine order "...against any area or locality within this Commonwealth for any of the reasons set forth in subsection (a) to prevent a dangerous transmissible disease. . from being carried into, within, from or out of the area or locality that is subject to the quarantine. A general quarantine order may include any domestic animals, conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials that may carry dangerous transmissible disease. . and may include any area or locality, including all buildings, structures, premises and equipment located therein." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(d))

- J. ASF is found in countries around the world, particularly in sub-Saharan Africa. To date, 11 Asian countries have reported outbreaks since August 2018, including Indonesia, Mongolia, North Korea, South Korea, China, the Philippines, Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, Myanmar and Timor-Leste. China has confirmed more than 163 cases of ASF and has lost an estimated 200 million swine which amounts to thirty-three percent of all the pigs in the world. The disease is also spreading within the European Union (EU), and the virus has reached 10 member states of the EU.
- K. Although ASF has not been detected in North America, Central America or South America, it is important to note ASF is rapidly spreading and has reached South Korea and the Philippines. Currently, there are only 6,000 miles separating the continental United States from this devastating disease.
- L. Pennsylvania is ranked 12th nationally for pork production and 5th nationally for number of swine processed. ASF presents serious threats to animal health and the economic vitality of the Commonwealth's swine production industry. Introduction of ASF into the commercial swine herds of this Commonwealth would result in severe economic losses to the infected herd owners as well as loss of valuable National and International trade opportunities for all of Pennsylvania's pork producers.
- M. The PDA through this Quarantine Order establishes reasonable requirements to allow for movement of swine and products within this Commonwealth for exhibition purposes, while protecting against the introduction of ASF into this Commonwealth's commercial production swine population.

Order of Quarantine:

With the foregoing recitals incorporated into this Order of Quarantine by reference, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) under authority of the Domestic Animal Law, at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(d) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), hereby establishes a General Order of Quarantine related to the dangerous transmissible disease African Swine Fever (ASF) and the shipment and holding of swine, alive or dead, and any conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials capable of harboring ASF, within and through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The following are the conditions, restrictions and requirements of this Order:

- 1. $Quarantine\ Area.$ The area covered by this General Quarantine Order is the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- 2. Applicability and Time Period of Order. The terms, provisions and requirements of this Order are applicable to all live and dead swine, swine manure, swine offal and swine germplasm, and any conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials capable of harboring ASF located within or to be shipped through or in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (Quarantine Area), from the effective date of this Order until the time this Order is rescinded in writing by the PDA.
- 3. *Definitions*. The following terms when used in this Order have the following meanings:

Accredited veterinarian. A licensed veterinarian jointly accredited by APHIS-USDA and the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to perform official duties

on behalf of APHIS-USDA or the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to practice veterinary medicine. See accreditation standards established by 9 CFR Parts 160 and 161 (relating to definition of terms; and requirements and standards for accredited veterinarians and suspension or revocation of such accreditation).

Animal Exhibition. Any temporary spectacle, display, event, exhibition or act featuring performing animals including, but not limited to, circuses, pony rides, animal exhibits, weight pull events, and petting zoos. This definition shall exclude zoologic exhibits and Pennsylvania Game Commission menagerie permit holders.

Breeding swine. A sexually intact swine 6 months of age or older or a sexually intact swine 5 months of age or younger selected for producing offspring.

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI). An official document issued by a federal, state, tribal, or accredited veterinarian certifying that the animals identified on the document have been inspected and were found to satisfy the regulations pertaining to their intended movement—within the same state, between states, or internationally.

Direct movement to slaughter. Transported to a facility for slaughter, without stops or unloading except for feeding and watering, during which the animals are not commingled with any other animals unless all are destined for slaughter.

Market swine. A swine that is registered and entered in a PDA-sponsored market swine class, weighing at least 210 pounds and approximately 6 months old.

Pennsylvania health certificate. A legible official document, made on a form (AAI-13) provided by the Department, prepared by an accredited Pennsylvania veterinarian or a representative of the Department certifying the health of animals described therein according to the health requirements established by this chapter.

Recognized slaughter establishment. A slaughter establishment operated under the Federal Meat Inspection Act (21 U.S.C.A. §§ 601—623, 641—645, 661, 671—680 and 691) or a State inspected slaughter establishment.

Slaughter market. An animal market approved by the Department for the sale of slaughter animals in accordance with Chapter 5 (relating to animal markets) and the act of June 22, 1931 (P.L. 650, No. 225) (3 P.S. §§ 431—439), known as the Farm Animal Dealer or Broker License Law.

Swine Health Monitor. A Swine Health Monitor (SHM) is a person who is familiar with swine and can recognize when swine are sick, has met the training and standards set forth in this quarantine order, and has been appointed by a fair board or livestock show committee to assess swine health.

Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship. A veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR) is defined by the American Veterinary Medical Association as the basis for interaction among veterinarians, their clients, and their patients and is critical to the health of an animal. A VCPR means that all of the following are required:

- a. The veterinarian has assumed the responsibility for making clinical judgments regarding the health of the patient and the client has agreed to follow the veterinarians' instructions.
- b. The veterinarian has sufficient knowledge of the patient to initiate at least a general or preliminary diagnosis of the medical condition of the patient. This means that the veterinarian is personally acquainted

- with the keeping and care of the patient by virtue of a timely examination of the patient by the veterinarian, or medically appropriate and timely visits by the veterinarian to the operation where the patient is managed.
- c. The veterinarian is readily available for follow-up evaluation or has arranged for the following: veterinary emergency coverage, and continuing care and treatment.
- d. The veterinarian provides oversight of treatment, compliance, and outcome.
 - e. Patient records are maintained.
- 4. Swine health monitor requirements. A Swine Health Monitor (SHM) shall meet the following standards, demonstrate the following skills and perform the following duties.
- a. A SHM shall undergo annual web-based training provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.
- b. At the conclusion of such training, the SHM applicant shall be required to pass an examination, meaning the applicant shall obtain a score of 75% or better, and upon successful completion, will be granted a certificate of completion allowing them to seek appointment, as set forth in this Order, to perform swine health monitoring duties for one year.
- c. A SHM shall maintain a current working knowledge base, to be able to recognize animal health parameters, and identify clinical signs suggestive of foot and mouth disease (FMD), Classical Swine fever (CSF), and African Swine Fever (ASF), and other diseases that may become of consequence.
- d. As part of their duties, a SHM shall monitor and assess the health of exhibition animals prior to unloading upon arrival, and on a daily basis during the totality of the animal exhibition.
- e. Upon arrival of any swine at an animal exhibition, a SHM shall assess the health of each animal prior to the swine being allowed to unload from the conveyance.
- f. A SHM shall not permit any animal showing any form of sickness or illness or any clinical signs suggestive of ASF, CSF or FMD, or any other animal on the same conveyance, to unload from the conveyance and shall notify the Veterinarian holding the VCPR with the fair board or livestock show committee (VCPR veterinarian) for examination and final health assessment of all animals on the conveyance prior to unloading.
- g. Where the SHM finds it necessary to notify the VCPR veterinarian, no swine or animal on the conveyance shall be unloaded until the VCPR veterinarian has completed a final examination and health assessment of all animals on the conveyance and provided written documentation to the SHM that each animal if free from ASF, CSF, FMD, and any other suspected or identified disease of consequence.
- h. During the exhibition, the SHM shall daily observe all swine at the exhibition and keep daily records of those observations to be reviewed with the VCPR veterinarian.
- i. The SHM shall immediately report, and document such report in writing, providing the identification of the animal, date of report and suspicious disease signs, any clinical signs suggestive of FMD, CSF, ASF, or any other suspected or identified disease of consequence, to the VCPR veterinarian.
- j. The VCPR veterinarian shall follow up on the SHM report by examining the animal and notify the State Animal Health Official (SAHO) when appropriate. All

- such examinations shall be documented by the VCPR veterinarian in writing and provide the identification of the animal examined, the date of the examination, what disease assessment or testing was done and the final health assessment of the VCPR veterinarian.
- 5. Exhibition Requirements. Fair boards and livestock show committees shall establish a VCPR veterinarian and appoint a SHM for all animal exhibitions. No swine species shall be unloaded at an animal exhibition or exhibited in this Commonwealth unless each animal meets all the following criteria:
- a. Is accompanied by a Pennsylvania health certificate or ICVI that was issued by a licensed and accredited veterinarian not more than 14 days before the date of the animal exhibition.
- b. Shall be permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number recorded on the Pennsylvania health certificate or ICVI.
- c. Any swine that does not have an 840 RFID tag at the time of arrival at the animal exhibition, shall not be unloaded and shall be returned to the premises from which it originated.
- d. Where the swine does not have an 840 RFID tag at the time of purchase by an exhibitor, a tag may be acquired by one of the following methods:
- i. Apply for premises ID through PDA and purchase 840 RFID tags through a distributor.
- ii. Request an 840 RFID tag from an accredited veterinarian whom you hold with a veterinarian-client-patient-relationship.
- e. Has been visually inspected for signs of disease prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian, VCPR veterinarian or a SHM appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee or both, as required by Section 4. of this Order.
- f. The SHM shall immediately report, in the manner required by Section 4 of this Order, any clinical signs of disease to the VCPR veterinarian holding the veterinarian-client-patient-relationship with the fair board or livestock show committee.
- g. The VCPR veterinarian shall immediately follow up by examining the animal and notify the SAHO when appropriate and shall issue such written reports as are required in Section 4 of this Order.
- h. Any swine showing signs of illness upon arrival at the animal exhibition shall not be permitted to unload and shall be reported to the accredited veterinarian holding the veterinarian-client-patient-relationship with the show or fair board.
- 6. Exhibition Timing and Order. All breeding swine animal exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine. Breeding swine shall be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving. Breeding swine animal exhibitions, excluding birthing or educational displays which are not competing, shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours.

7. Birthing Exhibitions. Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays which are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition as long as reasonable precaution is taken to ensure separation of the birthing swine and market swine, no crosscontamination between the two separate exhibition areas and the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display.

- 8. PDA sponsored animal exhibitions. All market swine exhibited in PDA sponsored animal exhibitions, fairs and market shows, along with meeting all other requirements of this Order, shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.
- 9. Non-PDA sponsored animal exhibitions. Non-PDA Sponsored animal exhibitions and shows including jackpot shows and 4-H roundups not occurring during a PDA sponsored animal exhibition, fair or show, where arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine occur within a 72 hour window and there is no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions, while being required to meet all other requirements of this Order, shall be exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement listed in paragraph 8.
- 10. Conveyance, goods and other materials. All conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials in contact with swine being shipped within or through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for animal exhibition shall be cleaned and disinfected in accordance with the following:
- a. A conveyance used for the transportation of swine to animal exhibitions, fairs and shows shall be cleaned and disinfected by an exhibitor prior to each use and shall be free of visible accumulations of manure, bedding and other organic materials.
- b. At the conclusion of swine animal exhibitions, fairs and shows and after all swine have left the premises, the fair board or livestock show committee shall ensure all holding pens and animal exhibition areas have had all bedding and other organic material removed and all areas, including fences, gates, stalls, holding pens, containers, housing, coming in contact with or through which swine were moved shall be put through the fair board or livestock show committee's cleaning and disinfection process.
- 11. Violations/Penalties. Any person violating the requirements of this Order shall be subject to enforcement and penalties as are allowed under the provisions of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2301 et seq.), which include, revocation of license, criminal prosecution, civil penalties of up to \$10,000 per violation, injunctive relief or any combination of these penalties.
- 12. No Restriction on Further Action by PDA. This Order shall not be construed as limiting PDA's authority to establish additional quarantine or testing requirements or take any actions otherwise permitted under applicable statute or regulation.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Interstate and International Quarantine Order; Swine Exhibition Requirements

Recitals

- A. African Swine Fever (ASF) is a highly contagious hemorrhagic viral disease affecting domestic and wild swine.
- B. There is no vaccine to protect swine against African Swine Fever, nor is there a known cure or treatment for this dangerous transmissible disease.
- C. African Swine Fever has a high environmental resistance and can be spread by domestic or wild swine, whether alive or dead, and through raw and processed pork products. African Swine Fever does not cause disease in humans and is not a public health threat.
- D. African Swine Fever is known to be transmissible from infected to uninfected swine through contact and via contaminated feed and fomites (non-living objects) such as shoes, clothes, vehicles, equipment and any other goods, products, facilities, specific insect vectors (soft ticks), containers and other objects with which infected swine—alive or dead—may come into contact.
- E. Section 2321 of the Domestic Animal Law (Law) establishes a list of "dangerous transmissible diseases" and provides for the designation of additional dangerous transmissible diseases through regulation or temporary order (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321).
- F. African Swine Fever (ASF) is specifically designated as a dangerous transmissible disease at section 2321(a)(3) of the Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321(a)(3)).
- G. The Domestic Animal Law (Law) (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2301—2389) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), provides the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) broad authority to regulate the keeping and handling of domestic animals to exclude, contain or eliminate dangerous transmissible diseases, such as ASF.
- H. This includes authority, set forth at section 2329 of the Law, to establish and enforce quarantine orders "Whenever a dangerous transmissible disease...exists anywhere within or outside of this Commonwealth...the department shall have the power to establish and enforce quarantines of any such infected, exposed, contaminated, suspected or susceptible domestic animal. In addition,...a quarantine may apply to any goods, products, facilities, containers, vehicles or materials that may carry dangerous transmissible disease...and may apply on or in or against any premises, area or locality..." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(a)).
- I. Section 2329(c) of the Law provides specific authority to establish and enforce an interstate and international quarantine order, stating, "An intestate or international quarantine may be established and enforced by order of

- the department against any place or places outside this Commonwealth for any of the reasons set forth in subsection (a) or where dangerous transmissible diseases...are reported to exist. An intestate or international quarantine may prohibit the bringing of any domestic animals, conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials into this Commonwealth except in accordance with the requirements set forth in the quarantine order..." (3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(c)).
- J. ASF is found in countries around the world, particularly in sub-Saharan Africa. To date, 11 Asian countries have reported outbreaks since August 2018, including Indonesia, Mongolia, North Korea, South Korea, China, the Philippines, Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, Myanmar and Timor-Leste. China has confirmed more than 163 cases of ASF and has lost an estimated 200 million swine which amounts to thirty-three percent of all the pigs in the world. The disease is also spreading within the European Union (EU), and the virus has reached 10 member states of the EU.
- K. Although ASF has not been detected in North America, Central America or South America, it is important to note ASF is rapidly spreading and has reached South Korea and the Philippines. Currently, there are only 6,000 miles separating the continental United States from this devastating disease.
- L. Pennsylvania is ranked 12th nationally for pork production and 5th nationally for number of swine processed. ASF presents serious threats to animal health and the economic vitality of the Commonwealth's swine production industry. Introduction of ASF into the commercial swine herds of this Commonwealth would result in severe economic losses to the infected herd owners as well as loss of valuable National and International trade opportunities for all of Pennsylvania's pork producers.
- M. The PDA through this Quarantine Order establishes reasonable requirements to allow for movement of swine and products into and within this Commonwealth for exhibition purposes, while protecting against the introduction of ASF into this Commonwealth's commercial swine population.

Order of Quarantine:

With the foregoing recitals incorporated into this Order of Quarantine by reference, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) under authority of the Domestic Animal Law, at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2329(c) and section 1702 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 442), hereby establishes an Interstate and International Order of Quarantine related to the dangerous transmissible disease African Swine Fever (ASF) and the importation or shipment of swine, alive or dead, and any conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials capable of harboring ASF, into and through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The following are the conditions, restrictions and requirements of this Order:

- 1. Quarantine Area. This Interstate and International Quarantine Order is applicable to all states and territories of the United States and foreign countries and territories and the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- 2. Applicability and Time Period of Order. The terms, provisions and requirements of this Order are applicable to all live and dead swine, swine manure, swine offal and swine germplasm, and any conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials capable of harboring ASF to be shipped through, in or into the Commonwealth of

Pennsylvania, from the effective date of this Order until the time this Order is rescinded in writing by the PDA.

3. *Definitions*. The following terms when used in this Order have the following meanings:

Accredited veterinarian. A licensed veterinarian jointly accredited by APHIS-USDA and the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to perform official duties on behalf of APHIS-USDA or the Department in the state the veterinarian is licensed to practice veterinary medicine. See accreditation standards established by 9 CFR Parts 160 and 161 (relating to definition of terms; and requirements and standards for accredited veterinarians and suspension or revocation of such accreditation).

Animal Exhibition. Any temporary spectacle, display, event, exhibition or act featuring performing animals including, but not limited to, circuses, pony rides, animal exhibits, weight pull events, and petting zoos. This definition shall exclude zoologic exhibits and Pennsylvania Game Commission menagerie permit holders.

Breeding swine. A sexually intact swine 6 months of age or older or a sexually intact swine 5 months of age or younger selected for producing offspring.

Direct movement to slaughter. Transported to a facility for slaughter, without stops or unloading except for feeding and watering, during which the animals are not commingled with any other animals unless all are destined for slaughter.

Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI). An official document issued by a federal, state, tribal, or accredited veterinarian certifying that the animals identified on the document have been inspected and were found to satisfy the regulations pertaining to their intended movement—within the same state, between states, or internationally.

Market swine. A swine that is registered and entered in a PDA-sponsored market swine class, weighing at least 210 pounds and approximately 6 months old.

Recognized slaughter establishment. A slaughter establishment operated under the Federal Meat Inspection Act (21 U.S.C.A. §§ 601—623, 641—645, 661, 671—680 and 691) or a State inspected slaughter establishment.

Slaughter market. An animal market approved by the Department for the sale of slaughter animals in accordance with Chapter 5 (relating to animal markets) and the act of June 22, 1931 (P.L. 650, No. 225) (3 P.S. §§ 431—439), known as the Farm Animal Dealer or Broker License Law.

Swine Health Monitor. A Swine Health Monitor (SHM) is a person who is familiar with swine and can recognize when swine are sick, has met the training and standards set forth in this quarantine order, and has been appointed by a fair board or livestock show committee to assess swine health.

Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship. A veterinarian-client-patient-relationship (VCPR) is defined by the American Veterinary Medical Association as the basis for interaction among veterinarians, their clients, and their patients and is critical to the health of an animal. A VCPR means that all of the following are required:

- a. The veterinarian has assumed the responsibility for making clinical judgments regarding the health of the patient and the client has agreed to follow the veterinarians' instructions.
- b. The veterinarian has sufficient knowledge of the patient to initiate at least a general or preliminary

diagnosis of the medical condition of the patient. This means that the veterinarian is personally acquainted with the keeping and care of the patient by virtue of a timely examination of the patient by the veterinarian, or medically appropriate and timely visits by the veterinarian to the operation where the patient is managed.

- c. The veterinarian is readily available for follow-up evaluation or has arranged for the following: veterinary emergency coverage, and continuing care and treatment.
- d. The veterinarian provides oversight of treatment, compliance, and outcome.
 - e. Patient records are maintained.

- d. Has been visually inspected for signs of disease prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian, VCPR veterinarian or a SHM appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee or both, as required by Section 4. of this Order.
- e. The SHM shall immediately report, in the manner required by Section 4 of this Order, any clinical signs of disease to the VCPR veterinarian holding the veterinarian-client-patient-relationship with the fair board or livestock show committee.
- f. The VCPR veterinarian shall immediately follow up by examining the animal and notify the SAHO when appropriate and shall issue such written reports as are required in Section 4 of this Order.
- g. Any swine showing signs of illness upon arrival at the animal exhibition shall not be permitted to unload and shall be reported to the VCPR accredited veterinarian holding the veterinarian-client-patient-relationship with the show or fair board.
- 6. Exhibition Timing and Order. All breeding swine animal exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine. Breeding swine shall be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving. Breeding swine animal exhibitions, excluding birthing or educational displays which are not competing, shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours.
- 7. Birthing Exhibitions. - 10. All swine imported into the Commonwealth for animal exhibition shall meet interstate health requirements established at section 3.131 of PDA's regulations (7 Pa. Code § 3.131).
- 11. Conveyance, goods and other materials. All conveyances, containers, goods, products or materials in contact with swine being shipped within or through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for animal exhibition shall be cleaned and disinfected in accordance with the following:
- a. A conveyance used for the transportation of swine to animal exhibitions, fairs and shows shall be cleaned and disinfected by an exhibitor prior to each use and shall be free of visible accumulations of manure, bedding and other organic materials.
- b. At the conclusion of swine animal exhibitions, fairs and shows and after all swine have left the premises, the fair board or livestock show committee shall ensure all holding pens and animal exhibition areas have had all bedding and other organic material removed and all areas, including fences, gates, stalls, holding pens, containers, housing, coming in contact with or through which swine were moved shall be put through the fair board or livestock show committee's cleaning and disinfection process.
- 12. Violations/Penalties. Box 68, Watsontown, PA 17777) for the modification of Source ID P301, a 5.5 TPH, 31 MMBtu/hr, natural gas-fired molded brick kiln (Kiln # 3), said modification consisting of a 9 TPY increase in SO_x emissions and a 0.43 TPY increase in $PM/PM_{10}/PM_{2.5}$ emissions. This modification is the result of the production of up to 5,400 TPY of molded buff bricks containing up to 60% by weight clay and the balance consisting of shale. The air contaminant emissions from Kiln # 3 are controlled by a dry sorbent injection system (ID C301A) and two fabric collectors (ID C301B and ID C301C), in parallel. This kiln is located at the Watsontown Plant located in Delaware Township, **Northumberland County**.

The Department of Environmental Protection's (Department's) review of the information submitted by the company indicates that the air contamination source will comply with all regulatory requirements, including monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements, and pertaining to air contamination source and the emission of air contaminants including 25 Pa. Code Chapter 123, the best available technology requirement (BAT) of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12 and 40 CFR 64, Compliance Assurance Monitoring. Based on this finding, the Department proposes to issue a plan approval for the proposed modification.

The emissions from Kiln # 3 will not exceed the following limits:

Particulate Matter (PM): 1.15 lbs/hr, 3.40 tons in any 12 CMP and 0.005 gr/dscf;

VOCs: 0.14 lbs/hr & 0.61 ton in any 12 CMP;

Hydrogen Fluoride (HF): 0.46 lbs/hr & 2.03 tons in any 12 CMP;

Hydrogen Chloride (HCl): 0.09 lbs/hr & 0.37 ton in any 12 CMP;

Total HAPs: 0.57 lbs/hr & 2.62 tons in any 12 CMP;

SO_x: 11.59 lbs/hr & 16.10 tons in any 12 CMP;

NO_v: 3.26 lbs/hr & 14.3 tons in any 12 CMP;

CO: 6.71 lbs/hr & 29.4 tons in any 12 CMP.

In addition to the emission limitations, the following is a brief description of the conditions the Department intends to place in the plan approval in order to ensure compliance with all applicable air quality regulatory requirements:

- 1. The only clay/shale that may be processed by Source ID P301 shall be (a) mixtures of clay and Watsontown shale with a clay content not to exceed 60% by weight; or (b) 100% Watsontown shale. Additionally, the permittee shall not process more than 3 tons per hour and 5,400 tons per year of the clay/shale mixture identified previously in (a).
- 2. Within a 180 days from the date of buff brick firing in Source ID P301, the permittee shall source test P301 for hydrogen fluoride (HF), hydrogen chloride (HCl) and sulfur oxides (SO_x). In addition, the permittee shall conduct particulate matter, nitrogen oxides and carbon monoxide stack testing at the outlet of the dry lime injection system's fabric collector to determine the mass emission rate (pounds per hour) of the respective air contaminants. The testing shall be performed while the kiln is firing 60% clay buff bricks at the maximum production rate of 3 tons per hour. The permittee shall follow the testing requirements specified in Section C, Site Level Requirements, of this plan approval for this testing. This emissions testing shall also include the initial performance evaluation of the required bag leak detection systems for fabric collectors C301B and C301C in order to satisfy the requirements of 40 CFR 64.4(e).
- 3. Control device IDs C301B and C301C shall be equipped with bag leak detection systems by the time source testing is conducted on Source ID P301.
- 4. (a) The permittee shall adhere to a range of 1"-5" of water column for pressure drop across ID C301B and C301C so that operation within that range shall provide a reasonable assurance of compliance. A departure from the specified range at any time shall be defined as an excursion. The permittee shall continue to comply with this condition until such time as the bag leak detection systems are installed, calibrated and put into operation. Thereafter, the data collected from the bag leak detection systems during the initial performance test shall be used to provide a reasonable assurance of compliance. (b) The permittee shall adhere to a range of 0%—5% opacity from the exhaust of ID C301B and C301C so that operation within that range shall provide a reasonable assurance of compliance. A departure from the specified range at any time shall be defined as an excursion. (c) The permittee shall adhere to having a chemical feed rate of no less than 50 pounds (40 pounds hydrated lime and 10 pounds sodium bicarbonate) per hour to ID C301A when processing 100% Watsontown shale, and no less than 72 pounds per hour of sodium bicarbonate to ID C301A when processing a mixture of 60% clay (maximum) and the balance being Watsontown shale, so that operation at that rate shall provide a reasonable assurance of compliance. A departure from the specified range at any time shall be defined as an excursion. (d) The permittee shall utilize approved QA/QC practices that are adequate to ensure continuing validity of data and proper performance of the pressure drop gauge installed on ID C301B and C301C. Once the bag leak detection systems have been installed, calibrated and put into operation, the permittee shall

utilize approved QA/QC practices that are adequate to ensure continuing validity of data and proper performance of the bag leak detection systems installed on ID C301B and C301C. (e) The permittee shall calibrate and check the accuracy of the pressure drop gauge taking into account manufacturer's specifications at least annually. Once the bag leak detection systems have been installed, calibrated and put into operation, the permittee shall calibrate and check the accuracy of the bag leak detection systems taking into account manufacturer's specifications at least annually. (f) The permittee shall maintain all monitoring equipment and stock parts necessary for routine repairs onsite. (g) The permittee shall ensure at least 90% of the monitoring data has been properly and accurately collected.

- 5. The injection rate for the ENCERTEC, Inc. model C-5138-DIFF-07 sorbent (ID C301A) shall be at least 40 pounds per hour of hydrated lime and 10 pounds per hour of sodium bicarbonate, when processing 100% Watsontown shale and at least 72 pounds per hour of sodium bicarbonate, when processing a mixture of 60% clay (maximum) and the balance being Watsontown shale.
- 6. With respect to the bag leak detection systems required for fabric collector C301B and C301C, the permittee shall submit a monitoring plan to the Department's Northcentral Regional Office at least 90 days prior to the scheduled source testing of Source ID P301 required by this plan approval. This monitoring plan shall identify how the bag leak detection systems will comply with the provisions of Condition # 007 of this plan approval for Source ID P301. Additionally, the monitoring plan shall also include the manufacturer's recommended procedures and specifications and good engineering practices for installing, testing and operating the bag leak detection systems.

The facility is a major (Title V) facility. The Department of Environmental Protection ("Department"), under the authority of the Pennsylvania Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act ("HSCA"), 35 P.S. § 6020.1113, has entered a Consent Order and Agreement ("CO&A") with 601 Perkasie Owner, LLC ("601 Perkasie") to resolve this party's liability for the Department's response costs incurred to abate the release of hazardous substances at the property located at 7th and Spruce Streets in Perkasie, PA ("the Site"), which is located within the larger Perkasie TCE HSCA Site. 601 Perkasie is a new company which was created by the present owner, 601 Spruce St Investment Partners, LLC for the purpose of financing the redevelopment of the Site. On or about June 21, 2021, 601 Perkasie purchased the Site from the present owner.

The larger Perkasie TCE HSCA Site is an area of commercial and residential properties which have been impacted by groundwater contamination from multiple sources including the Site. From 1946 until approximately 2008, the Site was used by another party which used hazardous substances including trichlorethylene ("TCE") as a degreasing solvent for onsite operations. In 2013, the Department investigated the Site and found TCE and its breakdown products in groundwater on and in the vicinity of the Site.

The Department has determined that hazardous substances within the meaning of Section 103 of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act, 35 P.S. § 6020.103, were released and threatened to be released on the Site. Pursuant to Section 501(a) of HSCA, 35 P.S. § 6020.501(a), the Department has incurred response costs associated with its investigation and other response actions at the Site. As an owner of the Site where hazardous substances were released and threatened to be released, 601 Perkasie is a responsible party which, pursuant to Section 701 of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act, ("HSCA") 35 P.S. § 6020.70, is potentially liable for the Department's response costs.

The Department and 601 Perkasie have signed a CO&A to resolve this company's proportionate liability in the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for response costs incurred at the Site. In consideration for this payment, 601 Perkasie will receive contribution protection as well as a Covenant Not to Sue regarding hazardous substances released and threatened to be released at the Site.

This notice is provided under Section 1113 of HSCA, 35 P.S. § 6020.1113, which states that, "settlement shall become final upon the filing of the Department's response to significant written comments". The CO&A is available for public review and comment. A public comment period on the CO&A will extend for 60 days from today's date. LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995 PREAMBLE 2

The following plans and reports were submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Provisions of Sections 301—308 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) (35 P.S. §§ 6026.301—6026.308) require the Department to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a notice of submission of plans and reports. A final report is submitted to document cleanup of a release of a regulated substance at a site to one of the act's remediation standards. Submission of plans and reports, other than the final report, will also be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. These include the remedial investigation report, risk assessment report and cleanup plan for a site-specific standard remediation. A remedial investigation report includes conclusions from the site investigation; concentration of regulated substances in environmental media; benefits of reuse of the property; and, in some circumstances, a fate and transport analysis. If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements.

Final TGD: Minor Revision

DEP ID: 563-2112-656. Title: Liners—Impoundments, Stockpiles, and Coal Refuse Disposal Areas. Description: This minor revision will change the name of this policy from Liners—Impoundments, Stockpiles, and Coal Refuse Disposal Areas, to Liners and Caps for Coal Refuse Disposal Areas.

This guidance document is used in the design of groundwater and surface water protection systems for coal refuse disposal areas and coal processing areas to prevent groundwater contamination. The TGD applies to impoundments and storage areas at coal refuse disposal or coal processing sites, or both, used for the storage or treatment of mine drainage, runoff contaminated by metals or sulfate, leachate from coal refuse disposal areas and water from coal processing operations.

Coal refuse disposal areas are regulated under 25 Pa. Code Chapters 88 and 90 (relating to anthracite coal; and coal refuse disposal), which is currently undergoing a proposed rulemaking in response to statutory changes. Concurrently, the Department will revise this TGD to incorporate caps used at coal refuse disposal sites in the future. A title change is part of that revision. Because the title of this document appears in the existing 25 Pa. On March 13, 2020, the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) was declared a Nationwide emergency under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 5121—5207) retroactive to March 1, 2020. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, providers are dispensing a higher than normal amount of personal protective equipment. The Department is increasing the fee for disposable gloves.

Effective with dates of services on and after July 1, 2021, the Department increased the fee for disposable gloves provided to MA beneficiaries as follows:

Nursing Facility Assessment Program for Fiscal Year 2021-2022

This notice announces the proposed assessment amount, the proposed assessment methodology and the estimated aggregate impact on nursing facilities that will be subject to the assessment under the Nursing Facility Assessment Program (Assessment Program) beginning in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022.

Background

Article VIII-A of the Human Services Code (code) (62 P.S. §§ 801-A—815-A) authorizes the Department of Human Services (Department) to impose an annual monetary assessment on nonpublic and county nursing facilities in this Commonwealth each fiscal year until June 30, 2022. See 62 P.S. §§ 803-A and 815-A.

Under Article VIII-A of the code, the Department may impose the assessment only to the extent that the assessment revenues qualify as the State share of Medical Assistance (MA) Program expenditures eligible for Federal financial participation (FFP). To ensure receipt of FFP, Article VIII-A of the code requires the Department

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to seek a waiver from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), if necessary, to implement the Assessment Program. See 62 P.S. § 812-A. For FY 2021-2022, the Department will submit a waiver request to CMS to implement changes to the Assessment Program as described in this notice. The implementation of these changes is contingent on CMS's approval of the waiver request.

For each fiscal year that the Assessment Program is implemented, the Secretary of the Department (Secretary) determines the aggregate amount of the assessment and the annual assessment rates in consultation with the Secretary of the Budget. See 62 P.S. § 804-A. The annual assessment rates must be sufficient to generate at least \$50 million in additional revenue, but not more than the maximum aggregate assessment amount that qualifies for FFP. See 62 P.S. § 804-A.

Before imposing an annual assessment for a fiscal year, the Secretary must publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The notice must specify the amount of the assessment being proposed, explain the proposed assessment methodology, identify the estimated assessment amount and aggregate impact on nursing facilities subject to the assessment and provide interested persons a 30-day period to comment. See 62 P.S. § 805-A.

This notice announces the assessment amounts, rates and methodology that the Department is proposing to implement in FY 2021-2022 and the estimated aggregate impact on nursing facilities that will be subject to the assessment in FY 2021-2022.

Proposed Assessment Methodology and Rates

During FY 2021-2022, the Department is proposing to modify the assessment methodology by now including in the lower rate tier nursing facilities with at least 115,000 MA days and with an overall occupancy rate of 90% or higher based on FY 2019-2020 resident days data. No other changes to the current assessment methodology have been made. For FY 2021-2022 the Department is also proposing a uniform \$0.95 increase to the FY 2020-2021 assessment rates for both tiers. The Department is proposing to calculate the annual assessment amount for each nonexempt nursing facility by multiplying its assessment rate by the facility's historical non-Medicare resident days for FY 2019-2020. The Department intends to continue its policy of annually updating the basis of the assessment to the most current year for which complete data is available. The Department will continue to collect the annual assessment amount in four equal quarterly installments. With these modifications, the Assessment Program will be implemented as follows:

For FY 2021-2022, the assessment will be imposed on all licensed nursing facilities in this Commonwealth except the following nursing facilities, which will be exempt from the Assessment Program:

- (1) State-owned and operated nursing facilities.
- (2) Veteran's Administration nursing facilities.
- (3) Nursing facilities that provide nursing facility services free of charge to all residents.
- (4) Newly licensed nursing facilities that have not been licensed and operated by the current or previous owner until the nursing facility's days are included in the data used as the basis of the assessment. A nursing facility that changes ownership is not considered a newly licensed nursing facility for assessment purposes.

For FY 2021-2022, the Department is proposing to continue to assess nonexempt nursing facilities at two

rates. The Department is proposing to assess a rate of \$5.56 to the following five categories of nursing facilities:

- · County nursing facilities.
- Nursing facilities that have 44 or fewer licensed beds.
- Certain continuing care retirement community (CCRC) nursing facilities (see 40 Pa.B. 7297 (December 18, 2010)).
- Nursing facilities with an MA occupancy rate of at least 94% based on FY 2019-2020 resident days as of March 17, 2021. For the purpose of qualifying for the lower assessment rate, a nursing facility's MA occupancy rate will be calculated as follows: MA Occupancy Rate = Sum of Total PA MA Days from the FY 2019-2020 resident days data ÷ Sum of Total Resident Days from the FY 2019-2020 resident days data, rounded to two decimals
- Nursing facilities with at least 115,000 MA days and with an overall occupancy rate of 90% or higher based on the FY 2019-2020 resident days as of March 17, 2021. For the purpose of qualifying for the lower assessment rate, a nursing facility's overall occupancy rate will be calculated as follows: Overall Occupancy Rate = Sum of Total Resident Days from FY 2019-2020 resident days as of March 17, 2021 ÷ (number of licensed beds as of March 23, 2021 × 365), rounded to two decimals.

For all other nonexempt facilities, including nursing facilities that began participation in a CCRC on or after July 1, 2010, the Department is proposing to assess these facilities at a rate of \$29.65.

Aggregate Assessment Amounts and Fiscal Impact

The Department estimates that if the proposed assessment rates are implemented the annual aggregate assessment fees for nonexempt nursing facilities will total \$436.313 million. The Department will use the State revenue derived from the assessment fees and any associated FFP to support payments to qualified MA nursing facility providers in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

Supplemental Payments to Qualifying Hospitals

The Department of Human Services (Department) is announcing its intent to discontinue the Medical Assistance (MA) stability payments beginning with Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022. In addition, the Department intends to revise the payment reconciliation process to account for the discontinuation of these payments.

Background

The Department imposes a monetary assessment on the net inpatient revenue and net outpatient revenue of licensed hospitals in this Commonwealth, other than exempt hospitals under Article VIII-G of the Human Services Code (code) (62 P.S. §§ 801-G—816-G). The funds generated by the hospital assessment are used to make MA payments to hospitals and managed care organizations for inpatient and outpatient services, described in section 805-G(a)(1) and (2) of the code (62 P.S. § 805-G(a)(1) and (2)), as well as other purposes as approved by the Secretary for inpatient hospital, outpatient hospital and hospital-related services. The Department has used a portion of these funds for fee-for-service (FFS) MA Stability Payments annually beginning in FY 2010-2011 and continuing through FY 2020-2021. This payment is in the approved State Plan.

Discontinuation of MA Stability Payments

Previously, the Commonwealth's budget included appropriated funds for the MA Stability payments. The Commonwealth's budget for FY 2021-2022 does not include appropriated funding for the MA Stability payments. For this reason, the Department intends to submit a State Plan Amendment to provide for the discontinuation of MA Stability Payments for all hospitals, including what is referred to in the State Plan as new hospitals (new hospitals), beginning with FY 2021-2022. The Department is not otherwise changing its approved State Plan provisions addressing the qualifying criteria or payment methodology for other payments to new hospitals.

Payment Reconciliation

The Department also intends to amend the State Plan to modify the payment reconciliation process used to determine the available funding for certain MA payments funded with assessment revenues. Specifically, effective with the reconciliation of payments for FY 2021-2022 and continuing for subsequent years the Department is proposing to:

- a) Specify the periods for which the MA Stability Payment is subject to reconciliation; and,
- b) Change the amount of available funding for payments to be reconciled to \$201.847 million (and of this amount, specify that the portion attributable to the inpatient disproportionate share payments and direct medical education payments is \$40.959 million).

The Department is not otherwise changing its approved State Plan provisions addressing the payment reconciliation process.

Fiscal Impact

Effective FY 2021-2022, and subject to approval by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Service, the Department will no longer fund \$150.335 million in total funds for this supplemental payment. The Department has increased the available funding for outpatient hospital services made available through the Physical Health HealthChoices managed care program by \$150.000 million in total funds effective January 1, 2021.

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 11. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of \$3,000,000 Payout, prize money from winning \$3,000,000 Payout instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the \$3,000,000 Payout instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.
- 12. Governing law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.
- 13. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote \$3,000,000 Payout or through normal communications methods.

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 11. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Bonus Buck\$, prize money from winning Bonus Buck\$ instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Bonus Buck\$ instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.
- 12. Governing law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

13. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Bonus Buck\$ or through normal communications methods.

A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 11. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Hot Ticket, prize money from winning Hot Ticket instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Hot Ticket instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.
- 12. Governing law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.
- 13. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets

from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Hot Ticket or through normal communications methods.

Election for the Office of Judge of the Philadelphia Municipal Court

On June 9, 2021, the Acting Secretary of the Commonwealth (Acting Secretary) received written notice that Judge Gerard A. Kosinski has revoked his declaration of candidacy for retention as a judge of the Philadelphia Municipal Court. Under the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth, an election for the judicial office held by Judge Kosinski will occur as part of the municipal election to be held November 2, 2021.

In the Municipal Election, the electors of Philadelphia County will elect four judges of the Philadelphia Municipal Court. Each elector will be entitled to vote for up to four candidates, with the four candidates receiving the largest number of valid votes being elected.

In the Municipal Primary held May 18, 2021, the electors of the Democratic Party and the Republican Party each nominated three candidates for the office of judge of the Philadelphia Municipal Court. By law, each of the certified Statewide political parties of the Commonwealth-the Democratic Party, the Republican Party, the Libertarian Party and the Green Party—will be permitted to nominate one additional candidate for the Philadelphia Municipal Court by submitting to the Acting Secretary, no later than September 13, 2021, a nomination certificate in the form prescribed by law and prepared in accordance with the applicable rules of the political party. See 25 P.S. §§ 2938.3, 2953 and 2954. Political bodies will be permitted to nominate a candidate by filing with the Acting Secretary, no later than September 13, 2021, nomination papers prepared and submitted in accordance with the requirements of the Pennsylvania Election Code (25 P.S. §§ 2600—3591).

STATE TAX EQUALIZATION BOARD

2020 Common Level Ratio

The State Tax Equalization Board (Board) has established a Common Level Ratio (CLR) for each county in this Commonwealth for the calendar year 2020. The Board is governed by sections 1500—1521 of the Community and Economic Development Enhancement Act (act) (71 P.S. §§ 1709.1500—1709.1521).

The act requires the Board to use statistically acceptable techniques, to make the methodology for computing ratios public and to certify, prior to July 1, the ratio to the Chief Assessor of each county annually.

The statistically acceptable technique which the Board used for the 2020 CLR is to determine the arithmetic median of the individual sales ratios for every valid sale received from the county for the calendar year 2020.

The methodology used is to include every valid sale as verified by the county assessor. The Board has defined high and low limits by computing outliers based on an interquartile range (IQR-factor of 3) to establish an upper and lower boundary. This outlier trimming is based on standards recommended by the International Association of Assessing Officers. After the boundary limits are defined, the Board has utilized the remaining valid sales, rejecting those sales which exceed the limits. The resulting arithmetic median ratio is the ratio which the Board is certifying as the CLR for each county for 2020.
