# READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

#### Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

# Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

#### Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

#### Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

#### **How to Find Rules and Regulations**

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde\_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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#### **Printing Format**

Rules, Regulations and Statements of Policy in Titles 1—107 of the Pennsylvania Code

Text proposed to be added is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Text proposed to be deleted is enclosed in brackets [ ] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [ ] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

#### **Fiscal Notes**

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

And Now, this 19th day of August, 2022, upon the recommendation of the Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania; which followed the proposal to amend Pa.R.D.E. 205 and 402 having been published for comment in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, 51 Pa.B. 5359 (August 28, 2021):

It Is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that Rules 205 and 402 of the Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement is amended in the attached form.

This *Order* shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. No. 103(b), and shall be effective in 30 days.

TITLE 204. JUDICIAL SYSTEM GENERAL PROVISIONS

PART V. PROFESSIONAL ETHICS AND CONDUCT Subpart B. DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

CHAPTER 83. PENNSYLVANIA RULES OF DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

Subchapter B. MISCONDUCT

Rule 205. The Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

(c) The Board shall have the power and duty:

(17) To authorize the use of electronic means to conduct prehearing conferences and post-hearing proceedings before a hearing committee, special master or the Board, but all adjudicatory proceedings shall be conducted in person unless warranted by extraordinary circumstances. Witness testimony may be presented via ACT upon motion for cause shown. All proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with Board Rules, Enforcement Rules and the decisional law of the Court and the Board.

 $\begin{bmatrix} 17 \end{bmatrix}$   $\underbrace{(18)}$  To exercise the powers and perform the duties vested in and imposed upon the Board by law.

Subchapter D. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS Rule 402. Access to Disciplinary Information and Confidentiality.

\* \* \* \* \*

- (j)(1) This rule does not permit broadcasting, televising, recording or taking photographs during a proceeding under these rules, except that a hearing committee, a special master, the Board or the Supreme Court when conducting a proceeding may authorize the use of electronic or photographic means for the presentation of evidence, for the perpetuation of a record or for other purposes of judicial administration.
- (2) Public access to a public proceeding before a hearing committee, special master or the Board shall consist of or be supplemented by livestream technology, which access shall cease upon the conclusion of the proceeding. The official record of the proceeding shall be the record generated by the court reporter, as applicable.
- (3) A request for in-person access to a public proceeding other than by the parties, their attorneys and reasonably necessary staff shall be made to the Board at least 30 days in advance of the scheduled proceeding.

# TITLE 210. APPELLATE PROCEDURE PART I. RULES OF APPELLATE PROCEDURE ARTICLE I. PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS CHAPTER 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS IN GENERAL

#### Rule 102. Definitions.

Subject to additional definitions contained in subsequent provisions of these rules which are applicable to specific provisions of these rules, the following words and phrases when used in these rules shall have, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the meanings given to them in this rule:

Counsel of [record.—] Record. All attorneys who were counsel of record in the trial court at the time of the filing of the notice of appeal will be counsel of record in the appellate courts. For a criminal defendant, the representation extends up to and including the filing of a petition for allowance of appeal and the handling of such an appeal if granted, unless [(1) substitute counsel has entered an appearance and is expressly identified in the praecipe as substitute, rather than additional, counsel; (2)] the Court of Common Pleas has entered on the docket an order permitting the attorney to withdraw[; or (3) an application for withdrawal is granted by the appellate court] or counsel is permitted to withdraw pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 120.

#### DOCUMENTS GENERALLY

Rule 120. Entry and Withdrawal of Appearance.

Any counsel filing papers required or permitted to be filed in an appellate court must enter an appearance with the prothonotary of the appellate court unless that counsel has been previously noted on the docket as counsel pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 907(b), 1112(f), 1311(d), 1514(d), or 1602(d). New counsel appearing for a party after docketing pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 907(b), 1112(f), 1311(d), 1514(d), or 1602(d) shall file an entry of appearance simultaneously with or prior to the filing of any papers signed by new counsel. The entry of appearance shall specifically designate each party the attorney represents, and whether the attorney is entering an appearance as substitute or additional counsel. The attorney shall file a certificate of service pursuant to paragraph (d) of Pa.R.A.P. 121 and to Pa.R.A.P. 122. If an attorney enters an appearance as substitute counsel for a party, the original counsel of record for that party may withdraw by praecipe, without filing an application for permission to withdraw.

Official Note: For admission pro hac vice, see Pa.B.A.R. 301.]

(*Editor's Note*: The following text is proposed to be added and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

- (a) Entry of Appearance.
- (1) Requirement. Counsel's appearance shall be entered prior to or with the filing of any documents in the appellate court.
- (2) *Procedure*. Unless counsel has been noted as counsel of record pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 907(b), 1112(f), 1311(d), 1514(d), or 1602(d), counsel shall file an entry of appearance by *praecipe*:
- (i) designating the party or interest counsel represents; and
- (ii) indicating whether counsel is new counsel, additional counsel, or substitute counsel.
- (b) Withdrawal of Appearance—General Rule. Except as provided by subdivision (e), and subject to the additional requirements of subdivisions (c) and (d), counsel may withdraw from representation on appeal only with permission of court through an application for relief filed in the appellate court.
- (c) Criminal Matters—Direct Appeals. Counsel seeking permission of court to withdraw from representation of an appellant in a direct appeal of a criminal matter on the basis that all issues that could be raised on appeal are frivolous shall:
- (1) file a brief prepared pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 2111; and
- (2) serve a copy of the application and brief on the appellant, accompanied by a notice informing the appellant that, within 60 days of service of the application and brief, the appellant has the right to:
  - (i) retain private counsel for representation; or
- (ii) self-representation and to respond to the issues raised in the application or brief, or to bring any additional issues to the court's attention.
- (3) Within 14 days after service of the appellant's response, the Commonwealth or appellant's counsel may file a reply to the appellant's response.
- (d) Post Conviction Relief Act Appeals. Counsel seeking permission of court to withdraw from representation of an appellant in a Post Conviction Relief Act appeal on the basis that all issues sought to be raised by the appellant on appeal are without merit shall:
- (1) file a letter detailing the nature and extent of counsel's review, listing each issue the appellant seeks to raise, and counsel's explanation of why the issues have no merit; and
- (2) serve a copy of the application and letter on the appellant, accompanied by a notice informing the appellant that, within 60 days of service of the application and letter, the appellant has the right to:
  - (i) retain private counsel for representation; or
- (ii) self-representation and to respond to the issues raised in the application or brief, or to bring any additional issues to the court's attention.

- (3) Within 14 days after service of the appellant's response, the Commonwealth or appellant's counsel may file a reply to the appellant's response.
- (e) Withdrawal of Appearance—Exception. Counsel may withdraw by filing a praecipe in the appellate court in the following circumstances:
- (1) In civil matters where the party is not entitled by law to be represented by counsel on appeal and the *praecipe* is filed within 30 days of the notation of counsel on the docket pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 907(b), 1112(f), 1311(d), 1514(d), or 1602(d).
- (2) Substitute counsel has entered an appearance or other counsel remains to represent a party or interest, and substitute counsel or remaining counsel assumes representation for all relevant appellate purposes.
- (f) Additional Service. In addition to any requirements set forth in Pa.R.A.P. 121(c)(1)—(4), counsel seeking to withdraw shall serve the client with any application, praecipe, brief, or letter filed pursuant to this rule.

#### Comment:

For admission pro hac vice, see Pa.B.A.R. 301.

The requirement of an entry of appearance pursuant to subdivision (a) includes counsel for *amicus curiae*. The entry of appearance for such counsel should indicate the interest, *i.e.*, name of *amicus curiae*, represented by counsel. For additional rules pertaining to *amicus curiae*, see Pa.R.A.P. 531.

Subdivision (c) addresses withdrawal in criminal cases where there is a right to counsel, and where there is governing decisional authority concerning the procedures for seeking withdrawal. For the substance of the brief filed pursuant to subdivision (c)(1) in criminal cases, see Anders v. California, 386 U.S. 738 (1967); Commonwealth v. Santiago, 978 A.2d 349 (Pa. 2009). Briefs required by subdivision (c)(1) should comply with the content requirements of Pa.R.A.P. 2111 notwithstanding that such briefs are not advocating on behalf of an appellant. For the substance of the letter filed pursuant to subdivision (d)(1) in post conviction relief cases, see Commonwealth v. Turner, 544 A.2d 927 (Pa. 1988); Commonwealth v. Finley, 550 A.2d 213 (Pa. Super. 1988).

For an appellant seeking to respond to counsel's letter in subdivisions (c)(2) and (d)(2), see Pa.R.A.P. 121(g) (Hybrid Representation).

In cases not subject to subdivisions (c) or (d), where a party is entitled by law to be represented by counsel on appeal (whether by decisional law, rule, or otherwise), the developing case law should be consulted to determine if a procedure or other guidance exists governing or limiting withdrawal.

New or substitute counsel is subject to all existing deadlines. Counsel seeking to withdraw in any case has a responsibility to continue to meet all deadlines and to comply with all applicable law, rules, and orders of the trial and appellate court until the appellate court has granted the application to withdraw.

An entry of appearance immediately prior to oral argument may result in recusal or postponement if a conflict exists.

#### ARTICLE II. APPELLATE PROCEDURE CHAPTER 9. APPEALS FROM LOWER COURTS Rule 907. Docketing of Appeal.

\* \* \* \* \*

- (b) [Entry of appearance] Notation of Counsel.— Upon the docketing of the appeal, the prothonotary of the appellate court shall note on the [record] docket:
- (1) as counsel for the appellant, the name of counsel, if any, set forth in or endorsed upon the notice of appeal;
  - (2) counsel of record; and
  - (3) any counsel named in the proof of service.

[The prothonotary of the appellate court shall upon praecipe of counsel filed within 30 days after the docketing of the notice of appeal correct the record of appearances. Also within 30 days after the docketing of the notice of appeal, counsel for a party may strike off his or her appearance by praecipe, unless that party is entitled by law to be represented by counsel on appeal. Thereafter, and at any time if a party is entitled by law to be represented by counsel on appeal, a counsel's appearance for a party may not be withdrawn without leave of court, unless another lawyer has entered or simultaneously enters an appearance for the party.

#### Official Note ] Comment:

Paragraph (a).—The transmission of a photocopy of the notice of appeal, showing a stamped notation of filing and the appellate docket number assignment, without a letter of transmittal or other formalities, will constitute full compliance with the notice requirement of paragraph (a) of this rule.

[ A party may be entitled to the representation by counsel on appeal by constitution, statute, rule, and case law. For example, the Rules of Criminal Procedure require counsel appointed by the trial court to continue representation through direct appeal. Pa.R.Crim.P. 120(A)(4) and Pa.R.Crim.P. 122(B)(2). Similarly, the Rules of Criminal Procedure require counsel appointed in post-conviction proceedings to continue representation throughout the proceedings, including any appeal from the disposition of the petition for post-conviction collateral relief. If a party is entitled to representation on appeal, the appellate court will presume that counsel who represented the party in the trial court will also represent the party on appeal, and counsel will be entered on the appellate court docket. In order to withdraw in such cases, either (1) new counsel must enter an appearance in the appellate court prior to or at the time of withdrawal; (2) counsel must provide the appellate court with an order of

the trial court authorizing withdrawal; or (3) counsel must petition the appellate court to withdraw as counsel. Counsel for parties entitled to representation on appeal are cautioned that if any critical filing in the appellate process is omitted because of an omission by counsel, and if the party ordinarily would lose appeal rights because of that omission, counsel may be subject to discipline.

When an appeal is filed in a custody action, upon application of a party and for cause shown, the appellate court may make a determination that using the parties' initials in the caption is appropriate after considering the sensitive nature of the facts included in the case record and the child's best interest. See Pa.R.A.P. 904(b)(2).

Paragraph (b).—[With respect to appearances by new counsel following the initial docketing appearances, please note the requirements of Pa.R.A.P. 120.] For the definition of "counsel of record," see Pa.R.A.P. 102 (Definitions). Rule 1112. Appeals by Allowance.

- (f) [Entry of appearance] Notation of Counsel. Upon the filing of the petition for allowance of appeal, the Prothonotary of the Supreme Court shall note on the [record] docket:
- (1) as counsel for the petitioner, the name of his or her counsel, if any, set forth in or endorsed upon the petition for allowance of appeal[,]; and[,]
- (2) as counsel for other parties, counsel, if any, named in the proof of service.

[Unless that party is entitled by law to be represented by counsel on allowance of appeal, the Prothonotary shall upon praecipe of any such counsel for other parties, filed at any time within 30 days after filing of the petition, strike off or correct the record of appearance. If entry of appearance in the trial court extends through appeals, counsel's appearance for a party may not be withdrawn without leave of court. Appearance cannot be withdrawn without leave of court for counsel who have not filed a praecipe to correct appearance within the first 30 days after the petition is docketed, unless another lawyer has entered or simultaneously enters an appearance for the party.

(d) [Entry of appearance.—] Notation of Counsel. Upon the acceptance for filing of the petition for permission to appeal, the prothonotary of the appellate court shall note on the [record] docket:

\* \* \*

- (1) as counsel for the petitioner, the name of counsel, if any, set forth in or endorsed upon the petition for permission to appeal[,]; and[,]
- (2) as counsel for other parties, counsel, if any, named in the proof of service.

[Unless that party is entitled by law to be represented by counsel on a petition for permission to appeal, the prothonotary shall upon praecipe of any such counsel for other parties, filed at any time within 30 days after filing of the petition, strike off or correct the record of appearance. If entry of appearance in the trial court extends through appeals, counsel's appearance for a party may not be withdrawn without leave of court. Leave of court to withdraw is also required for any other counsel who have not filed a praecipe to correct appearance within the first 30 days after the petition is docketed, unless another lawyer has entered or simultaneously enters an appearance for the party.

# Official Note ] Comment:

The Rules of Criminal Procedure require counsel appointed by the trial court to continue representation through direct appeal. Pa.R.Crim.P. 120(A)(4) and Pa.R.Crim.P. 122(B)(2). - (1) as counsel for the petitioner, the name of counsel, if any, set forth in or endorsed upon the petition for review[,]; and[,]
- (2) as counsel for other parties, counsel, if any, named in the proof of service.

[ The prothonotary shall, upon practipe of any such counsel for other parties, filed within 30 days after filing of the petition, strike off or correct the record of appearances. Thereafter a counsel's appearance for a party may not be withdrawn without leave of court, unless another lawyer has entered or simultaneously enters an appearance for the party.

#### Official Note ] Comment:

See the Official Note to Pa.R.A.P. 1112 (appeals by allowance) for an explanation of the procedure when Form 3817 or other similar United States Postal Service form from which the date of deposit can be verified is used.

The petition for review must be served on the government unit that made the determination in question.

Rule 1602. Filing.

(d) **[** Entry of appearance.—] Notation of Counsel. Upon the filing of the petition for specialized review, the prothonotary of the appellate court shall note on the **[** record **]** docket:

- (1) as counsel for the petitioner, the name of counsel, if any, set forth in or endorsed upon the petition for specialized review [,]; and [,]
- (2) as counsel for other parties, counsel, if any, named in the proof of service.

[The prothonotary shall upon praccipe of any such counsel for other parties, filed at any time within 30 days after filing of the petition, strike off or correct the record of appearance. Thereafter a counsel's appearance for a party may not be withdrawn without leave of court, unless another lawyer has entered or simultaneously enters an appearance for the party.]

#### SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA APPELLATE COURT PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE

#### **RE-PUBLICATION REPORT**

### Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.A.P. 102, 120, 907, 1112, 1311, 1514, and 1602

The Appellate Court Procedural Rules Committee is considering proposing the amendment of Pennsylvania Rule of Appellate Procedure 120 to rescind and replace the current text governing the entry of appearance. This amendment, coupled with the amendment of Pa.R.A.P. 102, 907, 1112, 1311, 1514, and 1602, is intended to consolidate procedures for the entry, substitution, and withdrawal of appearance of counsel in the appellate courts.

The Committee previously published a proposal on this subject, see 51 Pa.B. 1780 (April 3, 2021), and received several comments. A comment questioned whether the prior proposal would authorize a previous entry of appearance in a trial court matter to apply again in subsequent or ancillary proceedings in the trial court after an appeal is final. The Committee refrained from addressing the continuity of representation in the trial court through the Rules of Appellate Procedure after an appeal has concluded. That matter is a subject for procedural rules governing the trial courts and the Pennsylvania Rules of Professional Conduct.

Another comment suggested that the phrase, "entitled by law to be represented by counsel," used in the prior proposal may be overbroad and subject to misunderstanding by litigants who believe they are entitled to representation even though that entitlement cannot be traced to a constitution, statute, or rule. That comment prompted further deliberations and substantial revision of the proposal.

Another comment objected to a requirement of prior court approval before current counsel for a criminal defendant could withdraw through substituted counsel. That requirement was viewed as cumbersome, unnecessary, and an additional burden, which would result in fewer attorneys withdrawing from appeals despite substitute counsel's representation. The Committee's intention with this requirement was to ensure that substitute

counsel will assume representation of the party for all relevant appellate purposes and to minimize delays or disruptions of scheduling. In response, the Committee has eliminated this requirement for prior approval in the present proposal.

Finally, AOPC/IT commented that the requirement for counsel to serve the client when seeking to withdraw cannot be accommodated through PACFile. Service, therefore, would need to be made by other means. The Committee agreed and noted that service would need to be made by the options available in Pa.R.A.P. 121(c).

In response to these comments and further deliberations, the Committee restructured Pa.R.A.P. 120 to set forth the general requirements for entering and withdrawing an appearance in subdivisions (a) and (b). Subdivisions (c) and (d) contain specific requirements for the withdrawal of appearance in criminal appeals and Post Conviction Relief Act (PCRA) appeals. Subdivision (e) creates an exception to the general requirement of subdivision (b). Subdivision (f) sets forth a requirement that counsel serve the client whenever seeking to withdraw.

Concerning subdivision (a), the requirements are largely carried over from the current Pa.R.A.P. 120 with one addition. Through subdivision (a)(2)(i), the *praecipe* for entry of appearance must designate the party or interest counsel represents. As for the latter, that requirement is intended to include counsel for *amicus curiae*. The commentary accompanying the rule explains this requirement.

Subdivision (b) states the general requirement that counsel must apply to the appellate court for permission to withdraw as counsel in a pending appellate matter.

Subdivisions (c) and (d) codify the procedural requirements for compliance with Anders v. California, 386 U.S. 738 (1967) and Commonwealth v. Santiago, 978 A.2d 349 (Pa. 2009) for the withdrawal of counsel in direct criminal appeals, and Commonwealth v. Turner, 544 A.2d 927 (Pa. 1988) and Commonwealth v. Finley, 550 A.2d 213 (Pa. Super. 1988) for the withdrawal of counsel in PCRA appeals. These subdivisions are narrower in scope than previously proposed. Previously, the Committee proposed applying these procedures based on whether a party was "entitled by law" to be represented by counsel and whether the basis for withdrawal was frivolity or lack of merit.

During the time between proposals, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania amended Pa.R.A.P. 1925(c)(4) regarding counsel's stated intent to withdraw as counsel in a criminal or Post Conviction Relief Act (PCRA) appeal, and subsequent remand for counsel to file a statement of matters complained of on appeal if withdrawal was denied. The scope of amended Pa.R.A.P. 1925(c)(4) informed the Committee, which recalibrated the scope of proposed Pa.R.A.P. 120(c) and (d) to bring those subdivisions in alignment with Pa.R.A.P. 1925(c)(4).

The Committee acknowledges that there may be cases other than a criminal or PCRA appeal when a party is entitled by law to counsel. However, the Committee was reluctant to codify withdrawal procedures without Supreme Court of Pennsylvania precedent. Instead, the commentary accompanying the rules advises readers to consult developing case law.

Similarly, the Committee discussed whether the differences in withdrawal of counsel procedures, namely the requirement of a brief in criminal appeals and the requirement of a letter in PCRA appeals, should be maintained. The Committee considered a proposal to require a brief in both instances but with fewer briefing requirements than those required by Pa.R.A.P. 2111(a) to lessen the burden. Ultimately, the Committee was not inclined to propose altering the requirements set forth in the case law.

Subdivision (e)(1) is intended to incorporate and preserve the current provisions of Pa.R.A.P. 907(b) (notice of appeal), 1112(f) (petition for allowance of appeal), 1311(d) (petition for permission to appeal), 1514(d) (petition for review), or 1602(d) (petition for specialized review), permitting the withdrawal of counsel by praecipe in civil matters where the party is not entitled to representation by law, provided the praecipe is filed within 30 days of noting counsel on the record. Subdivision (e)(2) reflects the existing permissibility of counsel to withdraw by praecipe through the substitution of counsel with the added condition that substitute counsel assumes complete representation for appellate matters. This condition is intended to guard against limited representation that may result in the client being unrepresented in further proceedings. Added to this subdivision is the permissibility of "surplus" counsel to withdraw by praecipe provided other counsel remains.

Additional amendments are proposed to Pa.R.A.P 907(b), 1112(f), 1311(d), 1514(d), and 1602(d). The titles within these subdivisions have been changed from "Entry of Appearance" to "Notation of Counsel" to indicate that the subdivisions only address the responsibility of the prothonotary to note trial counsel on the appellate docket. As noted above, the current language on the entry of appearance by action of counsel and withdrawal of counsel will be removed and governed by new Pa.R.A.P. 120.

As for the mechanism currently contained in these rules for "correcting the record upon praecipe of counsel," this was understood to allow for counsel to withdraw because counsel was not supposed to be in the appeal in the first place. That aspect is addressed by proposed Pa.R.A.P. 120(e)(1). Another aspect of correction may occur when counsel is not withdrawing, but there is some error in noting on the docket the name, address, or party represented by counsel. Upon consultation with the appellate court prothonotaries, it appears that the prothonotary's office is able to correct these aspects of the record upon written communication by counsel. A formal praecipe is not necessary to accomplish it.

Additionally, "counsel of record," as defined in Pa.R.A.P. 102, was reviewed. The definition was modified regarding representation of criminal defendants to remove provisions that would be incorporated into Pa.R.A.P. 120. The modified definition indicates that such representation extends to filing a petition for allowance of appeal and the handling of the appeal unless the court of common pleas enters an order permitting withdrawal of counsel, or counsel is permitted to withdraw pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 120.

# TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

**CHAPTER 1000. ACTIONS** 

Subchapter A. CIVIL ACTION

VENUE AND PROCESS

(Editor's Note: Pa.R.A.P. 1007 and 1018 as printed in 231 Pa. Code read "Official Note" rather than "Note.")

#### Rule 1007. Commencement of Action.

An action may be commenced by filing with the prothonotary:

- (1) a praecipe for a writ of summons[,]; or
- (2) a complaint.

#### [ Note ] Comment:

For the form of the writ of summons, see Rule 1351.

See Rule 205.5 governing the requirement for filing a cover sheet with the pleading commencing the action.

Rule 2005(b) does not authorize the filing of a *praecipe* for a writ of summons if **[ an unknown ]** <u>a known, but unnamed</u> defendant is to be identified by a Doe designation.

#### **PLEADINGS**

#### Rule 1018. Caption.

Every pleading shall contain a caption setting forth the name of the court, the number of the action and the name of the pleading. The caption of a complaint shall set forth the form of the action and the names of all the parties, including a Doe designation for [an unknown] a known, but unnamed defendant as provided in Rule 2005, but in other pleadings it is sufficient to state the name of the first party on each side in the complaint with an appropriate indication of other parties.

#### [ Note ] Comment:

Civil Actions and proceedings shall be captioned "Court of Common Pleas of \_\_\_\_\_\_ County—Civil Action" or other appropriate form of action.

The caption of all legal papers filed in a medical professional liability action must contain the designation "Civil Action—Medical Professional Liability Action." See Rule 1042.16.

The caption of all legal papers filed in a civil action by and against a minor must designate the minor by the initials of his or her first and last name. See Rule 2028.

## CHAPTER 2000. ACTIONS BY REAL PARTIES IN INTEREST

(*Editor's Note*: Pa.R.Civ.P. 2005 as printed in 231 Pa. Code reads "Official Note" rather than "Note" and the Explanatory Comment is not codified.)

Rule 2005. [Unknown] Known, but Unnamed Defendant. Doe Designation.

- [ (a) This rule shall only apply to in personam actions.
- (b) The plaintiff or joining party may designate an unknown defendant by a Doe designation in a complaint provided that:
- (1) a defendant's actual name is unknown to the plaintiff or joining party after having conducted a reasonable search with due diligence;
  - (2) the Doe designation is averred to be fictitious;
- (3) a factual description of the unknown defendant is averred with sufficient particularity for identification; and
- (4) the plaintiff or joining party avers that a reasonable search to determine the actual name has been conducted.

*Note*: This rule does not authorize use of a Doe designation in an action commenced by a writ of summons.

The unknown defendant should be designated by a Doe designation such as John Doe or Jane Doe.

(c) Within 20 days after the actual name of the defendant has been identified, the plaintiff or join-

ing party shall file a motion to amend the complaint pursuant to this rule and Rule 1033 by replacing the Doe designation with the defendant's actual name. An affidavit shall be attached to the motion describing the nature and extent of the investigation that was made to determine the identity of the defendant, and the date upon and the manner in which the defendant's actual name was identified.

Note: Rule 1033 and this rule govern the requirements for amending a complaint to replace a Doe designation with the actual name of a defendant.

- (d) The court shall grant a motion to amend filed pursuant to subdivision (c) unless the court finds that the party seeking the amendment failed to exercise due diligence in identifying the actual name of the defendant.
- (e) A defendant introduced to an action by its actual name in an amended complaint, after the filing of a motion pursuant to subdivision (c) and the court's ruling, may respond by preliminary objection challenging compliance with this rule, asserting prejudice or any other ground set forth in Rule 1028.
- (f) No subpoena in aid of discovery relating to a defendant identified by a Doe designation may be issued or be served without leave of court upon motion stating with particularity from whom information is sought and how the discovery will aid in identification of the unknown defendant. In deciding the motion, the court shall weigh the importance of the discovery sought against unreasonable annoyance, embarrassment, oppression, burden, or expense to any person or party from whom the discovery is sought, and prejudice to any person or entity suspected of being the unknown defendant. Leave to serve a subpoena in aid of discovery does not preclude a challenge to the subpoena by the person or entity served.
- (g) No final judgment may be entered against a defendant designated by a Doe designation.

#### EXPLANATORY COMMENT

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania has adopted new Rule 2005 governing the naming of unknown, or John/Jane Doe, defendants in a complaint. Currently, the Rules of Civil Procedure are silent as to the use of Doe defendants in litigation; however, case law shows that the naming of Doe defendants has occurred. Rule 2005 is intended to fill this gap by standardizing the procedure in which to assert a cause of action against a Doe defendant.

The rule requires a complaint using a John/Jane Doe or similar designation to describe the defendant with sufficient particularity for identification. The rule imposes a duty on the plaintiff or joining party to exercise due diligence in identifying the actual name of the defendant both before and after the complaint is filed. While a sufficient description of an unknown defendant is typically fact specific to a particular case, it may include the physical characteristics of the unknown defendant, the position or title of the job performed by the unknown defendant, the alleged conduct of the unknown defendant, and how the unknown defendant is connected to the action.

Once served, the previously designated Doe defendant may challenge the filing party's due diligence by filing preliminary objections, asserting prejudice or any other ground set forth in Rule 1028. A defendant originally named by a Doe designation is not precluded from asserting nor is the grant of a motion to amend determinative of a defense based on a statute of limitations or repose.

It is important to note that designating a Doe defendant as a mere placeholder or as use as a class of defendants, e.g., John Doe Defendants 1-10, is not a valid use of Rule 2005. The rule is not intended to create a practice of naming Doe defendants as a catch-all category in the event a probable defendant is not named in a complaint. Rule 2005 requires the information in the complaint concerning the Doe defendant to sufficiently describe that defendant for all intents and purposes except by its actual name.

Rule 2005 is not intended to affect the substantive rights of any litigant. The ability to substitute the actual name of the Doe defendant after the expiration of the statute of limitations does not impermissibly extend it. Rule 2005 does not extend the time for filing an action as prescribed by the applicable statute of limitations.

The rule is intended solely to provide a procedural mechanism to substitute the actual name of a Doe-designated defendant where the action has been filed within the limitations period and the defendant has been adequately described in the complaint to demonstrate that it was that defendant against whom the action was asserted.

(This is entirely new text.)

(*Editor's Note*: The following text is proposed to be added and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

- (a) Scope. This rule shall only apply to  $in\ personam$  actions.
- (b) *Doe Designation*. The plaintiff or joining party may designate a known, but unnamed defendant with a Doe designation, such as John Doe, Jane Doe, or ABC Corporation.
  - (c) Content of Complaint.
  - (1) The complaint shall aver:
- (i) the plaintiff or joining party is unable to ascertain a known, but unnamed defendant's actual name after having conducted a reasonable search with due diligence;
  - (ii) the Doe designation is fictitious;
- (iii) a detailed description of the reasonable search with due diligence for the known, but unnamed defendant's actual name;
- (iv) a factual description of the known, but unnamed defendant with sufficient particularity for identification; and
- (v) the plaintiff or joining party conducted a reasonable search to determine the actual name of the defendant.
- (2) The plaintiff or joining party shall not designate a class of known, but unidentified defendants, *e.g.*, John Doe 1-10, as a placeholder in the complaint. The court may impose sanctions for such a designation.
  - (d) Motion to Amend Complaint.
- (1) Within 20 days after the actual name of the Doedesignated defendant has been ascertained, the plaintiff or joining party shall file a motion to amend the com-

plaint pursuant to this rule and Rule 1033 by replacing the Doe designation with the defendant's actual name. An affidavit shall be attached to the motion setting forth the nature and extent of the investigation that was made to ascertain the name of the defendant, and the date upon and the manner in which the defendant's actual name was ascertained.

- (2) The plaintiff or joining party shall serve the motion to amend on the named defendant pursuant to Rules 400 *et seq.*
- (3) A Doe-designated defendant to be named in a complaint may file and serve an answer to the motion and contest the adequacy of the description of the Doe-designated defendant within the complaint, whether the plaintiff or joining party has conducted a reasonable search with due diligence to ascertain the name of the defendant, and the timeliness of the motion.
- (e) Trial Court Determination on Motion to Amend. The court shall grant a motion to amend filed pursuant to subdivision (d) if the court determines the allegations in the motion and the complaint support a finding that the party seeking the amendment failed to exercise due diligence in identifying the actual name of the defendant.
- (f) Preliminary Objection. A defendant introduced to an action by its actual name in an amended complaint, after the filing of a motion pursuant to subdivision (d) and the court's ruling, may respond by preliminary objection challenging compliance with this rule, asserting prejudice or any other ground set forth in Rule 1028.
- (g) Subpoenas. No subpoena in aid of discovery relating to a Doe-designated defendant may be issued or served without leave of court upon motion stating with particularity from whom information is sought and how the discovery will aid in identification of the Doe-designated defendant. In deciding the motion, the court shall weigh the importance of the discovery sought against unreasonable annoyance, embarrassment, oppression, burden, or expense to any person or party from whom the discovery is sought, and prejudice to any person or entity suspected of being the Doe-designated defendant. Leave to serve a subpoena in aid of discovery does not preclude a challenge to the subpoena by the person or entity served.
- (h) No Entry of Final Judgment Permitted. No final judgment may be entered against a Doe-designated defendant.

#### **Comment:**

This rule authorizes the use of a Doe designation in an action commenced by a complaint. It does not authorize use of a Doe designation in an action commenced by a writ of summons. The rule requires a complaint using a John/Jane Doe, ABC Corporation, or a similar designation to describe the defendant with sufficient particularity for identification. The rule imposes a duty on the plaintiff or joining party to exercise due diligence in identifying the actual name of the defendant both before and after the complaint is filed. While a sufficient description of a known, but unnamed defendant is typically fact specific to a particular case, it may include the physical characteristics of the known, but unnamed defendant, the position or title of the job performed by the known, but unnamed defendant, the alleged conduct of known, but unnamed defendant, and how the known, but unnamed defendant is connected to the action.

It is important to note that designating a Doe defendant as a mere placeholder or as a class of defendants, *e.g.*, John Doe Defendants 1-10, is not a valid use of Rule

Once the actual name of Doe-designated defendant has been identified, a plaintiff or joining party must file a motion to amend pursuant to the requirements of subdivision (d) of this rule and Rule 1033. The trial court will grant a motion to amend unless the allegations in the motion and the complaint support a finding that the party seeking the amendment failed to exercise due diligence in ascertaining the actual name of the defendant.

Once served the complaint, the previously Doedesignated defendant may challenge the plaintiff or joining party's due diligence by filing preliminary objections, asserting prejudice or any other ground set forth in Rule 1028. A defendant originally designated as a Doe is not precluded from asserting, nor is the grant of a motion to amend determinative of, a defense based on a statute of limitations or repose.

Rule 2005 is not intended to affect the substantive rights of any litigant. The ability to substitute the actual name of the Doe-designated defendant after the expiration of the statute of limitations does not impermissibly extend it. Rule 2005 does not extend the time for filing an action as prescribed by the applicable statute of limitations

The rule is intended solely to provide a procedural mechanism to substitute the actual name of a Doedesignated defendant where the action has been filed within the limitations period and the defendant has been adequately described in the complaint to demonstrate that it was that defendant against whom the action was asserted.

# SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA CIVIL PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE

#### PUBLICATION REPORT

#### Proposed Amendment of Pa.R.Civ.P. 2005 with Corollary Amendments to Pa.R.A.P. 1007 and 1018

The Civil Procedural Rules Committee is considering proposing to the Supreme Court the amendment of Pennsylvania Rule of Civil Procedure 2005 governing the naming of unknown defendants in a complaint with a Doe designation.

The Committee considered a request to clarify Rule 2005 because John Doe complaints were not being filed in compliance with the rule. Adopted in 2019, Rule 2005 was intended to standardize the procedure for naming a Doe defendant. It requires a plaintiff using a Doe designation to describe that defendant with sufficient particularity for identification and to exercise due diligence in identifying the Doe defendant both before and after the filing of the complaint. Once the actual name of the Doe defendant is identified, the plaintiff must then file a motion to replace the Doe designation with the defendant's actual name.

The requester indicated that, in practice, some John Doe complaints routinely provide a minimal description in

the averments as to the due diligence of the plaintiff to determine the name of the defendant. Absent this information, the trial court is unable to determine the nature of the plaintiff's search to determine the actual name of the defendant. In addition, the requester noted that some complaints have used John Doe as a placeholder in the event the plaintiff discovers additional defendants who may be liable in contravention to the intent of the rule.

To address the first concern, the Committee is proposing modification of the current rule in two respects. Current subdivision (b) would retain language authorizing the use of John Doe defendants. Current subdivisions (b)(1)—(4) would be placed in a new subdivision (c) setting forth the requirements of the complaint. Included in new subdivision (c) would be a requirement for an averment in the complaint describing the steps taken by plaintiff in its reasonable search to determine the defendant's actual name.

For the second concern, the Committee considered the commentary that accompanied the adoption of the rule in 2019. The rule had never been contemplated as creating a mechanism for plaintiffs to designate a placeholder for any possible future defendants who may not have been discovered or known at the time of the filing of the complaint. To obviate any question as to the use of "John Doe" pursuant to the rule, the Committee proposes adding this commentary into the rule text as subdivision (c)(2). As a result, the rule would expressly prohibit this use. Further, the proposed amendment would permit the trial court to sanction a litigant who insists on using a Doe designation as a placeholder.

In addition, the Committee also identified other portions of the rule worthy of clarification. First, the proposal would add additional procedures regarding the motion to amend when replacing the Doe designation with the defendant's actual name. New subdivision (d)(1) would retain the requirement of the current rule to file the motion to amend within 20 days of ascertaining the actual name of the defendant and to attach to the motion an affidavit describing the steps taken to ascertain the name of the defendant. New subdivisions (d)(2)-(3) would add a requirement for service of the motion on the to-be-named defendant and give that defendant the opportunity to contest the adequacy of the description of the Doe defendant in the complaint, whether a reasonable search was conducted with due diligence to ascertain the name of the defendant, and the timeliness of the motion.

Second, the Committee observed that the current rule requires the trial court to grant the motion unless the court finds that the party seeking the amendment failed to exercise due diligence. The proposed change in new subdivision (e) would clarify that the trial court does not make findings as to the party's due diligence; rather, the trial court determines whether to grant the motion to amend based on whether the allegations in the motion and the complaint support a finding that the party exercised due diligence in determining the actual name of the defendant.

Finally, the Committee is proposing changing the term "unknown defendant" to "known, but unnamed defendant" throughout the rule. An "unknown defendant" suggests a defendant that is not known at all and will be identified in the future. In contrast, a "known, but unnamed defendant" is intended to clarify that the plaintiff may

use Doe designation because it has identified a defendant exists, but has not yet been able to ascertain the name of that defendant.

Given the affect of these amendments, the Committee proposes replacing the entirety of the text and commentary to Rule 2005. Corollary amendments to Rule 1007 and Rule 1018 reflect the change to the description of the Doe designation.

The Committee invites all comments, concerns, and suggestions.

Parties who are unwilling or unable to participate in the electronic filing of legal papers are permitted to file and serve legal papers in a physical paper format. Establishment of a PACFile account shall constitute consent to participate in electronic filing, including acceptance of service electronically of any document filed in PACFile.
- (E) Applicable filing fees shall be accepted in the same manner as currently required by statute, court order, Local Rule or as established by fee schedule.
- (F) Upon electronic submission of a legal paper, the PACFile system shall provide an electronic notification to

The Clerk of Courts shall convert such physical filings to a PDF and add it to the system, except those legal papers defined in paragraph (B).

#### Fishing; Seasons, Sizes and Creel Limits

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 61 (relating to seasons, sizes and creel limits). The Commission is publishing this proposed rule-making under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendment updates the Commission's regulations concerning Atlantic striped bass fishing in the Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary.

#### A. Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect on January 1, 2023.

The proposed amendment to § 61.2 (relating to Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102(b) of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

#### D. Purpose and Background

The specific purpose and background of the proposed amendment is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

#### E. Summary of Proposal

At its May 2022 quarterly meeting, the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC), which includes the Commonwealth as a member, approved Amendment 7 to the Interstate Fishery Management Plan for Atlantic striped bass. The most recent striped bass stock assessment determined the stock was overfished and that overfishing was occurring. Based on these findings, the ASMFC's striped bass management plan calls for management actions to rebuild the stock. As part of Amendment 7, new requirements were established to address recreational release mortality, among other management plan components. Recreational release mortality is a large component of annual fishing mortality and Amendment 7 establishes a new gear restriction which prohibits gaffing striped bass when fishing recreationally. This new restriction, along with the existing circle hook requirement when fishing recreationally with bait, are intended to increase the chance of survival after a striped bass is released alive. To align with the provisions of Amendment 7, it is recommended to prohibit the use of a gaff when fishing for striped bass in the Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary.

In addition to the ASMFC mandated amendment, Commission staff identified an opportunity to further clarify language in § 61.2(b) pertaining to the legal harvestable size range for striped bass. The current language describes the minimum legal harvestable length but does not account for the maximum legal harvestable length in the striped bass slot limit. Although the harvest slot limit

in the regulation chart clearly defines the upper and lower limits to the legal harvestable length range, it is recommended to add clarifying language to the body of the text in the regulation.

The Commission proposes that  $\S$  61.2 be amended to read as set forth in Annex A.

#### F. Paperwork

This proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

#### G. Fiscal Impact

This proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions.

# TITLE 58. RECREATION PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION Subpart B. FISHING

# CHAPTER 61. SEASONS, SIZES AND CREEL LIMITS

# § 61.2. Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and River Estuary.

- (a) It is unlawful to take, catch, kill or possess fish, except during the seasons specified in this section. It is not a violation of this section if a fish caught out of season from water where fishing for other species is lawful is immediately returned unharmed to the waters from which it was taken.
- (b) It is unlawful to take, catch, kill or possess fish of less than the minimum size or greater than the maximum size specified in this section. It is not a violation of this section if an undersized or oversized fish taken from waters where fishing is otherwise lawful is immediately returned unharmed to the waters from which it was taken.
- (c) It is unlawful to take, catch or kill more than 1 day's limit of any species of fish as specified in the following chart during 1 calendar day. It is unlawful to possess more than 1 day's limit of any species of fish as specified in the following chart except under the following circumstances:

- (1) A person may possess any number of lawfully caught fish at the person's residence.
- (2) A person who is engaged in a fishing trip away from home for 2 or more consecutive calendar days may, while transporting fish from the place where caught to his residence, possess a number of fish equal to no more than two times the daily creel limit for that species of fish. In prosecution for violation of this section, it shall be a rebuttable presumption that a person transporting fish from a fishing site caught all of the fish during 1 calendar day.
- (3) A fish will not be considered to be caught in violation of this section if it is immediately returned unharmed to the waters from which it was taken.
- (4) A fish caught that is not to be counted in the creel limit shall be immediately released unharmed into the water from which it was taken. Except as otherwise provided in § 53.24 or § 63.40 (relating to tournament and fishing derby permits; and fishing tournaments and fishing derbies), a fish placed on a stringer, or confined by any type of container, structure or device, or not returned immediately to the water, will be considered as part of the daily creel or possession limits. Fish returned to the water shall be handled carefully and be returned unharmed to the water from which taken.
- (5) Fish may be given to another person, but the fish shall be counted in the donor's creel limit and neither the donor nor the recipient may kill or possess (while in the act of fishing) more than the limit allowed.
- (d) It is unlawful to fish with bait for any species of fish in the tidal Delaware Estuary, including tributaries from the mouths of the tributaries upstream to the limit of tidal influence using any hook type other than non-offset (in-line) circle hooks. The definition of a non-offset (in-line) circle hook is a non-offset hook where the point is pointed perpendicularly back towards the shank. The term "non-offset" means the point and the barb are in the same plane as the shank.

# (d.1) It is unlawful for any person to gaff or attempt to gaff any striped bass at any time when fishing.

(e) The following seasons, sizes and creel limits apply to the Delaware River, West Branch Delaware River and Delaware River tributaries from the mouths of the tributaries upstream to the limit of the tidal influence and the Lehigh River from its mouth upstream to the first dam in Easton, Pennsylvania:

# CHAPTER 63. GENERAL FISHING REGULATIONS § 63.8. Long bows, crossbows, spears and gigs.

(a) General. Except as otherwise provided in this part, **snakehead**, carp, suckers and catfish may be taken with long bows and arrow, including compound bows, crossbows, spears or gigs any hour of the day or night aided by a light at night if so desired, in Commonwealth waters and waters bounding and adjacent thereto.

#### **Boating; Boating Restrictions**

#### D. Purpose and Background

The specific purpose and background of the proposed amendments are described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

#### E. Summary of Proposal

Current regulations limit boat propulsion to electric motors only on Commission owned or controlled lakes, some State Park lakes, and water bodies specified in Chapter 111 (relating to special regulations counties). These regulations were originally intended to reduce noise, excessive wakes, shoreline erosion and property damage, and reduce the risk of petroleum-based water pollution on certain water bodies. Boats powered by small electric motors (such as trolling motors) and unpowered boats are popular on Commonwealth bodies of water with electric motor only restrictions.

Some exceptions exist for State Park lakes and certain other waters specified in Chapter 111 where internal combustion motors are permitted but with horsepower limitations. Boats propelled by small gas outboard motors and unpowered boats are popular on these waterways.

Recent technological advancements with battery-powered electric boat motors have produced a variety of higher-powered options up to 180 horsepower and 60 miles per hour. While these new units are currently expensive and have limited battery capacity, it is anticipated they will become more affordable and widely available in the future. Boating stakeholders, partner organizations, other State agencies and staff have expressed concern about the potential increased availability and popularity of high-powered electric motors, which would be legal to be operated on waters under current regulations that allow electric motors only. Additionally, law enforcement staff have expressed concern about the complexity of enforcing horsepower limitations for electric motors to meet the original intent of current regulations.

To address these issues, the Commission recommends amending Chapter 107 to limit the speed at which electric motors may be operated and clarify that horsepower restrictions apply to internal combustion motors only. These amendments set the conditions by which Chapter 111 regulations are qualified, as noted in § 111.71 (relating to general requirements).

The Commission proposes that §§ 107.1 and 107.2 be amended to read as set forth in Annex A.

Subpart C. BOATING
CHAPTER 107. BOATING RESTRICTIONS

#### § 107.1. Horsepower restrictions.

On waters where horsepower limitations are prescribed, as set forth in Chapter 111 (relating to special regulations counties), [boats with motors larger than the maximum horsepower shall be permitted but the motors

may not be used ] the use of internal combustion motors in excess of the prescribed horsepower limitation is prohibited.

#### § 107.2. Electric motors.

Except as otherwise specified in Chapter 111 (relating to special regulations counties):

- (1) Electric motors are permitted on Commission owned or controlled lakes and on State Park lakes where boating is permitted.
- (1.1) Boats propelled by electric motors on Commission owned or controlled lakes, State Park lakes and water bodies specified in Chapter 111 may not be operated at greater than slow, no-wake speed.
- (2) On Commission and State Park owned or controlled lakes, internal combustion motors attached to or installed in boats need not be removed, but the operation of engines is specifically prohibited.
- (3) Officers authorized to enforce the code and this part and, in the case of State Park lakes, officers and officials of the Bureau of State Parks and operators of emergency vessels may operate boats powered by internal combustion motors in the performance of their official duties on waters otherwise restricted to electric motors only.

The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendment updates the Commission's regulations pertaining to Treasure Lake, located in Clearfield County.

#### A. Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect on January 1, 2023.

#### E. Summary of Proposal

Treasure Lake is a 379-acre lake within the grounds of a semi-private resort-style residential development of the same name. It is the largest of three lakes on the property and is designated for motorboats. It has a speed limit of 35 mph. Treasure Lake is popular for boat-towed watersports, as well as fishing and kayaking. The lake has a marina with 200 boat rental slips and four boat launches.

In March 2022, the Treasure Lake Board of Directors voted to amend its policies to extend the maximum boat length on Treasure Lake from 25 feet to 26 feet, consistent with the United States Coast Guard's definition of a Class 1 vessel (16 feet to 25.9 feet). The Treasure Lake Board of Directors has requested the Commission adopt the same regulatory amendment in the *Pennsylvania Code* so that Waterways Conservation Officers can continue to assist in enforcement of this boating regulation.

The Commission proposes that § 111.17 be amended to read as set forth in Annex A.

#### F. Paperwork

This proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

#### G. Fiscal Impact

This proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions.

#### 1. Purpose and Authority

used as a muzzleloading firearm.

As the nature of its name implies, a muzzleloading firearm is by definition "a firearm designed" to have its loose ammunition components "loaded...from the muzzle. . . . " In this instance, the ammunition components refer to the combination of the loose or pelletized black powder or black powder substitute and the projectile or projectiles. Recent developments in the firearms industry have generated muzzleloading firearms that can accommodate the loading of a captured powder charge similar to a cartridge, casing or shell that is loaded from the breech, with the projectile or projectiles remaining to be loaded from the muzzle. Current regulations specifically prohibit muzzleloaders that accept cartridge ammunition. However, this restriction was originally intended to restrict modern firearms that are loaded by a cartridge or casing that contains both the powder and the projectile. The Commission does not intend or desire for this restriction to apply to the previously-described muzzleloaders. The Commission is proposing to amend § 131.2 to permit muzzleloading firearms that allow a cartridge of loose or pelletized black powder or black powder substitute to be loaded from the breech, while the projectile remains loaded from the muzzle to be used as a muzzleloading firearm.

Section 2102(d) of the code (relating to regulations) authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations stipulating the size and type of traps, the type of firearms and ammunition and other devices which may be used, the manner in which and the location where the devices may be used, the species the devices may be used for and the season when the devices may be used." The amendments to § 131.2 are proposed under this authority.

#### 2. Regulatory Requirements

This proposed rulemaking will amend § 131.2 to permit muzzleloading firearms that allow a cartridge of loose or pelletized black powder or black powder substitute to be loaded from the breech, while the projectile remains loaded from the muzzle, to be used as a muzzleloading firearm.

#### 3. Persons Affected

Persons who utilize muzzleloaders that utilize a charge cartridge, casing or shell that is loaded from the breech and the projectile or projectiles remaining to be loaded from the muzzle within this Commonwealth will be affected by this proposed rulemaking.

- (ii) The term includes <u>full or partial</u> breech-loading rifles and handguns that <u>fire loose ammunition components</u> comparable to a muzzleloading firearm.
- (iii) The term does not authorize a firearm that accepts cartridge ammunition **that contains both the projectile and propellant charge**.

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed at its July 9, 2022, meeting to amend §§ 131.2 and 135.181 and delete § 135.182 (relating to definitions; rifle and handgun ranges; and ranges, State Game Lands No. 176) to eliminate the outdated and unnecessary text unique to State Game Lands No. 176 (SGL 176) and replace it with new Statewide shotgun range regulations

for both clay bird ranges and shotgun patterning ranges under proposed § 135.182a (relating to shotgun ranges).

This proposed rulemaking will not have an adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for this proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

This proposed rulemaking was made public at the July 9, 2022, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until September 21, 2022, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

#### 1. Purpose and Authority

The Commission manages the use and operation of the shooting ranges located on SGL 176, in part, under the provisions of § 135.182. The Commission manages the use and operation of the remainder of its 33 shooting ranges located on State game lands across this Commonwealth under the various provisions of § 135.181. The Commission reviewed this split regulatory structure and determined that the days and hours of operation and range reservation periods unique to the shooting ranges at SGL 176 are no longer necessary.

The elimination of the text in § 135.182 that is unique to SGL 176 will revert the management of the use and operation of the shooting ranges at this location entirely to the general provisions of § 135.181 which have Statewide application. This will result in a number of changes that are largely beneficial to users of the SGL 176 shooting ranges. As it relates to the proposed deletion of paragraph (1), users will see an expansion in open shooting days to now include Mondays and Tuesdays but will also see hours of operation on Sundays restricted to 12 p.m. to sunset, except those specifically designated as being open from 8 a.m. to sunset. While certainly a change to the regulatory text, the Commission does not believe that a change will be observed by users of the shooting ranges at SGL 176, as the Commission itself has not followed these unique days and hours of operation language for approximately 8 years. As it relates to the proposed deletion of paragraph (2), users will see the calendar window of opportunity for groups or organiza-tions to reserve a range reduced from year-round to January 1 through October 1.

In replacement of the previously addressed proposed deletion of text, the Commission is proposing to insert new shotgun range regulations that will be specific to the unique needs of these types of ranges not properly addressed by other existing regulations. The Commission currently only has a few ranges designated specifically as shotgun ranges. However, the Commission intends to establish more ranges soon as a result of their increasing popularity and use. The proposed changes will set forth the types of firearms, ammunition and targets that may be used on shotgun ranges. The proposed amendments will also establish the standards for use of these shotgun ranges to help ensure that users of the ranges, as well as other persons and property in the vicinity of these ranges, are protected from harm or injury. These changes will also protect the significant investment the Commission has put into constructing the current and future facilities. The Commission is proposing to amend  $\S\S\ 131.2$  and 135.181 and delete  $\S\ 135.182$  to eliminate the outdated and unnecessary text unique to SGL 176 and replace it with proposed § 135.182a regarding new Statewide shotgun range regulations for both clay bird ranges and shotgun patterning ranges.

Section 721(a) of the code (relating to control of property) provides "The administration of all lands or waters owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the commission shall be under the sole control of the director, and the commission shall promulgate regulations consistent with the purpose of this title for its use and protection as necessary to properly manage these lands or waters." The amendments to §§ 131.2, 135.181 and 135.182 are proposed under this authority.

#### 2. Regulatory Requirements

This proposed rulemaking will amend §§ 131.2 and 135.181 and delete § 135.182 to eliminate the outdated and unnecessary text unique to SGL 176 and replace it with proposed § 135.182a regarding new Statewide shotgun range regulations for both clay bird ranges and shotgun patterning ranges.

# TITLE 58. RECREATION PART III. GAME COMMISSION CHAPTER 131. PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS

#### § 131.2. Definitions.

In addition to the definitions contained in section 102 of the act (relating to definitions), the following words and terms, when used in this part or in the act, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

\* \* \* \* \*

*Broadhead*—A fixed or mechanical tip affixed to the fore end of an arrow or bolt having sharpened cutting edges consisting of metal or naturally occurring stone.

Clay bird range—An area where saucer-shaped targets, usually made of baked clay or limestone, are launched and targeted by a shooter using a firearm that discharges multiple projectile ammunition.

Closed season—Periods of the calendar year and hours during which it is unlawful to take game or wildlife.

Meat or animal products—For the purpose of section 2361(a)(13) of the act (relating to unlawful acts concerning taking of furbearers), meat or animal products include artificial representations or facsimiles.

Multiple projectile ammunition—Cartridge or shell ammunition that is loaded with shot pellets or multiple loose projectiles designed to spread or scatter upon discharge from a firearm.

Muzzleloading firearm—

(i) A firearm designed and manufactured to be loaded with loose ammunition components (projectile and propellant charge) from the muzzle or forward, open end of the firearm's barrel.

\* \* \* \* \*

Regular small game hunting season—The designated period of time when resident small game species may be hunted and taken.

Shotgun patterning range—An area where paper targets are placed on or affixed to a stationary backer and targeted by a shooter using a firearm that discharges multiple projectile ammunition.

Shotgun range—A firearms range designated by the Commission as a clay bird range or shotgun patterning range.

Single projectile ammunition—A cartridge or shell ammunition that is loaded with a single projectile designed to remain intact upon discharge from a firearm.

Special firearms deer season.—Any firearms deer season, except muzzleloader season, that precedes the regular firearms deer season.

#### CHAPTER 135. LANDS AND BUILDINGS Subchapter J. SHOOTING RANGES

#### § 135.181. Rifle and handgun ranges.

(a) General provisions. In addition to § 135.2 (relating to unlawful actions) [ and except as provided in § 135.182 (relating to ranges, State Game Lands No. 176) ], the following pertain to lands under Commission ownership, lease or jurisdiction designated as rifle or handgun ranges:

\* \* \* \* \*

# § 135.182. [Ranges, State Game Lands No. 176] [Reserved].

In addition to §§ 135.2 and 135.181 (relating to unlawful actions; and rifle and handgun ranges), the following exceptions apply to ranges located on State Game Lands No. 176, Half Moon Township, Centre County:

- (1) Ranges are open to the public Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, from 8 a.m., prevailing time, to sunset. In addition to the periods in this section for public use of the range, the Regional Director or a designee has discretion to grant special use of the range during any period. At other times, the range is closed to public use.
- (2) A group or organization desiring to use the range shall make necessary arrangements with the Northcentral Regional Director or a designee at least 20 days in advance.]

(*Editor's Note*: The following section is proposed to be added and is printed in regular type to enhance readability.)

#### § 135.182a. Shotgun ranges.

- (a) Shotgun ranges. In addition to § 135.2 (relating to unlawful actions) the following pertain to lands under Commission ownership, lease or jurisdiction designated as shotgun ranges:
- (1) Shotgun ranges are open for use from 8 a.m., prevailing time, until sunset Monday through Saturday and from 12 p.m. to sunset Sunday, unless posted otherwise by the Commission.
- (2) A person using a shotgun range is responsible for keeping the area clean and free of debris, and may not discard, deposit, leave or throw litter, except in approved refuse containers. Range users shall remove all targets from range backboards, if applicable, and collect used cartridge casings or shotshell hulls when their shooting is completed and prior to leaving the range.
- (3) The Commission is not responsible for anyone injured on a shotgun range. An individual using a shotgun range does so at their own risk and assumes all responsibility for injuries to a person or property caused by or to them.
- (4) When more than one person is using a shotgun range, a range officer shall be designated.
- (5) A person under 16 years of age may not use a shotgun range unless they are properly accompanied and supervised by a person 18 years of age or older.
- (6) The Commission or any designated local representative may close a shotgun range by posting appropriate signs to that effect. A person may not use a shotgun range during a period when the range is designated as closed.
- (b) *Prohibited acts*. At a shotgun range located on land under Commission ownership, lease or jurisdiction, except when authorized by the appropriate regional director or a designee, it is unlawful to:
- (1) Discharge a firearm from any location other than an established shooting station or shooting location on the designated firing line.
- (2) Discharge a firearm on a shotgun patterning range at any target other than a paper target placed on a stationary target backboard mounted by the Commission.
- (3) Discharge armor piercing, incendiary, explosive, tracer or single projectile ammunition.
- (4) Be intoxicated, use or possess an intoxicating beverage or controlled substance.
  - (5) Discharge an automatic firearm.
- (6) Load or discharge a firearm that contains more than three rounds of multiple projectile ammunition.
- (7) Target or shoot at clay birds anywhere on the range except areas designated by the director by signs stating that clay bird shooting is permitted.
- (8) Load or discharge a firearm or use a range facility for any reason without possessing a valid Pennsylvania hunting or furtaker license or a Commission-issued range permit signed by its holder. This prohibition does not apply to persons 15 years of age or younger or up to one person accompanying another person in possession of a valid Pennsylvania hunting or furtaker license or a Commission-issued range permit.

- (9) Operate, manipulate or discharge a firearm in negligent disregard for the safety of other persons present at or nearby the range. This prohibition is specifically intended to include loading a firearm, operating or manipulating a loaded firearm, or discharging a firearm anywhere on a shotgun range while another person is downrange of the firing line.
  - (10) Use or discharge any single projectile ammunition.
- (11) Use or discharge multiple projectile ammunition on a clay bird range that is larger than # 4 lead, # 2 steel or # 4 of any other composition or alloys of nontoxic shot approved by the Director of the United States Fish and
- Wildlife Service or an authorized representative under 50 CFR 20.134 (relating to approval of nontoxic shot types and shot coatings).
- (12) Throw, target or shoot clay birds on a clay bird range that are composed of any substance other than baked clay, limestone or other biodegradable material.
- (13) Throw clay birds on a clay bird range from any location other than the designated firing line.
- (14) Use the range in violation of any other requirement of this section or posted signage.





- Robust workforce development and Training and Technical Assistance plans to help build a much-needed workforce.
- Proposed updates to Grantee and Subgrantee staffing plans based on workforce needs assessment survey.
- Plans to transition to Hancock Cloud-Based data management system.
- Plans to request approval from DOE to continue to use the energy auditing tool, HEAT, for single family and manufactured housing—which is also included in the DOE Annual Plan.

There is a continued National focus on coordination of efforts where other health and safety, lead-abatement, utility weatherization and housing rehab services are coordinated locally with weatherization services.

The proposed development—located at 577 East River Road in Walker Township, PA—consists of sewage planning for two new single-family homes on an existing residential lot, each utilizing an on-lot disposal system with total project flows of 800 gallons per day. This request for planning exemption has been disapproved because the submission does not qualify as an exemption from the requirement to revise the Official Plan because the subdivision proposes the use of onlot sewage disposal systems in an area underlain by carbonate geology as per Chapter 71, Section 71.51(b)(1)(ii).

## Availability of Rebates through the Pennsylvania Alternative Fuels Incentive Grant Program

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) announces the availability of rebates to Commonwealth residents under Pennsylvania's Alternative Fuel Vehicle (AFV) Rebate Program (Program). The Program, administered by the Department through the Alternative Fuels Incentive Grant Program, provides rebates to Commonwealth residents to assist with the costs of purchasing an AFV. The Department is now accepting applications.

To qualify for the rebate, the AFV must be registered in this Commonwealth. The rebate will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis in the order in which applications are received. The Program will run through the end of June 2023, or until at least 1,000 rebates have been awarded or funding has been expended. The Program can be reassessed or changed at any time.

To help bridge the gap in affordability of AFVs to Commonwealth residents, the Program will be limited to providing rebates to qualifying Commonwealth residents.

Commonwealth residents whose total household income is equal to or below 400% of the Federal Income Poverty level, as defined by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, will be eligible for the rebate. A full table of the income requirements to be eligible to receive a rebate is provided on the Program's web site at www.dep.pa.gov/AFVrebates and in the Program guidelines. To view the Federal Income Poverty level, visit https://aspe.hhs.gov/poverty-guidelines.

The following rebate amounts will be offered by the Program. Vehicle types—new, pre-owned and demonstration alternative fuel vehicles—will receive the same rebate amount per vehicle category:

- \$2,000 rebate for a battery electric vehicle
- \$1,500 rebate for a plug-in hybrid electric vehicle
- \$500 rebate for a natural gas fueled vehicle including original equipment manufacturer (OEM)/certified retrofits only
- \$500 rebate for a propane fueled vehicle including OEM/certified retrofits only

• \$500 rebate for an electric motorcycle

In addition to the rebate amounts available to eligible applicants, the Program will also provide an additional \$1,000 incentive if the eligible applicant's total household income is equal to or below 200% of the Federal Income Poverty level, https://aspe.hhs.gov/poverty-guidelines.

- 6) The ability to participate in designated online training classes accessible over the Internet.

- 1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania The Addams Family (hereinafter "The Addams Family"). The game number is PA-5171.
  - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) CREEPY Symbol: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when

matched against the play symbol in the "KOOKY" area, determine whether a player wins the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" prize.

- (d) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (e) KOOKY Symbol: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbol in the "CREEPY" area, determine whether a player wins the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" prize.
- (f) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (g) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (h) MORTICIA MULTIPLIER: The area at the top of a The Addams Family lottery game ticket that contains either a 1X (NOMULT), 2X (2TIMES), 3X (3TIMES) or 5X (5TIMES) multiplier symbol that is applied to any prize won in the main play area.
- (i) MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY: The area at the bottom of a The Addams Family lottery game ticket containing one "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" prize symbol that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player wins the prize amount shown. "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" is played separately. "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" prizes cannot be multiplied.
- (j) Play: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (k) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (l) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (m) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (n) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (o) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (p) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- 3. Price: The price of a The Addams Family ticket is \$5.
- 4. Description of The Addams Family Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Addams Family lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability

to select their own play symbols. The Addams Family tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

- (b) The Addams Family is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) The Addams Family tickets contain a "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area. When a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, multiply any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by two. When a 3X (3TIMES) symbol appears in the "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, multiply any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by three. When a 5X (5TIMES) symbol appears in the "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, multiply any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area by five. When a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area is not multiplied.

- (h) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a The Addams Family ticket and select The Addams Family option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
  - 5. The Addams Family ticket characteristics:
- (a) The Addams Family tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: The Addams Family tickets will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area, a "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, a "CREEPY" area, a "KOOKY" area and a "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN),

- 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The play symbols and their captions, located in the "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, are: 1X (NOMULT) symbol, 2X (2TIMES) symbol, 3X (3TIMES) symbol and a 5X (5TIMES) symbol. The play symbols located in the "CREEPY" and "KOOKY" areas, are: Thing symbol, Lurch symbol, Gomez Addams symbol, Wednesday Addams symbol, Pugsley Addams symbol, Uncle Fester symbol, Cousin Itt symbol and Grandmama symbol.

- (21) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) multiplier symbol appears in the "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (22) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) multiplier symbol appears in the "MORTICIA MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (c) Determination of prize winners for holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol, are:
- (1) Holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (2) Holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (3) Holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol and a prize symbol of  $50^{.00}$  (FIFTY) appears in the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of 50.
- (4) Holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol and a prize symbol of  $\$30^{.00}$  (THIRTY) appears in the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.
- (5) Holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol and a prize symbol of  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY) appears in the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (6) Holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol and a prize symbol of  $\$10^{.00}$  (TEN DOL) appears in the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (7) Holders of tickets upon which the "CREEPY" symbol matches the "KOOKY" symbol and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "MYSTERIOUS & SPOOKY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- 8. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

- (a) Qualifying Tickets: Non-winning PA-5171 The Addams Family (\$5), PA-5172 Pick Your Potion (\$2) and PA-5173 Winning Web (\$1) Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Qualifying Tickets") are eligible for entry in the Drawing.
  - (b) Participation and entry:
- (1) Entrants must be members of the Pennsylvania Lottery VIP Players Club to participate in the Drawing. To join the VIP Players Club, visit https://www.palottery.state.pa.us/vipplayersclub/login.aspx. Becoming a VIP Players Club member is free.
- (2) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at https://www.palottery.com, or the Lottery's official mobile application during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted, and entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.
- (3) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be accepted.
  - (4) Only one claimant per entry is allowed.
  - (5) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.
- (6) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.
- (7) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.
  - (c) *Drawing description*:
- (1) The Lottery will conduct one faBOOlous Second-Chance Drawing for qualifying Fast Play Lottery game tickets. All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.
- (2) All entries received after 4:59:59 a.m. September 6, 2022, through 11:59:59 p.m. November 3, 2022, will be entered into the Drawing to be held between November 4, 2022 and November 21, 2022.
- (3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at https://www.palottery.com.
- (4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5171 The Addams Family (\$5) = five entries, PA-5172 Pick Your Potion (\$2) = two entries and PA-5173 Winning Web (\$1) = one entry.
- (5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.

- (d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:
- (1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(e) or mentioned anywhere else in these rules.
- (2) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(c)(2).
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (ii) The second entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The third through the fifth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (iv) The sixth through the thirty-first entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (v) The thirty-second through the eighty-first entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
- (3) All prizes will be paid as lump-sum cash payments or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.
- (4) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will have the iLottery Bonus Money credited to their Lottery account and will receive an email notifying them that they won a prize.
- (5) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site.
- (6) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.
- (7) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.
  - (e) Drawing restrictions:
- (1) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.
- (2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.
- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.
- (4) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother,

- sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.
- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.
- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).
- (12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.
- (13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.
- (14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 9(d)(4). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's Lottery account.
  - (15) Prizes are not transferrable.
  - (16) Other restrictions may apply.
  - 10. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
  - 11. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
  - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
  - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
  - 12. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
  - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
  - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 13. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 14. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 15. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

### 16. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play The Addams Family lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
  - 17. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 18. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play The Addams Family lottery game tickets.
- 19. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not

- exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 20. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote The Addams Family or through normal communications methods.
- 21. Applicability: This notice applies only to The Addams Family lottery game announced in this notice.

# Pennsylvania Pick Your Potion Fast Play Game 5172

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Pick Your Potion (hereinafter "Pick Your Potion"). The game number is PA-5172.
  - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b)  $Bar\ code$ : The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

- (g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (k) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (l) WITCHES BREW BONUS: The area at the top of a Pick Your Potion game ticket containing four play symbols that, when matched according to the instructions, determines whether the player wins a prize. The "WITCHES BREW BONUS" is played separately.
- (m) WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE: The area at the top of a Pick Your Potion game ticket containing the prize amount that can be won in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area.
- (n) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
  - 3. Price: The price of a Pick Your Potion ticket is \$2.
- 4. Description of the Pick Your Potion Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Pick Your Potion lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Pick Your Potion tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Pick Your Potion is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. Whenever the matching number is 13 (THRTN), the player wins triple the prize amount shown. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Pick Your Potion tickets contain a "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area. Players matching any two of the four symbols in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area will win the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE." "WITCHES BREW BONUS" is played separately.
- (d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (e) Pick Your Potion tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Pick Your Potion ticket. The ticket

shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

- (g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Pick Your Potion ticket and select the Pick Your Potion option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
  - 5. Pick Your Potion ticket characteristics:
- (a) Pick Your Potion tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Pick Your Potion tickets will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR) and 25 (TWYFIV). The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area, are: Web symbol, Eyeball symbol, Skull symbol, Cat symbol, Crescent Moon symbol, Ghost symbol, Pumpkin symbol and a Bats symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: \$2.00 (TWO DOL), \$4.00 (FOR DOL), \$5.00 (FIV DOL), \$10.00 (TEN DOL), \$25.00 (TWY FIV), \$50.00 (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN) and \$13,000 (THRTNTHO). The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area, are: \$2.00 (TWO DOL), \$4.00 (FOR DOL), \$5.00 (FIV DOL), \$10.00 (TEN DOL), \$25.00 (TWY FIV), \$50.00 (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN) and \$200 (TWO HUN).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$25, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500 and \$13,000. The prizes that can be won in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area, are: \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$25, \$50, \$100 and \$200. A player can win up to ten times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Pick Your Potion lottery game.
- 6. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a faBOOlous Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Pick Your Potion lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9.
- 7. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Pick Your Potion prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$13,000 (THRTNTHO) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$13,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.

- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the matching number is a 13 (THRTN) and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$300.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the matching number is a 13 (THRTN) and a prize symbol of \$50<sup>.00</sup> (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the matching number is a 13 (THRTN) and a prize symbol of \$25.00 (TWY FIV) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$75.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (l) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of  $\$50^{.00}$  (FIFTY) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the matching number is a 13 (THRTN) and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$25.00 (TWY FIV) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$25.

- (o) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of \$25.00 (TWY FIV) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$25.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the matching number is a 13 (THRTN) and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the matching number is a 13 (THRTN) and a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$12.
- (r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (s) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (t) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, the matching number is a 13 (THRTN) and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$6
- (u) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (v) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (w) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$4<sup>.00</sup> (FOR DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- (x) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- (y) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.

(z) Holders of tickets upon which two matching symbols appear in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS" area and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "WITCHES BREW BONUS PRIZE" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.

- (4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5171 The Addams Family (\$5) = five entries, PA-5172 Pick Your Potion (\$2) = two entries and PA-5173 Winning Web (\$1) = one entry.
- (5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.
- (d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:
- (1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(e) or mentioned anywhere else in these rules.
- (2) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(c)(2).
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.

- (ii) The second entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.

- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.
- (4) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole

judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.

- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.
- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.
- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).

- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
  - 11. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
  - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
  - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
  - 12. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
  - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
  - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 13. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

- 14. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 15. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.
  - 16. Governing law:
- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Pick Your Potion lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
  - 17. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 18. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Pick Your Potion lottery game tickets.
- 19. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win

- 20. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Pick Your Potion or through normal communications
- 21. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Pick Your Potion lottery game announced in this notice.

### Pennsylvania Winning Web Fast Play Game 5173

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101-3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. Name: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Winning Web (hereinafter "Winning Web"). The game number is PA-5173.
  - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (f) Play: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (g) Play Area: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) Play Symbol: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) Prize: A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUM-BERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(k) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

- (l) 8-LEGGED BONUS: The area on a Winning Web ticket containing Spider play symbols that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player wins a prize. "8-LEGGED BONUS" is played separately.
- (m) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a
  - 3. *Price*: The price of a Winning Web ticket is \$1.
- 4. Description of the Winning Web Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Winning Web lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Winning Web tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Winning Web is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player correctly matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Winning Web tickets contain an "8-LEGGED BO-NUS" area. When three Spider symbols appear in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, the player wins a prize of \$8 instantly. The "8-LEGGED BONUS" is played separately.
- (d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (e) Winning Web tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Winning Web ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Winning Web ticket and select the Winning Web option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
  - 5. Winning Web ticket characteristics:
- (a) Winning Web tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Winning Web tickets will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area and an "8-LEGGED BONUS" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16

(SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR) and 25 (TWYFIV). The play symbol located in the "8-LEGGED BONUS" area is a Spider symbol.

- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: FREE (TICKET),  $\$1^{.00}$  (ONE DOL),  $\$2^{.00}$  (TWO DOL),  $\$3^{.00}$  (THR DOL),  $\$5^{.00}$  (FIV DOL),  $\$8^{.00}$  (EGT DOL),  $\$10^{.00}$  (TEN DOL),  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY),  $\$30^{.00}$  (THIRTY),  $\$50^{.00}$  (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$300 (THR HUN) and \$1,300 (THRTNHUN).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: Free \$1 Ticket, \$1, \$2, \$3, \$5, \$8, \$10, \$20, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$300 and \$1,300. The prize that can be won in the "8-LEGGED BONUS" is \$8. A player can win up to seven times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Winning Web lottery game.
- 6. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a faBOOlous Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Winning Web lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9.
- 7. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Winning Web prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,300 (THRTNHUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,300.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$300 (THR HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$300.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which three Spider symbols appear in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$8.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$8.00 (EGT DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$8.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (l) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$3.00 (THR DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$3.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$1^{.00}$  (ONE DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.
- (o) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one Winning Web Fast Play Game Ticket.
- 8. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.
- (4) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical

- errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.
- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.
- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).
- (12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.
- (13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.
- (14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 9(d)(4). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's Lottery account.
  - (15) Prizes are not transferrable.
  - (16) Other restrictions may apply.
  - 10. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

11. Ticket validation and requirements:

- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
  - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
  - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
  - 12. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
  - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
  - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

- 13. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 14. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 15. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.
  - 16. Governing law:
- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Winning Web lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
  - 17. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 18. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Winning Web lottery game tickets.
- 19. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a

- winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 20. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Winning Web or through normal communications methods.
- 21. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Winning Web lottery game announced in this notice.

Chronic Wasting Disease—Designation of Disease Management Areas and Endemic States and Canadian Provinces Order # 12

#### **Executive Order**

Whereas, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is an infectious and progressive neurological disease that is found in, and always proves fatal to, members of the family Cervidae (deer, elk or moose, and other susceptible species, collectively called cervids); and

Whereas, There are no known treatments for CWD infection, no vaccines to protect against CWD infection, and no approved tests that can detect the presence of CWD in live cervids; and

Whereas, CWD is designated as a "dangerous transmissible disease" of animals by order of the Secretary of Agriculture under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d) (relating to dangerous transmissible diseases); and

Whereas, The Game and Wildlife Code (Code) (34 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder (58 Pa. Code §§ 131.1 et seq.) collectively provide broad authority to the PGC to regulate activities relating to the protection, preservation, and management of game and wildlife, including cervids; and

Whereas, On March 28, 2017 (effective May 16, 2017), the Commission added 58 Pa. Code § 137.35 (relating to Chronic Wasting Disease Restrictions) to give more permanent status and structure to the CWD requirements and restrictions previously established and maintained over the prior decade by and through executive orders; and

Whereas, Section 137.35(d) provides the Executive Director with the authority to designate CWD Disease Management Areas (DMAs) and Established Areas (EAs) within this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, Previous executive orders concerning designation of CWD DMAs and EAs within this Commonwealth were issued by the Commission on June 1, 2017, July 24, 2017, October 6, 2017, February 16, 2018, May 21, 2018, October 22, 2018, June 17, 2019, June 2, 2020, May 28, 2021, October 21, 2021 and April 5, 2022; and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that further designations of CWD DMAs and EAs are required to implement necessary updates to the Commission's CWD program.

Now Therefore, I, BRYAN J. BURHANS, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, pursu-

ant to the authority vested in me by the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder, do hereby order and direct the following:

1. DMAs within this Commonwealth are designated as set forth below. These DMAs are more graphically illustrated on the maps titled "DMA 2," "DMA 3," "DMA 4," "DMA 5," "DMA 6," "DMA 7," and "DMA OVERVIEW" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundaries and maps of DMA 2, DMA 3, DMA 4, DMA 5, DMA 6, DMA 7 and DMA OVERVIEW, the written descriptions shall prevail.

#### a. DMA 1: Eliminated.

b. DMA 2: Adams, Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Centre, Clearfield, Cumberland, Dauphin, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon, Indiana, Juniata, Mifflin, Northumberland, Perry, Snyder, Somerset, Union, Westmoreland and York counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the Southeastern extent of the DMA at the intersection of Taneytown Road (State Highway 134) and the Maryland State Line, proceed north on Highway 134 for approximately 4 miles to the intersection of US Highway 15. Follow US Highway 15 north for 36.4 miles, crossing PA-581 where it becomes US-11. Follow US-11 2.4 miles to the point it meets the west shore of the Susquehanna River at Front Street. Follow the Susquehanna River north for approximately 15.1 miles to US Highway 22. Turn right onto US Highway 22 east for 0.2 miles, then exit to State Highway 147 towards Halifax. Follow State Highway 147 for 7.5 miles to the intersection with State Highway 225 in Halifax. Follow State Highway 255 for 33.1 miles to State Highway 890 in Treverton. Follow State Highway 890 north for 9.0 miles to State Highway 61 near Sunbury. Turn left on State Highway 61, proceed west for 1.7 miles to the Susquehanna River at a point abeam to State Highway 61. The boundary follows the Susquehanna River north for approximately 9 miles to the river bridge (State Highway 45) in Lewisburg. Continue west on State Highway 45 for approximately 45.6 miles to the intersection of State Highway 144 in Old Fort. The DMA boundary follows State Highway 144 south for approximately 3.8 miles to the intersection of US Highway 322 in Potters Mills. Proceed west on US 322 for approximately 17 miles, merging onto Interstate 99 and continuing west along Interstate 99 for approximately 7.2 miles to Exit 62 and returning to US Highway 322. Proceed along US 322 for another 10.9 miles to the intersection with State Highway 504 in Phillipsburg. Turn left on State Highway 504 and follow 0.6 miles west to State Highway 53. Continue west on State Highway 53 for 9.5 miles to the intersection of Route 153 in Houtzdale. The DMA boundary follows Route 153 south for 5.9 miles to the intersection of State Highway 253 (Viola Pike) and then left on Route 253 for 8.6 miles to the intersection of State Highway 53 in Van Ormer. Continue left on State Highway 53 for 1.7 miles to the intersection of Marina Road. Continue west on Marina Road for 5.5 miles where the road becomes Glendale Lake Road. Continue on Glendale Lake Road for 3 miles to the intersection with State Highway 36. Follow State Highway 36 west for .5 miles into the town of Patton. The DMA boundary follows right on State Highway 36 south for 3.5 miles to Bridge Street. Turn left on Bridge Street and follow west for 1.6 miles to the intersection of Spangler Street. Follow Spangler Street south for .9 miles to the intersection of Municipal Road. Turn right on Municipal Road and follow for 3.6 miles west to the intersection of US Highway 219 (Crawford Avenue) in Northern Cambria. Follow US Highway 219 south for

1.3 miles to the intersection of State Highway 271. Follow State Highway 271 south for 2.8 miles to the intersection of State Highway 553 near Nicktown. Follow State Highway 553 west for 6.9 miles to the intersection of State Highway 403 near Heilwood. Continue south on State Highway 403 for 15.8 miles to the intersection of US Highway 22. The boundary follows US Highway 22 west for 14 miles to the intersection of State Highway 217 South in Blairsville. Follow State Highway 217 South for 12.5 miles to the intersection of US Highway 30. Follow US Highway 30 east for 21.3 miles to intersection of US Highway 219. Finally, south along State Highway 219 for 32.6 miles to the Maryland border at the place of beginning.

c. DMA 3: Armstrong, Cambria, Clarion, Clearfield, Elk, Indiana and Jefferson counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the southernmost point at the intersection of State Highway 403 and State Highway 286 in the town of Clymer, proceed east on State Highway 286 for 4.9 miles to State Highway 240. Follow in State Highway 240 east for 8.5 miles to the intersection of US Highway 219. Follow US Highway 219 north for 2.4 miles to Sylvis Road. Follow Sylvis Road east for 5.8 miles to the intersection of State Highway 36. Follow State Highway 36 east for 8.8 miles to the intersection of La Jose Road (SR-3016) in Newburg. Follow La Jose Road east for 3.6 miles becoming Cherry Corner Road (SR-3005) for another .3 mile to the intersection of Marron Road (SR-3016). Turn left onto Marron Road and follow northeast for 2.7 miles to the intersection of State Road 729. Follow State Road 729 east for .9 miles to the intersection of Old Station Road. Follow Old Station Road (SR-2012) east for 2.4 miles to the intersection of Douglas Road (SR-3007). Continue east on Douglas Road for .3 miles to the intersection of Zion Road (SR-2012) near New Millport. Follow Zion Road east for 4.5 miles to the intersection of Faunce Road (SR-2012). Turn right and follow Faunce Road east for 3.1 miles becoming Sanborn Road (SR-2012) in Woodward Township. Continue east on Sanborn Road for 2.5 miles to the intersection of State Highway 153. Follow State Highway 153 north for 5 miles to the intersection of Valley Road (SR-2027). Follow Valley Road north for 2.1 miles becoming Hogback Hill Road (SR-2027). Continue north on Hogback Hill Road for 1 mile to the intersection of Main Street in Mineral Springs. Turn right on Main Street for .2 miles to the intersection of Bigler Cutoff Road. Turn left on Bigler Cutoff Road for .1 miles to the intersection of US Highway 322. Follow US Highway 322 east for .7 miles to the intersection of State Highway 970. Follow State Highway 970 north for 1.5 miles to the intersection of Interstate Highway 80. Follow I-80 west for 26.4 miles to the exit for State Highway 219 north. Follow State Highway 219 north for 21.2 miles to Boot Jack becoming State Route 948. Follow State Route 948 for 4.2 miles to the Clarion River in Ridgway. Follow the Clarion River for 28.3 miles to Bridge Road. Continue south on Bridge Road for 0.05 mile to the intersection of State Highway 949. Turn right on State Highway 949 and continue west for 16.3 miles to the intersection of US Highway 322 in Corsica. Follow US Highway 322 east for 0.3 miles to the intersection of State Highway 949. Follow State Highway 949 south for 4.2 miles to the intersection of State Highway 28. Follow State Highway 28 south for 13.2 miles to the intersection of State Highway 839 in New Bethlehem. Follow State Highway 839 south for 21 miles to State Highway 85. Follow State Highway 85 south for 11.7 miles to the intersection of US Highway 119 in the town of Home. Turn left on US Highway 119

and follow 3.4 miles to the intersection of State Highway 403 in Marion Center. Follow State Highway 403 south for 8.5 miles to Clymer at the place of beginning.

d. DMA 4: Lancaster, Lebanon and Berks Counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the northwestern extent of the DMA in the city of Lebanon, at the intersection of state Route 897 and U.S. Route 422, proceed east on U.S. Route 422 for 12.3 miles to state Route 419. Turn left on state Route 419 and proceed north for 2.3 miles to Christmas Village Road (state Route 4010). Turn right, proceeding east on Christmas Village Road for 5.1 miles to North Heidelberg Road (state Route 3033). Turn left on North Heidelberg Road, proceeding northeast for 0.6 miles to state Route 183. Turn right on state Route 183, proceeding southeast for 7.7 miles to the U.S. 222. Turn right on U.S. 222 proceeding southwest for 3.2 miles to the interchange with U.S. Route 422 Bypass. Proceed on U.S. Route 422 Bypass for 2.4 miles to intersection with Business Route 222E (Lancaster Avenue). Proceed south on Business 222E for 0.6 miles to the intersection with state Route 625. Turn left onto state Route 625 and proceed south for 16.7 miles to the intersection with Route 23. Turn right onto Route 23 for 0.3 miles to the intersection with state Route 897. Turn left on State Route 897, proceeding south for 0.6 miles to the intersection with U.S. Route 322 (28th Division Highway). Turn left, proceeding east for 0.1 miles to the intersection with State Route 897 (Spring Valley Road). Turn right on State Route 897, proceeding south for 4.2 miles to the intersection with Seldomridge Road (T-513). Turn left, proceeding east for 1.8 miles to the intersection with Cambridge Road (T-907). Turn right on Cambridge Road, proceeding 1.6 miles to the intersection with State Route 340 (Old Philadelphia Pike). Turn right on State Route 340, proceeding 0.4 miles to the intersection with State Route 897 (White Horse Road). Turn left on State Route 897, proceeding 4.0 miles south to the intersection with U.S. Route 30. Turn right on U.S. Route 30, proceeding west for 0.3 miles to the intersection with State Route 41 (Newport Pike). Turn left on State Route 41, proceeding 3.0 miles south to a point abeam State Route 41. The boundary proceeds south along the Chester/Lancaster County border of Pine Creek for 0.9 miles. Pine Creek merges with the East Branch Octoraro Creek and proceeds south along the Chester/ Lancaster County border for 18.2 miles. The East Branch Octoraro Creek merges with the Octoraro Creek and proceeds south along the Chester/Lancaster County border for 13.1 miles to the intersection with the Maryland state line. The DMA boundary then follows the Maryland border for 4.7 miles to the shoreline of the Susquehanna River. Proceed north along the Susquehanna River shorelines for 26.0 miles to a point abeam State Route 999. Turn right on State Route 999 proceeding east for 7.0 miles to State Route 741 (Rohrerstown Road). Turn left on State Route 741, proceeding north for 3.6 miles to U.S. Route 30 (Lincoln Highway) interchange. Turn right on U.S. Route 30, proceeding east for 2.4 miles to State Route 4011 (Fruitville Pike). Turn left on State Route 4011, proceeding north for 6.7 miles to State Route 772 (Orange Street). Turn right on State Route 772, proceeding east for 3.6 miles to State Route 501. Turn left on state Route 501 in Lititz, proceeding northerly for 5 miles to the intersection with U.S. Route 322 (West 28th Division Highway). Turn left on U.S. Route 322, proceeding westerly for 1.3 miles to the Pennsylvania Turnpike (U.S. Route 76). Move right along U.S. Route 76, proceeding east for 0.7 miles to the western boundary of State Game Lands 46. Proceed north, then east for 1.2 miles along the game lands boundary to state Route 501

(Furnace Hills Pike). Turn left on state Route 501, proceeding north for 4.1 miles to the intersection with state Route 419. Turn left, proceeding west for 0.1 miles to state Route 897 (South 5th Street). Turn right on state Route 897, proceeding northwest for 6.2 miles to the starting point at the intersection of state Route 897 and U.S. Route 422 at the place of beginning.


- e. DMA 5: Warren County, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the northeastern extent of the DMA at the New York State Line, at the intersection of the Allegheny River, proceed south on the west shore of the river for 27.8 miles to the bridge at Pennsylvania Ave East (Business U.S. Route 6). Turn left on Pennsylvania Ave East and proceed south for 0.1 mile to U.S. Route 6. Turn right, proceeding west on U.S. Route 6 for 11.6 miles to West Main St (State Route 27) at Youngsville. Turn sharp right on West Main St, proceeding northeast for 0.5 mile to State Route 27 (Matthews Run Road). Turn left on State Route 27, proceeding north for 7.2 mile to the intersection of State Route 69 (Jackson Run Road). Turn left on state Route 69 proceeding north for 3 miles to the intersection of State Route 957 (Main St) in Sugar Grove. Turn right on State Route 957, proceeding east for 0.2 miles to Jamestown Street. Turn slight left on Jamestown Street, proceeding north for 0.7 miles to where Jamestown Street becomes Busti Road. Continue north for 1 mile to the New York border. The boundary follows east along the border for 18.1 miles to the Allegheny River at the place of beginning.
- f. DMA 6: Clearfield, Elk, and Jefferson Counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the northeast corner at the intersection of Chicken Hill Road and State Route 948 in the town of Kersey, proceed south on Chicken Hill Road for 0.9 mile becoming South Kersey Road. Follow South Kersey Road south for 1.4 miles. Continue straight onto Boone Mountain Road for 6.5 miles to the intersection with State Route 153. Turn left onto State Route 153 and continue south 4.9 miles to State Route 255. Turn right on State Route 255 and continue south for 9.5 miles to Interstate Highway 80. Turn right on Interstate Highway 80 and continue west 4.4 miles to State Highway 219. Turn right on State Route 948. Turn right on State Route 948 and proceed east for 5.3 miles to Kersey at the place of beginning.
- g. DMA 7: Columbia, Lycoming, Montour, Northumberland, and Sullivan Counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the northwest corner at the intersection of State Route 15 and State Route 14 in the town of Trout Run, proceed north on State Route 14 for 4.5 miles to the intersection with Field Station Road. Turn right onto Field Station Road and continue southeast for 2.3 miles to intersection with Old Cemetery Road and Beech Valley Road. Turn left onto Beech Valley Road and continue southeast for 0.9 miles merging onto Calvert Road, then turning left onto Southard Road. Continue east for 2.5 miles on Southard Road to intersection with Wallis Run Road. Merging straight onto Wallis Run Road, continue east for 7.6 miles along Wallis Run Road to the town of Proctor. At Proctor, merge onto Hoppestown Road and continue northeast for 5.9 miles along Hoppestown Road to the intersection with State Route 87 at Hillsgrove. Turn right on State Route 87 and continue south for 2.4 miles to the town of Ogdonia. At Ogdonia, turn left onto Ogdonia Road and continue south for 3.0 miles to intersection with Brunnerdale Road and Loyalsock Trail Road. Turn right and continue south for 6.6 miles following Loyalsock Trail Road, becoming Route 3005 and then Deer Lake Road/Route 2083 to intersection


with State Route 220. At intersection with State Route 220, turn left and continue east along Route 220 for 5.6 miles to Beech Glen. Turn right onto State route 42 and continue south for 17.1 miles to Millville. Turn right onto State Route 254 and continue southwest for 3.5 miles to Jerseytown. Turn right onto State Route 44 and continue west for 10.8 miles to Turbotville. At Turbotville, merge onto State Route 54 and continue northwest for 10.9 miles through Montgomery to intersection with State Route 15. Turn right onto State Route 15 and continue northwest for 6.5 miles to intersection with Interstate 180 at Williamsport. Continue west on Interstate 180, returning to State Route 15 at Exit 29 and continuing north on State Route 15 for 12.7 miles to Trout Run and the place of beginning.


- 2. Established areas within this Commonwealth are designated as set forth below. The sole EA is more graphically illustrated on the map titled "Established Area In DMA 2" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundary and map of "Established Area In DMA 2", the written descriptions shall prevail.
- a. Established Area in DMA 2: Bedford, Blair, Franklin, Fulton, and Huntingdon counties, bounded and described as follows: Beginning in the Southeastern extent of the Established Area at the intersection of State Highway 75 and the Maryland State Line, proceed north on Highway 75 for approximately 13.9 miles to the intersection of US Highway 30. Follow US Highway 30 west 7.8 miles to US Highway 522 just north of McConnellsburg. Follow US Highway 522 north 37.5 miles to US Highway 22. The Established Area boundary follows US 22 west for approximately 42.4 miles to the intersection of Old Route 22 in Duncansville. Follow Old Route 22 west for approximately 2 miles to the intersection of Valley Forge Road. Turn left onto Valley Forge Road for approximately 3.4 miles to the Poplar Run Road. Follow left on Poplar Run Road for approximately 0.5 miles to Knob Run Road. Turn right on Knob Run Road for 4.3 miles where the road becomes Knob Road. Continue on Knob Road for 3.4 miles to the Bedford/Blair County Line, where the road becomes Blue Knob Road. Continue south on Blue Knob Road for approximately 1 mile to Blue Knob State Park. Continue south through Blue Knob State Park on State Forest Road for 3.5 miles where the road becomes Pavia Road. Follow Pavia Road 0.25 miles to the intersection with State Highway 869. Follow State Highway 869 for 3.4 miles to State Highway 96. Follow State Highway 96 south for 14.4 miles to US Highway 30 in Schellsburg. Follow US Highway 30 east 4.75 miles to the intersection of State Highway 31. Follow US Highway 31 south for 3.4 miles to the intersection of State Highway 96 in Manns Choice. Finally, follow State Highway 96 south for 22.25 miles to the Maryland border at the place of beginning.
- 3. The previous executive order concerning designation of CWD DMAs and CWD-endemic States and Canadian Provinces within this Commonwealth that was issued by the Commission on April 5, 2022 and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on April 16, 2022 at 52 Pa.B. 2320 is hereby rescinded in its entirety and replaced by this Order.
- 4. This Order is effective immediately and shall remain in effect until rescinded or modified by subsequent order.

# 1332 Waiver Reinsurance Program—Program Parameters; Notice 2022-12

On July 24, 2020, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, a division of the United States Department of Health and Human Services, and the United States Department of the Treasury, approved the Insurance Department's 1332 Waiver Application. The approval is effective for a waiver period from January 1, 2021, through December 31, 2025, with a provision for a possible extension at the end of the initial term.

The reinsurance program is a claims-based, attachment point reinsurance program that will reimburse health insurers for claims costs of qualifying Affordable Care Act-compliant individual enrollees, where a percentage of the claims costs exceeding a specified threshold (attachment point) and up to a specified ceiling (reinsurance cap) will be reimbursed. Beginning January 1, 2023, and slightly adjusted from the parameters in Notice 2022-07

published at 52 Pa.B. 3181 (May 28, 2022) the program-adopted parameters have been updated to an attachment point of \$60,000, a cap of \$100,000 and a coinsurance rate of 53%.
