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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The Pennsylvania Bulletin is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The Pennsylvania Bulletin serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the Pennsylvania Code, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

The following documents are published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, Pennsylvania Bulletin, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The Pennsylvania Bulletin is the temporary supplement to the Pennsylva*nia Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the Pennsylvania Code Reporter, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 Pennsylvania Code § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the Pennsylvania Code codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the Pennsylvania Code. The Pennsylvania Code is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of Pennsylvania Code Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

A chronological table of the history of Pennsylvania Code sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the Pennsylvania Bulle*tin* in which the change occurred.

Court Rules in Titles 201–246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

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Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the [Legislative Reference] Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. CHAPTER 200. BUSINESS OF COURTS

Rule 242. Citation of Authorities.

Citation of authorities in matters subject to these rules shall be in accordance with Pa.R.A.P. 126.

Note: See also 210 Pa. Code § 65.37 and *Wenk v. State Farm Fire and Casualty Co.*, 228 A.3d 540, 552 n.11 (Pa. Super. 2020) for citing to non-precedential decisions of the Superior Court; and Pa.R.A.P. 3716 and 210 Pa. Code § 69.414 for citing to non-precedential decisions of the Commonwealth Court.

CIVIL PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE ADOPTION REPORT

Adoption of Pa.R.Civ.P. 242

On January 5, 2022, the Supreme Court adopted Pennsylvania Rule of Civil Procedure 242 governing the citation of authorities in the trial courts. The Civil

Procedural Rules Committee has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. See Pa.R.J.A. 103, Comment. The statements contained herein are those of the Committee, not the Court.

The Committee received a request to consider procedures permitting the citation of non-precedential appellate court decisions for their persuasive value in the courts of common pleas. The request noted the recent adoption of Pennsylvania Rule of Appellate Procedure 126 permitting such citation in the appellate courts. The request also advocated that permitting citation to these decisions would provide significant benefits to the bench and bar such as:

• promoting consistency among the trial courts on routine issues, as well as a more informed analysis on controversial issues;

• providing the trial courts with more guidance about the current state of the law, which in turn should bring more predictability in resolving all civil matters as well as more efficiency and cost-effectiveness for parties and the courts;

• allowing the use of similar fact patterns or legal analyses to support or refute a position;

• allowing the citation of opinions that may be more illustrative and more current than binding precedent; and

• retaining the trial court's discretion to give appropriate weight to these decisions as persuasive value.

At the outset of its review, the Committee observed that the current Rules of Civil Procedure are silent as to the citation of authorities in the trial courts; there is likewise no prohibition to the citation of non-precedential appellate court decisions. In the absence of any prohibition, it is assumed these decisions may be cited.

The Committee examined Pa.R.A.P. 126, as well as the restrictions imposed by the intermediate appellate courts for citing to each court's respective non-precedential decisions for their persuasive value. *See* 210 Pa. Code § 65.37 regarding citation to Superior Court non-precedential decisions and Pa.R.A.P. 3716 and 210 Pa. Code § 414 regarding citation to Commonwealth Court non-precedential decisions.

The Committee noted at that Pa.R.A.P. 126 establishes an overarching temporal limitation to citation of these decisions - citation is permitted for non-precedential appellate decisions issued after January 14, 2008 for Commonwealth Court decisions, and after May 1, 2019 for Superior Court decisions. They may be cited only for their persuasive value unless related to the doctrine of the law of the case, res judicata, collateral estoppel, or if relevant to a criminal proceeding because it recites issues raised and reasons for a decision affecting the same defendant in a prior proceeding. In addition, the internal operating procedures (I.O.P.s) and other intermediate appellate court-specific rules add an additional layer to the parameters for citation of non-precedential appellate decisions. Yet, the permissibility and parameters are located exclusively within appellate authority, which trial court practitioners and judges may not intuitively consult for proceedings in the courts of common pleas.

Given the complexity to the limitations required generally by Pa.R.A.P. 126 and the overlay of the intermediate appellate courts' I.O.P.s, the Committee proposed Rule 242 so that it does not disturb these carefully constructed parameters for citation of authorities in appellate practice. Rather, the rule incorporates by reference Pa.R.A.P. 126 and cross references the I.O.P.s. In doing so, the rule alerts both jurists and practitioners to consult the Rules of Appellate Procedure and intermediate appellate court I.O.P.s for existing limitations, provides the benefits of a rule expressly authorizing such citation, and provides instant, continued uniformity with appellate practice should those rules or I.O.P.s ever be amended in the future.

The Committee published proposed Rule 242 for comment. See 51 Pa.B. 1002 (February 27, 2021). The Committee received one comment to publication in support of the proposal.

In sum, new Rule 242 makes explicit the assumption that non-precedential appellate court decisions may be cited in the trial courts. However, respectful of the limitations the intermediate appellate courts have placed on the citation of their decisions, Rule 242 incorporates Pa.R.A.P. 126 and cross references the I.O.P.s for the specific requirements when citing to non-precedential appellate court decisions for their persuasive value in the trial courts. A note to the rule is intended to inform practitioners of the Superior Court and Commonwealth Court operating procedures.

The rule becomes effective April 1, 2022.

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART II. ORPHANS' COURT RULES

CHAPTER 1. PRELIMINARY RULES

Rule 1.3. Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in these Rules shall have the following meanings, respectively, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise or the particular word or phrase is expressly defined in the Chapter in which the particular Rule is included:

*

"Guardian *ad litem* or Trustee *ad litem*"—a fiduciary who is appointed by a court in a legal proceeding to represent an individual or class of individuals under a legal disability;

"Hearing Officer"—a person who is appointed by the court to investigate any issue of fact and to report findings of fact, conclusions of law, and recommendations to the court. A hearing officer shall include any person now or formerly referred to as a master by rule of court or statute;

"Incapacitated Person"—a person determined to be incapacitated under the provisions of Chapter 55 of Title 20 (relating to incapacitated persons);

* * *

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: This definitional section is new; but, some of the definitions are substantively identical to the definitions in former Rule 2.3 and other definitions are taken from and are similar to Pa.R.Civ.P. No. 76. <u>The</u> <u>term "hearing officer" is used in these Rules in the</u> <u>same manner as "master" in the Probate, Estates</u> and Fiduciaries Code, 20 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 *et seq. See*, *e.g.*, 20 Pa.C.S. § 751(1).

CHAPTER II. ACCOUNTS, OBJECTIONS AND DISTRIBUTIONS

Rule 2.11. Appointment of Official Examiners.

The court, by local rule or order in a particular matter, may appoint an official examiner who shall examine the assets held by or the transactions of any fiduciary.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 2.11 is substantively identical to former Rule 9.1. The appointment and conduct of Auditors and [Masters] <u>Hearing Officers</u> is provided for in Chapter IX.

CHAPTER IX. AUDITORS AND [MASTERS] HEARING OFFICERS

Rule 9.1. Notice of Hearings.

An auditor or **[master]** <u>hearing officer</u> appointed pursuant to 20 Pa.C.S. § 751 shall give notice of scheduled hearings in such manner and to such parties as local rules shall prescribe.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 9.1 is substantively identical to former Rule 8.1.

Rule 9.2. Filing of Report.

An auditor or **[master]** hearing officer shall file his or her report within 90 days after his or her appointment, unless the court extends the time upon request.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 9.2 is based upon former Rule 8.2.

Rule 9.4. Form of [Master's] <u>Hearing Officer's</u> Report.

A **[master's]** <u>hearing officer's</u> report shall state the number, times, dates, and duration of the hearings held, the number, extent, and causes of any delays or continuances, and the basis of the court's jurisdiction, and shall include a statement and discussion of the questions involved, findings of fact and conclusions of law, and specific recommendations.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 9.4 is <u>substantively</u> identical to former Rule 8.4.

Rule 9.5. Transcript of Testimony.

The transcript of testimony taken before an auditor or **[master] hearing officer** shall be filed with the report.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 9.5 is <u>substantively</u> identical to former Rule 8.5.

Rule 9.6. Notice of Filing Report.

An auditor or **[master]** hearing officer shall give notice of the filing of the report or of the intention to file the report in such manner and to such parties as local rules shall prescribe.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 9.6 is <u>substantively</u> identical to former Rule 8.6.

Rule 9.7. Confirmation of Report.

(a) The report of an auditor shall be confirmed in such manner as local rules shall prescribe.

(b) The report of a **[master]** hearing officer shall not be approved until a decree is entered adopting its recommendations.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 9.7 is <u>substantively</u> identical to former Rule 8.7.

Rule 9.8. Security for Expenses and Fees.

An auditor or **[master]** <u>hearing officer</u>, the accountant, or any interested party may apply to the court at any time for leave to require security for the payment of the auditor's or **[master's]** <u>hearing officer's</u> expenses and fees, and, when such leave is granted, the auditor or **[master]** <u>hearing officer</u> may decline to proceed until security is entered.

[*Note*] <u>Comment</u>: Rule 9.8 is substantively identical to former Rule 8.8.

ORPHANS' COURT PROCEDURAL RULES COMMITTEE ADOPTION REPORT

Amendment of Pa.R.O.C.P. 1.3, 2.11, 9.1, 9.2, 9.4, 9.5, 9.6, 9.7, and 9.8

On January 6, 2022, the Supreme Court amended Pennsylvania Rules of Orphans' Court Procedure 1.3, 2.11, 9.1, 9.2, 9.4, 9.5, 9.6, 9.7, and 9.8, replacing the term "master" with "hearing officer." The Orphans' Court Procedural Rules Committee has prepared this Adoption Report describing the rulemaking process as it relates to these Rule amendments. An Adoption Report should not be confused with Comments to the rules. *See* Pa.R.J.A. 103, Comment. The statements contained herein are those of the Committee, not the Court.

The purpose of the amendments is two-fold. First, while the term "master" has traditionally identified a quasijudicial officer and is considered neutral in legal proceedings, a pejorative connotation has been ascribed to the term in modern parlance outside of court. The term has been used in the procedural rules and statutorily in both state and federal systems and is firmly rooted in the judicial process. However, the term has racially divisive and offensive connotations, as well.

Second, the term has been either already replaced or proposed to be replaced in other bodies of rules. See 47 Pa.B. 2313 (April 22, 2017) (amendments to the Rules of Juvenile Court Procedure); 51 Pa.B. 6764 (October 30, 2021) (amendments to the Rules of Civil Procedure governing domestic relations proceedings); and 51 Pa.B. 4262 (August 7, 2021) (proposed amendments to the Rules of Civil Procedure). In addition, the Committee observes that a number of judicial districts have also changed this terminology in their local rules.

The term "master" continues to be used in relevant statutes. Finally, the amendments to Rules 2.11, 9.1, 9.2, 9.4, 9.5, 9.6, 9.7, and 9.8, replace the term "master" with "hearing officer" throughout the Rules.

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF VEHICLE MANUFACTURERS, DEALERS AND SALESPERSONS [49 PA. CODE CH. 19]

Dealer Participation Fee

The State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons (Board) amends § 19.4 (relating to fees) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

The amendment will be effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 332.1(c) of the Board of Vehicles Act (act) (63 P.S. § 818.332a(c)), as amended under the act of October 24, 2018 (P.L. 816, No. 134), regarding recreational vehicle shows, recreational vehicle off-premise sales, recreational vehicle exhibitions and recreational vehicle rallies, requires an out-of-State recreational vehicle dealer to register with the Board before participating in a recreational vehicle show, off-premise sale, exhibition or rally in this Commonwealth. Section 332.1(c)(1)(v) of the act requires the registration to include payment of a participation fee.

Section 302(a)(9) of the act (63 P.S. § 818.302(a)(9)), regarding powers and duties of the Board, authorizes the Board to promulgate regulations, consistent with the act, that it deems necessary and proper to effectuate the provisions of the act. Additionally, under section 330(a) of the act (63 P.S. § 818.330(a)), regarding fees, the Board must set fees required under the provisions of the act by regulation.

Background and Need for the Amendment

Section 332.1(c) of the act permits recreational vehicle dealers licensed in another state or domiciled in another jurisdiction that does not require licensure of recreational vehicle dealers to participate in recreational vehicle shows, off-premise sales, exhibitions and rallies in this Commonwealth under certain circumstances and requires the out-of-State recreational vehicle dealer to register with the Board. Since this provision became effective, the Board has been receiving, reviewing and accepting these registration applications for each event in which an out-of-State recreational vehicle dealer intends to participate without charging a participation fee for this service.

Section 332.1(c)(7) of the act requires the out-of-State recreational vehicle dealer to engage in at least four of five business activities in a state that is contiguous to this Commonwealth. Those activities include: (1) accepting delivery of recreational vehicles from the manufacturer; (2) maintaining of inventory offered for sale to the public; (3) consummating and finalizing recreational vehicle sales; (4) service and repair of recreational vehicles; and (5) delivery of recreational vehicles to buyers along with titling, registration and collection of taxes. Section 318 of the act (63 P.S. § 818.318) also authorizes the Board to take disciplinary action against recreational vehicle dealers for violations of these provisions.

Before the act was amended in 2008 under the act of October 8, 2008 (P.L. 1086, No. 90) (Act 90), recreational vehicle dealers from states that did not provide for reciprocity with this Commonwealth would set up "shell" dealerships in contiguous states with reciprocity for the sole intent of participating in shows and other sales events in this Commonwealth. Many contiguous states did not have facility requirements for a recreational vehicle dealership. Consumers in this Commonwealth were led to believe they were buying from a full-service dealership in a contiguous state. However, the actual dealership and facilities necessary to pick up the recreational vehicle, and later service the recreational vehicle, may have been far beyond the borders of this Commonwealth.

The requirements mandated under section 332.1(c) of the act require expenditure of staff time to evaluate the applications for registration and ensure that reasonable protections are in place for consumers in this Commonwealth. To cover the cost of providing this service, the Board's regulations add a participation fee of \$65. Currently, the Board processes these applications without collecting a participation fee. The purpose of this finalform rulemaking is to set a participation fee for out-of-State recreation vehicle dealer registrations.

Summary of Comments to the Proposed Rulemaking and the Board's Response

Comments from the public

There were no comments received from the public.

Comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC)

There were no comments received from the HPLC.

Comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC)

Under section 332.1(c) of the act, an out-of-State recreational vehicle dealer must register with the Board before participating in a recreational vehicle show, off-premise sale, exhibition or rally. The language of the act states that the registration must include payment of a "participation fee." To be consistent with the terminology in the act, IRRC recommended that the Board replace "registration" with "participation" in the regulation. As a result of IRRC's comments, the Board revises § 19.4 from "out-of-State recreation vehicle dealer registration" to "out-of-State recreation vehicle dealer participation fee," consistent with the wording of section 332.1(c) of the act.

IRRC commented that Act 90 established the requirements for recreational vehicle shows, off-premise sales, exhibitions and rallies. Act 90 provided for the participation of out-of-State recreational vehicle dealers in these types of events. IRRC suggested that the Board draft a separate rulemaking to ensure that the regulated community is informed and in compliance with the requirements of the act. By way of background, when Act 90 was enacted, the Board considered the law and concluded that, other than considering the implementation of a fee, the amendments under Act 90 did not require the promulgation of regulations to implement it because Act 90 and its requirements were sufficiently specific. Nevertheless, as suggested by IRRC, the Board will re-evaluate whether it should initiate a rulemaking to ensure that the regulated community is adequately informed regarding the requirements of the act. In the meantime, the Board will add additional information on its web site to ensure that the regulated community has sufficient information regarding the application process, including requirements for recreational vehicle shows, off-premise sales, exhibitions and rallies and the participation fee.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

Under this final-form rulemaking, out-of-State recreational vehicle dealers applying for registration will incur costs by having to pay a \$65 participation fee for registration. Should an out-of-State recreational vehicle dealer return to this Commonwealth for another show the same year, they will be required to file another application with the Board. The Board anticipates approximately 100 applications per year, for a total fiscal impact of \$6,500 annually. This final-form rulemaking should have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth, its political subdivisions or the private sector.

Because the Board has already been receiving and processing these applications without collecting a participation fee, other than making minor revisions to the application form, this final-form rulemaking will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, its political subdivisions or the private sector.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on November 24, 2020, the Board submitted a copy of the proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC). A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board is required to provide to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Board has considered all comments from IRRC. The Board did not receive any comments from the HPLC, SCP/PLC or the public.

On September 30, 2021 the Board delivered this finalform rulemaking to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on December 8, 2021, the finalform rulemaking was deemed approved by the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on December 9, 2021, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF PSYCHOLOGY [49 PA. CODE CH. 41]

Licensure by Endorsement

The State Board of Psychology (Board) amends Chapter 41 by adding §§ 41.52a and 41.52b (relating to licensure by endorsement; and provisional endorsement license) and amending § 41.1 (relating to definitions) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

The amendments will be effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

The provisions of 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 (relating to licensure by endorsement) require licensing boards and commissions to issue a license, certificate, registration or permit to an applicant to allow practice in this Commonwealth provided the applicant meets the following criteria: holds a current license, certificate, registration or permit from another state, territory or country whose licensing requirements are substantially equivalent to or exceed the requirements in this Commonwealth; demonstrates competency; has not committed any act that constitutes grounds for refusal, suspension or revocation of a license, certificate, registration or permit to practice that profession or occupation in this Commonwealth, unless the board or commission determines such conduct is not an impediment to granting the license, certificate, registration or permit; is in good standing and has not been disciplined by the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit, unless the board or commission determines such conduct is not an impediment to granting the license, certificate, registration or permit; and the applicant pays fees, as established by regulation. Additionally, 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 authorizes boards and commissions to issue a provisional license, certificate, registration, or permit while an applicant is satisfying remaining requirements for licensure by endorsement, for which the Board must set by regulation the terms of expiration.

The act of July 1, 2020 (P.L 575, No. 53) added 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 as part of the consolidation of the act of July 2, 1993 (P.L. 345, No. 48) (Act 48) into Title 63, Chapter 31 of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes*. The text of 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 was originally added to Act 48 by the act of July 1, 2019 (P.L. 292, No. 41).

Background and Purpose

This final-form rulemaking is needed to effectuate 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111, which requires the Board to issue a license to applicants who meet the requirements for licensure by endorsement as set forth in 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111. Under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111, the Board must determine whether standards for licensure are substantially equivalent to or exceed those established by the Board. Additionally, 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111, requires the Board to determine the methods of competency, including completion of continuing education or experience in the profession or occupation for at least 2 of the 5 years immediately preceding the filing of the application, and must establish, by regulation, the expiration of provisional endorsement license. This final-form rulemaking sets forth the criteria for eligibility for licensure by endorsement, including the specific methods required for an applicant to demonstrate competency as well as requirements for a provisional license, including expiration and termination provisions.

Comments to the Proposed Rulemaking

The Board published a notice of proposed rulemaking at 50 Pa.B. 7191 (December 19, 2020), for 30 days of public comment. The Board did not receive any public comments. The Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) reviewed the proposed rulemaking and informed the Board that it had no objections, comments or recommendations to offer on the proposed rulemaking. The Board did not receive any comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) or the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC) as part of their review of proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. §§ 745.1—745.14).

Amendments to the Final-form Rulemaking

Under § 41.52a(b), an applicant may be required to appear before the Board for a personal interview and may be requested to submit additional information, including supporting documentation relating to competency and experience. In drafting this final-form rulemaking, the Board clarifies that an applicant may request the interview to be conducted by video teleconference for good cause. The Board wishes to ensure an alternative to in-person interview if circumstances warrant a video teleconference. Additionally, the Board revises § 41.52b(c) to make clear that a provisional endorsement license terminates when the Board denies or grants a license.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This final-form rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The costs to the Board related to processing applications for licensure by endorsement will be recouped through fees paid by applicants. Applicants who apply for licensure by endorsement will be impacted by the \$105 initial application fee in § 41.12 (relating to fees) and may incur continuing education expenses if they choose to demonstrate competency by completing 30 hours of continuing education. Applicants who demonstrate competency through experience will pay the \$105 initial application fee. Applicants must complete child abuse recognition and reporting training, as required by 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(b)(3)(i) (relating to education and training), known as the Child Protective Services Law. There are free in-person and online child abuse recognition and reporting training options available; therefore, the Board does not anticipate a negative fiscal impact for this statutorily mandated training.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of the Board's regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) and (f) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a) and (f)), on December 9, 2020, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 50 Pa.B. 7191, to IRRC and the Legislative Reference Bureau. The Board subsequently submitted the notice of proposed rulemaking to the Chairpersons of the HPLC and the SCP/PLC for review and comment on February 19, 2021, as required under section 5(f) of the Regulatory Review Act. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request. Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board shall submit to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC copies of comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. No public comments were submitted on the proposed rulemaking, and IRRC did not submit any comments on this rulemaking. The Board received no comments from the HPLC or the SCP/PLC.

CHAPTER 41. STATE BOARD OF PSYCHOLOGY

GENERAL

§ 41.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Individual residing in the same home as the child—An individual who is 14 years of age or older and who resides in the same home as the child.

Jurisdiction—A state, territory or country.

National Register—The Council for the National Register of Health Service Providers.

* * * * * * * MISCELLANEOUS

§ 41.52a. Licensure by endorsement.

(a) *Requirements for issuance.* To be issued a license by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 (relating to licensure by endorsement), an applicant must satisfy all of the following requirements:

(1) Has a current license, certification, registration or permit in good standing to practice psychology in another jurisdiction whose standards are substantially equivalent to or exceed those established by the Board under section 6 of the act (63 P.S. § 1206) and §§ 41.31 and 41.32 (relating to educational qualifications; and experience qualifications).

(i) An applicant must submit a copy of the current applicable law, regulation or other rule governing licensure, certification, registration or permit requirements and scope of practice in the jurisdiction that issued the license, certification, registration or permit.

(ii) If the applicable law, regulation or other rule is in a language other than English, at the applicant's expense, the applicable law, regulation or other rule shall be translated by a professional translation service and verified to be complete and accurate.

(iii) The copy of the applicable law, regulation or other rule must include the enactment date.

(2) Demonstrates competency by one of the following:

(i) Experience in the practice of psychology by demonstrating, at a minimum, that the applicant has actively engaged in the practice of psychology in the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit for 2 of the last 5 years immediately preceding the filing of the application with the Board.

(ii) Completion of 30 hours of continuing education that meets the requirements of § 41.59 (relating to continuing education) during the 24 months immediately preceding the date of the application. (3) Has not committed any act that constitutes grounds for refusal, suspension or revocation of a license to practice psychology under section 8 of the act (63 P.S. § 1208) regarding refusal, suspension or revocation of license.

(4) Has not been disciplined by the jurisdiction that issued the license, certificate, registration or permit.

(5) Has paid the initial application fee as set forth in § 41.12 (relating to fees).

(6) Satisfies application requirements as required by the act and this chapter, including § 41.30(b)(2) and (3) (relating to qualifications and documentation necessary for licensure).

(7) Completes 3 hours of training in child abuse recognition and reporting from a provider approved by the Department of Human Services as required under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(b)(3)(i) (relating to education and training).

(b) *Interview and additional information*. An applicant may be required to appear before the Board for a personal interview and may be requested to submit additional information, including supporting documentation relating to competency and experience. The applicant may request the interview to be conducted by video teleconference for good cause shown.

(c) Prohibited acts. Notwithstanding subsection (a)(3) and (4), the Board may, in its discretion, determine that an act prohibited under section 8 of the act or disciplinary action by a jurisdiction are not impediments to the granting of a license by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. \S 3111.

§ 41.52b. Provisional endorsement license.

(a) Provisional endorsement license. The Board may, in its discretion, issue a provisional endorsement license to an applicant while the applicant is satisfying remaining requirements for licensure by endorsement under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3111 (relating to licensure by endorsement) and § 41.52a(a) (relating to licensure by endorsement).

(b) *Expiration of a provisional endorsement license*.

(1) An individual holding a provisional endorsement license may practice for up to 1 year after issuance of the provisional endorsement license. The Board, in its discretion, may determine that an expiration date of less than 1 year is appropriate.

(2) Upon a written request and a showing of good cause, the Board may grant an extension of no longer than 1 year from the expiration date of the provisional endorsement license.

(c) Termination of a provisional endorsement license. A provisional endorsement license terminates as follows:

(1) The provisional endorsement license terminates when the Board denies or grants the license.

(2) Failure to comply with the terms of a provisional endorsement license will result in termination of the provisional endorsement license.

(d) *Reapplication*. An individual may reapply for licensure by endorsement under § 41.52a after expiration or termination of a provisional endorsement license; however, the individual may not be issued a subsequent provisional endorsement license.

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY EDUCATION AND LICENSURE [49 PA. CODE CH. 42]

Educational Programs

The State Board of Occupational Therapy Education and Licensure (Board) proposes to amend §§ 42.1 and 42.13 (relating to definitions; and application for licensure) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

The amendments will be effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 5(b) of the Occupational Therapy Practice Act (act) (63 P.S. § 1505(b)) authorizes the Board to "adopt rules and regulations not inconsistent with law as it deems necessary for the performance of its duties and the proper administration of this law." Section 8(2) of the act (63 P.S. § 1508(2)) sets forth the requirements for licensure, which include completion of "the academic requirements of an approved educational program in occupational therapy recognized by the board with the advice and consultation of recognized national accrediting agencies and professional organizations including the American Occupational Therapy Association..."

Background and Purpose

Under the Board's existing regulations at § 42.13(a)(2), an applicant must meet "the academic requirements of an educational program in occupational therapy approved by the Board, or an equivalent program as defined in § 42.1..." Regarding educational programs, the Board's existing regulations do not specify which programs are "approved by the Board." In the United States, the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) is the only accreditation agency that accredits occupational therapy programs, and thus, ACOTE approved educational programs are the only programs approved by the Board. Significantly, this regulation serves to codify the Board's current practices and procedures and do not change the Board's current educational program standards. In drafting this final-form rule-making, as required by section 8(2) of the act, the Board consulted with the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) through the Pennsylvania Occupational Therapy Association (POTA) as well as the only National accrediting agency that currently accredits occupational therapy programs, ACOTE.

Comments to the Proposed Rulemaking

The Board published a notice of proposed rulemaking at 50 Pa.B. 5848 (October 24, 2020), for 30 days of public comment. The Board did not receive any public comments relating to the proposed rulemaking. The Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) reviewed the proposed rulemaking and informed the Board that it had no objections, comments or recommendations to offer. The Board did not receive any comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) or the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC) as part of their review of proposed rulemaking under the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. §§ 745.1—745.14).

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Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

There are no fiscal impacts or paperwork requirements associated with this final-form rulemaking.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on October 8, 2020, the Board submitted a copy of the proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

On October 28, 2021, the Board delivered the final-form rulemaking to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on December 8, 2021, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the HPLC and by the SCP/PLC.

Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on December 9, 2021, and announced, because it had no comments on the proposed rulemaking and the Board did not amend the rulemaking, IRRC was deemed to have approved the final-form rulemaking under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(g)).

Findings

The Board finds that:

(1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. \$ 1201 and 1202), referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law and regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).

(2) A public comment period was provided as required by law.

(3) This final-form rulemaking does not include any amendments that would enlarge the scope of proposed rulemaking published at 50 Pa.B. 5848.

(4) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the Occupational Therapy Practice Act.

Order

The Board, acting under its authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Board at 49 Pa. Code Chapter 42 are amended by amending §§ 42.1 and 42.13 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulation.

(b) The Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.

(c) The Board shall certify this final-form rulemaking and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This final-form rulemaking shall take effect upon publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

CHAPTER 42. STATE BOARD OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY EDUCATION AND LICENSURE **GENERAL PROVISIONS**

§ 42.1 Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* Commissioner-The Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs.

Licensee—An individual who has been licensed under the act as an occupational therapist or an occupational therapy assistant.

LICENSURE

§ 42.13. Application for licensure.

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(a) To apply for licensure, an applicant shall pay the required fee and submit evidence satisfactory to the Board, on forms provided by the Board, that the applicant meets the following criteria:

(1) Is of good moral character.

*

*

(2) Has successfully completed an educational program for occupational therapists or occupational therapy assistants that is either:

(i) Accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) or predecessor organizations.

(ii) Approved by the Board and accredited by a National programmatic accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education.

(3) Has successfully completed a period of supervised fieldwork experience as a part of an accredited educational program as required by paragraph (2) as follows:

(i) For an occupational therapist, a minimum of 6 months of supervised fieldwork.

(ii) For an occupational therapy assistant, a minimum of 2 months of supervised fieldwork.

(4) Has passed the licensure examination or has qualified for a waiver of the licensure examination under § 42.12 (relating to waiver of licensure examination).

identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under Sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the NOI to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following identified site(s), proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30-days of the following specified date. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 77.522 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

Additional criteria

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan, and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters of this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume, or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Submittal of comments

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit notice within 30-days of this notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and phone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

Requests or petitions for a public hearing on any NPDES permit applications will be accepted as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92a.82(d). The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30-days of this public notice and contain the name, address, phone number and the interest of the party filing the request and state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. The Department may hold a public hearing if the public interest is significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will consider comments from the public hearing in the final determination on the NPDES permit application.

Availability of National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System General Permit for Discharges from Hydrostatic Testing of Tanks and Pipelines (PAG-10)

Under The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1— 691.1001) and sections 1905-A, 1917-A and 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. §§ 510-5, 510-17 and 510-20), the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) by this notice informs the public of the availability of the final National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit for Discharges from Hydrostatic Testing of Tanks and Pipelines (PAG-10) for a new 5-year term. The PAG-10 General Permit will become effective on April 22, 2022, and will expire on April 21, 2027.

The PAG-10 General Permit is intended to provide NPDES permit coverage for the discharge of water used for the hydrostatic testing of existing or proposed tanks or pipelines, regardless of the contents of such tanks or pipelines. The PAG-10 General Permit may not be used for discharges to waters designated for special protection under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93 (relating to water quality standards) or other discharges that do not meet eligibility requirements of the PAG-10 General Permit.

Notice of the availability of a draft PAG-10 General Permit was published at 51 Pa.B. 6706 (October 23, 2021). A 30-day comment period was provided, and interested parties were directed to submit comments to the Department's eComment system. The Department did not receive any comments.

Permittees with existing coverage under the PAG-10 General Permit will be required to submit a renewal Notice of Intent (NOI) to maintain continued coverage under the PAG-10 General Permit. The Department will transmit notification to all existing PAG-10 permittees explaining the changes to the terms and conditions of General Permit coverage and what steps must be taken for continued coverage.

The PAG-10 NOI fee is \$2,500, to be paid in \$500 annual increments. The NOI fee does not apply to entities satisfying the criteria for an exemption under 25 Pa. Code § 92a.26(i) (relating to application fees).

No changes were made to the final PAG-10 General Permit in comparison to the draft PAG-10 General Permit that was published at 51 Pa.B. 6706.

Public Notice of Draft National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System General Permit for Discharges of Stormwater Associated with Industrial Activity (PAG-03)

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is announcing the availability of a draft National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) General Permit for Discharges of Stormwater Associated with Industrial Activity (PAG-03). The draft General Permit and related documents are available on the Department's eLibrary at www.depgreenport.state.pa.us/elibrary/ (select "Permit and Authorization Packages," then "Clean Water," then "Draft—PAG-03 NPDES General Permit for Discharges of Stormwater Associated with Industrial Activity").

The PAG-03 General Permit is intended to provide NPDES permit coverage to existing or proposed industrial facilities that discharge stormwater associated with industrial activity to surface waters of this Commonwealth. The General Permit may not be used to cover facilities that discharge industrial wastewater.

The following substantive changes are proposed in the draft PAG-03 General Permit in comparison to the PAG-03 General Permit that is currently in effect and has been administratively extended until September 23, 2022:

• The Department proposes to clarify in the General Permit that facilities with structural stormwater best management practices (BMP) that do not discharge during the monitoring period are allowed to report "no discharge" on discharge monitoring reports. These facilities will be required to provide at least one sample result on the subsequent renewal Notice of Intent (NOI).

• In addition to a Corrective Action Plan, after four consecutive exceedances of the benchmark values, the Department proposes to require permittees to complete and submit the Stormwater BMP Checklist (3800-PM-BCW00831).

• The Department proposes to add a monitor and report requirement for Total Nitrogen and Total Phosphorus to all appendices.

• The Department proposes to increase the benchmark value for Total Suspended Solids from 100 mg/L to 150 mg/L in all appendices. The Department requests public input on this proposed increase to the benchmark value.

• The Department proposes to add monitoring requirements for Oil & Grease to Appendices B & U and for Chemical Oxygen Demand to Appendix O.

• The Department proposes to modify Appendix H to remove several facility categories that were previously listed as prohibited from coverage under the PAG-03 and requiring individual permit coverage. The Department has determined that these facilities do not require permit coverage.

• A new No Exposure Certification (3800-PM-BCW 0083k) was developed to improve recordkeeping and ensure clear and consistent communication of the effective date, expiration date, ongoing eligibility and recertification requirements.

• The existing General Permit utilized the Annual Report to serve as the NOI for annual coverage under the

PAG-03. New coverage was approved without an expiration date of coverage identified. The Department proposes to no longer utilize the Annual Report as an NOI for coverage under the reissued General Permit. The Department will notify PAG-03 permittees of the mechanism that must be used to continue coverage under a modified or reissued General Permit, and new coverage will specify an expiration date of coverage that corresponds to the PAG-03 expiration date.

• The Department is proposing to collect information on existing Post-Construction Stormwater Management BMPs in the NOI.

The proposed NOI fee of \$2,500, paid in annual increments of \$500, has not changed in comparison to the PAG-03 General Permit that is currently in effect.

Co-payments for the Subsidized Child Care Program

This notice decreases co-payments codified at 55 Pa. Code Chapter 3041, Appendix B (relating to co-payment chart family co-payment scale (based on the 2021 Federal Poverty Income Guidelines)) under 55 Pa. Code § 3041.107(b) (relating to availability and use of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines). Chapter 3041, Appendix B of 55 Pa. Code establishes the family co-payment levels according to the family's computed annual income and lists the weekly family co-payment based on the annual family income. This decrease is effective January 17, 2022.

Under section 408.3(b) of the Human Services Code (62 P.S. § 408.3(b)), the co-payment schedule is adjusted by notice published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Effective January 17, 2022, co-payments will be reduced to 3% to 7% of a family's income to meet the Federal recommendation for percent of family income obligated to child care expenses. The initiative will not increase any family's co-payment. Families in the lowest income brackets will continue to pay the minimum co-payment permitted by law. Families in higher income brackets will see a reduction in the co-payment. The Department of Human Services (Department) pays providers the Maximum Child Care Allowance base rate less the family weekly co-payment. If the family co-payment is decreased, the Department's contribution to providers will increase.

Nursing Facility Assessment Program for Fiscal Year 2021-2022

The Department of Human Services (Department) is providing final notice of the assessment amount, the assessment methodology and the estimated aggregate impact on nursing facilities that will be subject to the assessment under the Nursing Facility Assessment Program (Assessment Program) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022.

Background

Article VIII-A of the Human Services Code (code) (62 P.S. §§ 801-A—815-A) authorizes the Department to impose an annual monetary assessment on nonpublic and county nursing facilities in this Commonwealth each fiscal year until June 30, 2022. See 62 P.S. §§ 803-A and 815-A.

Under Article VIII-A of the code, the Department may impose the assessment only to the extent that the assessment revenues qualify as the State share of Medical Assistance (MA) Program expenditures eligible for Federal financial participation (FFP). To ensure receipt of FFP, Article VIII-A of the code requires the Department to seek a waiver from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), if necessary, to implement the Assessment Program. See 62 P.S. § 812-A. CMS approved the Department's waiver request on December 1, 2021.

For each fiscal year that the Assessment Program is implemented, the Secretary of the Department (Secretary) determines the aggregate amount of the assessment and the annual assessment rates in consultation with the Secretary of the Budget. See 62 P.S. § 804-A. The annual assessment rates must be sufficient to generate at least \$50 million in additional revenue, but not more than the maximum aggregate assessment amount that qualifies for FFP. See 62 P.S. § 804-A.

Before imposing an annual assessment for a fiscal year, the Secretary must publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania* *Bulletin*. The notice must specify the amount of the assessment being proposed, explain the proposed assessment methodology, identify the estimated assessment amount and aggregate impact on nursing facilities subject to the assessment and provide interested persons a 30-day period to comment. See 62 P.S. § 805-A.

After consideration of any comments received during the 30-day comment period, the Secretary must publish a second notice announcing the rate of assessment for the fiscal year. See 62 P.S. § 805-A. The annual aggregate assessment amount and assessment rate for the fiscal year must be approved by the Governor. See 62 P.S. § 804-A.

The Secretary published a notice at 51 Pa.B. 3927 (July 17, 2021) announcing the proposed assessment rates, the aggregate amount and the impact for FY 2021-2022. No comments were received by the Department in response to the proposed rates notice.

Assessment Methodology and Rates

The following nursing facilities will continue to be exempt from the Assessment Program in FY 2021-2022:

(1) State-owned and operated nursing facilities.

(2) Veteran's Administration nursing facilities.

(3) Nursing facilities that provide nursing facility services free of charge to all residents.

(4) Newly licensed nursing facilities that have not been licensed and operated by the current or previous owner until the nursing facility's days are included in the data used as the basis of the assessment. A nursing facility that changes ownership is not considered a newly licensed nursing facility for assessment purposes.

For FY 2021-2022, the Department will continue to assess nonexempt nursing facilities at two rates. An assessment rate of \$5.56, which represents an increase of \$0.95 from last year's rate, will apply to the following five categories of nursing facilities:

County nursing facilities.

• Nursing facilities that have 44 or fewer licensed beds.

• Certain continuing care retirement community (CCRC) nursing facilities (see 40 Pa.B. 7297 (December 18, 2010)).

• Nursing facilities with an MA occupancy rate of at least 94% based on FY 2019-2020 resident days as of March 17, 2021. For the purpose of qualifying for the lower assessment rate, a nursing facility's MA occupancy rate will be calculated as follows: MA Occupancy Rate = Sum of Total PA MA Days from the FY 2019-2020 resident days data ÷ Sum of Total Resident Days from the FY 2019-2020 resident days data, rounded to two decimals.

• Nursing facilities with at least 115,000 MA days and with an overall occupancy rate of 90% or higher based on the FY 2019-2020 resident days as of March 17, 2021. For the purpose of qualifying for the lower assessment rate, a nursing facility's overall occupancy rate will be calculated as follows: Overall Occupancy Rate = Sum of Total Resident Days from FY 2019-2020 resident days as of March 17, 2021 \div (number of licensed beds as of March 23, 2021 \times number of days in the fiscal year), rounded to two decimals. The overall occupancy rate calculation will use 365 days in a fiscal year unless the state fiscal year includes an additional day due to leap year in which case the number of days in the fiscal year will be 366.

For all other nonexempt facilities, including nursing facilities that began participation in a CCRC on or after July 1, 2010, an assessment rate of \$29.65, which represents an increase of \$0.95 from last year's rate, will apply.

Aggregate Assessment Amounts and Fiscal Impact

The Department estimates that the annual aggregate assessment fees for nonexempt nursing facilities will total \$436.313 million. The Department will use the State revenue derived from the assessment fees and any associated FFP to support payments to qualified MA nursing facility providers in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

11. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Cash, prize money from winning Cash instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Cash instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

12. Governing law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

13. *Termination of the game*: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Cash or through normal communications methods.

4. *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: $$5^{.00}$ (FIV DOL), $$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $$30^{.00}$ (THIRTY), $$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), $$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$100,000 (ONEHUNTHO).

(c) Holders of tickets upon which a Clover (CLOVER) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "prize" area under that Clover (CLOVER) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches the "FOR-TUNE NUMBER" play symbol, and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in two of the "prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in two of the "prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$50^{.00} (FIFTY) appears in eight of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches the "FOR-TUNE NUMBER" play symbol, and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in eight of the "prize" areas and a prize symbol of 50^{00} (FIFTY) appears in four of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which a Clover (CLOVER) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "prize" area under that Clover (CLOVER) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.

(h) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches the "FOR-TUNE NUMBER" play symbol, and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in two of the "prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in two of the "prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$10^{.00} (TEN DOL) appears in four of the "prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$5^{.00} (FIV DOL) appears in four of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches the "FORTUNE NUM-BER" play symbol, and a prize symbol of 50^{00} (FIFTY) appears in two of the "prize" areas and a prize symbol of 40^{00} (FORTY) appears in ten of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of 500.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(1) Holders of tickets upon which a Clover (CLOVER) symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "prize" area under that Clover (CLOVER) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(m) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches the "FOR-TUNE NUMBER" play symbol, and a prize symbol of 50^{00} (FIFTY) appears in two of the "prize" areas and a prize symbol of 10^{00} (TEN DOL) appears in ten of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches the "FOR-

TUNE NUMBER" play symbol, and a prize symbol of 30^{00} (THIRTY) appears in five of the "prize" areas, a prize symbol of 10^{00} (TEN DOL) appears in three of the "prize" areas and a prize symbol of 5^{00} (FIV DOL) appears in four of the "prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.

(a) *Qualifying Tickets*: Non-winning PA-1567 Four Leaf Fortune (\$5), PA-1568 Leprechaun Loot (\$2) and PA-1569 Shamrock Green (\$1) instant lottery game tickets are eligible for entry into the Drawing.

(b) *Participation and entry*:

(1) Entrants must be members of the Pennsylvania Lottery VIP Players Club to participate in the Drawing. To join the VIP Players Club, visit https:// www.palottery.state.pa.us/vipplayersclub/login.aspx. Becoming a VIP Players Club member is free.

(2) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at https://www.palottery.com, or the Pennsylvania Lottery's official mobile application, during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted. Entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Pennsylvania Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.

(3) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be submitted.

(4) Only one claimant per entry allowed.

(5) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.

(6) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.

(7) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.

(c) *Drawing description*:

(1) The Lottery will conduct one Loads of Luck Second-Chance Drawing for qualifying instant lottery game tickets. All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.

(2) All entries received after 11:59:59 p.m. January 23, 2022, through 11:59:59 p.m. March 17, 2022, will be entered into the Drawing to be held between March 21, 2022 and March 31, 2022.

(3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Pennsylvania Lottery's publicly accessible web site.

(4) When a Qualifying Ticket is entered into the Drawing, the entry has a chance to be multiplied by 3 (hereafter the "Entry Multiplier Prize"). Each Qualifying Ticket will have a predetermined ticket file assigned at the time the ticket is printed that will determine whether an entry will be multiplied. If an entry is multiplied, the entrant will be notified during the entry process.

(5) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered and the Entry Multiplier Prize, if applicable. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-1567 Four Leaf Fortune (\$5) = five entries, PA-1568 Leprechaun Loot (\$2) = two entries and PA-1569 Shamrock Green (\$1) = one entry.

(6) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.

(d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:

(1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 10(e), or those mentioned anywhere else in these rules.

(3) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 10(c)(2).

(i) The first through the fifth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$17,000, less required income tax withholding.

(ii) The sixth through the tenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who

submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.

(iii) The eleventh through the twenty-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(iv) The twenty-eighth through the seventy-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted the winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.

(4) All prizes will be paid as a lump-sum cash payment or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.

(5) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will have the iLottery Bonus Money credited to their lottery account and will receive an email notifying them that they won a prize.

(6) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Pennsylvania Lottery's publicly accessible web site.

(7) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.

(8) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.

(e) *Drawing restrictions*:

(1) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.

(2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If a Drawing entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.

(3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.

(4) Employees of the Pennsylvania Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.

(5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Pennsylvania Lottery that, in the Pennsylvania Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.

(6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Pennsylvania Lottery.

(7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be

tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.

(8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.

(9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.

(10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

(11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).

(12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the same Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.

(14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 10(d)(5). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. (15) Prizes are not transferrable.

(16) Other restrictions may apply.

11. *Retailer incentive awards*: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Four Leaf Fortune instant lottery game tickets.

12. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania instant lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter

a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

13. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Four Leaf Fortune, prize money from winning Four Leaf Fortune instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Four Leaf Fortune instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which a Horseshoe (SHOE) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of \$2

(TWO DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under that Horseshoe (SHOE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which a Horseshoe (SHOE) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of \$1 (ONE DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under that Horseshoe (SHOE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.

(l) Holders of tickets upon which a Horseshoe (SHOE) symbol appears in the play area and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the "Prize" area under that Horseshoe (SHOE) symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one Shamrock Green instant game ticket or one Pennsylvania Lottery instant game ticket of equivalent sale price which is currently on sale.

(a) *Qualifying Tickets*: Non-winning PA-1567 Four Leaf Fortune (\$5), PA-1568 Leprechaun Loot (\$2) and PA-1569 Shamrock Green (\$1) instant lottery game tickets are eligible for entry into the Drawing.

(b) *Participation and entry*:

(3) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 10(c)(2).

(i) The first through the fifth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$17,000, less required income tax withholding.

(ii) The sixth through the tenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$10,000, less required income tax withholding.

(iii) The eleventh through the twenty-seventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

If a Drawing entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.

(3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.

(4) Employees of the Pennsylvania Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.

(5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Pennsylvania Lottery that, in the Pennsylvania Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.

(6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Pennsylvania Lottery.

(7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.

(8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.

(9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.

(10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

(11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).

(12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.

(13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the same Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.

12. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania instant lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will

not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

13. Unclaimed prize money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Shamrock Green, prize money from winning Shamrock Green instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Shamrock Green instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

14. Governing law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

15. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Shamrock Green or through normal communications methods.

1. Name: The name of the game is Pennsylvania THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} (hereinafter "THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} "). The game number is PA-1565. THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} artwork is separated into two separate themed scenes: Scene 1 and Scene 2. The actual play symbols used are specific to each scene. Both scenes are organized under the same game and the same prize structure and no one scene is determinative of the prizes available to be won on any individual game ticket, or the Second-Chance Drawing entries provided for in section 10.

The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WICKED WITCH BONUS" area of Scene 2, are: Witch Hat (NOBONUS) symbol, Lollipop (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Winged Monkey (NOBONUS), Funnel (TRYAGAIN) symbol, Basket (NOBONUS) symbol and an Apple (WIN100) symbol.

4. *Prize symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the play area, are: $$10^{.00}$ (TEN DOL), $$20^{.00}$ (TWENTY), $$40^{.00}$ (FORTY), $$50^{.00}$ (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO), \$5,000 (FIV THO) and \$500,000 (FIVHUNTHO).

5. *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$10, \$20, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$500,000. THE WIZARD OF OZTM contains a feature that can multiply certain prizes. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 9 (relating to Number and description of prizes and approximate odds). A player can win up to 15 times on a ticket.

6. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} Second-Chance Drawing from the Pennsylvania Lottery for which non-winning THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} instant lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided in section 10.

7. Approximate number of tickets printed for the game: Approximately 12,000,000 tickets will be printed for THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} instant lottery game.

8. Determination of prize winners:

(a) Determination of prize winners for Scene 1:

(1) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of \$500,000 (FIVHUNTHO) appears in the "prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500,000.

(2) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, and a prize symbol of \$5,000 (FIV THO) appears in the "prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.

The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted. Each Qualifying Ticket will have a predetermined ticket file assigned at the time the ticket is printed that will determine whether an entry will be multiplied. If an entry is multiplied, the entrant will be notified during the entry process.

(5) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered and the Entry Multiplier Prize, if applicable. (3) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 10(c)(2).

(i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.

(ii) The second through the eleventh entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.

(iii) The twelfth through the sixty-first entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.

(4) All prizes will be paid as a lump-sum cash payment or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.

(8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.

Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the instant ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a nonwinning Pennsylvania Lottery instant ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

13. Unclaimed Prize Money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} instant lottery game, prize money from winning THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.

14. Governing Law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.

15. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote THE WIZARD OF OZ^{TM} or through normal communications methods.

Under the Medical Marijuana Act (act) (35 P.S. §§ 10231.101—10231.2110), the Pennsylvania State Ethics Commission (Commission) shall biennially publish a list of all State, county, municipal and other government positions that meet the definition of "public official" or "executive-level public employee" as defined under 4 Pa.C.S. § 1512(b) (relating to financial and employment interests) of the Gaming Act, 4 Pa.C.S. § 1512(b) or the definition of "public official" as set forth in the act, or both. See 35 P.S. § 10231.2101.1.

In accordance with the requirements of the act, this list is being published herewith in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and upon the web site of the Commission within the e-Library at http://www.ethics.pa.gov.

Upon request, each public official shall have a duty to provide the Commission with adequate information to accurately develop and maintain the list. The Commission may impose a civil penalty under 65 Pa.C.S. § 1109(f) (relating to penalties) upon any individual, including any public official or executive-level public employee, who fails to cooperate with the Commission under this subsection. A person that relies in good faith on the list published by the Commission shall not be subject to any penalty for a violation of this section. 35 P.S. § 10231.2101.1.

This and any future lists are subject to change and will be updated as needed on the Commission's web site. The first publication contains only State agencies. DEFINITION OF "PUBLIC OFFICIAL" AND "EXECUTIVE-LEVEL PUBLIC EMPLOYEE" AS IT PERTAINS TO THE MEDICAL MARIJUANA ACT

"Public official." The term shall include the following:

(1) The Governor, Lieutenant Governor, a member of the Governor's cabinet, Treasurer, Auditor General and Attorney General of the Commonwealth. (2) A member of the Senate or House of Representatives of the Commonwealth.

(3) An individual elected or appointed to any office of a county or municipality that directly receives a distribution of revenue from the fund.

(4) An individual elected or appointed to a department, agency, board, commission, authority or other governmental body not included in paragraph (1), (2) or (3) that directly receives a distribution of revenue from the fund.

(5) An individual elected or appointed to a department, agency, board, commission, authority, county, municipality or other governmental body not included in paragraph (1), (2) or (3) with discretionary power which may influence or affect the outcome of an action or decision and who is involved in the development of regulation or policy relating to a medical marijuana organization or who is involved in other matters under this act.

The term does not include a member of a school board or an individual who held an uncompensated office with a governmental body prior to January 1, 2017, and who no longer holds the office as of January 1, 2017.

35 P.S. § 10231.101 et seq.

Section 2101.1(d)(2) of the Medical Marijuana Act directs that the term "executive-level public employee" be defined as stated within the Pennsylvania Race Horse Development and Gaming Act (4 Pa.C.S. § 1512(b)). The Gaming Act therefore defines "executive-level public employee" as:

"Executive-level public employee." The term shall include the following:

(1) Deputy Secretaries of the Commonwealth and the Governor's Office executive staff.

(2) An employee of the executive branch whose duties substantially involve licensing or enforcement under this part, who has discretionary power which may affect or influence the outcome of a Commonwealth agency's action or decision or who is involved in the development of regulations or policies relating to a licensed entity. The term shall include an employee with law enforcement authority.

(3) An employee of a county or municipality with discretionary powers which may affect or influence the


outcome of the county's or municipality's action or decision related to this part or who is involved in the development of law, regulation or policy relating to matters regulated under this part. The term shall include an employee with law enforcement authority.

(4) An employee of a department, agency, board, commission, authority or other governmental body not included in paragraph (1), (2), or (3) with discretionary power which may affect or influence the outcome of the governmental body's action or decision related to this part or who is involved in the development of regulation or policy relating to matters regulated under this part. The term shall include an employee with law enforcement authority.

"Law enforcement authority." The power to conduct investigations of or to make arrests for criminal offenses.



Working Draft of Sentencing Guidelines Proposals

The Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing hereby publishes for public comment a working draft of proposals developed during a comprehensive review of the sentencing guidelines. The working draft is set forth in Annex A.

The 7th Edition Sentencing Guidelines, adopted by the Commission on September 13, 2012, took effect December 28, 2012. Since 2012, the Commission adopted six amendments and one supplement to the 7th Edition Sentencing Guidelines:

• Amendment 1, adopted June 6, 2013, effective September 27, 2013.

• Amendment 2, adopted June 5, 2014, effective September 26, 2014.

• Amendment 3, adopted June 4, 2015, effective September 25, 2015.

• Amendment 4, adopted June 1, 2017, effective January 1, 2018.

 \odot Supplement to Amendment 4, adopted December 14, 2017, effective June 1, 2018.

• Amendment 5, adopted June 13, 2019, effective January 1, 2020.

• Amendment 6, adopted September 10, 2020, effective January 1, 2021.

During the past decade, in addition to adopting the 7th Edition Sentencing Guidelines and amendments to address immediate legislative mandates and implementation issues, the Commission also was engaged in a forward-looking comprehensive review of the sentencing guidelines. As described in greater detail in the Commentary, the comprehensive review provided an opportunity to study current practices and research best practices; to consider approaches to streamline, automate, and update the sentencing guidelines; to promote greater certainty in sentencing and more efficient use of resources and programs; and to harmonize the sentencing guidelines with amended statutes and with other Commission mandates, including the sentence risk assessment instrument, resentencing guidelines, and with the pending parole guidelines and recommitment ranges.

A working draft of proposals developed through this comprehensive review is found in Annex A. These proposals, if pursued by the Commission, would restructure the sentencing guidelines by providing more targeted sentence recommendations, redirect the primary focus of the recommendations on factors associated with the conviction offense, and reduce the impact of the prior record. The development of these proposals, while informed by the experiences gained from four decades of sentencing guidelines, were advanced through four initiatives:

- Strategic Planning Work Group (SPWG, 2014-2016)
- Model Penal Code: Sentencing (MPCS, 2001-2017)

- Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI-II, 2016-2019)
- Academic Review Panel (ARP, 2020-2021)

Given the substantial changes to the sentencing guidelines suggested during this comprehensive review, the Commission approved for publication a working draft of proposals, and the scheduling of hearings, to receive public comment before moving forward with consideration of any revisions to the sentencing guidelines.

Commentary on Annex A

This Commentary provides background on the comprehensive review of the sentencing guidelines which served as the basis for developing a working draft of proposals. The comprehensive review provided an opportunity to study current practices and research best practices; to consider approaches to streamline, automate, and update the sentencing guidelines; to promote greater certainty in sentencing and more efficient use of resources and programs; and to harmonize the sentencing guidelines with amended statutes and with other Commission mandates, including the sentence risk assessment instrument, resentencing guidelines, and with the pending parole guidelines and recommitment ranges.

A working draft of proposals developed through this comprehensive review is found in Annex A. These proposals, if pursued by the Commission, would restructure the sentencing guidelines by providing more targeted sentence recommendations, redirect the primary focus of the recommendations on factors associated with the conviction offense, and reduce the impact of the prior record. The development of these proposals, while informed by the experiences gained from four decades of sentencing guidelines, were advanced through four initiatives:

- Strategic Planning Work Group (SPWG, 2014-2016)
- Model Penal Code: Sentencing (MPCS, 2001-2017)
- Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI-II, 2016-2019)
- Academic Review Panel (ARP, 2020-2021)

Given the substantial changes to the sentencing guidelines suggested during this comprehensive review, the Commission approved the publication of a working draft of recommendations received, and the scheduling of hearings, to receive public comment before moving forward with consideration of any revisions.

Background on the Comprehensive Review

Since the implementation of the first sentencing guidelines in 1982, the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing has adopted eighteen changes (i.e., new editions, amendments, revisions, and supplements), the most recent of which incorporate guidelines for probation, for the use of restrictive conditions (i.e., county intermediate punishment programs), and for fines and community service; fourteen legislatively-mandated sentencing enhancements; and recommendations to identify eligible and appropriate candidates for programs at the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections. During the same period, the Commission adopted and implemented a sentence risk assessment instrument and guidelines for resentencing following revocation of probation, proposed a model pretrial risk assessment tool related to domestic violence, and held public hearings on proposed guidelines for parole and recommitment ranges to be considered following revocation of parole.

While a comprehensive review of the sentencing guidelines is a necessary response to increasing legislative mandates and clarifying court decisions, the rebuilding of the sentencing guidelines serves as a vehicle to reform and improve Pennsylvania's criminal justice system. This process advances the goals of the Commonwealth's Justice Reinvestment Initiatives (JRI-I and JRI-II), while giving renewed focus to concerns about racial justice and the over-reliance on incarceration and long periods of community supervision. As noted previously, four independent initiatives have been critical to this review, and in the development of proposals for consideration in the rebuilding of the sentencing guidelines:

• Strategic Planning Work Group (SPWG) (2014— 2016)—The Commission established the Strategic Planning Work Group (SPWG) in 2014, involving a representative statewide group of 35 criminal justice stakeholders to take a fresh look at the sentencing guidelines. The group met for seventeen meetings over the course of almost two years to conduct a full external review of Pennsylvania's sentencing guidelines. The goals of the review were to streamline and simplify the guidelines, to better incorporate the mandated sentencing enhancements, to promote greater certainty in sentences and more efficient use of correctional programs.

Specific SPWG recommendations included: recalibration and expansion of the number of offense gravity score categories (from 14 to 48) in order to provide more targeted recommendations and more uniform and proportional increases; reduction in the impact of prior record score through expanded lapsing provisions and simplified/ automated consideration of previous convictions; use of adjustments to offense gravity score assignments to consistently address offense-based and offender-based factors; and modification of offense gravity score assignments to address mandated enhancements.

• Model Penal Code: Sentencing (MPCS) (2001— 2017)—The Model Penal Code served as the basis for Pennsylvania's 1973 recodification of the Crimes Code (Act 334 of 1972). The American Law Institute (ALI) initiated a project in 2001 to rewrite the sentencing and corrections provisions of the Model Penal Code. In 2017, the ALI approved the new Model Penal Code: Sentencing (MPCS). As noted by Professor Kevin R. Reitz, MPCS Reporter, the new MPCS is the first official amendment to any section of the original Model Penal Code since it was adopted in 1962, and provides an institutional framework for all major forms of punishment. It includes, for the first time, standards for sentencing commissions and sentencing guidelines, and suggests sentencing procedures that promote greater fairness and transparency.

Many of the MPCS recommendations address limits on punishment and elimination of disproportionate sentence severity, while focusing on the individualization of sentences and the prioritization of the use of correctional resources to offenders who present the greatest risk and highest needs. Specific provisions contained in the MPCS related to sentencing guidelines include limits on the use of criminal history, standards for addressing multiple sentences, consideration of offender treatment needs and risk of reoffending, and reiterates the recommendation that a pre-sentence investigation be ordered whenever a defendant has been convicted of a felony and the court is considering a sentence in excess of the time served while awaiting conviction and sentencing.

• Justice Reinvestment II (JRI-II) (2016—2019)—A second statewide Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI-II) Working Group was assembled in 2016, with members appointed by the Governor, the Chief Justice, and the leaders of the General Assembly. The goal of JRI-II was to develop evidence-based recommendations to reform and improve operations at the front-end of Pennsylvania's criminal justice system. The working group presented consensus recommendations in December of 2018, and related legislation was enacted in November of 2019.

The working group recommended that the Commission: revise the prior record scoring to reflect risk to offend; adjust minimum ranges incrementally, to support further reinvestments in recidivism reducing interventions; guide the use of restrictive conditions of probation, terms of probation, use of split sentences, and maximum sentences; create interactive guideline information to support decisions with risk, recidivism, and cost information; and continue to analyze the cost and impact of restoring mandatory minimum sentences.

Specific to the sentencing guidelines, the legislation enacted by the General Assembly (Acts 114 and 115 of 2019) provided for the modification of factors to be considered in adopting the guidelines; adjustments to criminal history to better address risk to reoffend and substantial risk to public safety; and greater targeting of the use of specific sentencing options, including new guidelines to address the intensity and duration of probation, including the use of CIP programs as restrictive conditions of probation; and provided that the sentence risk assessment instrument could be used to help determine the intensity of intervention, use of restrictive conditions, and duration of supervision.

• Academic Review Panel (ARP) (2020-2021)—As the last phase of the comprehensive review, the Commission

convened an Academic Review Panel, chaired by Commission Member Judge Leon Tucker, comprising legal and social science faculty and practitioners who are subject matter experts in the areas of sentencing and corrections, guidelines, juvenile and criminal justice policy, social justice, and race and ethnicity. The panel included Vil-lanova Law Professor Steven L. Chanenson, former Commission Chair and SPWG Chair; and Minnesota Law Professor Kevin R. Reitz, MPCS Reporter. Commission staff facilitated 11 meetings between November 2020 and May 2021 for the purpose of discussing systemic changes needed to address racial disparity, to incorporate evidence-based practices, and to consider approaches taken by other jurisdictions. The panel reviewed the proposals advanced by the SPWG and the JRI-II working group, studied Commission data, and considered the MPCS sentencing guidelines provisions, especially as related to the use of criminal history.

The panel supported recommendations that give primary consideration in the sentencing guidelines to the conviction offense and factors related to that offense, while decreasing the impact of the prior record score due to its role as a secondary factor at sentencing. The Commission's enabling legislation and the MPCS provisions related to purposes of sentencing and sentencing guidelines require sentence recommendation that address the gravity of the offense, the harm done to crime victims, and the blameworthiness of the offender. To the degree these factors are addressed through the sentence recommendation for the conviction offense, the MPCS suggests limits on additional punishment for blameworthiness linked to the criminal history, as the offender has already been punished for prior convictions. The MPCS further cautions that the use of criminal history to assess an offender's risk of reoffending may over-predict those risks. And, consistent with the analysis of Commission data, the MPCS warns of disparate impacts on racial or ethnic minorities, or other disadvantaged groups, when increases in sentence recommendations are associated with higher prior record scores.

Specific prior record score recommendations include a recalculation of prior record score based on categories of offenses rather than point values; the establishment of new prior record score categories (0, Low, Medium, High) to better distinguish seriousness of criminal history and risk of re-offense; the expansion of the juvenile lapsing policy linked to the age of the offender; and the addition of an adult lapsing policy to address stale records. The proposed prior record score categories include a 'true zero' category for those with no previous convictions or with lapsed adjudications or convictions, while retaining RFEL and REVOC as part of the High category.

Working Draft of Proposals

Proposals related to § 303.1—Sentencing guidelines standards

Proposed addition of preliminary provisions that provide the authorization for the adoption of guidelines for sentencing, guidelines for probation and for restrictive conditions, and guidelines for fines; addition of definitions; and addition of statutory factors the Commission shall address when adopting guidelines for sentencing, guidelines for probation and restrictive conditions, and guidelines for fines.

Proposed modification of current provisions to provide more consistent practices in each county for the preparation of guideline sentence forms and the consideration of the sentence recommendations prior to sentencing. Best practices include the use of an administrative order or local rule to prescribe the process for preparation of the guideline sentence forms using the JNET-based SGS Web application, and consideration by the court and the parties of the sentence recommendations prior to sentencing. The involvement of the prosecutor is critical in the preparation of guideline sentence forms, as the prosecutor has the burden of proving sentencing factors used to determine the offense gravity score assignment, adjustments or enhancements, and prior record score, and has agreed to any provisions of a negotiated plea. Providing SGS Web-generated guideline sentence forms to all parties prior to sentencing allows for adequate review of the accuracy of the information and ensures consideration of the sentence recommendations and the related sentence risk assessment information.

Proposed modification of current provisions to provide more consistent practices in each county for the reporting of all required sentencing information to the Commission through the JNET-based SGS Web application no later than 30 days after sentencing. Best practices include the use of an administrative order or local rule to prescribe the process for the submission of completed guideline sentence forms and information on the sentence imposed for each conviction offense. The involvement of the adult probation and parole department is critical in the full reporting of sentences to the Commission, as the adult probation and parole department is responsible for supervising the majority of cases sentenced by the court, whether through sentences to probation or other restorative sanctions, or upon release from a county correctional facility. Additionally, the state funding plan for county adult probation and parole departments and the CIP funding take into consideration a county's full submission of data to the Commission and certification of compliance with the sentencing guidelines.

Proposals related to § 303.2—Procedure for determining the guideline sentence

Proposed modification to note consideration of any offense gravity score modifications due to offense adjustments or sentencing factor adjustments as described in § 303.3, and to reference incorporation of the sentence risk assessment instrument as part of the preparation of the sentencing guidelines.

Proposals related to § 303.3—Offense gravity score (general)

Proposed expansion of the number of offense gravity scores from the current 15 categories (14 general categories and one category for Murder 1 and Murder 2) to the proposed 42 categories (36 general categories and six Murder 1 and Murder 2 categories), with reassignment of omnibus offense gravity scores. This proposal, first suggested by the SPWG to include 48 categories, is intended to provide more targeted and consistent sentence recommendations and to allow modifications to the offense gravity score (e.g., step-up or step-down) to automate and reflect adjustments for sentencing factors and enhancements. Details of the procedure used to reassign offense gravity scores is discussed in § 303.15 (relating to offense listing).

Proposed modification of the offense gravity score assignments address offense adjustments (e.g., inchoate, ethnic intimidation, terrorism, ecoterrorism), sentencing factor adjustments (e.g., cooperation, course of conduct, role in offense), general enhancement provisions (e.g., deadly weapon, drug possession, criminal gang, domestic violence), and certain offense-specific enhancement provisions (e.g., human trafficking, arson offenses, sexual abuse of children). See Attachment 1.

Proposed offense adjustments decrease the offense gravity score assignments by one point for inchoate offenses and increase the offense gravity score assignments by two points for ethnic intimidation, terrorism, and ecoterrorism. Second or subsequent offenses for which the grade or statutory maximum are increased, including violations of the Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, are assigned higher offense gravity scores than those assigned to initial offenses. Higher offense gravity scores are also assigned for distribution of controlled substances to minors when the maximum penalty is doubled.

Proposed sentencing factor adjustments include decreasing the offense gravity score assignments based on cooperation and limited role in the offense; and increasing the offense gravity score assignments based on aggravated role in the offense or course of conduct, including temporal or offense pattern, and circumstances involving multiple victims, repeat victimization, or vulnerable victim.

Proposed general enhancements, which increase the offense gravity score assignments by one or more points, include possession or use of a deadly weapon and drug trafficking in a school zone and/or to minors, replacing the separate matrices of the current sentencing guidelines. The offense gravity score is proposed to increase by two steps when the court determines an offender participated in a criminal gang and for specified offenses involving domestic violence. For most offense-specific enhancements, the offense gravity score assignments proposed in § 303.15 have been increased to reflect consideration of the enhancement factor. In certain circumstances, additional enhancements apply.

This proposed approach to offense gravity score assignments, adjustments, and enhancements as proposed by the SPWG is intended to provide greater consistency and certainty in sentencing when common aggravating and mitigating factors are determined by the court to be present. Additionally, this and related proposals allow for streamlining and automating the application of numerous legislatively mandated sentence enhancements.

Proposals related to § 303.4—Prior record score (categories)

Proposed redesign of the prior record score categories and the procedures for determining the prior record score. The current eight prior record score categories (0-5,RFEL, REVOC) are replaced with four categories (0, Low, Medium, High). This proposal by the ARP creates categories that better distinguish criminal history and better reflect differences in risk to reoffend based on the seriousness and number of previous adjudications and convictions.

The proposed 0 category is limited to those with no prior convictions, or those with an extended period of law-abiding behavior following a conviction (e.g., Clean Slate). The proposed Low category includes those with a single prior M1 adjudication or conviction, or with multiple prior M2 or lesser offenses; the Medium category includes those with a single prior felony adjudication or conviction, or with multiple prior F3 or lesser offenses; and the High category including those with two or more prior F1 or F2 adjudications or convictions (RFEL), or with two or more prior adjudications or convictions for crimes of violence (REVOC).

This proposed approach to the prior record score determination is consistent with the JRI-II recommendation that the primary focus be on risk to reoffend, while retaining some consideration of blameworthiness by distinguishing those with no prior convictions or with long periods of crime-free behavior from those with continuing criminal conduct. And consistent with the MPCS recommendations, the impact of criminal history is substantially reduced in the sentence recommendation, shifting the primary focus to the current conviction offense and reducing the racial disparity associated with higher prior record score categories. See Attachment 2.

Proposals related to § 303.5—Prior record score (prior convictions)

Proposed addition of a lapsing provision for previous adult convictions. This was first recommended by the SPWG to address and standardize the common occurrence of mitigated sentences for stale prior records; the proposal was expanded and linked to provisions of Clean Slate by Drexel University law school students; the proposal was further refined by the ARP to include the elimination from the prior record score of any previous misdemeanor, ungraded felony, or F3 conviction upon successful completion of a 10-year crime-free period; elimination from the prior record score of any previous F1 or F2 conviction, unless specified as a crime of violence, upon completion of a 15-year crime-free period; and elimination from the prior record score of any previous conviction for a crime of violence upon successful completion of a 25-year crimefree period.

Proposals related to § 303.6—Prior record score (prior juvenile adjudications)

Proposed expansion of the existing lapsing provision for previous juvenile adjudications. The ARP closely examined the role of previous juvenile adjudications. The ARP noted research (e.g., brain development, age-crime curve, redemption and aging out of criminality), recent appellate court opinions, and the differences in purposes and procedural safeguards between the juvenile and adult justice systems, as support for a more limited consideration of previous juvenile adjudications in the prior record score. While previous juvenile adjudications only contribute to the prior record score in 6% of reported sentences, their impact on the sentence recommendation can be substantial.

The ARP proposed the retention of the policies that exclude consideration of previous juvenile adjudications for offenses committed prior to age 14 and for previous M2 and M3 juvenile adjudications; elimination from the prior record score of any previous juvenile adjudications for M1, F3 and ungraded felonies at age 21; elimination from the prior record score of any previous F1 or F2 juvenile adjudications at age 25, unless specified as a crime of violence; and elimination from the prior record score of any previous juvenile adjudication for a crime of violence upon successful completion of a 10-year crimefree period.

Proposals related to § 303.7—Prior record score (guideline points scoring)

Proposed replacement of the existing point scoring procedures with a new process, in which the first step involves the identification of the prior offense with the highest grade or statutory maximum, and the second step involves identification of prior offenses of the same grade or statutory maximum. This approach is intended to simplify and automate the preparation of the prior record score, and to better distinguish the seriousness of criminal history and the risk of re-offense.

Proposals related to § 303.8—Prior record score (miscellaneous)

Proposed modification to text related to excluded offenses, taking note of the new lapsing provisions proposed in § 303.5 and § 303.6.

Proposals related to § 303.9—Guideline sentence recommendations (general)

Proposed modification to text to address Murder 1 and Murder 2 recommendations and certain procedures related to enhancements and taking note of a single matrix replacing seven existing matrices.

Proposed modification to text to incorporate reference to the sentence risk assessment instrument, the recommendations related to obtaining additional information (RNR PSI) for consideration prior to sentencing, and reference to related MPCS provisions.

Proposed replacement of P1 and P2 with probation recommendations ranging from six months to 36 months in duration.

Proposed consideration of MPCS provisions related to recommendations or suggested limits of the use of concurrent and consecutive terms when imposing multiple sentences.

Proposals related to § 303.10—Guideline sentence recommendations (enhancements)

Proposed modifications to remove references to separate enhancement matrices and to the addition of months to sentence recommendations, and to add reference to the two procedures for applying enhancements: the assignment of an increased offense gravity score, particularly for offense-specific enhancements; and an increase of the assigned offense gravity score by one or more points, for both general enhancements and certain offense-specific enhancements.

Proposals related to § 303.11—Guideline sentence recommendations (sentencing levels)

Proposed modification of the existing five sentencing levels, which provide general classifications concerning the type of sentence, to seven sentencing levels, that more specifically target disposition and duration of sentences. This is consistent with the SPWG and JRI-II proposals to promote certainty in sentencing, evidence-based practices, and the efficient use of resources.

Proposed Level A targets the use of restorative sanctions other than probation, encouraging consideration of community service or fines as a sole sanction for relatively minor offenses. Level B targets the use of probation for durations ranging from six months to 36 months, with consideration of the use of restrictive conditions to address intensity of supervision. Level C targets confinement in a county facility and provides for a trade-off with restrictive conditions of probation as an alternative to confinement or consistent with a clinical assessment. Level D targets confinement in a state facility for most felony offenses. Level F targets confinement in a state facility for felonies with a statutory maximum of greater than 20 years. Level H targets sentences for Murder 1 and Murder 2 and incorporates applicable mandatory sentencing provisions.

Proposals related to § 303.12—Guideline sentence recommendations (sentencing programs)

No substantive proposals. This section was modified (7th Edition, Amendment 6) to include recently enacted legislation (Act 2019-115) and to describe correctional and sentencing programs. Modification to note the role of risk, needs, and responsivity to inform sentencing decisions.

Proposals related to § 303.13—Guideline sentence recommendations (aggravating and mitigating circumstances)

Proposed modification to disposition and duration of aggravated and mitigated ranges to correspond with sentencing levels.

Proposed Level A aggravated/mitigated adjustment to the standard range is 25 hours of community service. Level B aggravated/mitigated adjustment to the standard range is six months of probation or one month of restrictive conditions. Level C aggravated/mitigated adjustment to the standard range is two months of confinement in a county facility or the equivalent period of restrictive conditions of probation. Level D aggravated/ mitigated adjustment to the standard range is four months of confinement in a county or state facility. Level E aggravated/mitigated adjustment to the standard range is six months of confinement in a state facility. Level F aggravated/mitigated adjustment to the standard range is 12 months of confinement in a state facility. Level H aggravated/mitigated adjustment to the standard range is 24 months of confinement in a state facility.

Proposed consideration of a common practice identified by the MPCS of providing a non-exclusive list of aggravating and mitigating reasons for consideration by the court.

Proposals related to § 303.14—Guideline sentence recommendations (economic sanctions)

Proposed modification to fines/community service guidelines to address the changes to the Basic Sentencing Matrix, including the addition of offense gravity score categories and reduction in the number of prior record score categories. Recommended hours of community service range from 25—50 hours (or comparable fine based on hourly wage) to 225—250 hours (or comparable fine based on hourly wage), with 25-hour increments.

Proposals related to § 303.15—Offense listing

Proposed offense gravity score assignments. See Attachment 3.

The standard range of the current offense gravity score serves as an anchor for the proposed reassignment, with the disposition and duration of the median sentence (based on an analysis of 2017—2019 sentencing data) used to refine the new assignment. This provides assignments that reflect the 'typical sentence for the typical offense.' Further modifications to the assignments promote uniformity and proportionality across offenses and address specified adjustments and enhancements.

Proposed changes to the drug offense categories combine several high-volume categories into a single category, due to the limited number of convictions reported and the ability of the court to depart from the guidelines due to substantially higher quantities. The proposals also increase the offense gravity score assignments when the statutory maximum is doubled (e.g., 35 P.S. § 780-114 and § 780-115).

Proposals related to § 303.16(a)—Basic Sentencing Matrix

Proposed Basic Sentencing Matrix. See Attachment 4.

Proposals related to § 303.16(b)—Sentencing Matrix for Offenders Convicted of 1st or 2nd Degree Murder

Proposed deletion. Incorporated into Basic Sentencing Matrix.

Proposals related to § 303.17—Deadly Weapon Enhancement Matrices

Proposed deletion. Addressed through modification to offense gravity score enhancement provisions (§ 303.3).

Proposals related to § 303.18—School and Youth Enhancement Matrices

Proposed deletion. Addressed through modifications to offense gravity score enhancement provisions (§ 303.3).

ATTACHMENT 2

Proposed Prior Record Score Procedure

A. Identify all offenses for which the defendant was adjudicated delinquent or convicted prior to the date of the current offense:

(1) Juvenile adjudications—consider the most serious offense for which the individual was adjudicated delinquent from each disposition that meets the following criteria:

a. Individual 14 years of age or older at the time of the offense.

b. There was an express finding by the juvenile court that the adjudication was for a felony or M1 offense (exclude consideration of all lesser offenses).

(2) Adult convictions—consider every offense for which the individual was convicted. For former Pennsylvania offenses and out-of-state offenses:

a. Determine the current equivalent Pennsylvania offense.

b. Identify the grade associated with the current equivalent offense.

B. Lapsing provisions. Remove the following offenses from consideration in the prior record score:

(1) Juvenile adjudications:

a. At 21 years of age, remove all offenses with the following grades: M1, F, F3.

b. At 25 years of age, remove all offenses with the following grades, unless designated as a violent offense: F2, F1.

c. Crime-free period. If the defendant has successfully completed a 10-year crime-free period since the last adjudication or conviction, remove the remaining juvenile adjudications.

(2) Adult convictions:

a. Crime-free period. If the defendant has successfully completed a 10-year crime-free period since the last conviction, remove all offenses with the following grades: M, M3, M2, M1, F, F3.

b. Crime-free period. If the defendant has successfully completed a 15-year crime-free period since the last conviction, remove all offenses with the following grades, unless designated as a crime of violence: F2, F1.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

c. Crime-free period. If the defendant has successfully completed a 25-year crime-free period since the last conviction, remove the remaining adult convictions.
