

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rule-making must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, have caused this Proclamation to issue and, in compliance with the provisions of Section 15 of Article IV of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, do hereby give notice that I have filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, with my objections thereto, the following bill passed by both houses of the General Assembly at the Regular Session of 2021-2022:

House Bill No. 146, Printer's No. 3329, entitled "An act [a]mending Title 61 (Prisons and Parole) of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes*, in Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole, further providing for definitions and for parole power."

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of the Commonwealth, at the County of Dauphin, this thirtieth day of September, in the year of our Lord two thousand and twenty-two, and of the Commonwealth two hundred and forty-seven.

Notice of Veto; House Bill No. 146, Printer's No. 3329

September 30, 2022

To the Honorable House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 146, Printer's Number 3329.

This legislation, although attempting to address a tragic event, is misguided and would only set back the criminal justice system in Pennsylvania. The bill was prompted by the tragic death of an 8-year-old boy, and I sympathize with the family for their loss and for the desire of legislators to make Pennsylvania a safer place.

However, this legislation does not promote public safety, but instead proposes a mechanical and ineffective structure of mandatory parole denial, which is in effect a mandatory minimum by another name. This bill limits the Pennsylvania Parole Board's authority by prohibiting it from releasing a person convicted of an obstruction of justice or a violent offense while incarcerated on parole for an additional 12 or 24 months, respectively, after the original minimum term fixed by the courts or following the new conviction, whichever is longer. In many cases, it takes years for a conviction to occur. This bill would result in automatic parole denial for

much longer than 12 or 24 months regardless of the circumstances of the individual case. This legislation also defines obstruction of justice broadly to include such non-violent offenses as possessing contraband even though there is no evidence that such offenses have any relationship to successful reintegration.

The Parole Board uses a number of evidence-based tools and principles to make informed, accurate decisions that ensure public safety. This legislation arbitrarily limits the nuances of that decision-making process. After a review of cases of parolees committing crimes, no evidence was found that misconduct of policy or rule violations would have reasonably affected the outcomes of the cases. Further, this legislation would undermine our legal system by increasing the minimum term of incarceration after a judge has imposed a final sentence and it would cause a person to be incarcerated longer for a conviction that did not even exist at the original time of sentencing.

This proposed institution of backdoor mandatory minimums would remove discretion from the Pennsylvania Parole Board, undermine the determination of the original sentencing judge and jury, and trample upon the protections of the criminal justice system in Pennsylvania.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 146, Printer's Number 3329.

The following is a summary of recent actions of the General Assembly during the 2022 Regular Session:


Reorganization of the Fish and Boat Commission

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Agricultural Hemp Promotion, Education and Export Promotion Matching Grant Program; 2022-2023 Application Period

The Department of Agriculture (Department) announces the program requirements and application period for grants under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Hemp Promotion, Education and Export Promotion Matching Grant Program (Program). The Program is authorized under Fiscal Years (FY) 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 budgetary appropriations to the Department for agricultural product promotion, education and exports for hemp. The Department intends to make up to \$200,000 available for grants under the Program.

1. Program objectives.

- (a) *Purpose*. The Department will award grants to provide matching funds to nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations to reimburse up to 50% of the cost of projects intended to:
- (1) Increase consumer awareness of agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth and thereby increase sales of these agricultural hemp products.
- (2) Educate producers and consumers with respect to agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (3) Otherwise facilitate the growth and development of export markets for agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (b) Applicants. Grants will be awarded to Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations.
 - (c) FY 2022-2023 project funding priorities.
- (1) The Department will prioritize eligible projects for promotion, education and export market development of agricultural hemp within this Commonwealth to receive grant funding.
- (d) Competitive program. The Program is competitive. Grant requests and related documentation will be reviewed by the Secretary, who will approve or reject each grant request.
- (e) Funds available basis. Grants will not be awarded unless funds are available for this purpose. The Department need not expend all the funds that are available for the Program.
- 2. *Definitions*. The following words and terms have the following meanings:

Applicant—A Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization which applies for grant moneys under the Program.

Bureau—The Bureau of Market Development of the Department.

Eligible hemp products—An agricultural or industrial hemp product that is legal to grow, process and sell within this Commonwealth which has a major component/ingredient derived from the hemp plant.

Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization—A nonprofit business organization having its principal business offices within this Commonwealth, or having 50% or more of its membership within this Commonwealth, or having 50% or more of the agricultural products which it promotes or markets pro-

duced within this Commonwealth, and having as its members groups, individuals or organizations that serve to distribute a Commonwealth produced agricultural product in commerce. These members may include whole-salers, distributors, brokers, retailers, processors, growers and producers.

Secretary—The Secretary of the Department.

- 3. Limitations on grants. The minimum amount of a matching grant is \$1,000. A matching grant is a reimbursement grant, meaning no payment of grant funds will be made by the Department until the subject project is completed and the applicant documents the completion of the project to the Department in accordance with this notice.
 - 4. Uses of matching grant moneys.
- (a) Conformity to application. Matching grant moneys awarded to an applicant shall be expended solely to reimburse up to 50% of the cost of the specific project described in the grant application.
- (b) Allowable expenditures of grant moneys. Grant moneys shall be used for one or more of the following purposes described in the grant application:
- (1) To pay the cost of the specific project described in the grant application.
- (2) To pay the cost of a portion of a Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization's contribution to a National or regional agricultural product promotion and marketing project.
- (3) To pay the cost of programs conducted by an applicant to educate producers and consumers with respect to agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (4) To pay the cost of such other activities consistent with the Secretary of Agriculture's authority under section 1704 of The Administrative Code of 1929, as amended (71 P.S. § 444).
- (c) Prohibited expenditure of grant moneys. Grant moneys may not be used to defray the costs of employing temporary or permanent personnel.
 - 5. Applications.
- (a) Application required. Interested Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations shall submit grant applications to the Department. An application shall include a detailed work plan and project budget.
- (b) Project commencement and completion dates. An application shall designate July 1, 2022, or a later date, as the project start date and June 30, 2023, or earlier, as the project completion date. Program grant funds will not be awarded or paid for project activities that occur before the stated project start date or beyond the stated project completion date.
- (c) *Electronic applications only*. Interested applicants must submit a complete electronic project proposal and grant application using the Department's Electronic Single Application web site at https://www.esa.dced.state.pa.us/login.aspx?var=5.
- (d) Application window. Applications shall be submitted by 5 p.m. on Friday, December 2, 2022.
- (e) Additional documentation. The Secretary may require that an applicant submit additional documentation

to complete or verify an application. The additional documentation may include a letter, affidavit or other documentation:

- (1) Verifying that an applicant is a Pennsylvania non-profit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization.
- (2) Verifying the activities and location of offices of an applicant.
- (3) Confirming that the applicant for a matching grant has secured funds in an amount at least equal to the matching grant amount sought for the project.
 - 6. Review of application.
- (a) Transmittal of application to Bureau. When the Bureau receives a complete and accurate grant application, it will forward this application, together with supporting documentation submitted therewith, to the Secretary for review. The Bureau may also forward a recommendation as to whether the application should be approved or rejected, whether the grant should be in an amount less than requested and whether special restrictions or limitations should be placed on the grant.
- (b) Factors. The Secretary will review and evaluate the application and supporting documentation and may consider the following factors, among others, in deciding whether to approve or reject the grant request:
- (1) The relevance of the project to the promotion or marketing of agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (2) The innovativeness of the project described in the application.
- (3) The scope of the project and the number of people who will be exposed to or affected by the project described in the application.
- (4) The impact which the project will have upon the promotion and sales of the agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth to which the project is targeted.
- (5) The availability of full funding for the project from the applicant or from any source other than the grant Program.
- (6) The apparent ability of the applicant to complete the project as described in the application or, in the case of a grant to fund a National or regional agricultural product promotion or marketing project, the apparent ability of the entity with primary responsibility for the project to complete it.
- (7) The overall performance of the project if the project had received funding through any other grant program administered by the Department in a previous fiscal year.
- (8) Projects that are joint efforts between two or more Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations may be given preference over projects involving only one organization.
- (9) Projects where reference to the Department as a source of funding can practicably be made in promotional materials or broadcasts, and that would make such a reference, may be given preference over projects that would not make such a reference.
- (10) Whether the project has been assigned priority for funding in FY 2022-2023, as previously described in paragraph No. 1(c).
- (c) Decisions. The Secretary may approve a grant in an amount less than that requested in the grant application. In addition, the Secretary may impose restrictions or special conditions upon the issuance of a grant. The

Secretary will review all recommendations of the Bureau but will have final authority to accept or reject these recommendations.

7. Notice of disposition of application.

The Department will e-mail notice of the acceptance or rejection of a grant application by Friday, December 30, 2022. This notice will be by e-mail to the address provided by the applicant in the grant application.

8. Grant agreement.

After the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant will execute a written or electronic grant agreement which describes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made. The grant agreement shall contain and conform to the requirements of this notice and shall also contain special terms and conditions as required by the Secretary.

- 9. Verification of project completion.
- (a) *General*. Within 30 days of completion of the subject project, the applicant shall provide the Department with proof of the completion of the project and eligibility to receive reimbursement grant funds from the Department.
- (b) Required documentation. The proof described in subsection (a) shall consist of:
- (1) Copies of invoices for goods or services directly related to the project, confirming that the total billed amount is at least twice the amount of the grant, along with the written certification of the president or treasurer of the applicant that the goods or services that are the subject of the invoices have been delivered or provided to the applicant.
- (2) A certificate of completion, signed by its president or treasurer, verifying completion of the subject project and stating that the grant funds will reimburse the applicant for a portion of the costs incurred by the applicant in completing the subject project.
- 10. Delivery of grant funds by the Department. The Department will pay the grant amount to the applicant in a single payment within 45 days of receiving the proof of completion previously described in paragraph No. 9.

- Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Board; Grant Solicitation and Application Procedures for Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act Funding
- 1. Introduction. The Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program Board (Board) annually, or more fre-

quently as the availability of fund permits, solicits applications for grants to conduct promotion, marketing and research projects to increase the quality, profitability, production and sale of wines, enhance the wine industry and benefit wine producers of this Commonwealth. The Board was established by the Department of Agriculture (Department) under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4501—4513 (relating to Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act) (ACMA). Its composition, funding and duties were subsequently expanded by section 488.1 of the Liquor Code (47 P.S. § 4-488.1). The Board makes recommendations for the awarding of grants by the Liquor Control Board from funds provided through the Liquor Code (47 P.S. §§ 1-101—10-1001) for Liquor Control Board Act 39 of 2016 funding. This notice establishes the procedures by which grant applications will be solicited, reviewed and grants awarded. The purpose of this solicitation is to procure proposals to complete an economic impact study regarding the wine industry within this Commonwealth for 2021.

- 2. Solicitation. The Board will be accepting grant applications for the purposes, in the form and grant according to the schedule set forth herein for not less than 30 days beginning on the date of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Additional publication and dissemination of this notice shall be made and may include direct dissemination to qualified entities that perform this type of work. The maximum award available is \$40,000.
- 3. *Process overview*. The Board will employ the review process described as follows.
- a. The Department will receive proposals and disseminate them to the Board for review. The Board will meet on Tuesday, February 21, 2023, at 10 a.m. and score the proposals to determine to whom they will award the funds. Within 3 days of this decision the Department will communicate the results to all who submitted proposals.
- 4. Application deadline. Applicants should submit a Project Proposal and Grant Application, in the form set forth in paragraph 5 of this notice, to the Board by 4 p.m. on Friday, December 9, 2022. Proposals should be sent electronically as a PDF file, to RA-AGCommodities@pa.gov. The file should not exceed 5MB.
- 5. Format of the project proposal and grant application. Failure to follow this format could result in rejection of the proposal. Applicants may submit up to three one-page letters of support which do not count toward the page limit. The project proposal and grant application cannot exceed ten pages total for project and budget narratives, plus one additional page for the budget table and shall be formatted as follows:
- a. A cover page, titled Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program—Project Proposal and Grant Application, providing: the title of the proposed project; the full legal name and street address of the applicant; the name, address, telephone number and e-mail address of the applicant's principal contact person for matters relating to the application; the name, title, address, telephone number and e-mail address of the individual authorized to contractually bind the applicant to the grant agreement; and the total maximum grant amount sought for the proposed project or program.

- b. Addendum, titled Demonstrated Qualifications, should be attached as a maximum three-page addendum which does not count toward the page limit of the proposal.
- i. Describe how previous industry market research has been employed by the industries in this Commonwealth or other states:
- ii. List any reports or projects presented at meetings in this Commonwealth, other states, or countries.
- c. Section 1, titled Project Narrative, explaining or identifying methods for measuring and reporting data; details of the proposed project, including a timeline, statement of expected impact of data, staffing for the project, and objectives and methodologies; and whether, how and to what anticipated extent, the proposed report can be leveraged to impact quality, profitability, production and sale of wines, enhance the wine industry and benefit wine producers of this Commonwealth.
- d. Section 2, titled Data Points of Economic Impact Report. At minimum, the report must cover all data points from the 2018 economic impact report and should explore any new recommended areas by the applicant. Applicants can download the 2018 report at https://pennsylvaniawine.com/wp-content/uploads/2020/02/PWA_EconomicImpact-FNL.pdf. The report must capture how this Commonwealth ranks in the industry Nationally.
- e. Section 3, titled Evaluation and Reporting, in this section individuals should describe in detail the approach to methodology and include a narrative describing data collection to inform the outcome measures. This section must be clear and unambiguous as it will inform expectations of progress reports and the final report.
- f. Section 4, titled Budget, presenting a detailed budget for the proposed project or program, including any other matching funds and the value of any noncash resources that will be included in the project.

For all applications, each and every item of direct expense to be incurred in the project shall be separately set forth, including all purchases of consumable or nonconsumable goods or equipment, listing the disposition of all nonconsumable goods or equipment upon completion of the project; all travel by dates, purpose, destination, mode of transportation and rate; a full breakdown of other costs, if any, and the method used to calculate those costs. See also paragraph 12.

- i. *Personnel*—Includes employed personnel. Those employed elsewhere should be listed as subcontractors or consultants in the contractual cost category. Provide detail of all personnel by name devoted to the project, their professional qualifications, the amount of time calculated by hours and the tasks to be performed by each of the named personnel.
- ii. *Fringe benefits*—Provide the rate of fringe benefits for each project participant's salary. Identify the total for all funded fringe benefits.
- iii. Travel—Calculate the costs for travel by considering destinations, number of trips, days traveling, transportation costs, estimated lodging and meal costs and estimated mileage rate.

- iv. Supplies—This could be anything from office supplies and software, to education or field supplies.
- v. Contractual—If contractual work will be involved with carrying out the work of the project, identify the total contractual expenses. When determining the total cost for this category, include the fees for the professional services, travel costs, lodging expenses, indirect costs as provided in paragraph 12 and any other related contractual expenses.
- vi. Other—This category includes fees for conferences or meetings, facility and equipment rental costs, lodging and meal expenses, communication costs, speaker fees, publication costs and data collection.
- g. Section 5, titled Budget Narrative, providing details of how individuals arrived at the estimated expenses in the budget and describing how each expense will lead to the success of the project.
- h. Section 6, titled Industry Participation, addressing the extent of support, participation and data that will be derived directly from the Commonwealth's wine industry, including wineries, associations, organizations or agencies, or both, with an interest in the project outcome. Any letters or written confirmation of that support, or participation should be included in this section.
- 6. Scoring of applications. The Board will evaluate each complete and timely-filed project proposal and grant application it receives, which shall include a 100-point scale assessing:
- a. Up to 20 points for research methodology including data retrieval.
- b. Up to 40 points for previous experience or demonstrated expertise.
 - c. Up to 20 points for overall project evaluation.
- d. Up to 20 points for plan to garner support and participation from the industry.
- 7. Evaluation and awards. The Board reserves the right to request modifications or clarifications, or both, of project proposals and grant applications, including but not limited to additional details of purpose, reduced or modified budgets, and the like. Upon completion of evaluations, the Board will prepare a record identifying each complete and timely-filed project proposal and grant application received and the numerical score assigned to each.

- 8. Term of grants. Grant Agreements will become effective on the date of the last required signature affixed to the contract. The contract shall have a term of no longer than 12 months, except in cases where a nocost extension is requested and agreed to in accordance with paragraph 11.
- 9. Progress report. Progress reports are to include the deliverables from paragraph 5.d. A progress report must be delivered by e-mail to RA-AGCommodities@pa.gov no later than six months from the execution of the contract. The Board may request subsequent progress reports prior to the conclusion of the project. Final reports should be submitted within 60 days of contract end date. Failure to meet these deadlines constitutes a breach of the grant agreement, will result in non-payment of invoices, and could jeopardize future grant awards.
- 10. Grant agreement. The Department will provide successful applicants with a grant agreement for Grant-ee's execution to be returned to the Department within 30 calendar days. The Department will obtain the required signature on the grant agreements, including any other required Commonwealth entities and return a copy to the Grantee. Unless otherwise stated in the signed grant agreement, no grant agreement is effective, and work should not begin, and work may not be reimbursed, until all required signatures have been applied to the grant agreement. Among the terms of the grant agreement shall be a requirement that the grant recipient provide the Board with full and complete access to all records relating to the performance of the project and to submit information as the Board may require.
- 11. Nocost extensions and budget adjustments. Requests for contract modifications must be received no later than 60 days prior to the end of the agreement.
- 12. Cost-reimbursement grant and indirect costs cap. Grants made hereunder do not require the applicant to secure or to devote a matching sum to the project. Payment of grant funds will occur on a reimbursement basis only. Grant awards may include an allowance for indirect costs of up to 10%. In the case of graduate student participation, reasonable stipends will be allowed and tuition will not be allowed.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of November 2022

The Department of Banking and Securities (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P.L. 13, No. 6) (41 P.S. § 301), determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of November 2022, is 6 1/4%.

The interest rate limitations under the Commonwealth's usury statute were pre-empted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub.L. No. 96-221). Further pre-emption was instituted with the signing of Pub.L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as his principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board or the United States Treasury, or both. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 3.63 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 6.13 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 6 1/4%.

Designation of School Districts to Receive Duquesne City School District's Senior High School Students

The Duquesne City School District (Duquesne) eliminated its senior high school program in 2007. Section 14 of the act of July 20, 2007 (P.L. 278, No. 45) (Act 45) governed the reassignment of Duquesne's senior high school students until Act 45 was declared unconstitutional by the Commonwealth Court in 2010. In part, Act 45 authorized the Secretary of Education to designate two or more school districts to accept Duquesne's high school students. Under Act 45, then-Secretary of Education Gerald Zahorchak designated the East Allegheny School District (East Allegheny) and the West Mifflin Area School District (West Mifflin) to accept Duquesne's senior high school students on a tuition basis.

Shortly after Act 45 was struck down, the act of November 23, 2010 (P.L. 1350, No. 123) (Act 123) was enacted. The enactment of Act 123 resulted in significant amendments to section 1607 of the Public School Code of 1949 (School Code) (24 P.S. § 16-1607). Section 1607 of the School Code authorizes the Secretary of Education to designate two or more school districts to accept Duquesne's high school students. When Act 123 was enacted, East Allegheny and West Mifflin were designated to continue to accept Duquesne's senior high school students.

In 2012, Duquesne sought and received the approval of the Department of Education (Department) to alter/ curtail its junior high school program (grades 7 and 8). Accordingly, on July 9, 2012, East Allegheny and West

Mifflin were designated to also accept Duquesne's junior high school students under section 1607 of the School Code.

Beginning with the 2021-2022 school year, Duquesne began to again operate a 7th grade program. Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, Duquesne will again operate an 8th grade program. The designation of East Allegheny and West Mifflin to accept Duquesne's 9—12 grade students for the 2022-2023 school year remains unchanged.

As required under section 1607(d) of the School Code, the Department provides the following information regarding the assignment of Duquesne's 9—12 grade students to East Allegheny and West Mifflin.

Assignment of Students

• Students entering grades 9, 10, 11 or 12 shall be assigned to the same district to which they were assigned during the previous school year.

- Private, religious or charter school students who are residents of Duquesne and who wish to enroll in Duquesne and attend East Allegheny or West Mifflin must register as Duquesne students at the Duquesne Education Center to be assigned to either East Allegheny or West Mifflin.
- Students transferring into Duquesne will be given a choice between East Allegheny and West Mifflin and will be assigned to the district they choose.

Per Pupil Tuition Rate

The per pupil tuition rate that the designated districts shall receive for the 2022-2023 school year is \$15,817.15.

- 2. Encapsulate and stabilize the existing structure inside a new steel sheet pile bulkhead (approximately 1,000 linear feet). The perimeter of the pier will be constructed as an anchored steel sheet pile. The upriver and downriver sides of the pier will be tied to each other using anchor rods. The outshore end will be anchored to an internal sheet pile wall constructed inshore and parallel to the outshore wall, or it will be cantilevered to eliminate the internal wall. The sheet pile will be located approximately 2.5 to 3 feet from the existing upriver and downriver pier and the sheet pile on the outshore end will be located approximately 4 to 5 feet from the existing outshore end.
- 3. Place stone fill between the existing timber sheeting and the proposed steel bulkhead to engage the bulkhead

to an elevation of mean low water. Then place concrete fill from mean low water to the top of the existing seawall.

- 4. Perform excavation, as required, to place flowable fill beneath the timber decking to fill voids present between the timber decking and the mudline below. The amount of flowable fill required is unknown but will only be required in an approximately 3,600 square foot portion of the pier. An engineer's estimate of flowable fill required is 7,800 cubic yards.
 - 5. Place utilities for shore power.
- 6. New asphalt on the pier and within the floodway after utility and tie rod installation.
- 7. Apply coatings and other treatments to protect the new steel structural elements from corrosion and to enhance the pier's appearance.
- 8. The exterior appearance of the pier will be steel sheeting with a fender system installed where the vessels will be berthing.

- 9. Stormwater runoff will be captured by trench drains located along the perimeter that are routed to a water-quality, pollutant reducing device before discharging.
- 10. The redevelopment of the pier will necessitate the removal of an existing 12" stormwater line that outfalls at the southern edge of Pier 1. GAME COMMISSION

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease—Designation of Disease Management Area # 1

Executive Order

Whereas, Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) is a rapidly spreading, fatal disease in lagomorphs and is considered a foreign animal disease in the United States; and

Whereas, The viruses causing RHD can be transmitted by direct contact with infected rabbits and hares, or indirectly through carcasses, food, water, and any contaminated materials, and are very resistant to extreme environmental conditions; and Whereas, RHD has been designated a "dangerous transmissible disease" of animals by order of the Secretary of Agriculture under the provisions of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2301 et seq.) at 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d); and

Whereas, The Pennsylvania Game Commission (Commission) has determined that eastern cottontails (Sylvilagus floridanus), Appalachian cottontails (Sylvilagus obscurus), and snowshoe hares (Lepus americanus), members of the family Leporidae, are native and familiar species to the public and important prey and game species with impacts on the vegetation structure of their ecosystems; and

Whereas, Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease Virus Serotype 2 (RHDV2), a unique variant of RHD, has been detected in the United States in recent years and can infect all ages of a wide range of domestic and wild lagomorphs, including North American wild species of hares, jackrabbits, and cottontails; and

Whereas, The Commission desires to prevent the introduction and spread of RHDV2 within wild lagomorphs of the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, RHDV2 is of particular concern to the Commonwealth because of its potential to have a detrimental impacts on both wild and domestic lagomorph populations; and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that movement of any wild lagomorphs or their products (meat, pelts, hides, carcasses, etc.), associated equipment or other items and materials from locations where RHDV2 has been detected in wild or domestic lagomorph populations into the Commonwealth poses an unacceptable risk of introduction and spread of RHDV2 to the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, RHDV2 was detected in a domestic rabbit facility in the City of Uniontown, Fayette County, Pennsylvania in August 2022; and

Whereas, The Game and Wildlife Code (34 Pa.C.S. §§ 101, et seq.) and regulations promulgated thereunder (58 Pa. Code §§ 131.1, et seq.) collectively provide broad authority to the Commission to regulate activities relating to the protection, preservation, and management of all game and wildlife and their respective habitats (C.f. 34 Pa.C.S. §§ 322, 2101, and 2102); and

Whereas, Section 137.34 of the Pennsylvania Code (58 Pa. Code § 137.34) provide specific emergency authority to the Executive Director of the Commission to mitigate risk factors and determine the prevalence and geographic distribution of transmissible wildlife diseases of wild birds and mammals, excluding those species under Federal jurisdiction, if the introduction or spread of such diseases poses a threat to human, domestic and wild animal, or environmental health and safety within or adjacent to this Commonwealth; and

Whereas, Previous executive orders concerning a RHD importation ban within this Commonwealth were issued by the Commission on July 9, 2021 and March 23, 2022; and

Whereas, The Commission has determined that the designation of an RHD Disease Management Area is required to implement necessary updates to the Commission's RHD Management Plan.

Now Therefore, I, BRYAN J. BURHANS, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Game Commission, pursu-

ant to the authority vested in me by the Code and regulations promulgated thereunder, do hereby order and direct the following:


- 1. An RHD DMA within this Commonwealth is designated as set forth below. This RHD-DMA is more graphically illustrated on the map titled "Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease—Disease Management Area # 1" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Should any conflict exist between the below-listed written boundaries and the map of Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease—Disease Management Area # 1, the written descriptions shall prevail.
- a. Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease—Disease Management Area # 1: Fayette County, bounded and described as follows: Beginning west of Uniontown at the intersection of SR 21 and SR 3023 (Footedale Road) proceed North on SR 3023 (becoming S. Mill St in New Salem) for 4.7 miles to the intersection of SR 4010 (Searights Herbert Road). Follow SR 4010 east (becoming Pleasant View Smock Road then Upper Middletown Road finally Laurel Hill Road) for 9 miles to the intersection of SR 1051 (W. Crawford Ave). Follow SR 1051 east for .3 miles to SR 1049 (Eighty Acres Road). Follow SR 1049 east for 1.8 miles to the intersection of SR 119. Follow SR 119 south for 1.9 miles to the intersection of SR 2027 (Connellsville Road). Proceed south on SR 2027 for 2.7 miles to the intersection of SR 2021 (Coolspring Jumonville Road). Follow SR 2021 south and east for 1 mile to the intersection of SR 2023 (Hopwood Coolspring Road). Follow 2023 for 2.4 miles to the intersection SR 2040 (National Pike). Follow SR 2040 south for .2 miles to the intersection of SR 3027 (Hopwood Fairchance Road becoming Mountain Road). Follow SR 3027 (Mountain Road becoming N. Main St in Fairchance) southwest for 5 miles to the intersection of SR 3014 (W. Church St). Follow SR 3014 west (becoming Dry Knob Road) for 1.1 miles to the intersection Big Six Road. Turn right on Big Six Road for .3 mile to the intersection of SR 119 (Morgantown Road). Turn right on SR 119 and follow for .5 miles to the intersection of SR 3012 (York Run Road). Follow SR 3012 for 3.5 miles to

the intersection of SR 3009 (Walnut Hill Road). Proceed north on SR 3009 for .8 miles to the intersection of Davis Road. Follow Davis Road becoming Sunshine Hollow Rd for 1 mile to the intersection of Kelly Rd. Turn sharp right and proceed east on Kelly Rd for 1 mile to the intersection of SR 21 (McClellandtown Road). Follow SR 21 east for .3 miles to the point of DMA Boundary origin.

- 2. The removal or export of any wild, free-ranging lagomorph and their parts or products (pelts, hides, carcasses, etc.) that are captured, collected, taken, harvested, or killed within any RHD-DMA within the Commonwealth is hereby prohibited. The removal or export of any wild, free-ranging lagomorph meat with or without bone for human consumption from any RHD-DMA is authorized.
- 3. The direct or indirect feeding of wild free-ranging lagomorphs within any RHD-DMA within the Commonwealth is hereby prohibited.
- 4. The capture, transport, rehabilitation, and release of any living wild free-ranging lagomorphs within any RHD-DMA within the Commonwealth is hereby prohibited.
- 5. This Order shall not be construed in any manner to limit the Commission's authority to establish additional or further authorizations or limitations relating to the monitoring for RHD and mitigation of any risk factors associated with its introduction or spread.
- 6. The previous executive order concerning the RHD importation ban within this Commonwealth issued by the Commission on March 23, 2022 and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on April 2, 2022 at 52 Pa.B. 2086 shall remain in effect and is not altered or limited by this order
- 7. This Order is effective immediately and shall remain in effect until rescinded or modified by subsequent order.
