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

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# READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

### Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

# Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

### Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

### Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

### **How to Find Rules and Regulations**

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde\_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [ ] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

### **Fiscal Notes**

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

# Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care

October 5, 2022

Whereas, the early learning, development, and education of young children is of critical importance to Pennsylvania's families, workforce, education system, employers, and economy; and

Whereas, Pennsylvania has increased its investment in early learning, development, and education programs and has made steady progress to assure that more children receive quality early learning and development services; and

Whereas, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is committed to quality early learning opportunities that intentionally engage and support parents and families in their children's development and strengthen the parent-child bond; and

Whereas, on September 21, 2016, the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services and the U.S. Department of Education issued a joint policy statement to provide guidance to State Advisory Councils (SACs) on Early Childhood Education and Care; on sustaining Federal and State investments; and on advancing work that supports the coordination of quality, comprehensive systems of early care and education at the state level; and

Whereas, the Child Care and Development Fund requires coordination of the provision of child care services funded with other Federal, State, and local child care and early childhood development programs (including programs for the benefit of Native American children, infants and toddlers, children with disabilities, children experiencing homelessness, and children in foster care) to expand accessibility and continuity of care as well as full-day services; and

Whereas, Pennsylvania continues to be a leader in addressing early childhood program governance issues through the Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL), a collaborative effort between the Pennsylvania Department of Education and the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, which is focused on creating opportunities for the Commonwealth's youngest citizens to develop and learn to their fullest potential; and

Whereas, OCDEL has established numerous advisory groups to aid its work and to provide opportunities for stakeholders to engage in the process of policy development.

Now, Therefore, I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by the virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby order and direct that the Pennsylvania Early Learning Council, shall

continue and hereafter be named the Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care (Council) and, further, order and direct as follows:

# Subchapter OOO. PENNSYLVANIA STATE ADVISORY COUNCIL ON EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND CARE COUNCIL

Sec. 6.791. Purpose. 6.792 Responsibilities. 6.793. Composition. 6.794 Subcommittees. 6.795 Chairperson, vice chairperson and members. 6.796. Operations. Relationship with other agencies. 6.7976.798.Effective date 6.799 Termination date. 6.800. Rescission.

### § 6.791. Purpose.

The Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care (Council) shall advise the administration in planning for the expansion of effective early learning and development services for young children and their families and make recommendations to ensure the plans are implemented successfully. The Council will be responsible for advising on the coordination of the delivery of Federal and Commonwealth programs designed to serve young children from birth through their entry into school and making recommendations to ensure a smooth transition for those children into K—12 education and other programs serving older children.

### § 6.792. Responsibilities.

The Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care shall have the following responsibilities, consistent with Federal law:

- (1) Perform a periodic Statewide needs assessment concerning the quality and availability of early childhood learning and development programs and services for children from low-income families from birth to school entry.
- (2) Identify opportunities for, and barriers to, collaboration and coordination among Federally-funded and Commonwealth-funded child care, child learning, development, and education services, and early childhood programs and services.
- (3) Develop recommendations for the Child Care Development Fund State Plans to increase the overall participation of children in existing Federal, Commonwealth and local child care and early childhood learning, education,

- and development programs aimed at ensuring a continuum of care from birth through kindergarten entry and to facilitate enrollment in these programs for underrepresented and special populations.
- (4) Develop recommendations to expand access to quality care and education opportunities for children experiencing homelessness.
- (5) Advise on the continuous improvement of the Pennsylvania Statewide Child Care Emergency Plan to address the needs of all children in Early Childhood Education (ECE) settings.
- (6) Advise on the alignment of policies and funding across ECE programs to encourage healthy child development, comprehensive developmental and behavioral screening, linkages to services and follow up.
- (7) Develop recommendations to streamline enrollment for families who are eligible for multiple public benefits.
- (8) Develop recommendations to align the Office of Child Development and Early Learning's (OCDEL) child care facility licensing requirements and monitoring efforts with program and regulatory requirements for other early learning programs such as Head Start, PA Pre-K Counts and Early Intervention.
- (9) Provide recommendations to OCDEL and institutions of higher education on implementation and continued enhancement of the standards for professional development and qualifications for early childhood educators as well as the established markers for career advancement through the Pennsylvania ECE Career Pathway at https://www.pakeys.org/career-pathway/ to improve the knowledge, skills, and abilities of ECE teachers and administrators.
- (10) Develop consistent policies and training across ECE settings to include all of the following:
  - (i) Reduce suspension and expulsion of young children.
  - (ii) Increase inclusion opportunities.
  - (iii) Support children and families who are dual language learners.
  - (iv) Promote trauma-informed care.
- (11) Review and advise on the Commonwealth's policies for children and families transitioning between ECE programs and services and between ECE and the public school system.

### § 6.793. Composition.

The members of the Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care (Council) shall be appointed by the Governor, consist of at least 25 but no more than 30 individuals representing the following sectors and constitute a diverse representation of the Commonwealth's population. The Governor will fill vacancies as they occur.

- (1) Deputy Secretary for the Office of Child Development and Early Learning.
- (2) Two representatives of institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth.
- (3) Three representatives of local providers of early childhood education and development services from each of the following areas:
  - (i) Child Care.
- (ii) Head Start or Early Head Start, including migrant and seasonal Head Start programs.
  - (iii) Local educational agencies.
  - (4) The Commonwealth Director of Head Start State Collaboration.
- (5) A representative of the Department of Human Services' Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services or the Department of Health.
- (6) The Chairperson or, if applicable, a Co-Chairperson of the Early Learning Investment Commission, or the Chairperson's or, if applicable, the Co-Chairperson's designee.

- (7) The Chairperson of the Commonwealth's State Interagency Coordinating Council.
- (8) Three individuals representing families, including at least one individual who is a current or former recipient of TANF, Child Care Works or Early Intervention Services.
  - (9) Seventeen individuals representing any of the following:
  - (i) Early Childhood or Family advocacy organizations.
  - (ii) Business and industry.
  - (iii) Local governments.
  - (iv) State corrections or law enforcement.
  - (v) The child welfare community.
  - (vi) The children's health community.
- (vii) The early childhood mental health community with experience in providing trauma-informed care.
  - (viii) The philanthropic community.
- (ix) The professional development community that services early learning programs and practitioners.
  - (x) Commonwealth social services agencies.
  - (xi) Community-based programs supporting families with young children.
- (xii) An other individual who can assist the Council with the purposes outlined in this subchapter, including, but not limited to, a representative from any of the subcommittees of the Council.

### § 6.794. Subcommittees.

To ensure robust stakeholder participation, the Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care (Council) may have both standing and ad hoc subcommittees, which subcommittees shall include Council and non-Council members. The following standing subcommittees shall be established: Access to Programs; Professional Development; Physical, Behavioral and Mental Health; Child Care Certification and Quality Rating; and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. Additional ad hoc committees may be established at the discretion of the Co-Chairpersons.

### § 6.795. Chairperson, vice chairperson and members.

- (a) The Deputy Secretary for the Office of Child Development and Early Learning shall serve as Chairperson of the Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care (Council). In addition, the Governor shall appoint a member to serve as Vice Chairperson of the Council, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
- (b) Council members appointed by the Governor and serving by virtue of their official position with the Commonwealth are those identified in § 6.793(1) and (4)—(7) (relating to composition). Other Council members appointed by the Governor will serve for a term of 3 years.
- (c) Members will serve without compensation except for payment of necessary and actual expenses incurred in attending meetings and in performing their duties to only those members who are appointed as the individuals representing families under § 6.793(8). See Chapter 40 (relating to travel and subsistence).

### § 6.796. Operations.

The Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care (Council) operations will include all of the following:

- (1) The Council will hold public meetings and provide opportunities for public comment on the responsibilities under § 6.792 (relating to responsibilities).
- (2) The Council will meet virtually or in-person at least three times annually.

The Office of Child Development and Early Leaning will assist the Council by providing staff support or information, or both, requested by the Council that is needed for the Council to make informed recommendations pursuant to this subchapter. Information provided shall not contain personal information but shall be aggregated or anonymized and otherwise comply with Commonwealth data governance policies and Commonwealth and Federal confidentiality laws, such as those requiring de-identification of individual information.

### § 6.797. Relationship with other agencies.

Commonwealth agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction shall cooperate with and review the recommendations of the Pennsylvania State Advisory Council on Early Childhood Education and Care with respect to its purpose and responsibilities as set forth in this subchapter.

### § 6.798. Effective date.

This subchapter shall take effect immediately.

### § 6.799. Termination date.

This subchapter shall remain in effect until amended or rescinded by the Governor.

### § 6.800. Rescission.

Effective immediately, Executive Order 2008-07, Early Learning Council, is hereby rescinded.

# ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY BOARD [25 PA. CODE CHS. 271 AND 279]

### Municipal Waste Rural Transfer Facility Permit-By-Rule

The Environmental Quality Board (Board) amends Chapters 271 and 279 (relating to municipal waste management—general provisions; and transfer facilities) to update the regulations to read as set forth in Annex A. This final-form rulemaking amends Chapter 271 to establish requirements for operating a rural transfer facility under a permit-by-rule. The amendment to Chapter 279 clarifies that the requirements of that chapter are not applicable to rural transfer facilities.

This final-form rulemaking was adopted by the Board at its meeting of July 12, 2022.

### A. Effective Date

This final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

### C. Statutory Authority

This final-form rulemaking is authorized under sections 105 and 501 of the Solid Waste Management Act (35 P.S. §§ 6018.105 and 6018.501), which grant the Board the authority to adopt rules and regulations of the Department to accomplish the purposes and carry out the provisions of the Solid Waste Management Act (35 P.S. §§ 6018.101—6018.1003); sections 301 and 302 of the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act (53 P.S. §§ 4001.301 and 4001.302); and section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 510-20), which grant the Board the authority to adopt rules and regulations for the proper performance of the work of the Department.

### D. Background and Purpose

Presently, all residents of this Commonwealth do not have convenient and affordable access to waste disposal and recycling options. Specifically, in rural areas of this Commonwealth trash collection and recycling services are not economically feasible to establish and are therefore unavailable to many local communities. This lack of access results in residential waste and recycling being mismanaged through illegal dumping or open burning of the waste, which causes environmental degradation and places a significant strain on the Department and local governments to clean up.

For context, a 10-year study (partially funded by the Department) was conducted by Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful in which more than 6,200 illegal dumps were identified across this Commonwealth. The study found that cleanups of illegal dump sites cost on average \$3,000 per site and divert funding and staff resources from State and local governments that could otherwise be used more productively. It also conveyed that there is less illegal dumping in areas where there is universal access to waste and recycling collection and more than 87% of residents of this Commonwealth indicated they would be willing to take their household waste, recyclables or other items not collected at the curb to a convenient outlet and pay for the service.

Additionally, open burning of waste also can be a dangerous and environmentally hazardous activity. According to the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, one of the major causes of forest fires in this Commonwealth is debris burning. A careless or unaware person burning trash or yard waste can be responsible for causing wildfires that burn thousands of acres of valuable forests. In fact, 98% of the wildfires in this Commonwealth are a direct result of people's actions and place emergency responders directly in harm's way. Furthermore, a United States Environmental Protection Agency report published in November 1997 shows that a single household burn barrel may emit as many toxic chemicals as a well-controlled municipal incinerator.

To address the waste and recycling collection gap that currently exists in the more rural areas of this Commonwealth and help to prevent illegal dumping and burning of waste, the Board establishes a permit-by-rule framework for persons to construct and operate rural transfer facilities. A rural transfer facility is a facility located in a municipality with a population density of under 300 people per square mile where residents can drop off municipal waste and source separated recyclable materials that the operators of the facility would then transfer to a permitted processing or disposal facility.

This final-form rulemaking creates a permit-by-rule framework for authorizing rural transfer facilities operations. A permit-by-rule is a permit which a person or municipality is deemed to have for the operation of a facility or an activity upon compliance with the general requirements contained in the regulations authorizing the permit-by-rule in § 271.103 (relating to permit-by-rule for municipal waste processing facilities other than for regulated medical or chemotherapeutic waste; qualifying facilities; general requirements) and the requirements contained in this final-form rulemaking.

Under the permit-by-rule format, public or private entities would notify the Department of their intent to operate a rural transfer facility and would not have to submit an application for review. This simplifies the application requirements associated with other types of permitted facilities by replacing voluminous application materials with more general operational plans and notification documents while still protecting the health, safety and welfare of residents of this Commonwealth and the environment.

A facility operating under a permit-by-rule must follow a standard and abbreviated set of operating requirements that are tailored for the type of activity undertaken. As noted previously, the permit-by-rule for rural transfer facilities is only available for sites located in rural areas with a population density of under 300 people per square mile. Rural transfer facilities are also limited in the amount of waste they can manage onsite to 80 cubic yards of municipal waste stored in a maximum of four containers. In general, this and other thresholds in this final-form rulemaking are based on those that were included in the draft general permit the Department previously proposed to authorize what were referred to as convenience centers. The Department worked closely with regional waste program managers and the Solid Waste Advisory Committee (SWAC) to determine appropriate thresholds as described as follows. These thresholds were also based on information the Department had about existing individually permitted municipal waste transfer facilities, including how much waste these facilities accept on a quarterly or annual basis. The thresholds represent and establish an appropriate amount of waste to be managed at a small rural transfer facility that will meet the needs of rural communities without approaching amounts that would require the facility to obtain an individual permit. Further explanation of the thresholds and full operating requirements for the rural transfer facilities permit-by-rule are outlined as follows. If the facility fails to comply with the conditions of the permitby-rule as specified in this final-form rulemaking, the facility may be required to obtain an individual or general permit instead.

This final-form rulemaking was developed in consultation with the Department's SWAC and Recycling Fund Advisory Committee (RFAC). Members of SWAC and RFAC represent municipal solid waste authorities, local government interests, solid waste management industry groups, the legislature, consulting firms and private citizens.

Discussions formally began in 2015, with the formation of an Ad Hoc committee to focus on developing a model for what were then known as convenience centers and advise the Department on the requirements for operation. The Ad Hoc committee disbanded after its final meeting in August 2015.

The convenience center model evolved over the next several years, until the Department developed a general permit (GP) to authorize their operation. The Department brought the GP before SWAC and RFAC in December 2018, at which time it was determined that the recordkeeping requirements of the GP were too onerous for operators (that is, rural counties and municipalities) to meet. However, SWAC and RFAC members and the Department agreed that a means of authorizing operation of these facilities to aid in providing convenient, affordable access to waste disposal and recycling to all residents of this Commonwealth was imperative. The Department responded by developing a proposed rulemaking to authorize a permit-by-rule for rural transfer facilities. On June 3, 2020, SWAC voted to concur with the Department's recommendation that the proposed rulemaking move forward in the regulatory process. The Department discussed this final-form rulemaking with SWAC on June 14, 2022, and SWAC voted to concur with the Department's recommendation that this final-form rulemaking be presented to the Board for consideration.

- E. Summary of Final-Form Rulemaking and Changes from Proposed to Final-Form Rulemaking
- § 271.103. Permit-by-rule for municipal waste processing facilities other than for regulated medical or chemotherapeutic waste; qualifying facilities; general requirements

Amendments to this section add provisions for the operation of a rural transfer facility authorized through a permit-by-rule.

Subsection (i) is added to authorize operation of a rural transfer facility through a permit-by-rule under certain conditions. The permit-by-rule format streamlines and reduces costs associated with permitting and obtaining the authorizations necessary to establish and operate a transfer facility. This allows persons or municipalities in rural areas more flexibility and ease in constructing, siting and operating the facility, in conjunction with the added benefit of reducing illegal dumping and better serving residents of rural areas while still being protective of public health and the environment.

Paragraph (1) specifies operating requirements that a rural transfer facility must follow to receive authorization under this permit-by-rule. These requirements are intended to ensure rural transfer facilities are operating in a way that ensures the health, safety and welfare of residents of this Commonwealth and the environment are protected.

Subparagraph (i) describes the types of wastes that may be transferred through a rural transfer facility. It specifies that no processing other than the transfer of residential municipal waste, construction/demolition waste and yard waste take place at the rural transfer facility since this is a permit-by-rule for municipal waste. As such, the only materials that may be accepted at a rural transfer facility are municipal wastes as defined elsewhere in statute and regulation. See 35 P.S. § 6018.103 and § 271.1 (relating to definitions). Construction/demolition and yard waste are both classified as municipal wastes and are specifically identified to clarify what wastes are acceptable for management at a rural transfer facility.

Subparagraph (ii) requires the rural transfer facility to collect steel and bimetallic cans, corrugated cardboard and aluminum, at a minimum, for the purpose of recycling. This requirement is included to capture more recyclables, which contributes to this Commonwealth's recycling marketplace and helps support the 66,000 recycling-related jobs it provides.

Subparagraph (iii) specifies that a rural transfer facility may not collect or process any liquid, special handling waste, residual waste or hazardous waste. Management of these types of wastes by regulation requires additional scrutiny and approval for management and is not suitable for this municipal waste permit-by-rule.

Subparagraph (iv) places limits on the volume of municipal waste that can be stored at a rural transfer facility prior to transfer. This final-form rulemaking sets these limits at 80 cubic yards stored in a maximum of four containers at a facility. These limits do not apply to construction and demolition (C&D) waste nor yard waste as they have their own limits specified in § 271.103(i)(2) and (3). These thresholds are based on information the Department has about existing individually permitted municipal waste transfer facilities, including how much waste these facilities accept on a quarterly or annual basis. The thresholds represent an appropriate amount of waste to be managed at a small rural transfer facility to meet the needs of rural communities without approaching amounts that would require the facility to obtain an individual permit. The volume thresholds were established to limit the size and impact of these facilities so the less rigorous permit-by-rule framework for construction and operation can be utilized.

Subparagraph (v) specifies that containers at rural transfer facilities be emptied at least once every 10 days. The total waste collected, excluding C&D and yard waste, cannot exceed 160 cubic yards during that same 10-day period, and all containers must be emptied within 72

hours of being filled. Similar to the reasoning discussed previously for the requirements in § 271.103(iv), these volume and storage thresholds were established to limit the size and impact of these facilities and so the less rigorous permit-by-rule framework for construction and operation can be utilized. Time limits for emptying containers were specifically established to minimize the potential for nuisances associated with operation of the facility.

Subparagraph (vi) requires that records of pick up dates for all containers at a rural transfer facility be kept onsite for 5 years and made available to the Department upon request. These requirements are consistent with those already established for other facilities authorized by a permit-by-rule in this section. The additional requirement to keep records onsite for 5 years ensures that the Department can collect data on the facilities to evaluate the effectiveness of this final-form rulemaking.

Subparagraph (vii) specifies that a rural transfer facility cannot cause or allow a point or nonpoint source discharge from or on the facility to surface waters of this Commonwealth. This requirement is included to maintain compliance with The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and protect the waters of the Commonwealth.

Subparagraph (viii) states prohibitions on the areas in which rural transfer facilities may be located. These prohibited areas include: a populated area as described in § 272.411(a) and (b) (relating to affected municipalities) and section 1501(a) and (b) of the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act (53 P.S. § 4000.1501(a) and (b)); a municipality with a population density over 300 people per square mile; or an area that is zoned as residential, unless otherwise approved in writing by a municipality. Municipalities with a population density over 300 people per square mile is used in section 1501(b) of the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act and was included in the list of prohibited areas because municipalities with a population density exceeding this threshold already have recycling and waste management infrastructure. The intent of this final-form rulemaking is to facilitate and establish access to waste management and recycling services in the underserved rural areas of this Commonwealth. The defined areas described previously are not considered rural or underserved and are, therefore, not suitable for siting and operation of a rural transfer facility.

Subparagraph (ix) requires that the rural transfer facility not store waste, yard waste or source separated recyclable materials outside of a container to protect human health and the environment by preventing nuisances, vectors, and point and nonpoint source pollution. These requirements also aim to protect the market value of recyclable materials collected by preventing contamination during management.

Subparagraph (x) prohibits a rural transfer facility from accepting waste transported by a truck, tractor or combination having a gross vehicle weight rating, gross combination weight rating, registered gross weight, registered combination weight or actual gross weight of 17,001 pounds or more. These vehicle weight limits are established in the regulations implementing the Common wealth's Vehicle Code at 67 Pa. Code § 231.8(1) (relating to additions or modifications to 49 CFR) and trigger additional authorization and licensing under 27 Pa.C.S. Chapter 62 (relating to Waste Transportation Safety Act). Rural transfer facilities are not an acceptable destination for vehicles exceeding these weight limits, as they carry

an amount of waste that would exceed the volume and storage limits established by the permit-by-rule. Use of a rural transfer facility by these size vehicles would negate the potential benefits of convenient and affordable disposal and recycling for local residents.

Subparagraph (xi) requires that rural transfer facilities must be operated in a manner to minimize and control nuisances and vectors to protect human health and the environment. Facilities that do not meet this requirement may be required to obtain an individual or general permit under § 271.103(c).

Subparagraph (xii) requires that rural transfer facilities store source separated recyclable materials in a manner that preserves their marketability. This requirement is intended to ensure that recyclables are not damaged and ultimately are able to be recycled to help bolster this Commonwealth's recycling marketplace.

Subparagraph (xiii) requires an operator of a rural transfer facility to submit written notice to the Department when intending to operate a facility under the permit-by-rule. As specified in clause (A), the notice must be submitted to the Department within 30 days of adoption of this final-form rulemaking and by January 31 every 5 years after the initial notice. As specified in clause (B), for any rural transfer facilities that are constructed after the effective date of this final-form rulemaking, operators shall submit written notice to the Department at least 30 days before beginning operations and by January 31 every 5 years after the initial notice. As specified in clause (C), the written notice shall contain the following information: the contact information and address of the rural transfer facility; proposed hours of operation; the contact information and address of the person or municipality responsible for operating the facility; a brief description of the facility; and the name and address of the facilities to which the rural transfer facility transfers municipal waste. If there are any changes to the facilities to which a rural transfer facility transfers waste, the rural transfer facility operator shall notify the Department within 15 days of the change. These notification requirements are consistent with requirements for existing municipal waste permit-by-rule facilities in § 271.103(d) and (e)—(h). Notification also allows the Department to accurately identify the universe of rural transfer facilities operating in this Commonwealth and the disposal facilities they utilize.

Subparagraph (xiv) requires that the operator post and maintain signs at the rural transfer facility. Clauses (A)—(D) require that the signs include the facility name, hours of operation, a list of accepted materials, and the contact information and address of the facility operator. This subparagraph is consistent with existing site identification and signage requirements. These requirements allow for proper identification of the rural transfer facility site; provide emergency contact information to users; and provide clarity about what materials are able to be managed at the facility.

Paragraph (2) allows rural transfer facilities to provide for the collection of C&D waste in addition to the volumes permitted in § 271.103(i)(1)(iv) as long as the following two conditions are met. The volume of C&D waste stored at the rural transfer facility cannot exceed 40 cubic yards and be stored in a maximum of two containers as indicated in subparagraph (i), and the containers are removed and taken to a permitted processing or disposal facility at least once every 10 days as specified in subparagraph (ii). These requirements are based on information the Department has about existing individually permitted municipal waste transfer facilities, including

how much waste these facilities accept on a quarterly or annual basis, and allow for limited management of C&D waste while protecting the overall intent of this final-form rulemaking, which is to provide convenient and affordable access to disposal of municipal waste and management of recyclables to underserved areas of this Commonwealth.

Paragraph (3) allows a rural transfer facility to provide for the collection of yard waste in addition to the volumes permitted in § 271.103(i)(1)(iv) as long as the following two conditions are met. The volume of yard waste stored at the rural transfer facility cannot exceed 40 cubic yards and be stored in a maximum of two containers as indicated in subparagraph (i), and the containers are removed at least every 10 days and taken to a composting facility, land application site or other facility permitted for the beneficial use of yard waste as specified in subparagraph (ii). These requirements are based on information the Department has about existing individually permitted municipal waste transfer facilities, including how much waste these facilities accept on a quarterly or annual basis, and allow for limited management of yard waste while protecting the overall intent of the rulemaking, which is to provide convenient and affordable access to disposal of municipal waste and management of recyclables to underserved areas of this Commonwealth.

### § 279.1. Scope

Subsection (a) is amended to clarify that the application and operating requirements for transfer facilities established in Chapter 279 do not apply to rural transfer facilities operating under a permit-by-rule, as these facilities are now authorized under § 271.103(i).

Changes from Proposed to Final-Form Rulemaking

There were no changes made to the regulation from the proposed rulemaking to this final-form rulemaking.

F. Summary of Comments and Responses on the Proposed Rulemaking

The proposed rulemaking was published at 52 Pa.B. 363 (January 15, 2022), opening a 30-day public comment period.

The Board received no comments on the proposed rulemaking from the public, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC), members of the General Assembly or the House and Senate Environmental Resources and Energy Committees.

### G. Benefits, Costs and Compliance

### Benefits

This final-form rulemaking aims to provide convenient and affordable access to waste disposal and recycling services in rural areas of this Commonwealth where trash collection and recycling services are not economically feasible to establish and therefore, are currently unavailable to many rural communities. By establishing rural transfer stations where all members of the community can drop off their waste and recycling to be transferred to a permitted disposal or processing facility, rural Pennsylvanians will benefit from gaining access to disposal and recycling options and being able to responsibly dispose of their waste.

Accordingly, this final-form rulemaking will help to alleviate the mismanagement of residential municipal waste and associated burning or illegal dumping of waste that currently exists in the more rural areas of this Commonwealth. This final-form rulemaking provides a mechanism for municipalities to strategically locate a facility in areas that are most convenient for residents or where open burning and illegal dumping are an issue, or

both. Making responsible waste disposal and recycling options conveniently available in the community at little or no cost will meet the need of those currently paying significantly more to properly dispose of waste and manage recyclables. It will also provide an incentive to recycle and begin properly disposing of waste for those currently mismanaging these materials due to lack of convenience and prohibitive costs. This will improve protection of public health and the environment by preventing air and land pollution through an anticipated decrease in the instances of burning and illegal dumping of municipal waste and recyclables. It will also help to alleviate the costs State and local governments incur to clean up illegal dump sites and reduce the enforcement costs the Department currently incurs to respond to burning and illegal dumping complaints. Furthermore, once implemented, this final-form rulemaking will also allow for the capture of more recyclables, positively contributing to this Commonwealth's recycling marketplace and the 66,000 jobs it creates.

Public or private entities who decide to operate a rural transfer facility under the authorization of this final-form rulemaking will also realize benefits. By using the permit-by-rule format for this final-form rulemaking, the application requirements are simplified, compared to the requirements associated with other types of permitted facilities, by replacing voluminous application materials with more general operational plans and notification documents. A permit-by-rule provides persons or municipalities in rural areas more flexibility and allows them to obtain the authorization necessary to operate a rural transfer facility at a lower permitting cost, while providing necessary and adequate environmental controls to ensure that public health and the environment are protected.

### Compliance costs

This final-form rulemaking does not mandate that any public or private entity operate a rural transfer facility. Therefore, no compliance costs are required as part of this final-form rulemaking.

### $Compliance\ assistance\ plan$

The Department will continue to work with the regulated community to ensure this final-form rulemaking is understood. Department staff will provide compliance assistance during routine facility permitting and inspection activities.

### Paperwork requirements

Rural transfer facility operators are required in this final-form rulemaking to maintain records of pick-up dates for all containers for a period of 5 years. Records may be kept in a hard copy format or electronically. The permit-by-rule allows for significantly less paperwork than if a facility were required to apply for and obtain a general or individual permit.

### H. Pollution Prevention

By providing convenient and affordable access to waste disposal and recycling services in rural areas of this Commonwealth, this final-form rulemaking will help to alleviate the mismanagement of residential municipal waste and associated burning or illegal dumping of waste. By decreasing the instances of burning and illegal dumping of municipal waste and recyclables, the regulation will thereby improve public health and the environment by preventing air and land pollution.

Development of this final-form rulemaking also provides the Department with the opportunity to further educate the public about proper management of waste and recyclables and the environmental and economic benefits of proper management.

### I. Sunset Review

The Board is not establishing a sunset date for this final-form rulemaking, because it is needed for the Department to carry out its statutory authority. The Department will continue to closely monitor these regulations for their effectiveness and recommend updates to the Board as necessary.

### J. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on January 4, 2022, the Department submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 52 Pa.B. 363, and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Environmental Resources and Energy Committees for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing this final-form rulemaking, the Department has considered all comments from IRRC, the House and Senate Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, on September 14, 2022, this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on September 15, 2022, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

### K. Findings of the Board

The Board finds that:

- (1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202), referred to as the Commonwealth Documents Law, and regulations promulgated thereunder at 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2 (relating to notice of proposed rulemaking required; and adoption of regulations).
- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law, and all comments were considered.
- (3) This final-form rulemaking does not enlarge the purpose of the proposed rulemaking published at 52 Pa.B. 363.
- (4) These regulations are necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing acts identified in section C of this order.

### L. Order of the Board

The Board, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Department, 25 Pa. Code Chapters 271 and 279, are amended by amending §§ 271.103 and 279.1 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Chairperson of the Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for review and approval as to legality and form, as required by law.
- (c) The Chairperson of the Board shall submit this final-form rulemaking to IRRC and the Senate and House Environmental Resources and Energy Committees as required by the Regulatory Review Act.

- (d) The Chairperson of the Board shall certify this final-form rulemaking and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau, as required by law.
- (e) This final-form rulemaking shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

ARTICLE VIII. MUNICIPAL WASTE CHAPTER 271. MUNICIPAL WASTE MANAGEMENT—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Subchapter B. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PERMITS AND PERMIT APPLICATIONS

### REQUIREMENT

- § 271.103. Permit-by rule for municipal waste processing facilities other than for regulated medical or chemotherapeutic waste; qualifying facilities; general requirements.
- (h) Yard waste composting facility. A person or municipality that operates a yard waste composting facility that is less than 5 acres, other than an individual backyard composting facility, shall be deemed to have a municipal waste processing permit-by-rule if the person or municipality meets the requirements of subsections (a)—(c), the facility is operated in accordance with the Department's guidelines on yard waste composting and the operator submits a written notice to the Department that includes the name, address and telephone number of the facility, the individual responsible for operating the facility and a brief description of the facility.
- (i) Rural transfer facility. The following apply to a facility that provides publicly available municipal waste processing and collection of source separated recyclable materials:
- (1) A processing facility shall be deemed to have a municipal waste transfer facility permit under this article if, in addition to subsections (a)—(c), the following conditions are met:
- (i) No processing other than the transfer of residential municipal waste, construction/demolition waste and yard waste takes place at the facility.
- (ii) The facility provides for the collection of, at a minimum, steel and bimetallic cans, corrugated cardboard and aluminum for the purpose of recycling.
- (iii) The facility does not collect or process any liquid, special handling waste, residual waste or hazardous waste.
- (iv) Except as provided in paragraphs (2) and (3), the volume of municipal waste stored at the facility prior to transfer does not exceed 80 cubic yards stored in a maximum of four containers.
- (v) Municipal waste is transferred to a permitted processing or disposal facility at least once every 10 days and the total volume of municipal waste managed at the

facility does not exceed 160 cubic yards during the same 10 days. A full container must be transferred to a permitted processing or disposal facility within 72 hours of the container being filled.

- (vi) Records of pick up dates for all containers at the facility shall be kept onsite for 5 years and made available to the Department upon request.
- (vii) The facility does not cause or allow a point or nonpoint source discharge in violation of The Clean Streams Law from or on the facility to surface waters of this Commonwealth.
  - (viii) The facility is not located in any of the following:
- (A) A populated area as described in § 272.411(a) and (b) (relating to affected municipalities) and section 1501(a) and (b) of the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act (53 P.S. § 4000.1501(a) and (b))
- (B) A municipality with a population density over 300 people per square mile.
- (C) An area that is zoned as residential, unless otherwise approved in writing by the municipality.
- (ix) The facility does not store waste, yard waste or source separated recyclable materials outside of a container.
- (x) The facility does not accept waste transported by a truck, tractor or combination having a gross vehicle weight rating, gross combination weight rating, registered gross weight, registered combination weight or actual gross weight of 17,001 pounds or more.
- (xi) The facility is operated in a manner to minimize and control nuisances and vectors.
- (xii) Source separated recyclable materials are stored in a manner which preserves their marketability.
- (xiii) The operator submits written notice to the Department as follows:
- (A) Within 30 days of October 29, 2022, and by January 31 every 5 years after the initial notice.
- (B) The operator of a rural transfer facility constructed after October 29, 2022, shall submit written notice to the Department at least 30 days before beginning operation and by January 31 every 5 years after the initial notice.
  - (C) The written notice shall contain the following:
- (I) The name, address and telephone number of the facility.
  - (II) Proposed hours of operation for the facility.
- (III) The name, address and telephone number of the person or municipality responsible for operating the facility.
  - (IV) A brief description of the facility.
- (V) The name and address of the facilities to which the rural transfer facility transfers municipal waste. The

rural transfer facility shall notify the Department in writing of any changes to the facilities to which it transfers waste within 15 days of the change.

- (xiv) The operator posts and maintains signs that include all of the following information:
  - (A) Facility name.
  - (B) Hours of operation.
  - (C) A list of accepted materials.
- (D) The name, business address and telephone number of the facility operator.
- (2) A rural transfer facility may provide for collection of construction/demolition waste, in addition to the volumes permitted in subsection (i)(1)(iv), if the following conditions are both met:
- (i) The volume of construction/demolition waste stored at the facility prior to transfer does not exceed 40 cubic yards, stored in a maximum of two containers.
- (ii) The containers are removed and taken to a permitted processing or disposal facility at least once every 10 days.
- (3) A rural transfer facility may provide for collection of yard waste, in addition to the volumes permitted in subsection (i)(1)(iv), if the following conditions are both met:
- (i) The volume of yard waste stored at the facility prior to transfer does not exceed 40 cubic yards, stored in a maximum of two containers.
- (ii) The containers are removed at least every 10 days and taken to a composting facility, land application site or other facility permitted for the beneficial use of yard waste.

### CHAPTER 279. TRANSFER FACILITIES Subchapter A. GENERAL

### § 279.1. Scope.

- (a) This chapter sets forth application and operating requirements for a person or municipality that operates a transfer facility, other than a rural transfer facility operating under a permit-by-rule under § 271.103(i) (relating to permit-by rule for municipal waste processing facilities other than for regulated medical or chemotherapeutic waste; qualifying facilities; general requirements). The requirements in this chapter are in addition to the applicable requirements in Chapter 271 (relating to municipal waste management—general provisions).
- (b) The Department may waive or modify a requirement of this chapter for permitted transfer facilities at which no actual loading, unloading or transferring of municipal waste occurs, if the absence of loading, unloading or transferring activity renders the requirement unnecessary.

The Clarified Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NOPR), entered by the Public Utility Commission (PUC) on August 24, 2022, established a 45-day comment period and a 45-day reply comment period. The NOPR was published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on October 1, 2022, at 52 Pa.B. 6160, resulting in a due date of November 15, 2022, for comments and a due date of December 30, 2022, for reply comments.

On October 5, 2022, the Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA) requested that the reply comment period be extended until January 17, 2023, based on the expectation of extensive reply comments, noting further that the reply comments are presently due at a time when many stakeholders will likely be out of their offices for various holidays. The Energy Association of Pennsylvania and the Coalition of Affordable Utility Service and Energy Efficiency in Pennsylvania support the request for an extension to the reply comment period. The National Association of Water Companies—Pennsylvania Chapter does not oppose the request for an extension to the reply comment period.

The PUC agrees with OCA that there is an expectation of extensive reply comments and that the timing of the due date for reply comments has the likelihood of encountering holiday office closings. Accordingly, the due date for reply comments is hereby changed to January 31, 2023. Notice of this change will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and provided to, among others, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC).

CHAPTER 801. LEGISLATIVELY ORDERED MATERIAL RELATING TO PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

APPENDIX I. Procedures for Receiving, Processing and Advertising Non-emergency Proposed Constitutional Amendments.

(Editor's Note: Under section 801(b)(4) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 201(b)(4)), the Department of State established Procedures for Receiving, Processing and Advertising Non-emergency Proposed Constitutional Amendments as set forth in Appendix I. This document is published under 45 Pa.C.S. § 702(7) (relating to contents of Pennsylvania Code) as a document general and permanent in nature which shall be codified in the Pennsylvania Code.)

### Introduction

Article XI, § 1 of the Pennsylvania Constitution (Article XI) requires the Secretary of the Commonwealth to publish proposed amendments to the Pennsylvania Constitution. Article XI states that if an amendment is agreed to by the majority of the members of both the Senate and House of Representatives, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall cause the proposed amendment to be published three months before the next general election (November election in an even numbered year), in at least two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers shall be published; and if, in the General Assembly next afterwards chosen, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each House, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall cause the same again to be published in the same manner and the proposed amendment will be submitted to the voters as prescribed by the General Assembly.

Article XI imposes a mandatory duty on the Secretary of the Commonwealth to advertise amendments proposed by the General Assembly. Failure to advertise in strict compliance with Article XI is fatal to the amendment process.

Supplemental to the requirements enumerated in Article XI, the Pennsylvania Election Code and Administrative Code of 1929 (as amended) impose statutory obligations upon the Secretary related to the constitutional amendment process.

Thus, the primary responsibilities of the Department of State in the constitutional amendment process are:

- 1) Advertise the proposed amendments in newspapers after each passage;
- 2) Draft the ballot question to be put forth to the voters on second passage; and
- 3) Administer election on the ballot question and certify results.

### **Purpose and Objectives**

Department of State (DOS) staff must initiate, coordinate, monitor, and verify publication of constitutional amendments to ensure timely and proper advertisement of constitutional amendments in accordance with the requirements of Article XI. This document outlines the process that DOS will use to effectuate its duties under Article XI, the Administrative Code and the Election Code pertaining to constitutional amendments.

### Background

Amendments to the Pennsylvania Constitution may be proposed in either the Senate or the House of Representatives but must pass in both by a majority vote of the members elected. Pursuant to Article XI of the Pennsylvania Constitution, a proposed constitutional amendment must be passed in identical form in two consecutive sessions of the General Assembly before the amendment can be submitted to the voters for approval.

### First Passage

After the first passage of a proposed constitutional amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth is required to have the proposed amendment published once in each of the three months (August, September and October) prior to a November general election (even numbered years) in at least two newspapers in every county. The advertisements do not need to be published on the same date, but each advertisement should be published on or before the day of the month on which the November election will occur. For example, if the November election is on November 7th, the advertisements should be published on or before August 7th, September 7th, and October 7th.

### **Second Passage**

The next succeeding session, the General Assembly may at any time pass a joint resolution proposing the identical constitutional amendment. The General Assembly shall direct the Secretary of the Commonwealth at what election to present the proposed amendment to the voters in the form of a ballot question, so long as the primary or election in which voters will vote on the ballot question is at least three months after second passage. After second passage, the proposed amendment, ballot question, and plain language statement must be advertised once in each of the three months prior to the election at which the

amendment is to be voted for, which could be either a municipal (odd numbered years) or general (even numbered years) or primary election. The amendment is voted on by the entire electorate. If passed by a majority vote, the amendment becomes part of the Pennsylvania Constitution. The advertisements do not need to be published on the same date, but each advertisement should be published on or before the day of the month on which the primary or election will occur. For example, if the question is to be presented to the voters at a May 17th Primary, the advertisements should be published on or before February 17th, March 17th, and April 17th.

### Pre- and Post-Advertisement Notification to the General Assembly and Legislative Reference Bu-

Under Section 801 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (as amended), 71 P.S. § 271, the Secretary of the Commonwealth must provide written notice to the following individuals of the date that the advertisements required under Article XI are scheduled to be completed for a proposed amendment:

- 1) Every member of the General Assembly;
- 2) The Secretary of the Senate;
- 3) The Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives;
- 4) The Parliamentarian of the House of Representatives; and
  - 5) The Legislative Reference Bureau.

The written notice must be given no later than 14 days before the date on which publication is scheduled to begin, or as soon as practicable.

Likewise, after the publication process is complete, the Secretary of the Commonwealth must certify to the above referenced officials that the requirements of Article XI have been completed. The Secretary is required to certify no later than 14 days after the last advertisement occurs.

### **Ballot Question and Plain Language Statement**

Under Section 201.1 of the Election Code, when a proposed constitutional amendment is submitted to the voters in referendum, the Attorney General is required to prepare a statement "in plain English" that indicates "the purpose, limitations and effects of the ballot question on the people of the Commonwealth." See 25 P.S. § 2621.1. The Secretary of the Commonwealth drafts the ballot question itself with approval by the Attorney General. See 25 P.S. § 2755. The Secretary then includes the ballot question and the plain language statement in the constitutional amendment advertisement. See 25 P.S. § 2621.1. The ballot question and the plain language statement is sent to each of the county boards of elections as part of the notice of elections published not earlier than ten (10) days nor later than three (3) days before the primary or election. See 25 P.S. §§ 2621.1, 3041. The county boards of elections are also required to post copies of the ballot question and plain English statement at the polling places and in specimen ballots. See 25 P.S. § 2621.1.

### Emergency Amendments under Article XI, § 1(a)-(b)

Article XI also delineates a truncated process for amendment "in the event a major emergency threatens or is about to threaten the Commonwealth and if the safety or welfare of the Commonwealth requires prompt amendment" to the Pennsylvania Constitution.

An emergency amendment subject to the process set forth in Article XI, § 1(a)(b) only needs to be considered and passed once by the General Assembly, as opposed to the two consecutive session passages required for non emergency amendments.

Amendments under subsections a and b of Article XI may be proposed in either a regular or special legislative session, but they must be agreed upon by two thirds of the members of each the Senate and House of Representatives.

Once the General Assembly passes the proposed amendment, DOS must promptly advertise the proposed amendment in two newspapers of general circulation in every county.

The proposed amendment can be put to the voters at any time at least one month after it is passed by the General Assembly.

### **Designated Deputy Secretary (DDS)**


Pursuant to Section 801 of the Administrative Code of 1929 (as amended), 71 P.S. § 271, the Secretary of the Commonwealth must designate a deputy secretary to oversee implementation and training on the procedure for advertising constitutional amendments. The Secretary shall so designate the pertinent deputy in writing, and a copy of the designation can be obtained by contacting the Executive Office Assistant or referring to the Executive Office SharePoint folder entitled "Joint Resolutions."

The Secretary should update this designation at the following occurrences and intervals:

- When a new Secretary is appointed,
- Upon departure of a deputy who has been designated responsibility under this policy, and
- As otherwise necessary to reflect a change in designation.

#### Other Owners and Stakeholders

The following owners (white boxes) and stakeholders (shaded boxes) share responsibility for the publication of the process. Unless otherwise noted the documents should be shared with the head of the bureau.



### **Process**

The Office of Legislative Affairs tracks and monitors all legislation impacting DOS, including legislation proposing amendments to the Pennsylvania Constitution. A proposed constitutional amendment, when agreed upon by the Senate and the House of Representatives, is filed with DOS in the form of a Joint Resolution.

The outline, below, sets forth the tasks and parties responsible for completing each. Each action item has been assigned an owner who is accountable to the team for ensuring completion of the action item. The owner is responsible for working with and/or obtaining the approval of those identified to be consulted for each action item. Where the identified "Owner" of each action item is an office, bureau or program area, the accountable individual is the manager responsible for oversight of that office, bureau, or program area, unless said manager has designated another employee from within that office, bureau, or program area to serve as proxy in an email to the DDS.

### Pre-passage tasks

### Tracking proposed legislation

The Department's Office of Legislative Affairs (OLA), is responsible for tracking legislation proposing one or more constitutional amendments during the time the legislation is under consideration by the General Assembly.

OLA notifies the XO by email (SOC, DDS, OCC, and DSEC) when a Joint Resolution crosses from one chamber to another, passes both chambers, and is signed by both chambers in the General Assembly.

In addition to OLA, the Designated Deputy Secretary will assign others to monitor joint resolutions introduced in the General Assembly through Pennsylvania Legislative Services.

### Maintaining contact lists

The following contact lists are utilized to notify parties in this process. They should be reviewed for accuracy and updated bi-annually, and if possible, upon information regarding separation/hiring:

### Joint Resolution 2018-1

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, providing for rights of victims of crime

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania is proposed in accordance with Article XI:

That Article I be amended by adding a section to read:

### § 9.1. Rights of victims of crime.

- (a) To secure for victims justice and due process throughout the criminal and juvenile justice systems, a victim shall have the following rights, as further provided and as defined by the General Assembly, which shall be protected in a manner no less vigorous than the rights afforded to the accused: to be treated with fairness and respect for the victim's safety, dignity and privacy; to have the safety of the victim and the victim's family considered in fixing the amount of bail and release conditions for the accused; to reasonable and timely notice of and to be present at all public proceedings involving the criminal or delinquent conduct; to be notified of any pretrial disposition of the case; with the exception of grand jury proceedings, to be heard in any proceeding where a right of the victim is implicated, including, but not limited to, release, plea, sentencing, disposition, parole and pardon; to be notified of all parole procedures, to participate in the parole process, to provide information to be considered before the parole of the offender, and to be notified of the parole of the offender; to reasonable protection from the accused or any person acting on behalf of the accused; to reasonable notice of any release or escape of the accused; to refuse an interview, deposition or other discovery request made by the accused or any person acting on behalf of the accused; full and timely restitution from the person or entity convicted for the unlawful conduct; full and timely restitution as determined by the court in a juvenile delinquency proceeding; to the prompt return of property when no longer needed as evidence; to proceedings free from unreasonable delay and a prompt and final conclusion of the case and any related postconviction proceedings; to confer with the attorney for the government; and to be informed of all rights enumerated in this section.
- (b) The victim or the attorney for the government upon request of the victim may assert in any trial or appellate court, or before any other authority, with jurisdiction over the case, and have enforced, the rights enumerated in this section and any other right afforded to the victim by law. This section does not grant the victim party status or create any cause of action for compensation or damages against the Commonwealth or any political subdivision, nor any officer, employee or agent of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision, or any officer or employee of the court.
- (c) As used in this section and as further defined by the General Assembly, the term "victim" includes any person against whom the criminal offense or delinquent act is committed or who is directly harmed by the

commission of the offense or act. The term "victim" does not include the accused or a person whom the court finds would not act in the best interests of a deceased, incompetent, minor or incapacitated victim.

Section 2. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of this proposed constitutional amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of this proposed constitutional amendment.

(b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of this proposed constitutional amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of this proposed constitutional amendment. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall submit this proposed constitutional amendment to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

### **JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2021-1**

Proposing separate and distinct amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania, in declaration of rights, providing for prohibition against denial or abridgment of equality of rights because of race and ethnicity; in legislation, further providing for action on concurrent orders and resolutions; and, in the executive, providing for disaster emergency declaration and management.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following separate and distinct amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania are proposed in accordance with Article XI:

(1) That Article I of the Constitution of Pennsylvania be amended by adding a section to read:

### § 29. Prohibition against denial or abridgment of equality of rights because of race and ethnicity.

Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania because of the race or ethnicity of the individual.

- (1.1) That section 9 of Article III be amended to read:
- § 9. Action on concurrent orders and resolutions.

Every order, resolution or vote, to which the concurrence of both Houses may be necessary, except on the [question of adjournment] questions of adjournment or termination or extension of a disaster emergency declaration as declared by an executive order or proclamation, or portion of a disaster emergency declaration as declared

by an executive order or proclamation, shall be presented to the Governor and before it shall take effect be approved by him, or being disapproved, shall be repassed by two-thirds of both Houses according to the rules and limitations prescribed in case of a bill.

- (2) That Article IV be amended by adding a section to read:
- § 20. Disaster emergency declaration and management.
- (a) A disaster emergency declaration may be declared by executive order or proclamation of the Governor upon finding that a disaster has occurred or that the occurrence or threat of a disaster is imminent that threatens the health, safety or welfare of this Commonwealth.
- (b) Each disaster emergency declaration issued by the Governor under subsection (a) shall indicate the nature, each area threatened and the conditions of the disaster, including whether the disaster is a natural disaster, military emergency, public health emergency, technological disaster or other general emergency, as defined by statute. The General Assembly shall, by statute, provide for the manner in which each type of disaster enumerated under this subsection shall be managed.
- (c) A disaster emergency declaration under subsection (a) shall be in effect for no more than twenty-one (21) days, unless otherwise extended in whole or part by concurrent resolution of the General Assembly.
- (d) Upon the expiration of a disaster emergency declaration under subsection (a), the Governor may not issue a new disaster emergency declaration based upon the same or substantially similar facts and circumstances without the passage of a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly expressly approving the new disaster emergency declaration.
- Section 2. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments.
- (b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the secretary of the commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall:
- (1) Submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(1) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.
- (1.1) Submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(1.1) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.
- (2) Submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(2) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—ARTICLE III, SECTION 9

### RELATING TO TERMINATION OR EXTENSION OF DISASTER EMERGENCY DECLARATIONS

### **Ballot Question**

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended to change existing law and increase the power of the General Assembly to unilaterally terminate or extend a disaster emergency declaration—and the powers of Commonwealth agencies to address the disaster regardless of its severity pursuant to that declaration—through passing a concurrent resolution by simple majority, thereby removing the existing check and balance of presenting a resolution to the Governor for approval or disapproval?

### Plain English Statement of the Office of Attorney General

Joint Resolution No. 2021-1 proposes to amend Article III, Section 9 of the Pennsylvania Constitution to provide a new exception to traditional legislative procedure by allowing the General Assembly to terminate or extend a disaster emergency declaration or a portion of such declaration without needing the Governor's approval.

Currently, Article III, Section 9 establishes a general rule that all orders, resolutions or votes requiring approval by both the House of Representatives and Senate must be presented to the Governor for his approval or veto. Resolutions for the adjournment of the General Assembly are exempted from this process. If the order, resolution or vote is approved by the Governor, it becomes law. If the Governor vetoes the resolution, it does not become law unless two-thirds of the House and Senate vote to override the veto. The proposed amendment would create an additional exception to this customary legislative procedure for concurrent resolutions to terminate or extend, in whole or in part, a disaster emergency declaration issued by the Governor.

The proposed amendment will also have the effect of reversing a recent ruling of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court which held the Pennsylvania Constitution prohibited the General Assembly from passing a concurrent resolution to terminate the Governor's Covid-19 disaster emergency declaration without presenting it to the Governor for his approval. It will change the law to allow the General Assembly to terminate or extend a disaster emergency declaration through a concurrent resolution approved by only a majority of the members of the House and Senate, without having to present the resolution to the Governor for his approval or veto.

The proposed amendment is limited in that it only changes the traditional legislative process for terminating or extending disaster emergency declarations issued by the Governor. The amendment will not alter the current legislative procedure with respect to which orders, resolutions or votes of the General Assembly must be presented to the Governor for his approval on any other subject matter.

# PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—ARTICLE IV DISASTER EMERGENCY DECLARATION AND MANAGEMENT

### **Ballot Question**

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended to change existing law so that: a disaster emergency declaration will expire automatically after 21 days, regardless of the severity of the emergency, unless the General Assembly takes action to extend the disaster emergency; the Governor may not declare a new disaster emergency to respond to the dangers facing the Commonwealth unless the General Assembly passes a concurrent resolution; the General Assembly enacts new laws for disaster management?

### Plain English Statement of the Office of Attorney General

Joint Resolution No. 2021-1 proposes adding a new section to Article IV of the Pennsylvania Constitution. This amendment incorporates disaster emergency declaration and management powers directly into the Constitution by:

- Granting the Governor authority to declare a disaster emergency declaration by proclamation or executive order;
- Requiring each declaration to indicate the nature, location and type of disaster;
- Granting the General Assembly authority to pass laws providing for the manner in which each disaster shall be managed;
- Limiting the duration of a Governor's declaration to 21 days, unless otherwise extended, in whole or in part, by a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly;
- Preventing the Governor, upon the expiration of a declaration, from issuing a new declaration based upon the same or substantially similar facts, unless the General Assembly passes a concurrent resolution expressly approving a new declaration.

Currently, disaster emergency declaration and management powers are delegated by statute to the Governor. The Governor has the sole authority to issue and manage all disaster emergency declarations, which cannot extend beyond 90 days unless renewed by the Governor. The General Assembly may override a Governor's disaster emergency declaration by concurrent resolution that must be presented to the Governor for his approval or veto.

If approved, the amendment would transfer certain of the Governor's existing authority to respond to and manage disaster emergencies to the General Assembly. The Governor would retain the authority to issue an initial disaster emergency declaration but the declaration's permissible length would be reduced from 90 to 21 days. The sole authority to extend a declaration would lie with the General Assembly; presently, this power rests with the Governor. Upon expiration of the initial declaration, the amendment prohibits the Governor from issuing a new declaration based upon the same or substantially similar facts without the approval of the General Assembly. The Governor would no longer have unilateral authority to manage disasters, but would have to do so consistent with the laws passed by the General Assembly.

If approved, the General Assembly would be required to pass new laws establishing the manner in which each type of disaster shall be managed. If added to the Pennsylvania Constitution, the proposed amendment cannot be modified or repealed except by a judicial decision finding all or part of the proposed amendment unconstitutional or by the approval of a subsequent constitutional amendment.

# PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—ARTICLE I PROHIBITION AGAINST DENIAL OR ABRIDGEMENT OF EQUALITY OF RIGHTS BECAUSE OF RACE OR ETHNICITY

### **Ballot Question**

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended by adding a new section providing that equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of an individual's race or ethnicity?

### Plain English Statement of the Office of Attorney General

Joint Resolution No. 2021-1, if approved by the electorate, will add a new section to Article I of the Pennsylvania Constitution. This amendment creates a constitutional prohibition against restricting or denying an individual's equal rights under Pennsylvania law because of race or ethnicity.

Generally, inclusion of this amendment within the Pennsylvania Constitution signifies that freedom from discrimination based on race or ethnicity is an essential principle of liberty and free government. This amendment applies to all Pennsylvania state, county and local governmental entities, and guarantees equality of rights under the law. The amendment, if enacted, will become a part of the Pennsylvania Constitution. As such, its provisions must be applied consistent with the other provisions of the Constitution.

### STATEMENTS OF POLICY

This equal right to be free from racial or ethnic discrimination will exist independent from any such rights under the United States Constitution or corresponding federal law. If the current federal protections proscribing racial or ethnic discrimination are abolished, the prohibition against such discrimination will remain in the Pennsylvania Constitution. The amendment is limited in that it creates a right only under Pennsylvania law.

Once added to the Pennsylvania Constitution, the right to be free from racial or ethnic discrimination under the law cannot be eliminated except by a judicial decision finding the amendment unconstitutional or the approval of a subsequent constitutional amendment. If approved, the General Assembly may pass new laws to implement the amendment, but it may not pass a law inconsistent with it.



#### Governor's Office

#### PROCLAMATION

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE V, SECTIONS 1, 6(c), 10(d), 12(b), and 15(a)

WHEREAS, Joint Resolution No. 1 of 2013 and Joint Resolution No. 2 of 2015 proposed to amend Article V, Sections 1, 6(c), 10(d),12(b), and 15(a), of the Constitution of Pennsylvania to read:

§ 1. Unified judicial system.

The judicial power of the Commonwealth shall be vested in a unified judicial system consisting of the Supreme Court, the Superior Court, the Commonwealth Court, courts of common pleas, community courts, municipal courts in the City of Philadelphia, such other courts as may be provided by law and justices of the peace. All courts and justices of the peace and their jurisdiction shall be in this unified judicial system.

§ 6. Community courts; Philadelphia Municipal Court.

\* \* \*

(c) In the City of Philadelphia there shall be a municipal court. The number of judges and the jurisdiction shall be as provided by law. This court shall exist so long as a community court has not been established or in the event one has been discontinued under this section.

§ 10. Judicial administration.

\* \* \*

(d) The Chief Justice and president judges of all courts with seven or less judges shall be the justice or judge longest in continuous service on their respective courts; and in the event of his resignation from this position the justice or judge next longest in continuous service shall be the Chief Justice or president judge. The president judges of all other courts shall be selected for five-year terms by the members of their respective courts. A Chief Justice or president judge may

resign such position and remain a member of the court. In the event of a tie vote for office of president judge in a court which elects its president judge, the Supreme Court shall appoint as president judge one of the judges receiving the highest number of votes.

\* \* \*

§ 12. Qualifications of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

\* \* \*

(b) Justices of the peace shall be members of the bar of the Supreme Court or shall complete a course of training and instruction in the duties of their respective offices and pass an examination prior to assuming office. Such courses and examinations shall be as provided by law.

§ 15. Tenure of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

(a) The regular term of office of justices and judges shall be ten years and the regular term of office for judges of the municipal court in the City of Philadelphia and of justices of the peace shall be six years. The tenure of any justice or judge shall not be affected by changes in judicial districts or by reduction in the number of judges.

WHEREAS, Joint Resolution No. 1 of 2013 was agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each House of the General Assembly and published pursuant to Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania; and

WHEREAS, in the General Assembly next afterwards chosen, the aforesaid amendment to Article V, Sections 1, 6(c), 10(d), 12(h), and 15(a), of the Constitution of Pennsylvania was proposed in Joint Resolution No. 2 of 2015, which was agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each House of the General Assembly and published pursuant to Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid proposed amendment to Article V, Sections 1, 6(c), 10(d), 12(h), and 15(a), of the Constitution of Pennsylvania was submitted for approval to the qualified electors of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania pursuant to Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania at an election held on April 26, 2016; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary of the Commonwealth, pursuant to law, has certified to me that the aforesaid proposed amendment to Article V, Sections 1, 6(c), 10(d), 12(h), and 15(a), of the Constitution of Pennsylvania was approved by a majority of those voting thereon on the aforesaid day; and

WHEREAS, Section 903 of Title 1 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes requires the Governor, upon receiving the aforesaid certification of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, to issue his proclamation indicating whether or not the proposed amendment to Article V, Sections 1, 6(c), 10(d), 12(b), and 15(a), of the Constitution of Pennsylvania has been adopted by a majority of the electors voting thereon.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby proclaim that the aforesaid amendment to Article V, Sections 1, 6(c), 10(d), 12(h), and 15(a), of the Constitution of Pennsylvania was adopted by a majority of the electors voting thereon on April 26, 2016.

#### **Public Hearing and Business Meeting**

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold a public hearing on Wednesday, November 9, 2022. A business meeting will be held the following month on Wednesday, December 7, 2022. Both the public hearing and the business meeting are open to the public and both will be conducted remotely. Details about the remote platforms for the two events will be posted on the Commission's web site at www.drbc.gov, at least 10 days prior to the respective meeting dates.

Public hearing. The Commission will conduct the public hearing virtually on November 9, 2022, beginning at 1:30 p.m. Hearing items will include draft dockets for withdrawals, discharges and other projects that could have a substantial effect on the basin's water resources. A list of the projects scheduled for hearing, including project descriptions, will be posted on the Commission's web site at www.drbc.gov, in a long form of this notice at least 10 days before the hearing date.

Written comments on matters scheduled for hearing on November 9, 2022, will be accepted through 5 p.m. on Monday, November 14, 2022.

The public is advised to check the Commission's web site periodically during the 10 days prior to the hearing date, as items scheduled for hearing may be postponed if additional time is needed to complete the Commission's review. Items also may be added up to 10 days prior to the hearing date. In reviewing docket descriptions, the public is asked to be aware that the details of projects may change during the Commission's review, which is ongoing.

Public meeting. The public business meeting on December 7, 2022, will begin at 10:30 a.m. and will include: adoption of the minutes of the Commission's September 8, 2022, business meeting; announcements of upcoming meetings and events; a report on hydrologic conditions; reports by the Executive Director and the Commission's General Counsel; and consideration of items for which a hearing has been completed or is not required. The agenda is expected to include consideration of the draft dockets for withdrawals, discharges and other projects that were subjects of the public hearing on November 9, 2022.

After all scheduled business has been completed and as time allows, the business meeting will be followed by up to 1 hour of open public comment, an opportunity to address the Commission on any topic concerning management of the Delaware River Basin's water resources outside the context of a duly noticed, on-the-record public hearing.

There will be no opportunity for additional public comment for the record at the December 7, 2022, business meeting on items for which a hearing was completed on November 9, 2022, or a previous date. Commission consideration on December 7, 2022, of items for which the public hearing is closed may result in approval of the item (by docket or resolution) as proposed, approval with changes, denial or deferral. When the Commissioners defer an action, they may announce an additional period

for written comment on the item, with or without an additional hearing date, or they may take additional time to consider the input they have already received without requesting further public input. Deferred items will be considered for action at a public meeting of the Commission on a future date.

Advance sign-up for oral comment. Individuals who wish to comment on the record during the public hearing on November 9, 2022, or to address the Commissioners informally during the open public comment portion of the meeting on December 7, 2022, as time allows, are asked to sign up in advance through EventBrite. ## Commonwealth Specialty Crop Block Grant Program; 2022 Program Guidelines

The Department of Agriculture (Department) announces the program requirements and application period for grants under the Commonwealth Specialty Crop Block Grant Program (Program). The Program is authorized under 3 Pa.C.S. Chapter 105 (Act 40 of 2019) (relating to Commonwealth Specialty Crop Block Grant Program).

#### 1. Program objective.

The purpose of the Program is to enhance, but not replace, the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program by establishing a Commonwealth Specialty Crop Block Grant Program for specialty crops that are not currently eligible for grant payments under the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program or that are otherwise designated high-priority specialty crops by the Secretary. Funding for the Program will assist the growth, certification of seed and marketing of these eligible specialty crops.

- 2. Eligible applicants and projects.
- (a) Eligibility of applicants. State and local organizations, producer associations, academia, community-based organizations and other eligible specialty crops stakeholders are eligible to apply for grants under the Program.
  - (b) Eligible projects.
- (1) Grants may not be awarded to projects that directly benefit a particular commercial product or provide a profit to a single organization, institution or individual.
- (2) Grants must be for projects that are focused on an eligible specialty crop. For Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 round of grant applications, the Secretary designates the following as the high-priority specialty crops that are eligible for Program grants:
  - (i) hemp;
  - (ii) hardwoods;
  - (iii) honey;
  - (iv) hops; and
- (v) barley, rye and wheat for distilling, brewing and malting only.
- (3) If a project relates to a processed eligible specialty crop, the processed product must consist of greater than 50% of the eligible specialty crop by weight, exclusive of added water.
- (4) Projects must enhance the competitiveness of eligible specialty crops and benefit the eligible specialty crop industry as a whole and may include, but are not limited to, projects such as:
- (i) Increasing child and adult nutrition knowledge and consumption of specialty crops.
- (ii) Participation of industry representatives at meetings of international standard setting bodies in which the Federal government participates.
- (iii) Improving efficiency and reducing costs of distribution systems.
- (iv) Assisting all entities in the specialty crop distribution chains in developing good agricultural practices, including the use of cover crops for specialty crop production; good handling practices; good manufacturing practices; and in cost-share arrangements for funding audits of such systems for small farmers, packers and processors.
- (v) Investing in specialty crop research, including the use of cover crops for specialty crop production, organic research to focus on conservation and environmental outcomes and enhancing food safety.
- (vi) Developing new and improved seed varieties and specialty crops.
  - (vii) Pest and disease control.
  - (viii) Sustainability.

3. Definitions.

The following words and terms have the following meanings:

Cover crops—Grasses, legumes or forbs planted for seasonal vegetative cover to support one or more of the following purposes: a) reduce erosion from wind and water; b) maintain or increase soil health and organic matter content; c) reduce water quality degradation by utilizing excessive soil nutrients; d) suppress excessive weed pressures and break pest cycles; e) improve soil moisture use efficiency; and f) minimize soil compaction.

*Crop*—Plants that are cultivated for sale, production, processing or subsistence. The term does not include wild plants.

Department—The Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth.

Eligible specialty crop—A specialty crop designated as a high-priority specialty crop by the Secretary, with priority given to crops, plants and products that are not currently eligible for funding under the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program. For FY 2022 round of grant applications, these designated eligible specialty crops are hemp, hardwoods, honey, hops and the following grains if used for distilling, brewing and malting only: barley, rye and wheat.

Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program—The Specialty Crops Competitiveness Act of 2004 (Pub.L. No. 108-465, 118 Stat. 3882).

General evaluation criteria—The evaluation criteria established by the Department and utilized for the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program.

Horticultural crop—A crop that is used by people for food, medicinal purposes and aesthetic gratification.

Population density—The total population of this Commonwealth as determined by the most recent Federal decennial census, divided by the total area of this Commonwealth in square miles.

*Program*—The Commonwealth Specialty Crop Block Grant Program established under 3 Pa.C.S. Chapter 105 (Act 40 of 2019).

Rural municipality—A municipality of this Commonwealth with a population density less than the Statewide average population density or a total population less than 2,500, unless more than 50% of the population lives in an urbanized area, as defined by the United States Census Bureau.

Secretary—The Secretary of the Department.

Silvicultural product—A product of a forest or woodland, including, but not limited to, timber.

Specialty crop—A horticultural crop or silvicultural product, a plant cultivated and utilized for fiber or biofuel purposes or an apiary product.

*Urban municipality*—A municipality of this Commonwealth not defined as a rural municipality.

- 4. Limitations on grants.
- (a) *Project duration*. A project must have a completion date of no later than June 30, 2026.
- (b) Reimbursement grants. Grant funds will be awarded as reimbursement grants.

- 5. Available funds; allocation of moneys.
- (a) Funds-available basis. The sum of \$460,000 is available for grants under the Program. Grants will be awarded on a funds-available basis.
- (b) Allocation of funding. Moneys made available by the Department for Program grants will be allocated as follows:
- (1) An amount equal to 6.2% of the money will be allocated to recipients and projects located in rural municipalities where at least 20% of the population has been below the Federal poverty line since 1990, based on census data. A list of these rural municipalities can be accessed at the Department of Agriculture's web site at http://www.agriculture.pa.gov/pafarmbill under the Program.
- (2) An amount equal to 3.8% of the money will be allocated to recipients and projects located in urban municipalities where at least 20% of the population has been below the Federal poverty line since 1990 based on census data. A list of these urban municipalities can be reviewed on the Department's web site, at the Internet address previously provided in paragraph (1).
- (3) The balance of the money remaining after making these allocations, and after deducting for the Department's permissible administrative costs, will be allocated to recipients and projects in a manner which seeks to distribute the money evenly among types of eligible specialty crops and, where practicable, in a manner that distributes the money across this Commonwealth.

#### 6. Applications.

- (a) Full proposal required. The Department will accept proposals for eligible projects as part of a two-phase competitive process. Eligible applicants must submit a full proposal for a project which describes how the grant would be used to enhance the competitiveness of the subject eligible specialty crop through market development, technology, innovation, food safety, nutrition knowledge, sustainable practices or management, or both. A template for the full proposal may be found on the Department's web site at http://www.agriculture.pa.gov/pafarmbill under the Program.
- (b) *Electronic applications only*. Interested applicants must submit a complete electronic full proposal using the Department of Community and Economic Development's Electronic Single Application web site at www.esa.dced. state.pa.us.
- (c) Application window. Completed full proposals may be electronically submitted beginning October 31, 2022. Full proposals must be received by no later than 5 p.m. on December 2, 2022.

#### 7. Review of application.

The Secretary will review and evaluate the full proposal and supporting documentation and will consider the following factors, which are consistent with the general evaluation criteria of the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program, in deciding whether to approve or reject the full proposal:

- (1) The full proposal involves a project for an eligible specialty crop as previously defined.
- (2) The proposal states the specific issue, problem or need the project will address, the timeliness and relevance to the specialty crop industry, if it will provide a direct benefit to the specialty crop industry, and if the approach is rational and sound.

(3) The proposal will result in at least one of the eight outcomes as predetermined by the Program. Outcomes are measurable changes in behavior or conditions that reflect a positive impact to the specialty crop industry. Only one outcome and indicator is required. Scoring will be based on the outcome selected and the project's likelihood of success and relevance to the specialty crop industry.

- (4) The predetermined indicator (as described on the application form) listed under the outcome identified and the quantifiable results written for the indictor selected.
- (5) How the data will be collected and how well the project will accomplish the outcome and indicator selected.
- (6) The extent to which the budget is reasonable and consistent with the project's purpose, outcome and indicator. Are matching funds or in-kind contributions anticipated? Is it feasible that the proposed work can be accomplished given the proposed budget? Matching funds are not a requirement of the Program; however, matching funds are encouraged and may serve as evidence to demonstrate industry commitment to or support for the project.
- (7) The extent to which the full proposal meets the requirements for an "eligible project" presented in section 2(b).
- (8) Whether the subject specialty crop is not currently eligible for grant payments under the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program.

#### 8. Notice of disposition of application.

The Department will e-mail written notice of the acceptance or rejection of a full proposal. This notice will be by e-mail to the e-mail address provided by the applicant in the application. Applicants of successful full proposals will be invited to submit an application containing a final proposal for the Program. This application will be provided by the Department with instructions for submittal. Only those applicants notified by the Department will be eligible to submit a final proposal. The Department will evaluate all final proposals by applying the allocation percentages presented in section 5 and the evaluation factors presented in section 7.

#### 9. Grant agreement.

After the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant will execute a written or electronic grant agreement which describes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made. The grant agreement shall contain and conform to the requirements of this notice and shall also contain special terms and conditions as required by the Secretary. Applicants who wish to view the full terms and conditions of the grant agreement in advance of submitting an application may contact the Department at the address set forth in section 11. Applicants who are unable to agree to the terms and conditions should not submit an application.

#### 10. Verification of project completion.

(a) *General*. Within 30 days of completion of the subject project, the applicant shall provide the Department with proof of the completion of the project and eligibility to receive reimbursement grant funds from the Department.

- (b) Required documentation. The proof described in subsection (a) shall consist of:
- (1) copies of invoices for goods or services directly related to the project, along with the written certification of the president or treasurer of the applicant that the goods or services that are the subject of the invoices have been delivered or provided to the applicant; and
- (2) a certificate of completion, signed by its president or treasurer, verifying completion of the subject project and stating that the grant funds will reimburse the applicant for a portion of the costs incurred by the applicant in completing the subject project.

The Department of Agriculture (Department) announces a competitive solicitation process to award Specialty Crop Block Grant Program-Farm Bill funds for projects that enhance the competitiveness of this Commonwealth's specialty crops. Specialty crops are defined as fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits, horticulture and nursery crops, including floriculture. (For a full list of commonly considered specialty crops, see the United States Department of Agriculture's web site at www.ams.usda.gov/services/grants under the Specialty Crop Block Grant Program.)

#### 1. Program objective.

The purpose of the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program (Program) is to enhance the competitiveness of specialty crops by:

- (iv) Assisting all entities in the specialty crop distribution chains in developing good agricultural practices, including the use of cover crops for specialty crop production; good handling practices; good manufacturing practices; and in cost-share arrangements for funding audits of such systems for small farmers, packers and processors.
- (v) Investing in specialty crop research, including the use of cover crops for specialty crop production, organic research to focus on conservation and environmental outcomes and enhancing food safety.
- (vi) Developing new and improved seed varieties and specialty crops.
  - (vii) Pest and disease control.
  - (viii) Sustainability.

#### 3. Definitions.

The following words and terms have the following meanings:

Department—The Department of Agriculture of the Commonwealth.

Eligible specialty crop—Fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits and nursery crops (including floriculture). A complete list of eligible specialty crops can be viewed at www.ams.usda.gov/services/grants, Specialty Crop Block Grant Program, Definition of a Specialty Crop.

Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program—The Specialty Crops Competitiveness Act of 2004 (Pub.L. No. 108-465, 118 Stat. 3882).

General evaluation criteria—The evaluation criteria established by the Department and utilized for the Federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program.

Secretary—The Secretary of the Department.

- 4. Limitations on grants.
- (a) *Project duration*. A project must have a start date of September 30, 2023, and a completion date of no later than September 29, 2026.
- (b) Reimbursement grants. Grant funds will be awarded as reimbursement grants.
- 5. Funds-available basis.

Approximately \$1 million is available for grants under the Program. Grants will be awarded on a funds-available basis.

- 6. Applications.
- (a) Full proposal required. The Department will accept proposals for eligible projects as part of a two-phase competitive process. Eligible applicants must submit a full proposal for a project which describes how the grant

would be used to enhance the competitiveness of the subject eligible specialty crop through market development, technology, innovation, food safety, nutrition knowledge, sustainable practices or management, or both.

- (b) *Electronic applications only*. Interested applicants must submit a complete electronic full proposal using the Department of Community and Economic Development's Electronic Single Application web site at https:// www.esa.dced.state.pa.us.
- (c) Application window. Completed full proposals may be electronically submitted beginning October 31, 2022. Full proposals must be received by no later than 5 p.m. on December 2, 2022.

#### 7. Review of application.

The Secretary will review and evaluate the full proposal and supporting documentation and will consider the following factors, which are consistent with the general evaluation criteria of the Program, in deciding whether to approve or reject the full proposal:

- (1) The full proposal involves a project for an eligible specialty crop as previously defined.
- (2) The proposal states the specific issue, problem or need the project will address, the timeliness and relevance to the specialty crop industry, if it will provide a direct benefit to the specialty crop industry, and if the approach is rational and sound.
- (3) The proposal will result in at least one of the seven outcomes as predetermined by the Program. Outcomes are measurable changes in behavior or conditions that reflect a positive impact to the specialty crop industry. Only one outcome indicator is required. Scoring will be based on the outcome selected and the project's likelihood of success and relevance to the specialty crop industry.
- (4) The predetermined indicator (as described on the application form) listed under the outcome identified and the quantifiable results written for the indictor selected.
- (5) How the data will be collected and how well the project will accomplish the outcome and indicator selected.
- (6) The extent to which the budget is reasonable and consistent with the project's purpose, outcome and indicator.
- (7) The extent to which the full proposal meets the requirements for an "eligible project" presented in section 2(b).
- (8) Whether the subject specialty crop is not currently eligible for grant payments under the Program.

#### 8. Notice of disposition of application.

The Department will e-mail written notice of the acceptance or rejection of a full proposal. This notice will be by e-mail to the e-mail address provided by the applicant in the application. Applicants of successful full proposals will be invited to submit an application containing a final proposal for the Program. This application will be provided by the Department with instructions for submittal. Only those applicants notified by the Department will be eligible to submit a final proposal. The Department will evaluate all final proposals by applying the evaluation factors presented in section 7.

9. Grant agreement.

After the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant will execute a written or electronic grant agreement which describes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made. The grant agreement shall contain and conform to the requirements of this notice and will also contain special terms and conditions as required by the Secretary. Applicants who wish to view the full terms and conditions of the grant agreement in advance of submitting an application may contact the Department at the address in section 11. Applicants who are unable to agree to the terms and conditions should not submit an application.

- 10. Verification of project completion.
- (a) *General*. Within 30 days of completion of the subject project, the applicant shall provide the Department with proof of the completion of the project and eligibility to receive reimbursement grant funds from the Department.
- (b) Required documentation. The proof described in subsection (a) shall consist of:
- (1) copies of invoices for goods or services directly related to the project, along with the written certification of the president or treasurer of the applicant that the goods or services that are the subject of the invoices have been delivered or provided to the applicant; and
- (2) a certificate of completion, signed by its president or treasurer, verifying completion of the subject project and stating that the grant funds will reimburse the applicant for a portion of the costs incurred by the applicant in completing the subject project.

# DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Amendment to the 2019—2023 Consolidated Plan and 2019 Action Plan

On March 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) (Pub.L. 116-136) was signed into law to respond to the growing effects of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) public health crisis. The CARES Act provides special allocations to the Commonwealth under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions Grant and Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS Grant programs to be used to prevent, prepare for and respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Annually, the Department of Community and Economic Development (Department) prepares the Action Plan which outlines the methods of distribution for Federal funding received by the Commonwealth through the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). For the 2019 Action Plan, the Methods of Distribution to the State's resources will be updated, which according to the Pennsylvania Citizen Participation Plan for the Consolidated Plan, constitutes a change in the distribution of funds under the plan and requires an amendment to the original Consolidated Plan and Action Plan.

The Department conducted an unmet needs survey from December 20, 2021, until January 25, 2022. In addition, two listening sessions with grantees were held on March 8, 2022, and March 10, 2022. Additionally, the Department staff met with representatives of grantees at the PAHRA Capitol Conference held in February and consulted with the CD&H Advisory Committee to provide additional detail on the continued unmet needs in their communities.

The information provided to the Department necessitated changing the method of distribution to broaden the

scope of public infrastructure projects to be funded and reducing other project categories, which did not receive much consideration by units of local government during the last competitive application period. Proposed activities must document that they prepare for, prevent or respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

After receiving applications for funding based on the changes approved in April 2022, the Department proposed again to change its method of distribution to better align the amounts of funding to reflect those areas which received applications for funding.

Previously, these changes triggered a substantial amendment, which was completed in August 2022. However, further changes necessitate amending those amounts to better reflect what was recommended for funding. In accordance with a waiver of regulatory authority, approved by HUD on April 7, 2020, to the normal citizen comment period, the Commonwealth will hold a 5-day citizen comment period starting October 29, 2022, until November 2, 2022.

The proposed amendment for the 2019 Annual Action Plan is as follows:

Increase the amount of funding for Public Improvements and Facilities to \$52,836,739.

Reduce the amount of funding for Housing-related activities to \$375,000.

Reduce the amount of funding for Public Service activities to \$111,779.

Increase the amount of funding for Economic Development activities to \$1 million.

The lease is for Streambed Tract 2041 on the Susquehanna River, encompassing a total of 176 acres of submerged lands located in Great Bend Township, Susquehanna County. The lease was recorded at the Susquehanna County Courthouse on June 29, 2022, instrument No. 2022-05543. The lease allows for the development of oil and natural gas below and between the ordinary low water marks of the Susquehanna River solely by means of directional, including horizontal, drilling on a nondevelopment basis that will not disturb the river or its bed. #### **Revisions to Schedule of Prices for State Forests**

#### A. Summary and Background

Under section 314 of the Conservation and Natural Resources Act (71 P.S. § 1340.314), the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (Department), Bureau of Forestry (Bureau), will establish a price schedule for State Forest camping permits, effective November 3, 2022. The updated price schedule, which is in section D as follows, will include Bureau roadside campsites and select trailside campsites, for inclusion to the State Park and State Forest Reservation and Revenue Management System. The updated price schedule is needed to support maintenance, patrol and management of the Bureau's Camping Program and to adjust existing rates to the market. The resulting fees are comparable to those of state parks and forests in neighboring states and will narrow the gap between State Parks and Forests in this Commonwealth and private facilities, resulting in a more favorable competitive climate for the private sector.

When the updated price schedule becomes effective, it will be posted on the Department's web site at https://www.dcnr.pa.gov/Recreation/WhatToDo/StayOvernight/Pages/default.aspx.

The Bureau also adopts a new cancellation and change policy.

#### E. Cancellation/Change Policy

In addition to an updated price schedule, the Bureau is adopting a new cancellation and change policy. This policy correlates to the best management practices of the Department's Bureau of State Parks and other state park and private sector reservation web sites and mirrors the Department's management directives. The policy can be found at https://www.dcnr.pa.gov/StateParks/StateParkPrices/Pages/default.aspx.

New Reservation Cancellation/Change Policy:

This cancellation and change policy is applicable to all reservable and first-come, first-served facilities. This policy is applicable for all reservations created on and after November 3, 2022. This policy is available on the confirmation letter or e-mail.

Fees and Policies:

Transaction Fee: A \$6.50 nonrefundable transaction fee is charged on all reservations and registrations. This fee will not be refunded if the reservation is cancelled or transferred. Exceptions cannot be granted because this fee is a pass-through cost incurred by the Bureau for the reservation system.

#### Changes to a reservation:

A nonrefundable \$10 fee per reservation is assessed for all changes made to the reservation, except for adding nights to the reservation. This fee will not be refunded in the event of a change or cancellation in any situation. Exceptions cannot be granted because this fee is a pass-through cost incurred by the Bureau for the reservation system.

Reservations made at the maximum window (11 months to the day), or with a departure date after the maximum booking window, are not permitted to move or cancel the reservation for 22 days. After 22 days, patrons can change or move the reservation for a \$10 transfer fee.

Changes prior to the day of arrival to any online reservation or call center reservation, must be made by calling the State Parks and Forests Reservation Center at (888) PA-PARKS ((888) 727-2757), Monday—Saturday, 7 a.m.—5 p.m.

Changes on the day of arrival must go through the State forest where individuals have a reservation. There are no refunds for early departure of any part of a holiday weekend reservation once the site has been occupied. Changes will not be accepted by means of social media.

Cancellation of a reservation:

Cancellations can be made by means of the call center or web up to the day before arrival. Cancellations on the day of arrival must be made through the State forest. The State Parks and Forests Reservation Center's hours are Monday—Saturday, 7 a.m.—5 p.m. and can be reached at (888) PA-PARKS ((888) 727-2757).

Cancellations made up to close of business 7 days prior to the scheduled arrival date will incur the \$10 cancellation fee per reservation. If individuals cancel 6 days or less prior to the arrival date, they will forfeit the first night's fee. Reservations will be held for the entire camping reservation, including for no shows. Fees are retained and will not be refunded if individuals fail to arrive and do not inform the park of a cancellation in advance or during their stay. Refunds will be calculated based on the date of notification using the previously listed information or by check out if notification occurs after the arrival date but before departure date.

Refunds in excess of the previously listed policy will not be given for reasons including, but not limited to, natural disasters, drought, bugs, weather, campfire bans, death, pandemics (for example, COVID-19), water conditions or pool closures due to staffing.

#### Refunds:

If paid by Visa, MasterCard, Discover or American Express, the card will be credited. If paid by check or money order, a check from the Commonwealth will be issued. Only the person whose name is on the reservation may change or cancel. Refunds by check require a minimum of 6 to 8 weeks for delivery.

Requests for refunds outside of this policy will not be considered if submitted 8 days or more after departure date. For example, if an individual were to depart on January 7 and submitted a refund request on January 15, it is ineligible for review.

The applicant proposes to: 1. remove the existing single span, concrete encased steel bridge with a 6'-3" normal clear span, 6'-6" maximum underclearance, and out-to-out length of 29'-8" over an unnamed tributary to Tributary 43756 to Loyalhanna Creek (CWF, herein referred to as "Watercourse 1"), 2. construct and maintain a stream enclosure that will run parallel to the roadway (SR 711) for approximately 230 LF, consisting of three (3) modified drainage inlet boxes and approximately 50 LF of 42" diameter pipe, transitioning to approximately 180 LF of

72" diameter pipe, then turning 90 40 13 36.3s to the east to replace the aforementioned existing bridge with an additional 44 LF of 72" diameter pipe with a 72" type DW endwall, resulting in a temporary impact of 280 LF and permanent impact of 274 LF to Watercourse 1, 3. construct and maintain two (2) stormwater outfalls to Watercourse 1 consisting of 18" drainage pipes discharging directly into the aforementioned stream enclosure, 4. construct and maintain a 155 LF rock roadway embankment on the east side of SR 711 consisting of 206 rock on 1.5:1 slope, impacting 0.04 acre of Watercourse 1 floodway and 0.06 acre of the floodway of Tributary 43756 of Loyalhanna Creek (CWF, herein referred to as "Watercourse 2"), 5. construct and maintain 68 LF of relocated channel of Watercourse 2 due aforementioned roadway embankment construction, consisting of R-5 or R-7 rock choked with natural streambed material, 6. construct and maintain a stormwater outfall to the aforementioned relocated channel of Watercourse 2, consisting of an 18" pipe discharging onto a R-5 rock lined "v" channel, for the purpose of replacing the dilapidated structure carrying SR 711 over a UNT to Tributary 43756 of Loyalhanna Creek. Cumulatively, since some impacts overlap, the project will have a permanent impact of 348 LF and a temporary impact of 280 LF on Watercourse 1 and Watercourse 2. Mitigation will be achieved through the

restoration of temporary impacts and the relocation of Waters 2 into a 68 LF channel constructed with natural streambed materials and riparian plantings. The project site is located along SR 711 near the intersection with Palmer Drive. Latitude: 40° 13′ 36.3″, Longitude: -79° 14′ 42.6″.

The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The DEP may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides DEP's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

 $\it DEP\ ID$ : 294-2309-002.  $\it Title$ : Pennsylvania Radon Mitigation Standards.  $\it Description$ : The Pennsylvania Ra don Mitigation Standards (PA RMS) details how radon mitigators can install mitigation systems that conform to the regulatory requirements in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 240 (relating to radon certification). These standards were first published in 1997. Since the PA RMS was published, additional field experience was gained and additional National radon mitigation standards have been published. This prompted a revision of the PA RMS with changes such as configurations to avoid condensation around the fans; suggested sealants and materials that are not permitted as sealants; active sub-slab depressurization systems can be exhausted at ground level instead of the current roofline level; new electrical information was obtained for low voltage and direct current fan use; recommended materials for exterior pipe vents; and the recommendation to consider use of an active radon warning device on the active sub-slab depressurization piping in addition to the U-tube manometer.

### Pennsylvania Big Holiday Blowout Fast Play Game 5176

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Big Holiday Blowout (hereinafter "Big Holiday Blowout"). The game number is PA-5176.
  - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (f) MINTY MONEY: The area on a Big Holiday Blowout ticket containing Peppermint symbols that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player wins a prize of \$100. MINTY MONEY is played separately.
- (g) Play: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (h) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (i) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (j) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (k) SNOWFLAKE: The visual representation of a SNOWFLAKE printed around certain play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area. When a "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol is printed within a SNOWFLAKE and matches any "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbol, the player multiplies the prize won by ten and wins that amount.
- (1) SNOW SQUALL WINALL: The area at the bottom of a Big Holiday Blowout lottery game ticket that, when played accordingly to the instructions, determines whether the player wins all 16 prizes shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area. SNOW SQUALL WINALL prizes are not multiplied.

- (m) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (n) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (o) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- 3. Price: The price of a Big Holiday Blowout ticket is \$10.
- 4. Description of Big Holiday Blowout Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) Big Holiday Blowout lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Big Holiday Blowout tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Big Holiday Blowout is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol.
- (c) Big Holiday Blowout tickets also contain a "SNOW SQUALL WINALL" area. Whenever all the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are printed within a SNOWFLAKE, the player wins all 16 prizes shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area. "SNOW SQUALL WINALL" prizes are not multiplied.
- (d) Big Holiday Blowout tickets contain a "MINTY MONEY" area. When ten Peppermint symbols appear in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, the player wins a prize of \$100 instantly. "MINTY MONEY" is played separately.
- (e) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (f) Big Holiday Blowout tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (g) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Big Holiday Blowout ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (h) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Big Holiday Blowout ticket and select the Big Holiday Blowout option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
  - 5. Big Holiday Blowout ticket characteristics:
- (a) Big Holiday Blowout tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.

The play symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and printed in a "SNOWFLAKE" symbol, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The "MINTY MONEY" play symbol, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, is a Peppermint symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are:  $\$10^{.00}$  (TEN DOL),  $\$15^{.00}$  (FIFTEEN),  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY),  $\$30^{.00}$  (THIRTY),  $\$50^{.00}$  (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO), \$5,000 (FIV THO) and \$150,000 (ONEFTYTHO).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$10, \$15, \$20, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$150,000. Big Holiday Blowout contains a feature that can multiply certain prizes. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 8 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to 17 times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Big Holiday Blowout lottery game.
- 6. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a #sELFie Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Big Holiday Blowout lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9.
- 7. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Big Holiday Blowout prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$150,000 (ONEFTYTHO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5,000 (FIV THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing within a "SNOW-FLAKE," and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which all of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols appear within a "SNOW-FLAKE" and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in four of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in ten of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.

- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing within a "SNOW-FLAKE," and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which all of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols appear within a "SNOW-FLAKE" and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in five of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in three of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in six of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in one of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

- (o) Holders of tickets upon which all of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols appear within a "SNOW-FLAKE" and a prize symbol of \$50 $^{.00}$  (FIFTY) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$30 $^{.00}$  (THIRTY) appears in five of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$20 $^{.00}$  (TWENTY) appears in four of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$15 $^{.00}$  (FIFTEEN) appears in four of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$10 $^{.00}$  (TEN DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$400.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing within a "SNOW-FLAKE," and a prize symbol of \$30.00 (THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$300.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing within a "SNOW-FLAKE," and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols, with the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol appearing within a "SNOW-FLAKE," and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$150.

- (2) All entries received after 4:59:59 a.m. November 1, 2022, through 11:59:59 p.m. January 5, 2023, will be entered into the Drawing tentatively scheduled to be held between January 9, 2023 and January 20, 2023.
- (3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at https://www.palottery.com.
- (4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5176 Big Holiday Blowout (\$10) = ten entries, PA-5177 Cash Flurry (\$5) = five entries, PA-5178 Cookies for Santa (\$2) = two entries and PA-5179 Ugly Sweater (\$1) = one entry.
- (5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.
- (d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:
- (1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(e) or mentioned anywhere else in these rules.
- (2) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(c)(2).
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$100,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (ii) The second and the third entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The fourth through the sixth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$25,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iv) The seventh through the tenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.
- (v) The eleventh through the sixtieth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
- (3) All prizes will be paid as lump-sum cash payments or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.
- (4) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will have the iLottery Bonus Money credited to their Lottery account and will receive an email notifying them that they won a prize.
- (5) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site.
- (6) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.

(7) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.

- (e) Drawing restrictions:
- (1) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.
- (2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.
- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.
- (4) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.
- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.
- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).
- (12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.
- (13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent en-

tries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.

- (14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 9(d)(4). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's Lottery account.
  - (15) Prizes are not transferrable.
  - (16) Other restrictions may apply.
  - 10. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
  - 11. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
  - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
  - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
  - 12. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
  - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
  - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 13. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 14. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 15. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.
  - 16. Governing law:
- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Big Holiday Blowout lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

- 17. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 18. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Big Holiday Blowout lottery game tickets.
- 19. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 20. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Big Holiday Blowout or through normal communications methods.
- 21. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Big Holiday Blowout lottery game announced in this notice.

#### Pennsylvania Cash Flurry Fast Play Game 5177

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. Name: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Cash Flurry (hereinafter "Cash Flurry"). The game number is PA-5177.

2. Definitions:

- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) *Bar code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) CASH IN A HURRY: The area at the bottom of a Cash Flurry lottery game ticket containing one play symbol that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player wins the prize shown.
- (d) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (e) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (f) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (g) Play: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (h) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket, which contains one or more play symbols.
- (i) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area, which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (j) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (k) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (1) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (m) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
  - 3. Price: The price of a Cash Flurry ticket is \$5.
- 4. Description of the Cash Flurry Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Cash Flurry lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Cash Flurry tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Cash Flurry is played by matching the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the

prize shown under the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. Whenever a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) symbol appears in the play area, the player increases the prize shown under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) symbol by \$5 and wins that amount. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

- (c) Cash Flurry tickets contain a "CASH IN A HURRY" area. Whenever a player matches the play symbol in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area to any of the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, the player wins the prize shown.
- (d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (e) A Cash Flurry game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Cash Flurry game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Cash Flurry game ticket and select the Cash Flurry option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
  - 5. Cash Flurry ticket characteristics:
- (a) A Cash Flurry ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Each Cash Flurry ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a "CASH IN A HURRY" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN) and 30 (THIRT). The play symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRT) and a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: \$5 $^{00}$  (FIV DOL), \$10 $^{00}$  (TEN DOL), \$15 $^{00}$  (FIFTEEN), \$20 $^{00}$  (TWENTY), \$40 $^{00}$  (FORTY), \$50 $^{00}$  (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN), \$1,000 (ONE THO) and \$75,000 (SVYFIVTHO). The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, are: \$5 $^{00}$  (FIV DOL), \$10 $^{00}$  (TEN DOL), \$15 $^{00}$  (FIFTEEN), \$20 $^{00}$  (TWENTY), \$40 $^{00}$  (FORTY), \$50 $^{00}$  (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN) and \$200 (TWO HUN).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$40, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$1,000 and \$75,000. The prizes that can be won in the "CASH IN A

- HURRY" area, are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$40, \$50, \$100 and \$200. Cash Flurry contains a feature that can increase certain prizes. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 8 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to 13 times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Cash Flurry lottery game.
- 6. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a #sELFie Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Cash Flurry lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9.
- 7. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Cash Flurry prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$75,000 (SVYFIVTHO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$75,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1,000 (ONE THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$205.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$105.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

- (j) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$55.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (l) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $50^{00}$  (FIFTY) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of 50.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of \$40<sup>.00</sup> (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$45.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40.00 (FORTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (o) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40.00 (FORTY) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of  $$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$25.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (r) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (s) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and

- a prize symbol of  $\$15^{.00}$  (FIFTEEN) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (t) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (u) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (v) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (w) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (x) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (y) Holders of tickets upon which a \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol appears in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under that \$5 Bill (PLUS5) play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (z) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (aa) Holders of tickets upon which the "CASH IN A HURRY" play symbol matches any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "CASH IN A HURRY" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- 8. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

- (a) Qualifying Tickets: Non-winning PA-5176 Big Holiday Blowout (\$10), PA-5177 Cash Flurry (\$5), PA-5178 Cookies for Santa (\$2) and PA-5179 Ugly Sweater (\$1) Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Qualifying Tickets") are eligible for entry in the Drawing.
  - (b) Participation and entry:
- (1) Entrants must be members of the Pennsylvania Lottery VIP Players Club to participate in the Drawing. To join the VIP Players Club, visit https://www.palottery.state.pa.us/vipplayersclub/login.aspx. Becoming a VIP Players Club member is free.
- (2) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at https://www.palottery.com, or the Lottery's official mobile application during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted, and entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.
- (3) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be accepted.
  - (4) Only one claimant per entry is allowed.
  - (5) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.
- (6) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.
- (7) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.
  - (c) Drawing description:

- (3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at https://www.palottery.com.
- (4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5176 Big Holiday Blowout (\$10) = ten entries, PA-5177 Cash Flurry (\$5) = five entries, PA-5178 Cookies for Santa (\$2) = two entries and PA-5179 Ugly Sweater (\$1) = one entry.
- (5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.
- (d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:
- (1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(e) or mentioned anywhere else in these rules.
- (2) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(c)(2).
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$100,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (ii) The second and the third entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The fourth through the sixth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$25,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iv) The seventh through the tenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.
- (v) The eleventh through the sixtieth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
- (3) All prizes will be paid as lump-sum cash payments or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.
- (4) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will

- (2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.
- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.
- (4) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.
- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.

- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).
- (12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.
- (13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.

For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's Lottery account.
  - (15) Prizes are not transferrable.
  - (16) Other restrictions may apply.
  - 10. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
  - 11. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
  - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
  - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
  - 12. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:
- (1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;
  - (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
  - (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 13. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 14. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 15. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.
  - 16. Governing law:
- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures

established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Cash Flurry lottery game.

- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
  - 17. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
- 18. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Cash Flurry lottery game tickets.
- 19. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 20. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Cash Flurry or through normal communications methods.
- 21. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Cash Flurry lottery game announced in this notice.

### Pennsylvania Cookies for Santa Fast Play Game 5178

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers

and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. Name: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Cookies for Santa (hereinafter "Cookies for Santa"). The game number is PA-5178.

#### 2. Definitions:

- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.
- (b) Bar code: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (f) MILK MULTIPLIER: The area at the top of a Cookies for Santa lottery game ticket containing one play symbol that, when played according to the instructions, determines whether the player doubles any prize won in the play area.
- (g) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (h) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (i) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (j) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (k) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (l) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (m) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
  - 3. Price: The price of a Cookies for Santa ticket is \$2.
- 4. Description of the Cookies for Santa Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Cookies for Santa lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select their own play symbols. Cookies for Santa tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a

- Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Cookies for Santa is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. If a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, the player doubles any prize won in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area below. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (d) Cookies for Santa tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request a Cookies for Santa ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Cookies for Santa ticket and select the Cookies for Santa option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
  - 5. Cookies for Santa ticket characteristics:
- (a) Cookies for Santa tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Cookies for Santa tickets will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area and a "MILK MULTIPLIER" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR) and 25 (TWYFIV). The play symbols and their captions, located in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, are: 1X (NOMULT) symbol and a 2X (2TIMES) symbol.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are:  $\$2^{.00}$  (TWO DOL),  $\$4^{.00}$  (FOR DOL),  $\$5^{.00}$  (FIV DOL),  $\$10^{.00}$  (TEN DOL),  $\$15^{.00}$  (FIFTEEN),  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY),  $\$30^{.00}$  (THIRTY),  $\$50^{.00}$  (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$200 (TWO HUN) and \$10,000 (TEN THO).
- (d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$200 and \$10,000. Cookies for Santa contains a feature that can multiply the prize won. For a complete list of prizes, and how those prizes can be won, see section 8 (relating to number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning). A player can win up to eight times on a ticket.
- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Cookies for Santa lottery game.

- 6. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a #sELFie Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Cookies for Santa lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9.
- 7. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Cookies for Santa prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10,000 (TEN THO) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10,000.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$200 (TWO HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$200.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50<sup>.00</sup> (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50<sup>-00</sup> (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20<sup>.00</sup> (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.
- (i) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$30^{.00}$

(THIRTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.

- (j) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$30.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (l) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10<sup>.00</sup> (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15.00 (FIFTEEN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (o) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$8.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$5^{.00}$  (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a

1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

- (r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTI-PLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- (s) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$2^{.00}$  (TWO DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon

- which a 2X (2TIMES) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- (t) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2<sup>.00</sup> (TWO DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, and upon which a 1X (NOMULT) symbol appears in the "MILK MULTIPLIER" area, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.
- 8. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

- (a) Qualifying Tickets: Non-winning PA-5176 Big Holiday Blowout (\$10), PA-5177 Cash Flurry (\$5), PA-5178 Cookies for Santa (\$2) and PA-5179 Ugly Sweater (\$1) Fast Play lottery game tickets ("Qualifying Tickets") are eligible for entry in the Drawing.
  - (b) Participation and entry:
- (1) Entrants must be members of the Pennsylvania Lottery VIP Players Club to participate in the Drawing. To join the VIP Players Club, visit https://www.palottery.state.pa.us/vipplayersclub/login.aspx. Becoming a VIP Players Club member is free.
- (2) To enter the Drawing, entrants must submit the identifying information from at least one Qualifying Ticket via the Drawing's promotional web site, available at https://www.palottery.com, or the Lottery's official mobile application during the entry period. The identifying information from a Qualifying Ticket may be submitted only once in the Drawing. Entries will automatically be awarded at the time of successful submission of a Qualifying Ticket. No other method of submission will be accepted, and entries submitted using any other method, including entries mailed or hand-delivered to the Lottery, are not valid and will be disqualified.
- (3) Each entry must be complete and the information supplied by the entrant must be accurate. Incomplete entries cannot be accepted.

- (4) Only one claimant per entry is allowed.
- (5) Entrants must be 18 years of age or older.
- (6) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.
- (7) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.
  - (c) Drawing description:
- (1) The Lottery will conduct one #sELFie Second-Chance Drawing for qualifying Fast Play Lottery game tickets. All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.
- (2) All entries received after 4:59:59 a.m. November 1, 2022, through 11:59:59 p.m. January 5, 2023, will be entered into the Drawing tentatively scheduled to be held between January 9, 2023 and January 20, 2023.
- (3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at https://www.palottery.com.
- (4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying Ticket is as follows: PA-5176 Big Holiday Blowout (\$10) = ten entries, PA-5177 Cash Flurry (\$5) = five entries, PA-5178 Cookies for Santa (\$2) = two entries and PA-5179 Ugly Sweater (\$1) = one entry.
- (5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.

- (d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:
- (1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(e) or mentioned anywhere else in these rules.
- (2) The Lottery will conduct one Drawing from among all the entries received during the entry period as described in section 9(c)(2).
- (i) The first entry selected in the Drawing will be a winning entry and the entrant who submitted that winning entry shall be entitled to a prize of \$100,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (ii) The second and the third entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$50,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iii) The fourth through the sixth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$25,000, less required income tax withholding.
- (iv) The seventh through the tenth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$5,000.
- (v) The eleventh through the sixtieth entries selected in the Drawing will be winning entries and the entrants who submitted those winning entries shall each be entitled to a prize of \$100 iLottery Bonus Money.
- (3) All prizes will be paid as lump-sum cash payments or uploaded to a winning player's lottery account.
- (4) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money are not required to claim a prize. Winners of iLottery Bonus Money will have the iLottery Bonus Money credited to their Lottery account and will receive an email notifying them that they won a prize.
- (5) The number of winning entries to be selected for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site.
- (6) The odds of winning in the Drawing depend upon the number of entries received for the Drawing.
- (7) A computer-generated randomizer will be used to select the Drawing winners.
  - (e) Drawing restrictions:
- (1) To be eligible to participate in the Drawing, entrants must have complied with the requirements of these rules.
- (2) The Lottery is not responsible for late, lost or misdirected entries not entered into the Drawing. The Lottery is not responsible for entries that are not entered into the Drawing because of incompatible internet browsers, mobile Lottery application failure or other technical issues. If an entry is selected as a winner and rejected or otherwise disqualified during or following the Drawing, the Lottery will select another entry to replace the rejected or otherwise disqualified entry in accordance with these rules and Lottery procedure.
- (3) If any discrepancy exists between these rules and any material describing the Drawing, these rules shall govern.

- (4) Employees of the Lottery, 9Rooftops Marketing, LLC (formerly known as MARC USA, LLC), MUSL, Scientific Games International, Inc., MDI Entertainment, LLC, and their subcontractors, or a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing as a member of the same household in the principal place of residence of any such person are not eligible to participate in the Drawing. Offer void where prohibited or restricted.
- (5) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to cancel or suspend the Drawing and change these rules if the Drawing cannot be conducted as planned due to errors in these rules or advertising, unauthorized intervention, tampering, fraud, technical errors, viruses, worms, bugs or any other cause beyond the control of the Lottery that, in the Lottery's sole judgment, could corrupt or impair the administration, security, fairness, integrity or proper conduct of the Drawing.
- (6) All entries shall be subject to verification by the Lottery.
- (7) The Pennsylvania Lottery reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to disqualify an entrant found to be tampering with the operation of the Drawing or to be acting in violation of these rules or applicable law.
- (8) The Drawing is governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Applicable laws and regulations apply.
- (9) Prizes must be claimed within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won. If no claim is made within 1 year of the drawing date of the Drawing in which the prize was won, the right of an entrant to claim the prize won, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided by statute.
- (10) Final determination of winners will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.
- (11) A prize awarded in the Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the prize shall be paid according to 61 Pa. Code § 811.16 (relating to prizes payable after death of a prize winner).
- (12) A winner is responsible for all taxes arising from or in connection with any prize won.
- (13) A player may only win the prize for which the player is first selected in the Drawing. Subsequent entries, from the same individual, selected in the Drawing will be disqualified and a replacement entry will be selected.
- (14) Winners of iLottery Bonus Money must abide by the iLottery Terms & Conditions, the iLottery Bonus Policy and these rules. iLottery Bonus Money will expire 90 days from the date on which the winner was notified, via email, of the prize win, as further detailed in section 9(d)(4). iLottery Bonus Money has a five times play through requirement in order to convert the iLottery Bonus Money into cash. For example, for a player winning \$100 of iLottery Bonus Money, the player is required to place \$500 in wagers before the iLottery Bonus Money awarded is converted into cash which may be withdrawn from the player's Lottery account.
  - (15) Prizes are not transferrable.
  - (16) Other restrictions may apply.

- 10. Ticket responsibility:
- (a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.
- (b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.
- (c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or for a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.
  - 11. Ticket validation and requirements:
- (a) Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:
- (1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.
  - (2) The game ticket must be intact.
- (3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.
- (4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.
  - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
  - 12. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.
- (c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.
- (d) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play shall present the ticket, in person, to an authorized retailer, Lottery Headquarters or a Lottery District Office. The retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned, and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

- (2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;
- (3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and
- (4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 14 (relating to unclaimed prizes).
- (e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.
- (f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.
- 13. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.
- 14. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.
- 15. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

#### 16. Governing law:

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Cookies for Santa lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.
  - 17. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

- 18. Retailer Incentive Programs: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Cookies for Santa lottery game tickets.
- 19. Retailer bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which they qualify on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.
- 20. Termination of the game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Cookies for Santa or through normal communications methods.
- 21. Applicability: This notice applies only to the Cookies for Santa lottery game announced in this notice.

#### Pennsylvania Ugly Sweater Fast Play Game 5179

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

- 1. Name: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Ugly Sweater (hereinafter "Ugly Sweater"). The game number is PA-5179.
  - 2. Definitions:
- (a) Authorized retailer or retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

- (b) *Bar code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.
- (c) Game Ticket: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.
- (d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.
- (e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, transmitting reports and performing inventory functions.
- (f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.
- (g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.
- (h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (i) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money or experience that can be won as specified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.
- (j) UGLIEST SWEATER WINALL: The area at the top of an Ugly Sweater lottery game ticket containing one play symbol that, when matched with the play symbol in the "YOUR SWEATER" area, determines whether the player wins all six prizes shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area.
- (k) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (l) Winning ticket: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.
- (m) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers, letters, symbols or other characters found in the play area that, when matched against the play symbols in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.
- (n) YOUR SWEATER: The area at the bottom of an Ugly Sweater lottery game ticket containing one play symbol that, when matched with the play symbol in the "UGLIEST SWEATER WINALL" area, determines whether the player wins all six prizes shown in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area.
  - 3. Price: The price of an Ugly Sweater ticket is \$1.
- 4. Description of the Ugly Sweater Fast Play lottery game:
- (a) The Ugly Sweater lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. All prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability

- to select their own play symbols. Ugly Sweater tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.
- (b) Ugly Sweater is played by matching any of the play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area to any of the play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area. A player matching play symbols in this manner will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.
- (c) Ugly Sweater tickets contain an "UGLIEST SWEATER WINALL" area. Whenever a player matches the play symbol in the "UGLIEST SWEATER WINALL" area to the play symbol located in the "YOUR SWEATER" area, the player wins all six prizes shown.
- (d) Players can win the prizes identified in section 7 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).
- (e) Ugly Sweater tickets cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.
- (f) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer and verbally request an Ugly Sweater ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
- (g) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of an Ugly Sweater ticket and select the Ugly Sweater option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.
  - 5. Ugly Sweater ticket characteristics:
- (a) Ugly Sweater tickets shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale and a bar code.
- (b) Play Symbols: Ugly Sweater tickets will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area, a "YOUR NUMBERS" area and an "UGLIEST SWEATER WINALL" area and a "YOUR SWEATER" area. The play symbols and their captions, located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR) and 25 (TWYFIV). The play symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR SWEATER" and the "UGLIEST SWEATER WINALL" areas, are: Owl Sweater, Gingerbread Man Sweater, Penguin Sweater, Snowflake Sweater, Tree Sweater, Heart Sweater and a Snowman Sweater.
- (c) Prize Symbols: The prize symbols and their captions, located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, are: FREE (TICKET),  $\$1^{.00}$  (ONE DOL),  $\$2^{.00}$  (TWO DOL),  $\$4^{.00}$  (FOR DOL),  $\$5^{.00}$  (FIV DOL),  $\$10^{.00}$  (TEN DOL),  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY),  $\$50^{.00}$  (FIFTY), \$100 (ONE HUN), \$500 (FIV HUN) and \$2,500 (TWYFIVHUN).

(d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game, are: Free \$1 Ticket, \$1, \$2, \$4, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$2,500. A player can win up to seven times on a ticket.

- (e) Approximate number of tickets available for the game: Approximately 600,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Ugly Sweater lottery game.
- 6. Second-Chance Drawing: The Pennsylvania Lottery will conduct a #sELFie Second-Chance Drawing for which non-winning Ugly Sweater lottery game tickets may be eligible as provided for in section 9.
- 7. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:
- (a) All Ugly Sweater prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.
- (b) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2,500 (TWYFIVHUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2,500.
- (c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$500 (FIV HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (d) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in four of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.
- (e) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (f) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in four of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (g) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$50.00 (FIFTY) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.
- (h) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING

NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$50<sup>.00</sup> (FIFTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.

- (i) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (j) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of  $\$10^{.00}$  (TEN DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of  $\$4^{.00}$  (FOR DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of  $\$20^{.00}$  (TWENTY) appears in one of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of  $\$2^{.00}$  (TWO DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$50.
- (k) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20.00 (TWENTY) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (1) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in three of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (m) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (n) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in four of the "Prize" and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.
- (o) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING

- NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$10.00 (TEN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (p) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in four of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in two of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (q) Holders of tickets upon which the "YOUR SWEATER" play symbol matches the "UGLIEST SWEATER" play symbol and a prize symbol of \$1.00 (ONE DOL) appears in five of the "Prize" areas and a prize symbol of \$5.00 (FIV DOL) appears in one of the "Prize" areas, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.
- (r) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$5^{.00}$  (FIV DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.
- (s) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$4.00 (FOR DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$4.
- (t) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.
- (u) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of  $\$1^{.00}$  (ONE DOL) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.
- (v) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbols match any of the "WINNING NUMBERS" play symbols and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the "Prize" area under the matching "YOUR NUMBERS" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one Ugly Sweater Fast Play Game Ticket.
- 8. Number and description of prizes and approximate chances of winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes and approximate chances of winning:

  - (b) Participation and entry:

- (6) Players may submit the identifying information from an unlimited number of Qualifying Tickets in the Drawing.
- (7) Once an entry has been submitted it cannot be withdrawn or changed.
  - (c) Drawing description:
- (1) The Lottery will conduct one #sELFie Second-Chance Drawing for qualifying Fast Play Lottery game tickets, All time references are Eastern Prevailing Time.

- (3) The entry period for the Drawing will be posted to the Lottery's publicly accessible web site at https://www.palottery.com.
- (4) The number of entries an entrant will receive for the Drawing is determined by the purchase price of the Qualifying Ticket entered. The respective purchase price and corresponding number of entries for the Qualifying

- Ticket is as follows: PA-5176 Big Holiday Blowout (\$10) = ten entries, PA-5177 Cash Flurry (\$5) = five entries, PA-5178 Cookies for Santa (\$2) = two entries and PA-5179 Ugly Sweater (\$1) = one entry.
- (5) Players may review prizes won and their entries for the Drawing via the Drawing's promotional web site.
- (d) Prizes available to be won, determination of winners and odds of winning:
- (1) The prize entitlements described below are subject to all restrictions and limitations described in section 9(e) or mentioned anywhere else in these rules.

  - (5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.
- (6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.
- (7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.
- (8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.
- (b) Invalid or defective game tickets. A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.
  - 12. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:
- (a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.
- (b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. - 13. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this section. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

- (a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Ugly Sweater lottery game.
- (b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

- 17. Retailer compensation:
- (a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.
- (b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.
