

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published weekly. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. It is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations, Statewide court rules, and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, rescission, repeal or emergency action, must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following documents are published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*: Governor's Executive Orders; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or rescind regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. A Final Rulemaking must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the changes can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies, Statewide court rules and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes when they are adopted. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code* § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government.

How to Find Rules and Regulations

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacodeandbulletin.gov.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

A quarterly List of *Pennsylvania Code* Sections Affected lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Proposed new chapters and sections are printed in regular type to enhance readability. Final rulemakings and statements of policy are printed in regular type.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

In Proposed Rulemakings and proposed Statements of Policy, existing text corresponds to the official codified text in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

Court Rules in Titles 201—246 of the Pennsylvania Code

Added text in proposed and adopted court rules is printed in <u>underscored bold face</u>. Deleted text in proposed and adopted court rules is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**.

Proposed new chapters and rules are printed in regular type to enhance readability.

Ellipses, a series of five asterisks, indicate text that is not amended.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 232) requires the Governor's Budget Office to prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions and authorities receiving money from the State Treasury. The fiscal note states whether the action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fiscal note is required to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the change is advertised.

A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; and (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of the Budget is published with the fiscal note. "No fiscal impact" means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended. See 4 Pa. Code Chapter 7, Subchapter R (relating to fiscal notes).

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Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44:

Pennsylvania Longitudinal Data System

January 6, 2023

Whereas, the use of early learning, K-12, higher education, and workforce data may improve education and workforce outcomes for, and better serve, Pennsylvanians; and

Whereas, data analysis supports the evaluation of education and workforce initiatives, leading to informed decision-making and improved service delivery, program administration, and long-term outcomes; and

Whereas, the ability to build evidence for effective services and programs helps ensure government is advancing strategies that work; and

Whereas, education and workforce development services and programs are implemented across multiple agencies and systems, each of which obtain, create, and store participant data related to program engagement, educational and credential attainment, skill development, wages, and other education and employment outcomes, in separate and distinct data systems; and

Whereas, the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) requires collaboration to achieve workforce goals, including "the development of strategies for aligning technology and data systems across one-stop partner programs to enhance service delivery and improve efficiencies in reporting on performance accountability measures;" and

Whereas, the Keystone Economic Development and Workforce Command Center, and the Pennsylvania WIOA Combined State Plan identify a comprehensive statewide longitudinal data system as a key strategy to connect and align early learning, K-12 education, higher education, and workforce data; and

Whereas, Sections 501 and 502 of The Administrative Code of 1929, Act of April 9, 1929, P.L. 177, art. V, §§ 501, 502, as amended, 71 P.S. §§ 181, 182, require administrative departments and independent and departmental administrative boards and commissions to coordinate their work and activities; and

Whereas, Commonwealth agencies have been engaged in various initiatives to advance the effective and transparent use of data, resulting in national recognition as a lead state in the Results For America—State Standards of Excellence; and

Whereas, operationalizing a longitudinal data system based on shared data sets requires proper governance, protection of data, and innovative problem-solving; and

Whereas, a longitudinal data system is a nationally recognized best practice utilized by various states to improve education and workforce outcomes; and

Whereas, a comprehensive longitudinal data system will further assist in understanding long-term education and workforce outcomes and measuring progress towards reaching education and workforce goals.

Now, Therefore, I, Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the

Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth do hereby establish the Pennsylvania Longitudinal Data System and its Governance Board, and direct the following:

§ 5.1041. Purpose.

The Pennsylvania Longitudinal Data System will bring together education and workforce data across programs and agencies to support informed decision-making and improved service delivery, program administration, and long-term education and workforce outcomes.

§ 5.1042. Composition.

The members of the Pennsylvania Longitudinal Data System governance board shall be appointed by the Governor and shall consist of the following:

- (1) The Secretary of Policy and Planning or the Secretary's designee.
- (2) The Secretary of the Department of Labor and Industry or the Secretary's designee.
- (3) The Secretary of the Department of Education or the Secretary's designee.
- (4) The Secretary of the Department of Human Services or the Secretary's designee.
- (5) The Secretary of the Department of Corrections or the Secretary's designee.
 - (6) The Secretary of Administration or the Secretary's designee.
- (7) The Deputy Secretary for Information Technology or the Deputy Secretary's designee.
 - (8) The Commonwealth's Chief Data Officer.
 - (9) The Commonwealth's Chief Privacy Officer.

§ 5.1043. Power and duties.

The Pennsylvania Longitudinal Data System (PALDS) governance board shall do all of the following:

- (1) Elect annually one of the PALDS governance board's members to serve as chair.
 - (2) Create a strategic plan to implement this subchapter.

- (3) Establish data governance policies for the PALDS that comply with Federal and State laws and Commonwealth policy regarding data use, security and privacy.
- (4) Identify the long-term organizational and operational needs to ensure the PALDS is sustainable and able to meet its purpose under § 5.1041 (relating to purpose).
- (5) Meet quarterly to ensure successful implementation of the strategic plan, approve research projects and address issues identified by the PALDS management team.

§ 5.1044. Executive director.

- (a) The Governor shall appoint an executive director to oversee the governance board's operations and support the development, use and maintenance of the Pennsylvania Longitudinal Data System (PALDS) and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The executive director shall be an employee of the Governor's Office of Administration and shall report to both the Secretary of Administration and the Secretary of Policy and Planning on the work of the PALDS governance board.
 - (b) The executive director shall do all of the following:
- (1) Establish an agenda, workplan, timeline and meeting schedule for the PALDS governance board.
- (2) Assist the PALDS governance board in fulfilling its responsibilities under this subchapter.
- (3) Establish the PALDS management team, as authorized by the PALDS governance board with specific purposes and goals; the PALDS management team shall include, but not be limited to, agency data stewards and legal counsel from agencies that provide data to the PALDS.
- (4) Oversee the PALDS management team. The PALDS management team shall provide recommendations on the development of the PALDS, and its ongoing operations, in compliance with legal, statutory and regulatory requirements.
- (5) Establish cross-agency PALDS committees, if needed, to review research projects and provide recommendations to the executive director and the PALDS management team on said projects.
- (6) Report to the PALDS governance board on a regular basis the work that is being done by the PALDS management team and any PALDS committee.

§ 5.1045. Collaboration with other agencies.

Agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction that maintain, collect or store early learning, K—12, higher education and workforce data, as identified by the Pennsylvania Longitudinal Data System (PALDS) governance board, shall cooperate and collaborate with the PALDS governance board, the executive director, the PALDS management team and the PALDS committees, in compliance with applicable Federal and State laws and regulations and Commonwealth policies, to support the purposes of the PALDS, including all of the following:

- (1) Designate agency policy, legal, program, research staff and data stewards to serve as points of contact and to participate in PALDS committees.
- (2) Review and identify available data sets and information necessary to respond to approved PALDS research projects.
- (3) Develop a standing agency research agenda for the PALDS, which identifies and prioritizes the agency's research projects.
- (4) Contribute resources where possible and appropriate, which includes support in identifying sustainable internal and external funding opportunities.

(5) Engage with relevant early learning, K—12, higher education and workforce stakeholders, including the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education.

§ 5.1046. Implementation.

Agencies shall take all steps necessary to implement this subchapter to the extent permissible by law.

§ 5.1047. General provisions.

This subchapter shall be implemented consistent with applicable law. This subchapter is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the Commonwealth, its departments, agencies or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

§ 5.1048. Effective date.

This subchapter shall take effect immediately.

§ 5.1049. Termination date.

This subchapter shall remain in effect unless revised or rescinded by the Governor.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

ADAMS COUNTY

Rules of Civil Procedure; Administrative Order Number 20 of 2022

Order of Court

And Now, this 27th day of December, 2022, in recognition of the County changing its website address, the Court hereby modifies the following Rules of the Adams County Rules of Civil Procedure:

Rule 236. Notice of Order or Judgment. Economic hardship.

When the Prothonotary is required by general or local rule to give notice to any party of any hearing, order, judgment or other matter, it shall be the duty of the moving party to furnish the Prothonotary with sufficient copies of such documents. If the document is to be mailed, the moving party shall also furnish the postage, pre-paid envelope with the name and address of the recipient set forth thereon. The Prothonotary shall note the date that the notice was sent on the file copy. If sufficient copies are not provided, the Prothonotary shall make sufficient copies and charge the moving party a fee established by administrative order. The current fee schedule shall be

posted by the Prothonotary and available for review at http://www.adamscounty.us/Dept/Prothonotary/ Pages/default.aspx] https://www.adamscountypa. gov/departments/prothonotary. Additionally, the Prothonotary may assess postage fees against any moving party who fails to furnish a pre-paid envelope as required by this rule.

Rule 1910.11. Office Conference. Subsequent Proceedings. Order.

(c) Demand for Hearing De Novo. Any party may seek review by the court of the order entered following the office conference by filing a Demand for Hearing De Novo. The "Demand For Hearing De Novo" form shall be used to make such a request. An electronic fill-in version of this form is available on the Adams County Court's self-help website] under the Domestic Relations Services link of the Adams County website at [www.adamscounty. us] https://www.adamscountypa.gov/courts/ domesticrelationssection/documentcenter. All Demands for Hearing De Novo shall be filed at the Domestic Relations Section located at 525 Boyds School Road, Suite 600, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania 17325.

And now, upon consideration of the attached Complaint/ Petition for Modification/Petition for Intervention/or Petition for Contempt, it is hereby ORDERED that the parties and their respective counsel appear before a Custody Conciliation Officer in Conference Room 307 located on the third floor of the Adams County Courthouse, 117 Baltimore Street, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, _, 20 ____at ___.m.

At the conference, an effort will be made to conciliate and resolve the issues in dispute; or if this cannot be accomplished, to define and narrow the issues to be heard by the Court. Children should not attend the conference unless specifically requested by the Custody Conciliation Officer.

IF YOU FAIL TO APPEAR AT THE CUSTODY CON-CILIATION CONFERENCE AS PROVIDED BY THIS ORDER, WITHOUT PROPER CAUSE SHOWN, THE CUSTODY CONCILIATOR SHALL REFER THE MAT-TER TO THE COURT FOR FURTHER PROCEEDINGS, WHICH MAY INCLUDE A CONTEMPT HEARING WHICH CAN RESULT IN THE IMPOSITION OF SANC-TIONS, INCLUDING FINES, ATTORNEYS FEES AND COSTS.

If you have not already done so, you must complete and file with the Prothonotary a Criminal/Abuse History Verification regarding you and all persons living in your household on or before the time of the custody conciliation conference. The form is available on the Court's self-help page at | www.adamscounty.us under the "Courts" https://www.adamscountypa.gov/courts/ link | courtadministration/selfhelpcenter and at the Adams County Law Library.

You must serve a copy of the completed form on all other parties. No party may make a change in the residence of a child which significantly impairs the ability of the other party to exercise custodial rights without first complying with all of the applicable provisions of 23 Pa.C.S. § 5337 and Pa.R.C.P. No. 1915.17 regarding relocation.

If any party to this custody action is incarcerated at any stage of the proceedings, the custody conciliation officer or the judge will make reasonable efforts to arrange for the incarcerated party to participate by telephone or video conference. Incarcerated persons may make a request to appear in this manner through the Court Administrator's Office at 717-337-9846, 117 Baltimore Street, 4th floor, Gettysburg, PA 17325.

If you or any other party needs an interpreter, please contact the Court Administrator's Office at 717-337-9846 as soon as possible. Failure to make a timely request may delay the proceedings.

The modifications to these rules shall become effective after all the provisions of the Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration 103 are met, to include the following:

- a. One copy of this Order shall be forwarded to the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts via e-mail to RulesCommittees@pacourts.us.
- b. Upon notification from the AOPC that the local rule is not inconsistent with State Rules, file two (2) certified copies of this Order together with one (1) electronic copy in a Microsoft Word format to bulletin@palrb.us with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*;

And Now, this 12th day of January, 2023, in accordance with Pa.R.Civ.P. 239 and Pa.R.J.A. 103(d), and inasmuch as (1) Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(4) requires all proposed local rules to "be submitted in writing to the appropriate Rules Committee for review," and provides that the adopting court may "not proceed with the proposed local rule until it receives written notification from the appropriate Rules Committee that the proposed local rule is not inconsistent with any general rule of the Supreme Court," (2) the following local rules were submitted by the Court of Common Pleas of Lackawanna County to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania Civil Procedural Rules Committee for its review and approval, and (3) on January 11, 2023, the Court of Common Pleas of Lackawanna County received written notification from the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania Civil Procedural Rules Committee that the following "local rules are not inconsistent with the Statewide rules and are approved for publication pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(5)", it is hereby *Ordered* and *Decreed* that the following Lackawanna County Rules of Civil Procedure are adopted and amended as follows:

- 1. New Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175 is adopted as reflected in the following Rule 175 which appears in bold type and italics for ease of reference;
- 2. Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 208.3(a), 211(c), 214(e), 214.2(a) and (c), 1028(c), 1034(a), 1035.2(a), and 4000.1(a) are amended as reflected in the following Rules with the amended language appearing in bold type and italics for ease for reference;
- 3. Pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(5) and (6), the following Local Rules shall be disseminated and published in the following manner:
- (a) One (1) copy of the following Local Rules shall be filed with the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts;
- (b) Two (2) paper copies of the following Local Rules shall be distributed to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*;
- (c) The Legislative Reference Bureau shall also be provided with a copy of the following Local Rules on a computer diskette, CD-ROM, or other agreed upon alternative format that complies with the requirements of 1 Pa. Code § 13.11(b);
- (d) A copy of the following Local Rules shall be published on the website of the Court of Common Pleas of Lackawanna County which is maintained by the County of Lackawanna;
- (e) The following Local Rules shall be kept continuously available for public inspection and copying in the Office of the Clerk of Judicial Records, Civil Division, and upon request and payment of reasonable costs of reproduction and mailing, the Clerk of Judicial Records shall furnish any requesting person with a copy of following Local Rules; and

- (f) A copy of the following Local Rules shall be distributed to the Lackawanna Bar Association for publication in the *Lackawanna Jurist* and on the website of the Lackawanna Bar Association.
- 4. The adoption of Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175 and the amendments to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 208.3(a), 211(c), 214(e), 214.2(a) and (c), 1028(c), 1034(a), 1035.2(a), and 4000.1(a) shall become effective thirty (30) days after the date of their publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in compliance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(5)(iii); and
- 5. Pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(6)(iii), the Court of Common Pleas of Lackawanna County shall incorporate the following Local Rules in the complete set of the Lackawanna County Rules of Civil Procedure no later than thirty (30) days following their publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

THE BUSINESS OF THE COURT

Rule 175. Use of Advanced Communication Technology (ACT).

- (a) ACT includes any communication equipment that is used as a link between the court and others in physically separate locations, such as any system providing for two-way simultaneous communication of both video and sound, or telephone or internet-based audio communication in which all parties can hear and be heard.
- (b) Consistent with past practice, the court has the discretion to schedule and conduct certain court proceedings by Advanced Communication Technology ("ACT"), subject to any limitation imposed under the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure, Pennsylvania law, or these rules.
- (c) ACT shall not be used to conduct jury selection, jury trials, final pre-trial conferences, settlement conferences, or any type of proceeding involving the presentation of documentary or testimonial evidence, except as otherwise provided below.
- (d) The court has the discretion to utilize ACT to conduct initial status conferences, scheduling conferences, the presentation of uncontested motions or petitions, oral arguments on contested motions or petitions, or uncontested hearings involving court approval of settlements.
- (e) Any party may request to participate in any proceeding under Rule 175(d) in person or by ACT, and shall state in the request whether each party opposes or concurs with that request. The presiding judge has the discretion to grant or deny the request.
- (f) The court shall provide counsel and self-represented litigants with notice of the date and time of the proceeding and shall furnish them with the log-in or call-in information and access codes for the ACT proceeding.
- (g) The public shall be permitted access to court proceedings conducted via ACT, unless such access is prohibited or limited by statute of rule, or the presiding judge has closed the proceeding to the public in conformity with the applicable law.

PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE GENERALLY

Rule 208.3(a). Motion Procedure.

A party seeking relief from the court by way of motion shall serve all counsel and unrepresented parties with a copy of the motion, together with notice that the motion will be presented to the court on a date certain, at least (3) business days (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays) prior to the date of presentation. Except for discovery motions which are governed by Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 4000, 4000.1, 4012, 4013 and 4019, any motion defined by Pa.R.Civ.P. 208.a shall be presented in Motions Court which shall be held daily by the designated Motions Court judge. Uncontested or stipulated motions or petitions shall be presented for consideration by emailing the motion or petition, together with a proposed Order for execution by the Motions Court judge, to CivilMotion@lackawannacounty.org.

The original uncontested or stipulated motion or petition must be filed by the moving or petitioning party with the Clerk of Judicial Records. Contested or opposed motions or petitions shall be presented in-person to the designated Motions Court judge in the assigned courtroom on Monday through Friday at 9:00 a.m. and by the court en banc on the last Friday of the month at 9:30 a.m. Counsel and pro se litigants who desire to present an opposed or contested motion or petition in Motions Court shall write their names legibly in the motion book maintained for such purposes. Unless otherwise directed by the Motions Court judge, all opposed or contested motions or petitions shall be heard in order in which the names appear in the motion book. Motion court involving domestic relations and orphans' court matters shall be held by judges assigned to the family court division and the orphans' court division. [at the times and on the days designated by the Court Administrator]. Whenever practicable, emergency motions shall likewise by presented in Motion Court pursuant to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 208.3(a). In the event that an emergency motion cannot be presented in Motion Court, the party or counsel presenting an emergency motion shall submit the motion to the Court Administrator who will assign the emergency motion to an available judge under Pa.R.Civ.P. 249 for disposition. The Motions Court judge may dispose of the motion at the time of initial consideration or may defer any ruling and, in the interim, either (i) set forth procedures for disposition of the motion pursuant to Pa.R.Civ.P. 208(4)(a)(2) or (b)(1), or (ii) direct the parties to proceed under Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 211.

* * * *

Rule 211. Disposition of Motions and Petitions.

- (a) To assign a motion or petition to a judge for disposition or to schedule a motion or petition for argument where a rule returnable does not set a schedule, a party shall file with the Clerk of Judicial Records and the Court Administrator a praecipe for assignment. See Appendix, Form 2.
- (b) Prior to filing a praecipe of assignment, the moving or petitioning party shall contact counsel for all other parties of record to determine whether an opposing party or lawyer wishes to present oral argument. The moving or petitioning party shall indicate on the praecipe for assignment whether the matter is being submitted on briefs and without the necessity of oral argument or is to be scheduled for argument by the Court Administrator. No praecipe for assignment will be accepted by the Clerk of Judicial Records or the Court Administrator unless the

moving or petition party has indicated in writing whether the matter is to be submitted on briefs or scheduled for oral argument.

- (c) The Court Administrator shall assign motions and petitions to the judges of the court on a rotating basis and shall establish a briefing schedule for the parties. The notice of assignment shall state whether the oral argument will be conducted in person or by ACT pursuant to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175(c). No oral argument will be transcribed by a court reporter unless a party or counsel specifically requests such transcription at least one week prior to the schedule argument by contacting the Chief Court Reporter in writing in order to make advance arrangements for the physical or remote presence of an assigned court reporter to transcribe the oral argument.
- (d) The original of a party's brief shall be filed with the Clerk of Judicial Records and copies shall be provided to the assigned judge and all opposing counsel in accordance with the schedule set by the Court Administrator.
- (e) If the moving or petitioning party fails to timely file and serve a brief, or fails to appear at oral argument, if requested, the matter may be dismissed by the court as of course. The judge to whom supplemental briefing by the parties.
- (f) If any party other than the moving or petitioning party fails to timely file and serve a brief, that party may be deemed not to oppose the motion or petition and may not be allowed to present oral argument.
- (g) No case listed for argument will be continued except for good cause shown to the satisfaction of the court.

Rule 214. Listing Cases for Hearing or Trial.

- (a) The Court Administrator shall assign a case for hearing or trial upon the filing of a Certificate of Readiness in the form attached to the Appendix of these Local Rules as Form 7. The Certificate of Readiness should identify the judge who has decided any case dispositive motions under Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 1028, 1034, or 1035.2 and whenever practicable, the Court Administrator shall assign the case for hearing or trial to the judge who has decided that case dispositive motion.
- (b) No Certificate of Readiness may be filed until all discovery in the case has been completed and all depositions for use at trial have been scheduled or completed, nor may a Certificate of Readiness be filed if any case dispositive motion is pending for disposition by the court. The filing of a Certificate of Readiness shall constitute a verification that no case dispositive motions are pending nor does any party or attorney contemplate filing such a case dispositive motion.
- (c) No Party or lawyer may file more than one Certificate of Readiness on any single day.
- (d) At least fifteen (15) days prior to the filing of a Certificate of Readiness, the party or lawyer seeking to certify the case for trial must advise all counsel of record and self-represented parties of the intention to file a Certificate of Readiness. If no counsel or party objects to the filing of a Certificate of Readiness within that fifteen (15) day period, the Certificate of Readiness may be filed as provided by paragraphs (b) and (c) above. In the event that an attorney or party objects to the filing of a Certificate of Readiness and the attorney or party seeking to certify the case for trial believes that the objection is

frivolous or being asserted for an improper purpose such as to unnecessarily delay the disposition of the litigation, the attorney or party seeking to certify the case for trial shall present a motion to the Motion Court judge pursuant to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 208(a) requesting leave of court to file a Certificate of Readiness over the objection of the opposing party or counsel.

(e) Upon the filing of a Certificate of Readiness, the Court Administrator shall promptly schedule a status conference before the assigned judge and forward notice of the conference to all counsel and unrepresented parties. The assigned judge shall determine, and the notice shall state, whether the status conference will be conducted in person or by ACT pursuant to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175(c). During the status conference, the assigned judge will schedule dates certain for trial and the final pre-trial conference.

* * * *

Rule 214.2. Assignment of Medical Professional Liability Actions and Protracted Cases.

- (a) Following the filing of a Complaint by the plaintiff pursuant to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1042.2 and the entry of appearance by the defendant(s) or defense counsel pursuant to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1012(a) or Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 200.1(a) in all medical professional liability actions subject to the reporting requirements set forth in Pa.R.Civ.P. 1042.51(c), the Court Administrator shall assign the case to the judges of the court on a rotating basis and shall promptly schedule a status conference before that judge and forward notice of the conference to all counsel and unrepresented parties. The notice shall state whether the status conference will be conducted in person or by ACT pursuant to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175(c). During the status conference, the assigned judge will establish deadlines for the completion of discovery, the exchange of expert witness reports and the filing of case dispositive motion, and schedule dates certain for trial and the final pre-trial conference. All preliminary objections, motions for judgment on the pleadings, motions for summary judgment, and other case dispositive motions, discovery motions, and other pre-trial motions will be addressed to, served upon and decided by the assigned judge.
- (b) Any other case that will require at least eight (8) days of total trial time, including jury selection, may be designed as a protracted case and assigned to a judge of the court on a rotating basis for pre-trial and trial purposes. A case may be designed as a protracted case upon the filing of a Certification of Protracted Case Designation, subject to the provisions of Pa.R.Civ.P. 1023.1 and 1023.4 with the concurrence of all counsel of record and unrepresented parties in the form attached to the Appendix of these Local Rules as Form 7A. In the event that all counsel and unrepresented parties do not concur with the designation of a case as a protracted case, the party seeking such designation may present a motion to the Motions Court Judge pursuant to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 208.3(a) requesting the designation of the case as a protracted case. The motion requesting designation as a protracted case must set forth with specificity, and subject to Pa.R.Civ.P. 1023.1 to 1023.4, the reason(s) why the case warrants designation as a protracted case.
- (c) A Certification for Protracted Case Designation (Form 7A) or a motion requesting the designation of a case as a protracted case may be filed following the filing of a complaint by the plaintiff and entry of appearance by all defense counsel and unrepresented parties pursuant to

Pa.R.Civ.P. 1012(a) and Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 200.1(a). Once a Certification for Protracted Case Designation or an Order of the Court designating a case as a protracted case has been filed, the Court Administrator shall assign the case for a judge of the court on a rotating basis and shall promptly schedule a status conference before the assigned judge and forward notice of that conference to all counsel of record and unrepresented parties. The notice shall state whether the status conference will be conducted in person or by ACT pursuant to Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175(c). During the status conference, the assigned judge will establish deadlines for the completion of discovery, the exchange of expert witness reports and the filing of a case dispositive motions, and schedule dates certain for trial and the final pre-trial conference. After a case has been designated as a protracted case and assigned to a judge, all case dispositive motions, discovery motions, and other pre-trial motions in a protracted case will be addressed to, served upon and decided by the assigned judge.

Rule 1028(c). Preliminary Objections.

A party filing preliminary objections shall file the original preliminary objections with the Clerk of Judicial Records and shall deliver a copy of the same to the Court Administrator together with a praecipe for assignment in accordance with Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 211. The party filing a praecipe for assignment shall comply with the requirements of Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 211(b) prior to filing the praecipe for assignment. The filing of briefs, assignment of preliminary objections, and scheduling of oral argument, if necessary, shall be governed by Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175(c) and 211(c)—(g).

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Rule 1034. Motion for Judgment on the Pleadings.

(a) A party filing a motion for judgment on the pleadings shall file the original motion for judgment on the pleadings with the Clerk of Judicial Records and shall deliver a copy of the same to the Court Administrator together with the praecipe for assignment in accordance with Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 211. The party filing a praecipe for assignment shall comply with the requirements of Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 211(b) prior to filing the praecipe for assignment. The filing of briefs, assignment of motion for judgment on the pleadings, and scheduling of oral argument, if necessary, shall be governed by Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175(c) and 211 (c)—(g).

* * * *

Rule 1035.2. Motion for Summary Judgment.

(a) A party filing a motion for summary judgment shall file the original motion for summary judgment with the Clerk of Judicial Records and shall deliver a copy of the same to the Court Administrator together with a praecipe for assignment in accordance with Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 211. The party filing a praecipe for assignment shall comply with the requirements of Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 211(b) prior to filing the praecipe for assignment. The filing of briefs, assignment of motion for summary judgment and scheduling of oral argument, if necessary, shall be governed by Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 175(c) and 211(c)—(g).

* * * *

Rule 4000.1. Discovery Motion Court.

(a) Except for medical professional liability actions and protracted cases governed by Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 214.2, all discovery motions shall be presented to the Discovery

Motions Court judge. Uncontested or stipulated discovery motions or petitions shall be presented for consideration by emailing the motion or petition, together with a proposed Order for execution by the Discovery Motions Court judge, to Discovery Motion@lackawannacounty.org. The original uncontested or stipulated discovery motion or petition must be filed by the moving or petitioning party with the Clerk of Judicial Records. Contested or opposed discovery motions or petitions shall be presented in-person to the Discovery Motions Court judge who shall hear motions in the Lackawanna County Courthouse on Monday and Thursday at 9:30 AM in the courtroom designated by the Court Administrator, unless otherwise agreed by counsel or the Discovery Motions Court judge or by order of the Discovery Motions Court judge.

(b) In the event that the Discovery Motions Court Judge is unavailable on Monday or Thursday at 9:30 AM, and unless otherwise agreed by counsel for the Discovery Motions Court judge, discovery motions shall be presented to the Motions Court judge in compliance with Lacka.Co.R.C.P. 208.3(a).

Compulsory Arbitration

Rule 1301. Scope.

- 1. Types of Cases for Compulsory Arbitration—All civil cases where the amount in controversy (exclusive of interest and costs) is Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars or less shall first be submitted to a Board of Arbitrators, except those cases involving title to real estate, equity cases, mandamus, quo warranto, and mortgage foreclosure, in accordance with 42 Pa.C.S. § 7361.
- 2. Amount in Controversy—The amount in controversy shall be determined from the pleadings or by agreement of counsel.
- 3. Cases on a Trial List—The Court may of its own motion, or upon the motion of any party, strike from the trial list and certify for arbitration any case which should have been submitted for Compulsory Arbitration in the first instance.
- 4. Timing of Arbitration—No case shall be scheduled for arbitration until
- a. the expiration of 30 days from the most recent service either of (a) the complaint upon an original or an additional defendant; or (b) a counterclaim upon the plaintiff; AND

Form—Praecipe for Arbitration

b. unless counsel for the moving party certifies at the time of filing the Praecipe for arbitration that:

- i. All preliminary objections have been finally determined;
- ii. Counsel for the moving party has completed all discovery and knows of no pending discovery on the part of opposing counsel which will delay hearing;
- iii. The moving party and witnesses are available and ready to proceed to hearing.
- 5. Form—A case shall be listed for arbitration when a party files a Praecipe for Arbitration on the form attached to this rule.
- 6. Notice—Notice of the date, time and place of arbitration shall be provided to counsel for the parties via electronic mail or, if unrepresented, to the party directly via certified and regular mail by the Court Administrator, or her/his designee, and shall include the following provision pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 1303(a)(2):

"This matter will be heard by a board of arbitrators at the time, date and place specified but, if one or more of the parties is not present at the hearing, the matter may be heard at the same time and date before a judge of the Court without the absent party or parties. There is no right to a trial de novo on appeal from a decision entered by a judge."





DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION

Public Hearing and Business Meeting

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold a public hearing on Wednesday, February 8, 2023. A business meeting will be held the following month on Wednesday, March 8, 2023. Both the hearing and the business meeting are open to the public and both will be conducted remotely. Details about the remote platforms for the two events will be posted on the Commission's web site at www.drbc.gov, at least 10 days prior to the respective meeting dates.

Public hearing. The Commission will conduct the public hearing virtually on February 8, 2023, beginning at 1:30 p.m. Hearing items will include draft dockets for withdrawals, discharges and other projects that could have a substantial effect on the basin's water resources. A list of the projects scheduled for hearing, including project descriptions, will be posted on the Commission's web site at www.drbc.gov, in a long form of this notice at least 10 days before the hearing date.

Written comments on matters scheduled for hearing on February 8, 2023, will be accepted through 5 p.m. on Monday, February 13, 2023.

The public is advised to check the Commission's web site periodically during the 10 days prior to the hearing date, as items scheduled for hearing may be postponed if additional time is needed to complete the Commission's review. Items also may be added up to 10 days prior to the hearing date. In reviewing docket descriptions, the public is asked to be aware that the details of projects may change during the Commission's review, which is ongoing.

Public meeting. The public business meeting on March 8, 2023, will begin at 10:30 a.m. and will include: adoption of the minutes of the Commission's December 7, 2022, business meeting; announcements of upcoming meetings and events; a report on hydrologic conditions; reports by the Executive Director and the Commission's General Counsel; and consideration of any items for which a hearing has been completed or is not required. The agenda is expected to include consideration of the draft dockets for withdrawals, discharges and other projects that were subjects of the public hearing on February 8, 2023.

After all scheduled business has been completed and as time allows, the business meeting will be followed by up to 1 hour of open public comment, an opportunity to address the Commission on any topic concerning management of the Delaware River Basin's water resources outside the context of a duly noticed, on-the-record public hearing.

There will be no opportunity for additional public comment for the record at the March 8, 2023, business meeting on items for which a hearing was completed on February 8, 2023, or a previous date. Commission consideration on March 8, 2023, of items for which the public

hearing is closed may result in approval of the item (by docket or resolution) as proposed, approval with changes, denial or deferral. When the Commissioners defer an action, they may announce an additional period for written comment on the item, with or without an additional hearing date, or they may take additional time to consider the input they have already received without requesting further public input. Deferred items will be considered for action at a public meeting of the Commission on a future date.

Agricultural Hemp Promotion, Education and Export Promotion Matching Grant Program; 2022-2023 Application Period

The Department of Agriculture (Department) announces the program requirements and application period

for grants under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Hemp Promotion, Education and Export Promotion Matching Grant Program (Program). The Program is authorized under Fiscal Years (FY) 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 budgetary appropriations to the Department for agricultural product promotion, education and exports for hemp. The Department intends to make up to \$392,000 available for grants under the Program.

1. Program objectives.

- (a) *Purpose.* The Department will award grants to provide matching funds to nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations to reimburse up to 50% of the cost of projects intended to:
- (1) Increase consumer awareness of agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth and thereby increase sales of these agricultural hemp products.
- (2) Educate producers and consumers with respect to agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (3) Otherwise facilitate the growth and development of export markets for agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (b) Applicants. Grants will be awarded to Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations.
- (c) FY 2022-2023 project funding priorities. The Department will prioritize eligible projects for promotion, education and export market development of agricultural hemp within this Commonwealth to receive grant funding.
- (d) Competitive program. The Program is competitive. Grant requests and related documentation will be reviewed by the Secretary, who will approve or reject each grant request.
- (e) Funds available basis. Grants will not be awarded unless funds are available for this purpose. The Department need not expend all the funds that are available for the Program.
- 2. *Definitions*. The following words and terms have the following meanings:

Applicant—A Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization which applies for grant moneys under the Program.

Bureau —The Bureau of Market Development of the Department.

Eligible hemp products—An agricultural or industrial hemp product that is legal to grow, process and sell within this Commonwealth which has a major component/ingredient derived from the hemp plant.

Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization—A nonprofit business organization having its principal business offices within this Commonwealth, or having 50% or more of its membership within this Commonwealth, or having 50% or more of the agricultural products which it promotes or markets produced within this Commonwealth, and having as its members groups, individuals or organizations that serve to distribute a Commonwealth agricultural product in commerce. These members may include wholesalers, distributors, brokers, retailers, processors, growers and producers.

Secretary—The Secretary of the Department.

3. Limitations on grants. The minimum amount of a matching grant is \$1,000. A matching grant is a reim-

bursement grant, meaning no payment of grant funds will be made by the Department until the subject project is completed and the applicant documents the completion of the project to the Department in accordance with this notice.

- 4. Uses of matching grant moneys.
- (a) Conformity to application. Matching grant moneys awarded to an applicant shall be expended solely to reimburse up to 50% of the cost of the specific project described in the grant application.
- (b) Allowable expenditures of grant moneys. Grant moneys shall be used for one or more of the following purposes described in the grant application:
- (1) To pay the cost of the specific project described in the grant application.
- (2) To pay the cost of a portion of a Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization's contribution to a National or regional agricultural product promotion and marketing project.
- (3) To pay the cost of programs conducted by an applicant to educate producers and consumers with respect to agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (4) To pay the cost of other activities consistent with the Secretary of Agriculture's authority under section 1704 of The Administrative Code of 1929, as amended (71 P.S. § 444).
- (c) Prohibited expenditure of grant moneys. Grant moneys may not be used to defray the costs of employing temporary or permanent personnel.

5. Applications.

- (a) Application required. Interested Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations shall submit grant applications to the Department. An application shall include a detailed work plan and project budget.
- (b) Project beginning and completion dates. An application shall designate July 1, 2022, or a later date, as the project start date and June 30, 2023, or earlier, as the project completion date. Program grant funds will not be awarded or paid for project activities that occur before the stated project start date or beyond the stated project completion date.
- (c) Electronic applications only. Interested applicants must submit a complete electronic project proposal and grant application using the Department's Electronic Single Application web site at https://www.esa.dced.state.pa.us/login.aspx?var=5.
- (d) Application window. Applications shall be submitted by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, February 28, 2023.
- (e) Additional documentation. The Secretary may require that an applicant submit additional documentation to complete or verify an application. The additional documentation may include a letter, affidavit or other documentation:
- (1) Verifying that an applicant is a Pennsylvania non-profit agricultural product promotion and marketing organization.
- (2) Verifying the activities and location of offices of an applicant.

- (3) Confirming that the applicant for a matching grant has secured funds in an amount at least equal to the matching grant amount sought for the project.
 - 6. Review of application.
- (a) Transmittal of application to Bureau. When the Bureau receives a complete and accurate grant application, it will forward this application, together with supporting documentation submitted therewith, to the Secretary for review. The Bureau may also forward a recommendation as to whether the application should be approved or rejected, whether the grant should be in an amount less than requested and whether special restrictions or limitations should be placed on the grant.
- (b) *Factors*. The Secretary will review and evaluate the application and supporting documentation and may consider the following factors, among others, in deciding whether to approve or reject the grant request:
- (1) The relevance of the project to the promotion or marketing of agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth.
- (2) The innovativeness of the project described in the application.
- (3) The scope of the project and the number of people who will be exposed to or affected by the project described in the application.
- (4) The impact which the project will have upon the promotion and sales of the agricultural hemp products within this Commonwealth to which the project is targeted.
- (5) The availability of full funding for the project from the applicant or from any source other than the grant Program.
- (6) The apparent ability of the applicant to complete the project as described in the application or, in the case of a grant to fund a National or regional agricultural product promotion or marketing project, the apparent ability of the entity with primary responsibility for the project to complete it.
- (7) The overall performance of the project if the project had received funding through any other grant program administered by the Department in a previous fiscal year.
- (8) Projects that are joint efforts between two or more Pennsylvania nonprofit agricultural product promotion and marketing organizations may be given preference over projects involving only one organization.
- (9) Projects where reference to the Department as a source of funding can practicably be made in promotional materials or broadcasts, and that would make such a reference, may be given preference over projects that would not make such a reference.
- (10) Whether the project has been assigned priority for funding in FY 2022-2023, as previously described in paragraph No. 1(c).
- (c) *Decisions*. The Secretary may approve a grant in an amount less than that requested in the grant application. In addition, the Secretary may impose restrictions or special conditions upon the issuance of a grant. The Secretary will review all recommendations of the Bureau but will have final authority to accept or reject these recommendations.

7. Notice of disposition of application.

The Department will e-mail notice of the acceptance or rejection of a grant application by Friday, March 10, 2023. This notice will be by e-mail to the address provided by the applicant in the grant application.

8. Grant agreement.

After the Secretary approves a grant application, and as a precondition to the Department's release of grant moneys to a successful applicant, the Department and the applicant will execute a written or electronic grant agreement which describes the terms and conditions subject to which the grant is made. The grant agreement shall contain and conform to the requirements of this notice and shall also contain special terms and conditions as required by the Secretary.

- 9. Verification of project completion.
- (a) *General*. Within 30 days of completion of the subject project, the applicant shall provide the Department with proof of the completion of the project and eligibility to receive reimbursement grant funds from the Department.
- (b) Required documentation. The proof described in subsection (a) shall consist of:
- (1) Copies of invoices for goods or services directly related to the project, confirming that the total billed amount is at least twice the amount of the grant, along with the written certification of the president or treasurer of the applicant that the goods or services that are the subject of the invoices have been delivered or provided to the applicant.
- (2) A certificate of completion, signed by its president or treasurer, verifying completion of the subject project and stating that the grant funds will reimburse the applicant for a portion of the costs incurred by the applicant in completing the subject project.
- 10. Delivery of grant funds by the Department. The Department will pay the grant amount to the applicant in a single payment within 45 days of receiving the proof of completion previously described in paragraph No. 9.

Order

This Order establishes a variance from the requirement that an owner or lessee of "hayride attractions" comply with specific provisions of the Amusement Ride Inspection Act (4 P.S. §§ 401—418) ("Act") and its attendant regulations (7 Pa. Code Chapter 139). The current order supplants and supersedes all prior orders issued by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture regarding this variance

Background

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture ("Department") has lawful authority to issue a variance with respect to any rule, regulation or standard prescribed by the Act and its attendant regulations. This authority is imparted at Sections 4(4) and 9 of the Act (4 P.S. §§ 404(4) and 409) and referenced in the regulation at 7 Pa. Code § 139.12 (relating to variances).

A variance may be issued: 1) to prevent undue hardship; or 2) where existing conditions prevent practical compliance and the safety of the public can be reasonably assured.

ASTM International, the organization formerly known as the American Society for Testing and Materials, develops and publishes technical standards for a wide variety of industries with the goal of enhancing performance and safety. The Department adopts the standards developed by ASTM International's committee on amusement rides and devices ("F24 Committee") as its regulatory standards with respect to amusement rides and attractions that operate in this Commonwealth. On November 1, 2019, the F24 Committee published a new standard for hayrides, designated as F3168-19, Standard Practice for Hayride Attractions ("Practice F3168-19").

The Department regulates amusement rides and attractions under strict safety standards for design, construction, maintenance, operation and inspection. Prior to the adoption of Practice F3168-19, there were no industry standards that recognized or addressed the safe operation of hayrides as an amusement ride or attraction. The F24 Committee developed the guidelines in Practice F3168-19 to provide a level of conformity to reduce potential hazards to patrons, attendants, actors and spectators. In addition, the standard was specifically designed to be inclusive of hayride attractions used primarily for entertainment, recreation and/or agritourism purposes.

Historically, hayride attractions have been difficult to vet through the Department's existing registration and approval process because the wagon/trailer and the tow vehicle of a hayride are not designed or built with the specific intent to be used as an amusement ride. The nature of this type of ride—farm equipment being used as a hayride-creates an undue hardship on owners and operators with certain requirements of the Act and its attendant regulations. For example, the regulation at 7 Pa. Code § 139.4 (relating to registration) requires the owner of an amusement ride to provide the Department written verification under seal of a professional engineer that the ride conforms with the applicable design, load and safety requirements of the Act, its attendant regulations, and the ASTM International F24 Committee Standards. The Department recognizes that many of these regulatory requirements are not appropriate or applicable to owners and operators that use farm equipment, e.g., a wagon/trailer and tow vehicle, for both agriculture purposes and as a hayride attraction.

The Chairman of the ASTM International Hayride Standard Committee has requested this variance on behalf of Pennsylvania hayride owners in accordance with the Act. It is the belief of this office that a limited variance is appropriate with respect to the approval, registration and inspection of hayride attractions, and that the variance will not adversely affect the health or safety of the public.

In summary, the variance will allow an owner to register a hayride attraction without providing written verification from a registered professional engineer that the hayride complies with the requirements of the Act and its attendant regulations. Hayride owners shall comply with all other requirements under 7 Pa. Code § 139.4 and the terms of this variance for registration and approval of the wagon/trailer and tow vehicle.

Variance

For purposes of this Order, the definitions set forth in the Act and its attendant regulations apply. In addition, the following defined terms apply:

Agritourism—the act of conducting an activity for the enjoyment of the public that is related in some way to agriculture.

Hayride Attraction—an experience in which passengers board a wagon or trailer, typically a wagon filled with straw or hay, and are taken on a journey for the purpose of giving its passengers amusement, pleasure, thrills or excitement. The term does not include:

- 1. A hayride attraction designed specifically for home use, devices or attractions commonly referred to as barrel trains, or animal or human drawn wagons or trailers; or
- 2. A tow vehicle pulling a wagon or trailer for the purpose of transporting passengers to and from locations for convenience, ease of access or for safety, such as transporting passengers from parking areas and transporting passengers over long or difficult terrain.

Tow Vehicle—a vehicle used to pull a wagon or trailer that is conveying patrons to, through or from an attraction or over a pathway or trail.

Hayride Attraction Owner/Operator—A person that:

- 1. Owns or operates a hayride attraction that uses a tow vehicle to pull a wagon or trailer as an element or in combination with another amusement ride or attraction, corn maze, zombie walk, paintball game, tree harvesting farm, seasonal attraction, haunted house, haunted attraction, fair, exposition or agritourism event;
- 2. Has submitted the hayride attraction for approval and registration in accordance with the regulation at 7 Pa. Code § 139.4 (relating to registration), except as otherwise provided in this variance;
- 3. Has inspected the hayride attraction prior to it being open to the public and again within 30 days of each period of continued use and has submitted an inspection affidavit to the Department in accordance with the requirements of the regulation at 7 Pa. Code § 139.8 (relating to inspection affidavits);
- 4. Has complied with the design, operation, maintenance, inspection and testing standards for hayride attractions in accordance with Practice F3168-19 or any successor standard and the Department's hayride approval checklist form;
- 5. Has complied with all other requirements in the Act and the regulations at 7 Pa. Code Chapter 139 for owners, lessees and operators of amusement rides and attractions in this Commonwealth; and
- 6. Has otherwise complied with the terms of this variance.

A variance is hereby issued under authority of the Act. The limited terms of this variance are as follows:

1. Although a hayride attraction is an amusement ride for the purposes of the Act and its attendant regulations,

the owner of a hayride shall be exempt from the requirements specified in 7 Pa. Code § 139.4(d)(7)(ii). The effect of this provision is to remove the requirement to submit written verification from a professional engineer with respect to the registration of a hayride attraction.

- 2. Prior to operation, the owner of a hayride attraction shall obtain Department approval of the wagon/trailer and tow vehicle by verifying compliance with the design, operation, maintenance, inspection and testing standards in accordance with Practice F3168-19 or any successor standard and the Department's hayride approval checklist form (collectively the "hayride attraction submission"). Each approval will be granted on an annual basis and site specific.
- 3. The hayride attraction submission shall include the following:
- i. a copy of the operator's manual for the submitted attraction that identifies the mechanical, hydraulic, electronic and electrical systems of the attraction, including how the attraction is powered;
- ii. a copy of the owner's manual for the submitted attraction (if different than the operator's manual);
- iii. a detailed inspection checklist outlining areas and frequency on how the attraction is to be inspected;
- iv. photographs fully depicting the attraction, including an overall photo and a clear photo of the manufacturer's ID plate;
 - v. an owner's registration form;
- vi. an amusement ride or attraction registration application form; and

- vii. a hayride attraction approval checklist form.
- 4. The Department will provide the forms referenced in this variance upon request and make the forms available through the Department's website at www.agriculture. pa.gov.
- 5. A person or business registering a hayride attraction may email the submission to RA-amusementrides@pa.gov or send by mail to:

- 6. Except as otherwise provided in this variance, a person or business that owns, operates or leases a hayride attraction is required to comply with all registration, insurance and inspection requirements in the Act and its attendant regulations.
- 7. Inquiries regarding the registration and approval of hayride attractions may be directed to the Department's Bureau of Ride and Measurement Standards by email or phone at (717) 787-2291.
- 8. The Department will continuously monitor the efficacy of this variance and may revise or rescind this variance as it deems necessary.
 - 9. This Order shall be effective immediately.

- A proposed hierarchy of stormwater management objectives.
- Additional detailed information on the performance of the stormwater analysis that is required for PCSM at 25 Pa. Code § 102.8(g), including the addition of new methodologies for the analysis of volume, water quality and rate management.
 - Proposed criteria for the protection of wetlands.
- New best management practices—which are referred to in the draft Pennsylvania PCSM Manual as stormwater control measures (SCM)—including, but not limited to, managed release concept SCMs.
- New incentives for the protection of natural open spaces and natural stormwater features.
- New methods for the completion of the predevelopment site characterization required by the regulations, including infiltration testing.
- Introduction of methods for adjusting precipitation depths for stormwater analysis based on the known effects of climate change.
- New guidance regarding: antidegradation requirements; the determination of discharge points and points of analysis; analyses of stream stability and erosion potential; off-site stormwater management; the evaluation of thermal impacts; and the assessment of projects located in areas of karst geology.

This notice is published under section 306(d)(14) of the Federal Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972 (CZMA) (16 U.S.C.A. § 1455(d)(14)), relating to public participation in consistency determinations. The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) Coastal Resources Management Program has received notice that the United States Army Corps of Engineers Philadelphia District (applicant) is proposing the 2023 Maintenance Dredging of the Delaware River Federal Navigation Channel (Project).

The Applicant's proposed Fiscal Year 2023 Maintenance Dredging of the Federally Authorized Navigation Channels in the Delaware River includes the following activities:

- In the Philadelphia to Sea channel; hydraulic cutterhead, hopper or mechanical bucket dredging of approximately 300,000 cubic yards of predominately silt material in the Fort Mifflin Facility boat docking area and adjacent Fort Mifflin Range, utilizing a contractor yet to be determined, with upland placement of the dredged material into the Fort Mifflin Federally owned confined disposal facility (CDF). This dredging is scheduled to be conducted during the spring or fall of 2023.
- In the Philadelphia to Trenton channel; hydraulic hopper or mechanical bucket dredging of approximately 500,000 cubic yards of primarily sand material and some silt between River Miles 106 (station 18+000) and 127 (station 124+700) to include the Fairless Turning Basin with upland confined disposal at one or more of the following CDFs: Palmyra Cove and Cinnaminson in New Jersey, and Fort Mifflin, Money Island and Biles Island in Pennsylvania. This dredging is scheduled to be conducted by a contractor, yet to be determined, in July 2023—March 2024.

Dredging of the existing Federal navigation channel is proposed to not exceed depths than previously dredged with upland placement of the dredged material into CDFs. historic properties or other coastal uses. The Philadelphia to Trenton project may include approximately between 50,000 and 100,000 cubic yards of sand placement along the Palmyra Cove Nature Park Delaware River shoreline if coordination with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and the Burlington County Bridge Commission can be completed. This shoreline restoration would utilize dredged materials composed of a minimum of 90% sand and like upland placement, is not anticipated to result in any negative direct or indirect effects on public access, recreation, historic properties or other coastal uses.

This Project is subject to Department review for Federal consistency because it is a Federal agency activity and will have reasonably foreseeable effects on this Commonwealth's coastal resources or uses.

In accordance with section 307 of the CZMA (16 U.S.C.A. § 1456) and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) regulations at 15 CFR Part 930, Subpart C (relating to consistency for Federal agency activities), the applicant has determined that the proposed activity will be conducted in a manner consistent with the applicable enforceable policies of the Commonwealth's NOAA-approved Coastal Resources Management Program. Nursing Facility Assessment Program for Fiscal Year 2022-2023

The Department of Human Services (Department) is providing final notice of the assessment amount, the assessment methodology and the estimated aggregate impact on nursing facilities that will be subject to the assessment under the Nursing Facility Assessment Program (Assessment Program) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023.

Background

Article VIII-A of the Human Services Code (code) (62 P.S. §§ 801-A—815-A) authorizes the Department to impose an annual monetary assessment on nonpublic and county nursing facilities in this Commonwealth. See 62 P.S. §§ 803-A and 815-A.

Under Article VIII-A of the code, the Department may impose the assessment only to the extent that the assessment revenues qualify as the State share of Medical Assistance (MA) Program expenditures eligible for Federal financial participation (FFP). To ensure receipt of FFP, Article VIII-A of the code requires the Department to seek a waiver from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), if necessary, to implement the Assessment Program. See 62 P.S. § 812-A. CMS approved the Department's waiver request on December 7, 2022.

For each fiscal year that the Assessment Program is implemented, the Secretary of the Department (Secretary) determines the aggregate amount of the assessment and the annual assessment rates in consultation with the Secretary of the Budget. See 62 P.S. § 804-A. The annual assessment rates must be sufficient to generate at least \$50 million in additional revenue, but not more than the maximum aggregate assessment amount that qualifies for FFP. See 62 P.S. § 804-A.

Before imposing an annual assessment for a fiscal year, the Secretary must publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The notice must specify the amount of the assessment being proposed, explain the proposed assessment methodology, identify the estimated assessment amount and aggregate impact on nursing facilities subject to the assessment and provide interested persons a 30-day period to comment. See 62 P.S. § 805-A.

After consideration of any comments received during the 30-day comment period, the Secretary must publish a second notice announcing the rate of assessment for the fiscal year. See 62 P.S. § 805-A. The annual aggregate assessment amount and assessment rate for the fiscal year must be approved by the Governor. See 62 P.S. § 804-A.

The Secretary published a notice at 52 Pa.B. 6120 (September 24, 2022) announcing the proposed assessment rates, the aggregate amount and the impact for FY 2022-2023. No comments were received by the Department in response to the proposed rates notice.

Assessment Methodology and Rates

The following nursing facilities will continue to be exempt from the Assessment Program in FY 2022-2023:

- (1) State-owned and operated nursing facilities.
- (2) Veteran's Administration nursing facilities.
- (3) Nursing facilities that provide nursing facility services free of charge to all residents.
- (4) Nursing facilities that have not been licensed and operated by either the current or a previous owner for the full calendar quarter prior to the calendar quarter for which an assessment is collected.

For FY 2022-2023, the Department will continue to assess nonexempt nursing facilities at two rates. An assessment rate of \$9.32, which represents an increase of \$3.76 from last year's rate, will apply to the following five categories of nursing facilities:

- County nursing facilities.
- Nursing facilities that have 44 or fewer licensed
- Certain continuing care retirement community (CCRC) nursing facilities (see 40 Pa.B. 7297 (December 18, 2010)).
- Nursing facilities with an MA occupancy rate of at least 94% based on Calendar Year (CY) 2021 resident

days as of July 19, 2022. For the purpose of qualifying for the lower assessment rate, a nursing facility's MA occupancy rate will be calculated as follows: MA Occupancy Rate = Sum of Total PA MA Days from the CY 2021 resident days data ÷ Sum of Total Resident Days from the CY 2021 resident days data, rounded to two decimals (nearest whole percent).

• Nursing facilities with at least 90,000 MA days and with an overall occupancy rate of 77% or higher based on the CY 2021 resident days as of July 19, 2022. For the purpose of qualifying for the lower assessment rate, a nursing facility's overall occupancy rate will be calculated as follows: Overall Occupancy Rate = Sum of Total Resident Days from CY 2021 resident days as of July 19, 2022 ÷ (number of licensed beds as of February 10, 2022 × number of days in the fiscal year), rounded to two decimals (nearest whole percent). The overall occupancy rate calculation will use 365 days in a fiscal year unless the state fiscal year includes an additional day due to leap year in which case the number of days in the fiscal year will be 366.

For all other nonexempt facilities, including nursing facilities that began participation in a CCRC on or after July 1, 2010, an assessment rate of \$33.41, which represents an increase of \$3.76 from last year's rate, will apply. Aggregate Assessment Amounts and Fiscal Impact

The Department estimates that the annual aggregate assessment fees for nonexempt nursing facilities will total \$446.312 million. The Department will use the State revenue derived from the assessment fees and any associated FFP to support payments to qualified MA nursing facility providers in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs Regulation # 16A-66 (IRRC # 3361)

Consideration of Criminal Convictions January 18, 2023

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the November 19, 2022 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the RRA (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Legislative intent; Clarity; Reasonableness.

Act 53 of 2020 (Act 53) (63 Pa.C.S. §§ 3112—3118) set forth a new paradigm for the Bureau's various professional and occupational licensing boards and commissions in considering the impact of criminal convictions on a board or commission's decision whether to refuse to issue or renew, suspend, revoke, or otherwise limit a license, certificate, registration, or permit. This proposed regulation is the Bureau's enactment of the provisions and requirements of Act 53. The Bureau states,

This proposed rulemaking is intended to provide transparency to applicants with criminal histories relating to the types of crimes that may be an impediment to licensure and the factors that the boards and commissions will consider in determining whether an applicant with a criminal conviction may be granted a license. This proposed rulemaking accomplishes these ends by promulgating schedules of

criminal convictions that may constitute grounds to refuse to issue, suspend or revoke a license, certificate, registration or permit for each of the 29 professional and occupational licensing boards/commissions as required under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3117. As required under 63 Pa.C.S. § 3117, the Acting Commissioner [of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Commissioner)] consulted with each of the professional and occupational licensing boards, as well as representatives of the business community with knowledge of the respective professions and occupations in developing these schedules.

In determining whether a proposed, final-form, final-omitted, or existing regulation is in the public interest, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) shall, first and foremost, determine whether the agency has the statutory authority to promulgate the regulation and whether the regulation conforms to the intent of the General Assembly in the enactment of the statute upon which the regulation is based. In making its determination, IRRC shall consider written comments submitted by the committees and current members of the General Assembly, pertinent opinions of Pennsylvania's courts and formal opinions of the Attorney General. 71 P.S. § 745.5b.

Representatives Sheryl Delozier and Jordan Harris and Senators John DiSanto and Judith Schwank, prime sponsors of the legislation that ultimately was enacted as Act 53, more commonly known as "occupational licensing reform," submitted comments raising concerns about the proposed regulation. The legislators state that they be-

lieve that the Bureau and its boards and commissions have misconstrued the intent of Act 53. The legislators write,

The general theme of Act 53 was that applicants can be presumed unfit only for convictions that are directly related to the practice of the profession in which they seek to practice. The boards and commissions that operate under the umbrella of the [Bureau] were charged with determining what offenses are "directly related" to their practice areas.

But the lists of "directly related" offenses proposed by the licensing boards and commissions are overly broad and are in direct contrast to the spirit of this legislation and the intentions of its makers. For example, the Barber Board's list includes convictions for the possession of a controlled substance with the intent to deliver and felony DUI. Unequivocally, these offenses were not what the General Assembly envisioned as being "directly related" to the profession of barbering when approving this language. Indeed, it compels one to suspend all logic and sense to understand the reasoning underlying the inclusion of these offenses, knowing that such convictions result in the presumption that the applicant poses a "substantial risk" if licensed.

* * * *

In other examples, the Board of Nursing has listed as "directly related" 92 separate offenses beyond violent, sexual, and drug trafficking offenses. Many of the boards include garden[-]variety drug offenses on their lists, seemingly for only a general feeling that drugs are bad.

Moreover, none of the lists contain time limits on how long an offense is "directly related." As a result, anyone who ever in their lives was convicted of a listed offense is presumed unfit, no matter how many years have passed. These lifetime bans look remarkably similar to the prior law that we replaced with Act 53, which permitted exclusion of people with felony convictions for their entire lives. A regulatory package that creates lists of lifetime bans is not consistent with the intent of Act 53, which was to open the licensed professions to people with criminal records if they are fit to do the work and do not pose a heightened risk.

The regulatory package frequently discusses "transparency" as if it were the goal that drove Act 53. While transparency was certainly a goal of the legislation, the primary objectives, as we have said, were to open the professions more widely to rehabilitated people with old and unrelated criminal records and to provide relief to businesses struggling to find qualified workers.

We urge the Department [of State] to thoroughly review and revise with the boards and commissions the "directly related" lists before resubmission of the package to [IRRC], based upon the intent of the law.

Commenters agree with and echo concerns raised by the legislators. Commenters state that the proposed regulation includes directly related lists of criminal offenses which are generally overbroad and include no time limits for consideration of offenses. Commenters emphasize the concern that the regulations effectively create lifetime bans on pursuing certain occupations if the individual was convicted of one of the listed crimes at some point—even decades in the past. The co-sponsorship memo from Senators DiSanto and Schwank states that

the legislation "will remove unnecessary barriers to employment and entrepreneurship" by requiring occupational licensure boards and commissions to consider, among other factors, "the amount of time that has passed since conviction." Further, Sen. DiSanto remarked on the Senate floor that the legislation overhauls the State's "restrictive occupational licensure laws that deny many qualified residents the right to work because of an old or irrelevant criminal record."

Commenters raise additional concerns that although the presumption of unfitness may be overcome in an individualized assessment which is provided for in Section 43b.404 (relating to consideration of criminal convictions), the individualized assessment does not occur until after completion of training. One commenter notes that "[f]ew people will be able to devote the time and resources to a training program for a profession knowing that they face such a presumption at the end. In this way, the proposed regulations frustrate the purpose of Act 53 by deterring and excluding low-risk people with criminal convictions."

The Bureau addresses the concept of placing time limits in the proposed schedules in response to Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF) Question # 26 relating to alternative regulatory provisions. The Bureau explains that the definition of "directly relates" in Act 53 is not time-bound, nor has the General Assembly placed time limits on which crimes or categories of crimes may be considered by boards/commissions in making licensure determinations. Citing the definition of "directly relates" as taken from Act 53, the Bureau states in the RAF that a crime directly relates to a particular profession or occupation where "[t]he nature of the criminal conduct for which the person was convicted has a direct bearing on the fitness or ability to perform one or more of the duties or responsibilities necessarily related to the profession, trade or occupation for which the individual seeks licensure." Thus, the Bureau explains, it is the nature of the criminal conduct that dictates whether a crime directly relates to a profession, and not when the crime occurred. The Bureau states that it believes that the inclusion of time limits would be inconsistent with the legislative intent of Act 53 and amounts to a basic policy decision that is best left to the General Assembly. The Bureau concludes its response by stating that the Commissioner and the boards/commissions believe that the proposed regulation represents the least restrictive, acceptable alternative consistent with the legislative intent of Act 53.

Section 2(a) of the RRA, pertaining to legislative intent, provides the following direction: "To the greatest extent possible, this act is intended to encourage the resolution of objections to a regulation and the reaching of a consensus among [IRRC], the standing committees, interested parties and the agency." 71 P.S. § 745.2(a). As it prepares the final-form regulation, we ask the Bureau to consult the legislature to clarify the legislative intent of Act 53 and to engage stakeholders to reach consensus where possible. Additionally, we ask the Bureau to explain in the Preamble how the final-form regulation is reasonable and consistent with the General Assembly's intent.

2. Protection of the public health, safety, and welfare; Reasonableness.

The Bureau proposes a schedule of criminal convictions that may constitute ground to refuse to issue, suspend, or revoke a license, certificate, registration, or permit for each of the 29 professional and occupational licensing boards and commissions in proposed Sections 43b.423—43b.451. The Bureau states, "Each schedule indicates which offenses are those that the applicable licensing board or commission deems as directly related to the occupations or professions regulated by that board or commission, that is, those offenses where the nature of the criminal conduct for which the person was convicted has a direct bearing on the fitness or ability to perform one or more of the duties or responsibilities necessarily related to the profession or occupation for which the individual seeks a license, registration, certificate, or permit."

The PA Chiropractic Association (Association) opposes the proposed regulation as relates to doctors of chiropractic, stating that there are at least 27 crimes and offenses considered to be directly related to the chiropractic profession that are not considered to be directly related to the medical profession. Conversely, the Association points out that there are at least 15 crimes and offenses considered to be directly related to the medical profession that are not considered to be directly related to the chiropractic profession.

Similarly, several nursing associations raise concerns over inconsistency among health care professionals, noting that there are over 90 crimes on the list of directly related offenses under the Board of Nursing, whereas the Medical Board's list has 34 crimes. One association points out that theft-related crimes of all grades, DUI, possession of a small amount of marijuana, and lower-level crimes like simple assault are included as directly related to Registered Nurses (inclusive of Nurse Practitioners) and Licensed Practical Nurses, but not included as directly related to Physician's Assistants or Physicians.

Commenters assert that crimes that are designated as directly related should be uniform across all health care professions and occupations except where the listed offenses are specific to the scope of practice. Did the health care licensing boards consult with one another in determining which offenses to include in their schedules? We ask the Bureau to explain the reasonableness of and any impact on the public health, safety, and welfare of inconsistency among the schedules of health care professionals.

3. Section 43b.201. Fees for services.—Clarity.

This section establishes a fee for a preliminary determination application. While the Bureau addresses the process for qualifying for a waiver of the fee in the Preamble, the proposed regulation itself is silent on the existence of a waiver and the process for obtaining one. We ask the Bureau to add language to this section in the final regulation clarifying the availability of and process for seeking a waiver of the fee for a preliminary determination application.

4. Section 43b.404. Consideration of criminal convictions.—Clarity.

The Pennsylvania Society of Health-System Pharmacists requests clarification relating to drug trafficking offenses, stating that Subparagraph (d)(2)(ix) also should pertain to pharmacy interns and their registration process. We ask the Bureau to include pharmacy interns in this provision in the final regulation.

Schedules of criminal convictions.—Reasonableness.

Related to Section 43b.423 (relating to schedule of criminal convictions—State Board of Accountancy), the Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants

(PICPA) provides a list of other crimes, such as theft of trade secrets and mail fraud, which PICPA believes directly relate to the duties necessary to ensure the public's trust and confidence in the profession. PICPA asserts that these convictions should be added to the final regulation. We ask the Bureau to amend the final regulation to include the directly related convictions or explain in the Preamble to the final regulation the reasonableness of excluding them.

Based on the insights provided by this commenter, we ask the Bureau to consider whether additional offenses specific to other boards/commissions were omitted. A thorough reevaluation of all offenses and practices is therefore encouraged to ensure that the final list is appropriate, reasonable, and neither overly-broad nor under-inclusive.

Tentative Order

By the Commission:

The Commission's regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) state that an Electric Generation Supplier (EGS) license will not be issued or remain in force until the licensee furnishes a bond or other security approved by the Commission. In addition, 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(d) states that the maintenance of an EGS license is contingent on the licensee providing proof to the Commission that a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission has been obtained.

Each EGS must file an original bond, letter of credit, continuation certificate, amendment, or other approved

financial instrument with Rosemary Chiavetta, Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, 400 North Street, Harrisburg, PA, 17120, prior to the EGS's current security expiration date. Each financial instrument must be an original document that displays a "wet" signature or digital signature, preferably in blue ink, and displays a "raised seal" or original notary stamp. The name of the principal on the original financial instrument must match exactly with the name that appears on the EGS's license issued by the Commission.

Failure to file before the financial security's expiration date may cause Commission staff to initiate a formal proceeding that may lead to the following: cancellation of each company's electric supplier license, removal of each company's information from the Commission's website, and notification to all electric distribution companies, in which each company is licensed to do business, of the cancellation of the license.

As of January 3, 2023, each EGS listed in the Supplier Table below has not provided proof to the Commission that it has a bond or other approved security in the amount or language directed by the Commission, to replace a bond which is expired, or which is noncompliant with Commission regulations.

As part of its EGS license validation procedures, the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services sent a 90-day Security Renewal Notice email to each entity in the Supplier Table above stating that original documentation of a bond, or other approved security in the amount or language directed by the Commission, must be filed within 30-days prior to each entity's security expiration date. None of the companies listed in the Supplier Table provided the required documentation.

Based on the above facts, we tentatively conclude that the EGSs listed in the Supplier Table are not in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) and (d) and therefore it is appropriate to initiate the cancellation process for the EGS license of each company listed in the Supplier Table, without the necessity of a formal complaint, as being in the public interest; *Therefore*,

Order

By the Authority:

The Authority is the sole regulator of all taxicab, limousine and transportation network company services in Philadelphia. The Authority is empowered to conduct rate investigations and determine the rates that shall be charged by all taxicabs authorized to provide call or demand service in Philadelphia.²

On June 28, 2022, the Authority authorized the Taxicab and Limousine Division ("TLD") to amend the open rate investigation3 to gather information and comment concerning the amended petition for a rate change that was filed with the TLD seeking:

"an increase in the Airport flat rate from \$28.50 to \$32.00. Petitioner further request that the minimum fare from the Airport increase from \$11.00 to \$20.00. Both of these amendments will offset the reduction in fares, escalating fuel and consumer prices, and the rising cost of vehicle maintenance."4

Currently, the taxicab tariff allows for a flat rate of \$28.50 to be charged to and from the Philadelphia International Airport ("Airport") and the Center City Zone, as defined by the tariff in lieu of the metered rate charged by medallion taxicabs (hereinafter "Flat Rate"). Additionally, the current taxicab tariff sets a minimum fare of \$11.00 for any medallion taxicab trip starting an Airport taxicab stand. The Airport egress fee of \$1.50 is included in both the Flat Rate and minimum fare.

The TLD sought written comments from the industry members and the general public concerning the aforementioned rate changes. A total of ninety-four (94) comments were received from the general public and industry members alike and 52% of the comments were in support of the TLD's recommendations of increasing the Airport flat rate as proposed and increasing the minimum fare to only \$12.00.

The TLD investigated the proposed changes. The TLD gathered data concerning the number of taxicabs in service, number of trips being provided to and from the Airport, the current state of the market, comparable rates provided by other for-hire transportation services and ramifications resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Based upon review of all information received and recommendation of TLD staff, Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved and Ordered by the Board of the Authority as follows:

Section 1. Rate Changes.

(a) Effective February 6, 2023, the current taxicab tariff is to be amended as follows:

A \$1.00 per passenger surcharge for each additional passenger after the first will be added to the meter after the flat rate fee is engaged on the meter by the driver after leaving the Airport. This applies only to passengers over the age of twelve (12). If the trip necessitates a drop-off at more than one destination in the Center City Zone, the following applies: the flat rate and all additional per passenger surcharges of \$1.00 each are to be collected upon departure of the first passenger in the Center City Zone. The driver will then reset the meter initiating a new flag drop using the standard meter rates for each of the remaining passengers if each requires a separate drop-off.
- 3. The minimum fare that will include the egress fee for any trip starting at an Airport taxicab stand shall be \$12.00.
- (b) All other rates as outlined in the current taxicab tariff shall remain unchanged.

STATE POLICE

Canine Training and Certification Program

Under 53 Pa.C.S. § 2172 (relating to canine training standards for police officers), the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission (Commission), in collaboration with the Pennsylvania State Police and municipal police department canine units or officers, shall establish police officer canine training and certification standards, including all of the following:

- (1) Standards for initial certifications.
- (2) Standards for maintenance certifications.
- (3) Record-keeping policies and procedures for police department canine units or officers.

The Commission adopted the following standards under the authority of 53 Pa.C.S. § 2172 on December 8, 2022, and submits them for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Training and Certification Standards

1. Basic Training

A. Prior to conducting police operations, a police canine unit must complete a basic training program that includes instruction in basic working dog skills (temperament, obedience, apprehension, and the like), applicable specialty skills (patrol, scent, and the like) and team training with the assigned handler.

- B. Following completion of basic training, the police canine unit must be evaluated and approved by a police canine trainer operating with the approval of one of the following organizations:
- i. American Mantrailing, Police & Work Dog Association
 - ii. American Police Canine Association
 - iii. National Narcotic Detector Dog Association
 - iv. National Police Canine Association
 - v. National Tactical Police Dog Association
 - vi. North American Police Work Dog Association

- vii. Penn Vet Working Dog Center
- viii. Pennsylvania State Police
- ix. United States Customs and Border Protection
- x. United States Police Canine Association
- xi. United Police and Corrections K-9 Association
- xii. Transportation Security Administration
- 2. Maintenance Training and Evaluation
- A. Every police canine unit shall accomplish 16 hours of monthly maintenance training that includes review of basic skills, specialty skills and use of force decision-making by the handler.
- i. A police canine unit that is unable to complete monthly training shall document the reasons and will be required to make up the missed training at the next available opportunity.
- ii. A police canine unit that fails to accomplish monthly training for 2 consecutive months will be required to be evaluated in accordance with 2.B before being permitted to conduct police operations.
- B. At least once per calendar year, each police canine unit must be evaluated and approved by a police canine trainer as specified in 1.A.

- C. A police canine unit that fails an evaluation may continue to conduct police operations for a period not to exceed 60 days, during which the canine unit must be re-evaluated and approved.
- D. A police canine unit not meeting evaluation and approval standards within 60 days will be removed from service until the police canine unit is successfully evaluated and approved.
- 3. Records and Documentation
- A. Every police department employing a police canine unit shall maintain documentation of all basic and maintenance training for the duration of the police canine unit's service and for at least 5 years following the end of the police canine unit's service with the department.
- B. Both initial and annual evaluations will be documented on a form promulgated by the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission.
- C. Evaluations, whether successful or unsuccessful, shall be maintained for the duration of the police canine unit's service and for at least 5 years following the end of the police canine unit's service with the department.
